

#### FEBRUARY FOR THE CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

"Life is like a camera. Just focus on what's important, capture the good times, develop from the negatives and if things don't turn out – TAKE ANOTHER SHOT". Oh, how true, this month saw the opening of the new playground equipment, helping create "Good Times", there were negatives as there always will be in a large project, but lessons have been learnt, so now we move forward, and start new projects and help create more "Good Times".

Corfe Castle Parish Council Housing Needs Register – The Parish Council has decided to no longer hold a housing needs register, and instead simply refer anyone in housing need to the appropriate contact. Further information including contact details can be found on the parish council website www.corfecastlepc.org.uk under the General information area or by calling the Clerk.

**Playground update** –The installation of the new "Out of the Ruins" playground equipment has been completed, plus the roundabout has been fully repaired so is now back up and working. Within minutes of the safety fencing coming down there was a family with 2 young boys who came running over and all I could hear was "again, again" as the youngest was coming down the slide. Unfortunately Storm Eunice damaged the playground fence and as a result the playground has had to be shut again.

**New Councillor** – Back in November 2021 after the resignation of a member Corfe Castle Parish Council gave Notice of Vacancy. Initially we had 2 candidates come forward and Co-option was planned for January 2022, however due to illness the Cooption was postponed until February 2022.

It is with delight that CCPC can announce and welcome Helen Sumbler to the role of Councillor. Helen's details can be found on the Parish website under Councillors.

**Annual Meeting's & Meeting Locations** – CCPC have agreed to hold their Annual Parish Council meeting on Monday 9<sup>th</sup> May 2022 at 7pm in the Bill Carter room at the Village Hall. During this meeting there will be the election (by Councillors) for the position of Council Chairman & Vice Chairman, plus appointment of Councillors to the working groups and other bodies.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on **Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> May 2022** at 7pm in the Main Hall at the Village Hall. During this meeting the Parish Council welcome feedback from parishioners on any subject they feel passionate about. Details will be confirmed nearer the time. Four years ago before Covid we had a great evening with parish community groups taking part. If any Parish organisation would like to present to the Parish meeting please contact the Clerk.

Oak Tree – During a regular monthly Council meeting a member of the public requested Council consider planting an Oak Tree as a commemorative tree for the Queen's Jubilee. After consulting with local landowners, CCPC have decided the best location available will be within the New Extension area of Gods Acre Cemetery. Further investigation by the Parish Council will now take place on costing for the tree, whilst the newly formed Jubilee Working Group will consider making the area special by adding a plaque and a seating area.

Weeds - To weed or not to weed, that is the question! A few years ago, the Parish Council took on the role of weed spraying around the parish mainly on pavements as Dorset Council was unable to offer this service anymore. As the Parish now has a Caretaker the Parish Council decided to bring this work in house, ultimately giving us more control of the areas sprayed and saving money, However, this has opened the question of whether we should let the weeds grow or kill them off by spraying/burning and which chemicals to use. If you have an opinion on this subject, please contact the Clerk preferably via email so that your opinion can be recorded. Two Councillors have been asked to lead on this: Cllr Melanie Roberts and Cllr Helen Sumbler.

**Corfe Castle Charity, New Trustee** – CCPC is delighted to support the Corfe Castle Charity request to nominate Jon Phillips as a new trustee for Corfe Castle Charty.

Parish Action Plan – The Parish Council have created a document called the "Parish Action Plan" which will be published on the website, showing you all the projects, the Parish Council is working on. If you feel there is a project, you'd like to see the Parish Council work on please contact the Clerk with your ideas or pop along to the Annual Parish Meeting in May.

**Platinum Jubilee** - The Council is delighted that we have a Platinum Jubilee committee to organise events and news of progress appears elsewhere in CVN. There will need to be fundraising to carry out all the key projects and to help with preparations the Council have agreed a grant of £500 to the Jubilee committee.

#### What does your Parish Council budget pay for?

The Council had to put up the precept this year and it is reasonable to ask where the money goes. The increase coincides with the new playground and repairs and we have been asked if the increase in precept is to pay for that.

