

JANUARY FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

West Street Parking: Did you know that even if you park legally on the road, you could still be held liable for an accident involving another vehicle?

The Highway Code states in Rule 242: "You MUST NOT leave your vehicle or trailer in a dangerous position or where it causes any unnecessary obstruction of the road." This means that parking in a way that creates a hazard—such as near a bend in the road—could make you liable for accidents caused by other road users who are forced to move onto the wrong side of the road to navigate the bend. In such cases, proximate cause may come into play. This legal principle means that if your parking is shown to have directly contributed to the accident (for example, by obstructing visibility or creating a dangerous condition), you could be held responsible. In other words, your car's location could be considered a proximate cause of the collision, as it led to an unsafe driving situation.

Dorset Adventure Park: Sam Thompson and Tom Campbell-Hill, directors of Dorset Adventure Park, joined the January Parish Council meeting to share their vision for the Water Park's future under their leadership. One such vision is to work with other stakeholders to create safe pedestrian access to the park from Norden. The Parish Council extends its gratitude for their insightful presentation and looks forward to fostering a close and collaborative relationship with them in the years to come.

Swanage and Purbeck Town of Culture bid 2026: Richard Coleman (Mowlem Centre Trustee) and Culvin Milmer (Visitor Services and Business Development Manager; Swanage Town Council) attended the January Parish Council meeting, where they gave a short presentation on the Swanage and Purbeck Town of Culture bid for 2026. The Parish Council agreed to support the bid with a £600 contribution if successful. Fingers crossed for 2026 to be our year of culture!

Footpath update: The long-standing issues with the footpath from East Street to the play park area has taken another step forward. During recent works, the National Trust identified asbestos on the site, which must be safely removed before progress can continue. By the time you're reading this, the asbestos removal should either be underway or completed. The intention is to build a dry-stone wall by the path. The Parish Council remains committed to ensuring this project moves forward and will continue to follow up with the National Trust.

National Trust: At the January meeting, the National Trust (Corfe Castle) asked what priorities or support the Parish Council would like from them this year. If you have any suggestions, concerns, or ideas that the National Trust could assist with, please share them with the Parish Council Clerk via email. Your input is valuable in shaping our collaboration with the National Trust!

Precept / Council Tax: For the financial year 2025-26, the Parish Council has set the Precept at £61,450, representing an 11.36% increase from last year. However, due to the change in the amount of tax second homes now pay the increase per Band D home will be 3% which equates to 20p per month. The Precept is used to maintain Parish Council assets such as the play park and other open spaces; Support vital community projects, and it enables us to respond proactively to the community's needs. Thank you for your continued support in helping us maintain and improve our wonderful parish.

Reflection Garden Approved: In the new extension of God's Acre Cemetery, the Parish Council has approved an exciting project to create a beautiful Reflection Garden, overlooked by the iconic Corfe Castle. This serene space will include new seating areas, a dedicated memorial section, and a designated area for the scattering of ashes.

Church Knowle Parish Council

The January meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 14th January 2025 at 6:30pm. It was attended by six members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair) and two members of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

<u>Damage to the Tracks along the top of the Church Knowle Hills by Off-Road</u> Vehicles

There was a detailed discussion on the damage that is being done to the tracks along the top of the hills at Cucknowle and other locations. These tracks are designated rights of way with highway numbers (D50604, D52004 etc) and there is therefore, subject to any statutory restrictions and limitations placed on them, a public right of way. This right however only applies to the designated road and users may only pass over the road itself. They must not stray off the road, drive over and damage tumuli (which are listed historical monuments) nor may they leave the road and onto the private land bordering the road. Any damage to these unmade up rights of way caused by unnecessary journeys in wet weather or by careless use generally will be permanent and they will simply degrade until they are unusable. This is an on-going problem and concerns motor cycles and off road vehicles.

There will be a further public discussion and possible measures to deal with this problem will be explored at the next parish council meeting at the Furzebrook Village Hall on 11th February. Any interested party or parishioners are invited to come along and participate or make suggestions.

Vacancies on the Parish Council

There is still one vacancy on the council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk.

Dorset Council

Dorset Councillor Ben Wilson said that the main item concerning Purbeck was the statutory Public Inquiry into the Ferry Company's application to increase its fares yet again. The inquiry is scheduled for Tuesday 21st January at the Poole Harbour Commissioners Building in Poole. More details can be found on the sandbanksferry.co.uk website. This is not a popular venue

as most of those affected are on the Swanage/Studland side of the crossing. Anyone is entitled to attend – it is a Public enquiry.

