



DECEMBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

The Council received a presentation from Richard Brown who spoke about the benefits that National Park status could bring to Dorset. He highlighted the social and economic agenda of National Parks and explained the structure of a potential planning system; working together with the new Dorset Council. Richard advised the Council that a report has been published on the National Park website presenting the case for the economic benefits of a Dorset National Park. The report summarises the evidence available from a number of sources as well as reports from Government and economic advisors. The Council noted that National Park boards are not currently democratically elected and this raises a concern for them. Whilst the Council do not object to a Dorset National Park on principle they do have some concerns about the democratic deficit and this needs addressing. Later in the meeting the Council considered a response to the Governments Call for Evidence on National Parks and AONB's and resolved to submit the paper composed by Cllr Clarke, a copy of which is posted on the Parish Council website.

The Council requested could Cllr Brooks raise with highways the lack of detail in generic 'Road Closed' signs and requested can they please be more considered and specific? Corfe was recently signposted as 'Closed' when road works were in fact taking place in Herston, causing some residents and visitors of Corfe and beyond to make substantial and unnecessary diversions.

Following a meeting with ClIr Brooks and ClIr Spinney the highways department have decided to refresh the double yellows and repaint the white hatching in the Square outside of the Bakery. Although this falls outside of their code of conduct, they have decided that it needs to be done to create access for emergency vehicles needing to reach the Castle. Due to the cold weather and the fact that salt affects the setting of the paint the work will be done the New Year.

Cllr Dragon reported that Purbeck District Council had cancelled their forthcoming meeting as there was not enough businesses to transact. Both Cllr Dragon and Cllr Brooks advised that at District and County Council significant time is being spent on preparing for the local government reorganisation, leaving little time for anything else.

The Council has received draft heads of terms from Purbeck District Council relating to the transfer of the toilets and car parking spaces in West Street. The Council resolved to proceed with the transfer and to appoint a solicitor to assist them with the process. The vote was not unanimous and Cllr Dragon requested it be recorded that he voted against the proposal. The Council discussed the potential income from the car parking spaces, which

will be used to fund the provision of the toilets, and it was decided that the Council will maintain the current ratio of 10 spaces being let to residents and 12 spaces being let to second home owners at a higher rate. Cllr Dragon was not comfortable that potentially a resident would not be let a space allocated to a second home owner. The income from the current arrangement just covers the forecast expenditure on the toilets so the number of residents spaces cannot be increased, it was noted that should a resident wish to pay the higher rate for the space they could and the Council stated that in future years, and with experience of the actual expense of the toilets, it may be that the ratio could be adjusted to accommodate more residents. There are at present additional provisions for residents parking which will become the responsibility of Dorset Council.

In financial matters, the annual budget and precept requirement for 2019/20 was set. The Council payment for the Youth Club was allocated as a routine payment rather than expenditure from reserves. It has become a regular annual payment and the Youth Club are fulfilling the requirement asked of them by the Council to contribute to the Parish Council's donation. The Council bolstered earmarked funds to pay for Elections in May 2019 and to cover possible additional costs arising from the local government reorganisation; this could potentially address any unbudgeted expenditure arising from the transfer of the toilets.

The Council resolved to fund a small sign to acknowledge the excellent work of the gardening club and the generous donors who have regenerated the gardens around the West Street Toilets. At the Annual Parish Meeting in 2017 it was noted that the area was looking in need of attention and when the Council invited the Gardening Club to assist with improving the area they enthusiastically obliged, donating their time and their plants. The PC also received a generous donation from Simon Goldsack from Holme for Gardens.

The Council considers all planning applications. They had no objection to the demolition of garage, shed and garden wall in the cartilage of a grade II listed building at 46-48 East Street Corfe Castle, the construction of two new side dormers at 89 East Street, Corfe Castle and to provide structural support to a central chimney, to repair and to re-slate the roof at the Town House, The Square, Corfe Castle.