We have spent about £29000 on the new playground, new swing chains, a new swing basket and substantial repairs to the roundabout. We paid for these from a playground reserve we created over several years and about a third of the cost came from monies paid by developers for new or converted homes. These Community Infrastructure Levy funds have to be spent soon or they have to be returned to Dorset Council.

There is therefore no direct link between the precept increase and the playground but we have decided to start to build up reserves again for future projects or unexpected problems.

The main items of the budget are:

£24225 Running the Council and undertaking work. This heading pays for the work of the Clerk as administrator and project manager, meeting hall expenses, insurance, IT systems and licences, audit costs, training etc.

£2430 Grants and Subscriptions e.g. CVN, Dorset Association of Parish Councils, CAB

£7850 Maintenance of Playground/Sports Field. This pays for grass cutting and repairs and this year includes an addition of £2500 for future replacement or major repair of equipment

£3700 Youth club (part contribution)

£7070 Caretaker costs (7 hours a week) and pavement weeding

£4380 Maintenance of God's Acre including rates and rubbish collection. This is partly offset by income from plots

£4900 additions to Reserves for elections and unforeseen items. General reserves are still below the recommended level

Toilets and residents car park: the running costs are paid for from resident car parking permits

The precept levied is slightly lower than the total of these items above as some income is budgeted for.

Our key maintenance contracts have been awarded after tender and all other costs are closely scrutinised by the Council.



#### **Church Knowle Parish Council**

The Parish Council held its usual monthly meeting at the Church Knowle Village Hall on the second Tuesday of this month having skipped the January meeting on Covid advice from the DAPTC. The Council still has casual vacancies for two Councillors and any residents of the Parish with an interest in local affairs are invited to join. The meeting ran from 6-30pm to 9-45pm.

The meeting opened with the Public Discussion period where a resident presented plans in advance of making a formal application to the Planning Authority. This enabled her to discover any potential difficulties and address them prior to submitting a formal planning application. This was a very good presentation and a useful informal discussion followed in which some difficulties were highlighted. Any suggestions and discussion were naturally informal and the Council will assess without prejudice to any previous discussions the application entirely on its merits when submitted.

#### Neighbourhood Plan

The Localism Act 2011 intends to place more power in the hands of local communities. The Act provides for communities to produce a Neighbourhood Plan that has real statutory power and must be consulted and observed in local affairs. These Plans have been embraced by many Parish Councils, Arne has completed one, many other Parish Councils have either completed one or are in the process of doing so. More about the Localism Act can be found at <sup>1</sup> "A Plain English Guide to the Localism Act" and more about Neighbourhood Planning can be found at <sup>2</sup> "Neighbourhood Planning".

In order for the Plan to have the weight of law behind it, it must be put together using the correct processes and passed by a formal community referendum. A locally convened steering committee gathers the information and leads the process at community level and in order that the correct requirements are all covered most plans are guided by an external specialist consultant. If all proceeds well a Neighbourhood Plan can can be formulated, published and "made" (passed into law) in about 18-24 months.

Church Knowle Parish Council supports development of a Neighbourhood Plan for our Parish and would like to hear from those living in the Parish who would like to be part of moving this forward. There will be a discussion about next steps with our Neighbourhood Plan at the next Parish Council meeting on 8<sup>th</sup> March. #### Les Bugler Memorial Tree Seat

More donations towards this memorial tree seat have been received and the Parish Council sends its appreciation and thanks to all donors. The seat is safely stored and a small working group stands poised to construct and install it on a concrete plinth when the weather is finer in spring. A tree will also be selected and planted then.

#### **Planning**

The planning application (06/2021/0262) to develop agricultural land to the south of the village at Withy lakes, to which the Parish Council objected, has been scheduled to go to full planning committee but no date has been set for this yet.

The planning application, retrospective (06/2020/0463) to expand the use of the furniture studio/workshop and erect outbuildings at Creech Gallery, Creech Road, to which the Parish Council objected and which was refused by the Planning Authority is to go to appeal but no date has yet been set.

