JULY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

The July meeting was attended by two members of the public. Paul Jobbling, the newly elected Chair of the Chamber of Trade and Commerce introduced himself and spoke about the Chamber's strategic plans to promote the village and all it has to offer. The emphasis of the plan is to work with organisations, businesses and groups to jointly market Corfe as the 'Most Vibrant Village In Dorset'. He spoke of the necessity to do this in a way that is respectful to resident's needs, the village's history and the natural environment, whilst enhancing Corfe's appeal as a tourist destination, particularly throughout the winter months. It was discussed that the need was not so much to increase footfall in the already busy summer months, but to lengthen the 'cusp' of the busy season.

The second person to speak in the public half hour was lain Leslie who is one of Corfe's local Police Community Support Officers. He attended representing the police force and updated the Council on recent changes in community policing and on events specific to the village. Iain advised that their 'patch' is broader than it used to be; covering Norden, Chruch Knowle, Worth Matravers, Langton, Kingston, Studland, the Poole Harbour Islands and Swanage town, which inevitably absorbs a lot of their time.

He spoke about crime prevention and urged members of the community to look at two systems in place to help tackle crime. Firstly 'Dorset Alert', you can sign up to this via their website www.dorsetalert.co.uk and will be alerted of any crimes or news specific to our area. The second was a website called www.immobilise.com, which again is an online service. Goods such as power tools, electrical items, jewellery, and silverware can be logged and recorded. In the case of tools and electrical items this involves noting serial numbers and with other items, photographing and noting a description. This data base of information allows goods to be identified in the event of a theft and aids the police immensely with identification and pursuing a prosecution. If goods are not registered there can be no way of linking them with the crime so lain would urge all members of the community to look at immobilse.com, see how it would be relevant to them and to sign up. lain emphasised the need for the public to report crime and clarified how to report it; in the event of a crime happening, if you can foresee a crime happening or if a life is in danger, call 999. If a crime has been committed and discovered later then call 101. Even if the Police are unable to solve the crime due to lack of evidence they would rather have a true perspective of the scale of crime in our area, no matter how small.

District Councillor Nigel Dragon reported that the local plan forums mentioned in last months' CVN have been cancelled. On the agenda for a

forthcoming District Council meeting was the suggestion that a survey of randomly selected households will take place as a form of consultation on the Local Plan. There was speculation over how these households would be selected and how representative a consultation carried out in such a way would be.

The plans for the Unitary Council are still proceeding but progress is unclear. The leader of DCC is in touch with the Minister and a decision is anticipated before the end of the summer. There is concern that if the Unitary Council does go ahead the County offices will be situated in North Dorset and Purbeck could find its self out on a limb. The drive and purpose of the Unitary Council is to work efficiently and together to save money however the district Councillor would like to see evidence that true savings will be made after the administration costs and other costs resulting from the establishment of the Unitary. PDC has been invited to have two representatives on a Committee that has been established to look at the changes ahead. As PDC voted against the formation of the Unitary Council they would proceed with a strict declaration that their presence was not their endorsement of the Unitary Proposal and they still stand against it.

There was no update regarding the proposed TRO in the Village Square to serve Norden Park and Ride, other than that the whole project was on hold. The Council would like to establish why this is. The Cllr had attended an action group at which he queried if the TRO could be used by agencies other than the proposed park and ride but was unable to get an answer. It was felt it would be beneficial to be an 'open stop' and may ease congestion in the village.

The National Trust were represented by their new area Operations Manager Alison Warren and Jonathan Kershaw who is the lead ranger in the area. Alison reported the Tudors have inhabited the Castle for the coming weeks so not to be alarmed if movement is seen in the grounds overnight.

The National Trust car park ticket machine at Castle View was recently broken in to, fortunately the money was removed daily from machine as the Trust had been warned that thefts were occurring.

Jonathan advised the project for the Rings has been rescheduled as a phased project moving forward over the next three years; starting with tree removal and then moving onward with fencing. It is a big financial investment and Jonathan wants to ensure it is done in the best possible way.

A member of the Council attended a meeting in Mead Road with the Highways Agency from DCC to discuss the implementation of double yellow lines on the corner of Battle Mead. The process for the implementation is long winded, beginning with a points measured evaluation in which the primary focus is how dangerous the current situation is. Being a residential

area with slow moving traffic the Council have been advised it would not score highly in priority but would certainly be considered. In the meantime the representative form Highways is looking in to another option as a temporary measure.

