#### APRIL FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

As spring settles in across Corfe Castle Parish, the Council continues its work on local matters that impact our daily lives, from protecting our beautiful byways to planning for long-term housing needs and greener community spaces. Here's a round-up of what was discussed and decided at the most recent full council meeting, held in April.

Protecting the Rights of Way and Byways Open to All Traffic (BOAT): Corfe Castle Parish Council supports Church Knowle's initiative encouraging responsible use of Rights of Way and Byways Open to All Traffic (BOATs). A joint application for funding from the Dorset Police & Crime Commissioner to install signage discouraging anti-social behaviour will be submitted soon.

Corfe Castle Parish Council Opposes Sale of Rented Homes: Corfe Castle Parish Council has voiced strong opposition to the sale of rented properties, due to the potential loss of vital rental accommodation within the village. The Council is particularly concerned about the distress such sales can cause to long-standing tenants and believes that evictions should be avoided wherever possible. Recognising the importance of maintaining a stable and accessible rental market, the Council is open to discussions and committed to exploring alternative solutions. The Council express a willingness to work collaboratively with landlords, housing associations, and other third parties to help protect and expand the availability of rented accommodation within the parish.

**BMX / Skate Park:** The Parish Council has recently been approached with a suggestion to create a BMX and skate park within the village. While no decisions have been made, we are keen to hear from residents before exploring this idea further. Your thoughts, whether supportive or not, are important in helping us understand the level of local interest and any concerns. Please get in touch to share your views.

New adult exercise equipment: The Council has approved in principle a new adult fitness area by the Sports pavilion with five exercise machines. It has provisionally allocated £15k from reserves. Planning permission will now be applied for.

**Tree Planting**: The Council has agreed to plant trees in several locations later this year using funds in the Environment group reserve. The locations are listed on the agenda papers for the April meeting.

**Council wins bus grant:** The council has provisionally been awarded £5k from Dorset Council to investigate and run a shuttle between Purbeck Park and the

village. Any new service could not operate until 2026 and this timing has to be agreed with Dorset Council.

Water Recycling Centres: Corfe Castle Parish Council received updates regarding Wessex Water; upgrades are approved but may not be completed until after 2030. An invitation was extended to visit a recycling site in April, which Cllr Sumbler accepted.

**Financial Matters & Audit:** The Annual Governance & Accountability Return (AGAR) for 2024/25 was reviewed and approved. The AGAR documents will be submitted to BDO LLP for an intermediate audit. Accounts are open for public viewing between 3<sup>rd</sup> June and 14<sup>th</sup> July 2025. Please contact the Clerk via email to book a viewing appointment.

**Planning application update:** Full details for all planning applications can be found on the Dorset Council website, https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/planning-buildings-land/planning. The following applications have been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council:

**Application** No: P/TRC/2025/01555, **Location**: Corfe Castle Railway Station, Station Road Corfe Castle BH20 5EJ **Proposal**: T1 Yew - Fell. **Comment**: On grounds of safety no objection.

**Application** No: P/NOTP/2025/01600, **Location**: West Street Corfe Castle Kingston East Holme, **Proposal**: Removal of three phone boxes, **Comment**: No comment.

Application No: P/HOU/2025/01344 & P/LBC/2025/01345, Location: 78 East Street Corfe Castle BH20 5EQ, Proposal: Raise and replace roof on existing single-storey rear addition and install new French doors. Remove coal bunker to rear and infill blockwork. Remove hanging basket metalwork to front. Remove bathroom window and install skylight. Replace staircase and removal of chimney cladding. Remove internal kitchen wall and further wall below internal window. Erect new internal wall to facilitate WC. New floor infill and internal partition walls at first floor. Comment: Corfe Castle Parish Council have no objection. The removal of the hanging basket metalwork will facilitate maintenance and replacing the polycarbonate roof and U-PVC doors with a flat roof, roof lantern, and timber French doors enhances the building's character. The use of timber in place of U-PVC is more appropriate for the listed setting.

The proposals align with pre-application advice and are supported by the conservation officer. There is no harm to heritage assets, and the alterations support the continued use and upkeep of the property.