Cllr Wilson also reported that Dorset Council had voted to increase Council Tax by 4.99%.

Gates onto the Railway Line

A Councillor noted that the gates allowing vehicles to cross the railway line were, despite signs requesting that they be kept closed, nearly always left open. This will allow animals to stray onto the track and cause problems for all concerned, including the animals if they slip down an embankment. There is a £1000 fine for leaving these open. Readers are therefore requested to close any railway gates they find open.

30 mph Speed Limit

The Dorset Highways Traffic Regulation Team will begin the public consultation for implementing a speed limit at the end of January. As soon as details are available they will be put on the website (churchknowle-pc.gov.uk) under Information—Notices. They say a good level of community engagement is useful in supporting new speed limits.

The meeting finished at 7:50 pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Furzebrook Village Hall at 6:30 on 11th February 2025.

Environmental Group Update



At this time of year, our thoughts often turn to planning our holidays.

It's probably too late for 2025 for anyone interested in skiing holidays, but did you know that you can book a holiday to the snow by train? **Travelski.uk** (www.uk.travelski.com) offers packages to the French Alps that include train travel, transfers, 8 nights' accommodation and a 7-day lift pass.



While I haven't used this company so can't offer a personal recommendation, it's good to know holiday providers are starting to offer green holidays.

Another interesting holiday / travel website I recently found is **greentraveller** (www.greentraveller.co.uk). This site offers low carbon holiday ideas and includes a number of e-Guides to places as diverse as Spain, Greece, West Sweden and Belize. Staying closer to home, Green Travel Guides to Protected Areas in England as available, including a guide to Dorset. This website also has information on planning a flight free journey covering overland train journeys, including more unusual destinations for rail travel to Europe, for example Barcelona, Copenhagen, Zurich or Cologne, or journeys using ferries – how about Morrocco by train and ferry?! There is even a guide to "How to travel from South West England to Europe without flying" which includes sections with travel by ferry, coach or train. Although most journeys do not start from Dorset, it should be straightforward to link into the suggested routes by public transport from Purbeck.

Greentraveller also suggest using the excellent rail journey planning website **The Man in Seat Sixty-One** (www.seat61.com). Last year I used this site to plan a trip round Europe, taking in Paris, Barcelona, Madrid and Lisbon. While it is often more expensive to travel by train then to fly, the journey becomes part of the holiday as you enjoy the scenery, and you can make savings by sleeping on the train. Adults can buy an **Interrail pass** (www.interrail.eu/en) giving unlimited travel in 33 countries in Europe for 5 days (which do not need to be consecutive) for £267 (dropping to £201 for 12-27 years old and £240 for those over 60). Child passes for 4–11-year-olds are free (up to 2 free passes per adult). Unfortunately, seat / couchette reservations are extra.

News From the Castle



This month in the castle's history

National 14 Trust the

14th February 1203 - King John ordered 24 captured knights from the siege of Mirabeau to be starved to death at Corfe Castle. They were thrown in to the Oublette located in the West Bailey

and left to die.

27th February 1646 – The castle was betrayed and parliamentarians gained access and control of the castle through a Sallyport. The castle was destroyed by March 1646.

22 February 1866 - A local newspaper published news of the Butavant tower partially collapsing in a gale and villagers said it sounded like 'the world was ending'.

28 February 1954 – Commencement of Ministry of Works programme of repairs to the castle as it was in a 'poor condition' and 'undermined by rabbits'. First phase of the works was in the Keep and there was a dramatic failed attempt to drop scaffolding from a helicopter into the Inner Ward. Instead, an inclined slipway had to be built for transporting scaffolding (The Sphere newspaper, Saturday 28 February 1959). Before work began it was acknowledged the toil would be arduous, especially at high level, and workers were paid higher rates than usually allowed for this type of work. Also, as large stones were regularly falling, danger money was paid on top!

New strategy – focus on nature

In Purbeck, we're already underway with much of this work. We'll continue working in partnerships such as the Purbeck Heaths Super National Nature Reserve, the Dorset Peat Partnership, and Dorset Goes Wild which is giving all Purbeck children the chance to connect with nature. And of course. protecting the flower-

rich grassland, scrub and woodland of Corfe Common.

We're also supporting farmers in initiatives to restore nature, while producing good, healthy food and running sustainable businesses. And an exciting project begins this year to revive our ailing waterways, including those in the Corfe area. Watch this space to learn more – and find ways in which you can help.

