OCTOBER 2023 FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

Bus Shelter: Thanks to a member of public who reported rain dripping through the roof when using the bus shelter by Halves Cottages, the Parish Council have engaged a local contractor to repair the roof.

Gods Acre Cemetery (New Extension): Concern was raised about the viability of double depth plots being offered within the New Extension area of Gods Acre Cemetery, due to the water table levels. Contractors were asked to quote for investigation work, however when quotes came back at just under £8,000 for the initial investigation works the Parish Council decided to no longer offer double depth plots. Any Rights to Burial issued for double depth plots already will be honoured. What this means is from now on families who wish to be buried together will now be offered adjoining plots.

National Trust: <u>Wetland Restoration Project</u>. Over the coming weeks / months, keep an eye on the National Trust website but also in the CVN for details of a proposed exciting new Wetland Restoration project run by the National Trust on land near the village. During the November Parish Council meeting, Mark Singelton the Countryside Manager, for Purbeck will give an update on the Commons Committee.

Dorset Council update from Cllr Brooks: "<u>Budget Cafes:</u> We have recently held the first of a series of 'Budget Cafes' which are a great opportunity for all members to be involved with building next year's Budget - always challenging. We will update as we move through this process." The Parish Council has suggested some options for the budget including improving the park and ride, signage on car parking spaces and a plan for off road cycle and walking routes.

"Preventative treatments for Dorset's roads in October

Work continues in October to preserve more of our roads using a preventative treatment called micro-surfacing. Micro-surfacing seals the road, improves the texture and prevents water ingress. It is a cost-effective treatment for worn, but not structurally failing, roads that keeps them in good condition. It also adds reinforcement to the existing surface.

Digital Champion Roadshow: The Dorset Council's volunteer digital champion service is ten years old and to celebrate is holding a 'get online' roadshow. The volunteer digital champion service was set up in 2013 when Dorset Council's Superfast team realised that rolling out broadband to people was not enough to get people online. With take-up figures of the new Superfast broadband lower than expected, the team realised that some people needed to be motivated and supported to take up the new technology now at their disposal. The October meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 10th October at 6:30pm. It was attended by five members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair) and one member of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Public Discussion

The hand distribution of letters regarding obstructive parking was discussed.

Vacancies on the Parish Council

There are still two vacancies on the Parish Council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk. No applications have been received this month.

Adoption of Standing Orders and Code of Conduct

It was resolved to adopt the most recently prepared Standing Orders and Code of Conduct based on the Local Government Association's model.

The Playing Field

The cradle seats were replaced on the swing. Quotes are being sought to treat all of the wooden components and poles in the playing field with a coat of preservative. Prices for this are being sought, please see below.

Neighbourhood Plan

The application for the next tranche of grant is being processed. Nicola Pitcher is the chair of the reconvened Steering Group.

Planning

The repairs to the chimney and the installation of a wood burner at The Old Rectory, Church Knowle (P/LBC/2023/04840) was supported by the Council.

Concern was again raised at the extensive work being carried out on the Victorian farm buildings belonging to the Blue Pool estate at Furzebrook Farm with no planning permission. It was resolved to write again to the Planning Department.

<u>Highways</u>

Parking obstructing the H-bar painted on the road opposite the turning by the phone box and also blocking the driveways is an-going problem. A letter regarding this is being hand-delivered to properties in the vicinity.

The good work of East Creech Farm in maintaining the highway hedges was commended by the Council.

It was noted that many of the signs providing directions to people unfamiliar with the area were still so obscured by trees and overgrowth as to be of little use.

Tenders

Tenders are being sought for treating all of the timber at the playing field with an approved preservative. The timber will have to be sanded to remove any splinters first. Apply to the Clerk at clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk for details.

Fingers crossed for Purbeck nature funding bid

Forty landowners, farmers and organisations have come together in a bid for Government funding to help nature across Purbeck. The consortium, led by the Dorset Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, is looking for Landscape Recovery funding for an area of over 8,000ha. This includes the Purbeck Heaths National Nature Reserve and the coastal stretch from Durlston Country Park to Kimmeridge.

