

Highways Consultation: Keep an eye out for the upcoming Corfe Castle Parish Council Public Consultation Highways leaflet landing on your doormat soon! If you're a regular traveller along West Street, this is your opportunity to make your voice heard in shaping the future of our community's roads.

Your input matters greatly in determining how we can enhance safety and efficiency for both motorists and pedestrians. Please take the time to read through the leaflet and participate in the consultation process. Your insights and suggestions will directly influence the decisions made regarding the improvement of West Street. Together, we can work towards creating a safer and more accessible environment for everyone in our neighbourhood.

Wheelchair Access around the Village: A member of our community raised a concern regarding wheelchair access throughout Corfe Castle. It was brought to our attention that the pavements in certain areas of our village are not suitable for wheelchair users and pose significant challenges for mobility.

Specifically, it was noted that the pavements from the South end of Corfe Castle (Mead Road) to Why Jewellers are not adequately accessible. The areas near the old British Legion, the old Pink Goat, and the National Trust shop were highlighted as particularly problematic due to narrow pathways, making navigation difficult even for narrow mobility scooters. Additionally, the absence of drop kerbs further exacerbates the issue by limiting temporary / short distance access to the road. In response to this concern, Cllr Brooks has kindly agreed to directly contact the resident who raised the issue to arrange a village walkabout. This matter will be discussed further in the coming months.

Traffic Management – **A351**: A concern was raised regarding the upcoming roadworks scheduled, which are a necessity to allow the essential Old Stables roof. repairs. It was stated there is apprehension about potential major disruptions caused by the roadworks, at certain times of the day.

In response, Cllr Brooks assured residents that if there are significant issues with traffic management during the roadworks, they can reach out to her directly and she can then look to have the traffic management plan amended, where possible. Pre-School Building: A member of public via Cllr Roberts asked: What is going to happen to the pre-school building when children move into the main building? Cllr N Dragon, on behalf of the Corfe Castle Charities, shared that discussions are ongoing to determine the building's ownership. While it was built with public

donations, ownership details remain unclear. Until resolved, decisions regarding its future are on hold. Updates will follow as progress is made.

Gods Acre – Memorial Garden / Scattering of Ashes area: A plan was discussed and approved which involves inviting students from a local horticultural College to submit design proposals and quotes for landscaping works, with a budget of up to £5,000 for the creation of a Memorial Garden / Scattering of Ashes area within the New Extension area of Gods Acre.

Once the designs are submitted, a selection process will ensue, which could see a design chosen resulting in implemented under the supervision of the student(s) responsible. Not only will this initiative provide practical experience for the students, but they will also be credited with the design upon completion. The collaboration aims to foster creativity, skill development, and community engagement. It's an excellent opportunity to support the growth of aspiring landscapers while enhancing our local environment.

Updates as and when available regarding the progress of this initiative will be communicated to the community.

The Parish Council are excited about the potential of this partnership and look forward to seeing the innovative designs that emerge from it.

The proposed fence is being installed the same way round as the original which it replaces. It is out of sight of the highway.

Application No: P/HOU/2024/01623 & P/LBC/2024/01624, Location: Old Dairy Cottage, Woolgarston Road, Corfe Castle, Wareham, BH20 5JD <u>Recommend</u> No objection - This application repairs and improves the Old Dairy and repairs the barn connecting Woogarston Farmhouse, the barn and the Old Dairy. It provides a proper structure for the roof to replace a pre-existing temporary arrangement. The structural engineering calculations have all been completed. The method of improvement including waterproofing is all detailed in the application. The work once completed should provide a habitable building linked to the Farmhouse.

Application No: P/HOU/2024/01744, Location 32 East Street Corfe Castle Wareham BH20 5EQ, <u>Recommend</u>. No objection.

