

## SEPTEMBER MEETING FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

As autumn approaches, Corfe Castle Parish Council met on 8th September 2025 in the Village Hall to discuss parish matters and make progress on a number of community priorities.

**Community Voices Heard**: A local resident asked that the Parish Council investigate a possible planning violation, and if necessary, ensure Dorset Council Enforcement are contacted.

**Highways:** Results from recent speed surveys were discussed. The council will ask Dorset Council Highways to consider painting speed camera lines near the school to help manage traffic.

**Community Updates:** The Caretaker has carried out a wide range of works this month, including litter picking, mole treatment, and repainting a small area of the youth shelter to remove graffiti.

The council confirmed its support for the Youth Club, agreeing funding until January 2026 and will consider further funding on production of regular reports containing information on activities, fundraising, and attendance.

**Have your say:** Dorset Council consultations on both the Local Plan and the Local Transport Plan are now open until 13th October, and residents are encouraged to take part.

**Planning & Licensing**: The council raised no objections to several local planning applications, including works at Kingston and West Street, Corfe Castle. Concerns were noted that Dorset Council had approved some tree works applications before the 21-day comment period ended.

**Traffic & Festivals**: Following heavy congestion after a recent festival, the Parish Council will write to organisers and Dorset Council requesting stronger traffic management measures, including staggered exit times to protect residents and ensure emergency access.

**Environmental Action:** The council agreed to ask Dorset Council to stop using insecticides for roadside weed control, instead favouring mechanical sweeping. Other local parish councils will be invited to support this initiative.

**Community Transport:** Work continues with neighbouring parishes on community transport initiatives.

**Flood Protection:** Dorset Council has agreed to supply new "ROAD FLOODED" signs for two key village locations.

**Community Land Trust**: The Parish Council appointed Cllr Blinkhorn as its liaison officer with the Corfe Castle Community Land Trust.

**Next Council Meeting:** Monday 13<sup>th</sup> October 2025, at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter Room. To start the meeting is a public session, so please come and join us and have your say.


## **Environmental Group Update**



As we don't have any events to feedback on, here is an article providing some information I recently read about the use of solar panels on agricultural land.

We're all aware we need land on which to grow food, whether that be crops or livestock, but what if we look at innovative ways to combine this with both solar, known as "Agrivoltaics"? A recent BBC news article entitled "Will farming under solar panels take off?" describes how a farmer in India, Harpal Dagar, who has a farm on the outskirts of Delhi, has a deal with a solar power firm which pays him £900 per acre per year for the land on which the panels are mounted, plus a monthly sum for maintaining them. The panels are high enough off the ground that turmeric can still be grown underneath them, and the panels protect the plants from unpredictable weather conditions, thus reducing the risk of crop failure. So Harpal is winning all round! And a four-

year trial in New South Wales was described as a "complete win-win" by local farmers, with the panels providing shelter for the sheep and grass, and the sheep grazing any foliage that might block sunlight from reaching the panels.



Closer to home, in a small village in the south-west a recent application from a solar developer estimated a 150% increase in agricultural output from siting vegetable production in raised beds between rows of panels rather than growing cereals. This increase in productivity comes partly from irrigating the vegetables using water collected in gutters attached to the bottom edge of the panels. So, combining agriculture with solar panels may, with the right conditions, help our farmers by both increasing yields and providing a steady income less susceptible to the impacts of poor weather. Obviously, as well as Agrivoltaics, we still need to continue to deploy roof top solar.



## Saving our silent hunters

Many of you will have enjoyed the sight of ghostly barn owls flying over the f ields and hedgerows at twilight. But did you know that these beautiful birds are often found dead in cattle

troughs? Like most birds, barn owls need to bathe, but their feathers are adapted for slow, silent flight so they aren't very waterproof. If they fall into a trough, their feathers absorb the water causing them to sink.

To prevent this, we are trialling a system at Weston Farm, Worth Matravers – putting 'rafts' on cattle troughs. These are made of treated timber and strong plastic mesh, with polystyrene for permanent buoyancy. They allow cattle to drink but prevent owls from

sinking. (Find out more on the Barn Owl Trust website.) We'd like to pass on a huge thanks to our dedicated carpentry volunteers based near Corfe Castle who made and installed the rafts.

## Purbeck trailblazes environmental awards

A group of youngsters in Purbeck have become the first in the country to gain their Environmental Leaders award, thanks to our Senior Community and Volunteering Officer, Jill Bailey. She delivered, coordinated and assessed the course, which involved 12 students from The Purbeck School (11 to 14 years).

