#### OCTOBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Mrs Deirdre Selwin of the Harmans Cross Horse Show committee and Mrs Helen Selby, secretary of the Wareham and Purbeck Vintage Ploughing Committee, have decided to jointly provide the funds towards a defibrillator to be made available in the Square in Corfe Castle on a 24 hours per day basis. The cost is likely to be around £1,000 for both the item and the box required to house it.

Mrs Emily Paris explained to the Council that there would be a lantern parade for around 30 to 40 children on the 10th December 2016. They will walk from the Boiler House Gallery through East Street to the Square and then up West Street in Corfe Castle together with various marshals. The lanterns are jam jars with led lights inside.

The Councillors were pleased to receive an address from Mr Phil Stuckey of the National Trust about current projects in and around the Parish of Corfe Castle. First, he explained how the Rings is one of two remaining siege forts from the 12th Century which is why there is a legal requirement to protect it and they need to move the badger colony to satisfy the Historic England organisation. This was first raised as an issue twelve years ago and the money has only just been found to do the work. They must build an artificial set about 20 yards away and get the badgers used to it. Then fell all the trees and put up wire netting all around the Rings to stop them going back to the original set. It will be a two year project that will start with the tree felling and an agreement with the farmer. They hope to start before this November but if there is any delay the work will be have to start after July next year as a project over 2017 and 2018. Apparently, this type of scheme has been successful in protecting long barrows on the Salisbury Plain.

Next he showed Councillors a map of the joint project with the RSPB and Natural England to restore more heathland landscape in Purbeck. Some 85 percent of the original heathland has been lost since the 18th Century and the various organisations wish to restore an area of approximately 1500 hectares from Scotland Farm to the end of the Arne peninsular in order to form a continuous area for encouraging the wildlife. This has been aided by the recent acquisition of Slepe Heath in 2014. Funding is coming from Perenco to pay for the work.

Lastly, regarding smaller works, he came to the Middle Halves where the Trust has now put in place a management agreement with the grazing tenant in order to bring better control to this problematic area of land with six owners. They hope to achieve a hay crop by stopping grazing during the period between April and September. There will be better, wider

access for machinery created from East Street. The historic metal junk in the Halves will be cleared by the end of October 2016. There is to be scrub work to West Hill so animals can graze it. Drainage work to the turning circle at the end of West Street. Ditching work to the West Halves in order to stop water running down to the Copper Bridge area. Restoration to an area of cattle damage at the Church Knowle end of West Hill and the filling in of ruts resulting from earlier fencing work on the Hill. Other work includes restoration of the gateway to the land between the Kingston Road and the Middle Common where previous use of the crush has made a mess.

Concern was expressed by the Council that ragwort pulling needed to be done earlier in the summer before the weeds go to seed. Mr Stuckey said they are already spending £2,500 on this problem through the Commons Committee. A voluntary ragwort clearance was proposed that would be co-ordinated with Phil Stuckey.

A Commonwealth flag to celebrate Commonwealth Day every year has now been acquired and will be flown from the tower at St Edwards church next year on the 13<sup>th</sup> March 2017 for the first time.



#### **NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL**

Furzebrook Village Hall was the venue for a "mini" or bimonthly extraordinary meeting of the Parish Council. Both the Parish Council Chairman and Vice-chairman were unable to attend and Cllr Wilson was elected Chairman of the meeting. There were more Parishioners and members of the public present than Councillors and the meeting began with the Chairman suggesting that several "non-legal requirement items" were held over till the following month. This was supported by Members present.

