#### CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

#### MARCH AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

The Council has ongoing concerns regarding several highway issues that have been repeatedly raised with DCC. A representative from Highways attended the February meeting and we are hoping to make progress on several issues. Two of most concern are the poor repairs to the Purbeck Stone pavements in both East Street and West Street. The repairs are detrimental to the character of the village and we are hoping to soon meet a resolution with DCC to carry out the necessary modifications to reinstate the pavements to their former condition.

Purbeck District Council has requested all parishes submit a second homes audit and we have begun work on this. The purpose of the audit is to gather evidence to paint a realistic picture of unoccupied homes across the Purbeck region. The results may in turn have an influence on future planning policy.

The Community Land Trust group met to discuss the legal process of forming a Trust, prior to considering potential sites. Their focus is to deliver affordable housing to local people. Funding has been agreed at the Council meeting to push forward with the establishment of the Trust.

The Council can report the Registration Service is still available in Swanage albeit on a limited availability of 10.00am-11.30am Tuesdays and Thursdays. Registrations must be by appointment only. The hope is that this will help those who perhaps cannot travel and access the larger towns easily although understand the demand for appointments is high.

The Council are planning to install up to four defibrillators in the two villages; one unit in Kingston and three units in Corfe Castle. These will require 'guardians' who will be responsible for fortnightly inspections which would take around five minutes to complete. The defibrillators are being funded by fundraising and charitable donations and we thank everyone supporting and donating to this worthy cause. The units and their 'guardians' will be an invaluable service to the village. If anyone would like to volunteer to be a guardian or make a financial donation towards the units please do get in touch with the Clerk.

The AGM has been scheduled as a separate meeting from the normal Parish Council Meeting and will be held on Monday the 24<sup>th</sup> of April in the Village Hall. Please do attend and take the opportunity to raise any issues or ask the Council any questions you may have. A speaker will be in attendance to talk about using defibrillators.

The National Trust have replaced the car park ticket machine at Castle View and will be applying for planning permission to erect a second machine. The

new machines will accept cash payments, including the new £1 coin, and also scan National Trust Membership cards to issue tickets. This is move to phase out fraudulent use of the current car-sticker system.

With disappointment it was reported that Land Rovers are using Byway 70 (on West Hill) irresponsibly and the route is in such bad condition it is almost impossible to walk. Recent monitoring had showed a responsible and careful approach was being taken by vehicles using the route however due to recent wet conditions and a disregard for the condition of the path this is no longer the case. We hope it is a small number and would ask anyone using the byway for off-road activity to please take utmost care.

The recent litter pick took place on the 25<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> of February as part of 'Litter Free Purbeck' and was a resounding success. Many volunteers turned out for the occasion and used equipment provided by the council to remove eleven black sacks of rubbish. Some of the most prominent littering was found to be on the village hall playing field and the area around the Kingston Junction, the litter has now been removed for all to enjoy the clean space.

You may have noticed Corfe Castle were 'Flying the Flag for the Commonwealth' at St. Edwards Church on the 13<sup>th</sup> March. We will be raising the flag annually so do look out for next year if you missed it this time.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The parish Council objected to an application for alterations and extension to a roof to form a dormer window at 30 Halves Cottages, Corfe Castle. The objection was made on the basis the proposal is out of character with neighbouring properties and would be overdevelopment of the site. The Parish Council had no objection to a proposal for the following: The erection of a two storey side extension in Mead Cottage, 53 West Street, Corfe Castle and to demolish and erect a replacement garage extension at 2 Halves Cottages, Corfe Castle. It referred one matter to DCC Highways regarding access at Lindon Lea, 119 East Street, Corfe Castle.

#### The meeting will be in the Village Hall at 7pm on Monday 24th April.

There will be a presentation about defibrillators and information about the Parish Council project to install defibrillators in the villages of Corfe Castle and Kingston.

This is an opportunity for Parishioners to quiz the Council about what is going on and to hear what the Council is doing.

So come along and have your say.

