MARCH FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from our March meeting: During the public half hour, one member of the public came to stress his concern about the introduction of 5G and its possible effect on health. A second member of the public wanted to draw the Parish Council's attention to the proposed road repairs in West Street in May as there was a lot of concern on the community Facebook page.

The notification of the West Street works came too late to be included on the agenda, but the Parish Council has arranged a delivery to every affected household. The issue was raised with Cllr Cherry Brooks our DC representative and Cllr Brooks was asked about the lack of notification to residents by DC. She agreed to investigate. Residents who are concerned should contact Dorset Council on the phone number or web link shown on the letter.

Other projects: The Parish Council had 8 reports from Councillors on projects they are involved in on behalf of the Council. (Southeast Parish's Meeting; Purbeck Community Rail Partnership; Kings Coronation; 20mph speed limit; Environment Group; Cost of Living Support; Litter Free Purbeck; Purbeck Heaths NNR Sustainable Transport Meeting.)

The Council wanted to give special thanks to the litter team and the Swanage led team which had removed rubbish from the A351, and the Kings Coronation project team who have produced a great programme described elsewhere in CVN.

Good progress is also being made on the cost-of-living help scheme. The Environment group has had a well-attended programme and more talks are planned.

The Council will express its concern to Swanage Railway over the proposed high fares on the new train service to Wareham. The return fare from Corfe to Wareham is £10 and £25 from Swanage to Wareham. Currently until 30 June the bus fare on the no 40 is only £2 for a single ticket. The Council is worried that the pilot scheme will be deemed a failure.

The Council received a highly satisfactory report from its internal auditor for the last quarter.

Dorset Council Report: The main headline is that Dorset Council was able to use the savings from the merging of the six councils four years ago to safeguard services and remain financially stable. The precept for its own services is going up 2% compared with inflation of 10% and is a lower increase than permitted by the Government.

Annual Parish Meeting: Monday 22nd May 7pm, in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, main hall. This is your chance to hear what your Parish Council has achieved over the past year, and through your questions and comments help set the agenda for the Parish Council for the coming year. We will also have short presentations from some of the village organisations on current projects.

Planning application & Treework application update: The following applications have been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council, for full details including proposed works please see the Dorset Council website:

Application No: P/FUL/2023/00702, Location: Castle View Information Centre A351 St Edwards Bridge to Norden Roundabout, Corfe Castle Dorset BH20 5DR Recommend: No objection. This application is part of the National Trust's zero carbon policy. There are no visual aspects as the machinery is close to the building and cannot be seen from the castle.

Application No: P/FUL/2023/01023, Peake House, Valley Road, BH20 5HT. Recommend: No objection. Corfe Castle Parish Council strongly support the application. Peake House was originally built in the early 20th century as a domestic property for family use. In 2005 it was converted to bed and breakfast use and in 2007 it became a boarding house for Purbeck View School in Swanage. The Council objected to this change of use and the PDC Planning Officer recommended refusal. However, the application was approved by the PDC planning board. The present proposal will return the house to its original domestic use. To the best of our knowledge the house is and always has been served by a septic tank for its wastewater. We strongly support returning it to domestic use as this has been its function for the far greater part of its life.

Application No: P/CLP/2023/00948, Location: 25 East Street, BH20 5EE. Recommend: No comment as we do not feel we are qualified to make comment. To submit a letter to Dorset Council planning department requesting: given the age of the original application (1987) that the application be revisited, as it is believed the application would not be approved today.

It was noted the loading bay which has been installed since the original application was submitted does not show on the plans.

It was stated as the General Store now has a Post Office facility within the shop, the shop owners who live in the flat above, are not able to access the store once the store has closed. Due to this the only way to exit the building is through the storage area / garage; if there were to be a fire in this area there is no alternative fire exit.





Environmental Group Update



Our Last Get-Together

On Thursday 16th March we were very lucky to host 3 different talks about butterflies.

This proved to be another very popular topic!