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Church Knowle Parish Council - April Meeting

The Clerk is on leave for the April meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council but on the agenda for the meeting which took place in the Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 9th April 2024 at 6:30pm were the following items:

Vacancies on the Parish Council and Elections

Cllr Billa Ewards resigned from the council after many year of dedicated service. She brought an extensive local knowledge her wisdom and contribution will be missed. This leaves two vacancies on the council which has a full strength of nine.

Dorset Council Elections have officially notified us that only seven applications were received for the May 2nd elections and that candidates are duly deemed to be elected unopposed. The council going forward comprises: Derek Burt, Howard Fry, Ian Gilbert, Carl Grice, Hazel Parker, Will Slack and Jayne Wilson

Planning

Planning applications P/HOU/2024/01569 and P/LBC/2024/01570 for a new garage and alterations to the house at Whiteway Farm were considered. It was considered a request for an extension of time should be sought by the Parish Council, as there was conflicting dates for deadlines between paperwork and Council web site.

<u>Highways</u>

The problem of deer in the parish and on the road was discussed. Dorset Highways will be approached about the possibility of providing deer warning signs on the roads. Deer have become a massive problem in the parish and indeed in rural communities throughout the country. There are now some 2m roaming free causing 75,000 road accidents a year.

Furzebrook Phone Box

This was decommissioned by BT and adopted by the Parish Council over a year ago and is available for new role. Suggestions for a use for this box are sought. Pease contact the clerk and these will be put to the Parish Council to be considered.

Defibrillator at New Inn

This has been sent away for an upgrade and new battery and is now back in place and ready to go. In the event that it is needed it is very simply to operate and gives clear spoken instructions that are easy to follow by anyone.

Puffins - teetering on the brink

We've installed cameras to investigate why the puffin colony near Dancing Ledge is on the verge of extinction. In the early 1900s, these iconic birds were abundant along the Dorset coastline, but they have declined severely since. The colony in Purbeck is now tiny (three breeding pairs) and

isolated – the nearest being Alderney on the Channel Islands or the Isles of Scilly off the Cornish

Possible reasons for the decline are lack of food or predation of the chicks by rats, gulls or crows. We'll know more when the images from the cameras are studied after the nesting season.

Spring covid boosters. If you are eligible for the spring booster this year you should receive a letter from the NHS advising you to book in. Alternatively, you can book via the NHS App. The practice has no way of booking these appointments for you.

A polite reminder that the morning sit and wait clinic is for more urgent on the day medical problems. Please speak to reception to book an appointment if it is a more routine problem or query for the GP.

If it is a medication question this could be directed to the dispensary team, on 01929 480697 between 10.30 and 12.30 Monday to Friday, please do not call reception for these queries.

The reception team can book a telephone consultation with the Pharmacist, Tim that works closely with the clinical staff.

Please also remember that the dispensary requires 3 working days to dispense items and if you order over a weekend or late in the evening it will not be actioned until the next working day. We appreciate your patience and understanding in any delays where we have stock shortages that are out of our control.

We are trying to encourage the use of the NHS App to order repeat prescriptions for those able to, as this reduces the wait time to get though on the phone, especially for those that need to call in as they aren't able to order online. If you require help setting this up please let us know.

The summer term is now in full swing. Please forgive us for not writing for the past couple of months. We will now continue with our class


focus to share some of the learning and activities that are going on across the school.

Our **Upper Key Stage 2** class engaged with a great book, Varmints, by Helen Ward and Marc Craste. Using the book and film, the children, and class teacher, were taken on a

rollercoaster of emotions created by the authors. Using this, the children wrote some amazing diary extracts that shared the thoughts and feelings about the new creatures invading their land. Varmints tells the poignant tale of one small creature's struggle to preserve a world in danger of being lost forever and touches on themes including conservation, environment, citizenship, regeneration, philosophy and alienation.

In computing the children have been thoroughly excited by the use of our new microbits. Micro-bits are small codable



chipboards with a range of sensors and a programmable LED matrix. They worked hard to create a voting machine and then used their knowledge of variables to code the Micro-bits into a working pedometer. These little devices are a fantastic introduction into real world physical coding that some of the children will go on to use in their adult lives.