The Council voted to add its name to the list of supporters of the Dorset Deserves Better campaign to oppose the Dorset Council's draft local plan to build some 40,000 houses that "will encroach on our precious Green Belt, our famous Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty, and other locally valued greenfield land". This is a well organised formal campaign lobbying the Dorset Council and more can be found on their website<sup>3.</sup>

#### **Footpaths**

A plan is afoot to have the Ramblers Association perform an informal walking survey of these with a view to putting them into good order and certainly performing any essential work that needs to be done but this will be best done when the weather improves as we move towards Spring.



The group meets every Wednesday at the Wareham Youth Club from 6-8pm and are always welcoming to new members!



PPYG also had an incredibly successful Christmas event, have a read of their reflections below:

The 'Green Christmas' Event was a gathering organised by Planet Purbeck Youth Group to try and engage more of the youth in environmental activities. We hosted a range of activities such as wreath making from natural willow, a

'natural' photo wall and put up some environmental quizzes.

We met up at 2 to divide into decorating the youth centre and collecting willow from the common. Once we had prepared everything, including a Christmas film, hot chocolate station and food tables. Once people came in they put pine cones in boxes for a survey and then walked round different stations, trying different things out and talking to everyone. Our aim was to have an informal 'get



together' with a subtlety of awareness for the environment where people could hang out and enjoy getting ready for Christmas! We watched a short environmental film before our film, one in between and one at the end, but only about 2 minute long so as to not overload people with information. We then set up a walkout survey while people filtered out.

I think the event went really well and we achieved what we wanted to as there was quite a turn out for people, and we managed to make some people aware whilst also not overloading them. We managed to get at least one new member and they said they enjoyed the quiz before the film.

I think that if we were ever to host another event, we have learnt that not pressuring people to do certain activities and letting them mingle worked quite well. Also, putting up activities that would interest teenagers more (eg the selfie wall) were very popular.

#### **Corfe Castle Surgery**

As I write this article it is with uncertainty of what changes will be made to Covid-19 regulations. I would however like to point out that whatever the outcome at the end of February, we do not anticipate many changes at the Surgery. Please continue to wear face coverings and call 01929 480441 and speak to reception to book appointments, this is for face to face or telephone appointments, and 01929 480697 for the Dispensary (10.30-12.30 Monday to Friday)

We will continue to keep the staff and patients safe in any way we can and follow guidance provided to us by NHS England.

In the coming months we will be adding Cancer awareness to our monthly articles, in the meantime, running from February to March is a Cervical Screening campaign;

The overall aim of the campaign is to increase the number of those eligible to attend their screening. It will encourage those eligible for screening - women and people with a

cervix aged 25-64 - to respond to their cervical screening invitation letter, and to book an appointment with their GP practice if they missed their last screening.

Two women die every day from cervical cancer in England, yet it is one of the most preventable cancers. Around 2,700 women in England are diagnosed with cervical cancer each year and it is the second most common cancer amongst women under 35.


#### **Patient Participation Group**

Looking back to March last year, the country was in its third Lockdown. Our PPG article was entirely focused on the extraordinarily dedicated way our Surgery staff and all the doctors, nurses, admin staff and volunteers at the Wareham Hospital Hub and elsewhere raced against time to save lives by vaccinating us as fast as possible. We shall always be grateful to them for the past twelve months of rolling out the programme and to our Surgery for continuing to give us the best possible health care in the last two years despite the challenges. Thank you again.

This March there is a new optimism. Locally three quarters of us have had boosters or third jabs. The case numbers are falling. The end of restrictions is in sight. 'Normal' life is gradually resuming. The PPG is coming back to life. It's a joy to see people celebrating being back together. Nevertheless it's not that simple. Covid is still very much with us, disrupting our working and family lives. We all continue to feel the after-effects of the Lockdown in one way or another. One effect nationally is that a reluctance to go to the local GP surgery or hospital during the pandemic has led to referrals for suspected cancer being way below normal. To help address this, Cancer Research UK is highlighting cancer awareness this year. It has published a Cancer Awareness Month Calendar. Each month the signs and symptoms of different cancers will be set out. Here our Surgery will be supporting this so don't be surprised to see their monthly publicity about particular cancers and do take time to read it. It may save lives. The PPG strongly supports this initiative. We would like to re-inforce their advice that if you have worrying symptoms please, please don't put off making an appointment a day longer. You may well have your mind put at rest but if it is cancer then the sooner it's treated the better.

