JULY 2023 FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

August Meeting: During the July meeting, a recommendation was put forward to not hold a full council meeting in August. After a discussion this was agreed with the proviso that should any urgent item or controversial planning applications come in then a meeting may be called. Please check our website for meeting date updates.

Correspondence: Recently the Parish Council have received correspondence regarding issues that we have no legal power to act on, or any control over. If you have any issue and do not know who to ask for help, please refer to our website www.corfecastleparishcouncil.gov.uk/useful-links. On there you will find a link to report a **missed bin collection**, report a **non-injury collision or near miss**, or report an **overgrown hedge** causing issues on the Highways / Rights of way.

Possible Pre-School merger: Corfe Castle Parish Council was made aware of a possible merger between Corfe Castle Primary School and the Corfe Castle Community Pre-School. The Parish Council has raised a number of issues in response to the consultation with the aim of ensuring that if this merger goes ahead, it will not have a detrimental effect on the community or any of the parties involved.

Highways: As you know Corfe Castle Parish Council created a "Wish List" of Highways related issues from around the Parish including signage, drop down kerbs and yellow line markings. Unfortunately, a response from the Dorset Council Transport Planning Team was not in our favour However we hope our persistence has paid off as the Dorset Council Highways Team have offered to help. The Highways Team budget is small in comparison to the Transport Planning Team's, so work will be slow, but slow and steady wins the race!

Male Incontinence: This is not a subject many will be comfortable talking about, but a subject which should not be taboo. In a recent national survey across men of all ages, it was found that more than 51% of the men surveyed, have experienced symptoms associated with urinary incontinence at some time in their life. There is no statutory duty unlike sanitary waste bins for women, however Corfe Castle Parish Council have decided to lead the way by installing incontinence bins for both sexes within the toilet facilities.

Caretaker: Corfe Castle Parish Council have employed a Caretaker now for just over 2 years. During this time along with many other duties the Caretaker has undertaken maintenance work ensuring the longevity of our Parish Assets. However we need your help, if for example you notice a broken bench please send a quick email to the Clerk clerk@corfecastleparishcouncil.gov.uk stating the location along with a brief description of the item / issue and where possible please attach a photo.

Waste Bin Location: Corfe Castle Parish Council during the July meeting welcomed 3 members of public, who raised a concern over the location of a waste bin. The Dorset Councillor Cherry Brooks after listening to the concerns, agreed to investigate the issue immediately .

Planning application & Treework application update: The following applications have been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council.

Application No: P/FUL/2022/07181, **Location**: Purbeck Mineral and Mining Museum Norden BH20 5DW, **Proposal**:Removal of substandard storage units and provision of welfare cabin. **Recommend** This is an application we have already commented on (Feb '23) with a comment of "No objection". This application was escalated to be considered by Committee rather than an officer because the land is owned by Dorset Council. Therefore Corfe Castle Parish Council were invited to add further comment if so wished. The most recent recommendation is still no objection. The application was unanimously approved by the East Dorset planning committee on 6th July.

Application No: P/ESC/2023/03598, **Location**: Wellsite Arne G, Wytch Farm, Wareham, **Proposal**: Request for EIA Screening Opinion. **Recommend**: In 2012 Perenco were granted permission to continue operations until 2027. Part of the 106 was that they would produce a decommissioning, restoration, and aftercare plan. This is that plan for wellsite G. Wellsite G is in Arne Parish and only a very small part of the pipeline connecting to the gathering station is in our parish. The plan looks very thorough. No objection

Church Knowle Parish Council - July Meeting

The June meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 11th July at 6:30pm. It was attended by five members of the Council (Cllr Parker in the chair), the Dorset Councillor, Cherry Brookes and twelve members of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Public Discussion

The state of the road verge cutting and the poor condition of the road signs was brought up. The signs would benefit from a good clean as well as having the vegetation trimmed from them. Since the local economy is heavily reliant on tourism it should present as smartly as possible. In order to accommodate the wildlife in the verges the cutting of these needs to be phased. The Council will liaise with Dorset Council on this.

