NOVEMBER FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

Budget 2023 / **24** – It is that time of year again when Corfe Castle Parish Council start to consider the future financial demands for the parish. This month saw a report presented to council which included a 0% increase in Precept. Corfe Castle Parish Council, understand what impact the cost-of-living crisis is having for some of our residents and therefore if we can our aim is to not make times harder than they already are. A final report will be presented to Council in the December meeting.

Gods Acre Rules and Regulations – Following the adoption of the new Rules and Regulations document for Gods Acre Cemetery, Corfe Castle Parish Council will in early 2023, be carrying out a clearance within Gods Acre of any item which is deemed to be in breach of these rules. All items will be placed to one side near the pedestrian entrance in the new extension area for the period of one month before being disposed of.

Bus Stop – Corfe Castle Parish Council, were recently asked to consider asking Dorset Council to move a bus stop in Kingston. The change in location to just outside the Kingston Courtyard Centre, would mean visitors and local residents working at the Centre, would not have to walk down the road, daytime or night-time, when visiting/ going to work at the Courtyard Centre. Corfe Castle Parish Council agreed to support the idea in principle subject to a safe location being determined.

Corfe Castle Youth Club – Corfe Castle Parish Council, approved a Memorandum of Understanding between Purbeck Youth & Community Foundation and the Parish Council which sees the Council assisting financially to enable the club to run for this academic year.

Civility & Respect – Corfe Castle Parish Council agreed to take the NALC Civility & Respect Pledge. The pledge means: Council agree that it will treat all councillors, clerk and all employees, members of the public, representatives of partner organisations and volunteers with civility and respect in their role. Council has put in place a training programme for councillors and staff. Council has signed up to the Code of Conduct for councillors. Council has good governance arrangements in place including, staff contracts, and Dignity at Work Policy. Council will commit to seeking professional help at early stages should civility and respect issues arise. Council will commit to calling out bullying and harassment if and when it happens. Council will continue to learn from best practice in the sector and aspire to being a role model / champion council e.g., via Local Council Award Scheme & Council supports the continued lobbying for the change in legislation to support the Civility and Respect Pledge including sanctions for elected members where appropriate. contacted us about, incuding a campaign about dog mess was agreed and our first poster appears on the next page.

Feasibility Study Kingston Hill – The Parish Council were asked to carry out a feasibility study regarding a new foot path being created to run along Kingston Hill. After investigation the Parish Council concluded that a new foot path would be too dangerous. However, we have identified 2 potential foot paths serving the requirement. The first foot path identified runs between Corfe Common, and West Street Kingston via West Lynch. It was noted there is a stile on this foot path, which is not dog friendly, in fact you have to lift your dog over the stile! The Parish Council have requested Dorset Council who look after public rights of way and stiles along such routes, to consider changing the stile to a dog friendly stile. Foot path 2 is an old foot path which used to run between Lynch Farm and the back of St James Church, however this foot path fell into disuse many years ago.

Gods Acre Rules and Regulations – After an extended public consultation period Council considered feedback received and voted to endorse the proposed new rules and regulations for the Cemetery. The Clerk, Caretaker and Gods Acre Working Group will now work to ensure the new rules are followed.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Commercial Camping

The Parish Council is concerned at the level of commercial camping in the Parish and Dorset Council will be contacted to clarify the regulations and planning policies that apply to this.

Neighbourhood Plan

The Church Knowle Neighbourhood Plan is making steady progress along its timeline. To find out what was important to Parishioners prior to creating the plan, councillors hand-delivered and collected surveys to every home in the parish. The response has been excellent and will provide a clear direction for the plan once the data is analysed.

In addition to this engagement, enough hands went up to create a multifaceted steering group of councillors and parishioners. Together with public consultation, this group will create our Neighbourhood plan.

Two planning applications were discussed. The Council resolved to approve the application for tree work owing to Ash die-back. The other application at 3 Church Knowle was objected to, a site visit for some of the Councillors was part of the assessment.

Highways.

A suggestion was received that a road sign saying "Danger Concealed Farm Entrance" be erected to warn traffic of the access track by the telephone box.

Cemetery

An application was approved for a double burial plot in the Cemetery.

Administration

The 2023 budget was discussed that would account for the regular operation of the Council, any one off expenses and a contingency allowance. It was agreed that the numbers would be prepared during the month for approval at the December meeting ready for the precept application in January.

Rural Crime

The Council is in discussions with the Police about their making a presentation on Rural Crime Prevention before a Parish Council meeting. As soon as the date and details are finalised they will be advertised in the Corfe Valley News.

Correspondence

A question about the ownership of the historic lime kiln has been received from a ramblers group. It was established that it is owned by Scott Estates and the ramblers have been informed.

