CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

APRIL AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council Meeting was shortened to the hour before the Annual Parish Meeting in order to allow time for some of the normal business before the Annual Parish Meeting which commenced at 7pm.

Approximately eighteen residents attended the Annual Parish Meeting on a pleasant evening. The Meeting started with Mrs Linda Barnes of Purbeck Valley Farm providing information on the events on the farm in 2015 – eight weddings, the Young Farmers Club Weekend and the Folk Festival. The latest licence for the Folk Festival would be for four days in August and there would be an exclusion zone next to the property belonging to Mr & Mrs Gadd. The Young Farmers Club event would have a five day licence this year. Cllr Dragon said he attended the Licence hearing at Purbeck District Council. As a result of all the representations to that tribunal about the Folk Festival, the four day, 24 hour licence means the Licensing Officer, Mr Ian Carter, and another officer who can monitor noise levels will be available all through the festival and can be contacted by telephone.

Mr Spreyer of Woolgarston said that he and all the other twenty nearby dwellings hear everything that goes on at Purbeck Valley Farm because the land slopes up the hill to Woolgarston and Sandy Hill Lane. He remembered the 2003 planning permission being given by Chairman Julie Wheeldon including a condition of vegetation planting which he thought had not occurred. Mrs Barnes said it had been done. His issue with Purbeck Valley Farm was their non-compliance with Planning requirements, the lack of noise measurements at houses affected by the events and the area becoming a theme park. It was no longer a tranquil area. Mr Spreyer missed the date of hearing as he would have liked to speak. Cllr Dragon advised him that he would not have been able to speak without giving prior notice and registering. Cllr Dragon said he had raised questions with the Licensing Officer about who is consulted as it didn't appear to include neighbours; how is it advertised - on the property and where in the press? Mr Spreyer wanted to know how the 28 days allowed for farms to have events is measured in view of all the preparation work for the events which would come to far more than that number of days allowed if measured strictly. He has lived at Woolgarston for 26 years and now the formerly peaceful location suffers lots of noise in the summer. Cllr Stephen Dru Drury, the Chairman, said the Council would investigate the matters raised.

Donna Davis and Gill Sellen spoke about the withdrawal of funding by the County Council and how all the Youth Club workers will be made redundant by the 1st September 2016. The Chairman said the Council wished to support the Youth Club and the workers by funding the next year

through an intermediary such as Swanage Town Council. The Precept may need to be increased for future years if it were to become permanent and might require a referendum. Swanage Town Council may be preferable as an employer to other organisations such as Ansbury. The Chairman suggested a meeting with the Youth Club workers to discuss possibilities before the Youth Club Management Committee public meeting on the 27th April in the Village Hall. Donna Davis said between twenty and thirty children attend the Youth Club.

Mr Roger Frost asked what had happened about the removal of the post box to Station Road. Cllr Dru Drury informed him the matter had been taken up by the office of Richard Drax MP South Dorset who would be writing to the Chief Executive officer of Royal Mail.

The developers of the Arfleet Mill Lakes which is to be known as Dorset Waterpark in the persons of Liz Turner, CEO and a colleague were available to answer questions but there were none when the Chairman requested them. The Chairman and other Councillors had inspected the changes in the last few days.

Cllr Dru Drury, reported on Parish Council activities during the last year. He said the Council is experiencing a lot of change with the County Council having to work with a £40m deficit. This was manifesting itself as the withdrawal of funding for the Youth Club. The County Council was studying the various possibilities for changing to a couple of new unitary authorities instead of the nine existing District Councils in order to save money. He thought this might result in Parish Councils taking on more services and needing both more staff and funding to do so.

There is a continuing housing problem where Purbeck District Council are having to find another 2,240 houses. The Purbeck Partial Review Action Group has come up with three current options: (1) Three large sites; (2) A proportional spread of 10% over all the areas; (3) Two large sites and the rest spread over the remainder. The preferred option will be decided at a Council meeting at the Purbeck School on the 19th April. Afternote; it has now been recommended that 3080 new houses be built on 6 sites over the District, but not including Corfe. This approach will be put out to consultation during June.

