JULY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Josie Parish, Clerk to Studland Parish Council, talked to Councillors again about the Pan Purbeck Action Council approach to the Local Plan Partial Review discussions at Purbeck District Council. This organisation is concerned with the large increase in the housing targets imposed by Central Government and it wants residents to respond to the District Council. She suggests the new housing will be unaffordable for local people and will simply provide more second homes in the area. Apparently, the Leader of the District Council, Cllr Gary Suttle, will be pleased to receive correspondence from interested residents.

Mr and Mrs Gadd spoke to the Council about their continuing worries regarding the Purbeck Valley Folk Festival which is to be held in fields neighbouring their home. They have many reservations about the new noise management plan and how it will work in practice. The festival is to be monitored by representatives of the District Council but previous complaints have not always been recorded by that Council. Cllr Dragon, District and Parish Councillor, said he has been looking into the complaints procedure and thinks there is a problem that needs addressing.

The Parish Council was addressed by Mr Trevor Badley, principal planning officer, from DCC with regards to the new proposals by Suttles, the owners, for an extension of Swanworth Quarry and increased landfill of 440,000 tonnes of inert waste. The Meeting was attended by around 30 residents with a majority from Kingston and surrounding areas.

Mr Badley said that there would be another six week consultation period in February 2017 when the important pre-submission draft would be drawn up for the independent planners. His main points were:

*He showed the crushed rock output in 2014 for Dorset as 280,000 tonnes with almost half coming from Swanworth. Dorset County Council has to legally hold a 'land bank' of ten years requirement of crushed rock and this is currently mostly in Portland.

* The next closest alternative for crushed rock is the Mendips in Somerset, which could be made available locally in Dorset by using the railway to Coombe and Hamworthy depots.

* He viewed the current situation as one of the County minerals interest versus the environmental protection of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Apparently, the protection can be overridden in exceptional circumstances. A report is to go into the pros and cons of the situation based on the 2015 consultation. He suggested there would be no intensification of lorry movements. There would be visual landscape impact but the new proposals would minimise the impact. Tourism might be affected and any concerns regarding the water supply would be determined by the

Environment Agency with a hydrology survey. He warned residents that Suttles can go straight to the Secretary of State even if the County Council don't support the proposals.

Concerns from the locals were as follows:

*Mr Colin Nunn of Worth Matravers asked if the increase in the inert landfill material which is to form part of the revised Waste Plan would produce more lorry movements above the 75 daily movements allowed that he had just quoted. Mr Badley did not have any figures with him. Also, Mr Nunn was concerned that the lorries have been getting bigger and are now 20 tonne capacity. That the figure in 1994 was 150,000 tonnes of inert material but that there is to be a big change now. The original restoration date was 1988.

Mr John Suttle, the operations manager, confirmed no fresh stone is going into Swanworth but could be going to Swanage or for concrete. Restoration of the quarry required more construction or demolition waste. Some lorries come in empty due to a limit on the inert fill. This is a separate matter from the extension plan

Concern was expressed over truck movements on Kingston Hill. It was reported that lorries had hit part of a wall on the hill. There was also concern that the lorries were getting ever larger.

It was made clear that all vehicles from the proposed extension would have to go through the existing quarry access.

*Cllr Spicer-Short suggested there were many unmarked lorries going into the quarry. Mr Suttle said the total was forwarded to Dorset County Council included marked plus hired lorries. They were all counted.

*Mrs Feben Smith commented that the quarry size had doubled from 17 acres to 35 acres since the original plan in 2014 and was now closer to the B3069 and so even more visible.

*Mr Peter Boyce of Kingston suggested the boundary line drawn on the map was in the wrong place and is actually closer to the road. Mr Badley agreed. Mr Clabburn (Director of Quarrying) also agreed but said that area would be used for soil storage and visual blanking. Comments were made about the potential for noise and pollution blowing towards Kingston.

*Jackie Barker was also concerned about potential access from the extension on to the Kingston road and asked about the shape and that any attempted access from the northern point would be on to a dangerous corner of the road. She said the proposals mention screening through planting, but given the exposed uplands this would be unrealistic. However Mr Clabburn suggested the 6m of overburden would be seeded and levelled down to the actual stone.

