

CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

AUGUST AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

The August meeting was attended by three members of the public, none of whom wished to speak in the Public Half Hour. County Councillor Cherry Brooks was present and reported recent developments at the County Council which were few as many Councillors are on holiday in August. Cllr Brooks advised the majority of work being done by the County Council, other than localised issues, is relating to the Local Government Reorganisation or LGR as she called it. The Council are still waiting to hear from the Secretary of State with a decision on the reorganisation. Purbeck District Council have joined the table to discuss the proposals but on the proviso they are there to be involved in the discussions, not because they support the proposed reorganisation.

The County Council has allocated 11.6 million pounds to 'keep Dorset moving'. The money is intended to be spent on improving road safety and to fund preventative measures that will improve roads and their longevity; repairing potholes, cutting congestion and addressing other transport related problems. The strategic emphasis is being placed on prevention rather than cure. Cllr Brooks requested that if there were problems specific to the Council, of which there are several, that they are reported to her and this will certainly be an action for the Clerk this month. On this note the Council are aware of the raised gully covers and rattling iron works in East Street and they were reported to DCC during a site visit the Highways team made to inspect the new road surface. The Council has received a response from County that the gully covers do not meet required intervention levels and the rattling man hole covers have been reported to Wessex Water. Wessex Water's initial response has been that they too are acceptable; however the Highways department are pursuing whether they warrant action. Continuing the theme of transport, Cllr Brooks advised that bus services have been cut due to the County Council not giving as many subsidies to bus companies. this is impacting on some rural areas, however the Parish Council felt this was not the case in Corfe and that the village is served well by the number 40 bus route. If anyone has been affected by the cuts to bus services please do let the Clerk know.

A parishioner has requested the Parish Council make a recommendation to install a bus stop outside Woodyhide Campsite in Harmans Cross to service the new number 30 bus. The Council felt this was a good suggestion that they would be following up.

The provision of the Youth Club by the Council has been an ongoing topic at recent Council meetings and its provision is considered highly important to maintain a 'living village' and support the youth in the community. This month the Council voted to support the Youth Club for a further year and have pledged to give funding on the basis the Youth Club commit to fundraise 20% of the total fee for the year. We would therefore request parishioners to support all of the fundraising efforts the Council hope to see from the Youth Club and that you pledge your support for this extremely valued service.

There was a keen discussion about the best way to improve safety at the Zebra crossing outside of the School in East Street. County Councillor Brooks had been liaising with both the school and the Parish Council and had made a proposal that the Council fund the provision of a lollipop patrol, at a cost of circa £3000 per annum. This would be an ongoing financial commitment and the Council debated whether the money could be better spent in the long run by investing in a Pelican crossing, if indeed this was feasible. This is something the Council are keen to explore, prior to making a decision on funding the Patrol. There is no question that something must be done but the Council wishes to explore all avenues and Cllr Brooks has agreed to assist with this.

Many of you have come forward to offer your services as Guardians of the defibrillators. The funding is nearly in place to proceed with the two units for the Library and The Scott Arms. When they are installed we will begin liaison with the team. Thanks to everyone who has signed up.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to proposals for the following: a minor material amendment to planning permission 6/2017/0390 (erection of two storey dwelling & detached garage), to re-style porch roof, enlargement of lounge & variation of condition 2 for the re-location of garage with all ancillary landscaping at The Eye, Higher Filbank, Corfe Castle. Full Planning Permission for the re-location of the existing reception building and a new replacement shop and store/social hub building at Burnbake Campsite, Rempstone, Corfe Castle, Wareham. To demolish and reconstruct a rear kitchen extension and external and internal alterations at The Old Post Office, 16 West Street, Kingston. The Council had no objection to retrospective planning permission to erect a small garden store and replace the existing gates at 71 West Street, Corfe Castle, they did however object to the proposal to change the roofing material from thatch to tile at the same property on the basis that they would like to see further plans detailing

the design implications of modifications to the roof. The Council would also like to specify stone is used as opposed to tiles to match the neighbouring roofs

NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

The August meeting of the Parish Council took place in Furzebrook village hall attended by all the Members (one arriving later in the meeting) and one Parishioner who, during the Public Discussion period enquired about the responsibilities for style maintenance as he was concerned about the condition of one in Church Knowle village crossing the fence where the footpath CK2 crosses a fence before joining footpath CK1 leading to underhill footpath CK3. He was informed the landowner was responsible and that the Clerk to the Council would contact the farmers concerned to advise them of the problem. Ultimately, the County Council could carry out repair work in default and charge the landowner concerned.

