

APRIL AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

During the public discussion period concerns were raised regarding the materials used on the new building opposite the Old Telephone Exchange. Portland Stone has been used in the detail on the roof; a material which weathers very differently to Purbeck stone, retaining its white appearance and contrasting with other buildings in the area. It is thought to be the only Portland stone used anywhere in the village. A further complaint is that the roof has been tiled with concrete, as opposed to Bradstone slate roof tiles which would have been more harmonious with the style of roofing in the village. The matter has been reported to planning at PDC.

We would like to draw your attention to the forthcoming District County Council election and urge you all to turn out on May 4th to vote for a Councillor to represent your views. Your County Councillor is there to make decisions on behalf of the community and offer to support to local organisations and issues. Corfe Castle Parish lies within the South Purbeck division and should you need you can find details of your candidates online. Our current County Councillor, Councillor Mike Lovell, will be standing down as of May and we would like to take this opportunity to formally thank him for the time and commitment he has given to the Parish during his term.

Continuing the topic of County Council you may or may not be aware that Dorset County Council may soon become a Unitary Authority, consisting of two authorities representing Rural and Urban Dorset. These would potentially replace the nine local district Councils we currently have, including Purbeck. Progress on the reform was recapped at the meeting; some Councils have written letters of opposition to the Secretary of State and Christchurch , who voted against Unitary along with Purbeck, are holding a referendum. A decision is expected from the Secretary of State imminently, the outcome of which will undoubtedly effect the Parish Council and we watch developments keenly.

Noise and disturbance during the night has been reported coming from both Sandyhills Copse and along the railway line. This will be monitored and may well become an environmental health issue if it continues and escalates. The noise has been noted in conjunction with numerous cars parking in Sandy Hill lane which is an ongoing highways concern.

The council have no updates on the repairs to the pavements in East and West Street but please be assured we are pursuing the issue. DCC have made a second proposal for the diversion of Footpath 34 to run around the

west side of the hard court area in the school playing field. The Council has objected to this proposal, upholding their original suggestion that the diversion pass on the east side of the hard court which is both a more direct route and in open view.

Necessary repairs are soon to be completed in the playground. The see-saw should be repaired by the time this goes to press and the Councillors will be undertaking some improvements to the paintwork in the coming months. This will render the play equipment out of bounds for a short while so please bear with us whilst the painting takes place.

As of yet we have had no one come forward to volunteer to monitor the proposed defibrillators so we would like to appeal again to any 'guardians' who may be able to spend a few minutes every fortnight checking a unit. The checks are not onerous but would provide an invaluable service to the community. We have had a further pledge of financial support for the funding of the project and are optimistic a national organisation may provide one of our defibrillator units which would be fantastic.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to proposals for the following: Listed building consent to make alterations to Honeysuckle Cottage, 22 West Street, Kingston. Conversion of a roofspace to include two dormer windows at 136 East Street, Corfe Castle. Full planning permission for change of use to a dwelling at The Former Public Toilets, East Street, Corfe Castle. Listed building consent to make internal alterations to provide guest bedrooms with en-suite bathrooms at The Greyhound Inn, The Square, Corfe Castle. Listed Building Consent to remove internal cement and render from hallway and replace with lime mortar and limewash at Brushwood Cottage, 74 East Street, Corfe Castle. Retrospective listed building consent to erect a new roof including re-thatch, roof timbers, fireboarding and rebuild at Brushwood Cottage, 74 East Street, Corfe Castle. **Ali Burnett, Parish Clerk**

NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

April's was one of the Parish Council's "mini" meetings and was held at the Church Knowle Reading Room.

One Parishioner was in attendance and ClIrs Mike Lovell (DCC) and Malcolm Barnes (PDC) arrived during the meeting. ClIr Lovell reminded attendees that he would not be standing for election as a county councillor at the May local government elections so there would be a "new face" coming to Church Knowle's meetings from then on. We might even see our new county councillor at the annual Parish Meeting on Tuesday, 09th May. The Chairman thanked ClIr Lovell for his work as our county councillor during his tenure and wished him a pleasant retirement at which time Mike reminded everyone that he would be continuing as a district councillor, though not as one representing the Parish.