Let bramble take a ramble!

Did you know that brambles are foot food for wildlife, even in the depths

of winter? To prove it, this handsome bullfinch is feasting on the seeds!

While wildlife feeds on the leaves, flowers, fruit and seeds of bramble, the thorns protect nesting birds and mammals from predators. So, if you want to create a wildlife haven in your garden, let bramble take a ramble!

Going back to the bullfinch, this is a shy, secretive bird – but you can often hear its breathless piping and whistling. Notice its short, stout beak, perfect for cracking open seeds, nuts and buds.




Little Woolgarston Farm

Little Woolgarston Farm was a series of arable and pasture fields of over 54 acres lying south of Sandyhill Lane between Challow Farm to the west and Woolgarston Farm on the east. It was developed in the early 1800s and became another of those many, small holdings in the area. In just this one locality in the 18th century, there were 6 different landholders which would in time merge to become part of the Rempstone Estate. Only one owner lived here in 1772 – Robert Diffey. The rest lived in Poole, Langton, Corfe, Rempstone and Studland.




John Strong's field at Little Woolgarston in 1772 of about 12 ½ acres. Sandyhill Lane is shown above it.

John Strong of Poole, a butcher, bequeathed 'Woolston' to his son, Farr Strong, in 1749 "Item I give and devise unto my Son Farr Strong and his Heirs and Assigns for ever all that my Estate at Woolston in the Isle of Purbeck and County of Dorsett". Farr Strong still owned this land in 1777 and left it to his children. By 1844, John Smith owned what had been Mr Strong's large field and had had a small cottage built (now called 'The Barn') on the field.



Outline on a modern map roughly showing John Strong's original field.


Before 1844, another house was built on wasteland which today is known as 'Little Woolgarston Farmhouse'. This was still owned by the Rempstone Estate, and they would eventually purchase Mr Smith's field and auction the whole farm off in July 1919. It was part of over 2000 acres sold at that time.





Unplug to Unwind

Only large appliances such as fridges are designed to be left switched on all the time, so ensuring that everything else is unplugged before you go to bed is a simple routine that could protect your home from fire.

To help reduce the risk of a fire in your home, take these simple steps:

- Make sure an electrical appliance has a British or European safety mark when you buy it. Only buy your electrical chargers from a reputable source.
- Never leave items on charge when you are sleeping or when you are not at home.
- Don't overload sockets.



- Regularly check for frayed or worn cables and wires.
- Buy your electrical chargers from a reputable source.
- Register your appliances to receive notification of safety alerts or product recalls at www.registermyappliance.org.uk


Turned out wet again - Rainfall in 2024

This time last year I reported that 2023 had been the 2nd wettest year in my admittedly rather short sequence of annual rainfall records for Corfe Castle (since 2010). I can now confirm what you already know about last year. 2024 was almost as wet as 2023, making it the 3rd wettest year in my records (Figure 1).

In 2024 we had 1,094mm (or just a tad over 1 meter)

of rain! That was only 20mm less than in 2023 when we had 1,114mm. So, we have now had back-to-back wet years in 2024 and 2023 as we did in 2012 and 2013. 2014 was very wet too, so back then we had three wet years in a row. Let's hope 2025 does not result in a repeat of that pattern.


2024 was a year of ups and downs (Figure 2). It started well enough with a reasonably dry January (85mm) but February 2024 was exceptionally wet with over 200mm of rain falling – well over twice the normal amount for February. March was also abnormally wet (112mm). Following on from the soaking we had between September and December 2023, this all made for an extremely



soggy start to Spring 2024. April 2024 (57mm) was back to normal but then we had three months of erratic rainfall.

91mm of rain in May was almost twice the average rainfall for that month, but this was followed by a biscuit-dry June (9.5mm) (about one fifth of the normal June rainfall). To make up for that we got another soaking in July with 90mm,

again very nearly twice the normal July rainfall. That gave us our 4th abnormally wet month of the year and repeated the pattern of 2023 when we also had a very dry June followed by a very wet July. What is going on? Thankfully, August rainfall was more normal (42mm) but then, just as we might have been hoping for an Indian summer, September washed that idea away with another soaking of 151mm of rain (6 inches in old money)- more than twice the normal September rainfall. October and November were both as wet as normal (103 and 107mm) but we finished 2024 with our 2nd unusually dry month of the year – December having just 41mm – about one third of the normal rainfall for that month. So, a topsy turvy year with 2 unusually dry months but five unusually wet ones.