The next Carers' Time is on Thursday March 31st at 10.0 a.m. in the Village Hall as usual. Do come.

The Friends of Swanage Hospital have reminded us all to make the best possible use of the Minor Injuries Unit. We wouldn't want to lose it! For urgent care the official guidance is you should call 111 or go online for an assessment. If you turn up unannounced at the MIU you will be assessed. If not treated immediately you could be directed elsewhere or given an appointment later that day or the next. Do you know what they can treat? Here goes:- Injuries to limbs, broken bones, sprains, bruises and wounds, bites, burns, wound infections, minor head injuries, foreign bodies in eyes, nose and ear, asthma, emergency contraception and possibly minor ailments. An impressive list!

#### Mills in and around Corfe Castle - Arfleet

Arfleet Mill, an ancient flour mill, stood where the Dorset Adventure Park is now close to the Corfe River. In the mid 1850s, the mill could grind 300 sacks of corn weekly driven by a water mill and the steam mill. The site included a 4-bedroomed house, a walled garden, various outbuildings and two labourers' cottages. However, there are no remains left of it today as the property became unstable due to the clay mining and was pulled down before 1920 so that the valuable deposit of ball clay that lay underneath could be mined. A few outbuildings remained but they had been removed by 2018 and the old clay pits were eventually turned into Carp Lakes.

It's not clear whether there was a dwelling by the mill originally but by 1728, a house had been erected with an enclosed garden and two orchards. In 1318, the mill was owned by Ralph de la Hide along with land at Afflington, Herston and Swanage and the mill eventually passed into the hands of William Clavell as he had married Edith, one of Ralph's daughters.



Rumour has it that after the house was demolished it was used to build Vergers Mead and some of the stone went to Rempstone.

However, a chancery case in 1408, decided that the grandson of Ralph, John Stockland, couldn't inherit the property, and so 'Alfletmulle' descended to the Bonvyle family. William Clavell possibly purchased the inheritance in 1435. The male heirs of the Bonvyles died out and it was inherited by Cecilia, the only child of William Bonville. There was a little contretemps with her eldest son (Thomas Grey, 2<sup>nd</sup> Marquis of Dorset) over her claim on the estate when she married Henry Stafford, Earl of Wiltshire. Stafford had paid Henry VII £2,000 for permission to marry the wealthy heiress. Perhaps Thomas was slightly worried that his inheritance was about to disappear!


Hutchins states that the mill was still held by Stafford in 1510 but it must have been purchased outright by Richard Clavell as on his death bed in 1510, he owned Arfleet.



Arfleet Farmhouse & buildings early 20th century


Elizabeth Clavell inherited her father's estate when she was 24 years old but only had 18 years to enjoy it before she herself died. By then she had married Thomas Dackombe of

Corfe Castle and this family held onto the property until it was sold by a descendant, the Revd. John Morton Colson to John Calcraft in the late 18th century. It remains with The Rempstone Estate today.

The Clay works (open pits) were operated by Benjamin Fayle and they were in operation here until 1926. For the train aficionados, it was 'Tiny' that was used along the tramway branching off the mainline from Norden to Goathorn. The first shaft was sunk in about 1907 with the second one opening shortly afterwards. The working shafts were situated all around the mill – even one in the garden.

#### **How are we caring for Corfe Common?**



Corfe Common is an area of nationally important grassland, home to many rare species such as waxcap mushrooms, wild chamomile, southern damselfly and a whole variety of other wildlife. However, this habitat is under threat from climate change, insufficient grazing, invasive species and atmospheric

pollution. We are working, with advice from local ecologists and following a management plan, to improve the common and boost the populations and diversity of the many species that call the common home.