**Application** No: P/FUL/2025/00932, **Location**: Wytch Farm Gathering Station Access Road to Wytch Gathering Station Corfe Castle BH20 5JR, **Proposal**: Installation and operation of a replacement produced water pipeline between Wellsite B2 and the Gathering Station, Wytch Farm Oilfield, by horizontal directional drilling., **Comment**: Corfe Castle Parish Council have no objection, as Perenco plans to use Horizontal Directional Drilling (HDD) rather than an open trench, which will reduce site disturbance.

**Application** No: P/HOU/2025/01896, **Location**: 58 West Street Corfe Castle BH20 5HE, **Proposal**: Single storey wrap around rear extension, **Comment**: Corfe Castle Parish Council have no objection, as this is a reduction in size of the extension from the original application and is welcomed with the new scheme being more proportionate to the size of the site. The use of pebbledash as the external finish is in keeping with the existing building.

**Application** No: P/TRC/2025/02167, **Location**: 38 East Street, Corfe Castle, BH20 5EQ, **Proposal**: G1 Group of 3x Lawson Cypress in hedgerow - Remove to ground level., G2 Group of mixed elder and dead / small living Lawson cypress (approx. 15 small hedge plants) - Approx. 7m length to be removed to ground level. T2 & T3 Elders - Fell to ground level. T4 Plum - Reduce 1x main stem by approximately 2m, as indicated on submitted photograph. T4a Sycamore (self-seeded sapling in brambles) - Remove to ground level. T5 Plum - Remove to ground level. **Comment**: No objection.

**Dorset Council Updates**: Dorset Council have appointed a new Chief Executive Dr Catherine Howe. Dr Howe has a varied background in both Commercial and Local Authorities. Dr Howe will join in August.

**Street Lighting:** A consultation has been launched on Street lighting including the use of different light bulbs. All residents are encouraged to respond. Survey closes 4th May 2025

**Affordable Homes:** Dorset Councillors support an approach to double the number of affordable homes in Dorset. This will be achieved through use of council-owned land and buildings and by leasing more homes across the county.

**Council Tax** – Dorset Council have a dedicated web page for Council Tax (www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/council-tax). If a resident has any queries, they should first visit this page.

Cost of Living Help – Dorset Council are again offering free, confidential, and impartial support on: money worries, accessing affordable food, housing and employment rights and looking after your mental health. # **Environmental Group Update**





# Have you seen the wind turbines turning in Dorset's only Wind Farm, right here in Purbeck?

After 20 years in the making, the four turbines at Alaska Wind Farm at Masters Quarry in East Stoke, near Wareham, are now fully operational. They are expected to generate clean electricity until 2045, enough to meet the estimated average demand for over 5,000 households every year.

#### Wednesday 7th May meet at West Street Car Park at 8pm

Join us and the National Trust as we head to Corfe Common to see (hear!) bats! The National Trust will bring their audible bat detectors and use these not only to locate the bats but also hopefully to identify what species they are. We are also going to try to borrow a thermal imaging device so we can actually visually track the bats as they fly past us – great fun!



As a follow up to Richard's April talk, we will be hosting a swift spotting walk around Corfe Castle village led by both Richard and Julie Hatcher of the Swift Group, and as part of this will investigate if we can identify any suitable sites for swift nest boxes.

#### **Events still in the planning stage:**

**Late May**— a plant survey of the "wild" bank on the right hand side of God's Acre to compare with our 2023 survey.

June / July – walk and picnic on the Common

October – fungi spotting walk. November – hedge / tree planting session(s).

#### Young environmentalists meet minister

National Trust

Students from the Purbeck School were among the first in the country to gain qualifications in the new Environment Leaders Programme. Under the guidance of the National Trust, the 13

sixth form students worked on initiatives across the Purbeck Heaths. They included projects to raise awareness of threats to ground-nesting birds, tree

planting, tracking the grazing pigs and creating an Instagram account to encourage other young people to get out into the countryside.

The students reported that the scheme had helped build their self-confidence and leadership skills, as well as ignite a passion for nature and the outdoors. The award presentation was attended by local MP, Lloyd Hatton.

