

It is envisaged that the event will last about 2.5 hours, but it will depend on the speed we walk to the hide after the talk, and how long we spend at the hide. Fascinating facts about beavers (courtesy of NT)

- Beavers are the second-largest living rodent.
- They are herbivores, eating aquatic plants, grasses, herbaceous plants and shrubs in the summer months and woody plants in the winter.
- They will often store food underwater so they can access it if the water freezes over in the winter.
- They can remain underwater for up to 15 minutes.
- They have protective eyelids to see underwater and can close both their nostrils and ears to prevent water from entering.
- Beaver teeth are orange from the iron content in the food they eat.

Nature updates from the National Trust



Purple haze

Now's the time to get out onto the Purbeck Heaths as the heather

turns into a stunning palette of purple and pink. These delicate flowers are humming with the activity of pollinating insects, while rare heathland birds flit among the shrubs. The heather seems to have started flowering early this year, but hopefully there will still be lovely displays throughout September.

Heathland horror

We can't talk about the heathland

without mentioning the two huge wildfires of August. One destroyed 70 hectares of heathland at Holt Heath, near Wimborne, and the other 25 hectares at Newton Heath, near Studland. At the time of writing, both had been extinguished although the areas were still being monitored.

Heathland is home to many rare birds including nightjars, woodlarks and Dartford warblers, as well as reptiles like sand lizards, slow worms, smooth snakes, and adders. While most birds are able to fly away and escape the flames, reptiles aren't so lucky.

One of our rangers, Emma Finlinson, joined a rescue effort at Holt Heath organised by the Amphibian and Reptile Conservation Trust. They rescued almost 30 reptiles from the burnt earth and released them into nearby unaffected heathland.

We can't thank the fire services enough for their tireless work. But worryingly, they have said

that both fires were deliberate. Please be vigilant if you are on the heaths. If you see any suspicious behaviour, report it to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or in an emergency, call 999.

Slowing the flow

Work is about to begin on a project to reduce the risk of flooding along the Swan Brook – the stream that meets the sea in Swanage. This involves using natural measures to slow the flow of waterways.

The six sites are on tenanted National Trust farmland, all located at the headwaters of tributaries that feed into the brook (Langton Matravers, Harman's Cross and Godlingston Manor Farm, Swanage).

Traditional hay making

You might have seen haymaking taking place at various sites in autumn, including Corfe Charity Meadows. This traditional way of farming goes back hundreds of years. Grass and wildflowers are left to grow until mid to late summer before being cut. This timing allows insects to feed on nectar (and so pollinate the flowers), and gives flowers a chance to seed, enabling them to flourish in future years.

National

News from the Castle

We hope you've all had a good summer. We've had a great time welcoming families and watching them enjoy the castle.

masons' marks we found on the stones of Tower 2 are different again and include simple scratch marks. The variety of widths and depths suggest they were made by a few different masons, but their purpose is a mystery.

You'll notice the conservation works are moving at pace following conservation of a fallen tower, known as Tower 2. Some of the stones needed to be lifted and vegetation removed before being reset made extra challenging by the 35 degree angle over the 30 metre drop of the mound! A bespoke scaffolding rig was made and the work was painstaking but essential.

We have found various stone masons' marks throughout the castle, including markings around arrow slits to ensure the stones were positioned correctly and various symbols which were thought to be the tally marks to show employers how much stone had been worked on that day. The

Temporary traffic monitoring devices are in place on the Furzebrook Road as a preliminary to putting a speed limit on the road. There was a discussion about heavy vehicles using the road at night. Imerys, The Blue Pool and Perenco are all in support of having a speed limit on the road.

There was a report of the hedge at the abandoned building Willow Corner obstructing the footpath. Dorset Council have remedied this.

Furzebrook Phone Box

A suggestion submitted by a parishioner that this phone box could be turned into a hanging basket garden was considered by the Council. It was decided not to pursue this owing to local problems with deer and also some vandalism. The Parish Council would welcome any suggestions or ideas for a use for this nicely painted phone box in good condition.

Tender for Tree Work

The large ash tree in the Parish Council playing field opposite the Margaret Green Animal Sanctuary has ash die back. It has been assessed by the County Arboriculturist and has to be felled. Tenders are sought for this work and can be submitted in writing to Church Knowle Parish Council, 2 Peveril Road, Swanage BH19 2DH or by email to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk. Details of the work can be found on the website under **Tenders**



Revd Louise Writes...

I have been thinking recently about hospitality. I'm sure many of us have been extending hospitality or receiving it over the summer months, and I was thinking of how it is something which is both difficult and stretching at times, but also a huge blessing.

I loved receiving hospitality recently when we were invited to someone's home for a meal. I felt loved, as I was welcomed into the warmth of someone's family home and fed with delicious food. The food had taken

thought and effort, had cost those hosting, had been a way of me receiving from them.

Although hospitality is something which we do in this country, I'm aware that it doesn't come as naturally to us as it does to those in some other cultures. Of course it varies from person to person, and family to family. Some people seem to be particularly gifted in giving hospitality to others.