The evening's talks started with Richard Hughes and Christine Hill ,who survey the Corfe Common Transect. Richard began by describing the area covered by the transect, which is a botanically rich area of approx. 400 acres, and then explaining that their survey results contribute to the UKBMS (Butterfly Monitoring Scheme). The data in this database is used to guide environmental decisions, so Richard and Christine take their responsibilities to ensure the information they provide very seriously. Richard then went on to entertain and inform us with a series of photos, providing a description of each and, for butterflies, commenting on how they are faring both nationally and locally on the common. His extensive collection of butterfly photos included over 30 species, ranging from the familiar "cabbage" white, (two butterflies, the Large White and Small White), Painted Lady, Peacock, and Brimstone, to the lesser known Essex, Small and Dingy Skippers. Other flora and fauna were also included - did you know there are Green Winged and Heath Spotted orchids on Corfe Common? As well as animals such as hares, common snipe, adders, row deer, kestrels and flocks of up to 30 linnets! At the end of the talk, there was an interesting O&A session, when it was explained that butterflies are a good indicator of the health of populations of other insects that are much more difficult to survey.

Martin Warren then gave a Crash Course on Garden Butterflies. He began by explaining that there are 5 main families of butterflies, including Whites, Blues, Browns, Skippers and Vanessid, which includes, for example, the Peacock and Tortoiseshell. He then spoke about why butterflies visit gardens - to drink nectar or to lay eggs. Some good nectar plants include buddleia, marjoram, scabious, ice plant (sedum) and brambles. Flowers to grow for spring nectar include Dame's Violet (Hesperis), wallflowers, bluebells and dandelions. Plant to grow for butterflies to lay eggs on include nettles for Red Admirals; Alder or Purging Buckthorn for Brimstones; Holly and Ivy for the Holly Blue; Dame's Violet or Honesty for Orange Tips and of course, cabbages for the Large and Small White!

If you have a bigger garden, an area of long grass is also beneficial for butterflies. In terms of garden design, Martin explained that butterflies need

sun, shelter, structure and variety, and finally recommended information from Butterfly Conservation.

Sarah Spurling then spoke about Sustainable Swanage's work creating new surveys around Swanage, including at Prospect Green and the Downs. Sustainable Swanage initially set up the surveys to involve people and give them a connection with nature, and in 2021 trained 15 volunteers to identify butterflies. The surveys also offer an opportunity for mindfulness. Sarah explained that while the Transect at the new Local Nature Reserve at the Downs and Peveril Point has been surveyed for the last two years, it hasn't yet been registered with the UKBMS, to allow the route to be trialled and tweaked prior to this. The Transect is split into sections covering different habitats, and in 2022 it was surveyed in 22 of 26 weeks between !St April and 30th September. The surveys mean the site is monitored every week, with significant sightings of flowers and other insects recorded, and as volunteers walk around with a clipboard and butterfly guide, people ask them what they are doing, and so words spreads about the butterfly surveys.

Church Knowle Parish Council - March Meeting

The March meeting of the Parish Council took place in the Church Knowle Village Hall at 6.30pm on Tuesday 14th March 2023. All Parish Council meetings take place at 6:30pm on the second Tuesday of the month. The odd months are at the Church Knowle Village Hall and the evens are at the Furzebrook Village Hall.

The meeting was well attended with all eight councillors present, our Dorset Council Councillor and four members of the public.

The main items of interest in the meetings were:

Public Discussion

Application for Solar Panels at Whiteways Farm

The applicant for the planning application considered later in the meeting presented his application. He said that the farm was embracing a self sustaining ethos, as far as possible, in line with current environmental thinking and that as the building was listed panels could not be put on the roof.

Parish Councillor Vacancy

The closing time for nominations for candidates for the election was 4:00pm 15th March and so the number of nominations was not known at the time of the meeting.

Elected Unopposed

Dorset Council elections department have only received one nomination and so Derek Burt is duly elected unopposed to the Parish Council. Cllr Burt has served on the Parish Council before and takes an especial interest in Cotness as well as bringing a wealth of local knowledge and history. We are very pleased to welcome him back to the Council.

Neighbourhood Plan

The key themes that have been identified from the survey responses are:

- Infrastructure and Green Energy
- Accessibility and transport
- Affordable housing

- Preserving the environment
- Throughout, maintain the excellent qualities of the surrounding countryside in the Dorset Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty

A wider meeting will be held to examine these themes and actions in detail. It is hoped to expand the steering group and move forward with some more detailed work on these five themes. Please contact Debbie Evans via the clerk if you can spare a little of your time to support, indicating which theme you would be most interested in helping to develop.

Planning

This month saw one application requiring Council comment. This was:

P/HOU/2023/01088 – Whiteways Farm – Installation of solar panels in field. The Council resolved to have no objection.