The Council had a second meeting with Highways to walk through East Street and asses the new quiet road surface. Whist on the whole the Council were very pleased with the work there were several snags which the Highways team are going to address. Many of the rattling ironworks are actually the property of Wessex Water and Highways will be contacting them to request replacement. There is a temporary repair to the tarmac outside 158 East Street which will be rectified, the time frame for this is three months and the Council will be monitoring it. A complaint was raised about the aesthetics of the finishing of the surface. The Highways representative responded that their objectives were the swift, accurate, execution of a job and the safety of the finished work, not aesthetics which they have no budget for. Whilst they have fulfilled their objectives DCC's policy on highway maintenance in a conservation area contradicts listed building regulations which need to be so strictly adhered to and the Council will be approaching County Council to discuss this.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to proposals for the following: Alterations including the replacement of the roofs over the garage and lobby at Farriers, 3 West Street, Kingston. Addition to drainage, installation of mains gas, boiler, tank and central heating, h/c water supply, electrical re-wiring and replacement of front door, guttering and down pipes at Eastgate, 116 East Street, Corfe Castle. To replace an existing chimney at 166 East Street, Corfe Castle and the installation of two Pay and Display machines and related instruction signage at Castle View Information Centre. A "just quorate" June meeting of the Parish Council took place at Church Knowle village hall; the other Councillors attending the Purbeck District Council's meeting in Wareham to protect the East Creech Conservation Area armed with expert opinions and the Parish Council's critique of PDC's planners plans to seriously affect the uniqueness of East Creech hamlet and environs. It would appear, from reports, that the Parish Councillors and East Creech Parishioners attending the PDC meeting, may have also had some spiritual assistance from the now long gone East Creech Seven, as well as having the expert opinions of learned professors, judging from the result which allowed the Church Knowle & East Creech "guerrillas" to fight another day. (You can see the East Creech Seven's memorial near the East Creech "triangle".) Here's the result so far:

- PDC deferred its decision on the alterations to East Creech conservation area until September pending further "investigations",
- PDC's Planning Team (Ms Bridget Downton et al) to consult more with parish councils,
- PDC's Policy Group to consider Goals, Objectives & Policy definition of conservation areas.
- There must be detailed discussions to allow parish councillors to have informed participation.
- The PDC Policy Group to meet in September to discuss the East Creech conservation area with recommendations given to PDC,
- CKPC Members & East Creech Parishioners will be able to attend and speak at the PDC Policy Group meeting in September.
- East Creech residents would assist in open discussion on the conservation area boundaries.

The Parish and hamlet received considerable support at the meeting from PDC Cllrs Barnes, Lovell, Wharfe, Suttle & Izzard; the latter emphasising that Creech Barrow was the highest point in Purbeck and THE local landmark. And, of course, the help provided in the opinions given by the internationally renowned professors and PhDs on PDC's planners' proposals was invaluable. So, watch this space.

Now on to the Parish Council meeting proper. Because there is still no permanent Parish Council Chairman, Cllr Page was elected the Chairman of the meeting by the three remaining Members attending. It was decided that as there were only 4 Parish Council Members and 1 Parishioner present, several items on the agenda should be adjourned to the August meeting so that full

discussion on the matters could take place. Planning and finance matters, however, were discussed and invoices paid.

Public discussion before business consisted mainly about a planning application for a new barn at East Creech Farm. There were concerns about the "over-urbanisation" of East Creech with more and more "built environment" being produced around the farm which impinged on the general amenity of the hamlet and the surrounding land. There was also concern about another proposed development – again in East Creech – which included construction of poly-tunnels, stabling and a composting lavatory at the other end of the hamlet. Letters had been submitted to the Parish Council objecting to the proposed developments and Members took note of the comments raised. It was suggested that copies of the letters should be sent by the writers to PDC for consideration during their deliberations.

Following Public Discussion, the minutes of the June meeting were approved and there were no matters arising for discussion at the time. Business then went on to discuss "Planning Matters".