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*Peter Boyce, Kingston, was concerned about the effects on the private water supply of Kingston village: only recently the village had had a 'boil the water' notice. And when was a hydrology report being undertaken.

*Mr Gaggero of Encombe House, was also concerned about the water supply for the population of the Kingston area and the local businesses, including the four local farms, the Scott Arms and Purbeck Ice Cream. The water capacity is something he is worried about and he thinks the quarry could strain the system. There were two main problems – water quantity swings and the antiquated system. He had made upgrades to the system in order to get a better quality supply. However, they still detect pollution coming through the water system at times. The water originates from the Coombe via a tunnel and reservoir. Mr Gaggero had spent £200,000 on a borehole to augment the original system but they have had problems bringing it on line. It was to provide a surplus to the existing system and not to be the only system. He said the increased landfill and inert waste could pose a serious risk of leaching into the water supply. Jobs were important but the proposals are a threat to the water supply for 80 families.

Mr Badley said a detailed assessment of the hydrology was not feasible until the planning application stage.

Another resident suggested the water quality has got worse over time and wondered if it was farming pollution.

Mr Suttle said there had been a hydrology survey done by Tarmac for their four times larger proposals that had not identified any potential issues. He didn't think the new proposal could affect the water.

Mr Gaggero asked if the hydrology survey cost would have to be borne by the community. Mr Badley confirmed the cost would be borne by Suttles at the appropriate stage.

Another resident asked about the dimensions of the steel bridge across the Coombe and Purbeck way as large quarry lorries would be using it. Mr Clabburn said the bridge had a 15 metre span, 6 metre clearance and was wide enough for a single dumper truck to cross (approximately 3 metres wide). There would be gabion type support structures either side. The stream and footpath would not be affected.

Mr Badley explained the extension area would require a cut through the land on the new side which would be backfilled to form a tunnel nearer the bridge as the land was higher than the original quarry area.

Cllr Clarke asked further questions about lorry movements, both with inert waste in and out with crushed stone. Mr Clabburn replied that the maximum was 75 movements a day. There was a weight limit on the lorries. One planning permission only for the total number of lorry movements. Their working day was from 6.30am to 4.30pm with a 5.30pm finish.

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A resident said there should be no lorry movements in convoy as it had been shown at the previous hearings that this produced much greater shaking of adjacent buildings. Mr Suttle said he would make sure the drivers knew that information.

Cllr Bond asked what would happen if the permission was refused. Mr Clabburn said the quarry would finish in 2025 and the business would go somewhere else. Local jobs would go. Mr Suttle said all the employees live in Dorset, approximately 30 to 40 in Purbeck, the rest in Poole and Bournemouth.

Cllr Morrison-Wells said he had observed the reinstatement of the quarry by both Tarmac and Suttles and it seemed to him that the reinstatement was small compared to the amount of waste brought in. He was concerned that the cost of reinstatement would be great and how would this be guaranteed without increasing the number of lorries. Mr Clabburn replied that the continuation of the existing permission would allow an increase for infilling purposes. Cllr Morrison-Wells suggested there were no figures shown that might convince people that either the existing or new holes would be filled in. Mr Clabburn said that for 150,000 tonnes of crushed rock removed, it only requires 60,000 tonnes of inert waste as it is not so dense. He agreed some recycling material does go off site but it was only around one or two thousand tonnes.

The Chairman brought the discussion to a close and advised the Meeting that the Parish Council would continue to monitor the situation and that anyone concerned should get involved again in early 2017, when the next consultation will take place.

The Council then moved on to the other business of the evening.

Council representatives would attend a meeting with the highways department to find out how work would be carried out in future. There a number of unresolved highways matters around the council area. Hopefully these would be resolved soon.

The Council confirmed its support of the Youth Club for one year. Discussion on how the Youth Club would be managed was ongoing.

The Council discussed a proposal for a local national park – The Dorset and East Devon National Park. There were divided views and it was agreed that a presentation of the proposal would be made at the August Council meeting.