Public discussion began with a somewhat lively discussion about parking by wedding quests around St Peter's church. A Parishioner present was informed where the problems had occurred and the meeting heard about progress (or non-progress) regarding implementation of solutions. This was followed by an invitation from the Studland Parish Clerk to Members to a joint meeting of the Purbeck parishes to discuss the future of Purbeck on transfer of PDC's powers to the new unitary authority which is likely to occur in the next couple of years or so. Next up came the guestion of the Dorset & East Devon National Park with a Parishioner indicating that he wished to discuss the matter. The Chairman suggested that as tis meeting was of the "mini" type, it would probably be better to have such a discussion next month at the main meeting when more Councillors (and hopefully, Parishioners) would be in attendance. This was agreed to by the Parishioner and it was decided to adjourn discussion of the matter 'till November. Three Parishioners presented their case for a development at Withy Lakes and Members "grilled" them on the minutiae of the application

The business meeting then began and the draft minutes for September were agreed as being a true and fair record of the proceedings. The Clerk reported, during "Matters Arising" that he had contacted the animal sanctuary and had been told that the new buildings were movable and, consequently, he informed Members that planning permission was not required.

Next up came "Planning Matters" and the meeting heard that one of the Councillors – not in attendance – had a pecuniary interest in the application to be discussed. This related to application No 6/2016/0544. Members examined the plan and whilst they pointed out that the property had "agricultural tenancy" protection, they had no objection in principle for the conversion of a redundant farm building into a dwelling, particularly as it was for a young couple who were key workers.

The accounts were then examined, agreed to and invoices paid. The Clerk reported that the audit had now been completed and the external auditors at BDO had signed off the annual return; so all were very happy. And that was that. Next full meeting will be at Church Knowle Reading Room on 08<sup>th</sup> November at 7.30pm.

Early indications are that a National Trust initiative to restore one of the jewels of Purbeck's ecology to its former glory is starting to bear fruit.



In the last two years around 1.5 tonnes of carp have been removed from Little Sea in Studland in an effort to tackle a long term decline in what was one of our most important habitats. The rare water plants which were the foundation of Little Sea's unique ecosystem depended on clear, transparent water for survival.

But bottom feeding carp, illegally released into Little Sea around 15 years ago, churn up sediment, dramatically reducing the amount of light available to the water plants.

The result has been a collapse in the wider ecosystem.

We hope we have now removed the majority of the carp, but Little Sea covers an area of 33 hectares, and it is difficult to be sure, so we will monitor the situation and continue with the gill netting which has been successful so far. The carp we remove are sold to fish farms.

Now the latest botanical surveys have shown the first signs of possible recovery in Little Sea's ecology, National Trust ecologist David Brown revealed.

Key indicator species are making a comeback – the six-stamened waterwort is spreading once more, and the first translucent stonewort for several years has been recorded.

Last April we installed a barrier to isolate the western arm of Little Sea, an area known historically as one of the best for plant life, with the aim of excluding all fish from it.

This water in this area is now showing lower turbidity – in other words it is less murky – possibly because of the steps we have taken.

"These are encouraging signs but very early days," said David.

"Restoring Little Sea to its former ecological glory is probably the most difficult challenge we face on all of our nature reserve sites.

"We have studied the science, we have consulted the experts, and we are putting the resources into doing what we can. Over the coming years we will discover whether the lake responds as we hope."

National Trust volunteers have been hard at work making this year's vintage of our exclusive Purbeck Cider.

The scheme started as a way of bringing small orchards which dot the area back into use and preserving a traditional craft.

Though Dorset is not as well known for its cider as its neighbours to the west, most farms at one time had an orchard and made cider for their own farmhands. Old Volunteer cider is made at Corfe Castle using a traditional

cider press and bottled on the premises. There are no additives and the only ingredient apart from apple juice is a little sugar added at the end of the process to sweeten it slightly.

It is available from the National Trust shop in Corfe Castle and the Café at Knoll Beach in Studland.



November is often a time of wild seas and winter storms driving in from the Atlantic. From the cosy warmth of your living room a beach walk might not look particularly appealing but on wild, windy days it can be exhilarating. If you need some incentive to get out along the coast this November then wrap up warm and try a spot of beachcombing. Not only will it blow the cobwebs away but you might even find some marine treasures and long-distance voyagers freshly arrived from the ocean.

For beachcombing addicts like myself winter storms are something to look forward to, when all kinds of exotic marine animals and trans-Atlantic travellers can be found on Dorset's beaches. Tropical seabeans with mythical magical properties such as the Hamburger Bean and the Sea Heart have been used as good luck talismans for centuries. Designed to float for many years at sea and be flung up onto remote beaches and germinate, these specialist seeds from tropical plants originate in the Caribbean, Florida and South America.