#### Parish Clerk

Everyone will have heard by now that Jeff Dunn, our Parish Clerk for over 13 years has retired. Jeff has been an outstanding clerk guiding the Council in its deliberations, maintaining all the accounts, liaising with other public organisations and bodies and recording all the meetings. He will be a difficult act to follow.

Our new clerk, who was selected by competition, and who will follow in Jeff's shoes is Ali Burnett. Many will already know Ali as she worked in Why Jewellers for many years and therefore knows the Parish well. The Parish Council welcomes Ali and looks forward to working with her.



#### IN AN IDEAL WORLD THEY WON'T BE USED ....

.... nevertheless, the Parish Council is keen to see 24/7 public access defibrillators installed in the village. We are lucky to already have support from last year's Harmans Cross Horse Show and are looking forward to the proceeds of this spring's Purbeck Ploughing (see elsewhere in this edition), however we need more money, as well as time and effort, from local people to make it happen.

The current thinking on defibrillators is that if someone is ill enough to merit its use, then doing so is likely to improve their medical outcome. The machines are easy to use, making the all-important 'charge' decision themselves, so you need no experience or medical knowledge. If you phone 999 for an ambulance and the operator decides that a defibrillator could be of use in the circumstances described, they will tell you where the nearest one is AND despatch an ambulance to you at the same time. What you need to do is follow instructions until a medical professional arrives.

We are keen to see three units installed in Corfe Castle village and one in Kingston and although we already have some plans, suggestions are actively invited as to where they can best be sited. They need to be as accessible as possible, in the open air and with a power source as the cabinet the machine lives in is heated to prevent damage in freezing conditions. If you are thinking of offering a 'private' location, we are advised that the power consumption is in the region of £20 per year at current rates.

#### WHAT WE NEED

Funding - each unit, installed in a cabinet, costs in the region of £1800

Volunteers - the machines need checking regularly and the results input via an app on a smartphone. It takes all of about five minutes and we need local people to volunteer and join the team of 'guardians'. You will be issued with the necessary kit (WD40) but need your own smartphone.

#### **NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL**

March saw one of CKPC's "main meetings" at the Church Knowle Reading Room. There was a lot to talk about and things to so it went on for quite some time (after 10 o'clock, even).

Before the Public Discussion Period, Cllr Bugler declared a pecuniary interest in a planning application for discussion during the business meeting.

Public discussion began with a small contingent of parishioners from Steeple parish concerned about the possibility of BT ripping up their lonely old 'phone box at Creech and carting it away for scrap or selling it for about £3,000 to some collector in the USA or a Russian oligarch to use as a shower room. (Our dear reader may think this comment is in jest, but just "Google" - 'Old BT Phone Boxes for sale, prices' and you'll see why BT wants to take them out. Anyway. Steeple apparently wants to adopt its 'phone box for £1.00p but as it only has a Parish Meeting rather than a council, cannot raise a precept, has no bank account and (very importantly for BT) no public liability insurance BT won't play ball. CKPC, however, can, and is in the process of having its own at East Creech adopted whilst the one at Church Knowle is being "listed" as a building of architectural or historic interest; as a "listed building" BT would be obliged to retain the apparatus ie "phone" in working order. Following the Steeple parishioners' presentation, Members discussed what CKPC could do to help and decided to contact its insurers to see if an old telephone box in Steeple, if adopted by CKPC, would come under its insurance. The matter would then be given fuller consideration at the next meeting. This pleased the "Steeple-ites" who went off as "happy as Larry" later in the meeting.

Two Parishioners then described amendments to a planning application – Withy Lakes – which would be considered later in the meeting.

After the minutes of February's meeting were read and confirmed as true record, several matters arose; notably the Army road and bridleway closures. The meeting heard the Chairman had written to the Army following the presentation by Lt Col (Rtd) Davies confirming the concerns raised during February's meeting. Whilst Lt. Col. Davies had informed CKPC that it was unlikely the roads up Steeple Hill and Grange Hill would be closed again in the near future the Chairman pointed out lack of funds was no excuse for not complying with the conditions set out in the Byelaw. The PDC solicitor had also been spoken to with a suggestion the Byelaws regarding signage, etc., be enforced.

