**Playground Update:** By the time you read this I am hopeful the fence in the playground will have been fixed and children can once again explore their very own Ruined Castle.



**Cyber Security:** Corfe Castle Parish Council is moving its website and email system to a gov.uk domain. It is hoped this can be put in place within a month and will mean new email addresses for all Councillors plus the Clerk, along with a new website address. Don't worry we will be keeping are current website for a while, to guide you to the new site, and we will let you know here in CVN all the new details as soon as we go live.

**Oak Tree for the Jubilee:** You may recall a few months ago I reported the Parish Council was asked to investigate planting an Oak Tree for the Jubilee. It is with great delight I can confirm the Parish Council during the March meeting agreed to plant an Oak Tree in the New Extension area of Gods Acre.

A working group is also looking at sites for 70 trees throughout the Parish as part of our contribution to the Queen's Canopy national drive.

**Value Added Tax (VAT) Status**: CCPC are now registered with HMRC for VAT which means from February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022, all invoices issued for a business activity by CCPC will now incur VAT. No VAT is levied on burials or cremation plots.

**Corfe Castle Town Trust**: A report was submitted during the March meeting, informing Councillors of new plans to change the displays within the Museum later this year. It was stated that these works are possible due to legacies left by Bill Carter and Graham White.

Weed clearing on pavements and kerbs: CCPC would like to thank those who contacted the Parish Council letting us know your views on weeds and how to manage them. CCPC have taken stock of those comments and have agreed to trial a prevention scheme to keep the weeds at bay without the use of chemicals. CCPC will keep an eye on the weed situation and if the prevention method does not seem to be working will revisit how to manage them.

**Platinum Jubilee:** Lots of work is underway by the Jubilee Committee with updates and new announcements all the time. For the latest information on what's on and when please visit our website and see the announcements elsewhere in the CVN.

Lorries through the Village. Lorry sizes are increasing and the village experiences a number of oversized vehicles which can't easily pass through Corfe Castle. The Council will start a discussion with other local Councils about whether there should be regulations on size and hours of use for the largest vehicles. A member of the public whose company operates lorries advised of the need to avoid unintended consequences of any regulations

  Recommend: The tree mentioned in the application is located in the beer garden of the Greyhound and it does not directly overhang the back garden/patio area of 16 East Street. There is a Holly bush, also located in the Greyhound beer garden, which does directly overhang 16 East St.

  There would appear to be no reason to cut 20 feet from the top of the tree. We have assumed that due to the location of the tree, it is covered by a Tree Preservation Order.
  - There possibly is a case to cut back the Holly bush but it was noted that some of the main trunks are thick enough to warrant a separate Tree Works Application.

The owner of the Greyhound Inn informed us that the beer garden is leased from the National Trust and believes they should be asked to comment. We requested an extension to the comment due date to enable the NT to comment/react as they deem appropriate?

# **Dorset Council update.**

**Covid update:** Dorset was seeing a sustained fall in Covid numbers up until March; now however numbers are rising again. DC urge everyone to remain vigilant, wear masks, if possible, stay 2m apart, and wash your hands regularly.

**Ukrainian Refuges:** Dorset Council request rather than donating items please donate cash to either Save the Children or the Red Cross. The government resettlement scheme goes live 18th March. People that can offer a room or a couple of rooms, annex's etc, are being asked to commit to 6 months minimum, rooms must be a good size and fit for purpose. Households accepted onto the scheme will receive a payment of £350 per calendar month to cover items such as extra heating and electric. Homeowners are not expected to supply food but may wish to. The refugees are expected to look for work as they will be receiving benefit. Further info on this can be found on the DC website.

**Fuel Poverty:** Dorset Council have 19,000 people living in fuel poverty. Those eligible for fuel payment support who feel they would not be disadvantaged can donate the money. £75,000 has been donated so far and has helped the older generation to stay warm over the colder months. Anyone in fuel poverty who needs help should contact the Citizens Advice.

**Land Searches:** In October 2021 Dorset Council was struggling with the amount of land searches being applied for when people buy / sell homes. It was taking on average 62 days to process the application, however with a lot of hard work and effort the process is not taking on average 26 days, Dorset Council is still working to improve this.