<u>Highways</u>

Flooding of Furzebrook Village Hall by Stormwater from the Highway

It was reported that the Furzebrook Village Hall has engaged a private contractor who has cleared tree roots and debris from the drainage channels and the flooding problem seems to be fixed for the present.

Cllr Brookes from Dorset Council said that changes had been made to make it easier to apply for speed limits. It was agreed that Church Knowle would liaise with her and re-apply for a speed limit through the villages in the parish.

Correspondence

The Church Knowle Telephone Box

The Council is pleased to note that the missing door has been repainted and nicely repaired by BT. The phone box (a listed building) is now back to a well-maintained good condition. Passers-by are encouraged to make a call from the box to help the parish keep it. Periodically BT give a call log of the number of calls made from these boxes when they attempt to close and remove them and a few calls helps keep them. In the event that the equipment is not working (it should be) please contact the Parish Clerk.

The Creech Bottom Post Box

There has still been no actual action on this and the clerk is to chase this up. The request is a modest one – to replace the small standard Royal Mail post box that was stolen over a year ago.

Furzebrook Noticeboard

The Men is Sheds group has refurbished this and it will be put back into position this month.

General Discussion

Dogs

Dogs running wild and out of control are a problem in the countryside as they worry and can damage livestock. There have also been instances in recent times where a dog has actually attacked and injured a person. Dog owners are responsible for their dogs and there is a swathe of legislation that can be applied if need be. Everything from the Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953 - An Act to provide for the punishment of persons whose dogs worry livestock on agricultural land; to the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 - to enable restrictions to be imposed in relation to other types of dog which present a serious danger to the public; to make further provision for securing that dogs are kept under proper control.

News from the Library

Purbeck Stone Talk



Purbeck is one of the few places in Britain where stone has been quarried continuously since the

Norman Conquest. Stone from the band of Purbeck Marble can be found in many of Britain's most famous buildings, such as Westminster Abbey and Salisbury Cathedral. Purbeck stone was also used for bridges, walls, cottages, harbours over the last thousand years. Purbeck provided not only the stone but also many of the stonemasons who produced the remarkable carved stonework we see today.

The Haysom family have quarried in Purbeck since the 17th Century. Treleven 'Trev' Haysom was born Langton Matravers and began working for his father at St Aldhelm's quary in 1959. He is steeped in the history and traditions of Purbeck stone. An expert in the stone beds and fossils within them, he has a Cretaceous fossil named after him *Dorsetodon Haysomi*! He is the author of the definitive book on the subject published in 2020 which draws on the knowledge and experiences of generations of the Haysom family.

Come along to hear him speak at Corfe Castle village hall on Friday 21st April. It's open to everyone and admission is free, there will be a collection for a local charity at the end.

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

In the last edition, I said I would provide pictures and further updates with regards to the library and playground; bear with me a little longer on this - we hope the library will be completed by the middle of April.

On Friday 17th March, we had our first quiz evening, with over 40 tickets sold, where we welcomed parents, carers, other family members, staff and some local parishioners. Thank you to our PTFA who are so engaged in supporting our efforts to be more involved with the local community. Thank you, too, to Mrs Cole, our PTFA chair for working with the parish and community groups to support the Coronation effort and other local events.

In March, two of our classes went on school trips. Our Year 5/6 cohort visited Nothe Fort, the sea fort in Weymouth. The children dressed as evacuees and the fort offered a great educational day of fun. The children experienced a 1940s school room supervised by a very strict headteacher complete with cane, an air raid shelter drill, Mr Arkwright's shop and rationing and Mrs Mop doing the washing at home.

Our Year 3/4 cohort went to Hethfelton House for a day hosted by the Jim Cronin Memorial Fund; the activities had an emphasis on primate conservation and welfare, which linked into the PSHE work around wellbeing.

The morning focused on: what is a primate? Focusing on the differences between monkeys and apes, followed by outdoors activities that focused on wellbeing, decision making and communication as team games. The morning ended with enrichment, craft and a primary scavenger hunt in the woods. 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

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


Settlement Orders

Since refugees are a bit of a hot topic at present, I thought I would mention restrictions on people's movements in England. The restrictions were done with the best intentions but nevertheless favoured the rich as it was usually the poor who had to have pecuniary assistance. Each parish cared for its poor (no NHS then) and it was done by creating a tax in 1601 on its wealthier inhabitants. It was collected by the Overseers of the poor.