Next came the CKPC defibrillator saga. The Clerk reported on discussions he had with the tenant of the New Inn where it was proposed the unit be sited. Apparently, "listed building" planning permission would be required. One Parishioner and a Councillor wondered how many fatal heart attacks could happen while PDC planners were talking and deciding on the application.

#### NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

Members agreed. Further representation to PDC Planning Department would be made regarding the relative merits of community safety versus listed building status. Watch this space.

The Parish Council has submitted its critique on PDC's proposals regarding the East Creech conservation area and is eagerly waiting PDC's comments. CKPC objects to the plans and will send a deputation to the planning board when the matter comes up.

Planning applications were next on the agenda.

The meeting had no objections to the demolition of a building and replacement with a wooden garage (06/2017/0096) at 47 Furzebrook Road, but had some concern about increase in height of the new building.

Cllr Bugler then left the meeting as he had an interest in application number 06/2017/0107 relating to a variation to an existing application (6/2016/0544). The Council had no objections to the variations applied for.

Puddlemill Farm had three planning applications which required comment from the Parish Council, one of which related to installation of windows (6/2017/0092). Whilst the Council had no objection to the application, they were surprised that consideration did not appear to have been given to using sustainable and energy-saving double glazing. With regard to the other Puddlemill applications (6/2017/0046 & 0047) there were no objections.

The tree and hedge overgrowths at Longround Cottages will soon be things of the past as trimming and cutting works have been approved by the Parish Council and work should start pretty soon.

The new fencing and hedging around the playing field has been completed at very reasonable cost and really looks the part. Thanks and congratulations to all involved were given and Members agreed the guys deserved the Parish's gratitude for a job well done. The Council also considered planting wild flowers on the verge outside the entrance to the playground and see what could be done to prevent the parking of vehicles on the grass; this produces an unacceptable risk to children running out of the playground who would not be seen by drivers because of the parked cars, etc.

Next came Finance; these were in good order and bills were paid.

Reports on recent planning update training and PDC/Parish Chairmen liaison meetings were given and Members took note of the information.

The Chairman reminded all that he would not be seeking re-election as Chairman in May and also that there would be a litter pick in the Parish. And that was that. Next meeting will be at Furzebrook Village Hall on 11<sup>th</sup> April starting at 7.30pm.



It is hard to believe how quickly the first part of this year is progressing! As always, we have been very busy in school and have all been enjoying our learning. On Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> March, we celebrated World Book Day (a day late!) with the staff and children dressing up as a character from a book. All of the staff dressed as various characters from Harry Potter! Although the school wasn't quite as magical as Hogwarts, we did have a lovely day with the all children's learning based on books and finished with a special assembly to share our activities with parents and carers. Our PTFA organised a fun-filled Spring Disco and a film night which were both very well-attended. Thanks, as always, go to the tireless volunteers who help to make fundraising exciting! We also had a cake sale to help raise money for Steps for Stan and supported Comic Relief with a Corfe Castle Bake Off and wearing something red. We would like to warmly invite everyone to our Easter Service which will be held at St Edward's Church at 9.30 on Friday 7<sup>th</sup> April. This provided an excellent opportunity for children to share their learning about the Easter Story and for us to all join together to give thanks and praise.

As you may be aware, we have been campaigning for our Zebra Crossing to be changed to a Pelican Crossing. Unfortunately, this is looking more and more unlikely, although there are plans in place to repaint the Zebra Crossing which should at least make it more visible.

Many of you will have seen me recently watching the traffic in my high-vis jacket! What I have witnessed has amazed me. In addition to the many drivers who did not stop, there have been people impatiently tooting their horn, one driver who stopped but then started again when the person crossing was not fast enough, and numerous examples of people noticing at the last minute and then trying to stop.

Hopefully, my intermittent presence at the crossing will encourage drivers to slow down and stop if someone is waiting to cross, though it is important to note that the Highway Code states that pedestrians only have right of way once they have stepped out onto the crossing.