Jesus, in the parable of the Good Samaritan, helps us to see that our love for others and compassion for those in distress should encompass not just our friends and family, but those who are strangers and perhaps natural enemies. A verse in a New Testament letter, Hebrews 13, says "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it."

In the Rule of St Benedict, it says "Let all guests who arrive be received as Christ." A very high value is given to receiving guests! Throughout the scriptures there is a recurring emphasis on treating the "alien" or "foreigner" living among them as one of their own.

I feel challenged to receive and to welcome guests and strangers, not distinguishing between those I know well and am comfortable with, and those who might be strangers to me. Seeking to be a blessing and to receive others as Christ has received and blessed me.

Rempstone Farm


The Revd. Hutchins states that Rempstone was once 'a manor and hamlet'. The extent of the manor is not given, but it may have extended to include part of East Middlebere, Wytch, Fitzower and the surrounding heath. The etymologist, Ekwall, suggests the name may be derived from '*Hrempi's Tun'* – the farmstead of a man called Hrempi.

This area has been occupied for a long time. Close by Rempstone Hall, on the southern side of the Studland Road, lies a jumble of stones that forms a partial circle now called 'The King's Men'. The stones have been disturbed by digging for clay. To the west of the hall several finds indicate Roman or pre-Roman occupation.

Originally, the farm would have been a small dwelling on the heath. During the mediaeval period, Rempstone seems not to have paid fees to the crown, and, speculatively, it could have been part of a larger estate belonging to a monastery with the Abbot paying the taxes. The problem is the spelling of its name as on Treswell's map, it's spelt '*Remson*' which is very close to sounding like '*Renscombe*' at Worth which was owned by Cerne Abbey.



The abbot also owned land and tenements at Middlebere, and a rather worn document at The National Archives at Kew notes that the land here was part of the manor of Rempston. At Cerne's dissolution the lands passed to the crown and then to Thomas Goodwin with the manor being purchased by John Miller of Worth. On his death, it passed to his widow, who became Mrs Henry Culliford of Encombe. Her only child inherited the property, and it descended to her second husband, George Uvedale. Her first husband was Gervase Ashley, and it is Ashley's name that appears on the Middlebere map of 1586 despite him having died in 1573. The Newton Heath map, however, records 'Remson Heath' with the owner being George. It was a fortuitous marriage for George as it enlarged his Rollington estate to the detriment of Rempstone. It is unlikely that George ever lived here as he was involved with the alms-houses at Sherborne.

By 1591, Henry Bonfield of Rempstone is listed in the Dome Book of Corfe as owing a marbler $\pounds 2$ – for what is not stated but maybe it was for his house on the west side of West Street in Corfe which was tenanted. It was roughly where *Jasmine Cottage* is today.

The arrival of John Calcraft altered the emphasis on the two farms when he bought the property and the sprawling eleven square mile estate in 1757 for £850 from the daughter and heiress of William Rose. He enlarged the house, and it has remained in the family ever since.

Celia's Story

I am not surprised at the number of people I have met who do not know what a Christian is because I didn't know myself... Even though I went to Sunday School as a child and attended church regularly as a youngster, I was never told that I needed to be saved from going to Hell; that I needed to make response myself to God; and most importantly I had to realise I was a sinner in need of a Saviour. I now know that we do not start out as a Christian, we have to become one. When I moved to Wareham, little did I know my life would be changed. In fact, I had only been living in Wareham for two weeks when a dramatic change took place.

Jim Allis, an Evangelist from the Bournemouth area knocked on my door. He said that he was running a Children's Mission in Wareham. The first thing that sprang to my mind was that my two children would be able to go there every morning and then I would be free to look after my youngest who was only one year old. Also, it would give my two older children something to do during the holidays... As soon as Jim mentioned the Church in Wareham, I told him I didn't want to know.

I told him I was Catholic. I didn't want him talking to me about religion. So, Jim didn't say any more, but I was happy for my children to attend the Mission. As I didn't want to get involved in the church side of the Mission, I kept out of sight. One morning Jim came over to speak to me. He asked me if I would like to come over to the Church's open evening which is held on the last night of the Mission. I said I would think about it, but deep down knew I had no intention of being there. After the Mission, Jim came round to see me and asked if my two children had enjoyed the week. I said, 'Yes, very much'. We had a long chat and religion was mentioned. I felt less apprehensive this time, and was more able to discuss my religious beliefs. On leaving, Jim gave me a tape. Out of curiosity I listened to this tape and then got quite interested in what this lady was saying. I suddenly realised she was speaking the truth. She spoke of boring sermons that didn't mean anything to her, of meaningless rituals like repetitious prayers, something Jesus warned us not to do... and praying in front of statues; everything that seemed to distract me from God. All sorts of things I had been brought up to believe and accept in my Church. Suddenly my mind was beginning to change. I realised I had been misguided into accepting a lot of things which I now felt I had to question.

After listening to this tape, I realised I had to get in touch with Jim again because I began to feel unsure about a lot of my beliefs. I felt I belonged to a church that wasn't centred on God. Jim came along to see me again the next day and gave me another tape. This was taken from a Sunday Service at an

Evangelical church. It was a lovely service. The sermon was based on the Bible and I could understand every word. Every word that was said and every hymn that was sung meant something to me.

