#### **CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL**

#### FEBRUARY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Cllr Fooks spoke on behalf of a member of the public who was unable to attend the meeting. The Parishioner requested fisheye mirrors be installed at the exit of Little East common and at a private exit onto East Street, near to The Pound. The Council responded, advising that Dorset Council do not support the installation of fisheye mirrors on the highway. The Council will make enquiries with Highways to see if anything can be done to improve the visibility.

Following an incident of horses escaping from the common, James Gould of the National Trust asked if the gates to the common had been fixed adequately to secure the horses? Cllr Fooks advised a spring had been fitted but that it was not effective and doesn't always work. She asked that all the gates that exit onto a highway be looked at and that adequate fittings are in place. The Trust have installed an **electric car charging point** at Castle View which will soon be ready to use. They have yet to agree on what terms it will be available and what charges, if any, will be made.

The Council's **Parking and Traffic Study** has been referred to Dorset Highways to comment on the feasibility of recommendations and having received their feedback the PC will begin to consult stakeholders.

The Clerk had contacted the tree team at Dorset Council to ask what the process is for determining a decision on a **treeworks application**. Does the officer visit the site? The Council had received no response to date. The Council would like to request change to Dorset Council's tree policies and this is a project to work on.

The Clerk had contacted the Saturn Trust, the school and the Governing body to see if they were willing to hold a meeting for parents; giving parents an opportunity to raise any concerns they may have. The Saturn Trust have responded to say that they have put various measures in place to improve communications between the school, the Trust and parents.

At the request of a parishioner the PC are researching a **permissive footpath from Woodyhyde Campsite** to the village and they are currently liaising with landowners to see if they are willing to grant permission for a path. The Council were asked to investigate the restoration of **finger posts** in the Parish. The Clerk has identified two finger posts in need of repair, one in Kingston and one on the Rempstone Road. The council are able to get

grant funding for a proportion of the work but a resolution was required for expenditure to meet the balance. Before coming to a decision, the Council wish to know who owns the finger posts.

Following the recent consultation on the **Middle Halves Play Area**, Cllr Fooks presented a provisional plan for play apparatus. The plan covers a lot of the requests on the 'wish list' generated in the consultation. The suggested scheme is designed by the same manufacturer who created the 'train' at Norden and will occupy the space where the adults fitness equipment currently resides, all the other current play equipment will remain. Some members raised concerns that there may be objections to the removal of the fitness equipment. Cllr Fooks responded that she had only received one response that requested the retention of the fitness equipment. The scheme will be presented to the village at the Annual Parish Meeting on the 23rd of March and this will be a great opportunity to get comments and feedback. Please come along and let us know what you think.

The resident's car park in West Street is in urgent need of repair. The Clerk had sought quotes to improve the surface but had not received enough information on which to base a recommendation to the Council. The three quotes varied immensely as did the schedule of works. The item was deferred to the March meeting.

The Council is meeting representatives from Dorset Council to discuss **Speed Indicator Devices.** Whilst the village is currently served by a SID provided by Dorset Council (at Castle View) this arrangement is soon likely to cease. Dorset Council propose that like other parishes, the Parish Council purchase their own unit, at a cost of around £2500, which will reside permanently in the village and be moved periodically around two sites every six weeks. Cllr N Dragon had several queries; who would move the SID and how much would highways charge to do so if the Council were unable to find volunteers. He is also interested to know about the siting of a proposed SID and will ask where the Council would be permitted to position a unit. **The Council will present their findings at the Annual Parish Meeting** and seek views from the Parish; **do you want to see a permanent Speed Indicator Device in the village?** 

#### **CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL**

A village resident has offered £2000 towards village projects. The Council has had two proposals for this offer: new equipment for the playground and blood pressure monitoring equipment for the surgery. There is still time for other proposals and at the March meeting we will then forward the ideas to the donor for their decision.