The expansion of the Norden Park & Ride is being driven by a need to compensate for the loss of the car spaces being eroded at Studland, to provide connections to the Castle and village and a railway connection to the A351. The expansion is likely to take place on a field between the Norden roundabout and Castle View.

CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

The Council previously decided not to do a Neighbourhood Plan but it may well be that recent changes may cause the Council to rethink this matter.

Affordable housing continues to be in short supply and the Parish Housing Register is kept up to date in order to explore options for doing something about the problem. More affordable rental housing needs to be built somewhere in the village.

The Parish Council does general maintenance around the villages and employs contractors to keep weeds down. The playground is looking good since the old hedge was removed by the adjoining owners. New fencing and gates have been installed and a bit more fencing between the equipment is due to be done. Use of the Youth Shelter caused complaints from residents but the situation was sorted out with help from Donna so that none of the other options thought about were necessary to resolve the matter. The Parish Council cuts the grass to the playground and supports grass cutting for the Sports Field and supports the Sports Trust and the pavilion. All the benches in the village have been repaired recently including the one near the bus stop which the Council has just adopted.

Mass cycling is another recent issue for the Parish. There are no permissions or other controls to influence race events where numbers of cyclists are below 500 competitors. Discussions have taken place with Purbeck and New Forest Councils who also have the same problem. The Council is getting together with Church Knowle Parish Council to try and promote a solution.

The Councillors attend various committees and liaison groups to influence matters being dealt with by other organisations. The Council is involved with Gods Acre, the Village Library, the National Trust and the Village Hall improvements. It runs two tourism meetings.

The train to Wareham should have started later this year but rolling stock needs to be replaced. The track has been done and the crossing work and road rail interchange at Norden completed.

A recent meeting at Perenco revealed increased oil production with four nodding donkeys re-opened but falling oil prices has affected their profitsy.

The Council objected to the Navitus Bay Wind Farm and was pleased that the Secretary of State did not seek to overturn the decision of the Planning Inspectorate.

The District Council consults the Parish Council on planning (41 applications over the last year) and tree matters. There is a Minerals Plan where the Council received views from Kingston residents over possible proposals to extend the Swanworth Quarry towards the village. The

Council supports local industry but has concerns about this possible development.

Dorset County Council have been requested to repair and upgrade the stone pavements in East Street between the School Crossing and the Square. The School itself requested the County Council upgrade the crossing to Puffin status but the recent survey does not support such an upgrade. The Council has asked County to install double yellow lines between Sandy Hill Lane and 1 East Street (in the area currently marked by Police cones) to prevent the A351 being blocked by parking in the summer months.

The Post Office moved into the Stores and this has gone well and they have provided a good service.

The Queens 90th Birthday celebrations will be incorporated into village events starting on the 21st April with beacons in the Castle, then the 5th May and finally events on the weekend of the 11 & 12th June.

Councillor Bond provided a summary of the financial position of the Parish Council. He explained why the Parish Precept had not been increased for the current year (as for the last couple of years). This had required a reduction in general reserves. If Councillors had known previously about forthcoming cuts to other services like the Youth Club then the Precept might have been increased. However, current reserves would allow for ad hoc funding of the youth workers until a more sustainable plan could be created. The Council does not receive any income other than the Precept and this is used to pay wages, grants, removal of Gods Acre rubbish and the weeding of the streets amongst other things. This has increased from £19,850 last year to £20,275 this year.

He suggested the Parish Council may need to look into providing other services such as for the youth and elderly if District Councils do disappear in the future. However, he did not want to create a new bureaucracy and hoped the Council could outsource jobs to existing organisations like Swanage Town Council in order to use money as efficiently as possible. Parish Councils are currently not capped like larger authorities who if they exceed a 2% rise must call a referendum but this might change. There were no questions.

The Chairman, Cllr Dru Drury, thanked all the Councillors for their hard work over the last year.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to the proposal for the following: The erection of a new agricultural barn at Hartlands

Farm, New Line, Norden. The partitioning off of part of the attic to create a shower room, the replacement of a bedroom window, garden room doors and guttering at 95 West Street, Kingston.

