Editorial

At its last meeting the Parish Council considered **the** paper on parking and traffic in the village. This paper, which was prepared by a sub group of the Council, contains a number of ideas about how to resolve some of the traffic and parking problems in the village. Some of its ideas have already been shared. However at this stage these are no more than ideas. They are uncosted and unfunded and so far have had no design effort applied to create an actual proposal on which to move forward.

The Parish Council however is determined to improve the situation within the village and will be conducting a full consultation once we have some designed proposals, which have been costed. So far the first priority, which has in fact had some funding, is to improve the Norden car park and to provide a new cycleway and footpath down to the village. Work on this aspect has already started. Work has also started on rebranding the Norden car park as the Purbeck Park. New signs are already up on the A351.

There is more about all this in the parish clerks report on the last council meeting starting on page 6; the full report is also available on the Council website – you will find it under the agenda for the 13th January 2020 meeting.

JANUARY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Members of the Chamber of Commerce attended the meeting and spoke in the public half hour to voice their concerns regarding proposals set out for the West Street car park in a later Agenda Item; the Parking and Traffic Study.

They asked what is happening? What are the plans for the West Street car park? Is it closing?

The Council responded, explaining that the **Traffic and Parking working group** had been asked by the Council to prepare a study of parking arrangements in the village. The resulting document explores many potential alternatives for parking and is a basis for discussion; at this stage none of the suggestions have been endorsed or approved by the Council, nor the working group. One of the many suggestions in the paper is, in the long term, closing the pay and display West Street car park but this is one possible scenario and is by no means a firm proposal.

Cllr Dru Drury gave an overview of the study. The introduction presents the background information; the national situation with cars and the visitor numbers we experience in Corfe, it then goes on to summarise historic parking and traffic studies conducted by the Parish Council.

The next step after this initial discussion will be to liaise with stakeholders and with Dorset Council to discuss feasibility. He stressed that none of the recommendations were costed and no funding had been allocated to projects except for the Norden footpath and cycleway. Cllr Dru Drury stressed there is a huge amount of work to do before any of the suggestions could be seriously considered, should the Council wish to take them forward. There are too many recommendations to list within this summary but all are listed in the full minutes which are available on the website.

On behalf of the Council, Cllr Clarke expressed condolences to the relatives of Cllr Mike Lovell who has recently passed away. Cllr Lovell was a committed and diligent Councillor who regularly attended meetings as both a District and County Councillor and always spoke up for the area.

Clir Clarke reported that the **Government have approved the proposed** rearrangement of the Health Service in our area.

Cllr Brooks, our Dorset Councillor, reported that the Council are promoting **helping a neighbour with your winter fuel payments**. Those who feel they do not need their winter fuel allowance can donate it to someone in need through the CAB, or the Dorset Community Foundation. Further information is available from the Clerk or on Dorset For You.

CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

James Gould announced that the **National Trust is celebrating its 125**th **birthday.** This is being marked in Corfe with topical illuminations on the Castle Keep.

Jen, the National Trust Engagement Officer is working on the Purbeck **Beaver Feasibility project**; exploring the introduction of Eurasian Beavers to the Purbeck Landscape. A meeting is being held in Corfe on Monday 24th February to which they invite the public to find out more, and have their say on the decision making in the early stages of this project. If you have a view or would like to learn more do go along.

The **robing room scaffolding should be coming down soon** once the work has been signed off by the building inspector. This is slightly later than the Trust had initially planned.

Cllr Fooks reported there had been an incident with **horses escaping from the Common**. The gate is not latching sufficiently or springing back. She requested that James address this as a matter of urgency and requested that additional signage be installed stating the importance of shutting the gate. **There are still plans to install a tap at the allotments** but there has been a delay in trying to establish who owns the bank adjacent to the plots. This has now been solved so we should see the scheme progressing.

Following an announcement that the **Saturn Trust's merger** with Harbourside Learning Partnership and Ocean Learning Trust is going ahead, Cllr Fooks reported that she has received feedback from some parents of children at Corfe Castle Primary School who feel their concerns are not being addressed by the Saturn Trust. The Council were asked would they support convening a meeting to provide a platform for interested parents to raise their queries? It was decided that whilst the Council has no influence over the school, having been asked they would support the proposal to convene a meeting and would make enquires with other parties.

The Council have been awarded a grant of £900 from the Watermark Foundation and Wessex Water to install a water dispenser on the wall of the public toilets in West Street. The Council voted unanimously to accept the grant and instructed the Clerk to proceed. The grant should cover all the costs and will help to reduce the need for single use plastic bottles.