Before cutting back

We have a number of projects underway or being planned for 2022, all aimed at benefitting the wildlife of the common. We have an ongoing programme of scrub control works to reduce the amount of gorse encroaching into the flower-rich grassland. We also cut back the mature gorse on rotation, ensuring

there are different ages of scrub that benefit different species. Between November and the end of February we will also be reintroducing burning as a method of managing the gorse, especially in areas we cannot access with heavy machinery. The practice is considered a carbon neutral approach as regrowth will sequester carbon equivalent to that released during burning. This will only take place away from houses, public rights of way and roads.

In early summer we also "bash" or roll the bracken which shades out other plants, to slow its growth. Bare ground "scrapes" dug on the common provide places for mining bees, beetles and reptiles to breed and hunt. We are also focusing on the common's wet areas, looking at slowing the flow of the water and letting in the light. In the wet flushes we have coppiced the willow trees

(which will grow back) and installed leaky dams, which will create pools of

water and slow-flowing streams – perfect for damsel-and dragon-flies and amphibians. In February we will also be carrying out carefully controlled burns to reduce the amount of *Molinia* grass currently clogging up some of the mires.

We are currently working in partnership with the Dorset Wildlife Trust to improve the condition of the Corfe River. This involves cutting back the trees of several sections of the river on West Common, letting in the light. This will encourage aquatic plants to grow, which will oxygenate the water and trap nutrients and sediment that would otherwise wash down and pollute Poole Harbour.





#### The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

Do you find that if you start thinking about Space, and the Big Bang, and How Everything Came into Being, you start feeling a bit mad? Because it's all too big and too difficult, too impossible to imagine. Do you think our whole universe might be only a cluster of cells in something so big in relation

to us we can't begin to comprehend it? How can Space not have any edges? Perhaps the Big Bang is too *small* an explanation, *too* understandable.

I wonder if these are the sort of questions that prompted early mankind's search for meaning in life, and way back in pre-history all over the world led to a universal reaching out for explanation of our beginnings and the purpose of our life's spans, resulting in the many origin stories proliferating wherever cultural society flourished. It's interesting that without exception all the stories involved figures or living named beings that people referred to as 'gods' - except one. All societies - except one - made images of these 'gods' and addressed prayers to them. In most cases I suspect people sort-of knew their 'images' were not the 'real gods' but having images you could see, and touch, made them easier to relate to. But from the very beginning there was one society that insisted it's 'god' was pure spirit, known simply as 'God'. The Jewish God was not confined within the limits of bodily existence. To make an image of this God was punishable by death. God is the Creator of all that is and was and ever shall be – and mankind was created 'in his image'. For convenience sake, he is referred to as 'he' but of course is genderless, and the Jews were his Chosen People.

It is this God who has come down to us in this 21<sup>st</sup> century, this 3<sup>rd</sup> Millennium since pre-history, via Judaism and the man Jesus, in the Christian faith. Because God is pure spirit he can operate in and through us mere mortals, influencing, inspiring, and using us to pass on his message to Love and trust in Him as God, and to Love our Neighbours as we love ourselves. In ages when Might was Right and Love an admission of weakness, this was radical indeed; it is hardly less radical as we emerge from the individualism that began in the 1960s into the slowly becoming ethic of solidarity with the wellbeing of all people regardless of ethnic origin, skin colour, social status, creed or gender, and the wellbeing of planet Earth itself. It seems the message of Jesus is filtering through into the very make-up of all humanity.

#### The Great Pacific Garbage Patch

You may have heard of the great Pacific garbage patch before, but have you ever seen Kimmeridge Bay's very own?

The Great Pacific Garbage Patch is a gyre of marine, mainly plastic, debris. It is located in the North Pacific Ocean, stretching from Kuroshio (the Western side of the patch) all the way to California (The Eastern part of the patch). It covers a disturbing 1.6 million Square Kilometre area and is STILL growing rapidly. Just to put the size into proportion, it is three times the size of France, virtually all plastic!

January has brought harsh waters and strong currents to the Bay, which of course means lots of flotsam and jetsam; So much so that I came across something recently I hadn't quite anticipated to ever see at our beach.