A presentation "5G Technology – Benefits and Harms for Purbeck" was given by Brian Woodman. This was based on information in the public domain. Salient points were that there are no studies showing that this is safe (indeed there is a very credible school of thought that long term exposure to these very high frequency electromagnetic waves has serious health effects on people and wildlife), it is being pushed through planning as it is national policy and there is a plan to make the copper wire telecoms infrastructure redundant in the next couple of years which will greatly increase the spread and density of 5G. This will require a transmitter every 100-300m on lamp posts, church spires, poles etc. and there are very real concerns for the health of everyone especially children. New Member

William Slack who lives in Creech with his young family applied to join the Parish Council. He was co-opted with a unanimous vote, he signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office, was welcomed and duly took his place on the Council. This leaves just two vacancies on the Parish Council which has a full strength of nine members.

Planning

The application P/RES/2023/03475 reserved matters regarding the development at Withy Lakes was passed by a majority vote with no objection.

Neighbourhood Plan

As soon as grant funding becomes available again the Council will apply and take the Plan through to completion.

Highways

It was resolved in response to contact from Dorset Council to apply for a 30mph limit through the Church Knowle Village. The indications are that this stands the best chance of success. Applications from the Parish Council for a speed limit in the parish have been made for some decades with no success to date. The ward Councillor, Cllr Brookes will be asked to support this application.

Discussion Period

It was noted that parts of the road at Cotness were collapsing and the Council would report this. Anyone can make a highways maintenance report online on the Dorset Council website at *https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/roads-highways-maintenance/report-a-problem-on-the-road-or-pavement*

and of course, the more reports received the better the chances of a prompt remedy.

The July meeting finished at 9:18pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Furzebrook Village Hall at 6:30 on 8th August.



Planet Purbeck and Wild Purbeck Partnership

Community group Planet Purbeck has been commissioned to carry out a major survey into public attitudes to the vast nature recovery projects going on in the area.

They have been called in by the Wild Purbeck Partnership, a group of 30-plus landowners, farmers and environmental organisations that are working together to deliver significant changes to the countryside and coastline.

These changes, which include rewilding and allowing landscapes to take their own course, are aimed at benefiting both nature and local people.

But WPP has historically found it challenging to engage a wider audience, and to identify attitudes, than those involved in the projects and Purbeck's green enthusiasts.

Planet Purbeck was therefore chosen to conduct the survey as it is seen as a neutral, popular grassroots organisation more in tune with mainstream residents who may or may not be in favour of WPP's activities.

The hope for WPP is that it will gain a community mandate to go ahead with nature restoration on a large scale and at speed.

Thousands of Purbeck residents will be quizzed in the survey, dubbed Change Is Coming.

Planet Purbeck's co-founder Rob Waitt said: "We are going to be everywhere – on the sidelines of sports events and at fetes, fairs and carnivals.

"We will be chatting to people sunbathing, eating ice creams or just walking in the street.


"There will also be opportunities to respond on social media and other online outlets.

"We want to make sure everyone in Purbeck gets a chance to influence and shape how these projects will develop and work out.

"Are they in favour of, for example, the reintroduction of wild beavers? What do they make of bodies such as the National Trust and the RSPB, and Purbeck's national nature reserve? What do they feel are the benefits and drawbacks of living in Purbeck?"

Mr Waitt said Planet Purbeck is "incredibly proud" to be trusted with the survey. And he added: "It will be both exciting and fascinating to discover what people really think about these important matters."



News from The Castle

Can't believe it is August already! The patio and garden is looking beautiful, flowers blooming and the grapevines are growing.

It is business as normal and looking forward to a busy August. Hopefully the sun will continue to shine.

Magic Mondays are back starting on Monday 30th July, throughout August So come along and be amazed.

We have some lovely summer specials, so whether you fancy a salad or a bowl of steaming mussels, or our mouth-watering steak and ale pie we would love to see you, either at The castle or the Duke of Wellington. Have a fantastic August.

