JANUARY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Eleven members of the public filled the Town Hall for January's meeting. Representatives from Swanworth Quarry attend to speak about the current Minerals and Waste Plan Consultation. They are aware of concerns parishioners have regarding the proposed extension and wanted to put forward why they feel Swanworth is worth supporting. A number of points were made; 30+ people (90% of whom are Purbeck residents) are employed full time by the quarry at Swanworth and the company spends millions of pounds each year with local suppliers, taxes (both local and national) also run into millions of pounds each year. It was stressed that whilst the project is labelled an extension the area being quarried will remain the same as the existing operations will be being restored in conjunction with the expansion; this means that the volume of traffic will not increase and the representatives anticipate the planning conditions controlling vehicle movements will remain the same as they are now (movements are limited to 75 a day on 90% of days and 92 on the remaining days). They will not be pushing for an increase in vehicle movements should the plans progress to planning conditions. It was noted the plans are to mask the guarrying works in much the same way operations now occurring are masked, limiting visual impact. The area will eventually be restored to farm land; therefore not having a permanent impact on the AONB. Other members of the public supported opposing comments made at last months meeting and raised concerns about traffic going to and from the guarries, it was noted that if permission were not to be granted the lorry movements could be reduced to none.

Further issues raised were the visual impact of the extension and the supply of water to Kingston residents. This is a major concern to residents which needs addressing. The public were advised by Swanworth that a hydrology assessment has been submitted to the Environment Agency but it is not yet in the public domain. Further investigations to test the impact of a potential quarry on hydrology will take place if the plan moves ahead and it is a matter they will work on after the consultation.

It was asked again are there exceptional circumstances to warrant this development proceeding in an AONB and Heritage Coast? Particularly given aggregate is available from other areas and there is not a 'need' for it. The response from Swanworth was that the Dorset Mineral Strategy stipulates aggregate should be sourced from within Dorset and whilst Portland has aggregate they feel the landbank on Portland is overstated, Swanworth are doing research to investigate this.

The Chairman advised the members of the public present that the Parish Council is not a decision making Council; they are consultees and he urged members of the public to submit their own responses to the consultation.

The Council later discussed the consultation document as an agenda item and resolved that whilst they feel there are many planning issues to be addressed should the proposal move forward they do not object to the paper and the content of the information presented in it.

District Cllr Nigel Dragon advised that PDC had changed their policy on Local Government Organisation, moving to be in favour of the unitary Council. The Council also changed their recommendation to support the proposed SW Railway timetable proposals and have objected as has the Parish Council.

The Parish Council have submitted a response to the Secretary of State regarding the Local Government Reorganisation and are requesting a localism agenda is agreed before the LGR goes ahead.

It was noted there was broken glass in the playground and signs of drug use in the youth shelter.

The National Trust reported back on many ongoing issues. They will be keeping the castle lights on till the end of January, which was welcomed by the Council. The operations manager has carried out a risk assessment for the proposed National Trust shuttle bus between Norden and the Square which raised concerns about the safety of a bus stop being positioned outside of the shop.

The Council approved and adopted their budget for the 2018/19 financial year. Details of this, previous years budgets and other financial information can be found on the Councils new website www.corfecastlepc.org.uk

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to proposals for the following: replacement doors, window and sashes, new roof tiles to 1983 extension and extract vent relocation at 3 West Street, Kingston. A single storey rear extension, external and internal alterations at 7 The Lane, Kingston. To erect a two storey side extension to the village hall and alterations to the porch canopy, with associated surface water drainage works and roof and wall mounted ventilation. Alterations to windows and doors and re-covering of the roof at The Village Hall, 67 East Street, Corfe Castle. The Council had no objection to add a pitched roof to the existing flat-roofed garage to create a first floor and to install rooflights and windows at 87 West Street. Corfe Castle on the basis that accommodation does not form separate occupation. The Council objected to the erection of a community boxing gym with associated access and cycle parking on the land rear of 83-87, East Street. Whilst they supported the community ethos they objected on the following grounds; visual impact from East Hill, insufficient details regarding emergency access and disabled access to both the site and the building, the shower and toilet facilities appear to be unisex, change of use: the land is currently agricultural, car parking and noise.

NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

A Happy New Year to all from the Church Knowle Parish Council.

The first meeting of 2018 was held at Church Knowle Reading Room. For once, the fire gave out some heat and Councillors and the one Parishioner in attendance did not start suffering from the first stages of hypothermia.