Prep time: 20 mins . Cook time : 45 mins. Total time: 1 hr 5 mins



Ingredients:

3oz(75g) margarine 8oz(225g)Self-raising flour 8oz(225g) Plain Flour 4 teaspoons of baking powder 3oz(75g) Raisins or sultanas 1 tablespoon of Marmalade (or golden syrup) 6 tablespoons Condensed Milk made up to 1/4 pint (150ml) with water 2 eggs , beaten . Fresh or dried


Method:

 Rub the margarine into the flour and add baking powder.

 Add the dried fruit and mix to a soft consistency with the marmalade (golden syrup), condensed milk and egg.

3. Spoon into greaced or lined 6"(15cm) cake tin and bake in a moderate oven (180c -190c)gas mark 4-5) for 45 mins

4. Cool on a wire rack



The Rev Anne Bond writes

May Day! What does that phrase make you think of? The universal appeal for help when disaster strikes? Mayday, Mayday, my ship is sinking?

Or does it conjure up sweet pictures of children dancing around a village Maypole? I remember being bound by multi-coloured streamers to the Maypole while my friends, having succeeded in disentangling themselves, had run off to the Candy Floss Lady leaving me bellowing with rage while Miss stood by laughing!

The end of April and the beginning of May is when at last the cold winds of winter give way to the balmy breezes of Spring and the approach of Summer. Our gardens are blooming with daffodils and narcissi, bluebells and lilac, tulips and cherry blossom, flowery scents tease our senses, and the birds' singing has gone into overdrive. We are so lucky to be living in a part of the world that has four seasons, each distinctly different, and each – generally speaking – a moderate version of itself. Although that couldn't be said of Spring this year when there was so much flooding. So many people's lives have been grievously damaged by nature gone ballistic. How can one possibly preach a loving creator God who lets this sort of thing happen? Which is very much the same sort of question one asks when a loved one becomes dangerously ill.

I have heard it said that there are two sorts of disasters: those that come about as the natural and inevitable consequences of the world we live in; and those that happen because of the behaviour of the dominant species at the time.

Examples of those in the first category might be the meteor that crashed into Planet Earth and wiped out the dinosaurs, or the shift in Planet Earth's orbit around the Sun that caused the disappearance of water and green savannah and forests where now only exist vast deserts.

Examples of the second category could perhaps be the various infectious pandemics that have swept through Planet Earth such as the medieval Black Death, the post-World War One influenza, and recently the more dangerous strains of Covid, all of which were probably brought about by some specific activity of humanity.

Jesus taught: 'Love God – and Love your Neighbour as much as you love yourself'. If we could all find it in ourselves to do that – to just put that instruction into action no matter what, starting with the tiny circumstances that govern our individual lives, and carried on into public life at all levels, worldwide – we would find ourselves well on the way to the establishment of the Kingdom of God on Earth where 'the dwelling of God is with men, and he will live with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away.' (Rev 21:3-4)



West Lynch Farm & Burbarrow Tenement


Burbarrow

In between Blashenwell and West Lynch Farm lay a small tenement called 'Burbarrow' which no longer exists. Originally a farm, it ended up becoming a garden.

'Burbarrow' belonged to the Abbess of Shaftesbury but was eventually sold to William Morton Pitt in 1794 and passed down, like Blashenwell, onto the Earl of Eldon in 1837. The cottage still stood in 1790 but nothing remains except the rubble of the farm labourer's cottage.




It was sometimes called 'Burberry' and a little drove or lane called 'Burberry Lane' coming from Corfe passed between the 'garden' and the cottage along what is now a hedgerow-cum-stream. The 1776 plan shows that by then this lane was no longer in use, but one can still see the little enclosure/garden on the RAF aerial photo of 1947 (above).