**Cllr Parish raised concerns about the condition of the B3351** and hazardous ice on the road. There are two issues to address: firstly, the cause of water on the road; the drainage needs to be considered and secondly how is an emergency response initiated when there is a present hazard. Cllr Spicer Short had suggested recruiting the services of a group, 'Communities Prepared' who may be able to assist with the logistics of arranging an emergency response to highways matters.

**On planning matters** the Council had no objection to the removal of disused barn/sheds, repair of dilapidated structure and construction of replacement store/workshop at Glebe House, Bucknowle. To install an LPG fuel tank with concrete base, associated pipework & screening, internal alterations including lifting existing floor, erect fire lining & replace 2 doors at Scotland Farm. To roof alterations and loft conversion to include insertion of dormer window to south side elevation at Tom's Mead, Corfe Castle. To Install a balanced flue for new boiler through existing roof at 4 East Street, Corfe Castle and to a variation of condition 3 (Approved Plans) of planning permission 6/2018/0567 (Installation of a new Power Generation Plant) to revise the design of the plant to be more operationally efficient and allow maintenance access at Wytch Farm Gathering Station. The Council deferred commenting on an application to extend existing garage and erect an outbuilding at 3 The Lane, Kingston and have delegated decision making to the planning working group.

The next meeting will be held on the  $9^{th}$  March 2020 at 7pm in Corfe Castle Town Hall.

2019 will stick in the memory as the year when Climate emergency and ecological crisis became mainstream. In Corfe, as well as in other Parishes of Purbeck, people are coming together to work out how to respond collectively to this massive challenge.

Responding to these two hugely way of life changing catastrophes (more extreme weather, less varied nature) requires us to act, even when our knowledge and data is imperfect.

Whilst Corfe Castle Parish Council and the National Trust are looking at some big plans across Purbeck, every one of us can play our part in reducing the impact of climate change. This will enable nature to adapt to a warmer, more extreme, climate.

Here's some immediate things to do in your garden to make a difference now, with some ideas of how we can together work together more ambitiously.

- 1. **Make your garden messier!** Neat and tidy isn't as good for nature as a garden that's rougher and wilder around the edges leaves plenty of places for birds and small mammals to enjoy.
- 2. Get some water in. Even the smallest regular source of water is valuable for animals to find in droughts, and the insects emerge provide food for bats and birds.
- 3. **Plant a tree.** Preferably native and with berries! Hawthorn is a great (albeit prickly) small tree to have in your garden with blossom in May (although that is becoming more like April now) and berries in the autumn.
- 4. **Boost the amount of nectar available for pollinating insects**. Plant bee friendly flowers (look for the symbol).
- 5. **Something more ambitious for the future**. Would you be interested in helping some of Corfe's rarest plants? Plant chamomile and small scabious from seed at home... We'll be trying to get this to happen on a larger scale this year.

The above may seem insignificant, but the twin challenges of climate and ecological emergencies require local as well as global action to make a difference and we all have a role to play. Please also come along to Corfe Castle'sNnvironmentalNroupNneetingsNnNheNhirdNhursdayNfNveryN month!

#### NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

The February meeting of the Parish Council was in the Reading Room at Church Knowle, the wood burner blazing well and providing a cosy atmosphere for the five Councillors and a Parishioner who braved the elements; not forgetting the Clerk, of course. Cllr Higgens was in the Chair for the first part of the meeting, which included declarations of interest (of which there were none), public discussion (of which there was none) and apologies for non-attendance (of which there were two), and on his resignation Cllr Parker was duly elected for continuation. It was decided that there would be no Vice-chairman on this occasion and the meeting continued with the confirmation of the Minutes for the January meeting. The only matter arising from the Minutes was news of the late Cllr Mike Lovell's funeral and that whilst none of the Parish Councillors were able to attend, the Parish Council was represented by a retired Purbeck District councillor.