First up came an application (No 6/2017/0374) for the development of land opposite "The Bungalow", Grange Road. (It's not really on Grange Road, but on the narrow road to East Creech from Grange Road). Members had previously deliberated over an application for the same site, which had been withdrawn, and now examined an application which was similar to but, on the face of it, less intrusive than the previous one. They had concern about the toilet block and felt the building, and the proposed stabling would be out of character for the area. Whilst they had no planning objections about the individual buildings, they objected to the use of the field for building development bearing in mind its proximity to the East Creech conservation area and its adjacency to an SSSI and the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

The next planning application was that for a new barn at East Creech Farm (No 6/2017/0363). It was reported that residents had suffered from a considerable amount of dust pollution caused by vehicles using the farm track to one of the other barn developments at the farm and it was suggested that another barn would obviously increase use of the track resulting in increased dust nuisance. Members heard that an alleged previous planning condition requiring the track be metalled had, apparently, not been complied with. Whilst the Parish Council did not object to the size and height of the barns, having regard to the fact that modern farm machinery needed good headroom and floor-space, it felt that the buildings would be excessively intrusive to the landscape if constructed with the finishes described in the application. Whilst it did not object in principle to the development, it decided to recommend to PDC

that a the planning conditions regarding suitable and sufficient metalling of the farm tracks to reduce dust and mud nuisance be properly enforced and that the outside of the barn be coated with a surface to reduce visual impact to an acceptable degree.

An application (joint) to make additions to 14 & 15 Church Knowle (No 6/2017/0330) was then examined in detail. Members had some concern about the use of zinc sheeting proposed for part of the new roof rather than slate, but decided that the fall of the roof was such that slates might be inappropriate from the point of view of weather-proofing. Bearing in mind that the zinc sheeting was at the rear of the building and, therefore, not visually intrusive they would not object to the development on that basis. However, what did concern them was the proposed use of green oak vertical planking as cladding. This, they felt, was completely out of keeping with the stone cottage of unique design and, indeed, its near neighbours. The building is in the centre of the Church Knowle conservation area and, consequently, the use of such panelling would seriously affect the visual impact.

The "Jungle of Cocknowle" is on the march again and the Councillors decided to contact DCC to get it cut since the hedge on Cocknowle House Corner (opp Cocknowle House) is now causing visual obstruction and is a risk to road users of all types. Cocknowle Hill's a pretty dire road to negotiate at the best of times. DCC would also be asked to enforce hedge cutting at Plumtree Cottage in Church Knowle; the hedge being about 1metre or so into the road and causing vehicles and horse riders to veer into the road to avoid damage or self-injury. The Parish Council also decided to seek permission to place bollards on the grass verge outside the entrance to the playing field and playground to prevent on-verge parking which is resulting in a danger to children and adults coming out of the entrances because they can't be seen by oncoming traffic.

Next up came "Finances". The Clerk reported on the annual audit of the Parish Council's accounts and presented the monthly accounts and invoices. The finances are healthy, with loads of "lolly" in the "kitty", and invoices were paid. No-one seems to be interested in filling the vacancy on the Council and it may be necessary to cajole some unsuspecting Parishioner into becoming a co-opted Councillor; who knows, that same person might even be "conned" into being elected the Parish Council Chairman!

The cardiac defibrillator is now installed, registered with South-west Ambulance Trust and up-and-running. Let's hope it doesn't have to be used, but at least it's there, outside the New Inn, if it had to be – Heaven forbid.

Councillor Barnes (PDC), who as earlier mentioned had arrived after the PDC meeting, reported on the East Creech conservation area discussions and on

what's going on with regard to the proposal by Bournemouth, a couple of the Dorset district councils and, of course, DCC to unite the Dorset district councils into one giant behemoth of a unitary authority with Bournemouth, Poole and Christchurch forming a second. Purbeck, Christchurch (for pretty obvious reasons) and East Dorset are apparently not in favour of the proposals and are going to have some "discussions" about the "way ahead".

Cllr Page then closed the meeting. The next one is on 08^{th} August at 7:30pm in Furzebrook village hall.

The latest news on work by the National Trust and the local community to create a sustainable future for Middle Beach is set out in a new leaflet. A Middle Beach Working Group made up of representative of the National Trust, Studland Parish Council and the Middle Beach Action Group has been looking into plans to respond to coastal change at Middle Beach since last year.

A response is needed because existing sea defences are reaching the end of their lives while members of the community and visitors told us they did not want to lose the café.

"After many months of meetings and consultations with a wide range of experts, the group feel that they have found a solution," says the leaflet. "The group want to provide a new café and toilets in a safer location at Middle Beach. During this transition period the current facilities and defences will be maintained. Once the new facilities are open, the defences will be removed allowing the shoreline to adjust to a natural state.

"The group have worked hard to design a proposal that will ensure a sustainable future for both the natural environment at Middle Beach and its facilities.