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NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

The first of the winter meetings was held at Furzebrook Village Hall with ClIr Ellwood succeeding ClIr Higgens as Chairman for the month until the January 2019 meeting following the Public Discussion Period. Six Parish Councillors, together with four members of the public & Parishioners attended and took part in the public discussion period. The DCC and PDC councillors also arrived and contributed to the meeting.

Councillors Parker and Edwards declared interests as neighbours with regard to planning application 6/2018/0320 to be discussed later. The Clerk advised the Councillors concerned that the interests were not pecuniary and consequently there was no need for them to leave the meeting. Cllr Higgens also declared what he thought might be an interest that application because he had had dealings with the designer in the past. The Clerk advised him that in his opinion that would be a bit like declaring and interest in a planning application made by the local butcher because he buys his sausages from him. The Clerk dismissed the need for the Declaration. And everyone was happy. (Older readers may recall the shenanigans a few years ago when one of the Councillors declared a pecuniary interest in a planning application but remained at the Meeting during the Public Discussion Period during which she was asked questions by Members who wanted to gain information.) The Parish Council takes "transparency" very seriously and as a result Councillors declare "interests" even where they may be tenuous to the extreme. One should remember that in a small parish with a population of about 200 with families having lived there for generations it is pretty obvious that just about everyone knows, or has had contact with, just about everyone else. So, now, on to the Public Discussion.

Much of the "Public Discussion" period was taken up with Parishioners and Members discussing their serious concerns about a planning application (6/2016/0320) for the erection of structures at Barnston Farm. Reference was made to an application for similar development at the farm several years ago and it was felt that the installation of these structures would seriously affect what Members and Parishioners agreed is a pretty unique part of Dorset; the uniqueness is what brings people to holiday in this area. There was concern about the private water supply to the area being able cope with the increase in human population (albeit somewhat temporary and fluctuating) whilst at the same time serving the numerous farms and homesteads. At full pelt in the summer, when the water table was lower, the units would be able to house 36 people, with private toilets and showers; guite a sizable population increase for the Parish and the area served by the private water supply in particular. There was also discussion about possible conflict with the Local Plan if permission for the development was permitted. Other objections raised included probable parking problems, destruction of unspoilt farmland by installing tracks and hard-standing, the fact that the development was "smack-bang in the middle" of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (Dear Reader, note the words "outstanding, natural and beauty"; it just about condenses down the flavour of the objections raised at the meeting in those few words.). Anyway, discussion and concerns raised continued

for about an hour, indicating the degree of public concern raised, and eventually the Chairman called a halt to ensure that other matters of concern to Parishioners could be raised and that the meeting would not have to go on till 04:00hr on Wednesday morning!

Next up in the "Public Discussion" was an item of concern to a Parishioner in the Cocknowle area had about a footpath going through her land and which had, apparently, not been notified during property searches. In 2015, Dorset County Council had made a footpath diversion order of a path but this resulted in discussions between Purbeck DC and DCC; all very complicated. Suffice it to say, our County Councillor entered the discussion and said that DCC had evidence to show the line of the path and PDC may have been confused. Three of the Parish Councillors present could remember an old footpath going through the land and which had been in regular use and described its route at the meeting. Apparently, some of the old evidence held by District and County had been lost, but the Clerk advised the Meeting he had some old maps and route descriptions. He would look out those relating to FP30 and these bits of info might just clear the mud from the case. The Parishioner concerned was grateful for this and thanked the Parish Council. And that was the end of the Public Discussion Period.

Now on to business.

The Minutes for November's meeting were read and following correction of a few typographical errors were agreed as a true representation of that meeting. There were a few matters arising from the Minutes but these were mainly points of information.

