OCTOBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

The October meeting was attended by six members of the public. Prior to the meeting the Council had held an open door session where those interested in being a Parish Councillor could come and ask questions about the role. Thank you to those who attended. Should anyone have wished to find out more about the role but missed the event you are very welcome to contact the Clerk who can send you information regarding being a Parish Councillor. Nominations for election are not due until late March 2019 so there is still plenty of time.

The meeting opened with a member of the public speaking in objection to a planning application to upgrade a field track between Lower Scoles Farm and Kingston Road with a hard surface. He was concerned about the environmental impact and the impact on the AONB. A second parishioner requested that the no cycling sign be re-instated at the top of Oli Vyse Lane; cyclists are using the narrow lane and this is a danger to pedestrians. The National Trust, who were present, are going to investigate what happened to the original sign and agreed to meet with the Parishioner.

Cllr Brooks reported success with a Policy Development Panel she had been working on. The panel aimed to highlight the long term effects of short term budget cutting decisions, such as the use of black top to repair pavements in the conservation area as we have seen in Corfe Castle. The Councillor's report has been accepted by Council and a budget of 1.7million has been allocated for this financial year, there should also be a provision in the new Council's budget for next year. Pro-Active Maintenance Units will be instated; they will be a direct point of contact for Parish and Town Councils to address highways problems immediately, so please report any problems to the Clerk should you find them.

Cllr Dragon had attended the inquiry into the ferry toll. He praised the Parish Councils Chairman for his succinct delivery of evidence. He reported that the ferry company had in the summing up presented some new evidence stating revised tolls and is hoping the inspector will not take this forward. Cllr Morrison Wells advised he felt this was the case and that the new evidence would not be considered.

It was reported a meeting had been held between a County Council officer and a local farmer regarding a proposed footpath and cycleway from Norden Park and Ride to Castle View. The farmer is agreeable to the idea but would need a separate track for his cows. Cllr Dragon noted the estimated cost for the project is in the region of £600,000 and whilst the potential funding from Perenco would address some of the cost there will be a significant sum to raise.

The National Trust reported they have recently completed a tree survey of all the trees along the nature trail; when they have the results to this the National Trust will look at cutting back the overgrown hedge which is restricting visibility outside of Oli Vyse lane, as requested at the September meeting. They also noted that the parking outside of the garage at Uvedale will be restricted from the 19th of November. The Trust will be contacting residents directly about the parking and they will be publishing their own notice in the Corfe Valley News.

You may have noticed No Parking signs at God's acre. These are intended to prevent pedestrians having to walk into oncoming traffic around parked cars and the Council hope they will have some effect whilst highways look at other solutions.

Cllr Clarke reported a decision was just announced that the merger of Devon and Cornwall Police Force with Dorset, which was strongly opposed by the Parish Council, would not be going ahead. The Police and Crime Commissioner for Devon and Cornwall is currently not minded to support the proposals.

At the September meeting the Council agreed terms under which they would be happy to adopt the asset of the toilets and residents car-parking spaces form Purbeck District Council. In response PDC resolved that they would not proceed with the transfer of the toilets and car park to the Parish Council unless the Solicitor to the Council was able to secure agreement from the Parish Council to accept a transfer on the previously agreed terms. In light of this the Parish Council discussed agreeing in principle to open negotiations over the heads of terms. If the Parish Council do not adopt the toilets it is likely they may close. They will be transferred to the new Dorset Council and the provision of toilets, which is no longer a statutory service, cannot be guaranteed.

Councillors highlighted that the toilets should not be adopted at the cost of the rate payer, particularly because the provision is largely for visitors. Members felt very strongly that the precept should not be raised to fund the provision and that the idea of inviting local businesses to help with the cost must be explored. The National Trust have agreed to help on principle but only if other businesses contribute. It was acknowledged the toilets and parking spaces would not be an 'asset' as in the event of them becoming economically unviable they would be transferred to the Unitary Authority, and in fact running the provision could be a liability.

