DECEMBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Dorset County Council in the guise of Highways Authority will be doing work on the A351 between Norden and Stoborough from the 11th January for two and a half weeks that will involve shutting half the road and traffic lights. We understand the road surface is cracking and requires replacement. In a similar vein, the National Trust will be erecting scaffolding around Uvedale House in February after the Half Term holidays. This will also entail using traffic lights in order to manage traffic for the period of the works which should finish before the Easter holidays.

There is currently a proposal by Dorset County Council to close all the Youth Centres in the County and use staff in the community instead. This is another cost saving measure aimed at saving a million pounds.

The Parish Council has contacted Royal Mail over the relocation of the post box to Station Road. No reply has been received so far. Residents have also raised the issue and Councillors are aware the new location is likely to lead to a reduction in use.

The Speed Camera Partnership van has been in the village recently. This was requested by the Council as a result of some dangerous early morning (rush hour) driving at the Kingston end of East Street that was reported to the Members.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to proposals for the following: The relocation of an existing storage container which contains the cycle hire business near to the entrance of the site and the stationing of another storage container adjacent to it to be used in association with the cycle hire business at Norden Park & Ride, Corfe Castle. The erection of an extension to the front elevation, to replace a conservatory, erect a rear balcony and a loft conversion at Aeolia House, South Street, Kingston.

The Parish Council wishes everyone a happy Christmas and a peaceful and prosperous New Year.





NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

December's meeting was held at Furzebrook village hall with Cllr Higgens in the Chair and 3 Parishioners attending along with the Parish Councillors and Clerk.

Public discussion pre-business revolved around a planning application regarding alterations and part change of use of some buildings to residential at Puddlemill Farm. The Council would be examining the application later in the meeting.

Following declarations of interest the draft November minutes were read and approved as being a true record of November's meeting.

The meeting then went on to deal with matters arising from the Minutes which included notification from the Chairman that the salt bin for East Creech had arrived at East Creech and information from a Member that a new, more suitable, site was being in the hamlet had been found. Members also approved the purchase of locks to secure the bin and its contents during the summer and also the bin being used as a litter/stools bin. The Clerk reported he was obtaining costs for repair of the 2 damaged finger posts and would submit the estimated to the Parish's county councillor for funding along with that for the grit bin. The meeting also heard that contact had been made with Natural England with a view to better "policing" of the many cycling "events" in the Parish.

There was general discussion about the Localism Act and a complaint from a resident alleging an offence having been committed under the Act by CKPC; the complaint was made to PDC who passed the matter on to Dorset Police. The Clerk reported that he had been informed by the police that both Dorset Police and the Crown Prosecution Service had found no case against the Member concerned or the Parish Council. Members decided that a meeting with PDC was required to discuss their actions and the Chairman would arrange this.

The Meeting heard that the Council's website, which could include the old format of "News From Church Knowle", as previously published in CVN, as well as other Parish Council matters and items of information & interest to all, was progressing well and should be up and running in the next few weeks.

Members then discussed a project being run by the Campaign for Real Ale to have pubs in villages and other communities given more protection from avaricious "PubCos" supermarkets and developers by having them declared "Assets of Community Value". Members felt that the single pub' in the Parish was a pub' which deserved such protection and would discuss the matter with the tenant with a view to having the pub' declared such an asset.

The encroachment by builders on the village parking area outside Knowle Cottage was discussed and the Clerk told Members that investigations with the Land Registry had confirmed it was public highway. The matter of skips and rubble, etc. on the area would be reported for action by DCC as would the lack of warning lights on the skip and rubble piles.

The Clerk updated Members on the matter of the yew tree requiring pruning in the cemetery. The PDC tree protection officer confirmed that any work would require tree works approval from PDC. This, if necessary, would be obtained.

The Meeting approved a motion that the Parish Council would not charge fees for the burial of still-born and children below the age of 12 months. This decision would be communicated to funeral directors in the area.