Next up came Planning Matters which included full formal examination and consideration of the "holiday" development at Barnston. An application (No 6/2018/0602) for an extension at Willow Corner, Church Knowle was examined and the Council decided they would not object to the development. Then came the Barnston project. The Parish Council looked at the application and took into consideration what was said during the public discussion and after considerable discussion decided to object in the strongest terms to permission being granted. Their objection is as follows:

<u>Church Knowle Parish Council's Response to Planning Application 6/2018/0320</u> <u>~ land at Barnston Farm, Church Knowle</u>

CKPC decisions have been made with regard for the purpose of conserving and enhancing the natural beauty of the AONB as per their responsibility defined in the guidance given under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000. Areas of outstanding natural beauty (AONBs) are lands protected by the CROW Act designed to protect the landscape, to conserve and enhance its natural beauty.

One of the core principles in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) is that planning should recognise the intrinsic character and beauty of the countryside. The National Planning Policy Framework Chapter 11 goes on to state within the following paragraphs:

Para 115. Great weight should be given to conserving landscape and scenic beauty in National Parks, the Broads and **Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty**, which have the highest status of protection in relation to landscape and scenic beauty.

Para 116. Planning permission should be refused for major developments in these designated areas except in exceptional circumstances and where it can be demonstrated they are in the public interest.

Using the guidance given within the NPPF outlined above, the objections to the development discussed by Church Knowle Parish Council are as follows:

1. The proposed development conflicts with the objectives of the Dorset AONB Management Plan. The site is visible from the footpath to the south, the ridge which runs to the north as well as an adjacent road.

2. The development will require installation of paths, tracks and structures on a previously unspoilt field.

3. There will be an environmental impact on fauna and humans in relation to light and noise pollution when the proposed development is complete and in use.

4. In general, the proposed development will be detrimental to the amenity of the area.

5. Water supply to the area is from a private water source that serves local farms and human habitation. The Council is concerned that this limited supply will be insufficient at times of high demand to fulfil public health needs. The council considers the local infrastructure will probably be unable to cope. There is also concern about electricity supply.

6. There is lack of detail given in the application in relation to sewage and water treatment.

7. There is a lack of sight of the appropriate camping certificate.

8. In the Parish Council's view this constitutes a major development and if accepted, this application would set a precedent for further development within this designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It would contravene the guidance given within the CROW Act and the NPPF.

The Clerk reported on the progress of planning matters previously discussed by the Parish Council and these were noted. No new suspected unlawful developments were reported and the Clerk then gave an update on current ones which had been reported to PDC.

The refurbishment of finger-posts at Barnston Cross and East Creech Triangle is well underway and soon there will be less risk of people not knowing which way to turn. It was reported that the contractor had been given the full specification of the destinations and mileages so that, hopefully, by the New Year the posts will be back to their old selves. Despite there being no budget in DCC Highways' coffers to erect an "Unsuitable for HGVs" sign at the Barnston Cross entrance to the Kimmeridge road, the Parish Council will continue to badger DCC to get one.

Next up was "Finance". Accounts for November to close of banking business on the Friday before the December Meeting were approved, as was the payment of invoices. The Clerk reported on progress of the opening of another deposit account with Lloyd's Bank paying more interest than the one held at Scottish Widows' Bank. A request had been made for authority to repair the playground shelter, fence posts and equipment to maintain the safety of our little playground at a cost of £386, and after discussion this was approved.

There was then discussion about the progress of the Parish Council's project to clean up the upper reaches of the Corfe River and of the public meeting held at Bucknowle Farm. There was still concern amongst Members of how the funds for this were being distributed by Dorset Wildlife Trust.

Apart from a few minor matters, that was that for the last meeting of 2018 and the meeting closed at 9:35pm. Next meeting of the New Year will be held in the Church Knowle Reading Room on Tuesday 08th January.

National Trust Corfe Castle

National Discarded dinghies and left-behind lilos have returned to Studland after being transformed into desirable designer luggage, thanks to a conservation partnership between the National Trust and online luggage manufacturer Wyatt & Jack.

Now they will help raise funds to protect the local landscape, instead of adding to more than 1.2 million tonnes of plastics dumped into UK landfill sites each year.

National Trust Beach Ranger Mollie Gadd contacted Wyatt & Jack, which is based on the Isle of Wight, after seeing their Inflatable Amnesty initiative online.

