

JANUARY AT THE CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met in the Village Hall on 10 January 2022 as current regulations do not allow the Council to make decisions by Zoom. In order to minimise Covid risk all the doors and windows were open and understandably no member of the public attended this very cold meeting!

Budget 2022-23

The Council had reviewed the budget line by line at its December meeting and it undertook a further review before making a precept resolution to Dorset Council. Councillors recognised the very difficult financial situation facing both people and organisations. The Council's own pressures have been outlined in the previous issues of the CVN.

The Council resolved to ask Dorset Council to raise £53,447 for the Parish Council from Parish Council Taxpayers when deciding on the Council Tax for 22-23.

Housing List

In the past the Parish Council has held a housing needs list although it has no housing to rent of its own, in case other providers needed the information. The Council has decided to replace this with a housing guide with contact details for other providers such as Dorset Choice and the Corfe Castle Charity

Queens Jubilee Weekend 2-5 June

A separate report on this follows. The Council has set up a working group of Councillors to support Parish activities.

Councillor vacancy

The clerk has received two nominations for the one Councillor vacancy. As both candidates could not attend because of health-related reasons the Council will make a decision on the vacancy at its February meeting

Dorset Council report

Cllr Cherry Brooks reported on intensive Dorset Council discussions on its Budget. There has been an increase in Government grant and this together with a tax increase of 3% will enable investment in adult care services and children's' services. More savings are expected from the merger of all the Dorset Councils.

Dorset Council has been preparing a bid to the Government for improved bus services, which will be publicised shortly under the title "Bus Back Better".

For Dorset Council over the last 2 years Covid issues has taken priority and still will have priority in that if new waves come about there are contingency plans in place, but now Dorset Council is looking to refocus on its prioritises. The new Council came in 2 years ago, promised residents that they would not cut services, promised they would do transformation, but less than 1 year in Covid hit, which meant they could not concentrate as much on what they wanted to do.

This year should see significant strides forward in the way they operate, now they are a larger player, having combined many districts, they are being heard more in Westminster, they have had some considerable grants, for example $\pounds19$ million for the environment.

Their settlement this year was larger than expected, and they received $\pounds 10$ million from the government.

Norden to Corfe cycle route. Cllr Brooks confirmed this project is on-going and that Dorset Council have not set any final completion date.

Bins – There is a new portfolio holder for this area Cllr Laura Millar. Cllr Millar has started to make changes with the aim of making the area more customer focused and customer driven. Cllr Millar has sent out a press release about the disruptions and what Dorset Council are doing to address the issues, from recruitment to retention, which can be found on the Dorset Council website.

National Trust report

Just over 7,500 visitors came to the Castle in December and in 2022 the Trust is planning evening opening on some days in addition to normal opening

There will not be large-scale events in 2022 such as Vikings and Saxons and Civil War re-enactments but they may return in future years

February 18th 2022 2.00pm, Village Hall Gen Crisford: *The Re-introduction of Beavers to Purbeck*

Beavers were a key part of our wetland ecosystems until they were hunted to extinction 400 years ago. Eurasian Beavers are native animals; they evolved alongside our other native fauna and flora and until extinction had successfully coexisted in Great Britain since the last ice-age. It is believed that bringing back Eurasian beavers at carefully chosen sites could benefit Poole Harbour and the rivers which flow into it, and local communities are helping to make it a reality.

The release of beavers on Purbeck could occur within a few months. Come and hear about the scheme and how it is progressing.

We Need Your Help

Ten years ago the library was threatened by closure and only survived by being taken over by the village community. We remain connected to the Dorset Council Library Service book stock and all their digital systems so the service is exactly the same as any other library in Dorset. The difference is that we administer and provide staff for the library ourselves. Our team of volunteers ensures that the library remains open and available to all for free.

Corfe Castle Surgery

Another month has passed in a whirl of Covid infections and changing guidelines!

Unfortunately we are still very much in the pandemic and try as we do to keep ourselves free from infection and illness, there have been weeks over the previous months where staff have been off with Covid or having to self-isolate due to children or family members having the virus. This has meant changing clinics for the Nursing and GP team or a delay in dispensing of medication.

