



JUNE AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meeting was attended by two members of the public one of whom spoke about the management of the Youth Club which is under review. The parishioner, who works for the Youth Club, pledged her support for the current management provider; The Purbeck Youth and Community Foundation and requested the current staff be consulted moving forward. The Council has a responsibility to ensure that public funds are being spent appropriately and therefore has to periodically review providers of services. The review of the running of the Youth Club is at an evidence gathering stage and no decisions have been made by the Council.

Our new County Councillor, Cherry Brooks, had intended to attend the meeting but was unable due to commitments imposed on her by new boundaries and a larger ward. She will endeavour to attend the next meeting and has requested she receive a full report of the meeting.

District Councillor Nigel Dragon reported that he had attended the District Council AGM and that the Chair, Vice Chair and all members of Committees remained unchanged.

The Neighbourhood Plan for Lytchett went to referendum and an impressive turnout of 48.3% of the electorate voted 98% in favour of adopting the Plan. This demonstrates that the process of neighbourhood planning is favourable within communities and that the panel who composed the Lytchett plan must have taken great care to listen to the requirements of the community.

There are three rounds of forthcoming forums to discuss the review of The Purbeck Local Plan which sets out where new development, such as homes and infrastructure, will be provided across the district. Purbeck District Council have set up five spatial area forums and one district-wide infrastructure forum to provide a platform for anyone to raise matters important to themselves, bringing local knowledge and ideas to help PDC review the plan. Initially the forums required registration but are now open to all. Should you be interested in attending information can be found at www.dorsetforyou.gov.uk/purbeck-local-forums.

Andrew Eustace of the National Trust announced this could be his last meeting and introduced his successor Alison Warren. Andrew did not have a lengthy report. He advised there were no developments on the TRO (temporary traffic restriction order) and shuttle bus service from Norden. There has been a suggestion to Councillors from another party that the plan has actually been postponed which would be of great disappointment to the Council after the time and work that has been invested. The Council will seek clarification on the matter.

Work clearing the copse in the Halves is almost complete with just a couple of relics belonging to farmers remaining. The Council expressed their astonishment at the quantity of rubbish extracted and their thanks to the Trust for executing its removal so efficiently.

A Councillor pointed out that walking up at The Rings was hazardous due to numerous badger holes and suggested that the National Trust put measures in place to warn the public, Alison will endeavour to do so along with Jonathan Kershaw who has taken over from Phil Stuckey.

The Council were very grateful to hear the Trust have offered to finance the housing of their defibrillator unit in the Square, specific location yet to be decided. This will enable the unit they own (currently located within the NT office) to be placed outside in this busy location and be available at all times in the event of an emergency.

The Chair welcomed Alison and formally thanked Andrew for the support he has given the Council with the many issues that have arisen during his role in post and for the interface which the Council have had with the Trust.

Continuing the theme of defibrillators, ClIr Spicer-Short has announced that the third defibrillator in the village will be located outside the library. Guidance suggests a distance of 200 meters between units and the strategic placing of the resources the Council has available to them covers this. The Square will be kindly covered by the National Trust, The Library Unit covers the Village Hall, the ground which is used for recreation behind the school and village hall, the school and The Legion, whilst the unit which will be installed by the Community Heartbeat Trust in the Mead Road phone kiosk covers the large residential area surrounding it. I am also very pleased to report we now have a team of ten volunteer guardians so thanks you to all of you who have offered your time.

As you may have seen on the Parish Council Website and notice boards the CCCLT (Corfe Castle Community Land Trust) is now an official entity. The importance of having an up to date account of housing need within the Parish was discussed at the meeting and we would invite anyone who is in need of housing and who is not on the Parish Housing Needs Register to please request a form from either Cllr Michael Bond, Dragons Bakery, the Village Shop or the Clerk who can email you one. The Clerk will also be contacting some longstanding existing applicants to enquire if their need is still current.