**Swanage Ambulance Car being retained:** Great news; which is partly to do with the pressure group, but also partly due to what is happening to the Wareham Hub. The NHS were going to build a medical centre there, but have pulled out, and have decided to reinvest some money in the area, including the ambulance car, and Wareham Hospital.

**Land released for Affordable Homes:** Due to the NHS not building on the Wareham Hub site, the land has now been released to Dorset Council to build affordable homes including affordable homes for people with special needs.

**Tricuro**: Tricuro is a care company, currently jointly owned by Dorset Council and Bournemouth, Christchurch and Poole (BCP) Council. Before becoming 2 unitary authorities the system worked well however Dorset Council believe the priorities are different now and have served notice with Tricuro with BCP taking this on. Dorset Council has set up a new care company called Care Dorset.

**Next Council Meeting** – Monday 11<sup>th</sup> April 2022 (meetings are held on the second Monday of each month), at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter room. To start the meeting is a public half hour, so please come and join us and have your say.

# **News from the Library**

Easter falls on the date we usually hold the monthly talks so there will be no event this month. However, next month sees the return of the talk from February that had to be postponed due to the severe storm warning.



# May 20<sup>th</sup> 2022, 2.00pm, Corfe Castle Village Hall. Gen Crisford (National Trust): *The Re-introduction of Beavers to Purbeck*

Beavers were a key part of our wetland ecosystems until they were hunted to extinction 400 years ago. Eurasian Beavers are native animals; they evolved alongside our other native fauna and flora and until extinction had successfully coexisted in Great Britain since the last ice-age. It is believed that bringing back Eurasian beavers at carefully chosen sites could benefit Poole Harbour and the rivers which flow into it, and local communities are helping to make it a reality.

The release of beavers on Purbeck could occur within a few months. Come and hear about the scheme and how it is progressing.

# Weeds around villages in Corfe Castle parish

A Parish Council Working Party was recently formed to look into weed control options instead of killing them with weed killer, and reported back at the March Council Meeting.

The following hierarchy of weed control was agreed:

- 1. Prevention
- 2. Hand weeding (where safe to do so)
- 3. Non-toxic household chemicals
- 4. Thermal heat lance / torching

A selection of recipes for weed control using non-toxic chemicals can be found by a quick search on the internet, we found the following recipe and instructions on the Daily Express website:

Add 3 tablespoons of salt to 1 litre of household 5% white vinegar and stir until dissolved. Mix in 3 tablespoons of washing up liquid. Add the mixture to a spray bottle and you are ready to get spraying. For the best results, spray any weeds at noon, when the sun is at its highest; the sun will help to dry out the weeds once the mixture hits them.

The Council are also arranging a combined weeding and litter picking Working Party to spruce up our village ahead of our Jubilee celebrations, see details below, and before this we're proposing week beginning Monday 4<sup>th</sup> April as "Weeds Week"!

Village residents are requested to clear and weed the area of pavement / verge directly outside of their property, if possible, so the communal areas can be focussed on by the Working Party. Why not get together with neighbours to weed and litter pick your street during Weeds Week?

# Jubilee 'Queen's Green Canopy' Projects Update

- ➤ We're striving to plant **70 trees for 70 years** within the parish. We're in direct contact with Dorset Council about several suitable sites we've identified. We're seeking further sites and will consider private land **Any suitable offers???**
- ➤ A wider project of recording 70 trees being planted for each of the 70 years of reign (yes, that really is 4900 trees!) is also under way. We've already recorded an impressive 2200 in the 2021/22 planting season. Do you have evidence of trees you've planted since October 1st 2021, or are planning before 31st March 2023. # **Water Saving**

## Churchyards

'No-mow' areas were trialled in the churchyards at Kingston and Corfe Castle last year. As a result, several rare orchids were found growing in Kingston - therefore their 'no-mow' area is being extended. In Corfe Castle, it's hoped that they'll also repeat/extend their 'no-mow' again this year.

