#### CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

#### MAY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Councillors were pleased to hear from resident Josey Parish, Clerk to Studland Parish Council, who addressed them on what she considered as important changes ahead or emerging dialogues for anyone engaged in council work within Purbeck. She summarised them as: future changes in Local Government; the possibility of a joint Neighbourhood Plan for rural Purbeck; the proposed National Park status for Purbeck and East Devon; a proposal for a cross Parish meeting with the National Trust; the Partial Review discussions at Purbeck District Council as a response to top down imposition of housing figures from Central Government. The Chairman thanked her. Councillors welcomed some of the suggestions and will be responding to Studland Parish Council after the next Meeting.

The Council welcomes members of the public attending the monthly meetings. It is important that we know what residents think about any Parish issue including ones that the Councillors are currently considering. I would like to take this opportunity to remind residents that they can contact any Parish Councillor if they have concerns or want to know more about decisions that have been taken.

The weather is improving and garden plants are making lots of growth now. Please make sure that you keep garden vegetation, especially hedges and trees, that may be growing out over the road, pavement or path well trimmed back. If you spot any problems (potholes, a lack of verge cutting, damaged signs, etc.) with the roads around the Parish, you can report these to the County Council on 01305 251000. There is also a system at dorsetforyou.com that allows you to report highways problems on-line and to view the status of your own previously reported enquires. You can also discuss highway issues with Councillors Dando and Spinney who have special responsibility for highway maintenance. Similarly, if you see a street light that is not working, you can report it to Scottish & Southern Electric (SSE) online at www.lightsonindorset.co.uk or free phone 0800 068 4145 (try to note the column or lamp number).

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to the proposals for the following: The erection of a single story extension at the rear of 1 Battlemead, Corfe Castle. External alterations to include cleaning of the exterior walls with the Doff/Thermatech process, replacement of guttering, fascia boards and downpipes where required (or remove altogether), the replacement of loose mortar, and the replacement of plaster around the interior of windows at the Evangelical Church - 44 East Street, Corfe Castle.

#### CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council did object to a proposal for the following: The conversion of an existing barn to ancillary residential accommodation/holiday unit and the erection of a two storey extension at Sandy Hills Farm, Sandy Hills Lane, Corfe Castle. The Council suggests the proposals would be an overdevelopment of the site. The work will detrimentally affect the view from the Castle and elsewhere within the AONB. Any development should be as ancillary accommodation, not as a separate unit. The privacy of the neighbours will be reduced. A new ground floor wall should be built, the first floor balcony removed and the window recessed and no access permitted through the existing large ground floor wall aperture (just glazing) as a condition of any permission that is ultimately granted.

You can manage and order prescriptions online using your personal log in, please ask at Reception for further details. If there is anything we can do to help with the planning or ordering of your medication, please do speak to a member of the Dispensary team.

The Dispensary (and telephone line) is open 8.30-12.30 for enquiries but medication can be collected at any time during Surgery opening hours.

#### **NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL**

The annual meeting took place at Church Knowle Village Hall on the 10<sup>th</sup> May with the retiring Chairman, Tony Higgens, giving a report on the activities of the Parish Council. The single Parishioner who attended in addition to the Parish Councillors opened a discussion about traffic problems which occur when events are being held at the animal sanctuary and also thoughtless parking of motor cars on the pavement, thereby increasing risk of injury to pedestrians. It was suggested that Dorset Police should take action against the miscreants.

Following about 20 minutes of discussion the annual Parish meeting ended and the May meeting of the Parish Council started. The Chairman advised Members present that he would not be seeking re-election as Chairman of the Parish Council for the year and, consequently, the Parish Council would have no Chairman unless another Councillor agreed to be nominated and voted in to the position. The existing Vice-chairman took the rôle of Chairman while discussions continued and the retiring Chairman offered to take the Chair for the meeting. This was duly proposed, seconded and carried. The meeting decided to deal with the urgent Council matters and then adjourn *sine die* and postpone other matters on the agenda until a re-convened meeting was called later in the month by which time the clerk would have received advice as to how to proceed. That meeting will be reported in the next edition of Corfe Valley News.