The draft minutes of the March meeting were recorded as a true record of proceedings with several matters arising. Firstly, our dear reader will recall that some Steeple parishioners had come to the March meeting to request CKPC adopt their 'phone box on Grange Hill; the Clerk reported that following discussion with the Parish Council's insurers and BT it would be possible for CKPC to "adopt" it for the very reasonable price of £1.00p. Councillors decided unanimously to adopt it. Following on from that, the Chairman reported that the application to have Church Knowle's 'phone box listed had been accepted by the DEFRA Secretary of State and, consequently, the box outside the Reading Room has been saved with the telephone reconnected. The meeting also heard that following CKPC's discussions with PDC, the district council has objected to the removal of the 'phone box in East Creech and although it hasn't been "listed" it appears safe for the time being.

Another "matter arising" related to the installation of the cardiac defibrillator unit at the New Inn. The meeting heard that the tenant was happy with CKPC's request that it be fixed on the outside wall of the garage at the New Inn so that it would be obvious to those who may need to use it in the event of a life-threatening emergency. So, everything's going ahead with that and, hopefully, at least one life may be saved as a result.

The Chairman reported that the planning application for development at Rachel's Plantation had been turned down by PDC as an "invalid application".

Bearing in mind the meeting was a "mini" meeting, it was decided to postpone reports and discussions regarding the dire states of some of the Parish metal finger posts and the plans by the Parish Council to deal with verge parking by the entrance to the playground until the May meeting.

Another "matter arising" related to PDC's census of "second homes". Members had done a count of such properties and the number appeared to be 31; which is pretty large considering the total number of houses in the Parish. The Clerk would duly inform the district council.

The main objective of a "mini" meeting is to discuss planning matters. The replacement of a rotten wooden lintel at Barnston Manor was discussed. Although permission had been previously granted by PDC for the replacement of one such lintel on removing it another was found by the builder. It was, therefore, deemed necessary by PDC for a separate application to be made. There was considerable discussion as to why such an application was needed and Councillors felt to insist on such an application was a complete waste of time. They reviewed the application and the application was unanimously supported.

This brought us to matter of a suspected unlawful development by BT's broadband contractor of the installation of a green metal box approximately the size of a coffin on the village's car parking bay immediately outside Knowle Cottage, smack bang in the middle of the village's zone 1 conservation area. The Clerk had made enquiries and had been informed that no notification or application for permission for installation had been made either to PDC or the landowner (Dorset County Council). Members thought it a travesty that full planning applications had to be made for the installation of a lintel to replace an old rotten one at Barnston Manor or that listed building consent had to be given for the installation of life-saving equipment at the New Inn, but, apparently, BT's contractors could plant a green junction box immediately outside the front window of a listed building in the middle of a conservation area with impunity. Members decided to report the matter to DCC and PDC. They also decided to write to BT for an explanation and suggest that the unit be moved to a site less obtrusive. They also decided that an invitation be made to the contractor to attend a Parish Council meeting to explain the reasons behind the decision for siting the box. With regard to all this, it was also decided to write to PDC expressing the Council's concern about the planning matters concerned.

Past Planning matters were then reported on and the progress of applications noted.

The accounts were examined, agreed, and bills paid.

Under "Correspondence", the Chairman reported on a report sent from DAPTC to parish councils regarding rural housing for which an early response was required. Members decided to set up a working party and authorised it to provide the response.

During the general discussion period concern was expressed about a surfeit of onpavement parking in Church Knowle village. Several motorists have been parking their cars in such a way that the pavement is blocked and wheelchair users, mothers/fathers etc with baby buggies have to go into the road to move past the cars. Whilst the council recognises the difficulties for residents with limited off-road parking it is an offence to obstruct the pavement for pedestrian use. Members suggested that motorists parking their vehicles should be aware of the law and ensure there is sufficient room for pedestrians with buggies etc

The Parish Council heard that the residents of Cotness whose house was gutted by fire almost a year ago should be able to return to their rebuilt cottage by the end of April. This was greeted by goodwill messages from those present at the meeting.

The next meeting will be at Church Knowle village hall on 09^{th} May following the Annual Parish Meeting which begins at 7.00pm.

The engagement period over our plans for Studland's Middle Beach has been extended by a month to allow for more research, while a new member of staff is looking at how we can work more National closely with coastal communities.

Last year a motion opposing plans to remove outdated sea defences at Middle Beach and move facilities to sustainable locations was discussed at the National Trust AGM.

The motion was defeated, however the Trust announced it would spend six months engaging with the community through the Middle Beach Working Group, which includes representatives from Studland Parish Council and the National Trust.

Five months in, the group has been exploring the science behind coastal change at Middle Beach and our plans to adapt based on the Trust's Shifting Shores strategy.

Part of the plan is to remove gabion sea defences as they reach the end of their lives to restart the process of beach replenishment by allowing the cliff to erode naturally.