She acted after seeing families blowing up brand new inflatables on arrival at Studland, only to find the same toys discarded on the beach when they left hours later.

"They are not designed to be, but they end up as one giant piece of single use plastic," said Mollie.

"A single use coffee cup is bad, but a single use inflatable is awful."

Wyatt & Jack specialise in taking inflatables, deckchairs and bouncy castles and turning them into bags, and now a selection has gone on sale at Knoll Beach's National Trust shop.

The Studland selection is special because every item began as rubbish collected nearby by beach rangers. This is the first time Wyatt and Jack has been able to send waste items full circle for sale where they originated.

They range from small zipped pouch bags for £16 to tote bags priced at £28-£50 and large fully waterproof rucksacks at £70.

With bright colours and fun designs, each item proudly displays its origins by incorporating elements like dinghy rowlocks and inflation valves, while the shop display highlights their unique story.

All profits from their sale will be used to support the work of the National Trust — just like everything else sold by trust shops.

Around 50 inflatables were reused in this way after the scheme began in August, and Mollie hopes many more will follow in years to come.




Our thanks to everyone who attended and supported. Audience participation was excellent. We take the lights down on Saturday 5 January 2019. We wish everyone a Happy New Year.

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



The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

I wrote last month about the gathering in the Square at Corfe Castle on Remembrance Sunday. Less than a month later another crowd gathered - this time on a Saturday, and at dusk. There was singing from the Corfe Castle School Choir and the Purbeck Village Quire, and the Christmas lights were switched on. After a short interlude, which seemed longer than half an hour, there was definitely an air of excitement and expectation as Father Christmas' arrival drew near. Once again, we owe a lot to those whose hard work gives Corfe Castle its very special character at Christmas.

Generally, most Christmas decorations and lights are down by January 6th. That is the twelfth day of Christmas. It is also Epiphany when the visit of the wise men is remembered. Christians of the Eastern Orthodox Churches pay as much attention to this festival as we do in the west to the birth of Jesus. The birth, the nativity of Christ is celebrated, but it is the Epiphany which is celebrated by the wider community with associated cultural traditions.

One group of the Christian churches, mainly in the West, focus on the coming of God among us in quiet and obscure circumstances. Another tradition, mainly in the East, emphasises God's light in Christ being made known to representatives of all the nations. There is a strong emphasis on light, God's light shining forth throughout the world for all people.

Churches and the strands of Christian tradition, just like individuals, have different characters and emphases. It is always good to be aware of these. There will be times in our lives when one aspect is more meaningful for us, than at others.

Even though the decorations are down and lights turned off and put away for another year around January 6th in the church calendar the season of Epiphany continues until the beginning of February. Music, readings and the words we use in church give us the opportunity to ponder upon the message of Christmas and Epiphany.

Whatever, the new calendar year brings for us personally and nationally, and in all other ways too, Christmas we trust, will have given us the opportunity

to renew our hope in God's good and loving purposes, and to renew our commitment to work with him for the peace and wellbeing of all peoples. Sometimes we know this is more quiet and hidden ways; at other times, God's presence is as of a bright shining light. At Christmas we celebrated Emmanuel – 'God is with us'; may that faith and awareness encourage and sustain us in the year now beginning.

On 15 October, the government announced a new strategy on loneliness.

In announcing the strategy, the Prime Minister acknowledged that loneliness is one of the greatest public health challenges of our time.

- Three quarters of GPs surveyed, say that they see 1 to 5 people a day who are suffering from loneliness
- Loneliness has been linked to conditions such as heart disease, strokes and dementia
- 200,000 older people haven't had a conversation with a friend or relative in the past month
- The number of over 50s suffering from loneliness is set to reach 2 million by 2025/6. This amounts to a 49% increase in 10 years

Age UK Dorchester runs a '**Reach Out**' service which provides volunteers for older people who have become lonely and isolated.

This can happen for a variety of reasons including bereavement, ill health and a loss of confidence. **'Reach Out'** can help you to access social activities or if this is difficult for you, a volunteer could visit you for a cup of tea and a chat.