There was a large bundle of objects bobbing in and out of the water. At first glance I thought it may have been a large shoal of fish, but after a closer look I suddenly realised it wasn't the shoal of fish I was hoping for; it was in fact our very own garbage patch ebbing around the bay. A thick floating island of plastic. With the strong currents the assemblage had accumulated; several black bags, a large amount of polystyrene, fishing rope, large heavy duty pots and tubs, wrappers, bottles and other plastic packaging. Unfortunately the sea was too rough and regrettably I was unable to safely retrieve it.

Due to the state of our waters becoming progressively worse, it really would be fantastic to see as many faces as possible on the beach clean.

Yet more swooped around Kimmeridge where I worked. But over the years, I've noticed a steep decline and the last nest I saw built on my house, or those of my neighbours, was in 2013. I hope I am not alone in wanting to help these birds return to our Purbeck communities.

From March, House Martins arrive after a marathon journey across the Sahara. They tend to re-use and repair existing nests. I would love to hear from anyone who 'hosted' House Martins last year, or even until recently. That way, we can map how many there are currently, and where they might be encouraged to return. They prefer setting up home close to other House Martins, so if you are lucky enough to be a House Martin 'host' you could speak to your neighbours to find out whether they, too, would like to put a roof over the heads of these plucky and charismatic little birds. It's so much fun to watch their cute chicks poking tiny heads out, waiting for their parents to swoop in with food. They bring the magic of nature right to our doorstep.

Recently, I discovered a new charity: House Martin Conservation UK & Ireland who offer general information. They also advise communities how to install special, artificial nest cups. <a href="www.housemartinconservation.com">www.housemartinconservation.com</a>

#### Worth based Suttle Stone Quarries aims to become carbon neutral

In its drive to become carbon neutral, Dorset-based stone experts Suttle Stone Quarries has invested in an extensive combination of measures, upgrading its equipment and processes as part of its ongoing decarbonisation strategy. The company, part of the Suttles group, has succeeded in reducing its carbon footprint by almost 400 tCO2e since 2018 and its most recent measures have led to savings of nearly 100 tCO2e throughout 2021.

In its drive to become carbon neutral, Suttle Stone Quarries has so far invested in the following measures:

- 1. Topped up grants from Low Carbon Dorset to install 120 Solar panels at its Worth Matravers quarry site. The solar power generates electricity to provide power for its quarry workshop, security and any fixed electrical systems. It also helps to power the quarry's 160kW stone crusher motor, which was previously upgraded from diesel to electric, reducing the reliance on fossil fuel energy sources.
- 2. Reduced its level of diesel-powered equipment.
- 3. Upgraded from heating oil to a renewably sourced heating system at its quarry office.
- 4. Upgraded electrical fittings with energy efficient alternatives.
- 5. Transferred to renewable electricity.

Additional solar panels were installed at sister company Suttle Projects' Hamworthy site, powering its workshop whilst helping to charge its fleet of electric vehicles.

Over the past 2 years, the Suttles group, which includes Suttle Stone Quarries and Suttle Projects, has continued to invest in its vehicles and processes to reduce its greenhouse gas impact. Suttles now has a growing fleet of 19 electric and hybrid vehicles and plant, replacing petrol or diesel versions. It has also achieved 'silver' status by the voluntary 'Fleet Operator Recognition Scheme', which demonstrates operators are achieving

exemplary levels of best practice in environmental protection, as well as safety and efficiency. Suttle Projects is also accredited to ISO standards, where the

company meets internationally recognised standards for its environment management systems.

Carbon and greenhouse gas emissions are often split into scope 1, 2 & 3 for reporting and Suttles' decarbonisation strategy has allowed them to understand and target reduction to those in categories 1 & 2, with scope 3 next in their sights.

John goes on to say "Suttles' decarbonisation strategy will involve setting science-based emission reduction targets this spring, setting us further on our path towards net zero carbon. The next initiative that will help us achieve those goals is the continued roll-out of HVO, an extremely clean and low CO2 fuel, across our LGV and plant fleet."

