

CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

JUNE AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Before the monthly report I have a request. Can you spare an hour of your time? On the first Monday of the month throughout the months of July, August and September volunteers will be meeting in the village Square at 6pm to litter pick the area. The gradual impact is making a real difference and the team would greatly welcome your help. All ages are welcome and equipment is provided, you may wish to bring some gloves.

The June meeting was chaired by the newly appointed Vice Chair Cllr Steve Clarke. Cllr Dragon reported that he had received several reports relating to the removal of a kissing gate at the land near the Pound. No one had any further information and it is thought the land owner needs be consulted. He also reported that several Temporary Event Notice applications had been received for events at Purbeck Valley Farm, the timings of which contradicted assurances received from Purbeck District Council regarding restricting the hours at which events could be held. He clarified that environmental health were being consulted and were mediating with the applicants.

James Gould from The National Trust addressed concerns raised at previous meetings. They assured the Council they are conscious of rubbish and carry out litter picks around the Square following busy periods. Whilst they acknowledge they do attract large numbers of visitors to the village they are not responsible for litter but are very happy to engage with the Parish Council to seek a way forward to improve the problem. The Parish Council have recently purchased new litter bins to replace the old ones throughout the village and hope these will be in place in time for the summer holidays.

James advised that whilst traffic moving through the village Square may have been delayed during re-enactment events in the Square at no point was access prevented. The Trust are liaising directly with parishioners immediately effected by access issues and will notify them of future events. The issue of parishioners receiving no warning of musket fire was also raised. James apologised for this and advised it is something that will not be missed in the future.

The implementation of Norden Park and Ride shuttle services is still in discussion and it was agreed the Parish Council and The National Trust will re-open discussion about alternative points at which passengers may be dropped off. James advised a high volume of volunteers would be needed to run the service. The Parish Council are very determined to see the project realised.

The Council are still in the process of looking at replacements for the two items of gym apparatus in the park. They are looking for a galvanised product that should not rust so quickly.

The Council discussed the prospect of adopting the toilets in West Street. As the provision of toilets is not a statutory function the new Unitary Council the Council have researched the running costs and hope an

agreement may be reached with the District Council in which the residents parking may also be transferred to the Parish Council. This would provide some revenue to contribute to the running cost. The Parish Council on principle feel this could be a way forward but have no guarantee from PDC that they would be able to offer the car park and they are looking at other possible ways to support the provision, perhaps with assistance from local businesses or organisations.

There were several outstanding matters from the Annual Parish Meeting in April; the council felt the cows that were problematic on the common had now settled down and it was noted that the grazier does keep the area in good order. The Council considered whether it would be beneficial to purchase a Speed Indicator Device for the village. They felt that at present as Corfe is one of ten areas in Dorset who receive a SID on a 12 week rota they would utilise this service for now. Should this service stop the Council will look into purchasing a unit, perhaps in conjunction with another Parish. The need to clean the dirty road signs in the village was acknowledged and the Parish Council resolved to liaise with other parishes to see if a joined up approach could be taken to this.

It is proposed that next years Annual Parish Meeting will be a meeting for Parishioners. The Council wish to celebrate all of the excellent organisations and societies that we have in the Parish and the work that they do. Groups will be invited to speak and the format will be less formal. Last month I reported on several highways matters. We have yet to hear from the Highways Improvement team with a report on how the junction at Station Road could be improved. The Council have agreed to request dropped kerbs some way down Station Road which they hope may encourage pedestrians to cross to use the crossing. They have also put in a request to install bollards in Froggy Lane at the entrance to the West Street car park. The cars parking there prove a real hazard as pedestrians have nowhere to go to avoid oncoming traffic. This will hopefully be installed soon.

There were many reports of petty thefts in the area. The Council are aware that this is an increasing problem and they will be monitoring the areas where the thefts are repetitive. They would also request all parishioners please look out for anything suspicious and if you witness anything report it to the police who are aware of the thefts.

The Council addressed several financial matters. They agreed unanimously to support a grant application from the Community Library which will aid them with their store room project. They have pledged a sum to the Gardening Club who have done a lot of work to deliver a fantastic planting scheme to improve the aesthetic of the area around the West Street Toilets. They have also approved the rejuvenation of the bus shelter at Halves Cottages.

The Parish Council considers planning applications within the parish each month. They had no objection to proposals for the following: A loft conversion, to include the insertion of 4 roof lights, a double dormer window with two Juliet balconies on the rear elevation and a replacement garage and porch at 117 East Street, Corfe Castle. To erect a barn at Land


off New Line, Norden and to take down existing chimney and rebuild, to remove tiles at abutment to neighbours gable wall and fit lead soakers, to replace tiles and provide lead flashing, to hack off and re render gable end at Wissett Cottage, 53 East Street, Corfe Castle.