It was raised that there was a danger entering into the adoption of the toilets without any reserve as the PC would need to account for damage and repairs.

It was ultimately decided that negotiations should continue so the Council resolved to express the intent to adopt the toilets on principle whilst looking

further into the valuation and seeking other means of revenue to support the running of the toilets.

The Parish Council considers planning applications within the parish each month. They had no objection to proposals for the following: a two storey rear extension at Townsend Road, Corfe Castle. To change the use of an outbuilding to holiday accommodation at Woolgarston Cottage, 1 Sandy Hill Lane, Woolgarston. A single storey extension and insert rooflight at The Annexe, Greystone Court, Langston Road, Kingston. The approval of openings between bedrooms on the first and second floors, removal of existing stud walls and formation of 4 bathrooms for 8 letting rooms (retrospective) at The Bankes Arms Hotel. To replace 18 existing windows & 4 french doors at Bartholomews, Corfe Castle and to rebuild southern most chimney stack to existing dimensions, lining of flue with lime mortar and inserting flexible steel liner at 74 East Street, Corfe Castle.

Where are we on the West Street Toilets?

Regular readers will have seen that the Parish Council has been considering for several months whether we should take over the toilets in West Street. The block was recently refurbished by Purbeck DC and is well used. Under local government reorganisation the block would transfer to the new Dorset Council.

However the new Dorset Council has no statutory duty to provide toilets and there have been indications that the new Council would cease to fund all toilets if the current financial crisis for Dorset continues. As libraries, the youth service and rural bus services have already been cut this seems to be a real threat.

The Parish Council believes our much-visited village needs toilet provision and we have therefore negotiated with Purbeck DC to take them over from next April. We have been able to secure an exceptional arrangement to

receive the income from the resident's car parking spaces, which will cover most of the running costs. We believe that we should be able to qualify for small business rate relief for the toilets and car spaces and there would then be no cost to local tax payers.

However we can only apply for a new valuation once we own the toilets and so there is a financial risk if the valuation office rated the toilets and car spaces in an adverse way.

If that happened there could be a significant financial gap. We would then consult the village, local businesses and the national Trust about how we could close any gap or whether we hand the toilets back to Dorset Council together with the car parking.

The Parish Council will consider the issue again at its 12 November meeting.



NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

There was almost a full complement of Councillors at the meeting held in a small corner of the huge sports arena, also known as Furzebrook Village Hall, on 9th October. Two Parishioners also turned up to take part in local democracy. Apologies were received and accepted from one of the Councillors who was unable to attend.

Following election of the Parish Council for October (Cllr Derek Burt), the Minutes of the July meeting were at last approved; there being three Councillors present who were also at July's meeting. However, one shouldn't be complacent about Minutes of Meetings being approved. Guess what? Yes, dear reader, there were only two Councillors present at the October meeting who were present at the September meeting so September's minutes couldn't be approved, amended or otherwise. The draft September minutes were held over until November. And because of all this, as there weren't any approved Minutes there couldn't be any discussions on "Matters Arising from the September Minutes". Oh, Happy Days!

Anyway, to business. It was decided that the "Special Interests" held by the Councillors in matters such as Highways, Cemetery Liaison, Police Liaison, Tree Works, etc., should continue as during 2017-2018. Two Councillors were also appointed to act as "Planning Leads" as well. Talking of "Planning", it was quite a quiet meeting as far as that part of Parish Council business was concerned. There were no planning applications in for discussion and in "Past Planning" matters, the Clerk gave a report on a minerals application which had been previously been approved by PDC but was still awaiting clearance by DCC.