Suttles' Director, John Suttle, added "We are always striving to minimise any negative impact we may have on the environment. As the peak demand for our electricity is during daylight hours, it made sense for us to invest in solar power, which not only mitigates soaring energy costs, but also significantly helps us in our drive for carbon neutrality. Although we have made big changes in our business so far, we recognise that these are just our first steps en route to



#### Wild Seas Centre opening

Due to unforeseen circumstances, we were unable to re-open the Wild Seas Centre in time for February half term as had been planned. However, the Centre will open on 1<sup>st</sup> April and then daily throughout the season. We look forward to welcoming you back.

#### Spring equinox tides

Around the time of the spring equinox, when the hours of daylight and darkness are equal, we get both higher highs and lower low tides. This is a good time for exploring the seashore, albeit sometimes a little cold! If you are planning to do a little rock pooling then the tides on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup>, and 21<sup>st</sup> March are particularly good, depending, of course, on the weather. However, also be aware that the tide will reach higher up the shore too, so make sure you don't get cut off. Remember to always follow the Seashore Code and replace any rocks, seaweed, and animals exactly as you found them.

#### **Increasing daylight hours**

As the days lengthen and the sun tracks higher in the sky, the seaweeds put on a spurt of new growth. This adds a splash of colour to the rockpools and shallows as the new growth has not yet been exposed to strong sunlight which tends to bleach it. Seeing the natural colours of algae makes them easier to identify, so now is a good time to hone your seaweed ID skills. You could even take part in the Big Seaweed Search organised by the Natural History Museum. Just search online for Big Seaweed Search and download their guide to some of the commoner species on the seashore.

#### **Beware! Cold Water!**

If you are heading down for a spot of rock pooling, be aware that the sea is at its coldest at this time of year. Here in Purbeck this means 8°C or below. It is so cold that it can take your breath away if you fall in. The seashore is also very slippery as rocks take longer to dry as the tide retreats. To make sure you enjoy your seaside adventure, go prepared and be extra cautious!

#### **5G** reaches Kimmeridge

Have you seen the new 5G noticeboard by the Wild Seas Centre, with information about sea safety, tides, and weather forecasts? This Dorset Council project aims to demonstrate how enhanced 5G connectivity can improve public safety and help prevent incidents. #### The Roundhead

Having served thirty years in the Metropolitan Police Force the time had come for me to retire. So what next? I decided to leave the chaotic capital I had served all those years and seek some peace and tranquillity. One place came to mind immediately and that was Corfe Castle. I had been there many times with my parents so had many fond memories. The decision was made.

I arrived late afternoon at a guest house in West Street, unpacked the car and went to my room. It had been a long day so I had a little nap before venturing into the village.

Later that evening I took a walk down West Street and entered the Fox pub to be greeted by friendly staff. After an excellent meal and a couple of pints and, feeling a bit tired, I returned to my room for an early night. However, sleep eluded me and so, after tossing and turning, I got up and decided to have stroll around the village to clear my head.

My watch showed 1.45am as I walked into the village square and continued across East Street into Station Road passing the Banks Arms and the quaint village store before arriving at Corfe Castle Station car park. Knowing you could still gain access to the platform when the station was closed, I stepped onto it where I was greeted with an eyrie silence, there being no one else abroad so late. I sat on one of the benches under the canopy and after a short while, finally fell into the elusive sleep.

Suddenly I was awoken by the sound of metal clanking and the smell of leather, on opening my eyes, was astonished to see standing a few feet away a man in ancient uniform. He was wearing a lobster-type helmet, breast plate, thigh boots and a scabbard with a very large sword. There was no doubt, this was a Cromwellian soldier, better known as a Roundhead. It sounds strange now but all I could say was "Hello", my immediate thought being he was some local who liked dressing up, but the sword worried me not to mention the time of night.

After what seemed an eternity with us both staring at each other, he spoke "I have been waiting many long years for someone to come at this exact time". Enough was enough - I stood, made my excuses and began to leave. At this he shouted "Please no! You are my only hope for eternal rest and peace."

His plea somehow touched me so I asked how I could help. He then began to tell me his plight. As he did so, the whole venue changed. There was no station and no buildings in the surrounding area except the Castle, shrouded in mist looming over us. He said he was a soldier in Cromwell's Model Army and stationed here while holding siege to the castle, during which time he and his comrades would gamble although this was frowned upon by Cromwell.