On planning matters the Council had no objection to demolish a rear conservatory and erect a two storey side extension and attached carport at 10 Halves Cottages Corfe Castle and to internal alterations; replace existing window with French doors, install wood burning stove & works to fireplace, repair/replace windows, refurbish lean-to at 116 East Street, Corfe Castle. The Council objected to the removal of a planning condition to allow

unrestricted occupation of the dwellings at Cotters Pound, 32 East Street. The Council also objected to a treeworks application to fell trees at 89 West Street.

The next meeting will be held on the 10th of February 2020 at 7pm in Corfe Castle Town Hall.

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NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

Church Knowle Parish has a new Parish Councillor! Step up Councillor Howard Fry of Church Knowle village. Councillor Fry was co-opted on to the Parish Council at the January meeting and this now brings the number of Councillors up to six; there are still three positions on the Parish Council waiting to be filled, so the Parish is not "out of the woods" yet when it comes to missing Councillors.

During the Public Discussion period the Council heard of the recent death of ex-Councillor Mike Lovell who had been the County Councillor for the Parish before Councillor Cherry Brookes took his place and was elected to the new Dorset Council.

Also during "Public Discussion" the maintenance of the Church Knowle playground and playing field was discussed. Our dear reader will recall the sad death of the late Councillor Les Bugler who voluntarily looked after the field and playground for many years and kept both areas and equipment in superb condition. One of the past users of the playground and playing field as a child and young adult offered his services as gardener to the Council and gave a short presentation on such services. The Parish Council invited him to offer a quote for the gardening services, the Clerk explaining that the Council would have to take at least three quotes and decide on "best value". With Spring growth of grass about to begin – if the grass had not already been thinking about turning the areas into the Church Knowle Savannah by the end of February – the Council felt obtaining quotes was a matter of severe urgency so that a contract could be awarded before the playground was swamped with vegetation á la Mayan temples in South America.

The meeting then went on to hear that Cllr Higgens would remain Chairman until the February meeting and this was followed by Cllr Parker remaining as Vice Chairman until that time as well.

The Council then heard that the archive store is now in place and that electrical wiring and a plug would be fitted so that any archivist, Parish Clerk, Councillor, Parishioner or whoever needed to research Church Knowle's copious records would be able to do so. Up to now, CK Parish has not had a "permanent" home for its records which have had to be stored in various Councillors' and Clerks' attics or garages. This new facility will be an excellent improvement on the past. However, be that as it may, the colour of the unit could be improved and Members decided it should be painted a sensible shade of green to match other storage units.

Highways matters involved discussions on the finger-posts saga and it was decided to postpone further discussion until February's meeting when it was hoped that a representative from the makers would be able to attend. The damage to West Hill and the Corfe Castle BOAT caused by thoughtless "off-the-roaders" was again discussed and there was a suggestion that a Traffic Restriction Order could be sought in a similar

vein to that which is in place near Grange Arch. It was reported that the road at Cocknowle Hill is again showing signs of damage due to the recent rains and this matter would be reported to Dorset Highways. It was also mentioned that a report on flooding in East Creech is still awaited from Dorset Council following an investigation of causes.

The accounts were found to be in good order and invoices were paid. The Council also discussed the need to review the precept for 2020-2021 due to the probability of a significant increase in the costs of maintenance of the playing field and playground. The Council would try to keep costs down as much as possible but it was accepted that that the Council would have to budget for an immediate increase in costs of at least £2,500 excluding capital costs which may be incurred if the mower required replacement. It was decided to absorb as much as possible from the general account and that an estimated precept of £8,000 would be required from Dorset Council.

And apart from formal postponements of discussion items until the February meeting, that was that for January. The Chairman closed the meeting at 9:30pm. Next meeting will be on 11th February at Church Knowle Reading Room commencing at 7:30pm.

Should the Isle of Purbeck have a new second homes policy?

Introduction

- 1-The Parish Council wishes to have the views of residents on whether there should be a new policy on second homes in Purbeck and possibly beyond.
- 2-The former Purbeck District Council after consultation agreed that new planning applications for new homes should have a condition that only residents for whom it would be their sole and principal home should occupy the property. In other words the property would be occupied by someone who would live there fulltime.
- 3-The policy was based on a 77-page report, which highlighted the high percentages of properties occupied by second homeowners with large numbers in Studland ,Swanage and Worth Matravers. The figure given for Corfe Castle was given as 13%.
- 4-None of this discussion should make our existing second homeowners feel unwelcome. Many intend to live here and be active members of the community. Many use services such as property maintenance. Some let their properties full time. It is the **balance** of second homes in the community which is an issue as too many second homes can create "ghost villages" and lose the character which attracted people in the first place.