General Discussion

There is a local Men In Sheds group and it was suggested that they be contacted when there are small maintenance jobs that need to be done in the Parish.


Boundaries on the Heath

The heath lying to the north of Corfe was composed of several others of varying sizes– New Mills, Wytch, Bushey, Slepe, Middlebere etc. Over the years some of these heaths have gradually altered and finding their original boundaries is not helped by encroachment of fields, clay pits, meadow drowning, tramways and roads. One such heath has been affected more than most. It ticked the box is for everything and is called Greenberry otherwise Grimbery or Grenebery Heath and, 400-odd years later, is now forgotten.

This heath formed part of the Rollington estate which had been given to Edmund Uvedale of Moor Critchel by his father, Henry. In 1588, a dispute arose between Edmund and Robert Parmiter of Burshew (Bushey), a yeoman. It concerned an agreement over the boundary this heath, which was agreed between them in the October of that year. The description refers mainly to the eastern side of the heath as the Corfe River, which marked the western side, was presumably not an issue. The agreement stated that:


- 1. Grenebery/Grimbery Heath started at a gate which was now called Tanner's Gate in 1588 because it was near to the house of the tanner.
- 2. Then the boundary went eastwards along a dyke towards a hedge which divided the two heaths Grenebery lay on the north side and Bushey on the south. Once the hedge was reached, there was another gate which accessed several pastures worked by Mr. Parmiter.
- 3. From this gate, you headed north towards 'Sharpeford bridge' passing a cross called White 'Shryppe' or 'Catyehill' Cross. Grenebery Heath lay on the cross's southwestern side; on the northeast side of the cross was Wytch Heath.
- 4. From the cross, the boundary headed northwards to Sharford Bridge passing by a new close lately taken out of the heath.
- 5. The boundary ended by the river at 'Stonerds Lane end'.

This heath may have been larger but the water meadow development along the Corfe River valley altered the field boundaries and the 18th century clay pits on Threshers Heath also ate into this heath. A few meadows called Grimberry are shown on Samuel Donne's map dated 1772 though.

In 1680, there was a tenement called Threshers (no 49 on the map below) which had rights of pasture on Grimberry Heath. These rights had belonged previously to a tenement called 'Greeneberry'. Since Greneberry Gate had a history of changing its name (Greneberry to Withymoor to Tanner's), it is possible that the old tanner's cottage lay along Thrasher's Lane where a ruin stands on the east side just before a stream. Threshers Gate lay where the stream crosses the lane close to the ruined cottage. The stream feeds through Grimberry water meadows from the Corfe River.



Thrashers Lane looking north: Threshers Gate lay on the south side of this stream.

The cross is not shown on the 1772 map. Mr Parmiter's original access to his fields altered when the Goathorn tramway was created in 1905. And the BP

Oil Road passes though the Grimberry meadows making it difficult to see the original field boundaries at the top NW corner.

The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

The Christingle Service is one of the highlights of our Christmas worship together. A special moment in the service at Corfe Castle is when the young people receive their lighted Christingles and form a horseshoe at the east end of the church; this will be so at many of these services.

At this point in the service the church lights are dimmed and there is a wonderful bright glow from the candles. It is a special moment of prayer when we are

particularly aware of the many people and communities around the world who are in need and are suffering. Each year there are concerns uppermost in our minds; this as true as ever this year.

This can almost be an unbearable moment, but the lighted candles placed in the oranges, which represent God's world and the whole of the creation, speak powerfully of God's light, which shines in the darkness and is not overcome.

I am writing in mid November and a few days ago pupils and staff went to Salisbury to spend time in the Cathedral. It was a good day and I was glad to be able to go along too. We learnt about the cathedral's history and its present life and work. We saw the special seat, known as the cathedra, where the Bishop of Salisbury sits during services. There were lots of other things we saw and thought about and you may well hear more about the visit, or you could ask some of those who went about it.

The Bishop of Salisbury looks after the churches, congregations and church schools in the diocese which includes Dorset and Wiltshire, and small areas from neighbouring counties. The Bishop, Stephen Lake, has sent round a prayer and asked us all to use it through the days of Advent, as we prepare for our Christmas worship and celebrations.

The Bishop says he will be using this prayer himself and hopes we will join with him:

Faithful God, Your world is full of fear. Hunger, cold and loneliness are all around. Your children are hurting. Into our darkness comes the child of Bethlehem – Jesus the light who cannot be overcome. He speaks words of hope and words of truth. May his Spirit fill our hearts this Advent and awaken us to your purposes: make us generous in giving, active in serving, and alert to your reign of justice, mercy, and peace, which he calls us to bring to birth – here and now. Amen.

