OCTOBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

James Gould reported that the National Trust had not received any further reports of incidents with cows. The Trust had offered **management of the allotments** to the Parish Council which they had declined. James wished to emphasise that whilst the Trust were happy to continue with the management they must be left to manage the allotments in the way that they want to manage them and do not want any come back from the Parish Council going forward. Cllr Fooks asked James to remove the sign in the giftshop which advises shoppers that profits generated in Purbeck are reinvested specifically in the area. James confirmed that this is not a true statement and advised a new sign is being designed. He does not know when it will be ready. The **work on the robing room** is likely to take slightly longer as the scaffolding has had to be modified. They are hoping to complete work by the end of the year and James reassured the Council the work will not affect the Christmas festivities.

Plans are still in progress to install an electrical charging point for cars at Castle View.

Cllr Brooks was unable to attend. In response to a request from the Council she reported that **licencing applications will be published online and she will notify the Council when they are live**. This will enable Parishioners to look online at the terms on which a licence is granted. Cllr N Dragon would like to see licensing as a standing agenda item, how best to do this will be considered.

Councillors noted items they would like to seek clarification from Cllr Brooks on the following; Cllr N Dragon would like **some clarity on the process of referring a planning application to the Area Planning Board**. It is understood that if a officer's decision is contrary to that of the Parish Council, he then refers it to the Area Committee Chair, Vice Chair and Ward Member and they decided if it will go to the Area Committee or not. This is then reported to the chief officer and the decision lies with her. Cllr Parish would like clarification on what is happening with the Purbeck Local Plan. She has concerns that there have been so many modifications the final plan will be very far removed from that originally consulted on. Cllr Fooks asked can a member of the Parish Council be present at all the Norden meetings going forward and can the Council please be informed on any meetings going ahead.

At a recent liaison meeting the Council was asked to consider if they are open to the idea of **seeking professional planning advice to deal with larger planning applications**. Swanage TC are investigating the proposal; writing a specification and seeking quotes. The Council were minded to

proceed to work with Swanage, looking at costs and seeing if the proposal is feasible. Cllr N Dragon commented that the Council do not have a large budget and this would limit what advice available.

Clir Clarke thanked the environment group for their very successful meeting and the group wishes to thank all of you who came to share ideas and contribute. The group asked for approval of a subsequent meeting to go ahead which will focus on biodiversity. This was approved by the Council and will take place on the 25th of November, in the Village Hall at 7.30pm. This meeting will explore how the Parish Council, The National Trust and you can help nature recover from it's rapid recent decline. Clir Fooks would like to have a space in the CVN where people can report how they are making small changes and where changes can be celebrated and encouraged. The Chair asked can the next step be to formulate a plan developing a distinct, task orientated agenda which the Council, with others, can deliver.

Cllr Fooks will report back on response to playground surveys at the December meeting. Should anyone wish to respond and hasn't already please get your survey to the bakery by November 15th. The Council made their remaining nomination to the Corfe Castle Charity and have nominated Michael Bond who will serve a term of four years on the Charities board of trustees.

Dorset Council have organised a series of workshops, the objective of which is to have discussions and develop a framework of how Dorset County and Parish and Town Councils will work together. The Council resolved they wished the following points to be raised; they want Dorset Council to see Parish Councils as a resource and to devolve actions to them. Parish and Town Councils should have an opportunity to be represented in decision making; including planning and licencing. The Council wish to see the former Clerks and Chair liaison meetings to be reinstated on a local level, not county wide. The Council wish to raise that Parish Councils should be statutory consultees in planning applications. Councillors should have a right to speak at planning board meetings as a Parish Councillor, with a higher weight than that of a member of the Public. The Council wish to have the response time to planning applications reinstated to 28 days. Finally, many local action groups do not have 'teeth'. If Dorset Council truly want to involve P&T Councils and engage with local communities, could they not use these groups and attend them so action can be carried forward?

A resident had raised a problem she had experienced with **numerous trade vans dominating parking in the centre of the village.** An incident had occurred where four vans with valid permits were all working at the same

address. This limited parking for residents and visitors for a number of days. It was suggested could a single permit for an individual job be issued to the householder rather than the tradesman, thus allowing only one vehicle at a time.

On planning matters the Council had no objection to strip and relay a stone roof to rear extension, re-render chimney stack, internal alterations, change door and window to french doors at Lynch Farmhouse, Kingston, Wareham and to a treeworks application; Picea - crown lift to 5m above ground level at 91 East Street, Corfe Castle.



NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

The five remaining members of the Church Knowle Parish Council met in the cozy Reading Room and were joined by a Parishioner, our Dorset Council (DC) councillor and two senior managers from the Dorset Wildlife Trust (DWT). Because the Meeting was a "mini-meeting, the agenda was shorter than normal although the meeting ended up taking as long as a full meeting because of the length of the Public Discussion Period; see below.

There were no declarations of interest from Members and the meeting quickly went to the Public Discussion Period during which the Parishioner present brought up concerns about what appeared to be the unlawful use of a caravan at Chiplake and discussion ensued about the various licences required to allow "permanent" use of caravans for habitation. It was decided to contact Dorset Council's planners regarding the matter.

The representatives of DWT then gave a presentation of the work carried out and proposed at the Corfe River and Furlong Coppice/Stonehill Down. What followed was a question and answer session which went on for about an hour and a half during which the reps were subject to some very searching questions and comments about the past lack of communication from DWT to the Parish Council about the activities in relation to the coppicing at Furlong Coppice and the environmental improvements for the Corfe River. Several of the Members were concerned about rare plants which were under risk due to activities at Furlong Coppice. Financial concerns raised by Members were also brought up and one could describe the questioning similar to that encountered by some "witnesses" at a U.S. Senate Committee hearing. By the end of the discussion and Q&A session, the DWT representatives had beenmade fully aware of the concerns within the Parish and they agreed to be more communicative with the Parish Council and its trees and project liaison officers.

Cllr Higgens was then elected Chairman of the Parish Council until the November meeting.

Next up came a discussion about the resignation of one of the Councillors and retirement, due to ill health, of another. Both were thanked *in absentia* for the hard work they had performed during their period as Parish Councillors. It was noted the retiring councillor had been in post for well over 20 years.

The Minutes for the September meeting were approved and Dorset Councillor Cherry Brooks gave a report on the Barnston Cross finger post and "A-board" advising drivers of coaches, motor-caravans, etc., that there was no access to the Smedmore and Swalland caravan sites via the Bradle road. The Caravan

and Camping Club would help by suggesting on their website that "SatNavs" be switched off when people are driving to either of those two caravan sites.

There were no planning applications submitted and the results of previous planning applications were noted. It would appear that the Dorset Council planners had taken the advice of CKPC that the thatch proposed at 2 Cotness be of reed.

Under "Highways" it was reported that a road drain close to Jubilee Cottage, East Creech had been overflowing and it was suggested that the outlet was too small for the flow. This may have been due to a collapse of the feeder drain or the mean hydraulic depth of the pipe was inadequate, especially during periods of heavy rain as Purbeck has been subject to since the beginning of September. It was decided to contact DC to try and get a camera drain inspection undertaken.

Our cemetery liaison councillor, who is also a member of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) gave a report on discussion she had had with the PCC and Salisbury Diocese about the access to the CKPC cemetery across St Peter's churchyard. She was awaiting a reply from the diocese authorities about getting the wayleave/easement formalised.

The Clerk reported that the finances of the Council were in good condition and that the Playground Fund had received a very kind donation from a Parishioner which had swollen its funds a bit. Our dear reader will recall that the fund is kept separate from other Council expenditure so that it doesn't get swallowed up by other CKPC commitments. It enables the Council to provide a good quality recreational facility for the Parish and, indeed, allows it to buy extra furniture and play equipment for Parishioners and visitors to use throughout the year. Invoices were approved and bills paid.

The storage of CKPC's records and archives were then discussed and several suggested solutions regarding converted sea containers came up. The Council was advised that that due to the costs it would be necessary to decide on a specification and invite at least three tenders to quote. The policy of "best value" should be used in decision-making. On a similar sort of note, it was also decided to look at prices for a new bench and tree for the playground; this is "work in progress" and further discussion was put off till November's meeting.

The Council is very concerned about the reduction in its membership due to retirements and resignations. It now has four vacancies which need to be filled. Whilst other parish councils in Dorset are in a similar condition this doesn't really mitigate the problem. Parishioners can be co-opted onto the

Council and the Parish Council would love to hear from anyone who thinks they would like to serve the Parish community.

That was the end of the meeting. Next meeting will be at the Church Knowle Reading Room on 12th November, beginning at 7:30pm.

Village homes for village people

Latest news from Corfe Castle Community Land Trust

Thank you to everyone who came to the public meeting on Thursday 19th September. For the information of those who were not present, we are delighted to say that over 100 people attended and in a straw poll, well over 70% supported our proposed project.