> A new hide at Studland has been specially designed to bring children closer to nature.

The new 'Alfresco Arch Hide' at the Knoll Beach Discovery Centre, built by our brilliant volunteers, Bernard, David and Tony, provides a sheltered hideaway for children to encounter a variety of birds and animals in a quiet corner of the wood.

Its open design means that the children can feel close to nature rather than be boxed-in and isolated from the action in a conventional bird hide.

Over the coming months, we will manage the surrounding area to attract birds by providing feeders and nest boxes, extend a boggy patch for pond life and create a bank for reptiles to sun themselves.

You can find the hide behind the Discovery Centre at Knoll Beach.

We believe it is important that children have opportunities to experience the natural world from an early age so that they grow up at ease in the outdoors and with a love of nature.

Our Natural Childhood report, published in 2012, highlighted the dangers of a generation becoming increasingly disconnected from the world around them.

These include obesity brought about by a sedentary lifestyle, the emotional effects of what the report called 'nature deficiency disorder' and risks to the wider environment tomorrow if children turn their backs on it today.



Since the report's publication, we've been doing our bit to reverse the trend with activities designed to encourage children back into the outdoors, including our successful 50 Things To Do Before You're 11 and Three Quarters programme. *Picture: (r-l)*

We're planning to spend more than £2.2 million in Purbeck this year on work including improvements to our tenants' homes, conservation and the outdoors, and scheduled repairs to Corfe Castle.

We are able to do this because last year in Purbeck we made £1.06 million in operating contribution – our annual 'profit'. The remaining expenditure will be funded from our reserves.

As the National Trust is a charity, all the money we make is reinvested in our wider work with the core purpose of looking after special places for everyone to enjoy.

That includes cash from our catering businesses and shops, admission prices at Corfe Castle, car parking and rental income as well as the subscriptions paid by our members.

This year in Purbeck we've allocated more than £548,000 to work on our rental properties as part of a commitment to tackle a backlog in planned improvements.

Conserving the Purbeck countryside accounts for £185,000 of planned expenditure, and an additional £50,000 will go on a rolling programme of maintenance at Corfe Castle.

Some £40,000 will be spent on restoring the dry stone walls which are an integral part of the south Purbeck landscape.

We're also funding a sports development officer to help people enjoy being active in the outdoors and a coastal engagement officer to carry on the work begun by the Living with a Changing Coast initiative.

The remaining expenditure breaks down into a wide range of categories from car park maintenance to new signage.





It has been a very busy month at Corfe Castle Primary School!

Our children in Years 2 and 6 have admirably completed their SATs tests. Children in Year 1 have been on many different educational visits and experiences: Studland Beach, Durlston Country Park, Margaret Green Animal Rescue and Putlake Farm. Our year 3 and 4 children have had a lovely (snowy) day out at Stonehenge and also a visit to the Lighthouse Arts Centre in Poole to watch the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra in concert. Years 5 and 6 have had a fun Mayan day when they dressed up, cooked and ate Mayan-inspired food and even learnt about the Mayan number-system! AND our youngest children, in our reception class, have been to Leeson House to do some Pond Dipping. Many thanks to everybody who helped out on these trips, without whom we would be unable to offer such an exciting array of activities.

We have recently been visited by an inspector from the National Society for our SIAMS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools). This inspection is carried out approximately every five years and judges our effectiveness as a Church of England school.

The inspector spent the day in school: talking to children, talking to parents, observing Collective Worship and some teaching, meeting with our governing body and talking to staff. As usual, our children were incredible and absolutely wowed her with their understanding of our Christian Values and their reflective thinking.