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Council issues safety reminder to private housing landlords

Purbeck District Council is reminding landlords and tenants of legislation affecting the private rented sector which came into force recently.

Since October 2015, all privately rented property must be fitted with smoke detectors on every storey and carbon dioxide detectors in high risk rooms, for example where solid fuels are used. Landlords must check smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are working at the beginning of each new tenancy. Failure to comply could lead to a fixed penalty notice from the Council.

At the beginning of each new tenancy, landlords must give their tenants a new information booklet produced by the Government called 'How to rent'; an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC); and a current Gas Safety Certificate (if there are gas appliances in the property).

Tenants also have rights which prevent retaliatory eviction by their landlord in the event that a tenant complains about the state of repair of their property.

Letting agents representing landlords must also be registered with an official dispute resolution scheme approved by the Government.

Richard Conway, Environment Manager, Public Health and Housing Services at Purbeck District Council, said: 'Although the majority of private landlords in Purbeck have already ensured their properties are compliant, we are making this reminder to ensure all private landlords are meeting the requirements set down in law.

Mr Conway added: "Council officers will investigate all complaints made by tenants in the privately rented sector. Officers will issue fixed penalty notices for a landlord who has failed to install smoke or carbon monoxide detectors or if a letting agent has failed to register with an official registration scheme."

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NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

Furzebrook Village Hall was the venue for the last meeting of the Parish Council before the Annual Parish Meeting in May. Cllr Tony Higgens was in the Chair and during the meeting he repeated his intention not to stand for election as Chairman for the following year.

One parishioner was in attendance and expressed her annoyance with the Parish Council in its, perceived by her, negative attitude to her development at Rachel's Plantation despite her past failure to comply with planning law and apparent failure to comply with planning requirements for her latest project. Also attending were representatives from senior management of the animal sanctuary who presented their apologies to the residents of the Parish for the traffic chaos caused by the "Family Day" at Church Knowle. During the Public Discussion period the Trustee and Chief Executive of the sanctuary gave an explanation of what had happened to cause the chaos and assured the meeting that "lessons would be learned" and they would try their best to ensure such incidents would not be repeated. The Chairman suggested that CKPC could attend the meeting with DCC Highways dept along with Margaret Green Trust when traffic management systems for future events would be "on the agenda". This was agreed. The business meeting then began.

The Chairman reported on progress regarding the Parenco/VOIP proposal to have microwave broadband in its Kimmeridge site and allow residents of Church Knowle to have access to it. The project manager will be invited to a CKPC meeting and describe how it would operate.

The results of the fire at Cotness Cottages and effect on the occupiers was discussed. It would take about 18 months to repair the cottages. Members were relieved that the elderly occupants had been given temporary accommodation in the meantime.

The meeting heard that the Church Knowle to Wareham weekly 'bus service had been withdrawn due to cuts in financial assistance by Dorset County Council. Members felt that this would cause difficulty to several car-less elderly residents, but hoped that alternative arrangements could be made.

The village carpark in front of Knowle Cottage was also discussed and the meeting heard that DCC had been in contact with the builders to get them to place warning lights on the skip and make good the surface they had damaged.

The future of the Corfe Castle youth club was discussed at length and the meeting heard that DCC had withdrawn funding from it due to cut-backs. Unfortunately, the Parish Council's precept had been set and part-received; consequently the Council felt that it had insufficient funds to contribute to the running of the club in the financial year. However, one of the Members posed the question of providing some funds for 2017-18.

A planning application (6/2016/0182) to provide hard standing, etc at 3 Tyneham Road was discussed. There was general discussion about a similar development at 5 Tyneham Road several years beforehand and Members decided (by vote) they had no grounds for objection as a precedent had been set by PDC on that particular application. The Council was very concerned that by reducing the kerb and building an opening on to the road the parking/lay-by facilities in Church Knowle would be further reduced and would advise PDC accordingly.

The Certificate of Lawful Use for camping, etc at Bucknowle Farm has been granted by PDC.

Rachel's Plantation was again discussed and there were interruptions from the public area of the meeting. The Chairman ruled that as the Council had not received any information on future plans from PDC they were unable to discuss this issue further until details or new plans were received.

