SEPTEMBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Before summarising the September meeting I would request anyone who is able to join Litter Free Purbeck on Saturday the 3rd of November at 10am for a village litter pick. The group will be meeting outside of the National Trust tearooms and all are very welcome, there is equipment for kids so bring them along. Contact Liz on 01929 480477 if you have any queries.

The September meeting started with a report from District Cllr Dragon. He reported that Purbeck District Council had prepared a Statement of Case for the public inquiry regarding the increased ferry tolls. Within the statement he had found some inaccuracies and he was concerned that these may weaken the Counsel's case. Cllr Clarke asked he draw attention to the errors ASAP so that they can be highlighted prior to the inquiry at which a representative from CC Parish Council will be in attendance. Cllr Dragon asked for confirmation that the Parish Council would not be expected to contribute financially to the Counsel and Cllr Clarke advised no mention of this had been made.

He reported there were only two items on the agenda for PDC's meeting on the 11th of September . One of specific relevance is the transfer of the West Street toilets to the Parish Council, a subject which quite necessarily dominated much of the evening's debate.

Laurie Clarke attended on behalf of the National Trust and recapped on their year to date. He advised visitor numbers were down which was not a surprise to him due to the fine weather. He advised they are looking into improving infrastructure, car parks and access to help accommodate the overall growing number of visitors to Purbeck.

Laurie again highlighted the trusts intention to prevent cars parking at Uvedale on the site of the old garage. As well as having concerns about the safety of cars frequently pulling in and out, the old garage is soon to be a site of an archaeological investigation; being the second oldest building in the village it was formerly a tannery and poor house and many remnants are finely preserved under the floor of the garage. Given that the tenancy is currently vacant the National Trust are seizing the opportunity to investigate the area fully and decide on a course of action for the building. They plan to give notice to cars using the area as a car park and in time fence it off to prevent parking.

Prior to the meeting the Council had requested the National Trust give consideration to supporting them in funding the provision of the West Street toilets in the event the Parish Council were to take them over. Laurie advised that some years ago the National Trust had already opened up their toilets for public use to address the closure of the East Street public toilets, this was

on the understanding the West Street toilets would be maintained by PDC (funded by the car park). With regard to the recent request from the Parish Council, he explained a precedent had been set when other Parishes had asked the same question and the Trust had agreed they would help, but on the basis that other businesses also contributed to the ongoing costs. It was asked could collaboration on cleaning all the facilities be considered.

The Council had to make a formal decision on whether to adopt the toilets if they were offered to them by PDC. They resolved that they would but with certain terms attached which would protect the PC if the toilets became economically unviable. At the time of writing PDC have responded that they do not accept the terms presented so the PC will need to re-group and decide if they wish to pursue the transfer or see the toilets handed to the Unitary Authority and potentially close.

The Council recently contracted a painter who has made an excellent job of painting the playground. The new paints will hopefully preserve the remaining gym equipment, two items of which we have had to remove over the summer due to rust. The Council appreciates the playground is very much enjoyed by residents and visitors and they are looking into replacements.

All of the bins in the parish have now been replaced with the exception of one in Kingston and one in Oli Vyse Lane which we hope will soon be in situ. The Parish Council have invested significantly in the bins and have gratefully received the very generous full sponsorship of one bin from Joan Dragon at Dragons Bakery. As more responsibility is falling on the Parish Council to fund bins, toilets, street sign cleaning and other functions now considered non statutory, any such contributions from local businesses and organisations which help to maintain the cleanliness of the Parish are very gratefully received.

You may have noticed highways installing bollards at the end of West Street in August, this was an error and they had not been commissioned by the Parish Council. The Parish Council had in fact requested bollards to be situated outside of Gods Acre on the entrance to West Street Car Park. Increasingly cars are parking there and forcing pedestrians exiting the car park to walk in the road, in the line of oncoming traffic. Unfortunately the area does not qualify for bollards so the PC are looking into other alternatives. White lines have been painted in Collets Close and the Council hope these will deter people from parking dangerously close to the junction.