#### Adders – shy and secretive snakes

This stunning photo of an adder was snapped at Corfe Castle! Now is a good time to glimpse these rare snakes, especially in the mornings when they bask in the sun to build up their energy.

Adders are venomous, but their venom is used to immobilise the small animals they prey on. They aren't aggressive and will usually disappear when they hear your footfall.

#### Remember:

- Never try to handle adders.
- Keep to paths rather than walking in long vegetation.
- Discourage your dogs from exploring in long grass, heather or gorse.
- If you are bitten, seek medical help immediately, or likewise take your dog to a vet.

#### Mystery of puffin decline

Despite extensive footage from remote cameras last year, the reason for the decline of the puffin colony near Dancing Ledge remains a mystery.

The cameras were installed in 2024, in the narrow fissure on the cliff where the puffins nest. The hope was that footage would reveal why pufflings (chicks) aren't surviving to fledge, with predation by rats thought to be the most likely cause. Volunteers have since combed through over 70,000 photos – but no rodents were captured on film.

The investigations have been led by marine ornithologist, Dr Richard Caldow. Although



disappointed that the cameras didn't reveal what the problem is, he and a

team of volunteers are continuing monitoring this year. We're also asking boat operators to share any photos which show exactly where the puffins are nesting. Then we plan to reinstate the cameras next year, using better equipment in more precise locations.

#### Wildfire risk warning

As you'll probably have seen on the news, there is high risk of wildfires on the commons and Purbeck Heaths at the moment. Sadly, there have been several cases of arson on other heaths in Dorset, so please be vigilant and call 999 if you see any suspicious activity. (Note, there are no more controlled burns until November.) Help keep everyone safe and protect our precious wildlife.

open to the general public, please don't forget to bring your proof of address for entrance. Entry is free to the castle for those living within Corfe Parish postcodes only.



#### **Church Knowle Parish Council**

The April meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> April 2025 at 6:30pm. It was attended by six members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair), four members of the public and the Dorset ward councillor Ben Wilson.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

#### **Public Discussion**

Cotness Lakes. Mr Elwood enquired about the status of the work at the Lakes. The people undertaking the tree work are in close contact with the Forestry Authority and have been awarded a grant to assist with the woodland maintenance. They are liaising with the Parish Council planning specialist about any planning requirement for future work.

Roadside stakes at Blue Pool. Oak stakes have been installed on the roadside verge at the Blue Pool. The question of whether these required permission from Dorset Highways was raised.

Damage to Unsurfaced Roads along the ridge. This is ongoing and a plan of action co-ordinated with other interested councils is in hand.

#### **Planning**

An application was received for a garage at 4 Tyneham. The council had no objection but supported the conservation officer's recommendations that it have a pitched roof.

A statutory application for camping at the New Inn was received. This is allowed under the regulations and the council was not required to comment.

#### The Neighbourhood Plan

This is progressing under the chair of the Steering Committee, Mrs Pippa Edwards. The parish wide housing needs survey is being processed with help from Dorset Council.

#### Report from Dorset Councillor

Dorset Council has a new chief executive Dr Catherine Howe.

#### The Corfe River

A technical site visit to the Corfe Treatment Works is organised for  $23^{\text{rd}}$  April.

There is still one vacancy on the council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk.



#### **Surgery and Patient Participation Group**

At our recent Corfe Surgery PPG meeting it was pleasing to note that we now have good representation at meetings from across the wide surgery catchment area but it would be helpful to have more male committee members - please do contact me through the surgery if you would like to join our meeting which we hold on average every four months .

As a PPG we are required to act as 'critical friend' to the surgery but also to offer help and support as best we can and provide a link between the surgery and patients if required. We know that we are very fortunate to be registered with the Corfe Surgery which under Dr Lepper's leadership continues to provide us with 'sit and wait' surgeries and 'face to face' consultations, something that the majority of us welcome and would not like to see changed. However the new GP Contract focuses a lot on 'digital' communication which may well be suited in larger practices but does create concerns for Dr Lepper and his team who prefer the personal approach. It is recognised that for working people a more *on line* service may be preferable so an **access survey** is therefore going to be prepared shortly to seek the views of surgery patients, please do look out for it and respond so that the right balance of access to surgery appointments can be sought.