"Now we want to engage with our visitors, members and the wider beach community to discuss how this adaptation strategy can work for everyone." The full leaflet is available from National Trust places including Knoll Beach in Studland, Currendon Farm and Corfe Castle.



'FITNESS' FESTIVAL SET TO GROW



Purbeck based Company Nordic Walking UK have inspired people all over the UK to enjoy being active outdoors and now their Purbeck Nordic Walking Festival is attracting people from as far as Japan, Russia and Texas! Corfe Couple Mike and Gill Rollason moved the business to Purbeck when their main offices in Milton Keynes flooded in 2012 and they now run a lively local group with 3 local Instructors (the Purbeck Nordic Walkers) as well as having trained over 5,000 Instructors to set groups up elsewhere. "The concept is simple, walking with poles is as effective as a cross training machine in the gym if you master how to do it

correctly" says Gill who has also written a book on fitness walking which was published by Bloomsbury Press.

Nordic Walking is an adaptation of the training regime used by cross country skiers so it works 90% of the major muscles, burns almost double the calories per step and yet feels easier than walking as the poles provide propulsion and make you lighter on your feet. "You have to experience it to believe it" Gill says "but the results are amazing and its suitable for everybody. It's great for those with lower joint problems, helps to alleviate back and neck pain and tones the arms, legs and backside too"

Last year the Nordic Walking UK team joined forces with the Purbeck Marathon and Purbeck Outdoor weekend to create two distance challenges for nordic walkers and a 'Festival of walks and workshops' that made the most of the local scenery and hospitality. "It started fairly small" says Gill "but the bookings kept flooding in and soon we had a schedule packed with 64 walks, 20 workshops, taster sessions and the challenges. More than 300 people came to enjoy themed walks such as Jurassic Geology, Thomas Hardy, The lost Village and even Cream Tea walks! The local group pitched in to help plan and lead the walks as well as help at the Festival Hub which was based at Sand Pit Fields in Swanage. "We wanted to showcase Purbeck and link with

The Revd John Andrews writes:

I recently read a rather startling book entitled "The Bible for Grown-ups", and I realised that my view of the Good Book has changed since my first introduction to the Jesus story in Sunday School....and rightly so. "Gentle Jesus meek and mild" was what I was taught, but in adulthood I discovered that the Jesus of the Gospels could be anything but "meek and mild". I am reminded of another book title: "The Hard Sayings of Jesus" - I have not read it, but the title sticks in the memory.

Jesus did indeed say some hard things - not only to the religious leaders of his day, whom he branded as hypocrites, but also to those who sought to follow him.

In Matthew ch.10 Jesus is reported as saying "Do not think I have come to bring peace on earth, I have not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I have come to set a son against his father and a daughter against her mother...." Elsewhere he says "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you." What kind of message is that?

Well, it's a *revolutionary* message. I haven't written these words before, but I am bound to say that Jesus was a revolutionary - and that's why the authorities were desperate to get rid of him. He came to turn the world's standards upside down, and to show that God's way is not the same as the way of the world.

The human race, left to itself, strives after power, influence, status and wealth. Jesus taught - and demonstrated in his own life and death - that God sets no value on worldly ambition. In its place he favours the virtues of humility, service, good-neighbourliness, and - above all - self-sacrificing love. Jesus expounded these values in his parable of the Good Samaritan; in his entry into Jerusalem on a donkey; and in his willing submission to injustice and a cruel death, to prove that what God values is often the opposite of what mankind values. Revolutionary... *or what*?

The sad story has a happy ending: an apparent defeat turns into a glorious victory; out of death came a new life in which we all can share. The "revolution" is complete!



What are you like at coping with change? Last month I shared with you some of the changes that had taken place because of the stroke my wife experienced on the 5th.June. For Chris, the changes have been enormous. For the last six weeks she has not been able to walk, to go to the toilet, or to do any of the other things that we take for granted. For the last six weeks, she has seen her husband for just a few hours each day. For the last six weeks, she has been unable to "potter" in the Church garden or in our own garden. Everything has changed. Nothing is how it once was.

The changes in my life have been different, but just as all consuming. I am not used to the feeling of hopelessness. You want to change the problems a loved one is experiencing, but you can do nothing for her, except hold her hand, and pray for her. I am now getting used to doing the weekly shopping and ensuring that I have three meals a day, including a cooked meal in the evening. I am now getting used to putting the TV on, when the house seems particularly quiet and empty. My daily routine has totally changed and, as well as the above, there are the daily trips to Poole Hospital. It seems as if the car now automatically makes its way to level G, before it starts to look for a place to park.