Other ocean travellers often found in the winter months include the bizarrelooking Goose Barnacles. Related to the acorn barnacles found on seashore
rocks, these crustaceans have a long, writhing necks that look like a worm,
with a shell-enclosed 'head' from which feathery feeding tentacles protrude.
Designed to float and feed at the surface of the ocean they are 'fish out of
water' once washed ashore and will not survive long. You can find them
attached singly or in small clusters to marine litter such as fishing buoys and
plastic bottles, or even in huge colonies of thousands of animals on drifting
logs.

For help with identifying your beachcombing finds, or to find out what to look out for visit the marine wardens at the Fine Foundation Marine Centre, by the slipway in Kimmeridge Bay. They will be happy to help and show you some of our own amazing finds!

#### From the Reverend Ian Jackson:

In this part of the world we have very particular events which we think of at Remembrance time – especially the evacuation of Tyneham.

An important part of remembering is passing on to each generation the events of the past. Here are two pieces of writing from pupils at Corfe Castle Primary School. They speak for themselves. I hope they will help as we remember and that they will also encourage us, as we read how our school pupils think and express themselves. Ian

#### **Tyneham**

Tyneham, a small village in Dorset, is a ruin because of something that happened during World War 2. This is what I thought a person might think from a child's point of view:

I live in Tyneham, I have done all 10 years of my life. One day the army came into our village, none of us knew why, they just came and told us we had to move out. And we had to do it fast.

So that's what we did. They told us we'd be back when the war ended and we believed them; we started clearing up all our precious belongings saying goodbye to people and our houses. Then the army came into Tyneham and said, "Today is the day!" and that we had to move today. Children were crying, babies were screaming, even some adults were sobbing. My big, bold, strong brother (or so he thinks!) was clinging to a tree. Then we left on foot, to go to another village about 10 miles away. The only thing that kept us going was the fact that we were going back...

The people of Tyneham never did return. The army still use the hills there as a shooting range. If you go there you can sometimes hear the bang of the gunfire. You are still able to go and see the ruins of Tyneham; some say the names on the school pegs are still readable! All sorts of other villages in the Uk were evacuated like Tyneham.

In July 2015, three local primary schools, Corfe Castle, St Mark's Swanage and Wareham St Mary, became academies within a new Trust. As three collaborative schools, we have improved opportunities to share skills, support each other and challenge ourselves to improve continuously.

The Board of the Saturn Education Trust is responsible for the overall strategy and management of these schools. We have an experienced administration team across the schools and we have a broad base of education and business skills on the Board. We need however to find someone who can help us oversee the schools' premises, including health and safety. This person would ideally have a premises/property related background, but would <u>not</u> need to have any knowledge of how schools operate.

The role has three elements: Firstly, attendance at Board meetings, currently six meetings per year, normally held late afternoon at one of the schools. Secondly, co-ordination of activities of the nominated Health and Safety governors at each of the three schools and thirdly ad hoc input to the administration and finance team who manage the premises on a day to day basis, perhaps by reviewing reports or by providing a 'listening ear' when new challenges arise.

I am never quite sure where the subject matter for this monthly letter is going to come from. Today it came from this morning's BBC Breakfast Programme. They were interviewing Deeyah Khan, a Muslim film maker, whose latest film is being shown on ITV this evening. The subject matter has already convinced me that this is a programme to watch. It concerns the problems faced, in this country, of those who come from a Muslim family and have decided that they no longer wish to follow the Muslim religion. I have read of the terrible things that can happen abroad, to those whose background is the Muslim faith, and convert to Christianity, but this is different. This is about those in this country, who choose to follow no religion. It intrigues me, because it raises the ever recurring question of what sort of God do the parents believe they are worshipping, to react in the ways that they do.

I say "recurring" because that is what I find is happening. When I read about, and watch, the activities of those who are referred to as "Muslim Extremists", I find that I am asking the same question. What do they believe is the nature and character of Allah to carry out such atrocities in his name?