Whilst October seems a long way off, we did also discuss flu jabs at our meeting which will be available to over 65's and the 'at risk' group during that month. We were reminded that the Surgery is required to purchase the flu vaccines well in advance to meet the needs of the practice population at a cost of £15 per vaccine and were asked to promote the surgery flu vaccination service (which the PPG members support on the usual Saturday morning sessions). If patients receive their vaccines in alternative settings, the surgery is left with a surplus of vaccines which are then wasted. So please do use the Corfe Surgery for your flu vaccinations, a record of the vaccination will be placed immediately in your patient record and together we will be helping to maintain the financial viability of our surgery.

In recent weeks, in my role as Chair of the Friends of Wareham Hospital, I have met the South Dorset MP - Lloyd Hatton.

Lloyd is very keen to promote the services provided in our local community hospitals and try to re-establish those services recently lost. The Chemotherapy service once provided at Wareham Hospital is one such service which we are all keen to see in place again as it provided a local Purbeck based clinic saving the need for patients to travel to Poole or Bournemouth

Hospitals at such a vulnerable time. No positive news yet but we remain optimistic.

PPG's and Friends of local hospitals and other local organisations are currently working with the Primary Care Network (PCN) to develop the **Integrated Neighbourhood Team (INT)** where the team will aim to bring together people and services to improve population health and wellbeing. Patient engagement will be an important aspect of this work. #### Singing for Joy! - Purbeck Youth Music

There was standing room only when Purbeck Youth Music's Singing for Schools project produced concerts in Swanage and Wareham at the end of March. It was a delight to hear almost two hundred primary school children in each concert 'Singing for Joy' under the direction of Susannah Nettleton. The schools taking part were St Mary's RC, Swanage Primary, St Mark's, St George's Langton, Corfe Castle Primary, Stoborough, Wareham St Mary, Wool C of E and Wool SMSJ Primary. The teachers had worked hard to practise the songs which Susannah had taught them during her visits and the result was most impressive.

Parents and grandparents came to see and hear their children perform the songs they have been learning with Susannah in two schools' workshops in the spring term. Each school had a solo spot as well as the songs they performed all together. In one particularly lively song there was also audience participation. It was indeed joyful!



#### **Revd Louise writes**

Easter might feel long gone, but the church celebrates a whole season of Easter for forty days. This year that includes the whole month of May. May, that month of amazing abundance of life all around us, as the leaves on the trees show a multitude of greens, and the flowers, like lilac and peonies, roses and wisteria, burst into blossom. I do love May!

Easter, for Christians, is about the hope of abundant life that Jesus offers to us. Jesus dying and then rising again, showing that He has overcome death by bursting into life out of the tomb. Then offering us the gift of life in all its fulness: the kind of life that overflows with His love and peace and will last forever. We have passed through the darkness of Good Friday, the seeming end of hope, with the suffering and death of Jesus, to the light and joy of Easter Sunday morning. We have listened to the despair of Mary Magdalene, when she discovers that Jesus' body has gone from the tomb, and then with His appearance to Mary in the garden, we have felt her joy as she realises that Jesus is alive!

Mary Magdalene, who had been healed by Jesus, has come to the tomb whilst it is still dark, to anoint His body with spices. She is weeping because, not only has she seen Jesus suffer and die, but now she has also lost Jesus' body, and can't minister this final act of love by anointing his dead body. When she sees Jesus, she mistakes Him for the gardener. It isn't until He speaks her name that she recognises who He is. That He is there, that He is alive! At the sound of Jesus speaking her name, "Mary", her sorrow turns to joy.

As we enjoy the abundance of life all around us this May, enjoying its beauty, fragrance, hope, perhaps this can remind us of the kind of life that Jesus offers to us, today. In contemplating the gift of life which we can see in our world, may we take time to listen and to hear Him speak our name, knowing that He is offering us His abundant and everlasting life, and the hope, love, peace and joy He gives to us, as we turn to Him.