The Clerk was alive and kicking thanks to the excellent treatment he had following his "blue lighter" trip by emergency ambulance to Dorchester following December's meeting. It should be pointed out at this juncture that the meeting had nothing to do with the visit to Dorchester A&E.

The meeting was given a splendid presentation by our local Highways Officer from Dorset County Council who was also formally thanked by Members for her help in getting some long-standing road matters resolved. The results of a traffic survey were given and it looks like Church Knowle might be getting a 30 mph speed limit some-time soon. DCC has a Working Together "partnership" programme for non-core highways matters and Members were informed that if CKPC joined up, the County Council's insurance would cover volunteers carrying out litter-picking as well as work done by the Parish Council in clearing verges near the playing field and playground, etc. The meeting heard about how the Parish could arrange for "non-core function" gully emptying and clearing in association with DCC. The Parish has just over 200 road drainage gullies to keep the roads from flooding and such work would obviously cost money and this would have to be put into the budget for 2018-19. The Council thanked DCC for installing "SLOW" road markings at the entrance to Church Knowle and for the progress in plans to reduce vehicle speeds throughout the Parish by installing similar markings at East Creech and other hamlets.

As in past meetings, a Chairman of Meeting had to be elected and this month Cllr Page took the chair. Mr Ed Ellwood of Cotness was confirmed as a Parish Councillor and, consequently, the Parish now has a full complement of councillors.

The Meeting heard that the Clerk had still not received any satisfactory response from the organisers of woodland and heathland clearance around Creech, Grange Road and Furzebrook despite having sent e-mails to them. The amount of smoke produced was considerable and there was concern about damage to flora and fauna. It was suggested that residents contact the Environmental Health Officer about the matter and, no doubt, he or she would certainly be able to sort the possible miscreants out.

With regard to the East Creech Conservation Area saga, Members heard that a request had been made by our district councillor that PDC defer their decision on the matter until more information about the East Creech Roman villa and farmstead (which appears not to have been considered by PDC planners) discovered and investigated some years ago and which should be

included in the conservation area. Members of the Parish Council intended to visit the site on 14 January.

A "river walk" has been carried out by Parish Councillors accompanied by representative of the Dorset Wildlife Trust (DWT) and the meeting heard that DWT were very much "on side" with CKPC with regard to the proposed project of cleaning up the upper reaches of the Corfe River. A letter would be sent to all the landowners with riparian rights on each side of the river outlining a trial project to see how things would work out in reducing vegetation overhang and taking out "river muck" thereby opening up the river. It was suggested that such work would improve the water quality entering Poole Harbour but similar work would be needed along the lower stretches as well some time in the future.

We'll forget about the latest tome from the Dorset Minerals Extraction working party which for some strange reason includes Poole & Bournemouth; not many quarries or ball clay mines in those towns, for the time being as this item was postponed until February's meeting to give Members time to examine the consequences of more holes in Purbeck. But that brings us to a planning application (6/2017/0732) to extend the period of ball clay and gravel/sand extraction at Furzeyground quarry to 2030. The Parish Council considered the matter at length and looked at the possibility of deferring the matter until next month but after a long discussion they decided they had no objections in principle but would suggest a planning condition be made by DCC that to reduce noise and dust nuisance a metalled road be installed (similar to that at Dorey's Pit) and that screening on the southern boundary be built to protect residents from noise, dust and mud pollution.

The Council was very disappointed that Purbeck District Council has decided to take no action against the developer of the Old Blacksmith's in Grange Road except to give what appears to be retrospective planning permission for building a structure that bore little resemblance to the original planning application which CKPC had previously supported. They thought about writing a letter of complaint but following discussion about the somewhat peremptory reply to CKPC's initial letter of concern to PDC planners Members were of one voice in saying, "Well, what's the point? PDC never listen to us anyway, we're just wasting our time.". There was an air of serious concern and disappointment and some of the Councillors wondered in generality what was the point of a Planning Dept. since people could build things willy nilly and then get "retrospective planning permission" because it would probably cost too much for the local authority to go to Court.

Coming back down to Earth, Highways matters were then dealt with. The trees along Furzebrook Road towards East Creech are seriously overhanging the road and some branches were reported to have snapped thereby causing increased risk to road users. The Clerk advised the meeting that the matter would be reported to DCC so that they could take the appropriate action. The Clerk also gave an update on the replacement of the decayed and missing

footpath and bridleway signs in the Parish and also the missing fingerpost at Cocknowle.