## **Grass Verges**

# **Church Knowle Parish Council**

Now that the COVID regulations have all but disappeared the Parish Council is reverting to its normal practice of alternating between the Church Knowle and Furzebrook village halls. The April meeting and other even months will be at Furzebrook.

The March meeting opened as usual with the Public Discussion period in which two planning applications that had previously been submitted, but were not clear were clarified and described by the applicants. This enabled the Council to make an informed decision later in the meeting.

# Neighbourhood Plan

The Localism Act 2011 aims to give more power to Parish Councils and organisations at a local level. While how much has been achieved is open to debate the Act does allow for a Neighbourhood Plan, a statutory instrument that must be consulted and followed in any government decisions, including planning, that affect the local community. These plans have an area over which they hold sway, more often than not the parish boundary (keep it simple); there is a predefined process that must be followed that culminates in a formal referendum. The Plan then passes into law.

A steering committee drawn entirely from local people specifies what will be in the Plan and they are helped with the process by an external independent consultant. The government provides grants which will normally cover the whole cost of the consultant and any other expenses (tea, biscuits, hog roasts?).

Church Knowle has applied for and been awarded a grant sufficient to cover the preliminary stages with a scoping exercise and is proceeding with this under the guidance of a consultant to see whether we want to commit to the making of a Neighbour Plan. The best qualified consultant presented to the Council at the meeting and he was duly appointed. Anyone who is interested in finding out more or being on the steering committee can contact the clerk (clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk) or come to the next Parish Council meeting.

# Missing Postbox - Creech Bottom

The postbox at Creech Bottom is missing. The Royal Mail says that "the post box was unfortunately stolen and they have had a substantial number of post boxes being stolen in Dorset area. There has been instances

when we have replaced stolen post boxes only for the replacement to be again stolen. Therefore at present we are not replacing the boxes, to reduce the risk of customer's mail being lost." The absurdity of this argument is plain, taken to its conclusion the best way to remove the (previously very small) risk of customer mail being lost is for customers not to write letters at all. It you are going to have a mail service you must have post-boxes. If there have been a substantial number of post-boxes stolen then there must be a substantial number of communities suffering with a much diminished postal service.

This leaves people having to get into their cars to drive to the nearest town to post a letter. Scoring very badly on all of the current markers: environment, traffic, economic and geopolitical (using oil!).

It has always been a criminal offence to interfere with the mail and the latest revision of the law is the Postal Services Act 2000. If the motive is the value of the post-boxes themselves (scrap or otherwise) it should be possible to replace these with boxes of a modern material with no market value. If it is for the mail itself there can be little value in tax returns and birthday cards even the days of Postal Orders are long gone. Not only has there been no community consultation about the "decision" not to replace the post-box but the Mail does not seem to be putting much resource in to the problem. A complaint to Offcom will be forthcoming although Poirot is more likely (eventually) to produce a result. Perhaps a letter to Offcom would be best but alas where to post it!

In the meantime there is a petition for people to sign in the Lookout Stores, Stoborough BH20 5AZ. Replace Our Postbox!

# The Playground

A problem has arisen with dogs fouling the Council-run playground by the New Inn. All dog owners know the regulations and it is especially important to observe these rigorously in a children's playground where there are very real and serious risks to health. The Council is considering erecting signs which will be a shame as prescriptive signs in any community should be kept to a minimum.

Now that spring is coming those tasks that have been deferred over winter are rising to the top of the list. It will not be long before the Les Bugler commemorative tree seat is installed on a concrete pad in the playground together with a tree to mark the Queen' Platinum Jubilee.

# **Next Meeting**

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 6:30pm at the Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> April. The Parish Council is currently three people short of its full complement of nine and anyone in the Parish is welcome to join the Council. Anyone can come to the meetings and make a representation in the public discussion period or simply observe proceedings.



We have bought a waiting room Blood Pressure Monitor for use by all of our patients. The monitor can be used before seeing a GP or Nurse and it may help with the demand we have for appointments.

We still need to restrict the number of patients in the waiting room at any one time, but you will be offered the use of the monitor when contacted about booking an appointment.