The proposed development at Puddlemill Farm (App No.6/2015/0707 & 0708 was examined and Members found no reasons to object to it. They did, however, have concerns about surface and rainwater drainage, water supply and disposal of sewage from the proposed holiday cottages. A tree works application to fell some sycamore and ash trees at Jubilee Cottage, East Creech received no objections from Members. PDC would be made aware of the Council's decision.

A possible unlawful development at Rachel's Plantation was discussed as was the reply from PDC to the Parish Council's report. Members had concern about PDC's lack of consistency of enforcement and their concerns would be passed to the .district council.

Reports were received about potholes in parish roads and would be passed to DCC. The Council also heard that a joint meeting with Corfe Castle PC and Dorset Highways was being arranged to seek a "way ahead" in the matter of the Corfe Castle BOAT.

The monthly finance report was given, accepted and invoices authorised for payment.

Following reports on correspondence received, lack of affordable rented accommodation in the Parish and minor matters the meeting closed at 9.20pm. Next meeting would be at Church Knowle reading room on 12th January at 7.30pm.

Work is under way to replace the concrete slipway at the boat park on Knoll Beach in Studland, which has come to the end of its life.

The £25,000 scheme has been funded by the Neptune Coastal Campaign, the National Trust's longest running and most successful fund raising initiative, which celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2015.

Work to remove the old slipway was continuing at the time of writing. It will be followed by a period of approximately one month to allow natural processes time to reprofile the beach before the new slipway is built.

There will be temporary access to the beach for boat owners during this time and the situation will be closely monitored.

The reprofiling period is necessary to allow the beach to find a new level as removing the old structure will have a knock-on effect on the distribution of sand in that area.

Installing a replacement before a new balance is established would put it at risk of being washed out or buried.

The replacement plan forms part of our long term strategy to ensure a sustainable future for Studland Beach by working with the natural processes which constantly reshape our coastline.

The new slipway will be around 30m from the previous one and will be much less steep. Not only does this mean it will be easier to launch boats and less of a barrier for walkers, it also makes it more sustainable.

The lower profile will allow sand to move along the beach more naturally and waves will pass smoothly over it rather than causing damage.

Another Neptune-funded project, the new boardwalk at Shell Bay, is meanwhile nearing completion.

Some 4,000m of pine, 500m of larch and 80 eight foot oak posts have gone into creating it.

The existing boardwalk, which had also come to the end of its life, will be removed after Christmas.



December's Fun and Festivities: It was wonderful to see the beautiful little paper-and-card birds, robins of every hue, with their pleated wings and tails of Christmas wrapping paper which we made at Susie's Crafty Workshop. Enthusiasm, determination and lots of happy chatter filled the hall which was a hive of industry as the birds took shape. Hanging from silvery branches the birds are so light that they move with the slightest puff of air and the flock suspended from the giant white painted tree branch looked spectacular. These birds, designed by Susie's friend Caroline Booth, look intricate but the process of making them is surprisingly simple, to the relief of many.

The delicious treats of stollen, mince pies and sausages which we enjoyed with our tea brought the afternoon and our last meeting of 2015 to a very happy conclusion.

Did you know?



ABOUT TIME!

As the Church Clock strikes the midnight hour on 31 December 2015, we say 'Farewell' to the passing year and Welcome 2016. This year, St. Edward's Church Clock will have clocked up 152 years of witnessing such events as a New Year dawns. **Dated 1864**, the clock movement was built by a reputable London clockmaker's company. Sometimes this was the

Village Blacksmith's job but someone must have had good connections to think *ahead of time* for future generations and sustainability! The mechanism stands in the tower ringing room.

Have you heard?