There still being no Parish Council Chairman, Cllr Page was elected Chairman of the August meeting.

Discussions regarding election of new Parish Council Chairman and Vice-chairman were postponed until the September meeting. A motion proposed to maintain continuity of Special Interests delegated to specific Members from the previous year and for all Councillors to share Special Interest in rights of way was carried.

There were no declarations of interest made by Councillors on matters to be discussed at the meeting.

Following deletion of a typographical error on "hard copies" of the July meeting minutes distributed at the meeting – the electronic and file copies having previously been amended - the minutes were approved and file copy signed as being a true record of the proceedings. Under "Matters Arising", it was reported that a large pot-hole had again appeared at Furzebrook bridge and lorries were not using the informal one-way system instigated by Imerys for commercial traffic serving their pits and and Furzebrook site causing excessive noise. The matter would be taken up with Imerys and in the meantime the identity of the lorries concerned would be reported to the Imerys' site manager.

A short report on the PDC meeting regarding the proposed changes to the East Creech conservation area was given and the Parish Council expressed their thanks to Parishioners, East Creech residents and the organiser of the expert witness reports provided to CKPC in its deposition to PDC refuting the current plans by PDC's officers. They also asked that their thanks be relayed to the expert witnesses concerned. The Parish Council's working party on the

conservation area plans will be meeting with PDC planners, etc., early in September to further discuss the proposals.

The Parish Council considered a tree works application No TWA/2017/121 to fell a conifer at Church Farm. They had no objections to the work being carried out. Past planning matters were noted.

The monthly accounts were presented and agreed to. Invoices received up to close of business on 04 August were reviewed and agreed for payment. The Clerk presented the annual return to the external auditors signed by the internal auditor (a chartered accountant) along with the final annual accounts for confirmation. The meeting Chairman duly signed off the annual return.

A working party/steering group is to be set up with representatives from the three parishes through which the headwaters of the Corfe River flow, Imerys and the DoE to decide how a project to improve the environment of that area and the cleaning up of the stream should proceed and how funds of upto £70,000 would be managed. Members were asked to think about a second "stand-by" project as well. This matter will be discussed further at the September meeting of the Parish Council.

During the end of meeting discussion period the East Creech conservation area was again brought up and concern was raised by some Members about the amount of council tax which appears to being spent by PDC on altering a conservation area where it only needed in law to be "reviewed". It was pointed out that, "You can review, but you don't have to change.". These concerns were expressed to the District Councillor who was in attendance. Discussion continued for some time and the points made would be repeated at the next meeting of PDC with the CKPC East Creech working party.

The Dorset Best Kept Village competition judges had inspected entries and invitations to the prize presentation had been received. It was decided to send two Members and their spouse/partner to prize-giving ceremony in September.

The Council decided to send a letter of thanks to the organiser and team of the Three Parishes' Fête held the previous weekend for ensuring such a success.

The meeting then closed. Next meeting will be at Chuch Knowle village hall at 7.30pm on 12th September.



Birdwatchers can avoid getting their feet wet thanks to a new boardwalk at the National Trust's Grebe Hide in Studland.

The 50m boardwalk was built by a team of National Trust countryside rangers and volunteers helped by Dorset Conservation Volunteers who spent a weekend on the project earlier this summer.

The £1,800 cost was met by the charity's income from sources such as membership subscriptions, car parking, retail and catering outlets, donations and legacies.

Grebe Hide overlooks Little Sea – a freshwater lake set among the dunes of the Studland Peninsula and renowned for its rich bird life.