Under "Highways", the traffic management problems in Church Knowle were again discussed, including a suggestion from a Parishioner for double yellow lines to be painted on the road through the village. This was rejected by the Meeting. Members were pleased to hear that the overgrowths at Cocknowle had been cut and were disappointed that those at Plumtree Cottage continue to seriously obstruct the road. DCC will be contacted again with a view to them cutting the overgrowths in default and charging the owners. The Clerk reported on the East Creech finger posts progress which was taking longer than anticipated but is still progressing.

The Clerk reported on the annual audit and future organisation, bills were paid and correspondence discussed. The meeting ended at 10.10pm with the reminder that the next meeting will be on 10th May at Church Knowle village hall following the Annual Parish Meeting.

National Trust News

Timbers found washed up on Studland Beach after Storm Katie swept through may be from the wreck of a 17th century Dutch ship which has excited experts since its discovery in 1990.

The so-called Swash Channel wreck, near the entrance to Poole Harbour, has

been described as the most significant maritime archaeology project in Britain since the raising of the Mary Rose in 1982. The Trust has contacted Bournemouth University experts to try to identify the timbers, which were found on Knoll Beach by beach rangers. Holes for wooden pegs, and the pegs themselves, are clearly visible.

They have now been submerged in storage tanks at Corfe Castle

to preserve them pending further investigation. The Receiver of Wrecks has been informed.

Historic crafts will come alive for modern visitors thanks to a £4,800 donation by the Purbeck Association of the National Trust. Corfe Castle is the focus of the donation and the work of our growing army of artisan volunteers is the chief beneficiary. Artisan volunteers help bring the past to life for castle visitors by demonstrating traditional skills such as stonemasonry.

Among projects to be funded is the carving of decorated stone bosses in the style of those which would once have embellished vaulting in the gloriette, King John's mini palace in the inner ward. The artisans are also restoring a Victorian hand pump in the tea-rooms garden. All the money raised comes from PANT's

programme of social events, trips and talks.

The association was founded in 1987 and has more than 400 members living mainly in and around Purbeck.

Membership is open to any National Trust member or volunteer wishing to support the work of the Trust in this area.

We're asking dog owners not to allow their pets into dew ponds near Langton Matravers as doing so poses a threat to rare great crested newts. Male great crested newts need clear water for their mating displays and dogs playing in the ponds is stirring up sediment and reducing visibility. Trampling on the banks of ponds is also destroying vegetation which the females need to lay their eggs in.

The rare amphibians' mating season runs until around the end of May so please be particularly careful around this time.

Dew ponds are a feature of the landscape around Langton Matravers and were originally created by farmers to provided water for livestock.

Most farms now use mains water instead.

A big thank you to everyone involved in the Community Woodland Project after a successful winter of coppicing in Langton West Wood.

Two out of a total of 17 coppicing areas or coupes have been restored, which will allow encourage fresh growth and boost biodiversity.

Coppicing has now finished for the season and will start again when the trees become dormant next winter.

There has recently been evidence of drivers doing donuts or wheel spins on the grass overflow car park at Spyway.

If you see anyone behaving irresponsibly there, please make a note of the registration as tell a National Trust ranger or the police.

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Neill Child, who is a trustee of the Purbeck Film Charitable Trust, owners of the Rex Cinema since 2009, gave us a most illuminating talk about the great little movie house in Wareham. Many of us know and love the Rex, where we can watch Classic movies and Hollywood blockbusters while sipping our wine or beer as we sit back to enjoy the show in an auditorium little changed since the coming of the 'Talkies' in 1927.

The Empire Theatre opened in the Oddfellows Hall in 1920, later to become the Rex Cinema which experienced many changes in fortune but survived through good times (demand from troops during WWII) and bad (coming of television) with various changes of ownership.

Things are going well now and refurbishment is taking place: we will be able to enjoy new carpets, re-padded seats and better sightlines when the cinema reopens on May 13th. Today the Rex is possibly the oldest continuously running cinema in England. From the 1930's 'They Met in a Taxi' (in B&W) to today's 'Best Marigold Hotel' there has always been something on the screen at the Rex. The building was originally a hall built by the Oddfellows, a Friendly Society, in 1889 for the express purpose of providing a place for entertainment and gettogethers to enhance social life and friendliness in the community. It's very good to know that nothing has changed.