West Lynch


West Lynch was a small dairy farm of between 21-23 acres and was purchased in 1712 by the trustees of Mrs Dorothy Pickering's Charity at East Lulworth. She was a member of the Weld family and gave £600 to set up a charity for the relief of 12 old Protestant widows and spinsters. The charity sold the property in 1949 and put the money into a fund before it ceased operating in 2015.

The property lies to the north of fields containing ridges lying north to south which is an ancient ridge and furrow system caused by ploughing. An old deed of 1624 mentions a dwelling house and another older dwelling lying nearby. The current property still retains one of the original 17th century window frames. A '*common highway*' lay to the east called West Lynch Lane. This is now part of Footpath 51 which leads to The Common and walkers will be surprised to learn that it was ever a highway as it is remarkably narrow in places.

Burberry Farm (shown at BXXII, below) was Mr. Crombes land, and was eventually let with Blashenwell once the Eldon Estate had acquired the land.

<u>New Partnership Launched to Help Residents</u> who Fear Losing their Home

Dorset Council and national charities Shelter and Citizens

Advice have joined forces for the first time to prevent homelessness in the county.

The new partnership is supporting Dorset residents who are experiencing a range of housing issues by providing a free, confidential and non-judgemental one-stop-shop for anyone with Experts can assist with many areas of housing, such as giving legal and debt advice, help finding a new home due to eviction and in some circumstances facilitate financial assistance to enable residents to remain in their accommodation.

The Housing Advice Line is open to anyone who:

- has a mortgage
- rents privately
- has a social landlord or
- are landlords themselves.

The service is also open to lettings agents, so they can share information with landlords and their clients.

When people call the Housing Advice Line on 01305 221000, their enquiry will be triaged and passed on to the most relevant team or organisation to progress.

The collaboration was formed to make it easier for people to access help if they have concerns or worries about losing their home, by having only one point of contact to get help.

Every local authority has a statutory duty to provide advice to everyone who is experiencing housing issues. Our data from 2023 shows we:

- took approximately 8,000 calls on housing issues via our Housing phone line.
- answered more than 25,000 emails about housing related topics.
- managed around 350 referrals from professionals from both our internal and external partners.
- took more than 4,000 enquiries through our dedicated online portal a rise of 6% from 2022.

The Bottle Top Story - So Far ...!

Following an item on the local TV News 2 years ago, a member of the Environment Group started to collect plastic milk bottle tops to contribute to an intriguing recycling scheme. The tops were being converted into building bricks of a Lego-type design for use in housebuilding in earthquake areas, specifically Nepal. Walls made of the bricks would be less likely to collapse, and if they did, the bricks would be less damaging, and re-usable. The enterprise was located at High Mead Community Therapy Farm, Ferndown. Aquarius members took up the cudgel and have been collecting tops ever since. So dozens of bin-liners and assorted other bags full of bottle tops have been fed into the system since then.

Bricks are not the only potential product. Currently the enterprise, now rebranded as Circular 11, has an industrial base in Christchurch where garden tables, benches, and various other products are made by shredding the bottle tops, melting the result and moulding it in metal tubes of various dimensions. When cool, the 'planks' can be pushed out, cut and fashioned as needed, and the off-cuts and shavings go back into the process: there is no waste. At the moment the innovative bricks are proving too expensive to make, but Circular 11 is seeking ways to make them economically as soon as possible.

How can you help?

Collect your plastic bottle tops, wash them, and pass them to an Aquarius member or to me, and we will deliver them to High Mead Farm or Christchurch when we are going that way. You could deliver them yourself – we can give you directions – but please don't make a special journey. High Mead Farm has other interesting environmental and social things going on, there's a Farm Shop, you can get a cup of coffee, and there are toilets!

It is worth mentioning that you can recycle these bottle tops by putting them on the bottle for your roadside recycling bin. Recycled products from that scheme may be possible to recycle multiple times, whereas Circular 11's products are mostly likely to be once-only use, but the idea of the Lego-style bricks helping to improve Nepal's earthquake resilience continues to appeal!