But just in case anybody gets the wrong idea, let me make the point that I had the same reaction just a few days ago when, once again on television, I heard of those in America who have become known as the "Street Hate Preachers". They claim the privilege of free speech, to preach hate towards those whose religion, or life style, or sexual orientation, is different to their own. I cannot understand how they can justify their attitude and behaviour, and believe that it is in harmony with the nature and character of Jesus Christ, as revealed in the Bible.

But being critical of others is easy. What about us? What do we believe about the nature and the character of God, and does our way of life harmonise with the beliefs that we claim to hold? I appreciated reading the Rev.Anne Bonds article last month, but it was the bold statement that she made almost at the end of her article, that made me think the most. Anne declared "God won't let his church die. He won't."

Anne was expressing not only her belief, but also her understanding of the nature of God. We live in a land that is littered with churches that have closed.

and whose buildings have now been taken over and used for a variety of other purposes. In Corfe Castle, we still have the building that was once the Methodist Church. Clearly God has allowed individual churches to close and cease to exist, but it is a different question when applied to the wider Church of Jesus Christ. Will God refuse to let His Church die, irrespective of how it behaves, and how faithful it is to His teaching? When you ask that sort of question, I am not sure I have the same faith and trust that Anne has.

Those who attend Church regularly are now less than 5% of the population, I believe. But what about the majority who do not attend any place of worship? Are they all atheists? That is not my impression. The great majority claim to hold some sort of belief in God, but choose, for a variety of reasons, not to express it by attending a place of worship, whether it be a church, a synagogue, a temple, or any of the other possibilities. But by so doing, they too are expressing a belief in the nature of God, perhaps without realising it.

When Jesus was teaching His disciples to pray, He began by saying that they should address God as Father. For me, this is, not the only, but one of the most helpful titles to help us to discover the nature of God. God is our Heavenly Father but......

Does that mean that I can ignore Him for most of the time and just turn to Him when I am facing problems?

Does that mean that I can ignore, not the suggestions, but the commandments that He has given to His children?

Does that mean that, at the end of this life, He will welcome me irrespective of how I have lived my life thus far?

God is our Heavenly Father but, there are loads of questions that need answers, and most of the answers will depend on what we believe concerning the nature and character of God. I have three daughters and five grand daughters and I know what I expect of them, even though none of them are now children. What does God expect of us, and what will His attitude be, if we ignore Him?

May God be with you in your thinking and reasoning.

At the time I am writing it is a hive of activity with builders still on site finishing things off, people working on computers, tills, publicity, etc etc. The staff – Simon Allen, Nicola Carr, Carla Crook, Karen Kidby and Mel Welsh - are all working very hard to get everything ready. It is great having someone from the village working there (apart from Steve of course!!). Staff induction was last week and yesterday Keith Welsh gave an excellent First Aid At Work training course. Rachel, the learning advisor, and Sylvia who is working in that role until Rachel starts next month are busy planning school visits and other events and also working with Julie Hatcher from the Marine Centre on joint activities.

#### Defibrillator

#### Other News

#### **Broadband Issues**

There have been some problems recently with interference with the Broadband signal from Radar. This appears to be connected to Royal Navy operations and only occurs intermittently; however, our broadband provider, VoIP are putting in some new equipment to try to stop it happening.

#### **Creech Hill Road Closures**

There have been rumours about the Army planning to close the road at the top of Creech Hill. There has been no official information on this and it would certainly be a big issue for us in Kimmeridge if it did happen. The route over Creech Hill, which has not been closed in living memory, is the main route between Kimmeridge & Wareham not only for routine travel but also for the Fire & Ambulance Services responding to 999 calls. As such any closure would cause delay to their response times which are already long enough because of our rural location. It appears likely that any proposed closures will be the subject of legal battles; not least because any road that has been open to public use for such a long time (over 20 years) cannot just be closed. Hopefully these are just rumours and nothing will come of it; not least because it would be so damaging to the normally good relationship between the Army and its neighbours in the local community.