<u>What was Purbeck up to during the time of the Stuarts & the</u> <u>Commonwealth?</u>

Corfe was adding to its housing stock by the end of the 1500s although it had a slight hiatus during the 1600s because of the Civil War. It continued to expand thereafter not least because of the available stone and fixtures that appeared in 1646 at the castle's demise. The gentry consisted of William Clavell who had now built his new house at Smedmore in 1620; the Bond family had already inherited Lutton, though were still not involved with the village; the Okedens had inherited the Uvedale land; the Lawrences still owned Grange, Tyneham, Creech and Steeple; however as they had supported the Royalist cause during the war had incurred the resultant penalties for doing so and their estates were eventually all sold off between 1683-1686; John Bankes arrived in 1637 having purchased the castle.

It was still an agricultural economy, but 'new' ventures were starting up with an interest in digging for clay on Newton Heath in 1635 (note that the Romans had also dug for clay, so this wasn't 'new' as such) and Sir William Clavell's idea to manufacture window glass at Kimmeridge, which failed.

The Dackombe family having arrived last century were to be gone by the end of this one -17^{th} - as (like the Lawrences) they had supported the Royalists although Robert Dackombe of Scoles became a turncoat and gave £50 to Commonwealth funds. This certainly saved Scoles and his wife went on to make sure that no Dackombe inherited it despite Robert's father writing in his will that the property would pass to his other son, Brune, on Robert's death.

The Uvedales also disappeared from the village because no male heir had been conceived. John Uvedale was the last inhabitant and was buried in a chest tomb in St Edward's in 1601. All their property eventually passed to George Uvedale's daughter, Elizabeth, who married William Okeden and it is this surname that appears on many deeds. George did not get as much land as he thought as his older brother, Edmund, had left the land out at New Mills to, what has now become, the Corfe Castle Charities. It took a court case to prove to George that he was not entitled to these rents.

During the Civil War soldiers roamed the area stealing from properties and vandalising buildings (Rollington, an Okeden property, suffered as did

Downshay). The soldiers sold deeds and leases back to their owners and supposedly burnt the rest. Since most would have been illiterate one wonders if they knew what they had? The church had Commonwealth troops stationed inside and buildings close to the castle, were damaged especially when the castle was slighted. The Bankes family lost deeds and proofs of certain practices (amongst things like the interior fittings, books, plate etc) and spent time asserting their rights afterwards. In 1667, Ralph Bankes took the Dollings to the chancery court in London to make sure they paid the 13 bushels of wheat and 30s. due to the lord of the castle from the manor of Worth Matravers which they denied having to pay. Worth paid this as a contribution towards the Keepers' wages for looking after the warren and in return received 4 deer each year which had been paid to them up to the start of the war.

Despite this, prosperity was rising and the hearth tax of 1662-4 reveals 68 taxpayers in Corfe which was comparable with the small market towns of Beaminster or Blandford. Borough business carried on as usual with a mayor appointed and sworn in every year. One thing did change though, the town got rid of its ducking stool. This had been placed by the mill pond at Boar Mill and was last recalled as still standing in the early 1700s. There is no indication in the town's records that it was ever used. The pond is now a fraction of its size due to the widening of the road.

Joseph Collett purchased some land in the town in 1621 with the purpose of using the rent for 10 poor people of Wimborne (5 men and 5 woman) who had to attend church services otherwise their pay would be docked. Originally, the deeds were placed in an oak chest with 6 locks on it in the south aisle of Wimborne Minster. Corfe also had some benefactors for their poor - Robert Abbott had left property in Corfe and Poole in 1620, and Sir Edmund Uvedale had bequeathed New Mills in 1621 (which resulted in the court case against his younger brother, George). Others followed suit during this century which built up a healthy portfolio for the Corfe Castle Charities.


The end of year also marked a moment of sadness as we bid

Above all, I feel grateful for having been able to serve in the ordained ministry over a good number of years. It has been such a privilege to share with many at the key moments in life, and through the routine and more mundane ones too. We are very grateful for all the love, kindness and encouragement we have been given and shown; thank you indeed.