Next month the Council will be holding an open door event prior to the normal Council meeting and we invite anyone interested in being a Councillor to come along at 6.15 to the Town Hall. There will be an informal opportunity to talk about the requirements of being a Councillor and get answers to any queries you may have. Please do come along.

Could you be a Councillor?

What would you like to see in your community? What would you promote, support or object to? Your Parish Council has the power to provide certain services for the parish; to maintain the playground and open spaces, to support the youth and the elderly, to offer recreational spaces and community transport, to provide public conveniences. If you were part of the Council what would you campaign for? There may be areas you as a resident feel are neglected by the Parish Council; being involved in the Council gives you the opportunity to get these areas on to the Council's agenda and push them forward. Corfe is a living, thriving village with numerous committees, societies and clubs representing all demographics; a greater diversity within the Council means a wider scope of views being represented which better serves the whole community.

The current Council term ends in May next year when elections will be held. The present eleven Council seats will be up for election and we encourage all parishioners to consider standing to be a Councillor. To do this you must live or work within the Parish. We currently have no Councillors from Kingston and would welcome some candidates from this part of the Parish. You do not have to have any prior knowledge of local government, just enthusiasm, interest and commitment. Training is offered and can be really beneficial to getting the most out of the role.

What does it involve? A Councillor is one individual who with the other Councillors make the 'Council'. The Council's decisions are always made as a group and not by individuals. Meetings are held on the second

Monday of each month and cover an agenda which is set the previous week. Councillors are expected to commit to attending but if you are unable to make a meeting you can send apologies. Some Councillors will be nominated to specific committees which they wish to be involved in, such as youth club, footpaths, Highways, organising and event, or planning and the role can be as involved as one makes it. Each month there is correspondence to read and often to comment on. Requests and comments from Parishioners are considered and the whole Council will decide how to respond and what action to take. As a Parish Councillor you get an insight into the various tiers of local government and the opportunity to form responses to minor and major consultations, for example the recent proposed merger of the Police Forces, or the Local Plan which effects housing.

We will be holding an open door informal opportunity to talk to Councillors about the role at 6.15pm in Corfe Castle Town hall on the 8th of October. This will be followed by the October Parish Council meeting which the public are welcome to attend. Please do come along and get involved. We look forward to seeing you.

A NEW DEAL ON SOCIAL HOUSING

The government is engaging in a consultation on their recent social housing green paper. The paper proposes fundamental reform to ensure social homes provide an essential, safe, well managed service for all those who need it.

The Government will consider how they can re-balance the relationship between residents and landlords to ensure issues are resolved swiftly and residents' voices are heard.

To support this vision there is a powerful case to be made for strengthening the regulatory framework so that it not only focuses on the governance and financial viability of housing associations, but also on how residents are treated and the level of services they should expect. The Government are also publishing a call for evidence which seeks information on how the regulatory framework is operating. This is the first step to a full review of regulation to make sure it is fit for the future.

The Government state they want social housing to support people to get on in life, making it more likely, not less likely, that they will go on to buy their own home, as well as providing essential, good quality and well run homes for those who need them most.

Five principles will underpin a new, fairer deal for social housing residents:

- A safe and decent home which is fundamental to a sense of security and our ability to get on in life
- · Improving and speeding up how complaints are resolved
- Empowering residents and ensuring their voices are heard so that landlords are held to account
- Tackling stigma and celebrating thriving communities, challenging the stereotypes that exist about residents and their communities
- Building the social homes that we need and ensuring that those homes can act as a springboard to home ownership.

It is nearly eight years since the last review of social housing regulation and the proposals in this Green Paper present the opportunity to look afresh at the regulatory framework. The government is keen to hear from residents, landlords and tenants. Should you wish to be involved in the call for evidence or submit a response to the consultation details can be found on the Parish Council Website www.corfecastlepc.org.uk

The Community Land Trust (CLT) held its first AGM at the Corfe Castle Club in August and members were updated on progress of the planned community affordable housing project.

At the AGM the Board was very disappointed to report that unfortunately, after so much hard work, the preferred site had been abandoned due to title issues. As a consequence, all feasibility studies have been suspended. However, with overwhelming support from the members, the Board will continue working with local landlords and the Purbeck District Council to identify other sites which might be suitable for a similar project.