I very quickly discovered that it was impossible for me to care for Chris, and for myself, and for the Church, therefore I recently gave my resignation as the Pastor of the Chapel, but was unable to tell them on what date my ministry would finish. I thought that it would be within the next six months. My thinking at that time was that when the hospital needed to discharge Chris, which I had presumed was two to three months away, but I suddenly discovered was three weeks, that she would need a Care Home place not too far from Corfe Castle. At last here was something that I could do. And I did. Within a few days I had made several phone calls, visited two Care Homes, and decided on a room in one of them. At last I could begin to visualise the future.

That brief feeling of comparative normality disappeared after a week. At a granddaughter's 21st.Birthday Celebrations, it came to light that a relative was professionally involved in caring for people who have had strokes, and her recommendation was that if we were moving to Essex in six months time, which we were, because all our three daughters live there, as well as our five granddaughters, then it made far more sense to move Chris from hospital to a Care Home in Essex rather than involve her in two moves in six months. She was also able to arrange for her to be professionally assessed and then

recommend a person to provide personal physio treatment, if we wished to go down that particular pathway. She emphasised that personal attention, in the first six months after a stroke, was all important.

As a result, I spent last Thursday and Friday morning visiting six Care Homes in Essex, and then this morning, choosing one of them and notifying them of my decision. For a few hours there was a feeling of accomplishment. At last something had been sorted. A base had been laid, on which I, or should it be we, could build. But that feeling didn't last long. After a representative from the Home had spoken to Poole Hospital, the recommendation was that Chris should be transferred to their neighbouring Nursing Home rather than the Residential Home I had chosen. All change, yet again!

As a result, it looks as if I will be heading for Essex yet again next week in order to view the Nursing Home, because I was willing to pay the higher costs since that Home was the furthest away from what one imagines as an Old People's Home. Chris and I are both 78, and I am not old so she can't be! She needs a lot of care, but not because she is old, but because she has had a stroke!

However my second visit to Essex will have a double purpose. If Chris is going to be moved to Essex, perhaps in a week's time, then there is no way that I am staying in Dorset. Already this morning I have been on the Web looking for flats or apartments in Braintree, Essex, because the chosen Care Home is just outside Braintree. I have never rented a property for my own benefit ever before, but what is the point of buying one, when Chris' future is totally unknown. I don't know if we will ever be able to live under one roof again. I don't know if we will need a bedroom each in the future. I don't know if we will ever sleep in the same bed again. Everything has changed. I don't know anything with any certainty any more. No, that's not true. Despite everything, my faith is just as strong. I know God loves both Chris and myself. I know that, with His help, we will get through these stormy days. There is no magic wand, but His help is only a prayer away. He doesn't necessarily take away the problem, but I have already experienced the fact that He gives you that inner strength and calm disposition, to cope with whatever life, not Him, throws at you.

The spiritual truths are the things that I know. All the rest is mainly unknown. I don't know if this will be my last letter in the Corfe Valley News. I don't know the date of my last Sunday at the Chapel. I don't know what the future of the Chapel will be. I don't know where I will be living in a month's time. I don't know if Chris will ever be able to walk again, or if she will need a hoist and be confined to a wheelchair. The list of my "Don't knows" is endless.

We all tend to think that we have got the future sorted. We plan for this and that. We assume that what we have planned for, will become a reality, but the stroke that took place on the 5th. June, has taught me a lesson. A certain future is an illusion. We don't know what the future holds. What is far more important, is

knowing who holds the future.

So, if this is my last letter, my thanks to those who have taken the trouble to read the letters of the past, and to those who have expressed appreciation. Thank you also to those who have invited me for a meal, or have remembered me when cooking their own meal, and done an extra serving. Thank you also to those who have remembered Chris and myself in prayer. Be assured, He has answered, is answering, and will answer in the future. It is just that we don't always get what we pray for, but that isn't what prayer is about, is it?

Every blessing from the pastor who can no longer be available to you, seven days a week, and 24 hours a day.