As you approach a zebra crossing

- look out for pedestrians waiting to cross and be ready to slow down or stop to let them cross
- you MUST give way when a pedestrian has moved onto a crossing
- allow more time for stopping on wet or icy roads
- do not wave or use your horn to invite pedestrians across; this could be dangerous if another vehicle is approaching
- be aware of pedestrians approaching from the side of the crossing. (Highway Code, Section 195)

We regularly teach the children about Road Safety and will continue to ensure that they understand the possible dangers, particularly when crossing the road.

Dorset County Council has suggested that we ask locally if any businesses would like to sponsor a School Crossing Patrol Person (Lollipop Person). It is likely to present a cost of approximately £3200 a year. If you are interested in sponsoring this or know someone who might, please do get in touch.

Thank you for your continued support in this and all matters relating to the safety and learning of our children.



For any life threatening requirements please call 999 and ask for the ambulance service.



#### The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

Well! We've all examined our consciences during Lent, and – speaking for myself – found myself distinctly wanting. Wanting self-discipline, that is. The only thing I have actually managed daily during Lent is to read and pray using the little Lenten Prayer Booklet given out by the Diocese. Mostly, I have to admit, because the pages are so small and what you are supposed to do takes very little time. You could, of course, spend an hour or so each day on it – you could even expand it into an actual Service and invite your friends to join you; but you can, also, grab the booklet first thing in the morning, read the verses from Scripture, concentrate fiercely on the Reflection, deafen the dear Lord by the determination with which you pray the prayer, and spend the rest of the day doing the Action whenever you get a spare moment not doing something else.

It isn't much to offer God, is it? But at least, I tell myself, it is *something*. Rather than nothing. At the moment self-denial food-wise seems to be escaping me. As soon as I decide not to eat chocolate during Lent – or crisps – all I can think about is chocolate – and crisps … they swim about in my consciousness so that they become the ONLY things I want to eat all day, every day, for ever and ever. It's a dirty trick played by the body on the mind.

It is not the things themselves that are dangerous. Although chocolate isn't very good for you because of the sugar content, and crisps aren't very healthy because of their salt content, what is *really* bad for you is the craving. It is a mind-prison. Which is where learning verses from Scripture comes in. Some of the most powerful and effective can be found in Matthew Chapter 6 verses 9 to 13, what we know as The Lord's Prayer: 'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name' reminds us who we are praying to, holy God himself. 'Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven' reminds us God is in charge, and what he wants to happen on earth will eventually come about, as it does in heaven. 'Give us today our daily bread' reminds us of the source of our well-being. 'Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors' reminds us we shouldn't expect to be forgiven our sins, if we are continually resenting the sins others have committed against us. 'And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one' reminds us we always have a choice, to give in to temptation, or to resist it.

So get thee behind me, you vile, tricky, temptation-of-the-taste-buds; I don't want you. Help me, Lord, to make right choices.

Why does it seem to be so difficult? But is it ... <u>really</u>? Didn't Jesus say "My yoke is easy and my burden is light"? (Matthew 11:30) April is the month of Easter, that time after the darkness of Good Friday when the world

becomes astonished and delighted by the bright white light of Jesus' rising from the dead, death defeated and the evil of man's inhumanity to man in retreat. Always, always, it is God who comes to the rescue before we've even thought of asking for his help, out of his great love for his creation. All we have to do is our best, and he does the rest ... the stuff we can't manage on our own.

Last month I wrote about 'taking up' prayer 'for Lent' rather than 'giving up' something. Now, I think both at once is probably the best idea. But will I be able to report back in May that for the first time I have managed to keep a Lenten resolution? If so, it won't be by my own efforts, but only because somehow I have been helped. Watch this space!

Last month, I expressed my personal beliefs that failing to provide for children's spiritual needs was a form of neglect. I did not seek to apportion blame, because I think that it is something that we all, in our different ways, are guilty of. I am not sure what response I expected. But what has happened since the Corfe Valley News went to print, was way beyond any expectation that I might have had. Because of what has happened, it would be wrong of me to go into any more detail, but it has raised another matter, about which I feel at liberty to write.

The question that I want to ask is, "Why is it that, as human beings, we seem to find it so hard to live at peace with those who think differently to ourselves?"