Further updates will be published as matters progress.

The Corfe Castle Community Land Trust was formed with the principal aim of providing affordable homes within our village exclusively for families with longstanding links to our community who, because of escalating costs of housing in the village, are being obliged to find accommodation outside our community. We are keen for people who are supportive of this aim to join us. Membership forms are available both on the Corfe Castle Parish Council website and at the Village Stores.



NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

Only Three Parish Councillors were able to attend September's meeting at Church Knowle village hall, so it was just quorate. There weren't any other Parishioners in attendance but our District Councillor arrived to swell numbers just a bit. Anyway, to business.

Cllr Derek Burt was elected Chairman of the meeting and it was decided not to have a Vice-chairman there being only three Councillors present. There was no public discussion period as no members of the public were present. Several items on the agenda were postponed until the October meeting since it was felt that it would inappropriate to discuss and vote on matters without the rest of the Parish Council being present; these included the formal appointment of Members to special interests/lead positions such as planning matters, rights of way, police liaison, etc., although the existing positions would remain for the time being.

The Minutes for the July meeting, having previously been deferred from August's to September's meeting for discussion and approval, had to be deferred again since there were insufficient Members present who were at the July meeting to confirm that they were "a true and accurate record". However, August's minutes were approved following correction of a couple of "typos".

Two "Tree Works" applications were reviewed. These related to No. TWA/2018/0156 which involved cutting a diseased Ash tree (described as a "bit of a haircut job" during discussion) and TWA/2018/166 which involved dealing with a diseased Ash which constituted a danger. Both applications were approved with no objections.

The Rachel's Plantation planning saga continued with the Clerk advising that he had contacted DCC regarding the opening of a driveway onto the public highway. This opening serves the now fully gravelled drive to the development which our dear reader will recall has caused such concern in the past. Following on from this, the meeting discussed what may be an unlawful development in Furzebrook Road involving land clearance, often being carried out under floodlights, which appears to be going on behind a barrier and creating noise nuisance which has reported to the Parish Council. The Clerk advised Members and the District Councillor of the law relating to noise nuisance etc. and the matter should be reported by the individuals to not only

PDC's planners but also to the Environmental Health Officer. Members noted his advice.

The finger posts at Cocknowle crossroads and East Creech triangle are at last going to be fixed. A quote of £200 was accepted by the Meeting and hopefully work will soon begin. As far as other highways matters are concerned it was reported that the DCC have now give a "job number" for repair of the collapsed bridge/culvert a near Glebe House. The waterway beneath marks the parish boundary with Corfe Castle but any road closure would have considerable effect on the residents of properties west of Glebe (ie Church Knowle and beyond). Remember the closure of the bridge at Vineyard Farm and its not inconsiderable effects on local traffic? However, members were sure it's all for the best. Members also heard that DCC is also looking at ditch clearance and is organising repair of a collapsing road in Furzebrook near the Green Pond caused by road floods undermining the road foundations.

The monthly accounts were approved and bills were paid.

The Clerk advised the Meeting that notice of a Councillor vacancy had been posted and he was awaiting results from PDC Returning Officer as to whether or not there had been any enquiries.

Readers of last month's CVN will recall that the Chairman of the Langton Community Land Trust gave a presentation on the formation of such a trust and how it can help local people get housing which they may not have otherwise been able to afford due to the inflated prices of houses caused by second homes, holiday homes and retirement properties. Well, the September meeting decided that CKPC would support the setting up of a Community Land Trust for Church Knowle. A steering committee will have to be formed and advice sought on how to do it. Cllr Page offered to act as contact point and, consequently, suggested that anyone from Church Knowle Parish who would like to join in the formation of such a trust contact him on 01929 551406 so that the project can get off the ground.

The meeting heard that there will be a joint "river walk" of the Corfe River involving representatives of the Parish Council, Environment Agency, Arne PC, Dorset Wildlife Trust, National Trust, FWAG and local farmers so that the environmental project suggested by CKPC on the cleaning up of the river and environmental improvements can now get going.