The provision of defibrillators was discussed. The Swanage Railway have one in the Station, the Surgery has one, as does the National Trust. However these were only available during opening hours of the owning organisation.

CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

It was thought there was a case for having one which would be available continuously. The provision of this would be investigated.

The Council continues to be involved in the Partial Review of the Purbeck Local Plan and to monitor the various groups, which have arisen in objection to the proposals. The Council objects in principle to any major development south of Corfe due to the consequent increase in traffic through the village.

The Council discussed the need for a neighbourhood plan, but after consideration decided that one was not necessary at present, although this could change in the future.

The Council considered proposals to remove the Registration Service (Births, Deaths, Marriages) from Swanage and decided to oppose the proposal as it would mean people having to travel to Wareham to conduct this business.

The Council agreed to the installation of improved signage for the Norden Park and Ride, the aim being to remove confusion about the provision of a free onward ride facility.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to proposals for the following: The Installation of a new garden shed to replace two existing sheds in the rear garden of 10 West Street, Corfe Castle. The removal and relaying of stone tiles to a rear kitchen extension to improve water tightness and to replace a defective leaking single glazed roof-light with a double glazed conservatory roof-light at 112 East Street, Corfe Castle. The replacement of all windows in the east and south elevations and six in the west elevation; to reinstate cast-iron guttering to the east elevation; to change the materials of the dormer cheeks and gables on the west elevation at 99 East Street, Corfe Castle. The replacement of a timber door and windows at 4 West Street, Kingston, Corfe Castle.

NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met at Church Knowle village hall and Cllr Page took the Chair for the entire meeting. But, hip-hip-hooray, kalloo-kallay the Clerk and Councillors chortled in their joy: a new Chairman and Vice-chairman were elected later in the meeting, Cllr Higgins having been cajoled into agreeing to act as Chairman for 2016-2017 and Cllr Colin Page being elected Vice-chairman for the year. Hopefully, the Clerk's hair will start growing again following his pulling it out over the past couple of months in response to the hiatus happening at the Council.

During the Public Discussion period, which preceded the election of Chairman and other stuff, the matter of a proposal to increase inert waste dumping at Swanworth quarry was discussed because one of Church Knowle's Parish boundaries was contiguous with that of Worth Matravers parish and a Parishioner accessed his house via Kingston. The Clerk reported that there was no planning application submitted, but the quarry had been put forward as a site in the county waste and minerals future plan. He had discussed the matter at length with County and it was expected that about 400000 tonnes per year of screened inert waste (rubble, etc) would be tipped to form part of the restoration of the quarry. DCC Councillor Lovell gave further explanation and Councillors noted the reports. In the end they decided to take no action until a planning application was submitted and they could look at any proposals in depth rather than immediately going into panic mode.

Councillors unanimously agreed to some significant changes in the Standing Orders of the Parish Council to "take some of the heat" from the Chairman in performing his duties and to help Councillors balance their private and public lives. It was decided that the Parish Council would meet as a full council six times a year (including the AGM), meeting bi-monthly, and in between those meetings a shorter meeting to deal with urgent matters such as planning comments and finance matters would be held. Parish councils in Law only have to meet 4 times a year and a large number of smaller councils – CKPC is classified as a small council – do just that. The current quorum of three Councillors, or one third of Members (whichever is the greater) would remain and whilst it was envisaged that the shorter meeting would probably only have three Members and the Clerk present, it is possible that all Members would attend on occasions, especially if an application was not a "routine" one. With regard to financial matters, (e.g. paying of invoices for previously agreed expenditure) cheques would be signed at the short meetings as well as the "main meetings". CKPC is fortunate to have one of its councillors in the Banking sector who would oversee invoice payments at the short meetings if necessary.

Appointments of Councillors to areas of special interest were then made and these would be made public on the web-site and notice boards. Gosh, it's a bit like getting a new prime minister and cabinet reshuffle all in a couple of hours. Mind you, that happened the other day in Downing Street, London, didn't it? Anyway, moving on!