The August meeting will be cancelled this year however the Council will still be working so please do feel free to get in touch if you have any concerns or queries. These can be addressed by the full Council at the September meeting.



NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

One Parishioner and five Parish Councillors attended the Parish Council's June meeting in a corner of the main hall at Furzebrook and a Chairman of the Meeting was duly elected. This was supposed to be a "mini-meeting" where Planning & Finance would have been the primary concerns. However, because much of the matters on last month's agenda were deferred till June this was more of a non-mini-meeting.

"Public Discussion" was centred around concerns the attending Parishioner had about a serious road accident which recently occurred along the Furzebrook Road between a car and a tractor leaving the car driver seriously injured. There was discussion about where the blame for the accident lay and the manner in which both vehicles may have been driven, speed limits in Furzebrook Road and signage warning of double bends, etc., Members felt that without accident investigator reports available such discussion on blame for the accident was somewhat irrelevant given that no-one at the meeting had witnessed either the actions of either driver leading up to the accident, or the accident itself. However, the Chairman of the Meeting reminded all that CKPC has been trying to get at least a 50mph (preferably 40mph) speed limit along the road for many years but has been frequently told by Dorset County Council that it's "on the list but there's little in the budget". Discussion then went on to how such a speed limit could be enforced and the general feeling was that it was unlikely Dorset Constabulary would enforce it; Grange road being a case in point where the police had previously said that any speed limit set on that "Le Mans-style speed trials stretch of road" would be difficult to enforce. It was suggested that the Parishioner wrote directly to DCC to express her concerns and CKPC would continue to seek a speed limit. Members felt that pressure should be put on Dorset CC to improve warning signage along Furzebrook Road to inform those driving along it about the serious hazards due to bends etc., this being especially the case because of the number of summer visitors who are not conversant with the hazards of Purbeck roads. The Chairman reminded the Meeting that if Purbeck were to be in a national park (eg the proposed Jurassic Coast NP) we might be able to get a 40mph speed limit throughout our area. It was suggested that CKPC contact the local highways officer but without a road accident report being available discussions could prove futile. "Public Discussion" ended with a final comment from one of the Members to the effect that if people come into the countryside they must take into account the road conditions and the need to work with farming and contractors using those roads.

No-one declared an interest and the meeting then went on to discuss whether or not to have a Parish Council Chairman for the year. They decided to continue in the same vein as before where the Chairman is elected on a rotating monthly basis. As the Chair was to be elected at the start of each meeting Councillors felt that the need for a formal Vice- Chairman on an annual basis was a bit superfluous. Members also decided to postpone discussion of appointing Members to special areas of interest for the year until the next meeting but in the meantime to carry on with the existing responsibilities until then. BUT, that left out the "Planning Lead" because Cllr Bugler had resigned at the previous meeting; it's just as well the Council had no planning applications to discuss this month.

Because only one of the Members present at this meeting was present at the May meeting, the May Minutes couldn't be approved, so this item was adjourned till July. Members then went on to discuss items that had been discussed at May's meeting according to the Minutes which couldn't be approved but they were not officially "Matters Arising". But discussion continued all the same. The Vicar of Dibley would be at home here.

The Rachel's Plantation gravel drive saga came up again and it was decided to formally contact Purbeck District Council and Dorset Highways about the possibility of an unauthorised vehicular access being made onto the highway from the property and also the possibility of un unauthorised development at the site.

Potholes in the roads through the Parish came up again and the Clerk told the Meeting that reports had been made to County whose "Helpline/Telephone Operators" had advised him of the current triaging system employed to assess risk and, hence, expected waiting time for fixing; in the meantime the holes will get bigger and perhaps then become Cat 1 holes!

There were no new planning applications on which to comment and the Meeting quickly went on to hear a report about the progress of discussions with the local Farming & Wildlife Advisory Group with regard to the CKPC Corfe River environmental project and how CKPC and the other two parishes (Arne & Steeple) might be able to ensure the grant monies from Imerys via the Environment Agency come to those areas rather than being spent on projects by Dorset Wildlife Trust outwith Church Knowle, Steeple and Arne. The meeting decided to invite Imerys' management to an extraordinary meeting of the Parish Council before the July meeting to see what could be done.

The heath fire on Creech heath was again discussed and Councillors heard that the will be a meeting to discuss "the way ahead" between CKPC and Swanage Railway. It's hoped that a report will be available for publication in next month's CVN. Watch this space, as they say. In the meantime, our dear reader will be pleased to hear that fire breaks have now been constructed on one side of the railway.