Obviously, each parish did not want to be burdened with poor folk from other parishes, because of the extra cost, so anyone earning or renting a property of less than £10 had to prove their right to stay in the parish. They could claim this by birth, apprenticeship, marriage, or residency for a long period. A board of enquiry was set up and run by two JPs to examine who had the right to stay in the parish or, worst case, be removed by the Overseers to another parish. It was intrusive but is now a goldmine of information for those hunting down ancestors as you get names, ages, what jobs they'd had, and children's names and ages and sometimes other little snippets about their life.

There are some horror stories, not only unwanted pregnancies, but men laid off before the year was out with the consequent reduction in pay. This happened to a chap who went to work for the vicar in Studland not once but twice! Some had disagreements with their masters or didn't like the work such as William Hall who went on a trial to see if he'd like the work of butchering – he didn't, and left Corfe and went to Poole working for a ship owner, sailing regularly to Newfoundland. To gain residency in Corfe he claimed he was born here, and the baptism records bear this out.



An examination of James Burgess, a mariner, who was trying to gain a settlement in Poole, also sailed to Newfoundland and lived there for 14 years. He returned to Poole leaving his wife, Maria, there. Sadly, sailors often absconded from their wives although there is no proof in this case.

Many were illiterate and signed with a 'X' such as Elizabeth Frampton, aged 20, who was pregnant and 'which child is likely to be born a Bastard and to be chargeable to the said parish of Corfe Castle'. The father isn't named.



Some were injured, like Samuel Gover, who began working in the claypits, moved to Poole, and apprenticed himself to learn the trade of ship's carpenter. One day he was sent to Wytch to repair the passage boat and got an inflammation in his eyes which left him blind in one eye. His master was very good and paid his wages, but Samuel eventually had to give up his apprenticeship and became chargeable to Corfe parish.

John Payne, a labourer, who was born in Corfe, came before the board in 1816 and again in 1817. He had been working from the age of 10 as a 'driver of horses' out at Fitzworth and remained working within the parish. He eventually gained employment with Norden clay pits and was able to build a cottage and enclose 5 acres of heath out on Rempstone Heath by agreement with John Calcraft so not all were hard luck stories.

These records can be found on Ancestry.com or at the Dorset History Centre, Dorchester, where you can hold the original document (ref no: PE-COC/OV/5/2/1-260).


Coronation Day changes

The Real Easter

A painting by Jean Leon Gerome displayed in Musee D'Orsay, Paris, visualises what happened on the first Good Friday and was written about by Luke in the Bible. Luke records the events in Ch23 like this Two other men, both criminals, were also led out with Jesus to be executed. When they came to the place called the Skull, there they crucified him, along with the criminals, one on his right, the other on his left.... One of the criminals who hung their hurled insults at Jesus. Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us. But the other criminal rebuked him. Don't you fear God? he said since you are under the same sentence. We are punished justly for we are getting what our deeds deserve. But this man has done nothing wrong. Then he said to Jesus remember me when you come into your kingdom. Jesus answered him I tell you the truth today you will be with me in paradise.

Notice like buses the facts that come in twos in this passage. Two criminals and two verdicts, one just and the other unjust. Then two ways of looking at Jesus, with two end results.

Firstly, as I said there were two criminals crucified with Jesus. Both were guilty and both deserved what they were getting, the death penalty. But Jesus was not guilty of anything. If you read the events leading up to this you read that Jesus was betrayed for money, arrested, and handed over to the Roman authorities because of jealousy and was tried unjustly, then sentenced to be killed. He was innocent as one of the criminals explains in v41. Yet the criminals were guilty. We don't know what they had done but they had done something that deserved punishment. Their crucifixion was just. And sadly folks, although we may not like what the Bible teaches. The truth is, we are all guilty of crimes before our perfect and holy maker God. Like the criminals crucified with Jesus, we all deserve God's Judgement on us.

We all fail to love God and our fellow human beings and look at the mess we are making of the planet. And God warned us what would happen if we turned off our reliance on Him and trusted in other things. He said we'd die physically and spiritually. And sadly, we are all so much aware of this today. We know we will all one day die physically and we are all also aware we are dead spiritually. For we all say, think and do things that upset each other and upset God. Like the two criminals, we all deserve the death penalty. But secondly, there is good news and the good news is there to be had by those who would look at Jesus and His death on the cross rightly.