Several highways issues are still outstanding; The Council has arranged an appointment with DCC Highways to discuss the proposals for yellow lines to

be introduced in Mead Road, the outcome of which will be reported at the next Council meeting in July. During the meeting the Council examined proposals for yellow lines to be introduced in East Street, just beyond Sandy Hill Lane going towards the Studland turning. The Council has accepted the proposals which will now be advertised for consultation by Dorset County Council. There have been several objections to the standard of finish of the new road surface relating to debris on the pavements, water leakage and the finishing of the new surface. The Council is still pursuing these issues with County.

The Council is aware that there is a national problem facing some rural residents presented by the conflict between listed building restrictions and economically insulating and heating a home. The Council are interested in finding out how prevalent this issue is in Corfe Castle and to what extent it has directly affected parishioners. Do you have any experience of restrictions being placed on plans which have impacted on your choices of insulation or windows? And have these in turn led to you being unable to heat your home economically? Or have your plans been turned down on material considerations due to listed building regulations. If so the Council would be very interested to hear from you. Please contact the Clerk if you have had any relevant experiences.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to proposals for the following: A loft conversion including rear dormers at 136 East Street, Corfe Castle, alterations and conversion of an existing garage into a bedroom/ study or studio bathroom at Honeysuckle Cottage, 22 West Street, Kingston and the demolition of an existing garage to be replaced with a workshop at Pounts Mead, Sandy Hill Lane, Woolgarston, Corfe Castle.

NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

Council met in a corner of the large hall at Furzebrook village hall and had four parishioners in addition to six councillors in attendance. The position of Parish Council Chairman having still not been filled, Members invited the past- Council Chairman to act as the chairman of the meeting for the evening. He accepted and the June "mini"-meeting then went ahead.

Public discussion centred around Purbeck DC's proposals to reduce the size and alter the boundaries of the East Creech Conservation Area and Church Knowle's critique of these proposals and its own plans. There's a meeting of PDC on 11th July to discuss the matter and decide whether or not to accept the district council's conservation officers' recommendation. The Parishioners heard that CKPC will be presenting its critique at that meeting as will, no doubt, members of the populace of East Creech. There was general discussion about how and by whom the Parish Council's case will be presented and it was the view that as many East Creech residents as possible attend and make their opinions loud and clear to the district council. The CKPC working party on the East Creech conservation area would be reconvened to work out the plan of action in conjunction with residents from East Creech.

After about three quarters of an hour the main business began and, unfortunately, the Parishioners then left. Our District and new County Councillors had already sent their apologies for non-attendance so there were empty seats again in the "public gallery".

The vacancies relating to the Parish Council Chairman, Vice-chairman and Councillor were quickly discussed and put off till the July meeting so Members could think further about the Parish Council's dilemma.

One of the Councillors expressed an interest in a planning matter as a neighbour and this was noted. May's minutes were then agreed to as being a faithful record of that meeting and "Matters Arising" from them discussed, notably the BT Openreach broadband box outside Knowle Cottage. The Clerk reported on lengthy discussions he had had with Dorset Superfast Broadband in which he had tried to convince their representative of the Council's view that the box was in a most unsatisfactory position and should be moved. Regrettably the DSB representative was not prepared to accept the invitation from the Parish Council to attend our parish council meeting to explain the reasoning behind the siting of the box and what could be done to alleviate the problem. A site meeting with "a few people" might be

possible according to Dorset Broadband but the likelihood of the box being moved was negligible because some people in Church Knowle had already been connected to it. If the box was taken out there would be no broadband according to Dorset Broadband even though some people have already been connected to VoiP (Parenco's) microwave super high speed system. Members noted the Clerk's report with disappointment and incredulity at DB's attitude. The meeting decided to arrange a "site meeting with a few people", including Dorset Broadband and hopefully including the resident outwith whose house the box sits in full and wonderful view.