#### **Corfe Castle Charities' land at East Woolgarston**


As mentioned in the previous CVN, The Corfe Castle Charities own some pieces of land close to Tabbit's Hill Farm – lands that had been purchased by George Bullocke, senior, in July 1603, from Thomas Seward and his wife, Margaret and which became known as 'The Woolgarston Lands' (outlined in black below).



The Mayor & Barons of Corfe Castle purchased them from Benjamin Heather of Kensington, Mdx, gentleman, in June 1700. Leaving aside the fact that the Borough of Corfe Castle purchased these lands rather than the Charities, another problem occurred before the purchase could be completed.

George Bullocke, the elder, a yeoman, who came from South Holworth, purchased these lands. His son, George, inherited them in about 1630 but by then, he had already moved to London and become a clothworker. George married, had two daughters, Elizabeth and Sarah, both of whom were born in London with neither of them realising that their grandfather held an estate in Dorset until after their father had died and both were married. So, in July 1674, William Nelson & his wife, Elizabeth, one of George's daughters, brought John King, junior, before the borough Petty Sessions at Corfe to accuse him of utilising these lands for his own benefit. However, the daughters had not realised that their father had mortgaged the lands for £84 to a London draper called John King, senior, in 1641, so King, junior, was well within his rights to use the land.

The case is left hanging at page 13 (the other pages are missing) but the outcome is known as John King came to own the land and by about 1689, he had sold 28 acres of land, 2 acres of meadow and 6 acres of pasture in *'Eastwoulgarston'* to Benjamin Heather and a fine of 10s. was paid to the court of Corfe Castle which is how Mr. Heather's name is on the sale of 1700.



The deed of 1700 lists the fields which had been part of some land called '*Jerrard's Hay*' totalling just under 27 acres. Little is known about Mr. Jerrard. Speculatively, he could be the John Jerrard that supervised a will of 1474 for John Marsh who held lands at Woolgarston but who knows. The

Mayor & Barons did not purchase all of '*Jerrard's Hay*' as one field of 8 acres was left out of the sale - Cull Mead in West Woolgarston was not included. Thomas Cottrell of East Lynch purchased these 8 acres and passed them on to John Cottrell of Corfe Castle in about 1706.

#### "A Season of New Life: An Invitation to Consider Jesus"

May is a beautiful month. Trees bloom, days lengthen, and the world seems to shake off the last chill of winter. It's a time when nature gives us a quiet reminder: life has a way of beginning again.

You may not consider yourself a religious person. Maybe faith feels distant, confusing, or even unnecessary in your life. But if you're reading this, something brought you here—and I believe that matters.

So, what if this May could be more than just the start of summer? What if it could be the beginning of something deeper—a spiritual awakening?

The Christian message, at its core, is about new life. Not just the kind you see in flowers and sunshine, but a new life offered through Jesus Christ. #### **Eves to the Skies**

Hi all, I hope you have all started to see the return of our migrational birds around your gardens and wild areas?

Although it's still early days swallows and sand martins have been trickling through Kimmeridge for the last month or so, we even managed to get two separate sightings of a hoopoe but sadly no photo; no new species for the hut feeders yet but plenty of excitement elsewhere. Lots of sea eagle sightings around the area; the eagles are still spending a lot of time at Swyre head and Smedmore hill, along with a resident pair of red kites and not to forget my pair of beautiful yellow hammers that feed in the barns most days.

The fields around the bay are also good for breeding hares; plenty of photo opportunities of them boxing and generally racing around.

Down in the bay we have had, northern wheatear, sandwich tern, dunlin, whimbrel, common sandpiper, common redstart, black redstart, whitethroat, swallow sand martins and rock pipits. chiffchaff and blackcap can be heard singing around the bay in good numbers, sightings of manx shearwater and gannet on passage to and from their feeding grounds and a few Canada geese thrown in for good measure. The gull population around the bay area also includes Mediterranean, black headed, great black-back, common and herring with the occasional kittiwake passing by.