All of the staffing team have worked extremely hard and non-stop through the pandemic to try and continue to offer a level of service that patients of the Practice would expect. Therefore, we would politely ask that if you have an appointment booked, please try and attend at the time given or let us know with as much advance notice as possible that you will not be able to attend.

Also note that due to restrictions in the waiting room you may have to wait outside or in your car before being called into the building.

If it is a telephone call you are expecting, please note that these calls may be made before or even after the provisional time given. This can be due to medical emergencies or staffing issues. Please be kind to the reception staff when enquiring as they won't always know what the clinician has been dealing with.

Finally, the dispensary are finding ever increasing numbers of patients that need their medication within the 3 working days that we require to safely dispense your medication, please do not put pressure on them to issue it on the same day. If you use the Systmonline or NHS app to order medication, please remember that although you can order it at any time, the request will only be picked up on the next working day. i.e. orders placed on Friday night, Saturday and Sunday will not be actioned until Monday.

Please continue to stay safe.

The next one is on Thursday 27th of this month so do please come and join us.

The next PPG meeting is planned for February 24th. If there are any matters you'd like raised at the meeting do get in touch via the Surgery or marysabbenclare@gmail.com before then. Like all the PPGs of the six GP Practices in the Purbeck Primary Care Network (Swanage, Corfe, Wareham, Sandford, Wool, Bere Regis) we are focussing on looking at how the surgery and PPG can best communicate with the patients. The Covid pandemic has shown the need to identify how people prefer to be kept informed or contacted. We are keen to find as many ways of getting in touch as possible, both online and with those who are not on the internet. We would welcome all your views and ideas. Don't forget there's now a PPG suggestions box in the waiting room if you'd like to use that!




Mills in and around Corfe Castle

There were two known mills within the Town & Borough of Corfe Castle – Boar Mill (the Town's mill) and West Mill (the mill for the castle); one still stands and the other is now a ruin.

Mill Crofts

Interestingly, at the southern end of the village, on the eastern side, there were 3 Closes known as Mill Crofts (by 1769 these had altered to 5 - see map below). These fields might have originally belonged to Boar Mill, as the Byle Brook passes by both, but maybe, a very long time ago, another mill stood here too? Anyway in 1620, part of the most northerly Croft was sold along with Verger's Mead, to Joseph Collett and formed part of his charity lands held in Corfe. The land had originally belonged to John Uvedale – the one whose initials can be found on the window stops at Uvedale House and the son of Henry.



This section of the 1769 map of the town is rather worn. No. 36 was Bailey's Tenement which included 5 Meads totalling about 14 acres. Verger's Mead lay on the northside.

Vergers Mead consisted of 5 acres along with half of one of the adjoining Crofts (acreage unspecified although the Tithe map of 1844 seems to indicate it could be about a quarter of an acre). It was still being called 'Mill Croft' in 1772 and, intriguingly, 4d. had to be paid to the lord of the Manor of Worth Matravers. I have no idea why. All suggestions welcomed!

Boar Mill

How many ways can you spell the mill's name? Bordemill, Bormill, Boore Mill, Bore Mill not to mention the recent Boar Mill. In the earlier documents it is called Borde Mill. Did it originally belong to the Borde family who were marblers? A John Borde was mayor of Corfe in 1411 so speculatively there may possibly be a connection. Maybe it was from the Latin meaning northern (*borial*) since it was on the northern side of the town? I've not found anything relating to actual boars though!

The 'grist' or grinding mill's premises seems to have been divided into two with the more northerly part consisting of a plot of ground called the 'Island Garden' or 'Culliford's Plot'. It is likely to be as one of the two mills (the other being West Mill) in a survey of the castle in 1326 paying 6s. 8d. annually to the castle. There was a little dispute in the 15th century as to who actually owned the mill, but the court found in favour of Robert Rempstone then of Godlingstone. It is first mentioned by the name 'Boure Mill' in 1510 when the garden lying near the bridge and part of Boure Mill was held by the Duke of Somerset aka the Earl of Hertford. Just over 30 years later, the mill had become part of the estate of Sir William Uvedale (I haven't found the purchase details) and it passed to his son & heir, Henry (the father of John Uvedale). Henry owned the Rollington Estate.