Landscape Recovery offers farmers and land managers the opportunity to work together across large areas for the benefit of nature. The Government will fund 25 projects across the country – the successful projects being announced in December.

David Brown of the National Trust, one of the partners in the bid, said:

"Purbeck really is leading the way in partnership working for nature – so much positive action is already taking place, and much more is being planned. By working with farmers who manage in nature-friendly ways we can restore nature across the whole landscape and put it at the heart of a sustainable local economy.

"Over my career as an ecologist the wider backdrop for nature has become increasingly bleak - but here in Purbeck I feel genuinely optimistic for our future."

The shops of Corfe Castle, A short history from King John to the 20th century.



Environmental Group Update



At our September meeting, Dilys Gartside (20s plenty for Dorset Campaign Coordinator) spoke to us on the subject of 20mph speed limits.

She told us that, when people were asked why they didn't continue with as much walking and cycling after the end of the Covid lockdown, most said it was due to fear from the speed of motor traffic. Slower traffic encourages active travel.



The current 30mph speed limit was set in the 1930s and is considered by many to be inappropriate today. In 2020, the UK signed up to the Stockholm Declaration which included the resolution: "A safe speed on roads with possible conflicts between cars and pedestrians, cyclists and other vulnerable road users is 30kph (20mph)."

Someone hit at 30mph is 5 x more likely to be killed than if hit at 20mph; 50% of people survive at 30mph, 95% of people survive at 20mph. People such as the young and older people are more vulnerable and so their likelihood of being killed at 30pmh is higher. Driving at 20mph ameliorates the impact of human error, and the stopping distance at 20mph being half as long compared to 30mph.

At the end of her talk there was a lively Q&A session, and in a show of hands, 13 out of 15 people voted for a 20mph limit through Corfe Castle village.

Our Next Get-Together

Unfortunately, our October meeting had to be cancelled at short notice for various reasons, but we are now looking forward to our November meeting. We are still exploring options for our next few meetings; these include hosting a speaker from Sustrans to talk about local cycle routes, and a speaker from Poole Harbour Trails / and / or The Cordite Way project to talk about the circular harbour route and the potential for eventually incorporating the newly designated Cordite Way public footpath.

We are also hoping to offer a screening of the film "Let's Go Wild! This inspirational film was made in Purbeck (by ex BBC / Netflix filmmaker Sue who is one of our neighbours in Corfe Castle), and features Purbeck people, mainly children, and the Purbeck countryside. It was premiered at The Mowlem for the Planet Purbeck Festival and we are hoping that our Luke can arrange a special showing for us!



From George IV to Victoria. Part 2

A few changes occurred during the 1800s. John, the 1st Earl of Eldon had already acquired Encombe by 1816 and enlarged his holdings further by purchasing Norden Farm clay pits and land on Norden Common from the late estate of William Morton Pitt, who had died at Fordington in 1836. Mr Pitt had struggled financially in his later years and was forced to sell off parts of his estate. In 1734, his family had purchased Encombe in similar circumstances when the Cullifords had got into debt. The High Court of Chancery ordered the rest of the Pitt estate to be sold in June 1838.

The village church also changed because the walls were bulging out by a foot on the northern side, and it was felt the interior was too cluttered, so, a rebuild was begun in 1859. The roof was raised, the chest tombs, memorial brasses, church seats and gallery were removed along with a medieval, stained-glass window at the eastern end. Stones roof tiles were replaced with slate. Fortunately for the rest of the valley, so much money was spent on St Edward's, that the other churches remained untouched although the intention had been to update them too. It cost over £4,000 the equivalent in today's money of about £200,000. This restoration resulted in the church you see today.

Schooling in the village altered too going from 3 Infant schools and 5 daily schools of various denominations in 1833 to the first National School built in 1834 (now The Corfe Castle Club and lately used by The British Legion). This was followed by 'The Bankes Memorial School' in 1895.