There, in countries such as Uganda, Zimbabwe, Zambia, DR Congo, Malawi and Tanzania, there is so much gratitude for all these goods. TWAM always provide skills training in local communities to ensure they are put to good use and improve the local self-reliance.

This Christian charity has grown over the last 30 years and even more containers are sent each year, so there is always an ongoing need of new donations. Local Snorkelling

Nature enthusiasts are being urged to "go wet and wild" at South Dorset's best sites for snorkelling.



With warmer weather approaching, a list of snorkelling hot spots has been compiled by the marine and freshwater team of community group Planet Purbeck. They hope to encourage both local folk and tourists to discover the "amazing beauty" that lies beneath the surface of the sea.

Their list also gives an intriguing insight into the "breathtaking" creatures and plant life that may be

found by those who take the plunge. Planet Purbeck's Doug Skinner said: "Much of the attention about wildlife, conservation and ecology tends to be concentrated on the land, which sometimes means our coastlines and seas get a little lost and left behind, as it were.

"We want to engage people with the sea and the amazing things that are going on in it. "Despite all the problems connected with the sea, such as pollution and over-fishing, there is still a huge amount of beauty there to be enjoyed."

Here is Planet Purbeck's Go-Wet-And-Wild guide for this spring and summer...



** Man O'War Cove. A favourite. Spectacular reef and in suitable conditions you can swim around the headland and through Durdle Door. Breathtaking and unforgettable.

** North Beach, Swanage, below the Grand Hotel. Numerous reefs with huge shoals of young fish; sandeels; wrasse; flatfish; crabs. Very accessible and great on a clear day but the longshore drift can be powerful and make it challenging to follow the reefs out.

** Kimmeridge Bay. Glorious plant life and marine invertebrates including coralline seaweeds and snakelocks anemones.

** Worbarrow Bay. Two sites here – near the Tout promontory, though watch out for spear fishermen, and Pondfield, a small rocky cove with caves.

** Redend Point, Studland Bay. Pipefish, razor shells and several varieties of crab and fish amongst the headland rocks. Avoid weekends due to marine traffic.

****** Boscombe. The offshore artificial reef has disappointed surfers but has been colonised by flora and fauna.

** Stair Hole, west of Lulworth Cove. Impressive submarine environment. On a quiet day species such as dogfish and lobster may be seen. Also Mupe Bay, east of Lulworth Cove.

** Seacombe. A little known spot featuring great caves and kelp forest.

** Dancing Ledge. A kelp forest and dramatic submarine landscape.

** Ringstead. Beautiful during clear conditions though not the best for wildlife.

** Frenchman's Ledge, Osmington. Recommended by ecologists.

** Church Ope Cove, east Portland. Busy but interesting rocky coastline.

Despite its encouragement for snorkelling, Planet Purbeck stresses that individuals keen to have a go must make their own assessments of conditions at each site and be responsible for their own swimming skills.

Mr Skinner, who will be among the speakers at a Rewilding Our Seas event during Planet Purbeck's 2024 festival in September, said: "As in all aspects of life, safety is paramount."





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SECOND UNIQUE VICTORIAN LOCOMOTIVE TO BE RETURNED TO STEAM BY DEDICATED SWANAGE RAILWAY VOLUNTEERS

Dedicated Swanage Railway volunteers – who restored a unique Victorian steam locomotive so it could haul a passenger train for the first time in almost 80 years – are embarking on their next ambitious challenge to overhaul another Victorian locomotive.



The Swanage Railway Trust's 563 Locomotive Group is to overhaul 1899-built London and South Western Railway T9 class steam locomotive No. 30120 which was attacked by a German fighter near Wool, west of Wareham, during the Second World War.

The enterprising group returned

1893-built London and South Western Railway T3 class steam locomotive No. 563 to working order in October, 2023, after a six-year £650,000 project almost completely funded by donations from railway enthusiasts and the public.