Please do not just turn up to use the machine without asking the reception team if it is convenient. The machine is screened off but it would be beneficial to wear short sleeves or layers that can be easily removed.

There are full instructions in place of how to use the monitor but please ask if you need help in adjusting the height of the stool and how to sit to get the most accurate reading. When your reading has been taken a ticket will print out for you to add your name and weight to and can be handed in to reception or to the Nurse.

Many thanks to everyone involved and for donating money to the Surgery so that we could purchase the monitor, it will be well used everyday!

With Covid-19 still around, please continue to stay safe and take precautions that you can. We will update you about 2<sup>nd</sup> Covid Boosters in due course as we are still waiting on confirmation of the vaccines in Purbeck.



## New Mills, close to Scotland Farm

Out on the heath, adjoining to Scotland Farm, there is an area called 'New Mills'. Some of the land there was bequeathed to the Corfe Castle Charities in 1621 by Sir Edmund Uvedale (not the one with the elaborate tomb in Wimborne Minster although they were related). The rent was to be used to maintain the poor folk living in the Almshouse. Some of the land had originally been rented to his parents and grandparents in January 1538/9 by Sir Edward Willoughby, his wife, Dame Anne and their son, Henry for 12s. yearly.

By 1743, the rent for this tenement had risen to £12 p.a. This may have included more land than the original tenancy as a survey of 1550 notes that the Uvedales were free tenants for one part of New Mills, thus paying no rent, but did pay 12s. as tenants for another part. Obviously, Sir Edmond donated the land he owned to the Charities, and I would like to suggest that the other part they rented, now forms part of Scotland Farm. All of the land lay on the other side of the Corfe River from Rollington Farm.

The deed of 1539 just mentions the ground, commons, meadows and pasture at 'Newmyll' which adjoined Rollington Farm – no mention of an actual mill -

but one existed there in 1757 when 'a grist or flower mill called New Mills' part of the manor of Rollington was sold to John Calcraft. It could have been pulled down when the Rollington fields were improved for the meadow drowning scheme but the water-grist mill is mentioned again in 1759 so there is only a small timeframe of about 12 years before a sketch map dated 1772 was produced for the Calcraft Estate showing no mill whatsoever. I have no idea where this particular mill was or whether it was the same one mentioned at New Mills in the Langton Wallis court records as 'New Mills' lay in that parish rather than Corfe's.

The Willoughbys were lords of the manor of Langton Wallis (this parish no longer exists and has mostly merged into Langton Matravers) which included land in what was then 'Estlangton' called '*Newmille*'. The court records refer to a mill. Another deed (undated but possibly late 13<sup>th</sup> century) notes a John Le Wallis as owner of the property. He was the son of Ingram le Wallis who gave his name to this manor. He'd purchased it from Albreda de Lincoln for £100.

From these court records, we know in the early 1400s, that a mill stood by a ford with a Pound constructed beside it. By 1407, the road that went through the ford was in a bad state of repair and eventually became impassable and the tenant at '*Nuemull*' was issued with a fine for allowing his house and buildings to become 'ruinous'.

In 1487, a new mill had been built, a fulling mill for cloth, and this is possibly where the plural comes from in the name 'New Mills' as, speculatively, there could have been two mills in operation then. The only two roads shown on the 1586 map are the one to Sharford Bridge and one passing from Norden through Middlebere Heath onto Slepe. But as to where the mill, or mills, stood is a conundrum. Obviously by a ford but any suggestions would be welcomed!





# The Reverend Anne Bond writes

By the time you read this we will be heading fast towards Easter; that glorious celebration of Almighty God's resurrection of Jesus and all that was achieved for humanity through it. Saint Paul wrote words to the effect: 'if there was no resurrection, our Christian faith is worthless'.

Nowadays we tend to think of Easter in terms of cute Easter bunnies, yellow chicks emerging from a nest of brightly decorated Easter eggs, bright white lambs bouncing with wriggling tails in flower-decked green fields, and three crosses silhouetted against a romantically rosy sunrise sky with the words He Is Risen. All these things are beautiful symbols of new life - the *renewing* of life – and quite right too, there's nothing wrong with that.