The projected site is once again on West Street, the entrance being between nos. 98 and 102 where there is a gate into a field. The proposal is for 14 dwellings for rent (mix of 1, 2 and 3 bed homes to be decided) with 6 for the open market, 3 for the Bond family, who are offering the land, and 3 for the developer, Aster. The benefit of these last 3 properties will form a cross subsidy, meaning that Aster will be able to reduce rents to below the nationally accepted figure of 80% of market rent and hopefully to achieve closer to 60%, making them more genuinely affordable for local people.

The main concerns expressed by those not in favour related to traffic and parking, problems of which we are all aware and which will be carefully assessed by Highways when a planning application is made.

The CLT will now move forward as fast as possible to prepare this application, working with the same professional team we used last year and hoping to submit the application in early 2020. Following approval, we aim to have the homes ready within 2 years.

It is probably worth emphasising that if you would like to be considered for one of these homes in due course, it is absolutely essential that you are on the council list, Dorset Home Choice. It would also be helpful to be on the Parish Council Housing Needs Register.





Dorset survey reveals a record breaking breeding year for tawny owls

The signs are that it has been a good year for tawny owls in Dorset this year, with a record number successfully hatching, bucking the national decline in these birds across the rest of the country. The findings were revealed following a nest box monitoring scheme at Milton Abbas Woods run by local bird experts and Forestry England.



Tawny owls, once a familiar site across England were placed on the amber list of birds of conservation concern in 2015 amid fears that they were undergoing long-term population decline. The Milton Abbas monitoring scheme has been tracking the fortunes of these birds in this part of Dorset since 2014.

The project provides special

nesting boxes and follows the owls' progress throughout the breeding season to measure how many young birds successfully hatch in each. This year 22 of the nesting boxes were used by the birds compared to only 13 in 2014. The number of eggs laid increased from 42 to 66, with survival rates for the young bird rising from 66% five years ago to a record 84% this year.

Danny Alder, licenced bird ringer and ecologist who led the survey said; "Tawny owls are very vocal at this time of year as young disperse to find their own territories and pairs communicate with their classic 'tu-whit, tu-whoo' duet. Given how well these birds have bred this year I expect their song to be well heard across this area this autumn. The record number of birds we found this year is extremely positive.

Mark Warn, Wildlife Ranger for Forestry England, said; "Survey work like this is really important. It helps us gauge whether our forests are providing the right kind of habitats for wildlife and helps shape the way we plant and manage our woods. Tawny owls need many different types of habitats to survive from dense woodland to more open areas for hunting. They also benefit from a mix of tree species including conifers offering all year round cover for roosting birds, and native broadleaf trees providing the foundation of much of the food chain the birds rely on."

Ian and Gerald from The Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service conveyed their serious message in an entertaining way at our Guest Afternoon in October. With fire stations in Wareham and Swanage, firefighters aim is to be on their way to emergencies in 4 minutes – a far cry from Ian's grandfather's day when, aged 14, his job was to catch the draft horses first.

Prevention is preferred to the cure so we were encouraged to have our homes fire checked, completely free, and many members signed up immediately, having heard of fire risks we had never even thought of. How many of us leave water in our kettles overnight to leak onto the electric plate? How many charge mobile phones etc on a flammable surface? Is your toaster under a cupboard? Certainly more Aquarius members will check now.

We are most at risk when we are asleep so Ian and Gerald demonstrated several fire and carbon monoxide alarms [including aids for the hard of hearing] which should be tested every week. Their advice in nearly all cases is GET OUT! Afterwards everyone enjoyed the special tea with cakes provided by the Committee.





Wild Seas Centre winter opening

This year we are delighted that the Wild Seas Centre will remain open on selected dates through the winter. We will be open every Sunday (except 29th December) from 12 noon until 4pm. We will also be open on some weekdays but please ring to check before planning your visit.

What's About

Autumn can be a time of storms and strong winds but there are still things to look out for on a trip to the beach. At this time of year there are lots of white cuttlefish bones decorating the shoreline where they have been deposited by the waves. These 'bones' are not like our bones but are really the modified shell of the cuttlefish which is a type of mollusc. Back in the evolutionary past, cuttlefish internalised their shell and used it to give structure to their soft body. It is also used to control their buoyancy in the sea, so that by increasing or decreasing the air inside its honeycomb-structure, they can rise or sink in the water without the need to use energy in swimming. Cuttlefish are closely related to octopus, with suckered tentacles for catching their prey. These animals breed only once in their lifetime, and having done so, they stop eating and die, only living for one or two years. When their soft body has decomposed, the buoyant bone floats to the sea's surface and washes ashore on our beaches.



While cuttlefish bones are frequently found on beaches at this time of year, sometimes more unusual items wash

ashore. If you find anything you can't identify we would be delighted to help if you send us a photo, or post it on Twitter @DWTMarine. For more information about the centre please visit our website:
