Saturday 11th November

Today is the day each year that our village joins the Nation and the Commonwealth to remember all those who have given their lives so that we can enjoy the freedoms they can no longer experience.

In particular we remember the 2 World Wars and all the assorted insurrections around the world since 1945 in which our Queen's servicemen have been shot at by her enemies and suffered losses.

We must be thankful that 1969 was special, being the only year since 1945 when a serviceman did not lose his or her life.

For many years we have visited the Memorial seat at Polar Wood on the Encombe Estate. This seat is very close to the site where 2 service planes crashed, one in 1939 and one in 1945 with the loss of many lives. This Transport plane was crewed by the Royal Canadian Airforce, and so the Canadian Liaison Officer Major Frank Laroche, who is stationed at Bovington, joins us to lay a wreath at the seat. Mr James Gegarro, owner of the Encombe Estate, joins us with members of his estate staff and lays a wreath on behalf of his estate. The exposed site is near Swyre Head and afterwards the small wreath laying party has enjoyed Mr Gegarro's hospitality in the warmth of Encombe House, for which we are all very grateful.

The Branch also has a memorial stone at Creech, to remember the 7 villagers who in WW2 were a group of Churchill's Secret Army. Although none died, we lay a wreath at this time of the year at this site, which is very close to their secret hole in the ground , so that their very brave work is not forgotten by future generations.

Before 11am on this day, a small party from the Branch, including our standard bearer Colin Cross, gather in the Village Square where the St Edwards bellringers lead by Carole Dean,toll the church bells.

At 11 o'clock the bells cease and the assembled party which always includes villagers and visitors, pause for the 2 minutes silence. This is followed by the epitaph "They shall grow not old"

It is always a great privilege to have 40 plus people join us for this simple ceremony.

Major George Preston Chairman Corfe Castle Branch RBL Today we again join the Nation and the Commonwealth in our formal Remembrance Church Service in St Edwards.

We all wear our Poppies that the branch has previously sold, in and around the Village.

Debbie Reynolds and her team prepare over 40 Poppy Boxes and distribute them in Corfe and the surrounding villages; 20 to local shops, pubs and businesses and 20 to our team of house to house collectors. Our most visible site is outside the paper shop, which has been manned for many years by Colin Cross.

Our church service is taken by our Rector Rev Ian Jackson and assisted by our curate Rev Anne Bond. The service follows our usual pattern with Standards and representatives on parade from the Branch, our Ladies section, the Foresters and the Brownies.

For several years we have been joined in church by a party of about 20 Officers, Warrant Officers, NCOs and servicemen ,and their families, from the Armoured Trials and Development Unit at Bovington Camp. During the service wreaths are laid by the Branch and by Major Frank Laroche on behalf of the garrison at Bovington .The Last Post and Reveille are played by Colin Bright from Swanage.

After the service we all assemble in the Square (normally about 150 souls) and parade down East Street to our War Memorial , where a short service includes wreath laying by our village organisations, and a short address by our Branch President Mr Nigel Haywood CVO, and the names of the fallen are read out.

We then retire to the RBL Club for refreshments and an opportunity for Villagers to meet and chat with the regular serving soldiers from ATDU. We are all very grateful for the hospitality of the Club and that we are joined by serving personnel from Bovington Camp.

In the afternoon our President and Chairman join the Rector and a small congregation, at Tynham Church, which is in the middle of the MOD ranges. We are joined by the Commanding Officer and a small party from Lulworth Camp. The service is similar to the one at St Edwards, but the music is played by Colin Bright and members of his Salvation Army band.

The names of the fallen at Tyneham, Kimmeridge, Steeple and Creech are read out by a descendant of one of the Tyneham residents.

When I wrote in the Village Diary in 2000 our house was filled to the brim with our 5 children and their friends. The 7 of us and our dog squeezed in (somehow). Now we're down to 3 and a dog. We'll see how much of a saving this really is over the coming years, when potential problems aren't acted on early by youth workers who know their young people well, and they spiral downwards. At least here the Parish Council are 80% funding our club. Some other villages have nothing. The thing that has changed a lot in our house is communication. There is much less shouting up the stairs and far more phone calls, texts, Whatsapp's, Skype or emails. We do all try and get together in the same room several times a year though. It can be difficult to

I try not to resent the tourist hordes who descend, by reminding myself that I <u>live</u> here, whilst they just come for a brief visit.(I'm not always so infuriatingly Pollyannaish though!)

The Revd. Ian Jackson writes:

There is an historical note framed and on the wall in church at Corfe Castle written about the end of the 19th century; it is near the vestry door. It was produced not so long after the church (apart from the tower) was rebuilt between 1859 and 1860.

The note also mentions earlier events and in particular the grant of £50 from the House of Commons in 1646. This was at the time of upheaval during years of the Civil War. Several other payments are mentioned and these include 25p to the person (5 shillings at that time) who brought the £50 from London. It is possible to work out the present day equivalents of those figures.

The fact that the money was actually brought from London makes the link with Parliament seem more real than sometimes today. However, of course, in those days journeys took much longer, so this would not seem so. Nowadays parliament is televised, and we can learn constantly about its work. This does not necessarily mean that we feel any more involved or that our links are more effective.

It is not inappropriate in November, to think of the connections our own lives and local parishes and communities and our national life, and the work of parliament in particular. November 5th reminds us of conflicts between Christian traditions and denominations – thankfully, so much has been overcome since the, but not to be taken for granted at any time. November 11th reminds us of the conflicts if the 2 world wars of the Twentieth Century and others since then, and in our own times.

All church building have been provided and are maintained over the centuries by the care and generosity of many people. We have significant reminders of this locally. One thing they remind us is to value, maintain and extend all links with local and national life. This may seem especially relevant at the present time; it always has been. God calls us to pray, reflection and involvement. May he renew his gift of peace among us — locally, nationally and throughout his creation.

Congregational Church

The Christmas before last I was given a jigsaw. Not any jigsaw a Star Trek jigsaw. Any 'Trekkkies' out there will know my excitement.

I had not done a jigsaw for years but after all, they are easy, just put the pieces together.....

The fact that I said the Christmas before last should be a clue, all did not go well! For weeks, alright, months I complained of missing pieces, blamed everyone bar myself until, until... I stopped for a moment, took a breath, looked at the picture and realised yep the mistakes were mine!

11 months later the 20,000 piece (oh alright 1000 piece) puzzle was complete.

Sometimes to achieve a greater aim we need to stop and see what is in front of us.

In the Bible the Apostle Paul was the same. Paul, like me, ploughed ahead and seems to have gone from city to city, community to community telling them what he wanted, they *way* he wanted and getting kicked out. Something in his method seemed to be wrong. But then came Athens and things were different (at least for a while.) (See Acts 17: 16 - 35)

In Athens Paul took the time to look around, to discover, to learn, to understand. We read, "For as I walked around and looked carefully at your objects of worship, I even found an altar with this inscription: to an unknown god."

Paul met people where they were, to tell the life changing, world changing, history changing message of Jesus and did it their way.

Paul took time to understand culture, the people, values, what was known and unknown. And the incredible result, people listened and wanted to hear more "We want to hear you again on this subject." Some became followers of Jesus. (v34)

I have been blessed to visit a number of countries and work regularly abroad. As I have travelled I have seen churches assuming they know what people want, and yes, more than once, much more than once, have made that assumption myself.... and, even if I have not been kicked out of villages and cities I have been bruised as I fell flat on my face.

I do, of course, passionately believe we do things in the name of Jesus whose message changes lives, brings hope and can change the world; I passionately believe that, so did Paul. But I, we, also want to learn from Paul and take time to look, listen and learn.

We want to keep listening.....to anyone who has views on how the CCECC can serve the community. After all St Francis of Assisi is often attributed with saying, 'preach the Gospel at all a times and if necessary use words.'

We want to learn how we can serve. After all a jigsaw is an incomplete picture if just one piece is missing, and the community of Corfe, and those beyond are a massive piece of the jigsaw as we seek to move forward.



Age UK Dorchester is advising older people living in Dorset, about the importance of caring for their feet. Due to health and mobility problems, older people can sometimes struggle to reach their own

feet, and they will develop some foot problems as they age, simply as a result of daily wear and tear.

Foot pain can be extremely debilitating, and over time it can become a significant health issue. If it becomes uncomfortable to walk for an older person, they are less likely to get out and about and take part in social activities or daily exercise that is vital for health and wellbeing.

It is also important for older people to get their feet checked regularly, especially if they have a long-term condition such as diabetes or arthritis, as their feet are particularly vulnerable, and any problems should be reported to the GP as soon as possible. The right footwear is also essential, and wearing comfortable, well-fitting shoes, is important.

Good nail care can also help to keep feet feeling comfortable; however, many older people find it hard to clip their toenails properly, partly as they can be hard to reach, but also because they become tougher with age - nails that become too long can press against the end of the shoe and the constant pressure can cause soreness, infection or ulceration. Toenails that have been poorly cut can also become ingrown.

Age UK Dorchester has recently expanded its footcare clinics throughout Purbeck - Wareham, Swanage, Bere Regis, and Wool.

OCTOBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

The October meeting was attended by six members of the public. One spoke to lend support to the previously reported events taking place at Purbeck Valley Farm. She wanted to clarify that the Stag parties held by Land and Wave in Sandyhills Copse were not connected to the farm in any way and that events on the farm were not organised directly by the land owners. She asked the Council to be aware of the many charitable functions held on the farm, the employment it brings to the local area and she requested reassurance from the Council that they were looking at the many complaints raised from a fair view point. Also present were Land and Wave who wanted to introduce themselves to the Council and open a dialogue to address any issues that arise. They advised that they have been working in the area of Purbeck for 3-4 years, employing 14 people in the winter and 40 through the summer months. They are aware that complaints have been raised within the Parish and would like to hold a meeting directly with the Council and other parties involved to try to address them.

County Cllr Brooks reported that Corfe has been appointed a new Community Highways representative who will be getting underway with the many highway matters in the Parish. She reported on a number of district wide issues: that funding for SEND (Special educational needs and disability) school pupils will change after October half term. This will mean funding is now granted in a banding based on level of need, rather than the time spent one on one with a teaching assistant. DCC and PDC have won a business award for their Innovation Park being the most innovative and small business friendly. Finally South Western Railway who have taken over South West Trains have proposed timetable changes which they are currently consulting on. The Council would urge residents of Corfe to look at their proposals and respond. The trains to London which are vitally important to so many in the area are being cut quite dramatically which will impact on commuters and tourism. You can view the consultation under 'Help and Support' on the website www.southwesternrailway.com . Please do take the time to look and respond.

Cllr Dragon reported that he had recently enquired at PDC if Parish Councils were informed of license applications? He was advised that they are yet this is contrary to other information offered. The Clerk will be requesting clarification and if required a policy change requesting that Parish Councils are made aware of licence

applications in their Parish, putting Councillors in a position to comment on applications. The ClIr had attended a Purbeck transport action group. The group deals with all modes of transport in Purbeck. He reported there had been issues with Swanage to Wareham trial railway service and whilst the link to the main line had operated successfully the service had made a financial loss. The trial service will be extended into 2018. PDC has invested a significant amount in the service and will want to ensure the service is extended and used.

Jonathan Kershaw the lead Ranger for the National Trust in Corfe and Langton Matravers delivered the National Trust report this month. He advised the work on the handrails going into the castle was just finished and that the scaffold would be coming down this month (he warned of disruption but hopefully that will have now passed with little bother). The resin bonded surface in the Castle View car park is underway and should be completed by the time of going to press. There will be some disruption on the footpath around Red Lane as Wessex Water have been granted access for planned restoration work on the river channel. Several complaints regarding refuse bins being left outside of The Bankes Arms are being dealt with by the Real Estate team and should soon be resolved. In readiness for the colder weather Jonathan will soon be reinstating the Parish grit bins in their winter locations.

Repairs to the pavements continue to be a topic on the agenda. The researched estimates for the Council to repair the pavements themselves have proved to be an unrealistic expenditure at this moment in time and the Council has received a rather unsatisfactory letter from DCC advising that whilst in a conservation area, the tarmac repairs in West Street are part of their current maintenance policy. They have looked in to various regulations including the obligations set out in conservation areas and found that they don't have a legal duty to replace the slabs. The Council will be consulting the Conservation officer at PDC on this view.

A report was delivered on the Norden Welcome Hub meeting. For these who are not aware £147,000 has been granted by the Coastal Communities Fund to be spent on creating a 'Welcome Hub' at the Norden car park. An additional £48,000 has been pledged by PDC to spend on the project. The Parish Council believe that safe, transport links connecting village and other attractions are imperative and should be improved first. A footpath, a cycle way and a shuttle service have all been long campaigned for however the Council



Another report of interest was delivered on the Dorset Health Reorganisation. It was reported that Poole hospital will lose its consultant led A and E which will be moved to Bournemouth. NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

As our dear reader will be aware, the planned September meeting of the Parish Council which was supposed to have taken place in Church Knowle village hall on 12th had to be abandoned as not enough Councillors were present for a quorum. A new meeting was called for the 26th and business went ahead albeit with some matters being deferred until October – notably discussion of new planning applications – because two of the four Councillors attending had declared interests and if they left the meeting it would become inquorate and would have to be abandoned. Just like the previous meeting.

But, hey, let's get on the "26th proper". Cllr Page was elected Chairman of the Meeting and following approval of August's minutes the meeting quickly went on to planning matters which hadn't been deferred till October. First up was a verbal report about a meeting between the Parish Council's working party with PDC planners on the East Creech conservation area. It appeared that it was somewhat more successful than the current Brexit negotiations and some of CKPC's suggestions had been taken on board, e.g. those relating to the extending the proposed area to include of Creech Barrow and Creech roman villa remains together with extending the southern boundary to the ridge. Steeple & Tyneham Parish Meeting expressed their support and would hope to confirm their support if and when ratified at their next meeting.