We are delighted with our report and are proud to say we were judged overall to be a good church school. Some of the highlights:

- Children say, 'Christian values bring us together and help us to sort out situations'
- Reflection areas and the recently introduced reflection journals make a valuable contribution to children's growing awareness of spirituality
- The whole school ethos is enriched by worship and the impact is evident in children's attitudes, behaviour and relationships
- Parents say they are fully informed through newsletters and that questionnaires give them opportunities to give their views.
- Parents particularly value the appointment of an Emotional Literacy Support Assistant (ELSA) from whom they say support has been excellent
- Parents believe this positive caring ethos based on Christian values has brought 'the soul back into the school' and that their children are valued as individuals and 'genuinely learn life skills for the future through the Christian faith'

We also feel that the identified areas for development are realistic and are outcomes for which we had already been striving.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your continued support.



June 2016 marks the 34<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this community magazine, in its present form. Our Editor, is a record holder, having been 12 years at the helm. Thank you Stephen. To quote from the first such restyled magazine- June 1982 - we read, "Keep this magazine safe, it could become a collector's item in vears to come". The print and publication now is a far cry from then with all the advanced digital technology and indeed, is now read worldwide on the internet. The contributions. community input, advertisers' volunteers' subscriptions and your donations are all vital to the continuing success without which it would have folded up years ago. It may be of interest to you to know how it evolved:-Following much discussion in the early 1980's, between the Parochial Church Councils and the Parish Councils, it replaced the individual Corfe Valley Churches own newsletters. In June 1982, it was published as a Community Magazine and not long after it appeared under the title of PURBECK VIEWS. One year later, in August 1983, the name

CORFE VALLEY NEWS was established relating to the Corfe River running through the Valley. Originally, the format was that the Church news appeared on the initial pages, followed by reports from the Parish Councils and then by general information. From 2004 as a popular decision, the Parish Council reports were moved to the initial pages and the Church news followed on from the centre pages, giving a neat logical order. More recently, the 'Thank You' and miscellaneous notices were introduced and feature towards the end pages. This lively Magazine always welcomes your observations and suggestions. The 'Corfe Castle Village Pump' was dreamt up in 2004, coinciding with the new editorship. Since the idea of these chatter pages, the world has certainly moved on apace. As we have just said, we are now read worldwide. Facebook. Twitter and social media magnified, have made the Village Pump appear a little rusty! We continue to need your input, please, to give it a bit of a shine.



That 6 year old boy, as we all know him today, is a confident well-travelled 18 year old young man, who confirms that the special royal souvenir has survived with loving care. It sits in pride of place, alongside that of his elder brother Luke.

The WEEKEND of the 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> JUNE is being recognized, this year, by the entire nation, when we are encouraged to fly the flag and sing with heart and voice, 'Happy Official 90<sup>th</sup> Birthday' to Our Queen'. #### The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

Recently in this letter I have asked 'Does prayer work?' and 'Who is God?' and have tried to present to you a way of thinking about God you might not have thought of. Now I am asking 'Who is Jesus?'

Jesus was a real person in actual history; he is referred to in near-contemporary historical documents outside the Bible. He was born in Bethlehem but brought up in Nazareth in Palestine, which in his day was part of the Roman Empire; nowadays both Bethlehem and Nazareth are in present-day Israel. He lived from approximately 6 BC, two years before the death of Herod the Great, to about 28 AD (modern dating). He was a flesh-and-blood man just like us, with a family of brothers, sisters, uncles, aunts and cousins.

However, there was something different about Jesus. From about the age of 12 he was aware he had a special relationship with God, which drove him to think and speak about God as his Father. Mary, Jesus' mother, was married to a man named Joseph, who was descended from the great King David of Israel's golden age. She had become pregnant in mysterious circumstances before she and Joseph were married. Jesus was born amid rumours of angels and the expected arrival of a new baby King. The old and angry King Herod heard the stories going around, and Jesus' family had to flee south over the border into Egypt, in fear for their lives. Even so, Herod had every boy baby under 2 years old within a narrow radius around Bethlehem killed, fearful of losing his throne.