Next came planning matters. Members examined applications relating to 2 Cotness Cottages (App No 6/2017/0266 & 0267) and West Bucknowle Lodge (App No 6/2017/0268) and decided they had no objections to the developments. One councillor had declared an interest only as a neighbour in close proximity to West Bucknowle Lodge before the matter was discussed. Past planning matters were noted.

The accounts were presented and invoices paid, including one for the enormous amount of \pounds 1.00p. The \pounds 1.00p cheque written was payment for the 'phone box being adopted at the Grange Road end of East Creech; the one in the middle of East Creech being adopted later when PDC removes its objections to BT.

Members had an update on the Church Knowle cardiac defibrillator and one Councillor mentioned that some local residents had asked about the possibility of having a "defib" installed in the newly adopted 'phone box.

In other matters, the subject of the lack of a Parish Council Chairman came up again and if a "rolling Chairman" – i.e. monthly change – was to be the norm, it would probably be necessary to alter the style of the minutes so that all Members were aware of their "things to do" during the next month and the incoming "rolling Chairman" would be able to "hit the ground running" on election each month. The Clerk reminded Members that, from his research, there appeared to be no legal requirement for an annually elected chairman and advised he would amend the style and delivery of the draft minutes from the June meeting onwards.

Also in other matters, it was reported that the landlord of the New Inn had offered to organise tidying up of the village in the area around the

pub and contribute towards the replacement of fencing along the raised pavement by the village post. Members also expressed their thanks at his kind offer to join a working party to tidy up Church Knowle village and keep it in line for Best Kept Dorset Village. With this in view, Members then heard from the meeting chairman about village, hamlet and Parish litter clearance projects. The Purbeck Litter Group wish to erect temporary signs asking people to "Please Keep Purbeck Litter-free" and the Council decided that they would support such signage in the Parish

The Clerk advised Members that he had received a request from the local police asking if the community PC could attend one of CKPC's meetings. Whilst July had originally been suggested by the Clerk, Members decided that the September meeting would probably be better as there was likely to be more time available.

And that was that. The meeting closed at 9.20pm and we all went home. Next meeting will be on 11th July at Church Knowle village hall beginning at 7:30pm. Please come, it's great for local democracy and you can actually take part as well as watching. You can't do that at Westminster without getting arrested.

National Trust rangers are asking the public to respect the countryside after an abandoned camp fire came within minutes of sparking a major blaze in Studland Heath national nature reserve.

National Trust Rangers on duty at Studland Heath spotted smoke coming from a remote spot near Little Sea and discovered the remains of a camp fire which had spread to nearby heather and gorse.

Camp fires are not allowed in the national nature reserve and visitors who want to have a barbeque are asked to use designated areas on the beach.

Although it was quickly brought under control and damage was confined to a few square metres, the blaze was on the point of taking hold.

Had it done so it would quickly have spread, with potentially disastrous consequences for wildlife and a much loved landscape.

"It is only thanks to sheer luck and the vigilance of our rangers that this did not become a major incident which could have destroyed 30 or 40 hectares of heathland," said Lead Ranger Paul Bradley.

"Studland Heath is particularly vulnerable at this time of year as the resident reptiles are active and there are ground nesting birds about."

"Our heathland is precious and can take decades to recover from a major fire," Paul added.

"Please be responsible, observe the regulations designed to protect the countryside and if you spot smoke dial 999 straight away."

The incident took place within half a mile of an area which is still recovering from the last major heath fire in Studland four years ago and could have threatened cattle grazing nearby as part of our heathland conservation programme.



Sometimes fate seems to take a hand – at least it did for Alison Warren who has taken over as the National Trust's Operations Manager for Corfe Castle.

Alison and her partner had been visiting Purbeck for years while thinking about an eventual move to Dorset – until her chance came out of the blue.

"We were staying at Acton and we had walked into Corfe," said Alison.

"It was a beautiful sunny day and I said to my other half 'I'd love to work here'."