The inscription reads '18 ESB 95'. ESB stood for Eldon Surtees Bankes, the then Rector of Corfe.




Laying the foundation stone to what is now the Corfe Castle CE Primary School. [Photo from Les Hayward]

And for those avid genealogists, a gift arrived in the form of Censuses taken every 10 years (apart from 1941 because of the war). They were produced as a population count to determine the growth or decline of its working or nonworking population. Corfe's earliest was the 1790 census produced by William Morton Pitt. A very detailed census which sadly was not emulated in the 1811, 1821 or 1831 censuses as the whole parish was not recorded. The end of the century saw the erection of the cross in The Square to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897. This still stands despite attempts by assorted mechanised vehicles to knock it down.



Photography had also been invented so a pictorial record was now possible which produced many photos of the ruined castle and not so many of the rest of the village. The Town Trust is always looking for photos of the village even if they have people in them.



It's screen time again as Purbeck Film Festival launches a fortnight of fun, drama and comedy to suit all tastes.

The annual Purbeck Film Festival is marking its 28th year with another programme of films old and new, certain to appeal to seasoned cinemagoers or anyone wanting a good night out.

More than 80 films are being screened in over 30 venues across Purbeck from **October 20 to November 4**, ranging from popular cinemas the Mowlem in Swanage and Wareham's magnificent Rex, to village and church halls, Durlston Castle – and a tennis and croquet club.

Church Bells Ring To Mark Unique Victorian Steam Locomotive Hauling First Passenger Train Since 1945 After Restoration

Church bells rang out in Swanage to mark a unique Victorian steam locomotive hauling its first passenger train since 1945 - following a challenging six-year £650,000 restoration – after the engine escaped being scrapped so it could mark the centenary of London's Waterloo station in 1948.

One of the guests attending the launch ceremony at Swanage station on Saturday, 7 October, 2023, for the T3 class locomotive No. 563 was Swanage Railway Trust Patron Sir Philip Williams whose great-grandfather was on the Board of the London and South Western Railway Company that designed and built the steam locomotive.

The bells at St Mary's Church – overlooking Swanage station – rang out in celebration thanks to several Swanage Railway volunteers who are keen bell ringers at the Victorian church.

Built in 1893 to a design by renowned engineer William Adams – and one of the finest express passenger train locomotives of the Victorian era – the nonworking London and South Western Railway T3 class No. 563 was donated to the Swanage Railway Trust by the National Railway Museum in 2017. No. 563 hauled its first two passenger trains – carrying only invited guests and

supporters of the Swanage Railway Trust's ambitious and historic T3 restoration project during October.

The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

Forgiveness! How many times have we exclaimed in exasperation: "I'll never forgive him (or her)" for whatever dire indignity or mortal sin has been committed. Possibly not actual slaughter ... more likely, perhaps, forgetting to put the food rubbish out for collection. Or misreading *ham* on the shopping list and coming home with jam. But you can't make baked eggs with *ham*, with jam ...

Many of us have things in our lives we find it hard to forgive, some worse than others. 'Forgive and forget' is a bit of advice often given in the effort to comfort, which doesn't really help because you can *say* words of forgiveness, whereas forgetting is beyond possibility. But without the 'forgetting' is it really forgiveness? Those of us who pray the Lord's Prayer say: "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us". To 'trespass' is to commit any degree of wrongdoing from unkindness to murder, from overworking to slavery, and from over-protection to coercive control. For the sufferer from the trespass of another, to forgive the perpetrator is a very big ask indeed.

The identifying characteristic of the One and Only True God is love – not an emotion, not a feeling, but behaviour that comprises love-in-action: unselfishness, wanting the well-being of others, giving to the needy, and helping those who can't help themselves. Forgiveness is like that: not an emotion, not a feeling, but the act of forgiving which (from the outside) looks like forgiving-and-forgetting. It may be impossible to forget the ill that has been done you; but it *is* possible not to let your mind dwell on it with active hatred for the rest of your life, and to keep the not-forgetting to yourself as far as other people are concerned.