During the agenda item on Highways, the Council was pleased to note that there has been lots of hedge cutting in Creech and congratulated the local farmer in his good work. There has been progress in getting fingers made for the East Creech and Cocknowle crossroads fingerposts which had had the previous ones amputated some time ago. It was also reported that the remedial work on the road and ditches, etc., in the vicinity of Green Pond was also just about complete; all congratulations to the team at Dorset Highways and their local highways engineering technician for sorting it out. On an even more substantial note, the road bridge over the stream which marks the boundary between Corfe Castle and Church Knowle parishes at Glebe House has now been completely repaired and it now looks like a bridge than road subsidence; indeed, several Councillors who had lived in the area for 50 years plus didn't even know there was a bridge there until the road started to fall away. Now they know there is one and the parapets have been superbly rebuilt. Although there was a temporary road closure and, later, traffic lights to protect the bridge builders from lunatic motorists and "Winabago" drivers while the work was being carried out, Councillors felt that it was very well worth the short-term inconvenience. Well done again DCC. The bridge was even opened ahead of time to reduce inconvenience for the late Rodney Parker's funeral (see last month's CVN).

The world we live in should always be in balance, so it must be with "Highways". The good news has been given and now here's the bad. It was reported that the road opposite Keeper's Cottage & Creech Barrow Cottage in East Creech is collapsing at its shoulder and a large pot-hole in the road between East Creech and Cotness was getting larger and larger. The Clerk would report the matter to DCC. There's always work to do.

The accounts were agreed to and invoices paid.

The Clerk reported that he had completed the administration work on the conversion of the legal title of the ownership of the cemetery after having visited the Weymouth equivalent of Fort Knox, also known as the Weymouth Land Registry Office. Currently, CKPC held the cemetery in "Title in Possession", something it had held for 12 years. Now that 12 years was up the possessory title could be and by the time this edition of CVN is published would be converted into Absolute Title. In other the cemetery is "all theirs" as far as the Parish Council is concerned.

The Corfe River project was discussed and a report on the "river walk" by CKPC, the Environment Agency, Dorset Wildlife Trust (DWT) and others was given. On this subject, there will be a talk at 7pm on 4th December at Bucknowle Farm to be given by Amanda Broome of DWT. All are welcome. The Parish Council would like to hear from anyone who has old photos of what the upper reaches of the Corfe River looked like years ago and bring them to the Bucknowle Farm meeting or let Cllr Page have copies so that CKPC and DWT can get more info on the river.

During the period for discussion towards the end of the meeting the matter of yet another heath fire, probably caused by ash/sparks from Swanage Railway steam trains, came up. The Clerk advised the meeting that under the Reporting of Injuries, Diseases and Dangerous Occurrences Regulations, such a fire would be a "Dangerous Occurrence" and must be reported for investigation by the enforcement authority (in this case the "ORR"- previously known as the Railway Inspectorate) by the Railway company. Members asked him to contact the ORR and express their concern about the fires which they felt were far too frequent. He would also contact Swanage Railway to express concern of the Council. Members were advised there would be a railway liaison committee meeting on 19th October which would be attended by at least one of the CKPC Councillors.

And that was that for October.

Next meeting will be at Church Knowle Reading Room on Tuesday 13th November at 7:30pm.

The National Trust has reaffirmed its commitment to ensuring future generations can continue to enjoy natural healthy beaches in Studland following the formation of a beach hut users' group at South Beach.

We want beach huts to stay at South Beach for as long as is feasible, and we would welcome all beach hut owners becoming involved in conversations about the future.

South Beach, like neighbouring Middle Beach come under a Shoreline Management Plan — an agreement between local authorities, the Environment Agency and landowners including the Trust.

The plan sets out how each stretch of coastline will be managed and is designed to avoid a piecemeal approach whereby management practices in one area can have unintended consequences elsewhere.

For South Beach and Middle Beach the policy is one of managed realignment until 2025 and no active intervention thereafter.

This is consistent with Shifting Shores, the Trust's national coastal management plan, which recognizes that coastlines are subject to constant change and seeks to work with natural process rather than against them.

Managed realignment means a gradual shift away from relying on hard defences to hold back nature.