"That evening I just popped onto the computer, had a look for National Trust jobs and there it was."

'It' was a job ad to provide cover for previous Operations Manager Andrew Eustace, who is on a two year secondment to the Trust's South West regional office.

The only problem was that the deadline was that same night. Undeterred, she applied and ultimately landed the job.

"It all felt like it slotted into place," said Alison.

"I couldn't believe it at first - it was kind of like a dream come true."

Alison was formerly the admissions manager for Windsor Castle and is looking forward to bringing the experience gained in looking after 1 million visitors a year to bear in her new role.

"I am very much looking forward to working with the local community to make sure we provide a warm, year round welcome to visitors in a way that works for us all," she said.

"What is happening at Corfe is great already and there is a fantastic

opportunity to deliver more."

A pay and display parking machine has been installed at Spyway car park in Langton Matravers to help fund our work in Purbeck, but residents and National Trust members will continue to enjoy free parking.

Charges start at £1 for two hours in the case of a private car, rising to a maximum £14 for a minibus or large vehicle parking for eight hours.



Aquarius Corfe Castle Women in Touch

Mo Andrews and Jean Gibb stepped into the breach when our planned speaker had to cancel – how well they did it and what an inspiration they are! Mo described how she started the Purbeck Good Neighbour Scheme 4 years ago, having become aware of the many practical problems faced by elderly people through her work with Dorset POPP (Partnership for Older People Programme). Most of these issues are actually quick and easy to fix but not if you are incapacitated in some way. For instance, a broken light bulb can make a kitchen unuseable after dark if you are unable to replace it yourself or afford the call out charge. A local telephone call to the GNS reaches a co-ordinator who will respond within 48 hours and then one of the 137 volunteers will carry out a one-off task for a small donation.

It soon became apparent that a growing number of individuals and couples are living with dementia with little or no support and at this point Jean took over. Jean knows what this means, having cared for her husband through 10 years of dementia and she went into action. On discovering the existence of Admiral dementia nurses, she began fund raising and is now able to provide one for Purbeck. With £50,000 raised in under 12 months and matched funding from Dementia UK and Dorset Healthcare, an appointment has just been made for a 3 year post.

The Admiral name remembers a dementia sufferer nicknamed Admiral Joe and the service aims to provide support and care from diagnosis to the end of life. Other varied groups are being started to offer further support, such as singing and art groups.

A short film emphasised the importance of awareness throughout society and encouraged us to become Dementia Friends and wear the little blue and yellow forget-me-not badge. Free training sessions are available in the libraries of Wareham and Swanage.

We are very grateful to both Jean and Mo for giving us their time and for their tireless hard work in an area of life which surely touches us all.



Dear audience members,

It is with pleasure and pride that I present to you the programme and musicians of this year's 2017 Festival edition.

Each year, the beauty of Purbeck and the energy and enthusiasm of you, our audience, inspire me to come up with

new repertoire and bring you musicians that you may not have heard perform live before.

I am incredibly excited to be bringing for the first time to Purbeck some of the most outstanding musicians from around the world that I know, as well as welcoming back two firm Purbeck favourites, Lara St. John and Katalin Kokas. Kati will bring her husband Barnabás Kelemen whose virtuosity and musical imagination will inspire all who hear him and I am personally very proud and happy to invite my most respected colleague, the cellist Adrian Brendel.

Three of the greatest Norwegian musicians, Christian Ihle Hadland, Lars Anders Tomter and Per Arne Glorvigen will be with us and Per Arne will perform several of his highly original and effective compositions as well as performing a theatrical masterpiece by Kagel and of course the Argentinian Tango composer Astor Piazzolla. Indeed, the dance element in music inspired one of the strands for the programme of the festival, ranging from the dances of Bach (book early for Lara St. John and the Berlin Philharmonic's phenomenal first harpist Marie-Pierre Langlamet's Bach recital in Worth Matravers!), through Haydn, Dvorak, Debussy, Hans Krasa and Piazzolla to a modern day wild and very groovy Tango.