However, with the invasion of Ukraine, it is being borne upon us that evil in its nastiest form is still among us. Terrible death and destruction is being rained upon thousands of innocent people who have done nothing to deserve it, all at the will of one self-deluding power-crazed individual. But what's new? Think back into the history of humanity all over the world.

Before Jesus, might was right, the biggest bully always won, and winning was what counted. But the One and Only True and Living God is the personification of Love. Love created the world and every living thing in it, including us. It must have almost broken God's heart to see the creatures He had made in his own image becoming corrupted. He endowed us with infinitely intelligent minds, speech, and endlessly creative capabilities – and yet, we seemed unable to resist wrongdoing. No wonder he decided to take action. In the person of his human Son Jesus he broke into humanity's history in order to set in order a new system of living: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, soul and strength, and Love your neighbour as yourself'. And then, as the person of the human Jesus, he took onto his own shoulders the guilt and regret and infinite sin of all humanity, past present and future, and gave his own human life, the life of Jesus, as the last ever sacrifice for sin. Three days after his crucifixion Jesus was restored to life - as the signal that redemptive forgiveness was now possible, and that there is life (though perhaps not exactly as we know it now) after human death. No-one has ever disproved the resurrection, though many have tried to.

Since Jesus, humanity has been slowly becoming more what our Creator intended. It is tragic to see the terrible fall-back that has befallen Ukraine. But ultimately evil can no longer win, as world-wide reaction is demonstrating. With one voice we cry to God for love and peace to prevail.

### **Pioneer view**

Dear Friends,

In this month's Pioneer view, I would like to share with you some exciting developments in relation to our new groups and an update on our other activities as we seek to grow compassionate inclusive communities.

On April 22nd in Corfe Mullen, we will be running our 1<sup>st</sup> wellbeing drop-in. This will happen at the village hall between the times of 10-12 noon. A key part of this drop-in will be Social Prescribing. This will be the 1<sup>st</sup> of many drop- ins we hope to open in other communities.

Social prescribing is a relatively new intervention. In fact, our befriending Scheme is linked up with a Social Prescriber who works from a local GP surgery.

Social Prescribing works for a wide range of people, including:

- People with one or more long-term conditions
- People who need support with their mental health
- People who are lonely or isolated
- People who have complex social needs which affect their wellbeing

Social Prescribing offers communities a significant avenue to support all diverse groups and people, who need help and support. This is exactly why the Growing Compassionate Communities charity seeks to embrace this.

The Growing Compassionate Communities hidden disabilities scheme will seek to dovetail with the Social Prescribing drop-ins, helping to create compassionate inclusive communities

But what is hidden disability? Hidden disabilities are not immediately apparent (hidden) for example mental health challenge's, such as depression. The hidden disability may also have Neurological roots that are not visible.

This GCC scheme will seek to make hidden disabilities visible through the wearing of a green ribbon. Moreover, we will be recruiting hidden disability champions, they will be identified through the wearing of a green wristband.

Both projects will go a long way to create compassionate inclusive communities for all diverse groups and people.



# Suttle Stone Quarries' Planning Application to Continue Quarrying

Suttle Stone Quarries, local employer to 50 staff, started a planning process in 2012 to continue its quarry works on the Isle of Purbeck. However, with quarrying reserves coming to an end at its Swanworth Quarry site in Worth Matravers over the next few months, Suttles' planning application with Dorset Council to continue quarrying on the Isle of Purbeck is currently ongoing.

At capacity, Suttles' Swanworth Quarry site supplies approximately 50% of Dorset's required crushed stone to the area, which is used as a sub-base for construction schemes, rock armour on sea defence works, gabions and decorative chippings. The Suttle family has worked in the natural stone and quarrying business on the Isle of Purbeck since the 1920s. The quarrying is currently operated across two sites: Swanworth Quarry in Worth Matravers, and California Quarry in Swanage.

Suttles' Director, John Suttle said "Over the past few years, we have been working very closely with Dorset Council and other organisations, such as the Environment Agency and Natural England, to ensure the proposed new quarry will benefit the local economy whilst minimising the impact on the environment. As Swanworth serves the very local markets of Purbeck and Poole/Bournemouth, it actually provides an environmental benefit in terms of massive haulage CO2e savings compared to alternative sources of crushed stone."