Apart from a few bits and pieces, including a report of a ditch along Furzebrook Road having become blocked due to vegetation and likely to be the source of flooding when the next rains come, that was that for June. Next meeting will be at Church Knowle village hall on 10th July beginning at 7:30pm and going on until dear knows when.



Surgery News

"Namaste", Healthcare Programme to Nepal - April 2018

Purbeck District Nurse Hazel Dent has just returned from a Healthcare Programme to Nepal. Nepal is one of several poor developing countries in the world that faces significant challenges in providing universal health coverage and equitable medical care. It is still struggling with poor access to health care facilities in rural areas and lack of funding for the poor, who cannot afford medication.

This Healthcare Programme was supported by Corfe Castle Surgery who donated Urine Testing Strips. These testing strips were used to screen and detect a wide range of conditions such as diabetes and liver problems. They were an essential part of the screening programme.

Hazel's voluntary work within this programme involved undertaking Health Assessment Clinics in the community, where the urine testing strips were used. Hazel, alongside a team of nurses screened a total of 300 people and were able to identify healthcare needs within these Nepalese communities. Following the clinics, Hazel and the team then carried out Health Promotion/Education Sessions to 140 people including health related skills for the community. This included basic first aid to survivors of human trafficking. Hazel would like to thank Corfe Castle Surgery, who through their kind donation have helped in making a difference to the healthcare needs of communities in Nepal.



Newly Recommended Marine Conservation Zones

On 8th June, World Ocean's Day, Government launched a consultation asking the public for their views about protecting 41 new Marine Conservation Zones (MCZs) in English waters – areas at sea where wildlife is protected from damaging activities. In Dorset, six sites were recommended for possible designation - Portland Deep, Purbeck Coast, West of Wight Barfleur, Albert Field, Studland Bay and Southbourne Rough.

Why Have These Sites Been Recommended?

This round of designation is about completing the network of MPAs around England. The Dorset contribution includes sites recommended back in 2013, but not yet designated; additional sites needed to cover seabed habitats that were under-represented, and sites recommended for highly mobile species (nesting black bream).

This is fantastic news for the marine environment! We want to ensure that more species and habitats are protected and represented throughout the English network of MCZs. Up until now there have been gaps in this network for particular sediment types. The six Dorset recommended sites contribute to filling these gaps and include species and habitats that deserve increased protection from the potential of damaging activities.

Benefits of MCZs

Protected sites not only recover or maintain the features for which they are designated but also benefit us! If managed correctly, these sites can be the source of some wonderful and enriching experiences; diving, snorkelling and other recreational sports. Research has shown these activities to have positive benefits on health and wellbeing. In addition, the revenue from these activities and tourism helps to enhance the local economy. However, the benefits are not only recreational; Defra state that MCZs are expected to bring significant benefits to marine biodiversity and productivity, environmental resilience, research and education and climate regulation.

The Benefice of the Corfe Valley on the Isle of Purbeck is within the Church of England, the Diocese of Salisbury and the Deanery of Purbeck. The liturgy is from the Book of Common Prayer (BCP) and Common Worship (CW). The geographic area covered by the valley Church includes the villages of:-

Corfe Castle, Church Knowle, Kimmeridge, Steeple (with Tyneham), the small communities of Bradle, Bucknowle, Bushey, Norden, Rempstone, Woolgarston and the

Islands in Poole Harbour St. Michaels (except Browsea). Steeple

The Reverend Ian Jackson writes

Recently, I came across something in a novel by Anthony Trollope. He was writing in the nineteenth century and he mentioned the new young vicar who was not proving very popular. One of the main reasons he was disapproved of was because he had introduced a second service on a Sunday, an afternoon service! What we regard as well established practices are often not all that longstanding. We are also reminded that there has always been development and change, and changes do not always meet universal acceptance; this is particularly so in church life.

Recently, changes have taken place in the arrangements for ministry in our local parishes. There are less full-time clergy than there were. Last Summer Gaynor Burrett moved to Wales from Kingston, Langton and Worth parishes. For some time it had been the intention that the next priest for those parishes would be 'House for Duty' - sort of part time. It was thought the best arrangement for our two groups of parishes would be for us to be one benefice with the 2 priests working together and sharing responsibilities. After discussion at each of the 7 PCCs (the 3 mentioned above and the 4 of the then Corfe Castle Benefice) this was agreed. After a period of open public consultation this change came into being. So on April 1st the 2 existing groups of parishes which had since the 1970's been the St. Aldhelm Group (a relatively informal way of working together) became the St. Aldhelm's Benefice.

At the beginning of April we were pleased that the Bishop appointed the Revd. James Mercer as the new Associate Minister for the benefice. James is at present the vicar of All Saints, Harrow Weald. He will move to Langton Rectory in September and be licensed on Monday October 15th at 7.30p.m. James and I will be working together along with all of us in our congregations. We will have our particular responsibilities but will also be involved throughout the benefice, as appropriate.