The Council had no objections in principle to a development at the Animal Sanctuary, Church Knowle (App No 6/2016/0400), but decided to recommend to PDC that all elevations should be of Purbeck stone so as to blend in with the majority of the Church Knowle village-scape. They were also concerned that there were no inclusions of the siting of LPG or oil tank on the plans submitted.

Under "Past Planning", the Council was extremely concerned that the plans to rebuild Cotness Cottages following the disastrous fire in March had still not been determined by PDC's planners. Members felt this was an unnecessary burden placed on the elderly occupants who were still living in temporary accommodation. Their concerns would be strongly made to PDC at the highest level to find the cause of the delay and endeavour to resolve the problem.

There's going to be a cross country cycling event in September organised by Lulworth Heritage Centre, much of the course going through the Parish. Brownie Points to the organisers for contacting the Council for comments and advice. Members agreed to contact the organiser and give advice and comments to help them make the event as pleasurable as possible to all concerned, including residents and other users of the land, roads, bridleways, BOATs etc. Several Members commented on how good it was to have a cycle event organiser actually making contact with the parish council (as per the voluntary Code of Conduct) rather than the manner used by some other cycling organisations who appear not to do so and just carry on regardless.

Also under Highway Matters, the Clerk reported that the repair and refurbishment of the East Creech & Grange Road finger posts would be completed by sometime in September (or earlier if the weather permits).

Finance matters were then discussed. They were found to be in good order, signed off and bills were paid. The Clerk reported on the progress of the annual audit and his report noted.

Cllr Higgins reported that the website, which had been hacked by some strange organisation associated with Middle East politics had been well and truly scrubbed, was now back in action and would be updated shortly.

Cllr Page then closed the meeting and the new Chairman reminded all that the next one on August 09th at Furzebrook Village Hall would be the first of the "Mini-meetings".

Conservation grazing on a designated area of Studland Heath is to continue throughout the summer in a change to previous years.

Four red Devon cattle which have been grazing an area between Ferry Road and the harbour have now been moved to a new temporary fenced off grazing unit near Little Sea, where they will stay until September or October.

Grazing returned to Studland Heath two years ago to help manage the heathland for wildlife, but in previous years it has taken place in spring and autumn only, with the cattle withdrawn for the summer period.

The softly, softly approach was in part due to concerns that visitors and grazing unit might not mix, but the experience of the last two years has revealed no real issues.

The new 500m grazing area is in a quiet area of heath and situated to leave access ways clear for walkers.

It is surrounded by a signed electric fence to prevent strays finding their way onto the road which will be removed when the cattle leave. The cattle themselves have a bowser to provide water and plenty of grass to eat.

Areas which have previously been grazed in the same way show a marked improvement in terms of conservation, said Lead Ranger Paul Bradley.

Rank, overgrown grass and scrub has been reduced to create a mosaic of vegetation and bare patches benefiting invertebrates and reptiles.

Studland Peninsular was once grazed by cattle which wandered freely in the same way as they do in the New Forest today, but the practice died out in the 1930s.



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Good posture means good brain control, bad posture means bad brain control. **Marcus Davies**, local osteopath of 16 years' practice, arrested our attention with the P word (and you could sense us all surreptitiously sitting up straighter!) and told us about a system he uses, known as dynamic neuro-muscular stabilisation. The brain, he explained, is by far the most important element of managing our posture and contains at birth the blueprints for all movements.

Marcus described the way a baby's limbs mature, making it possible to walk. As we grow, we overwrite natural movement and develop bad habits which often lead to pain and sometimes injury.

Marcus then brought in Erica, one of his patients, to lie on the treatment couch. Pressure on certain points of the body causes another part to move, so, as he pressed on Erica's heel, one of her arms began to move. Marcus told us how this stimulus can be used to help people in pain and can also help cerebral palsy or stroke sufferers who may experience awkward muscular contractions.

Marcus concluded his talk by answering numerous questions, helping us to understand more about why our bodies do what they do! We are very grateful to him for his time and for generously donating his fee to our chosen charity.