In the 35 years since the hide was built, a rising water table has made access more difficult, especially in winter when the hide is popular among bird watchers keen to spot visiting waterfowl.

The delicate natural balance in Little Sea has been threatened in recent years by carp which it is thought were illegally released there by a member of the public, probably in the noughties.

However, our programme of carp removal is showing signs of restoring it to health.

Hides such as Grebe Hide dotted around Little Sea and the shores of nearby Poole Harbour are just one of the ways the National Trust opens up special places for everyone to experience.

Corfe Castle Community Land Trust Affordable Housing Update

The Corfe Castle Community Land Trust (CCCLT) has received approval from the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) to be established as a Community Benefit Society. The aim of the CCCLT is to endeavour to provide affordable rental housing exclusively for people with strong connections to our village community. Precise eligibility criteria will be determined at a later date.

Special General Meeting

As required by the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) Rules, the steering group has formed the first Board to take the CCCLT forward towards its first general meeting which will be open to members. At that 'Special General Meeting', to be held before 19 November 2017 (date to be set), the Board will step down and offer themselves for re-election; other members will then have the opportunity to stand for election to the Board, having become members of the CCCLT.

Public Meeting

There will be a Public Meeting on **Thursday 19 October 2017 at 7pm** in the Village Hall. It will include a presentation of CCCLT, an explanation of the site process undertaken and the launch of membership applications.



Update by Christine Kemp on what has happened since September 2000.

Thinking back over the intervening years since 2000 has been an interesting experience!

Back then one daughter was still at the Purbeck School and I was a Community Physiotherapist in Swanage and also a Specialist Physio in Mental Health at St. Ann's Hospital in Poole.

Since then both daughters have graduated from different Universities and have done Masters Degrees. They are working in different Environmental capacities on opposite sides of the country having followed their father's work related leanings rather than my own. We both highly value their contribution in sustaining Britain and the planet, as well as the people living in them!

Alison is now married and Joanna engaged but their involvement with their work is still a priority!

I changed my job in 2004 to become the team leader for the Purbeck Community Rehabilitation Team based in Wareham. It was called the PINC team, which many of you will remember. I still worked as a Physiotherapist but my main role was managing a multi-professional team of Physios, Occupational Therapists, Nurses and Rehab. Assistants, across Purbeck. We were ahead of the game in many ways as at that time we were jointly funded by Social Services and Health so there was a Social Worker in the team. We also worked very closely with the Hospitals, GPs and all other Community workers. It was a very rewarding role and also I believe very beneficial to the Community.

You may be exclaiming that you have heard of this way of working as being recommended by the Department of Health and Local Authorities now! Well it was happening back then in Purbeck and has been gradually built on since. Unfortunately the funding from Social Services was withdrawn after 2 years, so although there is still very closely integrated working there is not the important dual funding and accountability. The team continue their good work having moved from the Hospital into a Social Services building.

I retired from this role 5 years ago and then worked part time as a Physio in Pulmonary Rehab. Initially this was for Purbeck but latterly came to be across the County, based in 5 more of the various Community Hospitals at different times. This increased my awareness and appreciation for all the good work and support that community hospitals provide for their localities.

I also muse on my past role in Mental Health as being unusual back in 2000. In those days I felt I was swimming against the tide being the only person employed for the patients' physical wellbeing as opposed to just their mental state. I was an ardent campaigner in the belief that one's physical and mental states are totally interdependent and need treating together! How many times have you heard recently that mental health and physical health are dealt with by separate teams, with different levels of funding and that this needs to change?

So what has retirement brought? The main thing is the strong feeling by my husband and I that you never know what is lurking around the corner so making the most of our time is important!

We bought a rather traditional boat to appease a yearning that we both had since our teens to nurture and further develop our skills at sailing, in Poole Harbour and beyond. We are improving but ones' confidence takes much more time to build on in later life as we are more aware of the pitfalls!