Our average annual rainfall from 2010 to 2023 was 932mm. After 2024, it has gone up to 944mm. I hope it comes down again, although in these days of climate change, I don't think we can have much faith in the old maxim that what goes up MUST come down. It seems to be just the rain that keeps coming down these days.

The Rambling Gardener

Spring is on its way: beautiful delicate Snowdrops, Crocus, early Daffodils and Camellias are all in flower. On sunny days one is tempted to go walking, which always makes one feel so good. On poor days get out the binoculars and watch the wonderful wildlife from inside if you can. Purbeck is blessed with lots of birds, especially as it is warmer here than farther north, and sometimes we get the odd bird that has been blown in a gale from other countries. It is fun to make a list of all the birds one sees and make a comparison between the seasons and the years.

Many years ago my husband got a bad abscess on his neck. The Doctor told him to mix honey with white flour until it was like putty and in the morning all the puss had been pulled out of his neck. Many years later my child had a painful mark with a ring around it on her leg. I was worried about blood poisoning, but a honey poltice pulled a thorn out of it overnight and all was healthy. Then, recently, I bought something called Hair Honey to reduce split ends; it has been good for my hair, but it has also been better than the Doctor's creams for my itchy skin. Honey is just amazing.

There are lots of herbs that can support our health, and I wish that every village had a herbalist. I think my tea made with dandelion leaf and roots, nettle leaves, lemon balm, rosemary, comfrey, mint and honey from local bees is a good general pick up. We are what we eat and drink, and those herbs, taken carefully, support our immune system.

February is the month to start sowing seed to keep the garden producing for the coming year. Sow early Peas like Kelvedon Wonder, which is hardy and short and if you sow every month, you can have peas all summer. Also plant sets of Garlic, Onions and Shallots. Stake all Cabbages as they hate wind rock. Sow Tomatoes inside to grow on in the greenhouse, and Lettuce to plant outside later. Sow Mustard on a windowsill to cut when a few inches high to spice up meals - young leaves are very nutritious; eat everything as fresh as possible.

I have just bought 2 winter flowering Camellias which should flower for 3 months every year. They need acid soil but planting them in leaf mold should be ok. It is worth taking care planting as they are very long lived.

I hope you have a good February. I enjoy seeing people in my garden so please do just ring and come to visit. All the best to you and may 2025 go well.

COMMUNITY WEEKEND TO GIVE PUBLIC OPPORTUNITY TO GO BEHIND THE SCENES ON THE SWANAGE RAILWAY

Dedicated Swanage Railway volunteers are to stage a fascinating two-day Community Weekend giving the public the opportunity to go behind the scenes of the award-winning heritage line that has been rebuilt since 1976.

The special event takes place on Saturday and Sunday, 22 and 23 February, 2025, - between 10am and 4pm - with staff at Swanage, Herston, Harman's Cross, Corfe Castle and Norden stations taking part.

For people living in Dorset, half-price Community Weekend standard travel train tickets are available in advance from the Swanage Railway website - at swanagerailway.co.uk – and on the day at the Norden, Corfe Castle and Swanage station ticket offices.

Proof of Dorset residence has to be supplied when purchasers collect their tickets or purchase standard travel train tickets from ticket offices on the day.

With advance booking of tickets recommended at swanagerailway.co.uk, there will be the chance to drive a 1950s heritage diesel shunter at Swanage for £20, watch a train guard or on-train travelling ticket inspector perform their duties for £7.50 (additional train travel ticket purchase required) as well as enjoy a £7.50 behind the scenes tour of the award-winning mechanical signal boxes at

Harman's Cross or Corfe Castle stations.

The public can also book – via the Swanage Railway website – visits to the Swanage Railway's steam locomotive engineering works, located on the outskirts of Swanage, with a heritage bus service operating from Swanage and Norden stations to the works.

Walk-up non-advance bookable free attractions - with donations appreciated - will be visits to 1960s heritage telephone exchanges at Harman's Cross and Corfe Castle stations (both subject to volunteer availability) between 10.30am

and 3.30pm as well as the chance to have a go at signalling at the Corfe Castle signalling museum, subject to volunteer availability.

Visitors will also be able to chat to volunteers at Herston Halt – which is only accessible on foot or by train - about the development of the community halt, which was the Swanage Railway's first station, since it welcomed its first train from Swanage in 1984.

Other walk-up non-advance bookable free attractions — with donations appreciated — take place on the Saturday and Sunday at Corfe Castle station. There will be the chance to meet the restorers of heritage carriages as well as