I have tried to explain these changes in reasonably straightforward terms but inevitably have had to use some technical terms. So, this is a time of change and it actually brings new possibilities. We can look forward to getting to know each other more across our 7 parishes and we ask God's blessing as we continue to serve him here in ways that are appropriate to the present day.



SPRING HARVEST 2018.

One of the delights of Spring Harvest is the chance it gives to observe the human zoo. Many of the children use scooters to move around. Very disconcerting were the little children, some hardly more than knee-high, whizzing about on the scooters well below eye line at great speed and threading through adult legs. Actually the only scooter collision I saw was between 2 teenagers who managed to collide head-on. They apologised profusely, made sure the other was OK, apologised again, and went on their ways. More generally teenagers seemed to move around in little single-sex ("single-gender"?) flocks of about half a dozen. I wondered how many of them were relishing an environment in which they did not have to worry about straying into the territory of a next-street gang. Older people seems to move around in church groups or families – in all sizes, shapes, ages, skin colours, and all at ease with each other. The ducks of Minehead were present as usual but perhaps fewer and less vocal than in some previous years; and outnumbered by the seagulls.

The daily Bible study gatherings focused on the epistle of James. The speaker was the principal of a theological college and there were times when it showed – too much theology and not enough verve and inspiration. Applause for her but no standing ovation. Most scholars believe that this James was the eldest of Jesus's brothers (he had 4 and at least 2 sisters). This James was not an active follower during Jesus's ministry but became the acknowledged leader of the followers of Christ in and around Jerusalem after the crucifixion. The epistle was apparently written in the mid-40s A.D. as a circular to tell the followers (not yet "Christians") what they should believe: that Jesus was the long yearned-for Messiah (though not quite as they had expected him); and how they should live: life style was to be based on the Jewish law as Jesus had preached it – "love God...." and "love your neighbour..."-- stripped of a bureaucratic overlay prescribed by the religious authorities which was as complex as that imposed nowadays by the Ministry for Administration in Whitehall or by the European Union. They considered themselves Jews but no doubt the Jewish priestly authorities, who also acted as the secular administration under the Roman imperial overlordship, regarded them as heretical fools, perhaps as the Anglican Church regards Jehovah's Witnesses, with the difference that as the secular authority the priests could jail them or have them executed. It was about this time that Paul was developing his mission to the Gentiles, mainly in what are now Turkey and Greece; and it

was being revealed to him that Jesus's death on the cross was a once and for all sacrifice for everybody's sins and the limitless cycle of animal sacrifice in the Jerusalem Temple was redundant.

The theme this year was "Only the Brave". Everyone has now heard of Cambodia's Killing Fields of the 1970s. A few years ago a survivor of these appeared at Spring Harvest. "I've seen the film, read the book, and now met the survivor. Beat that". This year we did. One evening we saw a video clip of a mass baptism by total immersion in the sea of Iranian converts to Christianity. The ecstatic joy on their faces was startling, as was the information that the clip had very limited circulation. If the Iranian authorities seeing it recognised any of those appearing they would be seized by the religious police of the Ayatollahs. (There was a book for sale at the bookstore entitled "Too many to Jail" explaining that Iranians are converting to Christianity faster than the religious police can round up and jail them!).

Even more amazing was the appearance of a little lady, of uncertain age, looking a bit battered but beautifully dressed, bowing formally and politely to everyone. She is a Christian from North Korea where even to be a Christian is a serious offence and where Christians dare not share their faith even with husbands or wives or children The president Kim Jong Un is worshipped as a god, rather like a god-king from some ancient civilisation, as were his father and grandfather before him. To worship any other deity is close to blasphemous; which perhaps explains why the little lady's Christian husband had been tortured to death for his beliefs. Her eldest son had been one of about 3 million people (about 12% of the population) who died in the mass famine a few years ago. She had twice escaped into China and been sent back; she had served, and survived, as most don't, a three-year prison sentence for being a Christian in a camp In conditions quite as appalling as those at Dachau or Stalin's gulag; where she set up a church with 5 others meeting to pray silently and sing silent hymns in the latrine block; and on her release had escaped yet again into China and this time got away to South Korea to join her surviving children who had got out separately. That's bravery. She was interviewed with the help of an interpreter. No photos or recordings were allowed during her appearance and I cannot give her name because of the risk to members of her extended family still in North Korea. At the end we all, several thousands of us, sang "Amazing Grace" led by this astonishing little lady singing in Korean.



Royal Voluntary Service, originally founded in 1938 as the Women's Voluntary Service, was formed by Stella Reading to help recruit women