Later my soldier was accused of being a traitor having been seen several times entering and leaving the Castle under darkness. He denied the allegation but the commanding officer said they had proof from a reliable source, and he was later executed. "All I want to know is who made this false allegation and why" he said.

I left the man and walked among groups of soldiers camped around fires. No one seemed bothered by my modern attire so I began asking questions of them. Sometime later I returned to my soldier and told him what I had learned. "It would appear your friend betrayed you because you knew he was married with children and he needed the money for his family so you refused to let him gamble and he took revenge on you". He said "I thought he was my best friend. I know he was killed at Naesby, perhaps that is some justice".

The soldier thanked me, reached out and gave me a cloth pouch tied with a leather cord. With that he and the surroundings disappeared and I found myself back on the deserted platform in the early morning gloom.

On returning to my lodgings, I fell into a deep and restful sleep. Awaking refreshed, I went downstairs for breakfast. And there, on the kitchen table, was the cloth pouch. As I opened it, out fell some coins with the laureate head of Cromwell. It wasn't dream after all.

#### **JUST £5,000 NEEDED TO REACH** £25,000 APPEAL TOTAL TO RESTORE TENDER OF UNIQUE

**VICTORIAN STEAM** 

#### **LOCOMOTIVE SAVED BY A 1940s CENTENARY**

A £25,000 appeal by the Swanage Railway Trust to help fund the restoration of the tender belonging to a unique Victorian T3 class steam locomotive – and so assist its return to steam for the first time since 1948 – is just £5,000 short of its total.



The 1893-built London and South Western Railway locomotive No. 563 was due to be scrapped after the Second World War but it was saved after being chosen by British Railways to celebrate the centenary of London's Waterloo station in 1948.

No. 563 was gifted to the Swanage Railway Trust by the National Railway

Museum in 2017 with work on its £500,000 restoration beginning during 2019 using specialist contractors in Gloucestershire.

Costing £50,000, the restoration of the locomotive's tender – which stores 3,300 gallons of water and three tonnes of coal for the engine – is taking place in the Swanage Railway's Herston engineering works on the outskirts of Swanage. It is hoped to have the 81-tonne locomotive back in steam and hauling trains, for the first time in 75 years, in 2023 for the centenary of the Southern Railway and the 185th anniversary of the formation of the London and South Western Railway.

The Swanage Railway Trust's 563 Locomotive Group chairman Nathan Au said: "We are delighted the appeal to the restore the T3's tender is just £5,000 short of reaching its £25,000 total and we urge people to continue to donate to help realise the dream of No. 563 steaming past the dramatic ruins of Corfe Castle and through the beautiful Isle of Purbeck.

"The T3 is a visual delight and an evocative time machine back to the days of the Victorian railway system which helped to power the industrial revolution, develop communities and our cities as well as bringing economic development and prosperity to this country during the 19th century. "The last time that No. 563 hauled a train was in 1948 and many people thought they would never see the unique T3 locomotive work again. "We are working hard to ensure the

engine's preservation for future generations to enjoy and the best way to do that is by seeing No. 563 brought back to life so it can haul trains for the first time in 75 years.

"Given its Victorian heritage, the T3 has an incredibly rich history to tell and it is unique because it is the only surviving tender engine designed by the renowned locomotive engineer William Adams.

"No. 563 is the only steam locomotive owned by the Swanage Railway Trust and returning it to working order gives us the opportunity to show our visitors



what the railway was like during Dorset's industrial and social development in the 19th century.

"No. 563 is a direct link to the Swanage Railway's past – right back to the early days of the London and South Western Railway when holidaymakers first visited Purbeck by train," added Nathan who is a volunteer steam locomotive driver on the heritage line.

Built in 1893 for hauling express trains on the London and South Western Railway, the T3 class 4-4-0 wheel arrangement locomotive was withdrawn by the Southern Railway at the end of the Second World War in August, 1945, after it had run 1.5 million miles.

Designed by William Adams for running at up to 80mph – and built at the Nine Elms locomotive works in London – No. 563 was saved from being scrapped when selected for restoration and display at Waterloo station's centenary celebrations in 1948.