Think about the passage we read. In it there were two criminals deserving punishment. But whilst one responded wrongly by scorning and scoffing at Jesus. The other responded rightly by putting his trust in Jesus. Think over what he asked Jesus *v42 remember me when you come into your kingdom* Think about that! Even at death's door, this man admitted his guilt and put his trust in Jesus. And what was Jesus' reply? *v43 I tell you the truth today you will be with me in paradise*. Here was a man who looked at Jesus' death rightly. Here was a man who received this amazing Good News of Easter held out to us even today.

As you look at the cross of Jesus, do you thank Jesus for what He did that day? Friends I don't know where you are with God. You may attend church, but you may not attend church at all. Why not Admit your need for Jesus. Thank Him for His death in your place on the cross and ask His help to know the certain hope of paradise with Him as He promises.

Ramblings of a local Gardener

April can be 'April showers' and a very good time to be in England, we shall see if climate change affects April. Birdsong hits its glorious annual peak in April, when the widest range of bird species throw their energy into one of our most uplifting wildlife phenomena. They are in their breeding plumage and looking beautiful. I hope to see them using my nest boxes and I so enjoy listening to their singing from my bed when I wake early, a great way to start the day. It is a shame that I don't hear the whitethroats or the yellowhammers with their traditional call of "little bit of bread and no cheese" (that used to be part of my morning ride from Swanage to Knitson when I was a teenager). There also aren't any resident wheatears, but we do have the beautiful melodious call of the collared dove that first became resident here in the 50s, from Europe.

It is great that there are so many things to enjoy, but as a gardener I put growing food at the top of the agenda. Growing perennials is less work, good for the soil, and they often have flowers that are good pollinators. Look for seeds so they can be sown directly into the soil that they will have to grow in. Hopefully in a few years they will do much of the garden work as they will cover the soil and reduce weeds. Your only cost will be buying the seeds and waiting for them to grow. There are hundreds of edible plants beside the ones we buy from shops and a varied diet is a good way to improve health. Nettle shoots are great now, I liquidise them with stock and onions to make a nutritious soup. The RHS would also like us to eat or otherwise get rid of the bought flowering garlic that has been escaping from our gardens and is crossing with, and destroying our natural woodland garlic, good for soup or salad!

Land cress is a good all year round green, a weed in most gardens. I let it flower in one corner and plant the resultant seedlings in bare places for picking all winter. This year I grew some inside so I did not have to go outside in the cold to have fresh spicey leaves. My variegated kale is a very hardy perennial, also was good for picking all winter.

In April look through seed catalogues. Choose seeds for the plants you like and do experiment with something you don't remember trying before. I will be sowing carrots, lettuce, tomatoes, beetroot, leeks, cabbage, kale, squash, radish, beans, onion sets, potatoes and some flower seeds. I will also be doing quite a bit of maintenance in the garden such as renewing rotted wood in the cold-frame and various arches as well as mending the fruit cage.

Good luck with your gardening. I hope to see you here on the 5th or 12th for eats and a chat - we can be inside if it is wet. Or, give me a ring if you wish to come when the garden is quieter. Tel: 01929 421681. Rachel

Reporting Non Injury Collisions or Near Miss Incidents involving motor vehicles

The Parish Council has agreed to explore whether a 20mph speed limit is possible for the village (replacing the 30mph). The current Dorset Council procedure requires traffic surveys on speed, accident data, a speed watch scheme and support from the village. If approval seems possible there will be consultation throughout the village on whether we should apply for a 20mph limit.

Many of you tell us there are many near miss incidents which are currently not reported and Dorset Council need to know this. So, if you have been involved in or witnessed, either a non-injury collision or a near miss incident involving a motor vehicle, it is important to ensure that it is correctly reported and recorded.

This information will assist the Parish Council and Dorset Council with deciding if changes are required to how traffic is controlled within the Parish.

Saving Honey Bee Swarms

Honey bees have a natural instinct to swarm when the colony gets too big. About half the bees leave the colony with the queen and they initially settle as a large cluster in a temporary resting place like a tree branch, fence, hedge or sometimes in a more inconvenient place (eg. a door handle or the wing mirror of your car). After some hours, or occasionally days, they move on to a more permanent home, like a hollow tree. But sometimes they decide to set up residence in a cavity wall, shed or chimney, which may be a significant nuisance. Even if they find a new home, a high proportion of swarms don't survive very long in the wild for a variety of reasons.