And apart from a few minor bits and pieces that was that for September. The full minutes will appear on the CKPC website when they are approved.

Next meeting will be at Furzebrook village hall on Tuesday 09th October.



Last month the PPG invited your feedback on your views on your experiences at Corfe surgery. Well, this month we are happy to tell you about Corfe surgery's results in the 2018 Annual National GP Patient Survey

The survey is sent randomly to a sample of patients in each GP practice and covers aspects from accessing appointments to the care offered by the GP, the helpfulness of the receptionists and the patient's overall experience. From your survey returns we are delighted to tell you that Corfe surgery came 10th OUT OF 7109 GP PRACTICES IN THE COUNTRY AND TOP IN DORSET (scoring higher than the CCG average in every question). We offer the surgery our warmest congratulations. It is a fitting tribute to the

dedicated work and care of Dr Lepper and all the team that their patients should rate them so highly.

To give you a few figures, 99.4% of our patients here described their overall experience as good. There were several 100% positive responses to survey questions- for example that their GP /health professional gave them enough time, was good at listening to them, treated them with care and concern and were trusted; that the receptionists were helpful; and that it was easy to get through by phone. The surgery scored particularly well in terms of averages on the experience of getting an appointment and seeing their preferred GP.

<u>The National Trust in Studland</u> has joined forces with an innovative online luggage maker to give a new lease of life to discarded beach toys which would otherwise have to be dumped in landfill sites.

More than a million and a half people visit the bathing beaches at Studland Bay each summer, and dealing with what they leave behind is a constant headache for the National Trust rangers who look after the area.

As much as possible is sent for recycling, but the plastic fabrics used in beach goods like inflatable toys and folding chairs had to go to landfill — at least until Beach Ranger Mollie Gadd made a chance discovery.

"I was rooting through Instagram and came across someone's picture of an inflatable they had pulled out of a bin at Studland," she explained.

"They said they were going to send it to a company which turns them into bags."

Wyatt and Jack, based on the Isle of Wight, take donated fabrics which would otherwise end up in landfill and use them to make unique items including tote bags, bum bags and cycle panniers.

"I emailed them the next day and they said they would take everything we had," said Mollie.

"I didn't believe them because at that stage we had about 40 inflatables ready to go to landfill."

But Founder-Director Georgia Wyatt-Lovell was as good as her word and made a special trip to Studland to collect the whole lot.

Now the Studland Bay ranger team is putting aside suitable items including inflatable boats and toys, folding chairs and windbreaks; and Mollie hopes the relationship will continue.

In a neat twist, selected items from Wyatt and Jack's range are shortly due to go on sale at the National Trust shop in Studland, with all profits going towards funding the work of the Trust looking after special places for everyone to enjoy.

"The actual material that is used to make inflatables will never break down in the environment," said Mollie.

"It can't be recycled and if it goes to landfill it will just stay there."

Georgia added: "We have collections points available all over the country with more appearing all the time and if you'd like to find out more about getting involved please get in touch at hello@wyattandjack.com."



OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD.

Operation Christmas Child is a worldwide scheme to provide Christmas presents to very poor children who would not otherwise receive anything at Christmas. Amongst other places where parcels are delivered are countries in Africa, and countries in the very poor areas of Europe such as Bosnia, Serbia, Romania, Moldova, the Ukraine, and possibly Greece. There is a large and efficient system, much of it based on Christian churches, to collect presents, transport them to their destinations and distribute them to the children who really need them.



Corfe Castle Primary School has been involved in Operation Christmas Child for several years.

Parcels consist of a number of small presents fitted into a shoebox. Boxes may be packed with presents suitable for a boy or a girl within one of three different age ranges. Leaflets will shortly be available which explain very clearly the sort of presents which are suitable, and those which should not be included, and how to package them and prepare them for dispatch. A donation is requested to cover the costs of collection transport and distribution. Suggested amount £5.

This year members of the congregation of St Edward's Church will be coordinating the collection of boxes within the village.

Boxes collected in England are normally moved by truck to Eastern Europe. Parcels for Africa are collected in the USA and moved there by ship. Because of the time that it takes to collect up boxes and move them to their destination boxes have to be ready and collected in early November at the latest.

Record-breaking Summer!

What a summer it's been with several records matched or broken! The Met office have confirmed summer 2018 the joint hottest on record together with 2006, 2003 and 1976. We certainly felt the heat here at Kimmeridge Bay as record numbers of people quenched their thirst with free drinking water as part of the Refill Scheme to reduce the use of single-use plastic bottles. Record numbers of people chose more comprehensive refreshment with a cooling exploration of our Snorkel Trail – affording some great sightings including beautiful corkwing wrasse, shoals of silvery sand eels and the other-worldly rainbow wrack whose colour shifts depending on the viewer's vantage point.

Last year, Dorset Wildlife Trust was awarded funding through the Dorset Coastal Connections project to develop the centre at Kimmeridge into a 'gateway' to Dorset's new Marine Protected Area network. After much hard work by dedicated volunteers and staff, the revamped and renamed Fine Foundation *Wild Seas Centre* was launched in May. The new and improved facilities have been extremely popular. Large numbers of visitors are experiencing local marine life close up through our aquarium and brand new rockpool exhibit—the ever popular anemones and snake pipefish taking centre stage. The interactive displays about the DORIS seabed survey have enabled visitors to peer under the waves with the new touchscreen display. Our lovely gift shop hosts more sustainable lines as well as gifts & cards by local artists. Excellent contributions by local artists continued with our 'Looking to Wild Seas' summer exhibition and we are excited to continue developing the centre as an arts destination in 2019.

Events have been broad in scope and well attended – here's another record number: 70 intrepid explorers joined us for the August Rockpool Ramble! With too many events to mention, highlights included Clifftop Dolphin Watches, Beachcleans, Marine Litter Awareness Day, The Big Wild Weekend, Dorset Art Weeks ...I could go on! We have also welcomed several local businesses and hundreds of school children to the centre to learn about local marine wildlife,

the challenges posed by marine plastic and to take part in beachcleans – removing sackfuls of rubbish and thousands of nurdles.

None of this work would be possible without our dedicated team of merry volunteers. Between them, they boast a staggering array of skills from carpentry and plankton-trawling to the baking of 'motivational' cake! We are also reliant on the generosity of our members and supporters, without whom we could not continue our work educating local children and inspiring more people to explore, and care about, our vital marine ecosystems. A heartfelt thank you from Julie Hatcher and all the team.

The season is not quite over! We have some cracking events still to come and plenty of school children coming to learn all about marine wildlife before the centre closes for the winter on 30th October. So if you havent already, come to see us and make the most of the Snorkel Trail before the weather turns!







The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

What do you do when a loved one becomes gravely ill?

You would expect me to say 'pray', wouldn't you? And, of course, I do say 'pray'. I think it is embedded deep in our human identity for us mere mortals to turn to a power outside ourselves when we feel there is no-one else to turn to, when every other possible source of help is proving useless.

So what do you do when prayer fails to deliver?

Well – surprise, surprise – I say: 'pray some more'. OK, you have prayed with your sick loved one for them to get better, to respond to medical treatment, not to die. And he or she has gone and died, helpless and perhaps in pain, and you are on your own, bereaved, bereft and bewildered. The almighty has dropped you right in it, up the creek without a paddle ... God might as well not exist for all the help he's been. *Now* what do you do? Get furiously angry with God? Abandon your faith?

It is *now* that God is most likely to be closest to you. Prayer is not about presenting God with a shopping list. Prayer is communication. Certainly, get angry with God, if that is how you feel. Tell him - shout at him - complain to him. Don't stand back and talk politely in case you offend him; throw your sad, distressed, unhappy self into his lap (in your mind) and expect a response. It may not come straight away. It may come in ways you don't expect, in a form that seems humdrum – such as the words of a supermarket advert suddenly making a sense to you for which it was never intended. It may come without words, but in an unexpected sense of peace and acceptance. It may come in a dream, or in a storm of weeping, or even in church ... it might come as you play with your kids or grandkids, or as you're working on your weekly budget, or when you are suds-deep in the shower.

The Bible tells us God made us 'in his image'. We have within us something of the 'Spirit' that mysteriously is God; and it is this 'something' that is the conducting-line connecting us to God. We can't be unconnected from him – it is how we are made. And God pays far more attention to us than we pay to him. Often, the activities and necessities of everyday life distract us from prayer; and yet, when we do return to it, we find ourselves welcomed and warmed as if we had never been away. The Apostle Paul put it like this: 'I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God' (Romans 8:18)

So never think God is not there for you. You may not have spoken to him for years and years – but all that means is that he knows you a great deal better than you know him. After all – he has never not existed; an old Biblical name for him is 'The Ancient of Days'. One of the things to remember about God is that he knows the whole bigger picture; we only know our side of it. It may seem to us that the death of our loved one was too soon and their suffering undeserved, but however close we are to someone, we can't know what is going on between them and God. We can only know our own relationship with our maker.

Harman's Cross Movie Night

This month we're showing two films. On Tuesday 9th October, "The Bookshop" and on Tuesday 23rd October, in conjunction with The Purbeck Film Festival, "The Post", both at 7.30 in Harman's Cross Village Hall. "The Bookshop" is adapted from the novel, shortlisted for the Booker, by Penelope Fitzgerald. Semi-autobiographical, it's about an amiable young widow,

Florence, who comes to a remote coastal Suffolk town in the late 1950s, buys a dilapidated property there and enterprisingly converts it into a bookshop. She makes a success of it, largely by stocking Nabokov's Lolita, thus incurring the envious displeasure of a local grande dame, who wanted the property for a selfaggrandising arts centre. She tries to nudge Florence towards switching sites, to a soon-to-be-vacated fishmongers instead. Most of the townsfolk become complicit in forcing her out, except Mr Brundish (Bill Nighy, a hot favourite with our Movie Night groupies), whose letter-writing to Florence sets the stage for a sympathetic alliance. A film that neatly depicts postwar Britain's cold war of generation and class. "The Post", directed by Steven Spielberg and starring Meryl Streep and Tom Hanks, is a must see. This thriller recalls the 1971 revelations of the Pentagon Papers, a devastating internal report that detailed how the White House had been lying about the Vietnam war. While Nixon seethes, newspaper editors head to the Supreme Court, asserting their constitutional right to speak truth to power. Washington Post owner, Kay Graham, is adjusting to taking over the business of her late husband when editor Ben Bradlee discovers the New York Times has scooped them with an explosive expose on the papers. Determined to compete, The Post manages to get a complete copy of the report. However, their plan to publish their findings is put in jeopardy with a federal restraining order that could get them all indicted for Contempt. Now, Kay Graham must decide whether to back down for the safety of her paper or publish and fight for the freedom of the press. A particularly apposite film given the current rantings from The White House. Tickets £5 on the door, which will open, along with the bar, at 7pm.

Langton Arthouse Cinema

On Sunday 14th October, in conjunction with The Purbeck Film Festival we're showing "Loveless" and in November we're screening "The Square" on Wednesday 7th, both at 7.30 in Langton Matravers' Village Hall. "Loveless" is initially the portrait of a failed marriage in its awful final stages. Still living under the same roof, we find the divorcing Moscow couple, Boris and Zhenya. They quarrel endlessly, united only in their mutual loathing. Each has found a new partner, and are both in the first flush of love and infatuation. Under those circumstances, the insults pour down like rain in this toxic battle zone. But then there's the urgent matter of the custody of 12-year-old Alyosha, their only son. Unheard, unloved, and above all, unwanted, the introverted and unhappy boy feels that he is an intolerable burden. However, what his parents don't know is that he hears every single word of their arguments. As a result, when they finally realize that Alvosha has been missing for nearly two days, it is already too late. But is this a simple case of a runaway teenager? A heartwrenching film which confronts us with the most unthinkable of crises. "The Square" is a provocative art-world satire of the cultural elite of Stockholm. The lead character, Christian, is the curator of a museum of modern art that seeks to draw

attention and donors through avant-garde exhibits and edgy social media campaigns. It represents an ideal society, where trust among people is the norm. 