A survey of 1572 notes that the mill had to supply 20 sexterns of ale, each containing 20 gallons, at the election of the constable. The mill had always provided the ale as an early survey, possibly of the 13th century, notes although it only had to supply 19 sexterns then. By 1631, it was down to 7 but although the amount of ale supplied varied the dues to the castle of 6s. 8d. never did.




The Dome Books of Corfe note that Richard Hayward was allowed to build a water weir in October 1689 by permission of the Mayor and Barons. This would have been built on 'waste land' and would not have been part of the original property so Richard Hayward had to pay 6d. annually for this privilege to the civic body.

The Uvedale family retained the mill until it passed via marriage to George Uvedale's grandson, Edmond Okeden in 1631 – still paying the 6s. 8d. due to the castle after 300 years. It was eventually sold by the Trustees of the last direct descendant of the Okedens to John Calcraft in about 1756/57. By then, a sum of £50 (over £5,000 in today's money) was needed to repair the mill. Captain Guy Marston, RN, sold the stone built and stone tiled house, mill and garden in May 1921. Charles H. Battrick was the tenant then and had been since 1874 (see photo).



The National Trust purchased the mill in 1992 and discovered a mummified cat along with a George III coin under the floor. Cats were thought to bring good luck and protect the occupants although it obviously failed to prevent flooding. It had ceased to grind corn in 1920 but continued to bake bread until 1952. The actual water wheel was replaced by a water turbine in the early 20th century. Its grinding mechanism is still in situ ... along with a colony of Horseshoe Bats.

Trust

Our rolling programme of conservation repairs and consolidation at Corfe Castle gets back under way this month following recent delays due to the pandemic.

Over the next few months, around £80,000 will be invested in measures to ensure Purbeck's most recognizable monument continues to inspire generations to come.

The castle's dramatic location, along with the damage done by 17th century Parliamentarian sappers, makes it very vulnerable to the effects of weather.

To counteract this, our specialist contractors will be repointing using the same traditional lime mortar employed by its Norman builders.

A surprising amount of the original medieval plaster remains, and where it is at risk of breaking away from the stonework it will be fixed back in place. The edges will then be 'feathered' so that water

runs off, rather than percolating behind and causing further damage. Locally grown sods of vegetation will meanwhile be placed on horizontal sections of masonry to absorb moisture before it reaches the vulnerable stonework beneath. This is known as soft capping.

Despite everything, stones do sometimes fall from the castle and when this happens a record is made and they are stored in a safe place.

Over the next few months we'll be taking the opportunity to put them back where they came from.

Another threat to the castle is vegetation such as ivy and valerian which takes root among the nooks and crannies.

If left unchecked this can cause damage, so the contractors will be removing larger areas of vegetation and consolidating the stonework beneath.

Works of this kind normally take place in the winter months when there are fewer visitors and will this year include some improvements to the visitor routes such as steps and handrails.

Finally, a section of collapsed wall at West Mill will be recorded and rebuilt.

Wild Seas Centre opening

The Wild Seas Centre has been closed over the winter months while we do a bit of necessary maintenance and get it all clean and fresh for the year ahead. At time of writing the plan is to re-open for the week of February half-term (19th to 27th February) and then weekends only until 1st April. From 1st April the Centre will open daily all through the season. Winter wildlife

The early months of the year can be very cold and stormy making it extremely challenging for some of our seashore and underwater creatures. Despite this it is breeding time for many. Limpets tie their spawning in with the stormy conditions, males and females throwing their wares into the sea to mix and fertilise. Following a few days or weeks of drifting in the sea, the larvae will settle into low shore rock pools with tiny shells measuring less than 0.5mm long.

Some fish are also spawning, laying eggs beneath seashore rocks, often guarded by the father until they hatch. They time it so the young fry hatch ready to feast on the spring plankton bloom which results from increasing day length.