So, many will be using these words, or praying in their own way, in the days leading up to Christmas; and this will be the case throughout the world, not just locally.

May this time of Advent and Christmas be a time when we know yet more of God's love, joy and peace; may it be a good and blessed time for us all.

The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

Christmas is almost upon us. Are you ready?

Do you have a freezer full of festive food, a secret stash of wrapped presents, Christmas Cards ready for posting, Christmas Stockings stuffed, beds made up for visiting family, the chimney swept, dry logs stored, enough strong drink handy-by to satisfy the most enthusiastic imbiber with a little left over for Santa, and a skiing holiday in the USA lined up for the New Year?

Or have you maxed out your credit cards having paid your rent, your taxes, the heating and electricity bills, for your mobile and the TV License, and are now wondering if you can afford the bus fare to get you to the Food Bank and is there such a thing as a Christmas Stocking Bank?

It seems extraordinary that in this 21st century of clever technology no reliable system exists to bridge the vast chasm between the have-squillions and the have-nearly-nothings. Having voted, albeit by a small majority, to leave the EU and instead to use our own standards and laws, how is it that we find ourselves in such a mess? Are we not now free to form our own Utopia, our own perfect state? Well, kingdom; we do, after all, enjoy the benefits of having a Monarch. You can tell I'm a staunch Royalist; I hope you can also tell I am not talking party politics but only raging against the injustices of society.

A buzzword current in today's multi-media is 'algorithm' which, according to the dictionary, is 'any procedure involving a series of steps that is used to find the solution to a specific problem'. Usually it is a calculation carried out by a computer that impersonally considers all the elements involved – good, bad, vital, less-important, expected, unforeseen – and because the solution is untouched by human emotion and preference, sometimes it is unexpectedly successful, suggesting unconventional ways to go ahead.

It would be interesting to see what emerged as the solution for levelling up incomes if these ancient by-laws of humanity were to be included

Certainly the unexpected covid pandemic and Russia's invasion of Ukraine have had significant effect upon the economy of this country; but even so, I do not believe it can be beyond the wit of man to ensure that the ultrawealthy do not hold more riches than they have use for and that the most impoverished among us have enough to guarantee a roof over their heads and sufficient food.

Wherever you are and whatever your circumstances, I wish you a Happy Christmas – and don't forget that celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ is the Reason for the Season!



Jesus Christ, God's gift to you

The angel said to some shepherds, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you, he is Christ, the LORD. This will be a sign to you. You will find a baby wrapped in strips of cloth and lying in a manger."

Christians celebrate Christmas and I know many people wonder why? Why celebrate the birth of a child born all those years ago? The answer comes from what the angel said, recorded in the Bible for us. A Saviour has come, who is the Christ, meaning God's promised rescuing King, of all the world.

Now you might wonder, why is this good news of great joy, and why did the shepherds need a Saviour? And as the angel said, this was a Saviour for all the people, so it applies to you and to me. Why do we need saving?

The Bible says the God who made us, made us all for a purpose. Just as many of us buy products that are to be used in a certain way, so God made us all to live in a certain way. As God our maker He ultimately is the King. He's the boss. His purpose is that we are to love Him all the time, and to look after all He has made all the time. This would mean looking after others rightly: at work, at home, on holiday, and as we drive places. But sadly, none of us does this all the time.

So often - and hands up, I admit this myself - we live for ourselves, our wants, our dreams, our weekends, and our holidays. If you can't see this about yourself, just think about all that we see on the news or in the papers. As human beings, we don't live for God all the time and we certainly don't live how God says. We prefer to live, as the Bible says, 'in darkness'. Sadly, we all as humans like to make excuses for ourselves. *I was tired, I had a deadline, I was ill, I'm only human, I* had needs. We all do it, all the time. The Bible calls this sin, and God as our maker is angry about it, and on a day in the future will punish people for their sin.

On one hand this might be a comfort. All the horrors, all the darkness we see in the news will be punished and all wrongs righted. On that day some people will go to live with God in heaven, where there is no pain, or death or crying. On the other hand, many will be left facing God's anger and punishment for eternity. The Bible says only people who are forgiven or saved by God get to live with Him. Just as only certain people have easy access to King Charles, so God will only live with forgiven people. He cannot and will not live with the people with whom He is rightfully angry. If I worked for a pub here in the Corfe Valley and I decided one day to use that pub for a party where all the food was eaten and all the booze was drunk, I am sure you'd agree my boss would be rightfully angry. I expect to be sacked and fined for not doing what I should have done by instead abusing what was there. But then if the boss's son said he'd pick up the tab and pay the fine that would be something amazing, wouldn't it? I would be foolish to ignore this amazing act of generosity that the son offered for my forgiveness.