Instead, the action of the wind and waves is allowed to reshape coastlines in a way that is natural and far more sustainable in the long term.

That means outdated gabion sea defences at Middle Beach and South Beach will be removed as they reach the end of their lives and it is no longer feasible to maintain them.

At Middle Beach this is already starting to happen and the Trust sits on a working group including community representatives about how to remove the gabions while maintaining existing facilities in new locations nearby.

At South Beach gabion deterioration is generally less advanced and there is no immediate need to plan for their removal, though the situation is under constant review.

Minor repair work has been carried out on the gabions at South Beach over recent years and this will continue for as long as it is feasible to maintain them in an acceptable condition.

We took the same approach at Middle Beach where minor repairs were carried out until it was clear they were no longer effective.

It is not possible to say exactly when the South Beach gabions will reach that point, but the Trust employs a specialist contractor to carry out regular assessments.

Our ultimate goal, as with all the coastline we look after, is to maintain a healthy and natural environment which provides a home for wildlife and can be enjoyed by everyone.

Ann Fielder, a magistrate of over 20 years experience, gave us some fascinating insights into this historic role. The first magistrates were created as Justices of the Peace, a term still in use, in 1361 under the reign of Edward the Third but it was not until 1919 that we saw the first female magistrate.

All criminal cases start in a Magistrates Court and may then be moved on through the judicial system. This means that a very wide variety of cases will be considered. The maximum penalty a magistrate may hand down is 6 months imprisonment. Three magistrates sit together on the bench for a sitting and each must do a minimum of 26 sittings per annum. The role is voluntary and unpaid; no formal qualifications are required but training and advice is given. An applicant will be interviewed and must demonstrate the right qualities for the work, such as being of good character, having sound judgement and social awareness.

Ann explained to us how sentencing is approached in a structured way and gave us examples of the types of case that come up regularly, challenging us to consider what sentence we would have brought. We appreciated Ann's clear presentation of a role in our society of which we are all aware but of which most of us knew very little.



OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD.

Amongst other places where parcels are delivered are countries in Africa, and countries in the very poor areas of Europe such as Bosnia, Serbia, Romania, Moldova, the Ukraine, and possibly Greece. There is a large and efficient system, much of it based on Christian churches, to collect presents, transport them to their destinations and distribute them to the children who really need them.



Corfe Castle Primary School has been involved in Operation Christmas Child for several years.

Parcels consist of a number of small presents fitted into a shoebox. Boxes may be packed with presents suitable for a boy or a girl within one of three different age ranges. Leaflets will shortly be available which explain very clearly the sort of presents which are suitable, and those which should not be included, and how to package them and prepare them for dispatch. A donation is requested to cover the costs of collection transport and distribution. Suggested amount £5.

This year members of the congregation of St Edward's Church will be coordinating the collection of boxes within the village.

Boxes collected in England are normally moved by truck to Eastern Europe. Parcels for Africa are collected in the USA and moved there by ship. Because of the time that it takes to collect up boxes and move them to their destination boxes have to be ready and collected in early November at the latest.

The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

Corfe Castle Primary School came to church for their Harvest Service shortly before the half-term holiday and as usual this was a challenging, moving and inspiring occasion. The theme for assemblies and R.E. has been 'thankfulness' and we heard about the work which had been done about 'blessings'. In the short prayers the children spoke of the blessings they experience: sport figured quite a lot, but so too did friends, family and support, and appreciation of the area where we live.

The service and its theme was very appropriate in view of what was to follow. The Key Stage 2 pupils (ages 7 to 11) had written the names of all those from the Parish of Corfe Castle who died in the First World War on small wooden crosses. One by one the 35 crosses were hammered into the ground around the 'Tommy' who stands in a prominent position in the churchyard.

Here was another moving moment as the children from the school helped to remember the local people who had served. It was poignant to recall that those who had been involved and died were not so much older than the older schoolchildren. It had been, and continued to be, inspiring to see the liveliness and thoughtfulness of the pupils.