Next came financial matters. The accounts were in good order and the bills coming due were paid. The Clerk reported on the likely costs to the Parish of highway work which is being transferred to parishes from DCC so that, of course and with no cynicism implied, DCC could appear to be cutting costs. Members decided that they would submit an estimated parish precept request for £7,350 to Purbeck DC for the 2018-19 financial year to help pay for the extra work which the Parish would have to take on to maintain the Parish's roads and verges in reasonable condition.

The website was then discussed and it was decided that the website designer/webmaster would update it on a monthly basis (and as required) from information supplied by the Clerk since the Councillor who previously carried out the work is no longer able to do so. Members agreed to pay the fee of £180 p.a. to the webmaster for the next year.

And that that for January. Next meeting will be at Furzebrook village hall on Tuesday 13th February at 7.30pm.

Oh, and by the way, would all parishioners of Church Knowle <u>and</u> Steeple please fill out the Housing Needs Survey form which will be dropping through their doors in the near future. We and Purbeck DC's housing dept. really need up to date information on what housing (not second homes) is needed in the two parishes for our parishioners and their growing children – see below.

Future housing in Church Knowle & Steeple

An important survey on housing needs will soon be posted through letterboxes in Church Knowle and Steeple,

Many communities are concerned because local people need to move elsewhere to find suitable housing. Young and old alike are forced to move away from their family and friends because rents and house prices have soared in rural areas making it impossible for them to stay.

The traditional British hedgerow is a boon for wildlife and an integral part of the landscape, but like so much of our countryside, it needs looking after.

We've just planted a brand new 300m hedge at Snail's Paddock in Studland and a 70m stretch of mature hedge at The Halves in Corfe Castle is being restored.

Hedges need to be laid periodically so they continue to work as field boundaries and keep their value for nature, explained Ranger Becky Eddy. The laying process involves clearing undergrowth then cutting about three quarters of the way through the living trunks near ground level so they can be I down almost flat. This causes new shoots to grow

up vertically which naturally weave together creating a stock-proof barrier, as well as a home for birds and small mammals.

Work on laying is now nearly complete at The Halves and the dead material has been stacked nearby ready for disposal.

"it looks a bit of a mess when it has just been done but it should be looking nice by the summer when it starts to grow a bit", said Becky.

Hedges which are not maintained in this way grow into mature trees and quickly open up at the base, said National Trust Ecologist David Brown. As well as allowing cattle to wander through the gaps, this robs them of their value for wildlife, he added.

Properly maintained hedges provide nesting sites for birds like sparrows, chaffinches and dunnocks and homes for mice and shrews.

They are also a good source of food in the shape of berries and other fruit.

Hedges have been part of the landscape for hundreds if not thousands of years and over that time have become a cornerstone of the whole

ecosystem, as well as helping to define the way the British countryside looks.

At Studland, saplings including blackthorn, hawthorn, dog rose and hazel have been planted along the line of a new fence dividing Snails Paddock from the rear of the Bankes Arms.

It follows the removal of an 8m section of existing hedge to form a new access to Snails

Paddock, which is used as an overflow for South Beach car park at peak times.

"In time the new hedge will provide a visual enhancement as well creating a new habitat and screening the overflow parking from the pub," said National Trust Studland Operations Manager Emma Wright.

The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

This may be tempting fate, but I'm going to mention the weather! After the build up to Christmas with all its excitement, January and February are curiously flat months, aren't they? Even in this south-coastal neck of the woods we used to have snow and bitter cold to spice up these grey eventless months. Crisp frosts and biting air got rid of lurking infections; and just enough snow to be fun for the children without being an inconvenience to grown-ups gave us something to grumble pleasurably about, over hot chocolate, the mug clasped comfortingly between frozen hands, elbows on the table. But this year's muggy, damp and dreary skies have little to offer us – and everyone has flu or stomach upsets.

Having written that, now we will have 6 weeks of arctic blizzards and the wrong sort of snow, followed by rain, ice, thaw and floods. *And* plague! But is that really how God works? Does he send storm and pestilence to tease us? Or to punish us? Or to show us how terrifyingly powerful he is?

The Apostle John wrote in his first letter: 'God is love'. I truly don't think God - who is the very essence of love, who in Jesus was the embodiment of love, and who, in some way we can't get our heads around, is love and life itself - would ever allow that sort of intervention to even cross his mind.