In 1999, during the restoration of the bells, the clock was converted to electric winding. More good thinking! However, the clock movement is still driven by weights. When these weights 'run down', they trigger a switch which starts an electric motor to wind the weights back up again. At this stage, another switch turns off the motor. The 'going train', driving the hands, is mechanically rewound approximately every 15 minutes. The 'striking train', a separate mechanism, driven by its own set of heavy weights, allows the clock to strike hourly. When the clock strikes twelve, the weights fall approximately 6ft and take several minutes to rewind. Let's face it! the two proud clock faces on the north and south walls of the tower, so centrally sited to Village life, daily watch over us in a timely way. As a point of interest, they are over 15ft down the wall and are unreachable from the top of the tower. From that view, the masonry ledge hides them. As a New Year starts, a new resolution perhaps, to take time to appreciate this valuable timepiece. One can tend to take this village asset for granted? On the rare occasions when it may stop (and my goodness it is certainly noticed then!), this is proved to be for peculiar reasons and can be costly to St. Edward's Church funds.

A striking thought we are assured that this 152 year old friend should continue keeping time for at least another century or two. Time will tell! In the meantime, we are most grateful for the time, skill and knowledge of those concerned in the continuing care and maintenance of the Church Clock – thank you.

SOUNDS GOOD



One Of The 6 Mighty Bells Of St.Edward's Church.

The restored 6 bells of St. Edward's Church were heard (42 years, since they were silenced in 1957) for the first time on New Year's Eve 1999. following the village funded 10 year project. They welcomed in a new century and, indeed, a new millennium. A very a-peal-ling band of volunteers, the Corfe Castle Ringers, certainly know their ropes and we are most grateful that they have kept the bells ringing ever since. In summing up their activities, Carole and Brian Dean, respectively Tower Captain and Steeple Keeper, both bell ringers since 1999, have been most helpful in compiling this interesting Corfe

Castle campanologist's 2015 checklist... They have certainly beaten the record of the 1994 Film 'Four Weddings and a Funeral'! They say: "We have rung for 12 weddings and 10 funerals and 7 other special occasions. These include the national celebration in September in recognition of the Oueen becoming the longest serving British Monarch. The bells were also rung on St. George's Day, The 10th Anniversary celebration of The Friends' of St. Edward's Church and on Remembrance Sunday. This is in addition to ringing for the Sunday morning services. On most Sundays. after ringing at Corfe Castle, our ringers go up the hill to Kingston, where there are 10 lovely sounding bells but no band of their own. Our band has grown to 11 ringers, which is the largest number for several vears." The sound of Christmas Bells were recently enjoyed and appreciated by many, ringing for the Christingle and Midnight Services and the joyful sound on Christmas Day in the Morning. Now, as we leap into a New Year, maybe you consider ringing the changes, a new hobby?! If you are interested in becoming a bell ringer, Carole and Brian are always happy to hear from you. In the meantime, a big 'thank you' to all involved. The sound of Church Bells has been part of English history for centuries and long may it continue here.





The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

'And the Word became flesh and lived among us...' These words come from the first chapter of St John's Gospel (verse14); they will have been read many times during recent weeks at Christmas services. For many people this a is a well known passage with lots of associations - not least, memories of Christmases over the years.

The passage speaks of 'the Word'. Many words have been written and spoken, seeking to explain its meaning. Words, and the understanding they express, are important - in many situations they are vital and they also give us great plesaure.

As important as language is, there are many ways to communicate. The gospel writer, after much thought and prayer, seeks to express the truth at the heart of christian belief. He does this by saying that what was happening in Jesus was that God's own word, his reason, thought and purpose, was expressed in the life of Jesus of Nazareth.

Christian faith says that not only has God lived among us, but that he continues to do so. We may know him through those we meet; we meet him, though not exclusively, through our gatherings for prayer, worship and discipleship.

A good question to ask is 'Who is Christ for us today?' Occasionally, the meaning and reality of Christ is clear to someone all in a moment. Mostly, this is something we explore and discover all our life long.

May the year now beginning be a good one for us all - not least, as we continue, along life's way.