Herod died in 4 BC. Jesus and his family returned to Palestine and settled in Nazareth. Jesus would have been educated with the other local boys in the town Synagogue. He may well have helped Joseph in his carpentry workshop, and gone with him to Sepphoris, a neighbouring town that had been sacked and was now being rebuilt, and was therefore the nearest source of regular work. He might also have received further instruction in the Hebrew Scriptures by attaching himself as a disciple to a known Teacher, noting and learning his seminars and sermons, and generally making himself useful.

Life in 1<sup>st</sup> century Palestine was difficult. Herod the Great's son, Herod Antipas, was King of the Jews only in name. The Roman Governor of Judea, Pontius Pilate, had an army at his disposal which he employed freely to supress riots. Taxes were heavy, and the Roman occupying force was feared and loathed, mainly because they were pagan. There were many gods around to choose from; roadside stalls sold little figures representing them, and temples contained heroic statues – but the God worshipped by the Jews was the only one

who existed as a formless, ever-present, all-powerful and all-knowing being; to make an image of him was punishable by death. He was the one and only real and active God, the Jews were his Chosen People, and the Temple in Jerusalem was the centre of their faith. This was the God whom Jesus called Father.

Jesus didn't start his public ministry until he was about 28. Because his message would be controversial he knew he wouldn't have much time to get it across before he was arrested as a trouble-maker. His studies of Hebrew Scripture had taught him God had warned the Jews, through the prophets, that if they didn't cease their immoral behaviour, corrupt business practices, and oppression of the poor, disaster would follow – as indeed it had in the shape of invasion and exile first by Assyria and then by Babylon, and now invasion and occupation by Rome. The only hope on the horizon was the rumoured arrival of a saviour, a Messiah, someone sent by God to sort things out.

As Jesus matured, he had become increasingly aware of his growing relationship with God, who now seemed so close to him that he felt like part of his own being. By the time he began his public ministry, Jesus understood that he himself was the long-awaited Messiah. People were expecting a political or military leader, but what Jesus did was to be infinitely more effective. Although the Jews tried hard to obey God's Law as given to them by Moses, they seemed unable to do so. Their priests and religious teachers had formulated hundreds of little laws designed to help people obey the main Ten Commandments to the letter, but that only produced a terrible sense of being weighed down by impossible legislation. Somewhere along the way, in concentrating so conscientiously on the letter of the law, the religious scholars had forgotten the loving and generous spirit of the Law. Eventually a system of animal sacrifice had developed in a desperate attempt to obtain God's forgiveness-for-sin - but it didn't really work.

How was Jesus to solve this problem? What did Jesus actually do? I will tell you in my next letter. With love, Anne

# MORE THAN 4,000 PASSENGERS TRAVEL DURING RECORD-BREAKING DIESEL GALA AND BEER FESTIVAL

Elated Swanage Railway volunteers are celebrating after their Diesel Gala and Dorset Beer Festival carried more than 4,000 passengers across four days – an all-time record in the eleven year history of the popular annual event.

Visitors delighted in the first visit of a classic early 1960s west of England Class 42 'Warship' class express locomotive No. D832 and newly-restored late 1950s Class 40 locomotive No. D213 'Andania' hauling its first passenger train since the mid-1970s.

The gala saw the first running of a public-carrying cream tea train, diesel locomotive driver experience trains and brake van trains on the Swanage Railway's newly restored four-mile line from Norden to the River Frome – within sight of Wareham.

It was also the first time that a Class 46 diesel locomotive – No. D182 – had run on the Swanage Railway's relaid Purbeck Line.

Designed to replace steam locomotives, the 78-tonne 'Warship' Class 42 No. D832 *'Onslaught'* was built by British Railways



in 1961 at its Swindon locomotive works in Wiltshire for hauling trains between London and the West Country.