I can quite understand that we are all different. We have different backgrounds. We have different beliefs. We have different ideas as to what is right and wrong. We have different personalities. We have different political views. We have different interests, and different understandings of what is important. We represent different age groups. Every human being is unique, and therefore, even when we join together in groups, it is normally a case of "birds of a feather, flocking together." We tend to associate with those with whom we have a common interest, whether that interest be sport, politics, music, or gardening. My question is, "Why the antagonism that so often follows?"

We see it at work in the playground, when children are just at the beginning of their life's journey. The child who is seen to be different is the one that you can guarantee will be picked on. I wore glasses from the start of my time at school, so it was inevitable that I was "Four Eyes", and then I was also ginger, which added another reason for being considered to be different. I was the only one of my friends to go to a Grammar School, so I was labelled a "Swat".

Since my time at school, other reasons have been found in order to treat others as different. Children who have different coloured skin, or, by their language, obviously have a different country of origin. Those who are different can very quickly become the butt of class humour, and that can easily turn to acts of violence.

Down through the centuries nations have fought nations, and those of one religious persuasion have fought those of a different persuasion. I think of the situation in Ireland, and the tension that has existed for decades between

Catholics and Protestants. But this is not the only division within the Church. A former minister of the Church where I ministered in Plymouth, ended up in prison on Drakes Island. His only "crime" was that he wouldn't join the Church of England, but chose to express his faith in a Non-Conformist Church. One of my Church Members in Plymouth had been brought up in a Brethren Church. When she married a Baptist, the family decided to have nothing more to do with her, and would walk past her in the street, without acknowledging her existence. What is wrong with us? Why can't we live at peace with those who are different to us, or think differently, or behave differently?

Later this month, some of us will be recalling the events of that first Easter, which includes the Crucifixion of Jesus, and then His Resurrection. The problem that I have been referring to, is this what lies behind the Crucifixion? Did Jesus end up being crucified being He was different? He was different to the religious leaders, different to the High Priests, and the Scribes, and the Pharisees. What they considered to be important, Jesus seemed to have a different opinion. His understanding of God, was different to their understanding. Was that why He had to be got rid of? Was He seen as a threat to the status quo, because He was different?

But what about the ordinary people? On Palm Sunday they were cheering for Him, but less than a week later, they were screaming for Him to be crucified. Why the change? What had He done to bring about such a change of heart? I think that they suddenly realised that the sort of Messiah that they thought they were going to get, was very different to the sort of Messiah that Jesus intended to be. Once again He was different, and so violence followed.

In America, there has been tension between black and white for a very long time. At the time of the Civil War, the tension was between north and south. Then it became tension between Republicans and Democrats; now we have tension between Donald Trump type Republicans, the original sort of Republicans, and Democrats. Much of the horrendous situation in Africa is caused by civil wars taking place within a nation. Why do we find it so hard, if not impossible, to live at peace with those who think differently, or act differently, to ourselves.

Personally I enjoy the diversity that we find within the human race. I am glad that we are not all the same. My wife tells me that one Barry Walton is quite enough! But we do need to learn to accept that we are all different and we have a right to express our differences. I am not going to apologise for what I wrote last month, because it is the truth as I see it. However, I will apologise if it upset anybody. That was not my intention. I was merely trying to raise what I believe to be an important issue.

The message of Easter is a message of reconciliation – the reconciling of man to God, but also the reconciling of human beings to each other. May God help us to live at peace with those who are different to us, and therefore with those with whom we may not agree.

May I wish you all a very Happy Easter.



# LARGEST GATHERING OF BULLEID PACIFIC LOCOMOTIVES SINCE 1967

The largest gathering of working classic

1940s Bulleid Pacific class express steam locomotives since the summer of 1967 will be taking place on the Swanage Railway – marking the 50th anniversary of the end of British Rail steam trains in southern England.

Five of the massive steam locomotives – built at Eastleigh in Hampshire by the Southern Railway for use on its main lines between London and the coast – will be hauling trains through the Isle of Purbeck during a three-day 'Strictly Bulleid' event from Friday, 31 March, to Sunday, 2 April, 2017, inclusive.