And speaking of wild dances, Saturday evening will be a one off chance to witness the rarely performed masterpiece for string quartet, harp and narrator (narrated by Robert Rinder of 'Judge Rinder' and Strictly come Dancing stardom!) by the French composer André Caplet. The piece is based on a poem by Edgar Allen Poe and is a musical and theatrical tour de force. As always, the spoken word is included with music in different ways and this year we also have the charismatic mathematician (yes they do exist) and music lover Marcus du Sautoy giving a fascinating lecture on the 'Song of Symmetry' in Bach's Goldberg variations before Christian Ihle Hadland performs the variations on the piano.

There will also be a lecture on Saturday at 2pm by Jason Price, the director of Tarisio and expert in stringed instruments, who will talk about the history

and details of several of the instruments that are played by the string players. Our instruments have stories to tell (some dating back to the 16th century) and this will be an unmissable extra event.

Another programmatic strand running through the festival is the chamber music of Antonín Dvořák. I have always adored his music and I believe he is one of the only composers that one never tires of with his endlessly inventive and natural melodies. Brahms said melody runs through Dvořák like water. I'm sure after hearing the String Sextet, Bagatelles and beloved Piano Quintet op. 81 you will all agree!

The Bishop of Salisbury writes:

(This month we are printing the Bishop of Salisbury's letter from the latest 'Grapevine' - the diocesan newsletter. The Bishop writes about our Christian faith and current events as at the middle of June. Ian)



The Rt Revd Nicholas Holtam, Bishop of Salisbury

Faith in an Age of Uncertainty is the theme of the clergy conference in July. The title was chosen long ago but it certainly fits the moment. Recent acts of terrorism in Manchester and London; the Grenfell Tower fire; the USA reneging on the international agreement made in Paris in response to climate change; as well as all the political uncertainties after the election to do with Brexit, a faltering economy, commitment

to austerity, and an unwillingness to fund public sector services; do indeed make for very uncertain and difficult times.

Politicians and journalists tell us we don't like uncertainty. That was why the Prime Minister wanted to give us strong and stable leadership. For ourselves, we try to make smart choices to manage the uncertainties of life as best we can. We try to live healthy lives, get a good education and smooth out the ups and downs through financial planning for ourselves and families as well as for our communities, but there is always uncertainty.

Religious faith helps us navigate the changes and chances of this life, to be creative, good and loving amidst whatever the difficulties. Just think about the way people responded to the terrorism in Manchester and London, or the fire in Kensington. We are made for goodness and goodness is stronger than evil, love is stronger than hate. In the end, the way of truth and love wins every time.

Christianity has always been one generation from extinction but that is a good reason for us to be confident. It is an enduring faith. Indeed, perhaps having to work hard for what matters is what draws out the best from us.

What Jesus teaches is that if we only seek to look after ourselves we will be sunk. Of this I am certain: walk the way of the Cross, love one another, give generously, be thankful, seek the way of truth and peace and we will have life in all its fullness.

The 5th June is a day that I will never forget. It was 6.30am and I was suddenly woken up by my wife, who was clearly in a very distressed state. I thought that she was having a very bad dream, and I asked her, "Are you awake?" I quickly realised that what was happening was that Chris was experiencing the consequences of a stroke. About ten years ago, while we were on holiday, Chris had experienced a mini stroke and in May this year she had had two mini strokes within half an hour, but within minutes, she seemed to have fully recovered, even though, on both occasions, she needed to spend one night in hospital. But clearly this was different. Stupidly I asked her whether I should phone for an ambulance, but then ignored her response.

Very quickly the ambulance crew arrived, confirmed my fears, and then faced the challenge of getting her down a very steep and narrow staircase. By 8.00 am we were both in Poole hospital. Within a few hours, they had confirmed that there was a blood clot on the brain, and told me that they wanted to transfer her to Southampton General Hospital who have a procedure to enter the body by the groin and then, incredibly, make their way up to the brain and remove the offending clot.