Planning application No 6/2017/0374 came up again under "Past Planning", partly because of letters from some Parishioners who were very concerned about the proposed development despite the proposals having been watered down as a result of comments made to PDC by CKPC. The contents were discussed at some length and it was decided to contact PDC to express support for the contents of the letters which, to a great extent, echoed those concerns which had previously been made by CKPC.

It was reported that a meeting amongst Imerys, Arne PC, Dorset Wildlife Trust and CKPC had been held to discuss local environmental projects which would have Imerys' funding. More news on this in a later CVN when more info becomes available.

Fly-tipping has reared its ugly head with reports of old washing machines, builders' rubble, mattresses and other junk being dumped in the lanes of the Parish and, in particular, the East Creech triangle. The matter has been reported to the PDC Environmental Health Officer, who will enforce the Law in this matter, and the Dorset Waste Partnership to collect the rubbish. Miscreants will be prosecuted to the full extent of the Law and if any person sees any incident they should report it and the person doing it (car/lorry

number plates will do) to the EHO who will investigate, collect evidence and prosecute. Fly-tippers are now being sent to jail for between six months and two years when caught – and they are being caught, with regular monotony.

After the accounts had been examined and invoice payments confirmed the meeting received a report from the Clerk that BDO had not yet completed its audit but hoped to do so by 29th September.

Correspondence was pretty minimal but, very importantly, the meeting was very pleased to hear that Church Knowle village had won Second Prize in the Past Winners category of the Dorset Best Kept Villages Competition. Congratulations to all who made this possible. There was also a ± 50 cheque that came along with the prize certificate. The Council also heard that salt and grit would be made available by DCC for paths etc. in the Parish, They decided to investigate current stocks and, if necessary, order some more. And that was that for September's reconvened meeting.

October's meeting took place at Furzebrook village hall two weeks after the September one and this time Cllr Tony Higgens was elected to the chair. Seven Councillors and four parishioners also attended. There was no risk, therefore, of the meeting being inquorate!

Public discussion began with Parishioners expressing their concerns and objections to the proposal to develop a piece of land by Furzeyground (Planning App No 6/2017/0374) into what appeared to be a smallholding with a polytunnel and shed. The Parishioners were concerned about intensification, visual aspects and the possibility of farm run-off affecting neighbouring land and water tables close to the AoNB. They referred to a letter sent to the Parish Council from one of the objectors which expressed his concerns and asked for support in having the application discussed at a full PDFC planning board meeting rather than being delegated to a PDC planning officer. It was explained to them that the letter concerned had been forwarded to PDC with a comment that Church Knowle PC supported their concerns. The Parish Council would support the view that the matter should be dealt with at planning board level because of the level of interest within the Parish, but it was also pointed out that the polytunnel could be considered a "temporary" building and may not be subject to the need for planning permissions. The Parish Council was also governed by legal constraints and had little room to manoeuvre in this matter. At the end of the Public Discussion period, council went on to look at the October Agenda

Following reading and approval of September's minutes and other matters, the council discussed proposed environmental projects and discussions with Imerys

et al. Funding and expertise were subjects of discussion, as was when to get the Environment Agency involved. But, again, more of this at a later date when the minutiae have been settled and the big picture comes around.

With regard to planning applications, tree works applications for works at Willow Corner (TWA/2017/174) and at Church Farm (TWA/2017/121) were discussed and there was no objection to the works being carried out.

The planning application (6/2017/174) for 71 Furzebrook Road was also considered at length and it was decided that there would be no objection to the development especially as road safety would be considerably improved.

The meeting heard about a possible unlawful development at 46 Furzebrook Road relating to an entrance being constructed onto to road. The Clerk had not received a planning application and it was surmised that it was possible it had been sent to Arne PC as the property was so close to the parish boundaries. It was also thought that the development was outwith the scope of the previous planning permissions given and the Clerk was asked to look into the matter.

Up again came the planning application regarding the land at Furzeyground. There was considerable discussion about the application and the views put forward at the public discussion period. The Council had had concerns, but it was felt they couldn't go much further than they previously had, especially since the applicant had considerably reduced the scope of his original project and planning application. One of the Members pointed out that as the shed and polytunnel could be construed as "temporary" structures if not on a plinth the applicant could withdraw his application and go ahead without planning permission as such was probably not needed for "temporary" structures. Members agreed, but at the same time decided to write to PDC to reiterate their overall concerns regarding the proposals.

The Council heard that had not yet received the auditor's report and, indeed, still has not, at the time of writing, received it. The accounts for the month were examined and bills were paid.

The Clerk reported that RoSPA would be inspecting the playground sometime this month, but in line with other inspections it would not be given notice of the inspection date. Members noted his comments. It was also reported that the Parish Council's stocks of grit and salt were at about 2 tonnes so DCC would not be getting an order in the near future.

And that was that for October.