And for one of the visiting Bulleid Pacifics – Battle of Britain class No. 34053 'Sir Keith Park' – it will be the first time that the classic locomotive will be seen at Swanage since the summer of 1964 when it hauled a long train from the Purbeck seaside resort up to London's Waterloo station.

A bonanza of brilliant Bulleid Pacific steam locomotives, the special trains will be running along the whole nine and a half mile length of the Swanage Railway — including the newly completed four-mile extension between Norden and the River Frome, within sight of Wareham.

It was on Sunday, 9 July, 1967, that the last Bulleid

Pacific steam locomotives hauled long express trains, at speeds of up to 100 mph, between London, Basingstoke, Southampton, Bournemouth, Poole, Dorchester and Weymouth.

The end of steam trains on British Rail's Southern Region on Monday, 10 July, 1967, saw electric trains brought in between London and Bournemouth with diesel trains operating between Bournemouth and Weymouth.

Swanage Railway general manager Matt Green said: "We are looking forward to the sight of five classic 1940s Bulleid Pacific steam locomotives in action which will be the largest gathering of Bulleid Pacifics since the end of steam trains in southern England during the summer of 1967.

"It will be very evocative and reminiscent of the Bournemouth and Weymouth locomotive depots from the mid-1940s through to the end in July, 1967.

"The last British Rail Bulleid Pacific steam locomotive ran down to Corfe Castle and Swanage on Sunday, 18 June, 1967, at the head of a long excursion train for railway enthusiasts marking the impending end of steam trains in southern England after more than a century," The huge frames of yet to be restored West Country

class Bulleid Pacific No. 34010 'Sidmouth' will be on display at Corfe Castle station during the 'Strictly Bulleid' event.

And the Swanage Railway's Herston engineering works — on the outskirts of Swanage—will be open on the Saturday and the Sunday so the public can admire Battle of Britain class Bulleid Pacific No. 34072 '257 Squadron' in the final stages of its restoration.

The four Bulleid Pacific steam locomotives visiting the Swanage Railway for the three days of sheer Bulleid brilliance will be West Country classes No. 34046 'Braunton' and No. 34092 'City of Wells' as well as Battle of Britain classes No. 34053 'Sir Keith Park' and No. 34081 '92 Squadron'.

The fifth Bulleid Pacific appearing at the 'Strictly Bulleid' commemorative event will be Swanage Railway-based Battle of Britain class No. 34070 'Manston' which sports its original 1940s air-smoothed casing over the boiler.

Visiting Bulleid Pacific No. 34046 'Braunton' will be appearing in the guise of fellow Bulleid Pacific No. 34052 'Lord Dowding' which was scrapped.

The award-winning Purbeck Mineral and Mining Museum will be open next to Norden station as will be the goods shed museum, exhibition coach and cinema coach at Corfe Castle station. There will also be enthusiast and trade sales stands at Swanage and Corfe Castle stations.

A year's membership of this friendly and supportive group costs less than two double scoop ice cream cones (£5). Come along to the RBL and join us.





#### East Dorset Beekeepers On War Footing For Asian Hornet Invader!



Members of the East Dorset beekeeping group have been mobilising to combat the potential devastating impact on Dorset's bees from an invader from China that threatens to decimate the local bee population.

The Asian Hornet has already caused havoc in France and reached the Channel

Islands and Tetbury in Gloucestershire last year.

The invading insect is particularly fearsome, although slightly smaller than our native European Hornet, and will 'hawk' in front of bee hives in mid-summer catching and decapitating bees returning to the hive. The unfortunate honey bee is then chewed into a paste and fed to the hornet's young larvae. A group of Asian Hornets can decimate a colony of honey bees within 3 hours!

Over sixty East Dorset Association Beekeepers met and planned their defence. They learned to identify the insect and then built monitoring traps which will catch spring Queens of the invasive species and alert Defra to the threat.

It remains to be seen whether the Asian Hornet will reach our county this year but our beekeepers are prepared for the threat.