Why Are Second Homes An Issue

- 5-The reasons given for a second homes policy include:
- 1-Demand for second homes in attractive areas pushes up house prices. Purbeck has one of the highest gaps between house prices and average local incomes meaning homes are unaffordable for local people. There is strong resistance to building new homes in Dorset so can we make better use of the houses we have?
- 2-The lack of affordable housing both to buy and rent means that both key public services and other employers cannot recruit. There is for example currently a crisis in community health services as district and community nurses cannot afford to live here and community hospitals have closed for staffing reasons.
- 3-If properties are empty for part or most of the year local services such as buses, shops and schools are not used and are at greater risk of closure.
- 4-Purbeck and Dorset relies on huge amounts of volunteering as public services are so underfunded and second home owners cannot undertake all year commitments.
- 6-Purbeck's second homes policy is currently being challenged, as the Government has not formally agreed it. However even if it does get agreement

it would apply only to **new** homes. The policy would be ineffective, as those seeking to have a second home would therefore buy an **existing** home.

7-Current Government policy is to discourage second home ownership by placing a 3% surcharge on stamp duty for those seeking to buy a second home but this extra charge may not discourage many.

What Could Be Done To Reduce The Growth In Second Homes?

- 8-If Corte Castle residents believe that we should not have more second homes than currently there are two main ways of achieving this. Both require Government approval and legislation.
- 9-The first option is to give local Councils (such as Dorset) the power to require that where the percentage of second homes in any parish becomes too great –that is it goes over a percentage threshold of say 10-20% of the total-all new sales are only to those who would make the property their sole home. The change would achieve the object of ensuring there were not too many second homes. The change would reduce the pool of potential buyers and house prices would either fall or not rise so fast. This would affect existing homeowners wishing to sell.
- 10-**The second option** is to put a surcharge on Council tax to recognise that home owners are not around to contribute voluntary effort to the community and that their absence affects local services. The money raised could be used for say rural transport initiatives. Governments would find it easier to implement this as there is finance legislation every year.
- 11-The paper to Corfe Castle, Parish Council, which raised this option, envisaged a modest surcharge of say up to 25%. At the last General Election the Labour Party proposed a 100% surcharge which was designed to stop second home ownership altogether. If the surcharge option discouraged home ownership it would also reduce the level of house prices below what they could be. But as with option one it would help preserve the existing character of the parish.
- 12-Both options raise questions such as whether a second home property should be exempted if it is let fulltime as a rented property. Should Councils have discretion on whether to apply the policy, as some areas in the UK do not have as severe a housing problem as Dorset? The position of owners with several holiday let homes needs consideration as some may only pay business rates.
- 13-A copy of the full paper is on the Parish Council website, www.corfecastlepc.org.uk. Residents including second homeowners are asked for their views on the following questions.
- 1-Should there be a policy to ensure second homes do not create the problems outlined above in paragraph 5?

- 2-Do you support the idea in Option 1 to limit sales to second homeowners once a certain number are in a parish?
- 3-Do you support the idea of surcharge for second homeowners on their Council tax if the money can be used to bolster local services.?
- 14-Comments are sought by the **end of February 2020** and the Parish Council will revisit the issue at its meeting on 9 March.
- 15-If there is support in the parish support will be sought from other Dorset parishes with a view to making representations to "Government.

Our PPG will be supporting the PURBECK PLEDGE, which will run throughout May this year, and is an event established by Live Well Dorset.



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<u>Firecrests and other feathered</u> <u>friends</u>

When I was a child my father took up birdwatching as a hobby, keeping a list of all the birds that he saw either in or flying over our family garden in Paisley in Scotland. Over thirty-odd years

that list reached seventy species. Fifty years later, following in his footsteps, I have been keeping a garden bird list since I moved to Corfe over twenty years ago and that list now runs to eighty-five species.

Every day I can expect to see the usual birds in the garden such as blue tits, robins, blackbirds and so on as well as the birds that fly around the village but seldom come into the garden, such as rooks, jackdaws and herring gulls. However, you never know what might turn up by chance as many birds move around a lot as the weather and seasons change. Over the years I have seen quite a few unusual species. Standing at the end of my back garden overlooking the meadows on a mid-summer evening I have occasionally been lucky and caught sight of a barn owl wafting across the field in search of mice and voles or of a nightjar hawking for moths.