Jill worked with them to build leadership skills like teamwork, communication, confidence, organisation and problemsolving. Then they went out with our tenant farmer, Jake Hancock, to explore the heaths near Corfe Castle and learn about conservation farming. On World Ocean Day, they joined various organisations at Studland Bay to promote awareness of seagrass meadows, coastal erosion and plastic pollution on beaches.

## Conservation works update

## **Church Knowle Parish Council - September Meeting**

The September meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> September 2025 at 6:30pm. It was attended by six members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair) and one member of the public.

## **Planning**

One planning application was considered:

P/FUL/2025/05005 Construction of new storage barn at the Blue Pool.

The Council voted to object to proposal until a report from Natural England had been received and there was an undertaking to return the surrounding land back to its natural state in recognition of its SSSI status. A condition that the barn was solely for the use of the Blue Pool as a storage facility was also sought.

## Tender for Tree Work

Six tenders were received for felling the ash tree in the Parish Council playing field opposite the Margaret Green Animal Sanctuary and the work was awarded to Arbor Nature who submitted the lowest quote.

## Traffic Surveys

Traffic surveys have been conducted by Dorset Highways on the Grange and Furzebrook roads and with a view to having a speed limit on these roads. The Council will be requesting the raw data from these as well as the Dorset Highways' analysis.

## Signage for the Cotness Ridge Roads

Signs are being prepared to discourage off-roaders from using these tracks for muddy amusement and to warn of the severe penalties for environmental damage in this protected and sensitive area. This is being done in conjunction with various specialist agencies and is grant funded.



## **Planet Purbeck and Thomas Cromwell Auction**

Oscar-winning actor Mark Rylance and campaigning writer George Monbiot are coming together to host a public forum about how local communities like Purbeck can influence national and global progress.

Topics up for open discussion at the event – staged by community group Planet Purbeck at Sandy Hill Arts in Corfe Castle – will include thorny issues such as rewilding, tourist taxes and, in a wider context, efforts to solve the convergent economic and ecological crises.

Rylance, who won the Best Supporting Actor Oscar for his performance in the Steven Spielberg film Bridge of Spies, and Monbiot, a leading critic of mainstream politics and passionate environmentalist, will conduct a Q&A session with each other and take questions from the audience.

The actor, who is Patron of Planet Purbeck, will also auction a signed photographic portrait of himself as Henry VIII's scheming chief minister Thomas Cromwell – a prop used in the acclaimed BBC series Wolf Hall.

And he will help to launch a Friends of Planet Purbeck scheme aimed at expanding the group.

He said: "I hope the chat with George will be full of ideas I haven't imagined and good humour. I will depend on the audience for the really smart questions.

"There is a desire to build up a group of people interested in similar things such as

nature conservation and climate change so there is a place they can come with concerns – and make a difference with ideas and action.

"I believe in thinking internationally but acting locally. If you change a small or local thing well enough it will affect the rest, which is true in biology and

the environments we live in. We can lift the whole system into a better place of harmony and equilibrium."

Guardian columnist and author Monbiot said of the event: "I'm greatly looking forward to it. We'll be navigating the great political and ecological crises in which we find ourselves and hoping to chart a path through."

The forum, on October 11, is the third in a series of Planet Purbeck Presents events scheduled for the autumn.

It follows a "marine ecology evening" co-hosted by Greenpeace in Swanage on September 19 and a theatrical and musical performance of Stravinsky's short masterpiece The Soldier's Tale in Langton Matravers on September 26.

For those who care for livestock.




Donations of food and money are always gratefully received!

## The Manor of Rollington

(or Ragintone, Redlyngton, Ridlington, Rowlington)

The manor included Threshers, property aound Bushey, Sandy Hill Farm, and Wytch Farm. The manor court was often held at Corfe Castle where the rent was collected – either in cash or capons (the manor received 17 capons yearly in the early 1700s). The tenants of Rollington also used to pay the castle (aka the King) 20 horseshoes with nails to the value of 1s. 8d. in the 13<sup>th</sup> century. However, in the 16th century, Henry Uvedale denied he had to pay this, and the rent ceased.

Nine thanes held the land in 1066; by 1086 the sole tenant is listed as Robert Tilly (or *de la Tille*). No households are mentioned. The land passed to Henry le Guldene in 1309 descending to his great grandson, Walter Derby, and was eventually sold to Henry Uvedale in 1547 forming what was to become the Calcraft Estate over 200 years later in 1757.

