#### **CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL**

#### JANUARY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

There were no members of the public present at the January meeting and the Council received several apologies from Councillors and from District Councillor Brooks. James Gould, National Trust Operations Manager, was unable to attend so the Purbeck General Manager, Laurie Clarke, attended in his place to deliver a report.

Laurie advised that the defibrillator unit on the wall of the National Trust ticket office needs some significant work to prevent damp and to ensure it is waterproof. Some remedial actions are currently in place but long term the unit may be required to be moved to a different location. It is likely that there will be a period of time when the unit is not in operation. Cllr Spicer-Short clarified that whilst the work is taking place on the casing, the actual defibrillator is currently residing in the village bakery should anyone need to access it in case of an emergency.

There is scaffolding on the Castle Bridge at present, this is to enable contractors to make essential improvements to the electricity supply and to return the bridge to its conservation status. The contractors are diverting the electricity supply under the bridge and over the land which will avoid unnecessary excavations on the bridge in future years. Whilst the scaffold is in place the Trust are removing ivy from the structure and re-pointing as required. Scrub management work has commenced on the mound and the Trust are considering how to approach maintenance on the mound going forward; possibly introducing more sheep to graze it.

The Trust are considering their future opening times and have proposed to extend the hours that the Castle is open for, they anticipate opening 10am-4pm in the slower winter months and 10am-6pm for the majority of the year. Laurie emphasised that these hours would be flexible and could be extended should they wish; he added that this is something they would welcome the Councils views on.

Ranger Jonathan Kershaw also attended the meeting representing the Commons Committee of which he is Chair. Jonathan reported that the Committee has developed a management plan and will be experimenting with various ways of controlling the 'thatch' currently covering a majority of the Common. The Committee is applying for funding to do this work and to improve the perimeter fence (something the Common is eligible for due to its SSSI status). Long term the Committee want to increase grazing and to improve the handling facilities over the Common which should in turn, along with all the maintenance work, improve the appearance of the common.

The Council is looking into replacing the new rubbish bin that was damaged outside of the village stores and it was resolved to order a replacement bin.

A parishioner had contacted the Council to ask if the Council would consider installing a grit bin at Halves Cottages. An estimate had been provided from Dorset County Council and the Council discussed the matter. They concluded that they would not support the expenditure on a grit bin but did offer an alternative solution which the Clerk will feed back directly to the Parishioner. The Council discussed the idea of neighbours helping those less able to access grit from the main bins in the Village Square and at Halves Cottages, and to transport it to their side roads.

With potential cold weather approaching, if anyone notices the grit is running low please report it to the Clerk who can arrange the bins be refilled.

The Clerk updated the Council on progress regarding the transfer of the West Street Toilets and Car Parking Spaces; the matter is currently in the hands of a solicitor appointed by the Council who is liaising with Purbeck District Council.

The Council had received correspondence from a Parishioner reporting that a large group of motor-cross bikers had been using the byway open to all traffic over West Hill. Whilst the Council sympathised that an engine of any description seems highly out of place in such a natural environment enjoyed by pedestrians, the motor-cross bikers were acting within the law and the Council can therefore not take any action. They have logged the letter as a Concern.

The delayed repairs to the ferry are of concern to the Council. The Council have asked the Clerk contact the ferry company requesting an explanation of why the works are taking so long and how much longer they foresee them taking? The ferry company have a duty to provide a service and the lack of service impacts on the Parish through the increased volume of traffic through the village.

Cllr Dru Drury congratulated the Corfe Castle Youth Club following a recent report received by the Council. Despite the village hall being unavailable at times the Youth Club has had a really good term with lots of very positive news.

The Parish Council considers all planning applications. They had no objection to plans to erect a single story veranda at 140 East Street, Corfe Castle.



#### NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

The January meeting of the Parish Council was in the Reading Room at Church Knowle, the wood burner blazing well and providing a cozy atmosphere for the first meeting of 2019. January is not generally a busy month for the Parish Council and this one proved similar to others. There were three apologies from Members and four members of the public from Arne Parish were in attendance.

Cllr Hollard was in the Chair and the meeting began with Public Discussion which revolved very much around the activities of Imerys and drivers attending its works at Furzebrook and Furzeyground Pit. The Arne parishioners were residents from close to the boundary with CK Parish and were concerned about what appeared to be increased movement of lorry traffic with accompanying noise and traffic speed. They felt that that the continental lorries (at 44 tonnes) were too large for the Furzebrook Road and that the railway bridge was at risk as it had a maximum tonnage rating of 40 tonnes. Speeding along Furzebrook Road by lorry drivers was of considerable concern especially as there was no footpath or pedestrian refuge along the road. They were concerned about the use of a "layby" at the Arne parish end of Furzebrook Road by lorry drivers who, allegedly, used bushes nearby for overnight parking, lavatorial purposes and other matters. Whilst it appeared that the Imerys' branded vehicles did not appear to be problematical, it was the "44-tonners" and other lorry drivers who were, apparently, the miscreants. The group felt that they should point out their concerns to Church Knowle Parish Council as Imerys' local management is based in its "patch".

The Council discussed the group's concern at length and it was explained that Imerys had little or no control over the lorry drivers outwith the yard primarily because the continental lorries were from other companies with no supply or service contract with Imerys; they were generally from firms collecting ball clay for customers. Discussion then moved to cleaning down of lorry holds before filling with ball clay. Councillors agreed there was no excuse for this being carried out on the road; it is, of course, highly dangerous as liquid ball clay can be very slippery and would affect traction on the road. It was acknowledged the vehicles had to be cleaned down to avoid "cross contamination" potential. The Councillor advised the Meeting that at Imerys' site there are rest facilities, staff shower and lavatory facilities, areas to eat and drink and also lorry cleaning facilities so there should be no reason for drivers to cause complaint from their activities. It was decided Church Knowle Parish Council would bring the concerns to the next meeting of the Imerys/CKPC Liaison group for discussion and action. There was a suggestion the visiting Parishioners attend the Arne Parish meeting to alert them of the issues and seek endorsement for a joint approach.

The Council then went on to its main business; of which there wasn't really much, this being January and only less than a week after the end of the "Great Sleep" which seems to encompass the United Kingdom from two days before Christmas until New

Year's Day night! (Unless you're a politician or reporter thinking of something to say about Brexit.)

So, to business. The usual stuff including approval of December meeting's minutes was discussed and the Environmental project was postponed for discussion to February. Next came "Planning Matters" and the Clerk reported there weren't any. Noone had any new "unlawful developments" to report although there are suspicions of some "goings on" in the Furzebrook Road area. Gosh, it all goes on in Furzebrook Road. And, talking of Furzebrook Road, an overhanging branch likely to cause injury to road users will be dealt with by the Parish Council's tree officer.

The new fingers for the posts at East Creech Triangle and Barnston Cross are well on the way to completion and it was reported that they should be up by the end of January – so, no need for SatNav any more, at least around here. The Clerk reported that he's going to find out how much DCC would charge for a sign asking HGV drivers not to use the Bradle road as a lorry rat-run and would put this on the agenda for discussion in February.

The Meeting then went on to discuss financial matters. The Council's funds were found to be in good order and bills were paid. It was also decided that there would be no increase in the precept for 2019/2020, which would be held at the same level as 2018/2019.

Councillors were reminded that in May they all come up for re-election. Several present indicated that they may retire and it was suggested that the possibility of a Parish Council with a Parish Clerk and one or no Councillors might occur. There needed to be a recruitment drive bringing "new blood" into the Council. It was decided that this should be a matter for urgent discussion in February.

Several Members present were concerned about the "deforestation" of the woodland around Creech and the area by what appear to be contractors for the local herpetological group. Smoke nuisance was severe and at the risk of appearing cynical, Members felt it of interest that the work of burning seemed to occur when the likelihood of a visit from the EHO was minimal (ie Christmas holiday). Comparisons were made with "slash & burn" farmers of the disappearing rainforests who by their activities are affecting not only local fauna but also the ability of the ecosystem to hold and disperse ground water in a controlled manner. The Council felt that, despite past requests, the herpetological group do not appear to wish for dialogue or other communication with CKPC to at least let them know the whys and wherefores of what is going on in this SSSI. There was general discussion but it was felt that the Parish Council had done all it could.

There was a report that fly-tipping in the area was on the increase. The Clerk noted this and would be monitoring the situation. Any evidence found by him of the miscreants

would be dealt with under the full force of the Law and he would report matters for prosecution (Penalty includes unlimited fine and imprisonment).

And with that good news the Meeting closed at 9.20pm. Next Meeting will be at Furzebrook Village Hall on 12<sup>th</sup> February 2019 at 7.30pm.





#### Look out for aliens!

While annual maintenance work continues at the Wild Seas Centre in Kimmeridge during our winter closure, our volunteers have also been active on the beach. As usual, rough weather has washed up lots of plastic litter on our beautiful Purbeck beaches and we have been busy trying to remove as much as possible. Some of the litter has goose barnacles attached, indicating that it has travelled from way out in the ocean, or even from North America, picking up these hitch-hikers along the way. Once washed ashore above the tide line these animals die, however other species, such as a predatory sea snail have been found alive. There is concern that the huge amounts of litter in the ocean are acting like a super-highway for non-native species to reach our shores, with potentially devastating consequences for our native marine life.

We need your help. With new species arriving regularly, it is important to record when and where this happens. If you are out and about on the beach this winter please keep an eye out for unusual wildlife and let us know. We are always interested in what you find (native or non-native) and with a photo and location emailed to us at the above address we should be able to identify and record it.

#### Final call for volunteers!

If you are interested in finding out more about what we do, or maybe would like to volunteer for us at Kimmeridge, there is still time. We are recruiting new volunteers now, and in early February there will be an open session at the Centre where you can come along and meet the team, ask questions and find out more about the variety of work we do. We provide monthly training sessions on a variety of Kimmeridge and marine wildlife related topics and organise trips and social events throughout the year. We're a friendly bunch and would love to welcome like-minded people to our team.







#### The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

At the time of writing this, we are still in the season of Epiphany – but by the time you read it, we will be approaching Lent. Lent is familiar: a time of abstention from chocolate, smoking and alcohol in the name of spiritual self-improvement; but what precisely is Epiphany?

Epiphany celebrates the visit of the Magi or Wise Men to the baby Jesus. Tradition tells us they were from 'the East' and although we assume there were three, we don't really know how many there were. Indeed, we don't even know if the story is literal truth or beautiful myth. If literal truth, common sense tells us they would have been part of a caravan of scholars and explorers travelling together for safety. The science of Astronomy was well developed at that time, particularly in Eastern countries where the climate was hot and dry, and the night skies clear. Further west and north there was considerably more rainfall, and the night sky would have been all too often covered by cloud. They would have been travelling mounted on camels, animals well-suited to traversing desert trails, and their caravan would have included pack-animals carrying luggage and necessary supplies, guides, waterdiviners, military fighting men and guards, and a number of servants and slaves. The Wise Men themselves would have been international scientists. philosophers, astrologers as well as astronomers, and probably some holy men. A medley of languages would have been spoken: several ancient Chinese and many Middle Eastern tongues, Latin, Greek, Hebrew and Aramaic, and probably some Mongolian and southern Russian dialects. They would have been accompanied by meat on the hoof – cattle and sheep – as well as crates of fowl; and there would probably have been a thin tail of horses and donkeys coming along behind, carrying the military, servants and slaves, and the slavewomen brought along to keep the men entertained.

It wouldn't have been the tidy Three Wise Men with their extraordinary gifts as portrayed in our familiar school Nativity Plays – but that doesn't matter. What does matter is that Epiphany has a vital, important message for us: The Gospel of Christ, the Good News, is for *everyone* irrespective of race, religion, gender, intellectual capacity, social standing or age.

Modern biblical research has established that, due to a mistake in early calendar making, Jesus was born 4 or 5 years before the calendar split from BC to AD, that is, from Before Christ to Anno Domini (meaning 'the year of the Lord'). Astronomy was a well-established science in China by the time of Jesus' birth. Chinese astronomers kept meticulous records of stars observed in the sky, and there is only one star recorded between 20 BC and 10

AD that precisely fulfils the description of the Star of Bethlehem in Matthew's Gospel: it was a new star, not seen before; it travelled slowly from east to south; and it 'stood over' Bethlehem. A spectacular comet with a long tail appeared in 5 BC and remained visible for 70 days. According to Chinese records of where the comet first appeared, the Magi – the Wise Men – would have first seen it 'in the east'. Both the revised dating of the birth of Jesus, and Chinese Astronomical records agree with the Biblical story.

Tradition has it that the Wise Men did not all come from the same place, that they were of different nationalities. They would have come together as scholars to investigate this new star, convinced it was a portent of the birth of a new King, a King so important and powerful that his arrival was marked in the sky by a heavenly body clearly visible to the whole world. The baby Jesus grew to adulthood and embarked on his public ministry, healing and teaching. It became ever clearer that here might really be the long-awaited Messiah, God's agent who would right all Israel's wrongs, a 'King of the Jews' unlike any that had gone before. And then the Romans put him to death on a crucifixion cross. But three days later he was back again, 'alive and kicking'.

Jesus of Nazareth, the Christ, God's Anointed one, the Messiah, the true 'King of the Jews' was in sober solid fact the One-and-Only Living God come into human history. In his divinity he was outside time and space; in his humanity he was just like us, confined within bodily limits. He died a human death, but he himself is indestructible, eternal, everlasting. No one person has affected the life and development of humankind as has Jesus. He is as alive today as he ever was, living in the lives of Christians in every country of the world.

#### St Edward's Church Flags

Several people have asked about the flags which are flown from time to time from the church tower.

We have four flags and if one of them is flown you can look in the church porch for a sign which will tell you why it is being flown on that particular day.

The flags shown here (clockwise from top left) are the Union Jack, the flag of St Edward, King and Martyr, the flag of St George and the Salisbury Diocesan flag.

The St Edward's flag has four crowns which represent his reign of four years, and the cross for martyrdom.

The Diocesan flag has a portrayal of Mary and the infant Jesus in the top left hand corner.