It helps being on the south coast because Corfe Castle is under the flight path of migrating birds as they make their way between breeding and wintering grounds. So, gazing up at the sky also brings rewards now and again such as seeing an osprey heading for the castle gap and on to Poole Harbour and beyond as it migrated north in spring one year. I guess that happens every year but it's a lucky chance if you happen to be looking at the right patch of sky at the right moment on the right day! I have even seen two Sandwich terns (an adult and a youngster) flying west together along the valley in late summer – probably having come from Poole Harbour and heading to Weymouth.

I have added several species to the garden list by listening after dark for birds that I seldom or never actually see but can recognise by their calls or songs - including tawny owls which I hear hooting regularly and nightjars churring in the summer. I have also occasionally heard wading birds that make distinctive calls when migrating at night – such as oystercatchers, whimbrel and spotted redshank.

It's not just the birds that fly over the village that add variety to the usual garden residents – sometimes odd visitors turn up in the garden too. Just last year I added three new species to the garden list when a yellowhammer, a

brambling and best of all a firecrest appeared (not all at the same time!) – and disappeared just as quickly. The firecrest is one of the smallest birds in Europe, being slightly smaller even than the wren. Feeding on spiders and other invertebrates, particularly on winter ivy flowers and other evergreens, the winter distribution of this species in Britain has spread rapidly since the early 1980s. Firecrests were first recorded breeding in Britain as recently as 1962, and since then breeding numbers have shot up too, probably linked to climate change - so a success story for this species at least.

It really is surprising how many species of bird can be seen without leaving the village. There is nothing unusual about my garden, just a good mix of border plants, shrubs and small trees, and some bird food. Rather, it's a case of the more you look the more you see.

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

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



The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

There are lots of competing voices calling for our interest and attention at the beginning of January.

Much is written about healthy lifestyles – what to eat (or not), how to exercise and so on. There are many suggestions for travels. Christmas is behind us, 2020 is well and truly under way.

At the same time the church calendar appears to have got a little stuck. We're in the Epiphany season which seems to be a repeat and continuation of Christmas – in particular we're still talking and singing about wise men, and bright lights shining and guiding them. Increasingly, in cathedrals and churches you will see the crib scene still in place until February 2nd.

This year, this particular January sees an historic change in the life of our nation. There is definitely a sense of moving on in this regard.

As always there will be a variety of responses to the things I have mentioned, which are themselves a mix of the routine and special events. For example, planning holidays in good time will be of great importance, and probably necessity, to some; others will prefer to leave such things until the last minute. Then, there will be those who long for such a break but for whom it will not be possible, and some who much prefer to stay at home. I don't need to rehearse the reactions to the changes in and out of national life.

What does Christian life and faith have to say in the midst of many such voices, thoughts and feelings? Human life can be both intensely rich fulfilling, and yet also for some people, and for many some of the time, incredibly demanding, daunting and over whelming.

The first chapter of St John's Gospel was heard a lot at services over Christmas. The Gospel writer expresses the meaning of Jesus' birth and life in a different way to Matthew and Luke, who do so by telling us about the visits of shepherds and wise men from the east. In John's Gospel we hear of God's Word made flesh and living among us, and being full of grace and truth.

The search for truth is constant and vital. This is immediately obvious in some walks of life – medicine and engineering come to mind. We need the appropriate treatment if we are unwell. If we are constructing a bridge, we need to have the correct measurements and calculations. This is no less true in our lives, both together and individually.

So, human life is demanding, a lot is asked of us. We believe when we are open to God he not only leads us into truth but fills our lives with his grace. This is God's generous self-giving love, which we do not have to earn. We

discover this gift in so many ways – in the life of the church, with all its faults, bit no less so throughout god's creation.

2020 is now well under way. May we indeed know God's grace and truth made known to us in Jesus.

Dorset Council launches 'Call for Ideas' to help tackle Climate Emergency

Dorset Council are looking for members of the public to submit ideas on how the Council might be able to help tackle climate and ecology concerns. Since declaring a <u>Climate and Ecological Emergency</u>, Councillors and officers have been working hard behind the scenes to develop ideas for a <u>climate change</u> strategy and action plan.

They are now calling on all Dorset residents to <u>submit their ideas</u> for how they think Dorset Council can reduce carbon emissions and protect the county's plants and wildlife.

This <u>Call for Ideas</u> is open to everybody, and each submission will be reviewed by the Council's Task and Finish groups.