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Spring seas

With the days getting warmer and longer, spring is in the air. We are familiar with the changes that spring brings on land with wild flowers in bloom and birds returning from their winter migration, but similar changes are taking place underwater too. At this time of year seaweeds are at their most vibrant and colourful and many animals are coming in to the shallow, warm, sheltered waters of our coastline to breed or lay their eggs.

One way to experience this underwater world is by taking to the water yourself, and what better place to start than the snorkel trail in Kimmeridge Bay. In early May (date tbc) we will install our popular snorkel trail for the summer season. The trail guides the snorkeller around 5 different marine habitats and for only £2.50 you can purchase a waterproof guide to discover which species to look out for from the beautiful iridescent 'Magic seaweed' to nest building Corkwing wrasse. If you don't have your own equipment, snorkels and masks can be hired from the Marine Centre, but you will need your own wetsuit – which is definitely recommended at this time of year!

The snorkel trail should only be used by confident swimmers and it's best to wait for a spell of calm weather to get the best visibility. Please contact the Marine centre for more information or to check the conditions on the day.

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

CROSSING THE LINE

MAY 20th 1885 was the date, 131 years ago, that the first train arrived in Corfe Castle, to great excitement. 87 years later, in 1972, the last train ran on the Wareham to Swanage line. Now, 44 years on, more history was made when, on April 8th.9th and 10th, train passengers were able to travel on the restored line as far as the River Frome, with Wareham literally in sight. This made one think about other changes and development that have happened in the Village in those 44 years. The last train out in 1972, of course ran on the rail track then through fields. This was before the arrival of BP. prior to the new roads and roundabout being constructed. But that's another story. The fine new, necessary Norden gates level crossing, signals much progress.

Apparently, more than 1000 delighted visitors passed through the gates to the Model Village Garden on the 50th Birthday special Anniversary Event, April 7th. 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

The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

Lots of things had to be sorted out and decided by the first Christians; not least, how many of the practices of the faith of the Old Testament needed to be retained. We can read about these times in the Acts of the Apostles, written by Luke the author of one of the four gospels. In chapter 15 of Acts we read about how the apostles and elders met together to consider this matter. This occasion is known as the Council of Jerusalem.

Following this Council a letter was sent to some of the churches. In the course of the letter is a very important phrase: 'For it has seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us'

On May 15th we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost; this is a celebration of God's gift to us of himself, through his Holy Spirit. In this country this is traditionally known as Whitsuntide. This celebration follows on 50 days from Easter and so the date varies each year, as does Easter itself. In days gone by this Christian festival was followed by a Bank Holiday which helped to mark the festival. There are quite a lot of customs, such as Whit walks and parades, which were associated with this holiday. This Bank Holiday was then fixed for the last Monday in May and a little later the May Day holiday was added on the first Monday of the month.

It is not always easy to explain what we mean by God's Holy Spirit. One way would be to say that when we use the gifts we are given, and are open to God's leading and guiding, and are conscious of his close presence, then this is to know and experience the work of the Holy Spirit.

So, the phrase 'it has seemed good to the Holy Spirit and us' expresses well one important way God works among us by his Holy Spirit.

In the coming weeks we shall be reminded frequently of the decision we are to make about the place of our country in Europe. Much will be written and spoken which, hopefully, will help us. Is there a Christian response in all of this? I would suggest we take notice of the phrase I've quoted ,and do indeed talk together, and do so open to God's guiding presence. This method of making a decision is an important part of what it is to be Christian.

I am also reminded of some words that seemed to me very wise, and I paraphrase slightly. It is just as important to pray once a decision has been made, as it is to do so while considering such a matter.

As with all of life, may God's purposes for us be worked out both in the life of our nation, and as we play our part with all his people.