I never did like going to Church, probably because I was always forced to go from an early age. I first started to go to church when I was 6 years old. I passed my First Holy Communion and was later confirmed. But none of this meant anything to me. I found the Service very hard to follow and was now beginning to realise why. There were too many distractions and too much side-tracking taking me away from the Gospel. No wonder I never got to know God. But suddenly I longed to know the truth. I had a sudden urge to read the Bible and also spiritual books.

I became frightened of the change that had taken place in me. All my past was put in front of me and I became very much aware of the sins in my life which I had never taken notice of before. I suddenly realised that all the sins that I had confessed to the priest years ago were never forgiven, only God can forgive sins, also I became conscious of any wrong I did at that time. I found myself changing my mind on things I was about to do. I saw Hell and that was where I was heading. Hell never worried me before. But suddenly it became real to me. I didn't want to go to Hell. I always thought I was going to Heaven. My mother taught me that as long as I believed in God I would go to Heaven. I had always believed in God, but I know now that just believing God exists doesn't get you to Heaven. You need to believe from the heart and really want to get to know God. You need to have a living relationship with God. I was suddenly experiencing this. God had come into my life, made me aware of my sins and made me realise my need of Him. My life was changing for the better. It was as if a miracle had taken place. For the first time God was real to me.

I desperately needed a Bible, so I got in touch with Jim again, and he came down next day and gave me a Bible. I had never read anything from the Bible before so I didn't know how to use it. But Jim soon put me right on everything.

It took me a long-time to pluck up the courage to go to the local church but the Pastor was very patient and understanding and helped me to overcome all my fears. And when I did eventually get there, the service was just the same as the tape I had listened to previously. The church I now go to, God is real and present. Jesus is in the centre and the Bible is preached. No way could anyone get close to God without the teaching of the Bible.

I thank God with all my heart for saving me. I didn't deserve to be saved. I hadn't done anything in my past that would have pleased God, but God came to me and forgave me and changed my life.

Since then, my life has been turned upside down. I am no longer the person I used to be. God has given me the power to do things I could never do before; my life of doubt is now a life of purpose. I was disillusioned with church as I observed the inconsistencies in the lives of many within the church. I had head knowledge about God but didn't know how to know God personally. I had religion but no relationship. Religion certainly got in the way of me becoming a Christian. The Pharisees, the religious leaders in Jesus' day, were kept away from Jesus because of their religion. So, take a look at the real thing and don't let your dislike for religion keep you away from Jesus and getting to know Him.

I often ask myself, why me? What about all the unsaved people out there? What is going to happen to them? Why can't they see the truth? Why don't they acknowledge Jesus Christ? And why don't they realise that Jesus Christ died on the Cross to save people from their sins. I don't think many people know what the Cross means today. I know I never used to. All I can say is that I am so pleased that Jim knocked on my door when he did, because if he hadn't, I could still be lost now on the road that leads to destruction.

Many are going to church, but few are going down the road which leads to life.

The Rambling Gardener

September is a lovely time of year with all the deciduous plants starting to lose their leaves for the winter; with the leaves all falling at different times depending on wind and temperature.

When writing, in August, after three months of no rain I wonder if we will be flooded when rain does come, washing our topsoil away. We must all help water penetrate the soil as it will be very dry deep down even after rain, for example making holes with a fork in lawns and beds. Due to the summer drought do remember to cut trees and shrubs back hard. Don't do this yourself with bigger trees - get in a trained person as I don't want to be responsible for any one getting hurt. But if you are a little hurt I have read that poppy seeds put in beer are a good painkiller!

Talking of being hurt I see that the government is thinking of saying all young drivers will not be allowed to drive after dark until they have been driving for five years. This could save many deaths of young people, but it would be difficult for many.

When our family came back from Canada in 1945 my father saw that heavy applications of nitrogen put on the land to increase food production had damaged the soil, so he gardened using no fertilizers and returning everything back to the soil. This included retaining the earth closet for more years than many families. Before the 1930s most people used earth closets which made towns slowly get higher over the centuries. I have been told that Wareham has sunk in my lifetime; with climate change and rising sea levels will it end up in the sea?

Now for gardening; Monty Don's advice has been to cut rose flowers as soon as they have passed their best, cut Buddlias back hard, don't leave seeds to regrow, and cut back grape vines.

My suggestions for this time of year are that you save the seeds of plants that do well in your garden and that you like in preparation for 2026. Also, for the winter, sow spinach and cabbages (if not already done) in trays to be planted out later, and autumn carrots, broad beans, winter lettuces and the tough orientals like pak choi directly into beds. Some hardy flowering plants' seeds like love- in- the-mist and cornflowers can go on to prepared sites. Do put some flowers into the veg patch to attract pollinators to your vegetables next year.

During the autumn cut wildflower meadows, raking up the cuttings, and putting all cuttings on the compost to stop the meadow soil getting too rich. I hope that you all enjoy your September in your garden.