We have enjoyed many exciting holidays in all parts of the globe, as I have now reached my 'gap years' time! We have added to the list of places to go to since the girls flew the nest but the 'bucket list' seems to get longer. Our aim has been to experience first-hand the different cultures, landscapes, temperatures and wildlife of the very varied environments we have travelled to, both on land and sea. We have tried to balance this against extending our carbon footprint too much which is rarely easy. Walking and whales have been a recurring theme!

As to things that have remained constant since 2000, we are still living in the same house in Colletts Close and very much appreciate the village and the lovely surrounding countryside. We still walk and explore, as there is always plenty more to find out about the area.

We both have a strong feeling of commitment to a range of local activities, old and new, both in Corfe Castle and beyond. Being founder members of 'Double Act' and participating in various ways over the years has been important to us. I still am a Brownie Leader in the village and am now seeing the second generation of children coming through which helps to keep me focussed on the younger generation and their likes and dislikes!

Our children although having put down roots elsewhere, very much enjoy returning to the place that has been home to them for 33 years and experiencing again the assets of Corfe Castle and Purbeck!

Have your say on Norden improvements

People are being asked for views on future improvements at the Norden car park site near Corfe Castle.

The <u>survey</u> is being undertaken by the Dorset Coast Forum as part of its Dorset Coastal Connections project. The Forum successfully bid for government funding earlier this year and the Norden site is one of 18 to benefit from the funding.

Purbeck District Council owns the site, which is home to Swanage Railway's Norden Station, Purbeck Mineral & Mining Museum, Cylexperience and a car park.

The wooded area is surrounded by walking and cycle paths and is close to Corfe Castle, Dorset Water Park and the Blue Pool.

Councillor Cherry Brooks, Economy and Infrastructure Portfolio Holder, Purbeck District Council said: "We are looking forward to the improvements at the site. It is centrally located with good links to Swanage and Studland and, with its tranquil surroundings, the improvements aim to enhance the experience of all visitors.

"Investment in the site is a welcome boost for the local economy."

Consultees are being asked what they think could improve their visit. Options up for debate include improved toilets, a children's play park, refreshments, car park resurfacing, local attraction information and Wi-Fi connectivity.

The survey is available online at www.dorsetcoasthaveyoursay.co.uk/norden-welcome-hub Paper questionnaires are also available at the site.

The improvements are due to start later this year.

The Dorset Coastal Community Team (DCCT), led by the Dorset Coast Forum, was awarded £5.6 million to deliver the Dorset Coastal Connections – People and Places project.

Dorset Coastal Connections comprises 18 coordinated projects between Christchurch and Lyme Regis with a goal of connecting people to the coast, connecting coastal communities to each other and connecting the Dorset coast to the 'wider world'. Enhanced access and public spaces will be created through creative and innovative approaches using arts and technology.

Dorset Coast Forum Coordinator Bridget Betts said "All of the projects in our portfolio aim to improve public spaces and facilities for residents and visitors alike. At Norden we're really keen to hear from all kinds of users to understand how this project can help the site be used best for everyone's benefit."





The Revd Ian Jackson writes:

One of the themes which appears frequently in the visitors' books in our churches is that of 'peacefulness'. Sometimes we're concerned that our churches are not 'used' very much – in some cases, and at some times of the year, just once or twice a month. Its easy to overlook the fact that they are 'used' much more frequently – many people come in and value and enjoy the stillness. We can easily see our ancient churches as a burden – very often, they are a source of blessing and encouragement.

Not everyone lives near a church, or one that is kept open. Of course, there are many other places where we can find stillness – again, we are fortunate here – fields, hills and the coast are nearby. (I recently read of someone saying they would rather be in the hills thinking of God than in church thanking God for the hills.) But again, not everyone lives in such an area. There are those who find they are able to find stillness and to know God in what many would see as the most unlikely places.

We all have a still place very nearby – in our own hearts and minds. (However it is that we talk of that inner place where can discover stillness and know God.) It can be hard to 'enter' that place and, most certainly, to stay there for long at all. There is much to help us from centuries of experience and wisdom, both specifically Christian, and from other traditions too. Do have a word if you would like to talk, or to read more, about what I have written.

Of course times have been hard for many, including our former Pastor Barry. Barry has now moved to Essex and we continue to pray for him, Christine and the whole family at what remains a very difficult time.