"The next phase of the planning application process will be a further public consultation made by Dorset Council. We are hopeful that a positive decision will be made shortly, especially as our quarrying reserves will be coming to an end at our Worth Matravers site over the next few months. Like all organisations, we need to plan for the next phase of business, whatever that looks like, so that we can be around to support the local community for many more years to come."

"We are always striving to benefit the local area, including working hard towards becoming carbon neutral. The measures we have brought in so far, such as investing in solar panel energy and more environmentally-friendly

equipment, have already brought in savings of almost 400 tCO2e since 2018."

"Conservation is also close to our hearts: as phases of quarrying finish Swanworth Ouarry, we are continuously providing biodiversity significant improvements. We achieve this by cultivating rare limestone grassland habitats in the completed quarry areas with the help and advice from Dr Barbara Smith. a renowned ecologist on habitat

restoration projects, specialising in aggregate sites. We also implement a meticulous cattle grazing regime to help suppress weed growth. In what was once farmland, then quarry, the end result is wild grassland, featuring various species of flora and fauna including quail, stoat, adder, hare and deer, which are regularly on view. Habitat creation is something that the quarrying industry has become particularly adept at over the decades, and we like to think we are a great example, having previously restored quarries in Swanage as well as achieving excellent restoration results at Swanworth."

"As Suttles has been part of the Isle of Purbeck quarrying scene since the 1920s, we know that our service benefits the local community in 3 key areas. The first is to significantly reduce the carbon footprint. If supplies had to be transported here by a company much further away, potentially in the Mendips area, this would not only increase the carbon footprint by potentially thousands of tonnes of CO2e per year, but also the number of larger articulated lorries on our local roads."

"The second benefit is providing local jobs for local people. Currently, we employ a loyal team of 50 staff, boosting the local jobs market. Our team have all been comprehensively trained in their roles and drivers take part in the voluntary 'Fleet Operator Recognition Scheme', which demonstrates operators are achieving exemplary levels of best practice in environmental protection, as well as safety and efficiency."

"The third area is pricing. By providing a local service, our crushed stone prices are lower compared to importing products from around the country. Our customers, such as local builders and gardeners, are already feeling the pinch

with rising inflation, energy, and transport costs, so a further increase to supply chain costs by moving supply to a non-local company could further impact on their businesses' profitability."

Suttles is a family-run ethical business with sustainability at the core of its

values, employing 115 staff in Dorset. Suttles comprises a group of companies including Suttle Stone Quarries and Projects, with 4 Suttle operating sites based across Dorset, including two in the Isle of Purbeck, and sites at Mannings Heath and Hamworthy, Poole. Suttle Stone Ouarries offers the sale and delivery of crushed

limestone and aggregates for architectural, landscaping, and civil engineering applications; gabion and rock armour, used in coastal and waterways protections schemes; earthworks collection services; and an inert waste recycling facility. Its quarry, Swanworth Quarry at Worth Matravers, is currently celebrating its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Suttle Projects offers national civil engineering, earthworks, piling and marine solutions. Suttle Projects works closely with the national rail network to provide civil engineering and is also working with BPC Council to replace its beach timber groynes to renew coastal defences. 

## The Purbeck Heaths – National Nature Reserve

This month has seen the culmination of an intense period of work across the Purbeck Heaths landscape. As you'll hopefully be aware this 'super' National Nature Reserve was designated in 2020, bringing together land stretching from Gold Point at the top of the Arne peninsula to the A351, across to the shores of Studland and out to Brownsea Island.

Over the past year we have been creating a single grazing unit on the western part of the landscape, to allow for wilder grazing and the introduction of pigs. The natural processes resulting from better grazing is just what some of the rarest bare ground loving heathland specialists need to survive. To create this single unit we've put up a new perimeter fence, and installed cattle grids. We've also removed a substantial amount of internal fencing between Arne, Middlebere, Slepe and Stoborough heaths. Animals will be out on the new grazing unit this spring.