Our hope as we remember this very special centenary is surely that we can all play our part, whatever our age, background and circumstances, in ensuring that all people can live together in harmony and free from need. This a constant and endless task. We can easily grow weary. The enthusiasm and passion of the young is a great inspiration for us – no less now, than in time past. Christian people seek to renew faith in God's good and loving purposes. Many others – of other faiths, or no obvious faith – share in all of this too.

We will all have our own reflections as we pass the many reminders of this special anniversary and hear and read about it. The simple display in the churchyard at Corfe Castle, and the way it came about, speaks very clearly for us in this place.

The Elephant in the Room

It is a mystery why people look to the heavens but if we think seriously about life for a moment, there is a huge elephant in the room called 'death' which will eventually stomp on us all. When we realise this, it makes sense for us to see if there is any way we can avoid being stomped on. This is why many people become interested in God, the giver of life. For some it takes longer than others to give it serious thought, but as their peer group around them die, it makes them realise that they also have a problem. A big one at that. It is an issue everyone begins to think about, but few people talk about.

The most sobering time for many of us is when we are on our deathbed. It is in those last moments that we tend to open our hearts and expose our fears. Let us think about these fearful last words of some famous people: Queen Elizabeth the First of England whispered, "All my possessions for one moment of time." The famous composer Ludwig van Beethoven cried, "Too bad, too bad! It's too late!" Thomas Hobbs (a famous 17th century English philosopher) said, "I am about to take my last voyage, a great leap in the dark." Socrates, another classical Greek philosopher, said, "All of the wisdom of this world is but a tiny raft upon which we must set sail when we leave this earth." If only there was a firmer foundation upon which to sail, perhaps some divine word. Bob Marley, the musician said 'money can't buy life'. 

Harman's Cross Movie Night

On Tuesday 13 November we're showing The Bookshop at 7.30 in Harman's Cross Village Hall. This film is adapted from the novel, shortlisted for the Booker, by Penelope Fitzgerald. Semi-autobiographical, it's about an amiable young widow, Florence, who comes to a remote coastal Suffolk town in the late 1950s, buys a dilapidated property there and enterprisingly converts it into a bookshop. She makes a success of it, largely by stocking Nabokov's Lolita, thus incurring the envious displeasure of a local grande dame, who wanted the property for a self-aggrandising arts centre. She tries to nudge Florence towards switching sites, to a soon-to-be-vacated fishmongers instead. Most of the

townsfolk become complicit in forcing her out, except Mr Brundish (<u>Bill Nighy</u>, a hot favourite with our Movie Night groupies), whose letter-writing to Florence sets the stage for a sympathetic alliance. A film that neatly depicts postwar Britain's cold war of generation and class. Tickets £5 on the door, which will open, along with the bar, at 7pm.

Langton Arthouse Cinema

In December we're screening Isle of Dogs on Wednesday 5 at 7.30 in Langton Matravers' Village Hall. This film is absolutely nothing to do with that small island in the Thames. It's about a diseased community of unwanted dogs, dumped on an island off the coast of a dystopian future Japan. It is director Wes Anderson's first feature film since The Grand Budapest Hotel, and reunites him with stop-motion animation nearly a decade after making Fantastic Mr. Fox. Using the voices Bill Murray, Jeff Goldblum, Scarlett Johansson and Yoko Ono, among others, Anderson creates a completely handmade world, gorgeous to look at and packed full of intricate detail. The film revolves around a young Japanese boy, 12-year-old Atari, who embarks on an odyssey to search for his missing pet, Spot, who has been sent to the island. This remarkable boy flies in a stolen plane on a sensational mission to rescue Spot where he is helped by a ragtag crew of outlaw hounds. Like all of Anderson's work Isle of Dogs is very stylised, offbeat and characterised by its dry and ironic humour but at the same time dealing with some weighty themes such as ethnic cleansing, fascism and corruption. 