The move took place, and I followed, with almost no idea of where the hospital, and therefore my wife, was to be found. However, I finally got there, but the person I spoke to assured me that a Mrs Christine Walton was in the hospital but wasn't in the Ward to which I had been sent. I was told to go into the Visitors Waiting Room and they would let me know when they had located her. They then added that she might very well be undergoing the procedure to remove the blood clot, but, not to worry, they would let me know.

After waiting for nearly two hours and hearing nothing from anybody, my level of anxiety was greater than any measure of patience. I tried the Ward yet again, who assured me that my wife was still not with them, but gave me the phone number of another Ward where she might be found. It was the wrong phone number but they, in turn, phoned the correct number for me, and I was told that Chris had been with them for ten minutes and they were wondering where I was. The bad news was that they had tried the procedure but were unable to get beyond the neck area, and suggested that Chris needed to be returned to Poole but, by then, Poole Hospital did not have a place to offer her, and so she stayed in Southampton Hospital that night. Because of the distance, the traffic, and the weather that evening, it took me two hours to return to Corfe Castle, and then I entered Chapel Cottage that seemed totally empty and no longer my home.

The following morning, I phoned the hospital to find out how Chris was and when I could visit her. I was told that there was no point because they were seeking to arrange to transfer her, and they would let me know when the arrangements had been made. It was 4.15 pm before I received the phone call to tell me that Poole still couldn't receive her, and that she would therefore be staying yet another night. By 4.30 I was in the car heading for Southampton and needing to find, yet again, this elusive hospital. Part of the visit was taken by being told by the senior person caring for Chris, that the situation could be fatal, and had she and I ever talked about the question of resuscitation? We hadn't, and now was not the time to start.

The latest news is that Chris was transferred on the Wednesday and is still in Poole Hospital. Her left arm and leg won't work at the moment, and both her sight and her speech are severely impaired. However, the work of the physiotherapists began in earnest today, and she has just stopped being "Nil by Mouth".

In order that you might fully understand the situation, I should add that Chris was always in charge of the kitchen, and my culinary skills consisted of cereals for breakfast, and beans on toast for any other meal. In one week, everything has had to change, including cooking a hot meal every day, and engaging in carrying out a shopping expedition to ensure that I had all that I wanted, for the coming week.

The temptation is to join the "Woe is me!" brigade, but then you put on the television and you see pictures of a tower block of flats, behaving as if it is part of the props of some scary Hollywood film, but it isn't make believe. It is for real. Many people have lost their lives. Families have lost loved ones. Many others have lost every possession they ever had. And what of those who were engaged in the rescue operation? They won't remember the 5th June. For them, the 14th June will stay with them for the rest of their lives.

What has happened to Chris is a terrible experience, and the challenges that she is facing and will have to face in the future are, perhaps, the biggest challenges

that she has ever had to face. And because of what has happened to Chris, I, too, have already started a totally new chapter in my life. It is possible that Chris will never be able to return to Chapel Cottage, and that has consequences for me and my ministry. But, compared with so many others, we are so fortunate.

We have both reached the age of 78 and have just celebrated 56 years of married life that has been full of challenges, but also of so much enjoyment and a sense of fulfilment. We have three daughters who have been brilliant particularly in the past week, and have shown how much they love us by their tears and their practical support.

We have a hymn that we sometimes sing in the Chapel that seems so appropriate at such a time as this.

"I do not know what lies ahead, the way I cannot see; yet one stands near to be my guide, He'll show the way to me." And then comes the chorus.

"I know who holds the future, and He'll guide me with His hand; with God things don't just happen, everything by Him is planned.

So as I face tomorrow, with its problems large and small, I'll trust the God of miracles, give to Him my all."

Whatever challenges you are facing, may you know His nearness at all times.