In about an hour's time, I am going to stop writing this article and turn the television on, because, today is the 15th.December and, in an hour's time, Tim Peake will be blasting off on his journey to the space station where he is due to spend the next six months. In his many interviews, he has already referred many times to the thrill that he is looking forward to, of seeing earth from out of space. I have seen photographs, but nothing could compare with seeing it for yourself. He will be 250 miles out into space, and travelling at 17,500 mph. I believe, but, I would imagine, that nothing will compare with that first view of mother earth from out of space. And this introduces the theme that I want to raise this month - "Seeing things from a different perspective."

There was a time when everybody believed that the earth was flat, but then came the proof that the earth was round and not flat, and everybody had to rethink their ideas and gradually, they began to see things from a different perspective. Similarly, there was a time when everybody believed that the earth was at the centre of the universe, and that the sun rotated around the earth. But then came the evidence that the earth revolved around the sun, and not the other way round. As a result, everybody had to start seeing things from a different perspective.

The 15th.December is not only the date of the launch, it is also my birthday, and I am still a child at heart, and I love opening my Birthday Cards and Presents. I couldn't believe it when I opened an envelope from Chris, my wife, to discover that she has bought me a lesson with the local gliding club. It is something that I have always wanted to do, but never got around to doing. Some time next year I will be up in the air, viewing Dorset from a totally different perspective.

It's now time to go and put the television on.

Wow!! How incredible was that, and to be able to see Tim inside the cockpit as the blast off takes place, and then to see his "thumbs up" as they move out of of earth's gravity, and truly start their space travel. It's incredible what has been achieved and it is incredible that we can watch what is happening from the comfort of our own living rooms. Three astronauts, Uri and two Tims, all on a journey that will involve looking at everything from a new perspective.

For me, it is still the 15th.December, but for you, Christmas is now in the past and the New Year, I presume, has begun. Let me ask you a question. Did Christmas make you look at life from a new perspective? I know that I am a Minister, and may be it is the sort of thing that you expect minsters to say, but the real message of Christmas, for me, is more mind blowing than ordinary human beings becoming space travellers.

You may not go to Church, but most people still believe in a God or in some spiritual power or force. In other words, atheists are still in the minority. The incredible message of Christmas, is that this God, that we struggle to believe in or understand, became a human being – and not just a human being, He becomes a baby. There is nothing more vulnerable than a baby, and yet that is the form He choose to come to us. But if you believe this amazing truth, and I do, then surely you have to ask why. Why did He bother? What was the point of His coming? Joseph was told, "You shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.

People hear the reference to sin and begin to run a mile, totally missing the point of why God wanted to save them. The purpose of God becoming a human being was to enable ordinary people like you and me, to spend eternity with Him. God speaks of the possibility of life after death. It sounds incredible but that is the Christian message. When our bodies die, the real us, whether we call it our spirits or our souls, can live on with God in heaven. Sounds impossible doesn't it? Not much more than a 100 years ago, the idea of human beings being able to fly was considered to be impossible. Today space travel is no longer new. We can circuit the earth. We can land men on the moon, and the possibility of doing the same on Mars is now being considered. The impossible becomes possible when things are looked at from a new perspective.

In May, Chris and I will be going to Greece, and I will be taking my binoculars and telescope so that we can do some bird watching. They are incredible. They give me a new perspective. I will be able to see the birds in a way that would be impossible without their help. I do not possess a microscope, but I am told that they are also incredible because, yet again, they provide a new perspective. They reveal what the human eye cannot see without their help.

I don't just believe, I know, that to accept Jesus Christ, and to embrace the Christian message, causes you to look at every aspect of life from a new perspective. Your home, your family, your friends and neighbours, your job of work, how you view pain, illness, or bereavement, they all change, you have a new perspective; what seemed pointless, is enriched with purpose. What was

"a pain", becomes a pleasure.

So, we enter a New Year,. Will it be the same as last year? Will it be a year of purpose? Is it time to look again at the Christian message that has been proclaimed for 2,000 years? Do you need to look at life from a new perspective? The choice is yours, but, if I can help, you only have to pick up the phone, and I will be delighted to share with you what I have discovered over more than 50 years.