The diesel gala and beer festival took place from Friday to Sunday, 6 to 8 May, 2016, with a preview day of diesel and steam trains on Thursday, 5 May, 2016.

During the annual event, 12 classic diesel locomotives hauled trains between Norden, Corfe Castle, Harman's Cross, Herston and Swanage to an intensive passenger timetable.

The diesel gala preview day on Thursday, 5 May, 2016, saw diesel trains from the Waterloo to Exeter main line re-created with locomotives carrying the west of England route's distinctive '62' headcode for semi-fast trains.

The preview day also saw a special 'Sconex' cream tea train run the nine miles between Swanage and the River Frome with Class 42 No. D832 'Onslaught' and



Class 33 No. D6515 on each end of the train.

It was the first time that No. D6515 had hauled a passenger train between Norden and the River Frome since the summer of 1966 when it headed a London to Swanage train during the days of British Rail.

Sunday, 8 May, 2016, saw the Swanage Railway's resident

pair of Class 08 shunters – No. 08 436 and No. D3591 – haul two brake vans of passengers from Norden westwards to the River Frome, within sight of Wareham.

On Sunday we fly out to Greece on holiday, but, before then, I am hoping to see more of the Invictus Games. I have seen Gareth Malone choosing the choir, and, last night, I saw some of the cycling, but there is still a lot more to come, before the Closing Ceremony takes place on Thursday. But this morning, I suddenly realised that I didn't have a clue, as to why they were called the "Invictus" Games. I knew that all those taking part were those left with permanent disabilities due to war injuries, but why "Invictus"?

With the help of Google, that query has now been resolved. In 1875, William Ernest Henley, who himself was an amputee, wrote a 16 line poem which, initially, did not have a title, but was later given the title "Invictus" which, apparently, is the Latin for "unconquerable". Now I could see why the Games had been given that name. Google also informed me that that the poem was often repeated by Nelson Mandella, during his 27 years of imprisonment. Nelson Mandella, and the men and women taking part in the Games, are those who simply refuse to give up, however great the odds. I must admit that I am a bit of a "sucker for a challenge", but, compared with such as these, I am in a different league altogether.

But having found out about the poem, I decided to take a closer look at the poem itself. Let me quote the first eight lines that I have reduced to four:-

"Out of the night that covers me, black is the pit from pole to pole. I thank whatever god's may be, for my unconquerable soul. In the fell clutch of Circumstance, I have not winced or cried aloud; Under the bludgeonings of Chance, my head is bloody but unbowed."

You can see why it was given the title "Invictus" - unconquerable. Henley's determination not to give up, whatever the Circumstances, or the Chances of life may throw at him. And yet, as one who has a deep Christian faith, I found it sad. From the poem, it would appear that William Henley had not discovered the faith that Jesus came to offer. No Christian could write the words, "I thank whatever god's may be." And yet there is still the belief that he has a soul, so there is a spiritual awareness. I remember a Baptist Minister friend of mine saying, many years ago, "I don't have a soul", which rather shocked me, until he added, "I am a soul."

But what of the next two lines that I have reduced to one?

"Beyond this place of wrath and tears, looms but the horror of the shade."

Am I misinterpreting it, when I take the poet to be speaking of this life, and the life to come? I think back to last Sunday, when the sun was not only shining, but it was warm as well. I had been given another opportunity of leading a small fellowship in worship, and, thank God, we had eight visitors who sang heartedly, and entered fully into the worship. And then, after the service, we held the second of our Monthly Sunday Lunches, and two of the visitors changed their plans, and stayed and had a meal with us. No, Sunday was definitely not a "place of wrath and tears", and how can I view the life to come as "the horror of the shade", when Jesus says, "In my Father's house are many rooms and I am going to prepare a place for you."

Let me now quote the last two lines, which again I have reduced to one.

"I am the master of my fate. I am the Captain of my soul".