I wrote last month about the temptation that we all fall into, namely the putting of people into groups and then treating everybody in that group as if they were all the same, instead of individuals with their own individual needs. Let me give you another group that I didn't refer to last month namely "The Deprived". What does that word conjure up in your minds? What is it that you imagine that they are deprived of? Food? Shelter? Clean Water? Care and attention? Love?

I am glad that our village has a Church School as part of the life of the village. I am particularly grateful that I am allowed to go and take an Assembly once a month. But since I last wrote to you, Chris and I have become more involved in the life of our local School. We now go in for an hour on a Monday morning and again on a Monday Afternoon to listen to children read. But, even more surprising, I have been asked to go in on a Friday afternoon to introduce some of the younger children to what I find a fascinating subject, namely birdwatching.

Chris and I have three daughters and five granddaughters, but the granddaughters are now young women, so it is a long time since I have been able to get alongside and relate to young children. So thank you to Mrs Morgan and her band of teachers who have given me the opportunity of experiencing the thrill and the challenge of feeding young minds and sharing with them some of the wonders that I have discovered with the help of others.

But what has this got to do with anybody being "deprived"? Whatever you believe about how creation not only came into being, but continues to evolve, surely we can agree that the natural world that is all around us, is both wonderful and fascinating. This afternoon I had two groups of four children, and I took in four bird books, and we looked at blackbirds, chaffinches, and mallards, and suddenly the children were able to see how Mr.Blackbird looks different to Mrs Blackbird, who isn't even black. And then we looked at the difference between the male and female chaffinches, and finally the difference between the male and female mallards. My point is, that children who haven't been introduced in some way to the wonders of what I would describe as God's creation, are deprived.

I am in awe of the way that children can become proficient with mobile phones, computers, and all things technological, but there is so much more for them to discover. The other day, I was upstairs and it sounded as if ornaments were being knocked off window ledges, and I wondered what Chris was up to. When I came downstairs to find out what was going on, I discovered that a jackdaw was trying to get out of a closed window at the foot of the stairs. We think it came down a chimney, because we couldn't discover any other way that it could have got in. So it was up to me to envelope it with a towel, and then release it out of the front door.

Many years ago I was in an art class and a stuffed bird was put before us and we were told to draw the "Crow". The teacher wasn't amused when I pointed out that it was a jackdaw. Which raises the question. Do you know the difference between, a rook, a crow, and a jackdaw? And what about a raven? Or what about the difference between a swallow, a house martin, and a swift? Or have you been deprived from discovering the wonders of creation?

However I am aware of what I consider to be a greater deprivation, namely the knowledge of the Christian faith, its roots, and it's relevance for today. When you are an adult, you have the free choice to ignore the teachings of Jesus Christ, and His commandments. But surely children have a right to be able to know what it is that their parents, and possibly their grandparents, are choosing to ignore and reject.

My total Sunday School attendance was one week. My parents didn't go to Church so neither did I. I was given so much as a child, but the one thing of which I was deprived, was the knowledge of God, and the love of Jesus Christ. I didn't discover what I had been missing until I was 19.

Our local school is doing an excellent job in trying to make the children aware of spiritual truths, but they are only part of a child's education. I would love the opportunity of working with them for the benefit of our children, and if it can't be on a Sunday, then let us find a time when it can be. It is important for our children to be able to read and write, and so much more, but are these more important than discovering what is right and wrong, and the Christian view of what life is all about and the promise concerning eternal life? To be ignorant of such things is to be deprived, at least it is in my book.

Neil **Lovesey** was our guest speaker at the Club's meeting on the 7th **April 2016.** His subject on this occasion was "Wildlife in the Garden"

He opened his talk by quoting one or two interesting geographical and historical facts. If one placed all of the man built structures together in one place they would fit into an area the size of the County Yorkshire and if all of the gardens associated with them were similarly treated they would fit into an area the size of the County of Suffolk. The remaining area indicates how much space is left for wildlife.

He went on to touch upon <u>Maslows Heirarchy of the Sociological Importance</u> of the need of all animals to have Water, Food, Safety, Security, Territory, and Reproduction. Neil illustrated his talk further with slides showing how wildlife had adapted their life style and even their names to mans interference by the construction of buildings such as barns, railways, canals etc.