Being that this was a "mini-meeting", which deals mainly with planning and financial matters, it was decided to postpone several matters, including a discussion of the way ahead for the replacement of the badly damaged fingerposts at East Creech and Barnston Cross until the March meeting. There were no new planning applications for discussion and the result of the recent application for work at Pine Trees Farm, which is outwith the Parish but close to the Parish boundary, was noted.

The planned adoption of the Church Knowle street lamp was discussed and the Clerk gave an update on progress and advised Members that it was hoped that adoption would be completed early in April. Adoption would mean that it would be Dorset Council who would be responsible for the maintenance of the unit and payment of the electricity bill thereby reducing costs to the Parish. Bearing in mind that the electricity company had considerably increased their charges to the Parish as a result of their closure of the current unmetered contract, the savings would not be inconsiderable.

The meeting was given an update from ClIr Parker regarding discussions with the Parochial Church Council and Salisbury Diocese about the access rights to the Parish Council cemetery through the churchyard. The Clerk advised Members that a request had been made to Lloyds Bank for the deeds, etc., of the cemetery to be brought out of secure storage by the bank so that they could be examined by the PCC and CKPC to enable further work to be done on the access issue.

The meeting went on to discuss the Corfe River environmental project and work carried out at Furlong Copse, etc., by Dorset Wildlife Trust (DWT). The issue of financial transparency in the management of the project by DWT came up again and it was decided to write to the Environment Agency to express CKPC's continuing concerns about how the project was being managed by the trust and also the snail's pace of the project and works ancillary to it. It was decided that the Council would send a Member or two to a meeting with Imerys, DWT and other "stakeholders" on 18<sup>th</sup> February to give further CKPC input.

The meeting then went on to discuss the future of maintenance of the playground and playing-field following the sad death of Cllr Bugler. The Council had invited quotes form three firms for a gardening contract and two had submitted quotes. They were examined in depth and, on the basis of best value, the gardening and grounds maintenance was awarded to a small local gardening business based nearby.

Next up came "Financial Matters". The accounts were in good order and bills were paid. It was decided to examine the electricity bill from SSE in greater depth as the Clerk had some concerns about it and payment would be deferred until both the Clerk and Council were satisfied. The parish precept was confirmed at £8,000.00p for the next financial year since there would be increased costs because of the need payment for gardening services. However, the Council decided to use funds in the bank account in a contingency manner to buffer the costs and keep the precept to as small an increase as could be afforded. The Council will have to re-visit this within the next two years since it only has a small amount of funds available for contingencies.

The Clerk confirmed his intention to retire as Clerk to the Council & Proper Officer at the end of the financial year. He would, however, carry on to ensure that everything would run smoothly after that date. There will be a recruitment advertisement appearing in the near future.

An update was given on the archive store which will shortly be painted. An electricity supply has been fitted and the Council will be looking around for shelving to hold all the records. Obviously, there will need to be an alteration to the insurance policy to cover the unit and, no doubt, this will also lead to increase costs.

And that was just about that for the February meeting. Cllr Parker closed the meeting and we all went home. The March meeting will be at Furzebrook village hall on 10th March at 7:30pm.

Friends of Corfe Castle Surgery is a registered charity which relies on a team of volunteer drivers to provide transport for surgery and hospital appointments for patients who need this form of assistance.





#### The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

Lent is upon us, when we remember the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, preparing himself for the mission that would culminate in him dying a terrible human death. No matter how much he might try to concentrate on the certainty of coming out the other side restored to life, he would not have been human if he had not viewed the prospect with dread.

And – make no mistake – although, mysteriously, he was also God, he was, through and through, human. He hurt just like we do, he was vulnerable to doubts and fears as are we all, and he was as prey to the inconveniences and discomforts of the flesh as the rest of humanity.

I'm sure you have heard it said: 'For evil to flourish, it only takes good men to do nothing'. Evil exists. You've only got to look at children in a playground or read about people's reaction to disaster: some want to help, while others want only to save their own skins or join in the orgy of violence. When we're children we respond to both good and evil impulses; whichever way we go as adults depends on a multitude of things such as our upbringing, to some extent the natural inclinations of our personalities, our intellect, and the nature of the opportunities open to us. But evil does *not* exist as inescapable wicked little demons prodding us with BBQ forks!

However, sometimes it *is* useful to 'personify' evil - to give it an identifiable face. It can help us to fight it. The Bible talks about evil like that, calling it 'The Devil', or sometimes Satan. Jesus went into the wilderness to be alone with his father God, to draw strength from him and make himself certain he could carry out his God-given task to the end; and that included his ability to

resist the many temptations that would inevitably come his way. Afterwards, he must have told his disciples the story that has come down to us in the scriptures. What follows in this letter is a light-hearted re-telling of this story - but from 'The Devil's' point of view!

'Well, there was I roaming to and fro upon the Earth when I saw that – that chip-off-the-old-block, that Son of He-who-cast-me-out-of-heaven – just wandering like a lamb to the slaughter in my cruel and merciless wilderness. Uninvited! *Unprotected!* What a gift!

I watched him for a while. I walked beside him. His mind was open and clear to me.

"Hello-a!" I said. "Well met!"

He grunted, and regretfully cast aside a dried-up blackberry.

"If you're really the Son of -ahem – God, command these stones to become loaves of bread. Go on! You know you can do it! Don't they look delicious ... white, crusty, soft in the middle ... you could even rustle up some butter. *Think* of it ..."

Wearily, he interrupted me.

"It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.""

I was affronted! I was only trying to help! I had forgotten God-Daddy's beastly books. But two could play at that game.

I took him to the so-called 'holy city'. I put him on the top pinnacle of the Temple, and I said to him in my best virtuous Daddy-God-fearing voice: "If you *are* the Son of God, throw yourself down, for it is written: 'He will command his angels concerning you' and 'on their hands they will bear you up so you will not dash your foot against a stone.'

He balanced on the point of the spire and looked down, down, down to where people scurried like ants about their business. He sighed, a deep sorrowful expelling of breath, then he turned his oh-so-compelling eyes upon me. "Again, it is written, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.""

And I - I - I felt ... ashamed ...

I shook myself and whipped him off that pinnacle with a crack like a whip. Huh! No one – but *no one* - gets the better of ME!

I tossed him in whirlwinds and rolled him in thunderclouds until I dropped him with a thud onto the top of the highest of Earth's mountains. He

landed in a snow drift. As he was climbing out, I revelled in my majestic mountain magnificence: deadly jagged peaks sharp against the ice-blue sky, the sting of tempest-driven snow against my cheeks, crevasses shadowy beneath solid-seeming snow-bridges waiting to enfold the unwary. But *oh! So* beautiful! I widened the horizon a little, so he could see all the Kingdoms of the whole world laid out in lavish and lovely detail before him.

"LOOK!" I said.

He turned his poor, pinched face, blue with cold, and gazed obediently.

I spoke seductively.

"All these I will give you if you fall down and worship me ..."

There was a moment of frozen silence, alive with expectation.

Then his eyes snapped searing flame and he turned his face to mine, blazing with fury as he roared at me in a voice that clenched my innards.

"Away with you Satan! For it is written, 'Worship the Lord your God and serve only Him!"

I recoiled. It was as if I had been struck by lightning.

 $And-and-I \ went \ \ldots$ 

The point is that if you fix your faith upon God and his Son Jesus Christ, nothing that evil does to you can ultimately harm you – the you that is the essential 'I AM' within, your true self, the self that is the living link between you and your Creator, the one and only true God.



#### Spring tides in Spring

March sees some of the lowest (and highest) tides of the year which makes it a great time for exploring rocky seashores. Parts of the seashore that are only very rarely uncovered will be exposed above the low tide, as will the creatures that live there. While Spring Tides occur every fortnight all year round, the March Spring Tides are influenced by the sun's equinox, with a larger than normal gravitational pull on the sea due to the sun and moon being over the equator. This results in the high tides reaching higher up the shore and the low tides receding lower down the shore than at other times of year.