Winter is also the time when stalked jellyfish appear in abundance at Kimmeridge, hanging off seaweeds in the shallow water of the bay. These tiny stingers attach by a stalk, preferring lots of water movement sweeping them back and forth on their seaweed fronds so that they can catch tiny crustaceans in the water. They are harmless to humans.

This time of year is also great for beachcombing – finding washed up treasures on the beach. Look for dark Mermaid's Purses mixed in with seaweed on the strandline. These are the spent egg cases of rays and vary in size and shape according to the species that laid them. There are a few different species you can find and they all have 4 'horns', one at each corner.

You can find more about all of these intriguing sea creatures when we re-open in February. We look forward to welcoming you back in.



The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

This month I have struggled to write a sermon on a short paragraph in the Bible book 'Acts of the Apostles' (Acts 8:14-17) in which I had to answer the question: 'Who or what is the Holy Spirit?' I have heard various answers to this, such as 'the fuel in the motor of faith', 'a holy ghost', and (in the Bible itself) 'a rushing mighty wind' (Acts 2:2 KJV). I tried to make my conclusions logical, reasonable, and easy to understand; and it was so difficult I thought it might make an interesting subject for this letter.

A day or two later, I re-read it. Oh help! I thought. Should my other name be Dr Who? Would a Real Theologian declare me stark, staring bonkers? Will I have the courage to actually say what I have written to a congregation? What would Professor Brian Cox think about it? Or David Attenborough?

I wrote (summarised): 'The thing to remember is that God is not confined within space and time as we humans are. God the Father, the creator of everything, is pure spirit, who for his own reasons broke through into the human world to become one of us in the human man Jesus - whilst at the same time remaining also God the Father in heaven. God the Holy Spirit is the living, but not visible to the human eye, spirit of Jesus who is also God the Father at large and active in the physical world, having access to his creation whom he has made 'in his image', entering into minds and hearts, influencing and advising, never removing human free will, always loving, invisible like the wind but visible in that the effects of his presence in peoples' lives can be seen'.

Brian Cox has shown us via wonderful photography and his soothing mesmeric voice, how the universe probably came into being over countless ages. And the Apostle Peter wrote in one of his letters: 'Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day.' (2 Peter 3:8) What is beyond and behind and further out than the universe? Isn't the human imagination without limits ... infinite? What of beauty and wonder in nature and the sublime in music, and all that we don't know about how trees communicate with each other, and why we are the only species on earth with spoken language – and is this a blessing or a handicap? David Attenborough's endless curiosity and scholar's skills are showing us a world wider, and wilder, than we could ever have dreamed of.

So are my thoughts about the Holy Spirit so far off the mark? I wonder. Don't you?

"I was really excited to see the saplings go in. It was great to see the idea come to fruition after a lot of hard work.



How is the future of Covid likely to affect us in the church?

We are not going to be without challenges and none of us can say what the future holds...we have seen the world turned upside down with Covid and churches have definitely felt the impact.

Some people will be cautious about going to church because of the risk to family members who are vulnerable – some will have been disillusioned with church, sometimes because of how their church was seen to respond to the virus and some will have already been struggling with church attendance because of the pandemic which would have given them an experience of living without going to church. There will be a wariness about congregating indoors. Some people may never get over the PTSD of the pandemic and always find large gatherings and close contact socialising difficult, and there will be a lot who feel like this.

Then there is the question, can we reopen, if so, how? Who's coming, who's not coming? On line or digital? Is the internet the future? Masks or no masks? Vaccine or no vaccine? Singing or no singing? The church will certainly not be the same after Covid. People were already drifting away from the church before Covid. Covid has hastened that drifting. Online church seems to be the norm nowadays, the larger churches have attracted a new digital audience, worship numbers have rocketed. Could post Covid see churches continue to use the internet, social media and video? Will this be the new norm? The Bible is clear in that we need regular gathering of the local church. We need each other for healthy faith and fellowship.