And what about the Congregational Chapel? At the end of the last Corfe News the Congregational Church article reads, "What will happen in August, as far as the Chapel is concerned, is unknown."

However, before we move to the future it is right to deal with the past.

Over the last couple of months, Adrian a Mission Enabler working for a number of Congregational Churches, including Corfe has had the opportunity to speak to a few people within Corfe and has been struck by some hurt and upset that remains with more than one within the community over things said and written.

None of us are perfect and we deceive ourselves if we think we are. We all make mistakes in what we say, do and write.

Therefore please can we all take this moment to issue a heartfelt apology for where ever hurt lies and from where ever it came. As Christians we are called to speak truth but to recognise we often get it wrong and are never called to do so in a way that causes hurt. Again we say sorry.

We want to put aside the past, recognising the hurts and be the church that Jesus calls us to be. Jesus was a servant. He, Himself said He came not to be served but to serve. (Matthew 20:28)

If Corfe Congregational Church is to be the church we believe it is called to be, if it is to grow again we need to replicate that, not be served but serve. We do so by (i) listening to the community we want to serve and then (ii) find ways of serving it.

Of course we have to do so within the limits we currently have and always within the context of what we believe Jesus would do.

Therefore over the next few months we are going to seek ways to listen, to try and restore friendships and relationships, and to listen to what the Community and God may be saying to us.

As a starting point Adrian, our Mission Enabler is opening up his personal mobile and email to those who may wish to talk. He is NOT, the Pastor but has been given a specific role. If you would like to talk, get hurts off your chest, if you can think of ANY way the church can serve you and Corfe please please let Adrian know.



Seals are some of the most charismatic marine mammals that are encountered along the Dorset coast. Grey seals are regular visitors whilst there is a small resident population of common seals in Poole Harbour. Kingston Concerts

Music of high quality but of very different kinds returns to St James Church, Kingston, next month (September) in two separate concerts.

The first at 11.30 am on Sunday, September 3, brings back the internationally renowned cellist Natalie Clein and a bunch of friends, all outstanding musicians in their own right, to give the closing concert of her annual and expanding Purbeck International Chamber Music Festival.

On offer to the Kingston audience will be two lesser known works, Passacaglia and Fugue (1944) for string trio by the Czech composer Hans Krasa and Morning Blues by Per Arne Glorvingen, a Norwegian composer who is also a master of the bandoneon, that essential ingredient of the tango. The concert will end with the richly melodic String Sextet in A major Op. 48 by Dvorak, whose music forms one of the themes of the festival.

The second concert at 7 pm on Thursday, September 28, will mark the return to Kingston of Northern Harmony, a choir of 16 exceptional young American singers steeped in the folksong traditions not only of their home country but of South Africa and of European countries like Bulgaria, Corsica and Georgia.

Their intriguing programme ranges from the rich sounds and syncopated rhythms of South Africa to American shape-note singing derived from the community singing of 18th century New England to the ancient three-part harmony singing tradition of Georgia.

Most of the singers have studied these different traditions in their countries of origin and bring to their performances all the enthusiasm generated by the joy of discovery and understanding. Many of the songs are accompanied by dance and by instruments whether it be the fiddle, oboe, drum or tambura, a kind of longnecked lute originating in Mesopotamia but now widely played elsewhere including in Eastern and Central Europe.

Transporting communities

Communities across Dorset are working together to find transport solutions that work for them.

Dorset County Council has a community transport fund that can help kick start a scheme. There is also a handy toolkit that gives helpful advice on what to think about before you start.

There are currently over 60 schemes covering 91per cent of the county. These arrange transport for social events, medical appointment and getting workers to work. They can run to regular timetables, are sometimes bookable, or can be one-offs to take people to local events or attractions.

Cllr Daryl Turner, the county council's Cabinet member for natural and built environment, said

"In the current financial climate the role of the county council in subsidising public transport has had to change. Instead of imposing timetables, we are working with communities to help them find solutions that fit better and are not reliant on future funding."