As a part of the same project we have been working with partners and stakeholders across the area to develop a Sustainable Tourism Plan and information including signs, a leaflet and a new website. These were launched at RSPB Arne on Wednesday 9th March, with those who have been involved in creating them. It has been a real team effort across the landscape of communities, businesses and organisations that live and work within or alongside the heaths. We're proud of making this happen, during a fairly unpredictable year where everyone has been both impacted by covid and welcoming more visitors than ever before. Our plan gets into the tension between visitors, communities, nature and businesses. We've started to pull together themes and projects that look to reduce the **negative** impacts of tourism on the community and nature, as well as how we can increase the **positive** impact that a visit to Purbeck has on the individual so that they may go on to live a life that has less impact on the environment. None of this is simple or easy, but we feel that bringing people together as one landscape gives us the best chance of succeeding. This plan was developed as part of the Purbeck Heaths Grazing Unit project, supported by Defra's Green Recovery Challenge Fund and Wytch Farm Landscape Enhancement Fund.

As with all these projects it's had its surprises that has made it harder to deliver than we expected, that's without Covid impacts too. We're all really looking forward to how the impact of this work plays out across the landscape of people and nature in the coming months and years.

# WAREHAM TRIAL TRAIN SERVICE POSTPONED TO SUMMER 2023

Dedicated Swanage Railway volunteers have postponed their planned trial diesel train service to the main line at Wareham until the summer of 2023 because of challenging trading conditions and economic uncertainty.

It had been hoped to operate the 90-selected day trial public service – using restored 1950s British Railways heritage diesel multiple units upgraded for main line running – during the summer of 2022.

Delays in completing the Swanage Railway's submission to the Government's Office of Rail and Road (ORR) to obtain permission to run the trains, the option of bringing in a contractor to operate the trains being uneconomic and main line

passenger numbers having not returned to pre-Covid levels – have prompted the postponement decision.

Swanage Railway chairman Gavin Johns said: "We can only run trains to Wareham when the conditions are commercially viable and it's important that we operate the trial as economically as possible and when commercial conditions are at their best. "We will continue with our main line train operating licence application to the Office of Rail and Road as quickly

as practicable. "The Swanage Railway's business is still recovering from Covid, which badly affected customer and staff confidence, against a background of challenging trading conditions and economic uncertainty.

"Trading conditions during 2022 are very unpredictable because they are being heavily affected by significant prices rises being borne by our customers and our business – such as the increased cost of coal – as well as the tragedy unfolding in the Ukraine.

"Concentrating on providing viable heritage train services between Norden, Corfe Castle, Harman's Cross and Swanage remains the Swanage Railway's first priority."

The current challenging economic reality has affected our plans for operating a trial 90-selected day trial train service from Swanage and Corfe Castle to the

main line at Wareham during 2022 and we are working to deliver that service during 2023, trading and economic conditions permitting.

"The business case does not currently exist to place external contracts to provide the trial train service to Wareham but we remain fully committed to securing all necessary consents and commencing services with a view to operating to Wareham during 2023. This is the most pragmatic way to proceed," added Mr Johns who is a volunteer Swanage Railway signalman.

A 60-selected day trial train service from Swanage and Corfe Castle to Wareham operated during the summer of 2017 using heritage diesel locomotives and carriages hired in as well as the contracting of a main line train company to operate the trains.

Gavin Johns explained: "The extensive work required to put in an application to the Office for Road and Rail (ORR) for operating trains to Wareham has been very detailed and has taken longer than expected – it has probably been the most challenging project in the 45-year history of the Swanage Railway.

"Trading conditions and economic uncertainties permitting, we plan to run a 90-selected day trial train service to the main line Wareham during 2023.

"I would like to thank everyone who has worked so hard on the Wareham project which has been a Swanage Railway ambition since British Rail closed the branch line to Corfe Castle and Swanage in January, 1972," he added.

The two 1950s former British Railways heritage diesel multiple unit trains that the Swanage Railway has refurbished and upgraded, for running on to the main line at Wareham, are a three-carriage Class 117 and a one-carriage Class 121 'Bubble Car'.