The Bible says in Acts 2:42 *They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer.* Will this then become "they devoted themselves to online watching, social distancing, wearing masks between each bite and praying alone"?

Whatever happens, we need to be reminded that God is in Control even if everything seems out of control. He is sovereign, it's His Church, His gospel and He has not been caught off guard by Covid. He will continue to build His church; He will continue to be glorified... "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. 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

Although we are not yet in a position to let you know the outcome of the planning application, we wanted to inform you that the application determination date has been extended to the end of February. This was necessary due to the scale of the project and the fact that some consultees' reports are still awaited. The Board continues to work towards a successful outcome for all.

Better broadband could be yours

Dorset Council, in partnership with Openreach, has been rolling out full-fibre broadband to around 3,000 premises across rural areas in the county. You can find out if you are in one of the areas to get full-fibre to the premises (FTTP) by going to <u>www.mapping.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/superfast/Checker</u> If you are one of the lucky ones to now have FTTP, the uplift in speed does not happen automatically. To benefit from this new ultra-fast technology you will need to contact your internet service provider to see if you can upgrade to a faster speed.

Not all internet service providers have FTTP packages, so you may need to consider switching to one that does when your current contract expires. There are government subsidy programmes that can help residents and businesses in rural areas improve their broadband. Dorset Wildlife Trust

Trees Please!

Now is a good time of year to carefully dig up and pot any young trees or shrubs which are growing where you don't want them. Rather than mow them, give them a second chance, and give the planet a mini-boost! If you can re-locate them on your land where they will be able to grow, give shade, add interest, provide a growing habitat and food source for all sorts of other beasties, and store carbon, please do so. If you can't provide a home for them, please let me give them a temporary home. In time, they will either be planted

round the parish, or perhaps first spend some useful growing time at the prospective tree nursery at Kingston before being planted in their final location.

Any species are welcome, but especially native ones (e.g. oak, ash, birch, lime, sycamore, willow, hazel, alder, poplar, hawthorn, yew, DED-resistant elm) or European introductions (e.g. horse chestnut, sweet chestnut, Norway maple, other poplars, plane, walnut, other oaks). Hawthorn seedlings/saplings would be particularly welcomed for some on-going hedging needs.

This is one part of the efforts of the Corfe Castle Parish Council Environment Group to help address the Climate and Ecological emergency.

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Rarely spotted woodpeckers

If you go down to the woods today you won't be sure of a big surprise, but you might get lucky and spot the rarest of the three woodpeckers that breed regularly in England. The green woodpecker is the largest and most brightly coloured of the three (and is depicted on cans of Woodpecker cider.) The great spotted woodpecker

is the commonest but is smaller – about the size of a starling - and boldly patterned in black, white and red. The lesser spotted woodpecker (LSW) is by far the smallest and rarest of the three. LSW are tiny - about the size of a sparrow - with a boldly striped black and white back. LSW lack the bright red patches under their tail and the big white shoulder patches which are characteristic of the great spotted. LSW's small size, rarity, liking for treetops, and shyness mean they are rarely spotted woodpeckers. A friend told me he last saw one in a garden in Sandford 25 years ago. The last time I saw one was in Surrey on Christmas Day 1976. That was the day I got my Hornby train set - so a real red-letter day for me. LSW were at their most abundant in England in the late 1970s but even then they were not common, and they have been getting rarer ever since.

LSW can be found in any woodland but seem to prefer well-wooded areas especially those with lots of dead wood, and woods near wetlands, streams, or rivers. They often nest near the edges of woods or in linear woods alongside roads or rivers. Their nest-holes are invariably in dead trees or dead parts of trees that are still alive.

In early January I went for a couple of walks around Arne, Ridge and Norden to try to renew my acquaintance with this shy little bird. Needless to say, I did not spot any rarely spotted woodpeckers. As LSW are likely to start drumming in the weeks ahead I will continue my efforts. Even if they prove to be never spotted woodpeckers, I will see lots of other woodland wildlife as my earlier searches turned up other nice birds like marsh tit, treecreeper, goldcrest and lots of firecrests (3!).


