SEPTEMBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Two members of the public attended the meeting which was held via zoom video link.

Due to health and safety reports and a possible second Covid-19 outbreak Cllr Brooks advised that the Chief Executive for Dorset Council has taken the decision **that staff will not return to full Council** offices until March at the earliest. Cllr Brooks has been working with the Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) to address the needs of people who have come across significant hardship and are in need of benefits or grants. She asked that if there is anyone in our area in need of help to signpost them her way.

Since the last Parish Council meeting there has been a full Dorset Council meeting at which there was a change in cabinet. Portfolio holders were changed and lead members were appointed to portfolio holders to support them with their work. Cllr Brooks is now the lead member for Highways.

Cllr Brooks had organised a 'walk about' in the village with representatives of the Parish Council and Dorset Council's Director of Place John Sellgren. This provided an opportunity for the Council to discuss their aspirations for Corfe. One long running project, **the Norden to Corfe footpath and cycle way** was discussed. Cllr Brooks assured the Council this was being progressed and they hoped to have more news soon. The Council had received two reports of inconsiderate parking in West Street that had blocked the road. These were discussed with the neighbourhood highways officer on a separate visit and the Clerk will feed back the parishioners.

James Gould reported that the National Trust's 45-day period of consultation following the announcement of a proposed scheme of cost savings and redundancies has come to an end. The next step was for senior management to have a further 2 week period to discuss the feedback and create what they call a "Mapping Process". James is not currently in a position to offer any information about the redundancies and their impact on Corfe, however he will update the Council at their October meeting.

The Council previously discussed the difficulty in obtaining information about **premises licences** and the fact that whilst Dorset Council do publish licencing information online, at present they do not do so for Purbeck. Having requested licensing information for each premises from Dorset Council the Council were

informed they could apply for information on a single premises, as can any member of the public. Dorset Council also reiterated that their intention is for all licence conditions to eventually be available online however, due to Covid 19, delays had proved this to not be possible to date.

The Parish Council is still making progress with the plans for a permissive footpath from Woodyhyde. All permissions are in place and a meeting is planned with Dorset Council to provide signage.

The external audit carried out by PKF Littlejohn of the Parish Council 2019 / 2020 accounts has been concluded and the Council has received the Notice of Conclusion of Audit which can be seen in full on the Parish Council website.

The resurfacing of the Parish Council residents' car park has now received approval for works to go ahead and the works will shortly be undertaken. The Council resolved that following works to relevel the surface, a planter will be positioned in the entrance to the car park that is adjacent to the toilets. This will prevent through traffic and (hopefully) preserve the surface of the resident's car park. When the planter is installed car access to the car park and disabled parking spaces can be made through the tarmac road to the doctor's surgery. The Clerk will be contacting residents with regard to accessing the car park so works can go ahead.

The playground working group have been asked to progress the project to install new equipment in the middle halves play area.

On planning matters the Council is minded to make no objection subject to a number of conditions on the lateral extension to **Swanworth Quarry**. The Council debated the application at length and voted 6-3 on the no objection approach.

The Council suggested several points on which they would seek mitigation should they proceed to submit no objection; these focused mainly on the impact of lorry movements and on the environmental impact of the application. They will revisit the application at the next meeting.

The Council deferred making decision to erect a garage and summer house on number 1 East Street until the October meeting.

The Council had no objections to a development of a single storey extension at the rear of Sunnymount, Higher Filbank. The Council also had no objection to

the installations of rooflights to dwelling and extension of outbuilding to create a carport at Puddledock Cottage, Scotland Heath.

The Council previously submitted a number of conditions they wished to see met regarding the retrospective application for a boxing gym on land to the rear of 83-87 East Street. The Clerk was asked to write to Dorset Council and confirm that the Council objected to the application subject to a revised number of conditions being met. These can be viewed in the full minutes.

The next meeting will be held on the **12th October 2020** at 7pm via Zoom. The Pubic are welcome to attend and participate in the public half hour at the start of the meeting. Details will be posted on the website by Tuesday the 6th of October. For further information please contact the Clerk Michelle Harrington, e-mail CorfeCastlePC@aol.com – 34 Egmont Road, Poole Dorset BH16 5BZ, please note there is no land line number available for 1 week as the new Clerk has started and is waiting for a phone line to be installed. Purbeck Seed Collecting Challenge

Purbeck needs more trees. Not everywhere - where would the non-tree loving species go? And not always planted - allowing woodland to regenerate naturally creates a richer woodland. But the right species in the right place are perfect for storing carbon and providing more homes for nature.

Even though we're social distancing and wearing masks – there is something you can do right now, within your bubble, to help get more trees in Purbeck. Collect seeds for <u>free</u> trees. For some species it's easy and for others, there's no getting round it, it's tough. But everyone loves a challenge, right? Because let's face it, this year has been such an easy ride...

Beginner Treesmaid: collect ten acorns from one of the many old woods scattered across the Isle. Acorns come from oaks. Ideally go for acorns from the big old trees (if it takes more than two of you to form a chain around the trunk, it's old). Plant each of them in a pot with a bit of soil (a yogurt pot with a hole in the bottom will do nicely). Watch them germinate, then plant them out next October. You could also collect other nuts: hazel, sweet chestnut and beech.

Too easy?

Budding Woodsman: Get some of the small berries of the hawthorn, blackthorn (trying not to get lacerated too badly in the process) and rowan. Mash them up to remove the flesh. Stick them in compost/soil outside and hopefully some will germinate in the spring. Watch Monty show you how: https://www.gardenersworld.com/how-to/grow-plants/how-to-grow-hawthorn-from-seed/

Still not enough of a challenge?