While this is an exciting time to explore the rock pools and rocky areas of the beach, it is also the most vulnerable time for the wildlife that lives there. Many are gathering to breed, mating and laying eggs, with parents often sticking around to guard the eggs until they hatch. If these are disturbed it can result in a poor breeding season, with abandoned eggs or injured adults.

When rock pooling it is always important to follow the Seashore Code, but it is especially so at this time of year. This will keep not only the wildlife but yourselves safe and includes returning any rocks that have been moved back to their original position. Rocks left overturned can have a devastating impact on the wildlife that shelters beneath them. Animals must also be returned to their exact spot on the beach as many have territories that they defend and, of course, their eggs that they are guarding.

At the Wild Seas Centre we are happy to give you a free bookmark featuring the Seashore Code to take home with you. We can also give you information about the best dates for these exceptional low tides and for exploring the rock pools. The Centre is currently open on Wednesdays and Sundays from 12 until 4pm.



#### Where ospreys dare



Last month I mentioned seeing an osprey flying over my garden one spring. At first I thought it was a large gull because ospreys are mostly white below and dark above and have relatively long and narrow wings – so an easy mistake to make. Ospreys are one of our larger birds

of prey (1.7m wingspan) and they visit us in Dorset most often in Spring and Autumn as they migrate between their wintering quarters in Africa and breeding grounds which in Britain are mostly in Scotland. Ospreys are unique amongst our birds of prey in eating only fish. On migration they eat a lot of mullet which is why, apparently, they enjoy an old west-country name of mullet hawk.

Of the three that I have seen in Corfe over the years, one was in mid-March, one in mid-April and one in early August. Now is the time to see them on Spring migration, so keep an eye out for anything looking like a large gull flying purposefully - probably northwards – quite possibly being hassled by our local crows, jackdaws, herring gulls or even buzzards (some buzzards look very pale underneath too – so beware!)

Ospreys were once common throughout much of Britain but were driven to extinction in England by the mid-1800's by a combination of industrial scale egg collecting, trophy hunting and a general slaughter of all things with hooked beaks and talons. They were virtually extinct in the whole of Britain by the early 1900s. After an absence of half a century they began to return to Scotland in the mid-1950s when one pair set up home at Loch Garten in Speyside. This pair was heavily protected by the RSPB but even so the early years of their return saw eggs being stolen and attempts to chop down their nesting tree. Some things had not changed, but the interest of the general public in them had, and like many thousands of others our family used to go on a regular pilgrimage to see them when on holiday in the late 1960s and 1970s.

By the late 1960s there was still less than 10 pairs in the UK, but since then ospreys have expanded their range and numbers. The strongholds are still the Highlands of Scotland but they have expanded naturally southwards as far as Cumbria and Northumberland. Since 2000, they have been given a helping hand to recolonise England. In 1996, young birds from Scotland were moved to Rutland Water and released, and they returned and bred again in England in 2003 – the first time for more than a century.

Closer to home, starting about 10 years ago, efforts began by the RSPB, Natural England, The Forestry Commission, The National Trust and private landowners to try and encourage the ospreys that visit Poole Harbour in Spring to stay and breed by putting up artificial nesting platforms. Although there was some interest in these platforms no birds stayed to breed so it was decided to try a translocation project. This project is being led by local charity 'Birds of Poole Harbour', Scottish charity the 'The Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation' and local Poole based-business 'Wildlife Windows'. Young birds have been reintroduced and released to Poole Harbour each year since 2017. Time will tell.

There are now more than 200 pairs of ospreys breeding in the UK, making this one of the great nature protection success stories of recent times. So, you may be seeing more ospreys around Corfe in years to come.