The Rev Anne Bond writes:

It's the silly season when all the world is on holiday, dads are revealing their winter-white legs, mums are squeezing themselves into swimsuits that have surely shrunk since last summer, and children are ecstatically splashing and paddling and "look-at-me-I'm-swimming-underwater" in the warm shallow seas of the south coast. There is sand in the sandwiches, ice creams on the beach, sun-blessed bodies and blessedly relaxed minds - and *everything* is just ... *LOVELY*.

That's what holidays are all about. A change from the everyday. Time out of Real Life. A breathing space to get the other fifty-two weeks of the year into some sort of perspective.

But in days gone by, some hundreds of years ago, holidays were literally how the word was spelled: 'holy days'. A holy day was when you honoured a saint, or commemorated one of the miracles of Jesus, or remembered the birth of Jesus, or his resurrection, or the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Well before the advent of television, processions thronged the streets followed by huge crowds, the churches were packed as people thanked God Almighty for sending his Son into the world to turn humanity's mind from 'Might Is Right' to 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, strength and soul and love your neighbour as you love yourself.'

When Alexander was about four and his twin brothers fourteen, we took them to Majorca during the Easter holidays and followed the Easter procession into the local church. A visiting Bishop was presiding dressed in flowing golden robes and a tall golden mitre. An awestruck whisper reached me from about knee level: "Look! Look! There's <u>**GOD**</u>!" ... followed by much ribald laughter and teasing from the big boys *so* squashing that I had to resort to a bit of squashing myself: "D'you remember, you two, when you first went to school? Charlie, you said: "Which ones are the girls?" and Edward, you told him: "they're the ones with the sticky-out ears."

Corfe Castle is one of the places people go to on holiday. It has everything the heart could desire: a ruined castle, four pubs, the seaside only 4 miles away in Swanage or Studland, a superb village shop and an equally excellent doctor's surgery, and two churches. Holiday-makers flock in their hundreds from up north where the climate is much colder, and they leave messages in the church visitors' book: 'Such a peaceful atmosphere', 'a beautiful building', 'I sat and let the calm and harmony fill my being'.

Sometimes visitors to somewhere can see what the indigenous inhabitants are blind to because they live in the midst of it day in, day out. There is something sumptuously luxurious about living somewhere where everywhere you look is pleasing to the eye. This is an ancient village full of stone-built houses dating back to the King John of Magna Carta. History rises

up from the ground you walk on. The church in the Square dedicated to Saint Edward King and Martyr is mostly Victorian having in the 17th century been used by Cromwell's troops to stable their horses and then left to fall down when they had finished storming the Castle; but the tower in the west end housing the Baptistry remained standing and is authentically ancient. The sense of a building that has been prayed in for centuries has never left it; it is this that feeds the minds, bodies and souls of our holiday visitors.

And what better way to celebrate a 'holy day'? A time set apart for inner contemplation, for wrapping yourself in enjoyment, for family pleasure and secret, individual joy. Days designed to fill you with sunshine and warmth, not only kissed by the sun but also blessed by the Holy Spirit empowering you for the tasks ahead of you.

I Stand at the Door and Knock

"Here I am, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will go in and eat with him, and he with me." Revelation 3:20

Have you seen that picture in St. Pauls Cathedral of Jesus Christ outside the door? It is dark, he holds a lamp, the door is closed and tangled up with briars and weeds. Well that picture by Holman Hunt is the setting for our verse this month.

What is the door? Some think that it is the door of the future, because Christ is going to come again. But that is hardly a door that we can open. Others say that it's the door of the human heart, and that may be nearer the truth. But reading the verse in its context we see Christ is speaking to a whole church. A church where he wasn't fully present. A church where some knew him personally, and lived in fellowship with him, and some people didn't know Jesus, and lived their lives with him outside. So, the most obvious answer is that it is the church door (the "Church" is people.)