And finally, the icing on the cake for me, while serving a customer I happened to look up just in time to see a much rarer black kite go over head, heading inland, (I did manage to photograph one on Stonehill down in 2020) but no such luck this time.

#### VE DAY IN CORFE CASTLE.

I am one of the few living, who can remember VE Day in Corfe Castle. I was three and a quarter at the time (fractions are important when you are very little) so I am probably the youngest who can.

My father was stationed near Corsham in Wiltshire and moved his family back to the family home at Mortons House early in 1944. The house had not been mistreated during the War as it had been the headquarters of the local Home Guard. There was someone called, I think, Captain Muir, still living there when we arrived.

During the build up to the invasion of Normandy on D-Day the US Army concentrated in this area. I have subsequently heard that locally we had a regiment of US Army armoured engineers with their headquarters at Leeson House but cannot youch for this.

The nearest I could get to saying "soldier" was "shoogar" which must have surprised some, especially soldiers. We had a live-in cook with a teenage daughter who invited a soldier home. It was perhaps just as well that he had no idea what I was talking about when I pronounced him to be "gaga shoogar", "gaga" being an all-purpose word meaning dirty, messy, or generally unpleasant. During this period I remember running crying for comfort at hearing a low flying aircraft or a tank trundling down East Street. I knew that there was a "war" going on and that the enemy were "the Germans".

Then one day I was told that we should dance and sing because the war was over, and we had won. Cook and Nanny did a jig in the kitchen. I asked whether the Germans would dance and sing too. I was told that they would not as they had lost the war. I pondered this and decided that perhaps the Germans would sing because the war was over but would not dance as they had not won.

Ther was a celebratory tea party for the village children in the garage of Mortons House (now The Old Guildhall), but I was too young to be allowed to go. Goodness knows how they found some food in a time of severe rationing. I imagine many kindly village folk gave up their sweet, sugar or butter ration.

Daddy came home. I was suspicious and a bit frightened of this strange man wearing a brown suit (probably actually army Service Dress) who appeared

one evening as I was being put to bed. He had been released early as, firstly, he was a reservist called up and sent to France with his regiment in September 1939; and, secondly, because he was a director of a firm mining ball clay in the Isle of Purbeck. The other directors were all over 80. The firm must be got going again as part of the local and national economy of a bankrupt country. A small ration of petrol became available for private motoring and Daddy's car came out of storage.

There was still a war. Now the enemy were the Japanese. I do not remember VJ day. I do remember being shown a picture of either Hiroshima or Nagasaki which had all fallen down. Nanny explained that it had been hit by an "atom" bomb which she said was very, very strong. We had yet another enemy now, called the Russians. I was shown pictures of an aeroplane called a "jet" which had no propellers. I thought this was ridiculous. Everyone knew that all aeroplanes had propellers.

Rationing remained very tight. Even potatoes were rationed. If you got the last, rotten, potato from the bottom of the bag you still had to eat it. There was no other. A rotten potato tastes vile. They were rebuilding the pier at Swanage which had been destroyed in 1940 lest invading German soldiers put it to use; and at Studland they dismantled scaffolding poles which had held explosive devices to impede invading Germans – not that we went to Studland very often as it meant using some of the petrol ration.

Everything was in short supply. I recall my aunt getting married in early 1947. No one had any stockings that the bridesmaids could wear so their legs had to be darkened with cold tea. Shortages continued and rationing did not finally end until 1954 but gradually the country recovered.

#### HISTORIC HORN BLOWN WHEN FIRST TRAIN DEPARTED SWANAGE IN 1885 TO BE SOUNDED AT 140th ANNIVERSARY CEREMONY

An historic Victorian brass horn reputed to have been blown to mark the departure of the first passenger train from Swanage to Corfe Castle and Wareham in May, 1885, is to be sounded again in a 140th anniversary ceremony at Swanage station.

The public is being invited to attend the special event – dressing in Victorian costume if they wish – on Saturday, 17 May, 2025, from 1pm.