The Civil War brought a lot of disruption to this area. The then tenant of Rollington, Thomas Grove, was forced to quarter soldiers from Col. Bingham's regiment at the farm. Grove left in 1646 when he thought his life was in danger. The unruly troops freely helped themselves to goods and cattle and the farm was destroyed. This resulted in a chancery case in 1653 when back rent was demanded from Grove by the then owner Edmund Okeden of Moor Crichel (over 24 miles away) and who seemed unsympathetic, or unaware, of the dangerous situation that faced Mr Grove.

By 1772, Samuel Donne's map (seen below) shows the house, garden and orchard with 297 acres of mostly arable fields which included the water meadows out at Grimberry. It also shows the limestone quarries at No. 4 the remains of which can still be seen today. Thirty years later, the buildings had not altered.



John Calcraft took a firm grip on the estate making sure that every tenant knew exactly how to manage the land so by 1880, the tenant, William Smith, knew that he had to repair all hedges, ditches, walls and watercourses; he had the right to hunt on the land except for game and rabbits; he could not divide a meadow without consent from the landowner and a strict list of what could be cultivated, and when, was shown on the lease.

By 1941, the tenant was William G. Marsh who had 212 sheep and 61 cows. The acreage of the farm had increased from 1772 and consisted of 353 acres for crops and grass, with rough grazing totalling 207 acres. The Ministry of Agriculture & Fisheries (MAF) return noted that there was no seasonal water shortage. Mr Marsh was Corfe's butcher and his shop is now Dragon's Bakery.

## Revd Richard writes,

It's good for your mental and physical health. It reduces stress and anxiety, boosts mood, increases resilience, and can lower blood pressure and inflammation.

Many studies have shown that being grateful is good for us. Apparently grateful people tend to have more friends and are more likely to help others. It can even lead to fewer headaches.

## Heavens preserve us! Not her again ...

I'm afraid so. Anne Bond puts pen to paper once more!

I am so old now I thought people might be interested in knowing how one got around various difficulties in the days before computers and AI.

I was born in January 1944 during the Second World War. My parents had married in June 1943, and I arrived 2 months premature, very small, weighing 3 pounds. In those days people got very shocked if babies were born less than 9 months after the wedding. My father was away fighting in Greece, and my anxious little mother, aged 23, invited all the neighbours in to see my premature baby spots so they wouldn't label her 'a fast one'.

She had been told to expect me to die. At that time people believed if you died before you had been baptised, you would go to Hell. So, when I was three days old, she asked the Vicar to tea, and to christen me. Before Dad had gone away with the Army, he had given her a little bottle of water from the River Jordan to use at my christening if need be. In this ancient house where we lived just outside Dorchester, there happened to be a chamber pot that had been used by George the Third that was exactly the right size for a portable font. Godparents were rustled up from somewhere in a hurry, and I was baptised, spots and all.

Then the hard work began, to keep me alive. My mother's loving cleaning lady and faithful friend, wife of the groom-turned-gardener 'for the duration', helped her. They painted me all over with olive oil, wrapped me in cottonwool, and put me into a hot-water-bottle-cover like a tiny sleeping bag. I was fed with expressed milk in a little half-moon-shaped feeding bottle with a teat at both ends. They were determined that if I died, it wouldn't be for lack of trying. Their efforts saved my life: I survived.

I can remember the first time I met my father. My twin sisters were born in June 1946, so he must have been home on leave in October 1945 when I would have been 19 months old. By that time Mum had acquired help in the form of a fearsome old children's nurse known as Nanny with whom I raged permanent war. Horrible Nanny said: "This is your father. He's been in Greece." The only 'grease' I knew about was what Nanny applied to my bum

when she laid me on her iron-clad lap to change my nappies. Also, Dad seemed to have a nailbrush stuck on under his nose. It was all rather confusing. Perhaps as much for him as for me. I don't think he quite knew how to relate to a daughter, a girl.

We welcomed Ellen Rignell from Winnow Farm Seeds, a seed farm and seed company based in Dorset. which was formed in 2024. She has been growing vegetables, flowers and seeds for over a decade, both professionally and at home. Her horticultural work has spanned organic market gardening, commercial seed production and plant science. She has also spent years working at the Gaia Foundation's Seed Sovereignty Programme coordinating the thriving seed saving network in the South West.

Her talk covered the importance of timing, from first sowing the seeds, potting the seedlings on and then hardening off. 