It's a silly illustration, but it goes some way to explain what a big deal it is that Jesus – God's Saviour – came to earth. This is why the news delivered that first Christmas is such good news. Jesu came that first Christmas to save us from our sin and from God's rightful anger at our sin. He has made the way that we can receive and know God's forgiveness. He can save those who ask Him and trust Him to do just that. It's why I urge you to think about the reasons Christians celebrate Christmas some more.

The shepherds were told to look out for a sign. Did they carry on with their work and ignore what the angel said? No - they just couldn't do that! Instead, they went and investigated what they had been told to see if was true. And I'd like to say to you today, if you haven't properly investigated Jesus, please do so. Go along to your local church and I am sure someone would be glad to help. But know that you are always welcome to come to Corfe Castle Evangelical Congregational Church at 3.00pm on Sundays. An Interesting find in a Corfe Garden

I thought you may be interested in a find made at our property in East Street in the course of internal building works carried out this year. Our cottage is Grade II listed and stated in the listing notice to be 18th century; however, the Town records show that there has been a dwelling on the site since the late 16th or early 17th century. It is constructed entirely of Purbeck stone, with a stone slate roof and the basic structure appears never to have been extended. In the rear, north facing wall I discovered a child's sandal which had been pushed in between the stonework internally. I would hazard a guess that the sandal dates from the first half of the 20th century.

According to information available on the internet, it was a tradition to conceal a shoe in a house to ward off witches and about half of the shoes found in such circumstances have been a child's shoe. The earliest known example dates from the early 14th century and the tradition is believed to have died out in the 20th century, so ours appears to be a very late example.

We have concealed the shoe in another hidey-hole along with a Jubilee coin.



Welcome to this month's round-up from the Dorset Wildlife Trust's Kimmeridge Team, and a new contributor. My name is Dan, and I will be writing our monthly updates for the Corfe Valley News from now on whilst Julie concentrates on other jobs. As I write this, we are almost halfway through an unseasonably mild November. Good for all our heating costs obviously but with worrying implications for the climate.

Bird Sightings

I came to the Wildlife Trust having worked for many years for the RSPB, and birds are one of my passions. Working at Kimmeridge allows me to look out for seasonal comings and goings at this fantastic sight, which is sadly overlooked by bird watchers. In the last month alone a variety of interesting sightings have proved that the area is well worth keeping an eye on. My colleague Sarah and I both saw a juvenile Merlin (the UK's smallest bird of prey) hunting along the toll road on separate days. From the smallest to the largest, Sarah also saw 3 of the introduced White Tailed Eagles at Worbarrow Bay on a Sunday afternoon walk, and at least 1 of these is thought to have flown back towards Poole Harbour that day via Tyneham. Recent storms have blown in some interesting seabirds, and an out of season Little Tern (more usually seen off Chesil Beach) was fishing in the shallows of Kimmeridge Bay for a while. Finally, a delightful species called Black Redstart (part of the Thrush family) are found overwintering more frequently along the Dorset coast. I have seen at least 3 recently, on the fence posts along the toll road and in and around the Etches Museum.

Volunteers needed

We are recruiting new volunteers at the Fine Foundation Wild Seas Centre. If you are 18 years or over and enthusiastic about our coastal and marine wildlife and getting out in nature, this could be for you! We are looking for people to help our visitors make the most of their visits, and to explain why Kimmeridge is so special and deserves protection. There are also a range of surveys to get involved in as well as occasional practical work parties, and we are extremely grateful to our volunteers for all they do. Could you offer at least two days each month to help us inspire and empower visitors to make simple changes in their everyday lives that benefit the planet and help tackle the environmental issues of our day? If so, please get in touch. An introductory session will take place in January. It is one of the oldest churches in Dorset and was rebuilt by King Canute after he had formerly burnt it down.


As an emergency it was used to house the homeless from the great Wareham fire of 1762 but the church gradually fell out of use till Leonard Sturdy refurbished it.

Since the 1930's it has been in use with a weekly Wednesday Communion Service. The service on 9th November was closest to the patronal Saint's Day (November 11th) and was attended by regular worshippers and those who had

a special connection to, and interest in, the Church.

The sculptor, Jonathan Sells, who carved the magnificent exterior plaque to celebrate the millennium was in attendance, as were Malcolm and Julie Lewis who came up with the idea for the plaque, and who were the main fundraisers for it along with Hilary Goodinge and Di Beaumont

Afterwards photographs were taken to mark the occasion and then we walked to the Parish Hall to share a magnificent celebratory lunch cooked by Carol Turner and her team.

enthusiastic professional musician, Hazel Ricketts. They rehearse every Monday evening in Lady St Mary's Church in Wareham where they conduct most of their performances.