Now, after questions were raised over the composition of the cliff, the Trust is employing specialist contractors to carry out a full geophysical survey.

They are due to be on site during April with the results going back to the Middle Beach Working Group in early May. As a result, the engagement period has been extended to May 30. At the same time the group is looking at options for the future location of the café and toilet block based on criteria including long term sustainability, planning restrictions and the views of the community.

The group's final recommendation will then be submitted to the National Trust for approval.

Meanwhile, Sarah Spinney has been appointed Coastal Change Engagement

Officer for Purbeck.

She may be firmly grounded in the hard science of coastal change, but Sarah believes the relationship between location and community is key to managing changing sites as places rather than simply coastlines.

Sarah thinks managing the impact of coastal change on sensitive sites like Middle Beach will increasingly demand a more holistic approach than has been traditional. Communities can be left feeling the agencies involved give too little weight to their views when basing assessments on readily quantifiable factors such as economic value, she says.

The challenge is to incorporate social and cultural values into the process.

"Even if we can't quantify it I'd like to develop ways of giving it some weighting so that we bring it into discussions," said Sarah.

"The key message is that anything we do on the coast needs to be a really integrated approach that takes into account the ecology, the morphology, the cultural and everything else."

"I think it is about appreciating the places on the coast rather than just the physical coastline itself." MANY HANDS MAKE LIGHT WORK: Staff and volunteers from the National Trust, RSPB Arne and Natural England joined forces to coppice gorse on Hartland Moor. Young, bushy gorse is very good habitat for Dartford warbler but left unmanaged it can spread and become old and 'leggy'. Cutting gorse on a regular basis encourages the young stages of growth which are more beneficial for wildlife. In the past gorse was cut by local people for firewood, especially for use in bread ovens as it burns at a high temperature and produces very little ash. Working in partnership for the day gave us a chance to pool resources, meet new people and share ideas and

knowledge about heathland and wildlife management. The baked potatoes, tea and biscuits were not too bad either! We hope to continue this partnership with a joint task at RSPB Arne next year.

May is when honey bees start to swarm in their thousands!

Although the huge cloud of bees that usually takes to the air on a warm, pleasant day around noon is awe inspiring and perhaps a little frightening there is no need for it to be particularly so with the boys and girls of the East Dorset Beekeepers Swarm Collection Team a phone call away from helping you out.



The mass of bees can actually turn the sky dark for about twenty minutes before the old queen of a colony (who has been evicted along with about 20,000 of her old soldiers) decides to settle on the branch of a tree, a wall or a hedge. The bees are at their most docile. No home to defend, and their stomachs full of honey, it is now a waiting game as they send out scouts to search and report back on the suitability of new homes in the locale.

And here's where East Dorset Beekeepers come in. The Association prides itself on the service of its swarm collections and will, in most cases be able to remove the swarm within the day. This not only

helps to protect bees under threat but also supplies our beekeepers with colonies which they can go on to make thrive. In addition we appreciate we are providing a valuable public service and preventing a call out to the dreaded Pest Controller.







The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

I write this on Easter Sunday afternoon, having taken part in two church services this morning as my youngest son was manfully (in both senses!) toiling away cooking our Easter Sunday roast lamb – for which I was very grateful, and to which I was much looking forward. But what was drawing me irresistibly home after church was – *my Easter Egg*! CHOCOLATE!

I am happy to report that, once I had painfully negotiated the first few days with several embarrassing incidences of simply forgetting I wasn't supposed to be eating what was in the act of being swallowed - I did manage not to eat chocolate or crisps until today. Having been literally *unable* ever before to do this – I am astonished. My powers of self-discipline are non-existent, my aptitude for self-indulgence is infinite, and my ability to make excuses for myself is unbeatable ... but somehow it has happened. I think it was after I wrote last month's letter for the CVN that I noticed a change in my attitude. Having confessed via the CVN to the world at large how weak-willed I am, it suddenly became unthinkable to break my Lenten resolution, and not difficult to stick to it ... because, I realise now (as I write this) the all-consuming craving for chocolate seemed to have disappeared. Which I find very surprising indeed.

I said I would report back in May – and this is it.

On a different subject altogether: May is a month with Bank Holidays at both ends. The first happens tomorrow. 'Holiday' is a corruption of 'Holy Day', and Holy Days were days set aside, usually in memory of one saint or another, for rest, prayer, worship, and feasting. They were days designed to nourish both the body and the spirit – but not one more than the other. Rest and feasting refreshed and replenished the body; prayer and worship, usually in church in the company of other like-minded friends, invigorated the inner person, giving them peace and motivation to continue the daily grind of their work, whatever it may be. Holy Days and Holidays were times for relaxation and enjoyment.