On loan from the National Railway Museum's extensive National Collection, T9 No. 30120 arrived on the Swanage Railway – from the Bodmin and Wenford heritage railway in Cornwall - during 2017 but the unique Victorian steam locomotive has not steamed in the Isle of Purbeck since 2020 when it failed its boiler examination.

Built at the Nine Elms railway works in London during 1899, T9 No. 30120 spent its career after the Second World War hauling trains in Devon, Dorset, Hampshire and Surrey before being withdrawn by British Railways at Eastleigh in Hampshire during October, 1961.



Nicknamed 'greyhounds' for their turn of speed on the main line, the T9 class steam locomotives operated on the ten-mile Wareham to Swanage branch line from the 1920s through to the early 1960s – first on passenger trains from London and then later on freight trains to Corfe Castle and Swanage.

563 Locomotive Group chairman Nathan Au said: "It is exciting to be embarking on our second ambitious challenge because we see the overhaul of the T9 as the natural follow-on project to the T3 in providing the Swanage Railway with another affordable locomotive with an impeccable Southern pedigree.

"We are delighted to be able to support the National Railway Museum in its mission to ensure that selected steam locomotives from its National Collection are available for the public to enjoy in steam and hauling passenger trains," added Nathan who is a volunteer driver on the Swanage Railway.

The National Railway Museum's railway partnerships manager, Paddy McNulty, said: "Following the success of the T3 restoration, we are pleased to be working with the Swanage Railway Trust on its plans for the T9.

"We look forward to seeing progress towards the successful overhaul of the T9 and enjoying the splendid sight and sound of both locomotives in steam on the Swanage Railway in the future," he added.

Nathan Au explained: "The project to overhaul the T9 will start with an assessment of the locomotive to confirm what work is necessary, that the restoration work is viable and that there is the necessary financial support available before a commitment is made to the full overhaul.

"The hoped for overhaul of No. 30120 will be shared between the Flour Mill engineering works in the Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire, and the Swanage Railway's Herston engineering works in Swanage with the Flour Mill doing the boiler and tender and the Swanage Railway doing the chassis of the T9.

"The Flour Mill successfully returned the T9 to steam in 2010 so its skilled staff are already familiar with the locomotive while their involvement in No. 30120 builds on the successful relationship established with the restoration of the T3," added Nathan who is also a director of the Swanage Railway's train operating company.

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The Rambling Gardener

May is a beautiful month; the birds are nesting, on sunny days the butterflies are out looking for plants to lay their eggs on, and all the plants are coming out with fresh new leaves. This is a green month which is both restful and interesting as there are so many different green colours no two plants ever look the same and our countryside is so beautiful. I think that we are blessed to live in England. There is violence and trouble in places, but mostly people here can do what they would like to do, and we haven't suffered like many other countries.

Why do people go to war and refuse to talk? When I was young I listened to a talk about how conservation minded people like my father were making plans to green up the Sahara. They had the knowledge that dew is formed by the hot desert getting very cold at night and it is possible to use dew nets to gather the water to grow trees until the trees are mature enough to get their own water from the dew at nights. However, it seems that the different tribes would not talk to each other, then the second world war broke out, and the plans were never carried out. If the plans had gone ahead in the 1930s would it be slowing down the present climate change and giving humans and wild life a chance to acclimatise to the changing temperatures? Surely it would be better to spend money on plans like this than on weapons. Fighting always seems to cause more fighting. Is it all to do with money? How I wish we could just wave a wand and make everyone happy with what they have. Unfortunately we can't change the world, but we can be prudent and careful not to waste food or water and we can green our own gardens.

The ground is still a bit cold to sow seeds outside as I write, but by the time you read this it will be time to sow all the seeds you want, vegetables and flowers, some inside and some outside. We used to say that the rule for planting seeds is "one for the rook and one for the crow, one to rot and one to grow," but with the increase of slugs and snails plus the fact that there are often very few seeds in the packets nowadays it may be best to sow more carefully in boxes of sieved soil in a sheltered place. It is easiest to have your seed boxes in the house so as to keep a good eye on them without having to put on outside clothes, and you can get strong plants to put out after hardening off as soon as the weather improves.