The areas that are being looked at are split into five themes: –

- Buildings
- Natural Environment
- Waste and Energy
- o Transport
- o Leadership and Influence

Dorset residents are being asked to submit their ideas under one or more of these categories via an <u>online form</u>. There are also questions around barriers to action, benefits, priorities and funding that participants are being asked to answer.

Some people will be invited to present their ideas to the <u>Climate Change and Ecological Emergency Executive Advisory Panel</u> as part of the Council's forthcoming Climate and Ecological Inquiry Day, which will take place in February and be open to the public.

Every proposed policy and practical action submitted will be passed to the appropriate Task and Finish Group for investigation, each of which is made up of Dorset Council members and officers.

The <u>Call for Ideas</u> is now open until 28 February 2020, but if participants wish to have their submission considered for presentation to <u>the panel</u>, they should submit their idea before 16 January 2020. The results from the process will be published alongside Dorset Council's draft <u>climate change</u> strategy and action plan in Spring 2020, that will be open to public consultation. Winter's Wild Seas

Here at the Wild Seas Centre we love it in winter when the waves pound against the cliffs and carry in all kinds of strange objects to be deposited on the seashore. Some, such as the cuttlefish bones, have come from close to home. Cuttlefish die off after breeding in the summer months, leaving just their white, airy bones to float on the sea's surface. The rough weather brings them ashore in large numbers at this time of year. The size can range from a tiny 2cm long to the largest at over 20cm.

Among the cuttle bones have been a few logs and plastic litter items with goose barnacles attached. These have washed in from the Atlantic Ocean where the drifting larvae attach to floating objects and can grow in large clusters. With a flexible, worm-like stalk and a head covered in an arrangement of triangular white shell-plates, these other-worldly looking animals are often still alive when they strand. With stalks writhing and shell plates opening and closing to reveal feathery feeding arms, they create a bizarre sight on the beach. At Kimmeridge we have 'rescued' a few which are feeding happily in our aquarium.

Other ocean dwellers to arrive at Kimmeridge recently have been several Portuguese man o'war. These jellyfish-like animals have long, blue tentacles which pack a powerful sting, so DO NOT TOUCH! In the open ocean they prey on tiny fish and other creatures that accidentally swim into their curtain of tentacles and are a favourite food of turtles and Ocean Sunfish which are immune to their toxins.

One of the most exciting finds this January has been of two tropical sea beans. Called sea hearts, these large beans were found at Worbarrow Bay having been carried for thousands of miles in the Gulf Stream all the way across the Atlantic Ocean from the Caribbean or tropical America. These large seeds are designed to be dispersed by the sea over large distances and can survive, drifting in sea water for up to 17 years, still able to germinate and grow if they make landfall on a suitable beach.

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At the Wild Seas Centre we love to hear what you have found washed up on the beach. Dorset Digital Champion and cyber security expert releases new book to help protect you from crime

An essential guide to help people take steps to protect themselves from cyber and identity crime is released this month from the British Computer Society.

The guide has been co-written and edited by Andy Taylor, a volunteer Digital Champion with Dorset Council who also works full time as an independent information security adviser following a career in the Royal Navy.

Andy is based at Sherborne Library on a voluntary basis, providing free support and advice to anyone needing help with basic digital skills. He is one of 75 Digital Champions volunteering in Dorset libraries to help people with computers, tablets, phones and more. Most have gained experience from their professional careers.

As Andy explains in his new book, information security fraud has evolved more rapidly than any other crime with the onset of computers and the digital world. Says Andy, "We mitigate against crime and injury everyday by following set rules and best practice. As an analogy, we drive vehicles and take a lot of risk going from A to B but we follow the rules of the road to stay safe. We can't take the risks away, but we know where they are and take steps to avoid injury. The same applies to information security. Paying by debit card on a reputable website, carries a risk, but it is very small so we take it. The risks increase significantly though when connecting to an insecure Wi-Fi where the credentials are unclear."

Take steps to protect yourself against cyber and information crime

- Consider using Paypal, it is very secure https://www.paypal.com/uk/home
- Never put any financial information including banking or credit card details in an email, it is not secure.
- Be quick to install the latest versions (patches) in software. Criminals look for the weaknesses in the old versions to exploit.
- Always use websites with https:\\ the 's' actually stands for security and will generate a padlock, make sure it is not crossed out. If the website does not have the 's', do not shop there.

Protect your documents. Always shred all discarded documents that
contain personal information (including name and addresses) and
recycle using a trustworthy document destruction company. An
advantage that identity and cyber criminals have on their side is the time
to sift through and pull together information from everywhere.