Traditionally flags are run up the pole first thing in the morning and lowered at sunset.

In announcing the strategy, the Prime Minister acknowledged that loneliness is one of the greatest public health challenges of our time.

- Three quarters of GPs surveyed, say that they see 1 to 5 people a day who are suffering from loneliness
- Loneliness has been linked to conditions such as heart disease, strokes and dementia
- 200,000 older people haven't had a conversation with a friend or relative in the past month
- The number of over 50s suffering from loneliness is set to reach 2 million by 2025/6. This amounts to a 49% increase in 10 years

Age UK Dorchester runs a 'Reach Out' service which provides volunteers for older people who have become lonely and isolated.

This can happen for a variety of reasons including bereavement, ill health and a loss of confidence. 'Reach Out' can help you to access social activities or if this is difficult for you, a volunteer could visit you for a cup of tea and a chat.

# RECORD-BREAKING 'FLYING SCOTSMAN' TO VISIT SWANAGE AND RUN WITH RARE PULLMAN CARRIAGE FOR FIRST TIME IN ALMOST 50 YEARS

Record-breaking 'Flying Scotsman' – the most famous steam locomotive in the world – is to visit the Swanage Railway and be reunited with a rare Devon Belle Pullman observation carriage for the first time in almost 50 years.

Owned by the National Railway Museum in York, the iconic 97-tonne A3 class locomotive – completed in 1923 by the London and North Eastern Railway (L.N.E.R.) – will be on the Purbeck heritage railway for 20 days from Friday, 22 March to Wednesday, 10 April, 2019, inclusive.

During a test run in 1934, the Nigel Gresley-designed *'Flying Scotsman'* was the first steam locomotive in the United Kingdom to haul a train at 100 miles an hour.

Coupled behind No. 60103 *'Flying Scotsman'* will be a late 1940s Devon Belle Pullman observation carriage – known as Car 14 – that dedicated Swanage Railway volunteers rescued from San Francisco in 2007 where it was being used as a company boardroom.

It was between 1969 and 1972 that *'Flying Scotsman'* ran with the Devon Belle Car 14 in the United States of America during a tour of the country aimed at promoting British exports. Sadly, the company running the tour went bankrupt with *'Flying Scotsman'* being returned home but the Pullman observation carriage remaining in the USA.

Swanage Railway volunteer Mick Gould – Swanage Railway Company business division director and chairman of the No. 60103 Steering Group – said: "The trustees, directors, staff and dedicated volunteers of the Swanage Railway are delighted that the Railway has been successful in its bid to host 'Flying Scotsman'.

"We are extremely grateful to the National Railway Museum for giving the Swanage Railway the opportunity to host such a unique and historic event to operate and display the world famous 'Flying Scotsman' which is such an icon.

"It will be the first time is almost 50 years that No. 60103 and the unique Devon Belle Pullman observation carriage – known as Car 14 – will operate together since they ran as a pair across the USA between 1969 and 1972," explained Mr Gould, a volunteer Swanage Railway train guard and signalman.

*'Flying Scotsman'* will be hauling five seven-carriage trains a day from Swanage to Corfe Castle and Norden for five days – from Friday 22 March to Tuesday 26 March, 2019, inclusive – with ticket-only access to stations for the public.

The iconic steam locomotive will then spend 15 days on display at Corfe Castle station – coupled to the Devon Belle Pullman observation carriage Car 14 – between Wednesday 27 March and Wednesday 10 April, 2019, with ticket-only access to view.

Swanage Railway Trust trustee and Swanage Railway Company chairman Trevor Parsons explained: "With uniformed attendants serving champagne and canapés to passengers on board the Devon Belle Pullman observation carriage, Car 14 will be coupled directly behind *'Flying Scotsman'* when it hauls trains on the Swanage Railway.

"That will give Pullman passengers a rare chance to enjoy the delights of travelling in style behind, and watching, the world's most famous steam locomotive as it travels through the beautiful Purbeck countryside and past the historic ruins of Corfe Castle.

"'Flying Scotsman' last visited the Swanage Railway in 1994 – when it only hauled trains to Harman's Cross – so it's very exciting that No. 60103 will be hauling trains all the way to Corfe Castle

and Norden," added Mr Parsons, a volunteer signalman and train guard on the Swanage Railway which has been built from nothing since 1976.

Costing £7,944 to build, *'Flying Scotsman'* was named after the prestigious London to Edinburgh express train service that the locomotive helped to operate – the journey time being eight hours. In 1924, *'Flying Scotsman'* appeared at the British Empire Exhibition in London and in 1963 British Railways withdrew the locomotive from service.

Purchased by the National Railway Museum in 2004, *'Flying Scotsman'* was restored thanks to a £4.2 million, ten-year project funded by the National Heritage Memorial Fund and the Heritage Lottery Fund as well as from public donations.