Jesus told a story called The Parable of the Wedding Banquet illustrating that unrepentant wrong-doers do get their come-uppance in the end (Matthew 22:10-14). Many people think we all get to Heaven eventually, God forgives, that is what he is for, and the concept of judgement is for pessimists and the terminally gloomy. But the great merciful mystery of God's forgiveness is <u>not</u> the same as saying that whatever we do it doesn't really matter because we'll all be forgiven in the end. We won't.

For those of us who have been grievously wronged, we can safely leave retribution to God. For us, it is enough to do our best to forgive, to try to wish well to those who have hurt us, to acknowledge and ask forgiveness for our own sins of omission and commission - and then leave the rest to the Almighty.

Purbeck Connect Ukraine (Pcu) – A Plea For Help And More Funds

In March 2022, following the Russian invasion of Ukraine, PCU was formed as a voluntary organisation to help Ukrainian refugees settle in the local area, as part of the charity Swanage Action for Refugees. There are now about 30 Ukrainian families in the wider Purbeck area, from Lulworth to Studland, who have been welcomed by local Host families.

In the past year, PCU's work has included:

- Linking up Ukrainian refugees with hosts in Purbeck
- Assisting with applications for visas, benefits, school applications
- Referring guests to services, e.g. the Foodbank, Job Centre and CAB
- Establishing links with other Ukrainian refugee groups in Dorset ۰
- Providing essential information to our Ukrainian guests
- Supplying clothing, bicycles, phones, laptops, bedding and household goods
- Providing transport to essential appointments and medical visits
- Arranging social activities & events
- Enabling our Ukrainian friends to prepare a



- Ukrainian dinner for their hosts and volunteers
- Assisting with relocation to new accommodation at the end of the hosting period
- Providing regular English lessons for adults, and a Saturday school for Ukrainian children

This autumn, as the war continues, we are still in need of more host families to help more Ukrainians moving to Purbeck. Many manage to work once settled, but they have lost so much and are still in great need. We have seen some lovely friendships develop and there is such gratitude from those who have received help from PCU.

Also we urgently require more funds to meet the ongoing needs and to be able to offer essential support as necessary.

Please consider whether you could help in some way; perhaps you could hold a Coffee Morning or organise a raffle, hold a concert, sports or social event, or may be simply make a personal donation. If you belong to a group, perhaps you could ask if they also could give a donation to PCU to ensure this vital work can continue, for as long as it takes.

<u>Corfe Castle Evangelical Congregational Church</u> FROM OLD LIFE TO NEW

We were discussing recently, how the nights are drawing in, less daylight, temperatures are starting to fall. The trees are losing their leaves, crops in the fields have been harvested, plants are no longer showing off their beautiful colours. This gives off the impression of everything becoming gloomy, no growth and all things dying off, the near future is very gloomy.

It gave me the thought that this is very untrue and in fact the opposite is happening.

Yes, the leaves on the tree are turning other colours and falling from the tree, but the new seeds, the conkers and acorns which have fallen from the trees are the start of new life. The farmers are preparing the fields after harvesting for the crops for next year, The roses and other plants have the dead twigs cut off ready for the new life to come back next year.

As a Christian, we have to give up the old life, take away the dead leaves and twigs so to be prepared for the new life like the new growth in Spring. When things are looking a bit dull and grey it is good to think about the work going on below the ground as new life will be coming in the months ahead, we need to go through the Winter to get to the beauty of Spring. As 2 Corinthians Chapter 5 Verse 17 says "*Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!*"

Life can be so wonderfully measured by seasons and stages. Autumn begins with the shedding of colourful leaves; Winter begins with a cold bed of snow; Spring begins with the sprouting of new life; and Summer begins with warm sunny days.