He went on to provide examples of the way nature takes care of itself by over producing to cope with losses by predators and the storage of food to overwinter to survive, but to do this they must have these six elements.

As always Neil gave a fascinating talk amply illustrated by a number of high quality photographs and examples backed up by detailed explanations.

Keep Reading with the Home Library Service!

If you, or somebody you know or care for, are unable to get to your local library, the Home Library Service (HLS) can provide a regular supply of books for you to continue to enjoy at home.

Through a partnership between the Royal Voluntary Service (RVS) and the County Council, the HLS in the Isle of Purbeck is provided from Wareham and Swanage Libraries. New clients are visited in their homes by a Local Coordinator to find out what sort of books they would be interested to read, and if they require large print, or books recorded on tape cassettes or CDs (talking books). Every

three weeks, volunteers select books according to the known preferences and any feedback received, and these are delivered to HLS Readers in their homes by other volunteers. All RVS volunteers carry identity cards and have provided references and been through a security check.

HLS Readers in the Corfe Valley receive books from Wareham Library; these are taken to the Corfe Castle Library through the Library Van Service and then delivered by local volunteers. HLS Readers in villages such as Kingston and Harman's Cross are served from Swanage Library. You don't have to worry about fines for overdue items either - no fines are levied for HLS users, although items out for a long time are followed up!

The HLS is open to anybody who needs it. If you are interested for yourself, or for somebody you know who loves books but can no longer access them, there are several ways of making contact with the service. It was fantastic to see Swanage Library filled to the roof for adventurer Jason Lewis, and the fabulous Bubbly Brunch with Sunday Times best-selling novelist, Jill Mansell. The feedback has been tremendous, so we know it works, but things now have to

change to secure the Festival's future.

A two-week programme is complicated to administer and the format makes it difficult for visitors to attend events if they are several days apart and the organisers therefore feel that it would be better to concentrate the events into a shorter time and fewer venues.

It is hoped that Purbeck Literary Festival 2017 will therefore be a week-long event wrapped around the weekend of 18th and 19th February with the whole Festival running from 16th to 23rd February.

However, for the Festival to continue, help is needed to build on this successful start. Volunteers are needed, whether to take full responsibility for an aspect of the Festival or simply to steward and sell books or help with refreshments at an event. The Festival cannot go ahead without a bigger Committee.

An open evening is planned for anyone who would like to get involved on May 5th at the Limes Hotel, Park Road, Swanage at 7pm. You are invited to come along and hear all about the festival, past and present, and plans for its future. Refreshments will be provided. Please let Emma know if you are interested in getting involved, even if you can't make that evening.

I hope we can encourage people to drop in if they would like to volunteer, even in a small way, as we try and establish a new Committee. It's a way of making new friends, and being part of something that has the potential to have a long life, putting Purbeck properly on the map for authors, readers and writers alike for years to come.

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FIRST TIMETABLED PASSENGER TRAINS RUN ON FOUR-MILE RESTORED LINE TO THE RIVER FROME – WITHIN SIGHT OF WAREHAM

History has been made during the Swanage

Railway's Spring Steam Gala when the first timetabled passenger train ran

over four miles of newly restored line towards Wareham – for the first time in 44 years.

And a Cornish centenarian steam locomotive played a starring role on all three days of the popular event as it helped to haul the special four-trains-a-day service between Norden, Furzebrook, Creech Bottom, East Holme and the River Frome.



Norden Gates Level Crossing – First SR Train to River Frome

Starting from Swanage,

four passenger trains each day ran beyond Norden station, over the newly-installed Norden Gates level crossing and on past Motala, Furzebrook, Creech Bottom and East Holme before stopping at the River Frome – within sight of the town of Wareham.

Passengers were not able to board or alight the steam trains running over the fourmile extension beyond Norden station and the trains operating between Norden

and the River Frome had a steam locomotive at each end.

The first train between Norden and the Frome River departed Swanage at 9.45am on Friday, 8 April, 2016, with Southern Railway late 1920s 'U' class locomotive No. 31806 on the front — a locomotive that used to visit Swanage in the 1950s.