Happily, beekeepers are keen to collect swarms from their initial temporary resting place, provided they can do so safely. This saves the bees by giving them a new home in a hive and avoids them taking up more permanent residence where they are not wanted. Swarming season depends on the weather and is usually from April to July. During this time the East Dorset Beekeepers Association has a number of beekeepers on stand-by to collect swarms. There is no charge for this and everyone benefits. If you are ever lucky enough to find a swarm of honey bees, please help us save the bees by calling our swarm co-ordinator on **01202 873292.** We'll do our best to help.

Our Life Boats - Part II

Here is a further article about the Kimmeridge Lifeboat from the April 1877 issue of Home Words – a forerunner of the Corfe Valley News.

The Mary Heape, life boat was stationed at Kimmeridge on Dec 11th 1868. The wisdom of this step was soon manifested by the gallant rescue which this boat was enabled to effect of the captain and crew (15 in all) of the Stralsund, a full-rigged German ship, which came ashore on the Kimmeridge Ledges, Dec 8th, 1872.

That day the weather was very wild and stormy and by the evening it was blowing with almost hurricane violence. The Coastguards on duty were watching with anxiety a vessel struggling off the shore. Later that night the people of Kimmeridge heard the double cannon report which was the signal that a wreck needed the lifeboat. The Kimmeridge men did not hesitate to obey the call to duty. It was found impossible to launch until there was a lull in the storm.

A careful watch was kept from the top of the cliffs by the indefatigable chief officer of the coastguard, with some of his men, Col. Mansel and the Vicar. About daybreak the weather moderated when, although there was still a heavy sea, the wind having shifted to the north-west, the lifeboat was launched; and through skilful pilotage of the coxswain, safely and swiftly pulled out through the surf into the open water. Having reached the scene of the wreck, the coxswain brought the boat up, head to sea, and dropped it in amongst the breakers down upon the ship. At daybreak when the sea margin could be reached, Mr Murray, the chief officer, and his men established communication with the vessel from the beach by means of rocket apparatus. Loud indeed was the cheer when the successful rocket carried its line across the spars. This line was used to drop the lifeboat ashore when laden with a part of the vessel's rescued crew and hauling her off for a second trip.

The vessel was the Stralsund, a German ship of 500 tons, bound for New York. After losing her sails, she had been driven by the storm from off Portland onto the Kimmeridge Ledges.

The lifeboat crew were William Stickland (1st coxswain), Lewis Stickland (2nd coxswain), George Cooper, Reuben Whiterow, Frederick Stickland, William Peveril & Felix Elmes (bow).

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Eagles & seagulls

In my last two articles, I have gone off-piste, venturing into the field of amateur archaeology with a view to encouraging CVN readers to take an interest in the subject too. This month I will, to the relief of some I suspect, get back in my box and return to more familiar territory.

A few weeks ago, I was in my study when I heard a commotion outside consisting of the loud alarm calls of many gulls. This is invariably a sign that something interesting is afoot, and sure enough on peering out the window I beheld a sight I have been hoping to see for several years – a sea eagle flying over. A mad rush downstairs and out the front door was just quick enough to catch another view of this menacing looking, barn-door of a bird beating slowly up East Street towards the village centre, its pursuing posse of comparatively puny looking gulls in full cry.

Since 2019 the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation in partnership with Forestry England have been transporting young sea eagles from nests in Scotland to the Isle of Wight, rearing them to independence, and releasing them in the hope that they will re-establish a breeding population on the south coast of England from which they have been absent since 1780. The birds have been fitted with tracking devices and one bird has twice visited the Netherlands, Germany and Denmark before returning "home". Young sea eagles wander a lot but tend to return to within 50km of their release site as they approach breeding age. That is when they develop their distinctive white tails. For some of them that might be next year. Some of the young eagles have been spending a lot of time around Purbeck and with the plentiful supply of fish in Poole Harbour it is a good bet that sometime soon sea eagles may again be breeding nearby. That is, I imagine, something most people would love to see.

Seagulls on the other hand are birds that everyone loves to hate. I suspect that is because they are too like us – successful, intelligent, adaptable, noisy, often aggressive to their neighbours, fond of fish & chips, and have an increasing preference for moving into towns and cities near the sea. A recent survey has estimated that there are now 50,000 - 100,000 pairs of herring gulls and 65,000

- 130,000 pairs of lesser black-backed gulls nesting in urban areas in England. Familiarity breeds contempt. There are many pairs of herring gulls nesting in Swanage, and I suspect that at least one pair have nested in Corfe Castle in recent years. It was the vigilance, aggression, and noisiness of these recent incomers that I must thank for finally seeing my first sea eagle in Purbeck.