Dorset Wildlife Trust would like to wish everyone a Happy New Year! We hope you have enjoyed the festive season. As the days start to lengthen we can look forward to a resurgence of wildlife in our countryside and coastal areas, not to mention beneath the sea.

If you decide to venture onto the beach for some bracing sea air, take extra care on rocks which at this time of year are often coated with a very slippery winter seaweed called Purple Laver. This red alga grows in fine filmy sheets or ribbons on the upper shore during the winter months when it is not at risk of being dried out by the sun and warmer temperatures. When spring arrives it will all but disappear, only surviving in patches lower down the shore.

Final call for volunteers!

Once again, we're on the search for enthusiastic volunteers to join the team at the Fine Foundation Wild Seas Centre in Kimmeridge Bay. Volunteers are essential in helping to run the Centre - looking after the aquarium, conducting seashore surveys, helping with visiting school groups, and assisting with engaging visitors with Dorset's amazing marine life. If you can spare a couple of days a month and are keen to find out about how you can get involved, please contact the centre directly. No previous marine experience or qualifications are required, just a passion for marine wildlife.

In February there will be an open session at the Centre where you can come along and meet the team, ask questions and find out more about the variety of work we do. We provide monthly training sessions on a variety of Kimmeridge and marine wildlife related topics and organise trips and social events through the year. Foster Caring

A Dorset foster carer is using her experience to encourage people to do the same, after a sharp increase in the number of children needing care in the county.

Jo Thomson, 48, and her husband Mark have fostered seven children over the last four years, aged four to 16. She also hosts Dorset's Children in Care Awards, where foster parents, looked after children and care leavers are celebrated.

So she was the natural choice to be Fostering Engagement Officer in a new project for Dorset County Council, which needs to recruit many more foster carers directly to avoid high agency costs and meet a growing need.

Jo said: "My daughter Amy was 14 when we decided to foster. Mark has older children, however effectively Amy is an only child and we thought it would be good for her.

"Our first placement was a 10-year-old girl, who had appeared seemingly out of nowhere after having been home schooled outside the area and therefore not in the system. She had simply appeared at social services.

"The girl stayed with us for six months and, happily, was able to return to her family when their circumstances changed.

"This being the first placement, it was challenging for Amy, but we sat down and talked it through and we all decided to carry on. I'm so glad we did.

"Amy recently secured a job working with children and much of the interview focused on her experience of fostering. It's meant she has an understanding of kids from many different backgrounds. So it's been very positive.

"We decided to drop back to offering short breaks while Amy was doing her GCSEs, then we took on a girl from Weymouth, who ended up staying with us for six months before going back to her family.

"I now offer short breaks to fit in with work. One boy, aged eight, comes to us every four to six weeks and we have a teenage girl who comes every month or so for the weekend to give her long-term foster parents a break."

It's certainly a myth that you cannot work if you foster. Jo has run her own fitness classes, SlimDance, for nine years now, and she and Mark run another health and wellness business together. This is on top of their day jobs.

"All of our jobs fit in together and we still have time to foster," she says. "It's a great balance. It's said if you love your job you never work a day in your life and that's true for me – I love everything I do.

"My social worker is brilliant. We always talk things through with her before taking a placement to see if it's going to be suitable for us and for the child. The child usually visits first; we find out what they like to eat, what their routine is etc, beforehand.

"I know it can be traumatic for children going into a foster home, but in our experience they haven't been. It always amazes me, but they've just been very practical about it and come in, and settled. They have no expectations, and no fear.

"Fostering brings its challenges and frustrations. You are battling for that child, sometimes, making lots of phone calls trying to get them the help they need. The rewarding part is seeing their confidence grow, seeing them engaging with school more. One girl suffered from terrible night terrors when she arrived, but they lessened over time.

"Of course you get attached, but it's different to adoption. One of the most rewarding things is seeing a child ready for the next stage and moving on."

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