Good Friday and Christmas Day have been common law public holidays since long before records were kept. By the 1830s the Bank of England observed 33 Saints Days and Religious Festivals as holidays; but in 1834 these were reduced to a mere 4: May Day (1st May), All Saints Day (1st November), Good Friday and Christmas Day. In 1871 the Bank Holidays Act added to these Easter Monday, Whit Monday, 1st Monday in August, and Boxing Day; and nowadays New Year's Day, the last Monday in May and the last Monday in August are also Bank Holidays.

The pace of life has speeded up with the arrival of technology designed to make our lives easier, but in the real world just making it possible to include more in a day, and so making them actually more work-filled. When God gave Moses The Ten Commandments he specified the Sabbath as a day of rest, for exactly the purpose of our modern-day Holidays. As far as possible, let us be resolute in observing our Holidays; let us keep them as Holy Days designed for relaxation and enjoyment, and for refreshment and replenishment however we choose to realise these aims. Above all, let us allow ourselves to trust in the love God has for his creation, and particularly for each one of us. No matter how small and insignificant our concerns may seem in the greater scheme of things, God is deeply interested in the tiniest details of our individual lives; if we ask for help, he will unfailingly give it.

By the time that you read this article, everything may have changed. I am referring to what is happening on the world stage. America has just dropped the "mother of all bombs" in Afghanistan; a carrier strike force is on its way to North Korea, and military action has recently taken place in Syria. It is also believed that North Korea are preparing to carry out further tests of their nuclear bomb, and Russia is meeting with Iran and Syria, to review their response to what is taking place. It is hardly surprising that China, Japan, and the nations of the world, are holding their breath, and wondering what happens next. Too many fingers are hovering over too many buttons, and everything could go terribly wrong with a loud bang. Meanwhile, the Christian Church celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, one of whose titles is the "Prince of Peace".

Is peace possible? Not just peace between nations, but peace within our parliament; peace at our places of work, and peace within our homes. Last month I asked the question, "Why can't we learn to live together in harmony, with those with whom we hold different points of view?" Whether you are watching children squabbling in a playground, or world powers, living on the brink of hostility, what you are dealing with, is human nature. To state the obvious, human nature is capable of incredible acts of loving kindness, but it can also go to the other extreme and engage in that which can only be described as evil.

But let me take you back to where we all started. We all came into this world as new born babies, so what went wrong, or for that matter, what went right? How did the good become good, and how did the evil become evil? Are we born, some with a good disposition, and some with a disposition towards evil? Is it all to do with how we are brought up? Do we become who we are, as a result of our parents and life at home? Or is our future mapped out in our genes?

If the latter is true, if, in some way, we are pre-programmed, then those who perform evil can't be blamed, and those who perform good, shouldn't be commended. To hold such a belief, is to deny what most would accept, namely the reality of freewill. Most of us believe that we are capable of choosing, and the ability to choose, includes the ability to choose right rather than wrong. If we do not have freewill, then we are nothing more than robots, functioning according to a programme that we did not choose, and about which we can do nothing.

Before we go any further, we need to acknowledge that there are many influences that play an enormous part on the person we become. The influence of our parents, and the sort of home life that we experienced. I have never smoked or drunk alcohol. Why not? Mainly, but not solely, because neither were evident in my home life, and I naturally followed suit. Our three daughters have followed me on the first, but not on the second. They made a choice. Schools also play a part in the person we become, but so does our place, or should it be our places of work. And what of the influence of friends? Those with whom we spent our leisure time? What part did they play in the person that we became? How many parents, as a way of trying to explain how their son or daughter have got into trouble, have declared, "They got in with the wrong bunch."

From the moment we are born, we all have a collection of genes, about which we can do nothing, and the influence of those genes is still being didcovered. As the months and years roll by, we are all subjected to a whole variety of influences, once again, many of which we can do little about. But, and it is a very big but, they are only influences. In themselves, they do not determine our future, because we can still choose. We still have, what I believe is the God-given gift of freewill. We can choose the pathway of goodness or we can choose the way of evil, or wickedness, or whatever you want to call it.