Herring gulls can be seen at all times of year. In contrast, lesser black-backed gulls migrate south for the winter to Iberia and western North Africa. Although not conspicuously so, they are a herald of Spring being one of the first migrants to return to our shores. From mid-March onwards I have seen quite a few lesser black-backed gulls purposefully heading north over the village enroute to their nesting colonies, the nearest of which may be in the Bristol Channel or in Bristol itself. While we may have to wait another couple of years to enjoy breeding sea eagles around Purbeck, we should in the meantime learn to love our resident herring gulls – even if only because they may help you to see a sea-eagle. Many pairs of beady eyes attached to loudspeakers are a very effective advanced warning system.

Help for Dementia Sufferers from the Rugby Club



A group for people living with dementia and their carers has been given a new lease of life – by a rugby club.

Swanage and Wareham RFC stepped in after the Covid pandemic put paid to meetings of the Forget-Me-Not group.

With concerns about the virus now receding, the club offered space at its smart HQ in Bestwall Road, Wareham, free of charge. And now the group, run by a collaboration between the Dementia UK and Age UK charities, is thriving, with regular Monday drop-in sessions attended by up to 30 sufferers of the memory-loss syndrome and their carers.

Rachel Newman, of Age UK's North, South and West Dorset branch, said: "It's a place where people with dementia and those who help them can come to find support from each other and from professionals who come to offer advice. "As well as the obvious benefits of socialising we organise activities and games that help brain function and dexterity, such as dominoes, and music that prompts memories.

"It's amazing what the rugby club has done. They have given us a wonderful space in which to run sessions and we're very

grateful. "Those with dementia seem to enjoy being here. There is a lot of fun and laughter alongside the support. "Sometimes friends or relatives come with their loved-ones, which also improves understanding of the condition and what can be done to help."

Swans chair Martin Hill said hosting Forget-Me-Not was an obvious course for the club given the Rugby Football Union's ongoing examination of the links between the game's players and early-onset dementia.

But the main motive for the offer of free space was to benefit the local community in general.

He said: "We have these facilities here at our clubhouse but don't use them during weekdays. So what's the point of leaving the place empty when there

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are individuals and companies out there charging excessive amounts to local groups, trying to get as much money out of them as possible?"

The club also hosts Lewis-Manning hospice care sessions and an NHS cardio group for minimal fees covering just electricity costs. And it is also involved in various ways with disability and multiple sclerosis groups, and the Lions.

Mr Hill said: "Making more use of clubhouses, grounds and facilities has to be the way forward for sports clubs.

"We just want to help the local community as much as possible. It's important to us. We're really proud of how much we do and if there are other groups that we can fit in, we're more than willing to do so."

Though he does not participate in the Forget-Me-Not sessions, Mr Hill keeps an interested eye on them.

He said: "It's great to see everyone joining in the activities Rachel organises, especially the music games. It's wonderful to see the pleasure they get when they remember a song or melody they may have forgotten."

Flood Update

Welcome to this month's newsletter. Following the mid-January flooding incident in the Wild Seas Centre we had a contractor on site last week to carry out some vital maintenance. You may remember this story from the January newsletter when I wrote about the sheer quantity of rainwater that caused the main aquarium Header Tank to float up out of its pit Well the tank has now been re-installed. Moving it with a mini digger the contractors found a concrete plinth underneath, and re-installed it onto this firm footing, despite the terrible weather last week. All should be good to go at time of writing. Being mindful of the centre re-opening on 1 Apr we are hopeful that we have got this sorted.

Low Tides at Kimmeridge

Staff from the Wild Seas Centre went out on the afternoon of the 20th February to take advantage of some of the lowest tides of the year. With opening season approaching, a reminder of just how much wildlife there is out on the reserve resulted in an afternoon spent in the best classroom in Dorset. Under Julies guidance we were soon finding a wide variety of animals and plants that are normally covered by water. The species list included 4 species of crab including the rare, furrowed crab which are being seen more often here. Several velvet swimming crabs were found minus their pincers which would have been snipped off by other crabs in territorial battles. They do grow back. Some of the females were carrying vast numbers of eggs already. Fish species included clingfish which were absolutely everywhere, and magnificent tompot blenny's sporting their colourful head tufts. Sea slug species were easy to find including the tiny but immensely colourful nudibranchs. And not to be outdone some beautiful seaweeds including magic seaweed Cystoseira tamariscifolia were found. Normally overlooked the fronds of this species turn from grey to a vibrant blue at this time of year. Remember to keep us informed of your sightings. Why not pop in for a chat when we re-open in April.