May is a good time to sow summer and winter squash, leeks, tomatoes and winter cabbage inside. So long as the weather is good early carrots and beans can go directly outside, as can parsnips and radish which are good to plant together as the radish can mark the line of slow maturing parsnip and will be ready before the parsnips need the space. If you have not already done so then peas, and both the 2^{nd} early and the late main crop potatoes should go in . Do try something new, you can look for new plants or maybe become a member of the Heritage Seed Library at <u>www.gardenorganic.org.uk</u> which has a lot of unusual seeds. Also apple trees need to be pruned enough to let the sun get to the middle of the tree and to check that there is no disease.

Leaving piles of twigs, untidy corners, seldom mown grass and wild areas is great for the wildlife that we can all encourage, especially in towns where a pot on a windowsill can provide shelter or food for insects travelling between green spaces. Six common butterflies need nettles in sunny places for their caterpillars. The caterpillars weave a white web to protect them so you can see them, but when they have hatched do cut back nettles in May and then late July to provide fresh young leaves for a possible second family.

Enjoy the warmer weather and your plants, and I would love to see you at my NGS garden opening at the end of the month..

<u>Swanage Skatepark Community Project launches Crowdfunder to give</u> <u>skatepark fundraising a rolling start!</u>

Registered charity, Swanage Skatepark Community Project (SSCP) aims to raise £20k in community crowdfunding towards the cost of rebuilding Swanage Skatepark by 9th June to be awarded with £6k in match funding from Sport England.

Swanage Town Council removed a large portion of skate ramps in 2023 when they became unsafe, without the funds to replace them. These ramps are sorely missed, especially because they were most used by beginners to build their confidence. After resurfacing some of the skatepark area, Swanage Town Council committed £15,000 towards the cost of new equipment, however this is nowhere near enough to restore the skatepark to be the valuable community resource it once was. SSCP volunteers, led by Lorna Haines who has a long legacy of fundraising for the Skatepark, are working to secure local and national funding to raise £200,000 to replace and improve on the lost ramps. This campaign is important as it shows funders the local community of Swanage support the skatepark.

It was in 2003 that Lorna Haines ran her first London Marathon to raise money for Swanage Skatepark. Now, 20 years later, Lorna is due to run another marathon to raise money for the Skatepark; she will take part in the <u>North Dorset Village Marathon</u> and Relay on 5th May 2024.

Lorna Haines says:

'Rebuilding the skatepark to ensure we have a fun and accessible facility will lead to more positive outcomes for the young people of Swanage. Wheel based sports are known for creating a better sense of wellbeing and can attract people who wouldn't normally engage in mainstream sports. Happier and healthier young people create positive ripples that will be felt by the rest of our community too.'

The Swanage Skatepark Crowdfunder campaign has been generously supported by local businesses who have offered some great rewards in return for your donations. For example: by contributing £10 to the future of the skatepark you could get a voucher for a buy 1 get 1 free cream tea at Brook Tea Rooms or a donation of £100 could be rewarded with a sea kayak experience for two from Fore Adventure.

James Woodford from SSCP says

'When I was younger this was always a busy place, we had no idea it was only funded and provided by Lorna's efforts. Now the skatepark and the young

people of Swanage are suffering again, another setback for this generation who already lost so much due to Covid-19 lockdowns. This is not just about building a bigger skatepark; creating better physical infrastructure will give people of all ages an alternative social and physical outlet and bring more vitality to the town. We really need the community to get behind this. There have been loads of positive changes in the area recently, new businesses and improvements that make Purbeck a better place, let's not stop now.'

The Crowdfunder will be live from Monday 15th April and will close 9th June after the Skatepark Community Day, kindly funded by #Willdoes.