The Swanage Railway's special anniversary comes in the year of Rail 200 - a national celebration, by both heritage railways and the national railway system, marking the 200th anniversary of the railways; celebrating the railways past, present and future in England, Scotland, Wales as well as on the Isle of Man.

The Swanage Town Band

will be playing on the platform to welcome dignitaries and other guests – just as their predecessors did in May, 1885 – including the Lord-Lieutenant of Dorset Michael Dooley, who is His Majesty the King's representative in the county, the Mayor of Swanage Tina Foster as well as Swanage Railway Trust patron Sir Philip Williams.

After speeches from Swanage Railway Trust chair Frank Roberts and dignitaries, the London and South Western Railway brass horn will be blown at Swanage station to mark the departure at 2pm of a special 140th anniversary steam train bound for Herston Halt, Harman's Cross, Corfe Castle and Norden.

With the dignitaries and other guests riding in a 1940s 'Devon Belle' Pullman observation carriage, the special train will be hauled by the Swanage Railway Trust's unique Victorian T3 class steam locomotive No. 563 which was built at

Nine Elms, in London, during 1893. The T3s hauled trains from London to Corfe Castle and Swanage from the 1890s to the 1930s.

Public admission to the 140th anniversary ceremony at Swanage station is free

but members of the public wishing to travel on the special steam train departing Swanage at 2pm will need to purchase travel tickets.

Swanage Railway volunteers attending the special 140th anniversary ceremony – as well as those volunteers on duty on the heritage line on Saturday, 17 May, 2025 – will be presented with a special commemorative badge designed by Swanage Railway Trust director and

volunteer Clive Hardy who is organising the special event.

Clive said: "The event marking the 140th anniversary of the Swanage Railway's opening will reflect the celebrations that accompanied the arrival in Swanage of a special train that brought the Swanage Railway Company's directors from London to the seaside town on Saturday, 16 May, 1885, as well as the departure of the first public passenger train from Swanage to Corfe Castle and the main line at Wareham on Wednesday, 20 May, 1885.

"In 1885, the new 25-minute train journey from Swanage to Wareham cost

eleven pence compared with a traditional horse and carriage journey taking one and a half hours at a ticket price of two shillings and sixpence.

"The opening of the Swanage branch line was historic and a seismic change for the Isle of Purbeck – turning Swanage from a fishing and quarrying town into a popular seaside resort and the

picturesque village of Corfe Castle into a desirable day-trip destination," added Clive who lives in Poole and has been a dedicated Swanage Railway volunteer for eleven years.

Swanage Railway Trust chair Frank Roberts said: "It's apt the 140th anniversary of the Swanage branch line's opening in May, 1885, falls in the year of the national Rail 200 celebrations marking the 200th anniversary of the UK's railways - celebrating the UK's railways past, present and future.

"We are delighted that His Majesty the King's representative in Dorset – the Lord-Lieutenant Michael Dooley – as well as the Mayor of Swanage Tina Foster, Swanage Railway Trust patron Sir Philip Williams and other guests from the Isle of Purbeck community are able to join us for what will be a very special celebration marking the 140th anniversary of the first train leaving Swanage for Corfe Castle and the main line at Wareham in May, 1885.

"The blowing of the London and South Western Railway brass horn 140 years after it was sounded at Swanage station to mark the departure of that first passenger train in 1885 will have great historical resonance and be a stirring link with the past," added Frank who has been a dedicated Swanage Railway volunteer for more than 40 years.

Swanage Railway Company chair Gavin Johns explained: "It is important to mark the 140th anniversary of the Swanage Railway's opening because the branch line nearly disappeared forever after British Rail ran the last train from Wareham to Corfe Castle and Swanage in 1972 and lifted most of the tracks.

"Since 1976, several generations of dedicated volunteers have worked tirelessly and selflessly to relay the tracks and rebuild the infrastructure required to operate, develop and link to the national railway network the vibrant community heritage railway that we enjoy today," added Gavin who is a volunteer signalman on the Isle of Purbeck line.

It was in 2010 that the Victorian London and South Western Railway brass horn was donated to the Swanage Railway Trust's museum housed in the restored goods shed at Corfe Castle station.