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

Eves to the Skies!

Hi all, spring is here and our first returning birds have appeared already, sand martins and wheatears have already been sited locally and it won't be long before the swallows/ house martins & Swifts follow.

Kimmeridge is a great habitat in winter for large numbers of lapwings/ Fieldfare & redwings and many other farmland birds that flock together to feed in the surrounding fields often joined by hundreds of black-headed and Mediterranean gulls.

Birds of prey also thrive here with regular sightings of buzzards, sparrow hawk, kestrel, Merlin and even red kite and white-tailed sea eagles putting an appearance. Tawny and barn owl are also resident, regularly seen or heard along with green woodpeckers.

The bird feeders at the tollgate have attracted daily visits from gold finches/green finches/blue & great tits and great spotted woodpecker along with good numbers of chaffinches and sparrows and other resident species.

Last year I recorded 53 species just from the toll hut! And I'm already up to 40 for this year so far.

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TRIAL TRAIN SERVICE FROM WAREHAM MAIN LINE INTO THE HEART OF PURBECK

Leave your car at home and travel by

rail is the message from the Swanage Railway which is to operate a trial heritage diesel train service from the main line at Wareham into the heart of the Isle of Purbeck - thanks to working in partnership.

Operating from April to September 2023, tickets for the service will also be available from main line train operating company South Western Railway so its passengers can add tickets for Corfe Castle and Swanage to their main line tickets.

It will be the first time in 51 years - since the last day of British Rail passenger trains between Wareham, Corfe Castle and Swanage on Saturday, 1 January, 1972, before the branch line was controversially closed with most of the track lifted during the summer of 1972 - that such a main line ticket facility for travel to Swanage has been possible.

In another first, the Swanage Railway will be using its restored and upgraded 1950s heritage diesel trains, used by British Rail across its network from the 1950s to the 1990s, to operate the eleven mile service - one mile of which will be on the Network Rail main line from Worgret Junction and directly into Wareham station.

The trial service will operate on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 4 April to 10 September, 2023, with the first train departing Wareham at 11.19am and the last train leaving Swanage for Wareham at 4.20pm – giving visitors the opportunity to spend four hours in Swanage or Corfe Castle. The timetable is subject to change on special event days.

Gavin Johns, the volunteer chairman of the Swanage Railway Trust, said: "This trial train service is the result of working in partnership with the Government's Coastal Communities Fund, the Department of Transport, the former Purbeck District Council, Dorset Council, British Petroleum, Perenco, Network Rail and South Western Railway.

"I would like to thank our valued stakeholders for their far-sighted investment of £5.5 million to re-connect Swanage and Corfe Castle with the main line at Wareham which included £1.8 million from the Government's Coastal

Communities Fund so we could restore and upgrade our 1950s heritage diesel trains for running on the main line directly into Wareham station."

On behalf of the Swanage Railway, the trains will be operated and staffed by West Coast Railways which is one of Britain's leading main line charter and special train operators with whom the Swanage Railway has worked on many occasions.

The four trains a day service from Wareham will be formed of a three-carriage heritage Class 117 diesel multiple unit that can have a one-carriage heritage Class 121 diesel multiple unit added at busy times, giving a total of 292 seats.

The two heritage diesel trains have been restored and upgraded for the Swanage Railway by specialist contractors who fitted the same technical, signalling and safety equipment that is installed on all other trains running on the national railway network.

Trevor Parsons – the volunteer chairman of the Swanage Railway Company which runs the trains for the Swanage Railway Trust – explained: "This trial train service would not be possible without the former Purbeck District Council committing £3.2million from housing developers' transport improvement contributions for re-signalling improvements between Wareham, Worgret Junction and the Swanage Railway as part of Network Rail's Poole to Wool re-signalling scheme in 2013."

Tickets for the trial heritage diesel train service between Wareham, Corfe Castle and Swanage will be available at swanagerailway.co.uk from Monday, 13 March, 2023.