At Norden, Spring Steam Gala's centenarian guest locomotive – Great Western Railway 1916-built tank No. 4247 from the Bodmin and

Wenford Railway in Cornwall – was put on the rear of the train for the historic four-mile journey to the Frome River. Departing Norden at 10.17am, the train crossed the new Norden Gates level crossing before passing Furzebrook at 10.21am and

arriving at the River Frome at 10.30am. After a stop of ten minutes, the train departed at 10.40am, arriving back at Norden at 10.55am.

Swanage Railway Project Wareham director, Mark Woolley, said: "It was wonderful and very exciting to see the first timetabled passenger train run between Norden to within sight of Wareham at the River Frome for the first time since January, 1972, when the last British Rail passenger train ran from Swanage to Wareham.

"Our dedicated teams have worked very hard over the past 18 months restoring and upgrading the former Network Rail line. Half a mile of new track has been laid, almost 2,000 wooden track sleepers replaced, a quarter-mile long embankment upgraded and six miles of lineside embankments cut back, fences repaired and drains cleared.

"There was an air of expectation and delight among the passengers on board the special train as it crossed Norden Gates level crossing, ran past Motala and then on to Furzebrook before running down the bank through Creech Bottom and East Holme to the River Frome," explained Mr Woolley.

General Manager Matt Green said: "I would like to say a very big thank you to everyone on

the Swanage Railway who has made the train service to the River Frome, within sight of Wareham, and the Spring Steam Gala possible.

"There has been a lot of preparation as well as a lot of hard work during the Spring Steam Gala to make sure that everything runs smoothly for what is a very historic event.

"It has been a great team effort and there has been a real buzz around the railway about the first passenger trains using our new state of the art level crossing at Norden Gates." added Mr Green.

The annual Spring celebration of steam took place between Friday and Sunday, 8 to 10 April, 2016, inclusive, and saw an intensive train service between Swanage, Herston Halt, Harman's Cross, Corfe Castle and Norden – including nostalgic freight trains from yesteryear.


Broadband

The fabulous Purbeck Valley Folk Festival returns on August Bank Holiday Thursday 25 - Sunday 28 August with another outstanding line-up of top musicians. This is the second year the folk festival has been located at the idyllic setting of Purbeck Valley Farm in Harmans Cross.

The organisers are particularly keen to attract local people, as well as music tourists, to the festival. The folk festival favours Purbeck beers and ciders, local stalls with healthy food options, and likes to do business with local businesses and organisations when possible.

Do you remember The Proclaimers? The Scots twins who walked 500 miles! They are the Saturday night headliners this year. No doubt the festival-goers will be singing along to their big hit "Sunshine On Leith".

Another headliner is the folk legend Eliza Carthy with her 12-piece Wayward Band. The festival also welcomes some well-known songwriters from mainstream music such as Latin Quarter (Radio Africa), John Bramwell (of Mercury-nominees 'I Am Kloot'), Sam Duckworth (of 'Get Cape. Wear Cape, Fly') and Nizlopi (JCB song). Sheelanagig will provide danceable late evening music from the Balkans with Gypsy music from Holy Moly and the Crackers. Ceilidh dancers will enjoy Threepenny Bit and Dyer:Cumming.

Favourites of the Purbeck folk scene like Glenn Ross, Pete Christie, the Wareham Whalers and Dorset skifflers Quinns Quinney, will play the same stages as BBC Folk Award stars including Lucy Ward and Maz O'Connor with their bands, and duos Gilmore Roberts and Kathryn Roberts & Sean Lakeman. In total, 70 bands will be performing their music.

Purbeck Valley Farm is home to hundreds of cattle. What happens to them during the Summer? Well, they go off on vacation to other nearby fields for a while. The two barns become a very clean music arena. The farm fields provide a lovely Summer setting for an outdoor stage and a couple of small intimate stages. The music-loving festival-goers mostly camp in family groups. Apart from fabulous music all weekend, there are workshops and lots of children's activities.

In 2015, the festival sold 3000 tickets to music tourists from all over the South and West as well as visitors from abroad. The organisers are keen to attract local people to the festival. 

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