Why is Jesus outside? We have to go back a bit to answer this one. Just a few verses earlier we read – "You say,' I am rich; I have acquired wealth and do not need a thing." Jesus was left outside the church door because they felt self-reliant. They had plenty of home comforts with their cars, DVD players and colour TV's or whatever the 1st century AD equivalent was. "I don't need a thing," they said. And that's why the door was shut. They had become unspiritual, and finished up with Jesus pushed outside their front door.

Why does He knock? If you wanted two words to sum up what the Christian experience was all about, it's not words like 'Joy' and 'Peace' that come to mind here. Rather we have the ideas of 'Friendship' and 'Satisfaction'. "*I will go in and eat with him and he with me*." So many people in this world are dissatisfied today, trying this and that, bored, frustrated and discontented. People's lives are empty. And why is that? Simply because the door is shut. And while he is outside, we will be empty and lacking spiritual companionship.

How do we open the door? *"If anyone hears my voice and opens the door…"* Not everyone hears Jesus' voice. We can miss it if we are immersed in self-interest or absorbed in self-love. So, if you read this verse today and feel God speaking to you, challenging you, inviting you, then be grateful because that's not something everyone hears.

But hearing isn't enough. We have to open the door too.

The door is shut. What will you do? If you hear his voice, you may open it. "Open the door" he says "and I will come in.

Jesus said...." I am the Way, and the Truth and the Life. No-one comes to the Father except through Me". John 14:6



Ramblings of a local Gardener

April can be 'April showers ' and a very good time to be in England, we shall see if climate change affects April. Birdsong hits its glorious annual peak in April, when the widest range of bird species throw their energy into one of our most uplifting wildlife phenomena. They are in their breeding plumage and looking beautiful. I hope to see them using my nest boxes and I so enjoy listening to their singing from my bed when I wake early, a great way to start the day. It is a shame that I don't hear the whitethroats or the yellowhammers with their traditional call of "little bit of bread and no cheese" (that used to be part of my morning ride from Swanage to Knitson when I was a teenager). There also aren't any resident wheatears, but we do have the beautiful melodious call of the collared dove that first became resident here in the 50s, from Europe.

It is great that there are so many things to enjoy, but as a gardener I put growing food at the top of the agenda. Growing perennials is less work, good for the soil, and they often have flowers that are good pollinators. Look for seeds so they can be sown directly into the soil that they will have to grow in. Hopefully in a few years they will do much of the garden work as they will cover the soil and reduce weeds. Your only cost will be buying the seeds and waiting for them to grow. There are hundreds of edible plants beside the ones we buy from shops and a varied diet is a good way to improve health. Nettle shoots are great now, I liquidise them with stock and onions to make a nutritious soup. The RHS would also like us to eat or otherwise get rid of the bought flowering garlic that has been escaping from our gardens and is crossing with, and destroying our natural woodland garlic, good for soup or salad!

Land cress is a good all year round green, a weed in most gardens. I let it flower in one corner and plant the resultant seedlings in bare places for picking all winter. This year I grew some inside so I did not have to go outside in the cold to have fresh spicey leaves. My variegated kale is a very hardy perennial, also was good for picking all winter.

In April look through seed catalogues. Choose seeds for the plants you like and do experiment with something you don't remember trying before. I will be sowing carrots, lettuce, tomatoes, beetroot, leeks, cabbage, kale, squash, radish, beans, onion sets, potatoes and some flower seeds. I will also be doing quite a bit of maintenance in the garden such as renewing rotted wood in the cold-frame and various arches as well as mending the fruit cage.

Good luck with your gardening. I hope to see you here on the 5th or 12th for eats and a chat - we can be inside if it is wet. Or, give me a ring if you wish to come when the garden is quieter. Tel: 01929 421681 Rachel

Tuesday 12 September – The Lost King

In 2012, after having been lost for over 500 years, the remains of King Richard III were discovered beneath a carpark in Leicester. The search had been orchestrated by an amateur historian, Philippa Langley, whose unrelenting research had been met with incomprehension by her friends and family and with scepticism by experts and academics.