Our **Summer Lunch** is on August 2nd at 12 noon at the Village Hall, and we hope to be out of doors in the sunshine. So come along with your picnic plate, cutlery, drinks and a savoury dish to share (plus folding chair if required) and join the fun with Aquarius friends.

Did you know?

**DOWN BY
THE OLD MILL STREAM !**

For centuries, this interesting corner of the Village has been a hive of activity, including at one time, a tannery. In many recent past months, we were all aware of the heavy traffic movements of scaffolding and stop/start lights, during the restoration of the NT historic buildings, with their intriguing and chequered history. Tourist traffic is now in full swing. Up to 1976, motorists were pulling in here to fill up at the welcome petrol pump!

Whilst Chatting on site with **STEVE FORD**, of Castle Garage, we looked back to

AUGUST 1916 exactly
100 years ago.

*“My late father, Samuel David, known as **DAVE FORD**, was born at Woodyhyde Farm. He was the 8th of 9 siblings. From the tales he told, his early recollections are of a Model T Ford car and an old Albion lorry, relics of WWI left on the farm. In 1925, at the age of 9, his father (my grandfather George Ford) was asked by The Bankes Estate to come to the rescue of, hopefully, doing something with the derelict tannery. Interestingly, we have the original letters, which show a telegram address and telephone number, Wimborne 84!*

Have you heard?

Responding to the plea, George Ford constructed a large side entrance to the main building and an inspection pit inside

was established and soon after, the first village petrol pump appeared here. He also built four lock-up garages.

In 1926 a Buick taxi was purchased. During 1923-35, George, enterprisingly, ran a bus service and later sold to Southern National.

1928, a further letter from The Bankes Estate reveals that grandfather was once again called to the rescue! Due to circumstances across the road at 8 East Street Ralph Mitchell's smithy, the lease of that and the cottage 6 East Street

were transferred to my grandfather. Ralph Mitchell subsequently worked for him at the garage.

It's 1929 by now and my father, age 13, was sent to the newly opened Swanage Grammar School, leaving at the age of 16. A self-confessed non-academic, he spent a lot of his time helping at the garage and milking cows at the farm. At 17, he was driving an Austin 10 van, transporting milk churns to Corfe Castle Union Dairies. He remembered working on Dr. Dru Drury's car, a 1920 De Dion Boutin.

What's in Store?!



From the archives!

Ivy Ford (later Burridge) 'Hands on' at Ford's Garage!

My father's brother Victor and sister Ivy (later Burridge), ran the Stores on site, an additional part of the family business, selling anything from nails to tinned food, buying, renting and repairing TV sets! Whatever it was you wanted ... try Fords! Later, the shop moved across the road to number. 8, The Old Smithy, and even more items filled the shelves.

On 24th July 1940 my father

received his WWII Call-Up papers. On the same day, he married Clara, his childhood sweetheart who, throughout the years that followed, was very much part of this family affair.

*As **RAF** ground crew, he worked mainly on spitfires.*

1946, on demob, Purbeck Garage and Stores revitalised.

My father's main hobby was that of his McCarthy fairground organ, which many readers may recall! Playing at various events, he was known for the most generous amount donated to the Cancer Research Fund.

(Note: For more details. see 'Diary 2000' June 18th, Dave Ford died 7th December 2000.)

1982 'Castle Garage' *Following my motor mechanic's apprenticeship in Wareham, I took over the workshop, renaming it 'Castle Garage'." Ford's Shop continued for a while with Dave at the helm, in his legendary way! **Thanks Steve.***

The Reverend Anne Bond writes

I have written on *Who is God? Who is Jesus? What did Jesus actually do?* and now we come to *Who is the Holy Spirit?* which will include *What is the Trinity?* and will be the last of my letters in this series. If anyone has any comments (rotten eggs as welcome as gold stars!) my email address is rev.anne@outlook.com

As I am sure you all know, the Bible is divided into two parts: The Old Testament, which is a collection of ancient Jewish writings encompassing Myth, History, Story, Poetry, Song, and the writings of the Major and Minor Prophets; and the New Testament containing the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, the Acts of the Apostles, letters mostly from the Apostle Paul to the various small groups of Christians around the eastern Mediterranean, and the Book of Revelation which is End of the World stuff. The Old Testament finishes 400 years before the birth of Jesus; The New Testament starts at the birth of Jesus.