Whatever horrors life had inflicted upon him, William Henley clearly believes that he has no-one that he can turn to for help, and, perhaps, that is where many people are at today. I once heard an atheist described as "a person with no one to thank". But without a belief in a loving and caring God, there is also no one to turn to, to ask for help, and strength, and guidance, and comfort, and all the other blessings, that Christians ask God to give them, not because they deserve them, but because God loves and cares for them. When I land in Greece, I will be walking very close to where Paul the Apostle walked, nearly 2,000 years ago. Listen to his experiences, and compare his reactions to those of William Henley.

"dying, and yet we live on: beaten, and yet not killed; sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; poor, yet making many rich; having nothing, and yet possessing everything." 2 Cor. 6: 9-10

Neither I, nor Paul, would ever be able to say, "I am the Captain of my soul". Being a Christian is inviting the Lord Jesus Christ to be the "Captain of your soul", and seeking to allow Him to be the Lord of every aspect of your life.

Whatever the circumstances of your life, I trust that you will live it as one who is unconquerable, but, not relying on your own strength, rather, on the help that our Lord promises to provide.

#### **Mineral Consultation**

A public consultation will take place on the following two emerging planning documents between the 26 May and 21 July 2016.

The Draft Minerals Sites Plan Update 2016 is primarily an update of information that was presented in the 2015 Draft Mineral Sites Plan, including aggregate production figures for 2014, amendments to the aggregates Area of Search, amendments to some of the preferred site options and a new site which came out of the 2015 consultation.

The 2015 consultation included some potential site allocations which were indicated as unlikely to be needed during the life of the Plan. It is now considered that some of these may be needed during the life of this Plan. They are:

- \* AS12 Philliol's Farm, Wareham
- \* AS-14 Henbury Farm, Sturminster Marshall

- \* Proposed extension to Swanworth Quarry in Purbeck (PK16): Amendments have been proposed to limit visual and landscape impacts and it is included for information.
- \* New aggregates site: A site known as Gallows Hill on the Puddletown Road was nominated during the recent consultation and is presented for information.

The Draft Waste Plan Update – Additional and Emerging Preferred Waste Site Allocations contains six additional waste sites and, following further assessment work, a series of fifteen sites that are emerging as preferred for allocation in the final Waste Plan to address the key waste management needs that have been identified. The sites are shown on the overview map below.

Please note: one of the additional sites included in the Waste Plan for consultation is Swanworth Quarry. Additional capacity for the filling of inert waste is being considered within the existing quarry.

#### **Playground**

Good news – the first equipment – a combination swing with toddler swing, normal swing and a 'birds-nest' swing and a 5-a-side football goal) - has been ordered: hopefully as we earn some more money we will be able to afford some extra things, but at least we are getting there at last! The fencing materials are on site and ready to be put up and the hedging plants that we all put in last autumn are looking healthy and covered in fresh new leaves.

#### **Broadband**

After many, many years of waiting and lobbying our high speed broadband connection has arrived. The new mast on Smedmore Hill is now fully functioning and VoIP Unlimited who have put up the mast (and provided the bulk of the capital cost at their own risk) will be installing receivers Kimmeridge and in the Corfe Valley. They may need some "repeater masts" to get full coverage of the whole of the Corfe Valley; but the benefits of this will be enormous. The scheme will provide a Wireless Network relaying the connection across the bay from Portland Harbour. We will have access to speeds of between 30-50Mbps – that is well over 100 times faster than we get on our BT landline! The added bonus will also be access to cheap

VoIP telephone connections instead of our current BT landlines which are in short supply anyway. A government grant will subsidise the installation costs

for each property making this new service a reality for the whole community. The photo shows the new 6m mast on Smedmore Hill surrounded by sea mist! Even on a clear day it is not that noticeable and bears out the wisdom of Purbeck District Council approving the planning application. VoIP Unlimited will be contacting local residents about the scheme and hope to be able to install the receivers within a couple of weeks of receiving an order.