For me, yesterday was Good Friday, when Christians remember the crucifixion of Jesus. Judas chose to betray Jesus. Simon Peter chose to deny Christ. Pontious Pilate chose to wash his hands and hand Jesus over to those who wanterd Jesus dead. The crowd chose to have Barabbas released, and instead screamed for Jesus' crucifixion. We can all choose, and the choices that we make, can follow the influences to which we have been subjected, or, we can choose to live in a way that is contrary to the influences that we have experienced. The influences are nothing more than that. They are only influences. They do not determine the sort of person that we become. We do. We have a choice. We have the gift of freewill.

My parents had Church connections, but they didn't go to Church. I never saw a Bible in our home, and I was never introduced to prayer. Don't get me wrong. They were good parents, but they weren't Christians. Jesus was never mentioned, not even as a swear word. At the age of 19, because of the girlfriend of that time, I found myself in the Town Hall in Birmingham with 3,000 other young people, and I was faced with a choice that I had never faced before. The call, the challenge of Jesus Christ to follow Him, and to put Him first in all future decisions, for the rest of my life. Whatever influences I might have experienced prior to that moment, were put on one side, and I chose to say, "Yes", to the call to follow Him. Whatever influences you might have experienced thus far in your life, you have that same choice.

The situation that the world finds itself in at the moment is not as God would wish. The Prince of Peace seeks the way of peace for all mankind. As the nations of this world face the possibility of a nuclear war, we need to hear and respond to the claims of Christ, whose greatest desire is that all should be saved from what evil can inflict on us all.

Fingers hovering over buttons. They have a choice to make, and so do we.

May God help us all to make the right choices.

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A unique Victorian steam locomotive

that escaped the scrapman's cutting torch thanks to the centenary of London's Waterloo station has arrived the Swanage Railway – thanks to the generosity of the National Railway Museum.

Having starred in acclaimed stage productions of 'The Railway Children' on both sides of the Atlantic, the ownership of Adams 'T3' class No. 563 has been transferred to the Swanage Railway Trust by the National Railway Museum.

Arriving on a road transporter at the Swanage Railway's road-rail interchange at Norden on Wednesday, 12 April, 2017, the Victorian steam locomotive – shrouded under a protective tarpaulin – was hauled to Corfe Castle station by a British Railways Class 08 diesel shunter dating from 1958.

Built in February, 1893, for hauling express trains on the London and South Western Railway, the 4-4-0 wheel arrangement locomotive was withdrawn by the Southern Railway at the end of the Second World War in August, 1945, by which time it had run a total of 1.5 million miles.

Designed by William Adams for smooth running at up to 80mph – and built at Nine Elms in London, carrying three tonnes of coal and 3,300 gallons of water – the 81-tonne No. 563 was not scrapped in 1948.

Instead, the unique locomotive was selected for restoration and display at the centenary celebrations for London's Waterloo station during 1948 in a move that thankfully guaranteed the preservation of No. 563.

A delighted Swanage Railway Company chairman Trevor Parsons said: "It's absolutely incredible to see the T3 on the Swanage Railway and marvellous that she has finally arrived. Even with the protective tarpaulins over her, you can really appreciate the locomotive's distinctive and charming Victorian lines.

"The locomotive is a complete original and sports its livery dating from 1893 – the T3 is a time capsule from 1945 when the locomotive was withdrawn by the Southern Railway after a hard working life of 52 years," he added.

"The vacuum pressure gauge for the brakes still has the original 'L&SWR' – for London and South Western Railway – written on the plate behind the glass. Step on to the T3's footplate and you are transported back in time 120 years to the 1890s and the life of Victorian railwaymen," added Mr Parsons.

Part of the National Railway Museum collection at Locomotion, the National Railway Museum at Shildon in County Durham, the T3 was transported by sea to Canada in 2011 where it had a six-month starring role in Toronto's Roundhouse Park for a theatrical production of 'The Railway Children'.



Returning across the Atlantic, No. 563 again took to the stage when the production – an adaptation by Mike Kenny of E. Nesbit's much-loved novel – was staged at King's Cross station in London where a thousand-seat pop-up theatre had been built.

Swanage Railway Company chairman Trevor Parsons added: "We are delighted, thrilled and very grateful to the National Railway Museum for

donating such a rare Victorian steam locomotive to the Swanage Railway.

"Thanks to the T3's ownership being transferred to the Swanage Railway, we hope to suitably display the locomotive to the public and illustrate a period of important London and South Western Railway history that has previously not been possible. Our primary aim is No. 563's conservation and preservation.

"Only twenty of the T3 class of steam locomotive were built for the London and South Western Railway in 1892 and 1893 – and No. 563 is the only survivor of the class so it is unique," added Mr Parsons who is also a Swanage Railway volunteer signalman and train guard.

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