Award For Signalling Scheme Enabling Trains

To Run On The National Railway Network To Wareham



An innovative signalling system – enabling trains to run from the Swanage Railway on the national railway network to Wareham – has won a national award for quality as well as the blend of

heritage and modern technology.

Dedicated Swanage Railway volunteers won the Abellio Signalling Award at the National Railway Heritage Awards in London with the competition celebrating its 40^{th} anniversary in the presence of Her Royal Highness, the Princess Royal.

The design, installation, testing and commissioning of the trail-blazing signalling system between Norden Gates level crossing and the main line Network Rail station at Wareham was a four-year project that took 3,000 hours of work by a dedicated team of Swanage Railway volunteers between 2011 and 2015.

A Swanage Railway volunteer for more than 20 years, Mike Walshaw from Swanage – a

retired electrical engineer with the Ministry of Defence Scientific Civil Service – led the signalling project linking the heritage railway with the national railway network.

Mike said: "I was absolutely thrilled, especially to be given the award by Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal. The award is important because it recognises the key role of a properly signalled link with the national railway network, enabling us to operate services to Purbeck from Wareham and beyond.

"The biggest challenge of the project was meeting the very demanding standards imposed on us by Network Rail for operating in part on an electrified main line into Wareham station," he added.

When trains run from the Swanage Railway on to the national railway network at Worgret Junction – or vice versa – they are signalled by the Corfe Castle

station signal box which liaises with the Network Rail signalling centre at Basingstoke in Hampshire.

Swanage Railway signalling engineers installed Edwardian key-token signalling equipment at Wareham station, in Corfe Castle signal box as well as in a new signal box built at Norden Gates level crossing, west of Norden station.

Built in the style of the Victorian signal box at Lyme Regis station in west Dorset, Norden Gates signal box handles trains on the four miles of restored line between Norden station and Worgret Junction, a mile west of Wareham station.

In their report, one of the award judges wrote: "Here is an entry which stands out because it brilliantly combines the traditional with the most modern. The


Swanage Railway deserves rich praise for keeping heritage alive in this way, a notable achievement which has been accomplished with dedication and finesse."

"The scheme also provides huge and lasting benefits going forward to the railway and the local communities through the facility for through running from Wareham. All concerned can be justifiably proud of what has been achieved and has been well worth all the hard work that has been involved," added the judge.

It is hoped to have a formal unveiling ceremony for the Abellio Signalling Award plaque on the Swanage Railway in the Spring of 2020. The award ceremony took place at the Merchant Taylors' Hall, in the City of London, on Wednesday, 4 December, 2019.

The National Railway Heritage Awards is an independent charitable trust while the signalling award sponsor Abellio is a leading national provider of train and bus services.

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Messy Gardening to Help the Environment

2019 will stick in the memory as the year when Climate emergency and ecological crisis became mainstream. In Corfe, as well as in other Parishes of Purbeck, people are coming together to work out how to respond collectively to this massive challenge.


Responding to these two hugely way of life changing catastrophes (more extreme weather, less varied nature) requires us to act, even when our knowledge and data is imperfect.

Whilst Corfe Castle Parish Council and National Trust are looking at some big plans across Purbeck, every one of us can play our part in reducing the impact of climate change. This will enable nature to adapt to a warmer, more extreme, climate.

Here's some immediate things to do in your garden to make a difference now, with some ideas of how we can together work together more ambitiously.

- 1. **Make your garden messier!** Neat and tidy isn't as good for nature as a garden that's rougher and wilder around the edges leaves plenty of places for birds and small mammals to enjoy.
- 2. **Get some water in.** Even the smallest regular source of water is valuable for animals to find in droughts, and the insects emerge provide food for bats and birds.
- 3. Plant a tree. Preferably native and with berries! Hawthorn is a great (albeit prickly) small tree to have in your garden with blossom in May (although that is becoming more like April now) and berries in the autumn.
- 4. **Boost the amount of nectar available for pollinating insects**. Plant bee friendly flowers (look for the symbol).
- 5. **Something more ambitious for the future**. Would you be interested in helping some of Corfe's rarest plants? Plant chamomile and small scabious from seed at home... We'll be trying to get this to happen on a larger scale this year.

The above may seem insignificant, but the twin challenges of climate and ecological emergencies require local as well as global action to make a difference and we all have a role to play. Please also come along to Corfe Castle's knvironmental group meetings bn the third Thursday bf kvery1 month!