Acts is Volume 2 of Luke's Gospel. In Luke's last chapter (Luke Chapter 24 verse 49, usually written Luke 24:49) Jesus tells his twelve faithful but confused disciples he is going to send them 'what my Father has promised' and instructs them to stay in the city until they have been 'clothed with power from on high'. In Acts 1:8 Jesus tells them 'But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you'; and then, in Acts 2:1-13, he tells the vivid and extraordinary story of the arrival of the Holy Spirit on them.

The Holy Spirit has never not existed, in the same way that God has not. In the first verse of the first book of the Bible we read '... and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters.' (Genesis 1:2) In a way the Holy Spirit acts as God's 'agent on earth'. His effect on the disciples when he 'clothed them with power' was remarkable: from being a scattered and disparate group of frightened, confused, disillusioned and despairing young men, terrified of being arrested and crucified like Jesus, they became fearless and articulate preachers and teachers of Jesus' message. Most of them were killed in one way or another under Roman persecution, refusing to renounce their faith and stop spreading the Gospel: *Love God and Love your Neighbour*. The only one to live into old age was the Apostle John who was exiled to Patmos on the west coast of Cyprus, from where he wrote the Book of Revelation.

The Holy Spirit is the communicating 'spirit of God' or 'spirit of Jesus' who is the means through which God empowers people to do things, and through whom difficult situations get sorted out. Occasionally the

seemingly impossible happens; sometimes things mesh *so* perfectly people say 'what a coincidence'; surprisingly often the sun shines on your event when it's raining everywhere else; or on a sunny day filled with birdsong and nature's beauties, or during a church service or a home Communion in somebody's house, the atmosphere becomes charged and you can *feel* the presence of holiness all around; and so on ... and if someone has been praying about whatever-it-is, you can bet your bottom dollar the Holy Spirit has been busy. For reasons of his own, God chooses to work through the prayers and hands and feet of believing people. The work Jesus began when he walked the earth can only be continued by us, the disciples of our generation; and it is the Holy Spirit who nudges, guides and empowers us as he did the original Twelve two thousand years before.

The Holy Spirit is God's means of communication, his conveyor of comfort and healing, and the conscience of Christians. He is not referred to as 'it', but traditionally by the personal 'he', because he communicates personally as God does. (Although he might just as well be 'she', gender being earthly rather than heavenly. Life in 1st century Palestine was heavily male dominated, which is why it would have been culturally meaningless to think of God and his attributes as female.)

When Jesus was alive on Earth, he was constrained by the limitations of a physical body. He could only be in one place at a time, and could only have one conversation at a time. He was confined, as are we, by the laws of space and time. But through the Holy Spirit he can be everywhere at once, and can hear and respond to the whole of mankind's prayers in the twinkling of an eye.

You have heard of God described as 'The Father, The Son, and the Holy Spirit' (or 'the Holy Ghost' in the 16th century language of the King James Bible and the Book of Common Prayer.). This trio of personalities is what is known as 'The Trinity'; but it is *not* a description of three people. The term 'The Trinity' is a way of understanding God; it is a way of describing how God has made himself known to us. God is emphatically only one person. He is one single entity – but he has shown himself to us as the Father in Heaven, as the living Jesus Christ once on Earth and now resurrected and ascended to Heaven, and as the Holy Spirit active in all creation.

Another way of understanding the Holy Spirit is as the love that exists between the Father and the Son. The essence and fundamental nature of God is love; but you can't love alone. To love, you have to exist in relationship. There is only one God, but he exists mysteriously in a loving

divine relationship of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit that is *Love Itself*, a love so vast and deep that it cannot help but overflow wherever it touches. The old and wise Apostle John wrote in one of his letters: *God is Love*.

Lastly, it is important to realise that Father, Son and Holy Spirit are absolutely equal in 'status' – which of course they must be as they are all aspects of the single being that is God.

It is difficult to write about these things because they are part of what lies beyond normal human experience and understanding. They exist 'out there' rather than in our familiar world of concrete reality. Which is why I have tried to write in everyday language, hoping to make what I'm writing accessible; although a lot of what I have written is actually verifiable history.

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Two things happened yesterday that I want to refer to as I write this month's letter for the Corfe Valley News. Yesterday, when I switched on the Morning News, came the report of what had happened the previous evening in Nice. A Frenchman, in his 30's, had driven a lorry, along a mile stretch of road, and had deliberately "mowed down" those who were gathering to celebrate Bastille Day, on the 14th. July. 84 men, women, and children, were already dead, and more than a hundred other people had been seriously injured, whose lives were also seriously in danger.

Such news creates shock and horror, but also confusion. How could anybody, whatever their nationality, whatever their beliefs, how could anybody be driven by so much hate, as to engage in the destruction of the lives of those they know nothing about? But what took place in Nice, doesn't stand alone.

Just a few days ago, the same News programme, carried pictures of the black man in America, who had been driven by that same hatred, and had resulted in the murder of five white police officers. But prior to this, came the news of the white police officers who, apparently, had shot and killed black fellow-Americans, who had been detained, one for having a rear light not working on his car!

More and more, our news programmes tell us of those who are driven by so much hate, that they destroy those who are the targets of their hate. But how can this be? If we are honest, we all know what it is to dislike, but how can that feeling of dislike, grow and fester to such an extent, that it results in the carrying out of mass murder?

The second thing that happened yesterday, concerns an item that arrived in the post. May be you had it as well. It was an appeal for financial support from that well known charity, the Samaritans. In the leaflet, sent through the post, it referred to the fact that, in 2014, 1,500 young people, between the ages of 16 and 24, had committed suicide. It also spoke of the high percentage of young people who had considered taking such a drastic action. But what has this got to do with those driven by hate, referred to above? One group are driven by hate, the others are driven by despair, but both are driven by forces that are out of control.

In the New Testament, Paul shares something of his own experiences, when he freely admits that he says and does things that he later regrets, but also that the things that he would like to say and do, fail to materialise. The experiences that Paul refers to, are true of all of us. The person that we present to our family, friends, and neighbours, is not the real "us". We would be highly embarrassed if they could see what we really think and feel, but we wear a mask to hide the failures that make us ashamed.

Similarly the good that we aspire to, seems to be permanently out of our reach. We know what we ought to be like, and how we ought to behave, but time and again, we fail to reach that level, and so we pretend. We may not be driven by hatred or by despair, but we are driven by forces that seem to be beyond our control. The only difference is the force of the wind that is driving us, not as to whether we are driven.

Would you agree with me, that all members of the human race are driven? Some, on the extremes, are driven by hate, and some are driven by despair, but we all know what it is like to be subjected to urges that are not good for ourselves as individuals, or for the society of which we are a part. Every act of violence, whether it be physical, or verbal, is the result of such an urge. Every unkind thought or action, is the result of such an urge. As individuals, we are continually being "buffeted" by such urges, which, at times, seem to be beyond our control, and, for some, lead to extreme reaction, which can lead to the devastation of the lives of others or, in some cases, to the devastation of their own lives.

But is there anything that we can do about the situation in which we find ourselves? I believe there is. This is where my beliefs come in. As far as I am concerned, God knows the battle that goes on within us, and He offers help. The help that He offers, is the help of His Holy Spirit, who, if we let Him, can enter our lives and provide the help that we need, in the very place that we need it, and that is within us. But, before that happens, we have to admit a need, and be ready to receive the help that is available, and most of us are not very good at either of those.

If you are struggling with hatred, or despair, or any of the other battles, help is just a phone call away. Is it time to ask for help?


Langton Arthouse Cinema

This film, Denmark's submission for this year's Best Foreign Film Oscar, is a film of two halves – one a frazzling visit to Afghanistan's Helmand, the second an inquiry into the first. Borgen's Pilou Asbæk plays Claus Pedersen, the leader of a Danish combat troop patrolling the province, who suffer losses, by the detonation of a land mine. Pedersen usually calls the shots from his HQ's control centre, but in empathy for his surviving men decides to lead from the front. Back home in suburban Copenhagen, Pedersen's wife Maria is bringing up three children single-handedly, the eldest of whom, is difficult because of his father's lengthy absences. Dad's sudden return, is due to a desperate decision made in the thick of combat which has him facing court martial and prison. *A War* does something brave and challenging in making its most sympathetic character responsible for the worst thing that happens. Pedersen's motives in looking out for his men at all times are upright enough, but the bigger picture is ghastly, and compels grave scrutiny of the military mindset that even puts this power in his hands. Launch of Let's Make Purbeck Litter-free

Over 40 people - including councillors and representatives from Dorset Waste Partnership – met at Harman's Cross Village Hall in mid July to discuss how everyone can help make Purbeck litter-free. Speakers from the National Trust, Surfers Against Sewage, Litter Free Coast and Sea, and the Dorset Devils (a Bournemouth community litter action group) shared their particular insights into how litter affects Purbeck residents and visitors, marine life, wildlife and the environment, and also how they approach clearing it up and, better still, stopping it at source.

It was an ideal opportunity to share possible solutions and, at points, to air complaints about littering, flytipping, the removal of bins and frequency of bin

emptying in certain areas. Everyone agreed how unsightly and dirty litter is and how it may affect local businesses and deter visitors. There were lots of good suggestions e.g. smaller versions of the purple litterpick bin bags came from a member of a walking group keen to litter pick on regular walks; information about the importance of reducing litter and waste could be included in the annual Council Tax demand from Purbeck District council. What was clear at the end of the meeting was that everyone wanted to work together to do something about it so that we do this effectively, without duplication.

The organisers of the meeting, Lara Manningham-Buller, Bridget Mayes and Frank Roberts, are teaming up with volunteers from the meeting to collaborate with Dorset Waste Partnership and the National Trust to support local groups in the Isle of Purbeck to reduce litter in their villages and towns in the way that they think is best. From existing groups' experience, litter problems reduce once a few litter picks have taken place but there are other things that can be done too. Let's Make Purbeck Litter-free (Litter-free Purbeck for short) hopes to help with advice and practical support especially shared resources and – if needed – volunteer-power. Some people have already volunteered from Corfe to both



litter pick and help with other aspects but more volunteers would be welcome, and especially anyone who could help at Kimmeridge or Church Knowle. Please contact litterfreepurbeck@gmail.com or phone or text Bridget Mayes on 07771 851892.

PPAC is a voluntary group of individuals from across the Purbeck area opposed to the proposals from the Partial Review of the Local Plan by Purbeck District Council. PPAC seeks to address planning related matters in the Purbeck area. Details of the Partial Review Consultation can be found on www.dorsetforyou.com/purbeck-partial-review

5300 additional houses in the Purbeck Area do not reflect the needs and aspirations of the local communities in Purbeck.

In its place PPAC recommends that any plans; maintain Purbeck as a rural area; are sustainable; are based on local solutions; addresses genuinely affordable housing; places people before profits; reform the National Planning Policy Framework; and supply more democracy in the Purbeck District.

Unless there are significant numbers of responses to the consultation saying "No to 5300 houses", then you can kiss goodbye to Purbeck as a rural area. If you live in the Isle of Purbeck villages, Swanage or Wareham these proposals will seriously affect you. The journey by car via Wareham and Wool to Dorchester will be much longer-think of all that traffic! The Purbeck area will

become more urbanised and there will be even greater pressure on the roads within the Isle of Purbeck-(south of Wareham). Limited employment opportunities will mean that the new houses will become second homes and investment properties, all beyond the reach of local people. The tourist industry and the UNESCO World Heritage Site will both be threatened by the proposed transformation of Purbeck into a more urban area.

PPAC urge readers to respond with a firm “No” to the current proposals. Please do this so that the area can be properly looked after now and in the future.

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