The Bible says in Ecclesiastes Chapter 3 verses 1 - 5:

To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven:

a time to be born, and a time to die;

a time to plant, and a time to pluck what is planted;

a time to kill, and a time to heal;

a time to break down, and a time to build up;

a time to weep, and a time to laugh;

a time to mourn, and a time to dance;

a time to cast away stones, and a time to gather stones;

a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing.

Matthew Chapter 5 verse 45 says, "*He allows seasons to change and new beginnings to ascend*."

This is a small wading bird that breeds in the arctic and migrates south during September/December with less 200 birds being seen annually around the UK I feel we have been very lucky to have seen and recorded it.

October has seen the reappearance of at least 100+ Mediterranean gulls regularly feeding out on the surrounding fields, these can be easily identified by the lack of black in the wing, meadow pipits, pied wagtails and linnets in larger flocks.

Look out for the returning redwings and fieldfares as they have already been seen further north.



The Rambling Gardener

November seems to have come very fast but every year goes faster than the ones before. The autumn leaves are wonderfully coloured, lemon yellow, scarlet, mahogany red. It is not nice to put away my summer clothes especially as we have had lots of hot days, but with the shorter days it will be months before we see as much sun. Also, with the colder nights it is wise to wear warm clothes. I plan to wear lots of russet-coloured woollens that makes me feel warmer!

I have bird feeders that I waste a lot of time watching as the birds are so incredible. The buzzards are busy eating rats and mice, and the sparrow hawk eats my sparrows of which I have too many. The thrushes and blackbirds help to keep the slugs and snails down, the many tits eat green fly and lots of other small grubs. It is interesting watching them and the way they interact. My bird feeders are largely where I can watch them from my house and learn more, in the warmth. Recently I read Rebecca Loncraine's book "Skybound," it explains how wind is used to keep airborne so watching birds using or fighting against the wind has become even more fun. By the end of the book, she has learned to live life while accepting her own mortality and every morning I say thank you for my present of a new day.

There are many jobs to do in November. Yet more fruit and vegetables preservation by drying, blanching and freezing or bottling. Dividing perennials while the ground is still warm from the summer to establish well, before the cold and wet arrives. Tulips give great colour from March and into May so now is a good time to plant some straight in the ground and others into pots for a focal delight. Either use just one variety, or if it is possible to layer 3 deep either all tulips or a mix of bulbs, which gives a longer flowering season from the same pot without repotting. These bulbs are hardy and can be left outside. Prune roses so they are not damaged by winter gales by cutting out any extra-long or unhealthy wood and any crossing branches. Lavender needs hard pruning if it is to have a long life, and October-flowering varieties should be cut back as they finish flowering. Keep the cut bits and use for lavender bags and add some Tarragon or other aromatic herbs if you want to keep moths out of clothes without using a spray. Grapes need pruning back to 3 buds. Apples trees prune any poor or diseased wood. Also, look out for canker it looks like swollen branches to remove in the winter. Keep the centre of the tree open to let the sunlight gets in.

Tender plants - move to greenhouse, into the home, or cover with compost, leaf mould or fleece. Collect things for making Christmas cards and decorations such as grasses, seedheads, old man's beard from hedgerows (spray with hair spray to avoid seeds falling) press pretty leaves. In December holly,

red ribbons and candles will be all that is needed to make wreaths and decorations for the house without using plastic.

In November when I was a child it was cold in the old house and we wore heavy woollen clothes. My parents said idle hands got into trouble so every day we had chores to do with the animals, in the kitchen, garden and on the farm. In the evening after supper, we would read the classics, pluck the angora rabbits we had, weave on a simple loom, or spin. We did washing on Monday, drying on Tuesday and mending on Wednesday. Due to rationing we didn't buy new clothes and we had to try to mend clothes and darn the woollens so it didn't show. We sat as near the light as possible because old electric lights were very dim. Now, I still read, spin, knit and weave and I also like watching some television especially wildlife documentaries.

My garden is always open to anyone who would like to visit, and in December I will be making my own wreaths and Christmas decorations, so do ring if you would like to join me.