Responsible Rockpooling

What better way to spend a hot summer's day than rockpooling at the beach or taking a refreshing dip in the sea? We might enjoy it but summer can be a difficult time of year for the creatures that inhabit the rockpools. The long, sunny days can greatly increase the temperature of the rockpools and the animals face a higher risk of drying out as the water evaporates in the heat. More beach visitors can add to the pressure, so spare a thought for them and make sure you follow the Seashore Code:

- Watch where you walk try to avoid walking in rockpools and across seaweed
- Make sure you put rocks and seaweed back carefully in the same position that you found them
- Take only photo's, don't take live animals
- Don't prise animals, such as limpets, off the rocks for crab bait
- Please dispose of litter responsibly put it in a bin or take it home
- Be careful around the cliffs, rock falls are frequent and unexpected



KINGSTON CONCERTS

Music of high quality but of very different kinds returns to St James Church, Kingston, next month (September) in two separate concerts.

The first at 11.30 am on Sunday, September 3, brings back the internationally renowned cellist Natalie Clein and a bunch of friends, all outstanding musicians in their own right, to give the closing concert of her annual and expanding Purbeck International Chamber Music Festival.

On offer to the Kingston audience will be two lesser known works, Passacaglia and Fugue (1944) for string trio by the Czech composer Hans Krasa and Morning Blues by Per Arne Glorvingen, a Norwegian composer who is also a master of the bandoneon, that essential ingredient of the tango. The concert will end with the richly melodic String Sextet in A major Op. 48 by Dvorak, whose music forms one of the themes of the festival.

The second concert at 7 pm on Thursday, September 28, will mark the return to Kingston of Northern Harmony, a choir of 16 exceptional young American singers steeped in the folksong traditions not only of their home country but of South Africa and of European countries like Bulgaria, Corsica and Georgia.

Their intriguing programme ranges from the rich sounds and syncopated rhythms of South Africa to American shape-note singing derived from the community singing of 18th century New England to the ancient three-part harmony singing tradition of Georgia.

Most of the singers have studied these different traditions in their countries of origin and bring to their performances all the enthusiasm generated by the joy of discovery and understanding. Many of the songs are accompanied by dance and by instruments whether it be the fiddle, oboe, drum or tambura, a kind of long-necked lute originating in Mesopotamia but now widely played elsewhere including in Eastern and Central Europe.

Each year, the beauty of Purbeck and the energy and enthusiasm of our audiences inspire me to come up with new repertoire and bring musicians that you may not have heard perform live before. I am incredibly excited to be bringing for the first time to Purbeck some of the most outstanding musicians from around the world that I know, as well as welcoming back two firm Purbeck favourites, Lara St. John and Katalin Kokas. Kati will bring her husband Barnabás Kelemen whose virtuosity and musical imagination will inspire all who hear him and I am personally very proud and happy to invite my most respected colleague, the cellist Adrian Brendel. Three of the greatest Norwegian musicians, Christian Ihle Hadland, Lars Anders Tomter and Per Arne Glorvigen will be with us and Per Arne will perform several of his highly original and effective compositions as well as performing a theatrical masterpiece by Kagel and of course the Argentinian Tango composer Astor Piazzolla. Indeed, the dance element in music inspired one of the strands for the programme of the festival, ranging from the dances of Bach and Khachaturian (book early for Lara St. John and the Berlin Philharmonic's phenomenal first harpist Marie-Pierre Langlamet's recital in Worth Matravers!), through Haydn, Mozart, Dvorak, Hans Krasa and Piazzolla to a modern day wild and very

groovy Tango. And speaking of wild dances, Saturday evening will be a one off chance to witness the rarely performed masterpiece for string quartet, harp and narrator (narrated by Robert Rinder of 'Judge Rinder' and Strictly come Dancing stardom!) by the French composer André Caplet. The piece is based on a poem by Edgar Allen Poe and is a musical and theatrical tour de force. As always, the spoken word is included with music in different ways and this year we also have the charismatic mathematician (yes they do exist) and music lover Marcus du Sautoy giving a fascinating lecture on the 'Song of Symmetry' in Bach's Goldberg variations before Christian Ihle Hadland performs the variations on the piano. There will also be a lecture on Saturday at 2pm by Jason Price, the director of Tarisio and expert in stringed instruments, who will talk about the history and details of several of the instruments that are played by the string players. Our instruments have stories to tell (some dating back to the 16th century) and this will be an unmissable extra event. Another programmatic strand running through the festival is the chamber music of Antonín Dvořák. I have always adored his music and I believe he is one of the only composers that one never tires of with his endlessly inventive and natural melodies. Brahms said melody runs through Dvořák like water. I'm sure after hearing the String Sextet, Bagatelles and beloved Piano Quintet op. 81 you will all agree!