But then I think about the terrible things that sometimes happen to good and loving people, and I ask myself the question so many of us have asked: "If God *really exists* and his nature is love, how could a loving God allow such a thing to happen?"

I think the answer might lie somewhere in the muddle that is our attitude to the weather.

In the beginning ... God created a perfect world, beautiful, bountiful and balanced, inhabited by a myriad of creatures exactly displaying the vast variety and possibilities of life. He gave to humanity the sort of brains that allowed us to become top of the food-chain, both literally and metaphorically; and, as well, he gave us the freedom to choose whether or not to live in obedience to divine will, or our own.

In the beginning ... the weather of our planet was terrifying: earthquakes, enormous volcanic eruptions, tsunamis and landslips on an unimaginable scale as the tectonic plates moved and settled and water rushed into new voids to make seas and oceans. Then came water creatures, and huge

land animals; and afterwards came man, with curious, inventive brains, and an answer to everything that threatened survival.

You takes your pick. One? Or both?

It seems to me that in this 21st century we are reaping the consequences of our own success. Overpopulation and greed has led to global warming and climate change. The most recent natural disasters such as hurricanes, flooding, earthquakes and the mudslides in northern California are not anything God has caused; they are the result of humanity's lack of global stewardship. Individuals suffer because indirectly they are victims of other individuals; and because God has dignified humanity by making us masters of our own chosen paths through life, he doesn't interfere. But, equally he doesn't desert us. As individuals suffer, whether they are aware of it or not he weeps with them, giving them the comfort of his presence as they make the journey from this life to the next.

There is no doubt that, as a species, we have the know-how and skill to put right our wrong choices. But do we have the motivation? Do we actually want to?

With a few notable exceptions, I believe the vast majority of us would work hard, and willingly, and without gross financial inducement, to restore this planet to its original balance and bountiful beauty. But somehow a way needs to be found to involve us all in the effort: every individual, in every country of the whole wide world, and all the governments of all nations.

We mustn't blame God for the weather; it's not his fault. It's ours.





Firstly that faith, I spoke briefly about last month was not ill placed; it was wonderful to see the church so full during some of our Christmas events and others enjoying the delights and curiosities of an Icelandic Christmas (although we did avoid the putrefied fish!)

But as soon as Christmas is over, the bells of New Year have chimed and the last firework been extinguished it is time to move on and we are already planning ahead, looking to what can be consigned to history and moving into the new day we believe and are seeing evidence of God having planned for us.

And early this year on the 13th February is 'Pancake Day' or Shrove Tuesday which precedes the 40 days of Lent.

And there is more to Pancake Day than filling our stomachs with fried batter, syrup, and sugar and lemons juice. Pancake Day is Shrove Tuesday which, as I say precedes the 40 days of Lent.

The eating of Pancakes and the 40 days of Lent have significance in the Christian calendar although, of course churches differ on some points.....and no it is not the number of pancakes this person tries to eat!

The significance of the **40** will, I am sure arise in both churches this Lent in one way or another (Noah's Ark saw the earth flooded by **40** days and nights of rain, the Hebrews spent **40** years in the wilderness before reaching the land promised to them by God, Jesus spent **40** days fasting in the wilderness in preparation for his ministry and there is more.)

Traditionally Shrove Tuesday is a day of 'penitence', to 'clean the soul', and a day of celebration as the last chance to feast before Lent begins. Its name Shrove derives from the ritual of 'shriving' that Christians used to undergo. It was (in short) in certain traditions, a way of being forgiven the past, and moving forward.

So in a sense, for us as a church, Pancake Day or Shrove Tuesday has some echoes of our journey, now letting go of the past and preparing ourselves for the future. Although we don't need others to intercede for us, it will be a time of letting go of the past, of reflection, of preparing both our hearts and minds for the service we feel God has for us this year and beyond.

Lent is traditionally a time we go without but it can also be a time we do more. After all it is about positive change. For us that means more praying, more listening and more serving so that come that glorious Easter Sunday we too will be clear the path the risen Jesus has called us to serve upon.

We would love you to be part of this, if only for FREE pancakes, however you like them, at 4pm on Pancake Day, Shrove Tuesday 13th February.

Please come and join us, on the way home from work, on the school run, on the way out or just to save making them yourselves! We really don't want to take a whole load of batter home.

Perhaps, Christian or not, it is a day we can all reflect on the past, on the present and look to make a positive change in a world, not just our waistline.

From all at Corfe Congregational Church we look forward to serving you on Pancake Day (and beyond.)