Artisan Forester: Go find some of the rarer native species, stratify the seed (google it), and **bring on** to demonstrate that you are the future of trees in Purbeck. Hornbeam, small leaved lime, silver birch, aspen, field maple are good species to aim for. Not easy to find, but that's what will make you an artisan

Top tips:-

Not all seeds will germinate – think of all the seeds/nuts and berries you see vs how few young trees are around. So in order to get 10 new trees you may need to plant 30 seeds.

The Dorset's Heathland Heart team have been working with land managers to provide funding and support for targeted habitat management works across a variety of sites, to enhance their suitability for some of our heathland's rarest species.



A wetland site on Hartland Moor National Nature Reserve (NNR) in Purbeck was identified as having potential to be restored as suitable habitat for the scarce Southern Damselfly.

Nearby similar habitat supports a good size population of this otherwise vulnerable creature. It is hoped that the creation of this new sites will provide the damselfly's the opportunity to expand its range, population size and stability.

The identified area crucially remains wet all year round with slow-running water and boasts lush vegetation, ideal for the Southern Damselfly

which is a weak flyer and needs this environment to breed successfully. However, a significant amount of Alder trees had encroached onto the site

causing it to become enclosed, shaded, and dryer, thereby reducing the wetland environment. The trees also made the area difficult for grazing animals to access, limiting the benefits which large herbivores provide in maintaining more open habitats. Hartland Moor is an excellent example of Dorset's heathland landscape and is cared for by the National Trust as part of their Purbeck estate.

It is also a key element of the recently designated Purbeck Heaths NNR which sees local landowners forming a significant partnership to work collectively towards conservation goals.

The wetland restoration works here involved clearing some of the over-crowded Alder trees, which were felled during the winter season. The felled Alder was initially left on site as removing it over the winter could have caused too much disturbance to the ground especially as In addition, some of the timber was used to construct small dams to further slow-down

the flow of water in the deeper channels and create shallow pools in the more open areas.

The remaining timber extraction was planned for the drier summer conditions and a local specialist contracted to complete the works. Dorset Horse Logging, which is based in Corfe Castle, specialise in felling and low impact timber extraction using heavy horses, negating the need for any disruptive machinery. This is especially useful on sensitive

sites, in areas of soft or wet ground, or those which are hard to reach by vehicle. Toby Hoad who owns and runs the business is a local resident and is

well connected with local conservation organisations. He has worked for many years as a woodsman and greenwood-worker producing sustainable woodland products from firewood and charcoal, to hand-crafted furniture.

We went to see Toby in action at the site in July. He was working with one of

his four working horses Celine. Celine is a special breed of horse called a Comtois, which is a draft horse originating from the Jura Mountains on the border between France and Switzerland

Celine is a very impressive and strong animal; she was impeccably behaved responding to Toby's commands and moving heavy timber with ease. Despite the heavy work she was very

relaxed and enjoyed making the most of the lush vegetation around her, having a good graze between hauling loads.

Toby and Celine made a great team working together to get all the cut timber out of the wet site and onto dry ground. Negotiating a route around numerous trees, ditches and banks which all remain intact thanks to this low-impact extraction method. Toby will then process the timber and sell

it onto the local community as sustainable firewood.

Southern Damselfly may be

the target beneficiary from habitat restoration here but the works will benefit a wider community of species, and the wetland sites provide an important feature within the wider heathland habitat and landscape beyond.

The summer, with some of our freedoms restored including more travel and social interaction, was wonderful for many of us after the long months of missing our friends and families so it's very disappointing that with the Covid-19 numbers rapidly rising nationally we are facing new restrictions -including the 'Rule of Six' and strict quarantine rules- as we go into the winter. These will profoundly affect us all for some time to come. We hope everyone in this remarkable and friendly village will keep an eye open for anybody who is struggling in any way. If you yourself need help please don't hesitate to ask. It won't always be like this.

On the subject of getting in touch, the members of the Patient Participation Group are having a meeting in early October. We would like to hear from you if you have any ideas on how we the PPG could better support you and the surgery at this extraordinary time or if you have any comments on your experiences as patients. For example, how have you found the increased use of remote than face-to-face consultations? It is important to get your feedback please. Looking forward, the PPG would also welcome your thoughts on what we might do this coming year, despite the current limitations on gatherings, and especially for our younger and older people (who may either want our help or want to help others). And how can we encourage more of us to take exercise?

More widely, NHS Dorset has been reviewing the way we were looked after by our GPs before the epidemic against the largely remote GP services (i.e phone consultations, video calls and e-consult) it put in place at the beginning of the Covid 19 emergency. It is beginning to consider in the light of its review what permanent changes it would like to make to the way we are looked after in the future. As part of this it has been holding some focus groups and doing some 'snapshot' (small- scale, very short response time) surveys to get the views of doctors and patients on remote versus face-to-face GP consultations and paediatric support. A few of us had the opportunity to take part. There are potentially big implications for all of us here in the village where we have in normal times been very appreciative of the access to Dr

Lepper and his team with mostly face-to-face appointments and the sit-andwait clinics.

One survey still open is being run by Dorset's Integrated Community care project. If you are over 16 and would like to contribute your opinions about your experience of the mental health services in the community and how you feel people could be enabled to improve their mental health and wellbeing you can email communications @dorsetccg.nhs.uk or request a paper version of the survey by calling 01202 541588. The closing date is October 9th.

If you have any visual or hearing impairment and have faced any issues during the pandemic there is still just time for you to respond to a survey being led by Citizens Advice It closes on October 4th! The link is https://wh1.snapsurveys.com/s.asp?k=159784834612.

Finally, as requested by NHS Dorset, we are happy to support the NHS, the GPs and hospitals by encouraging all of us firstly to have the flu jab if eligible and secondly to attend any rescheduled hospital appointments we are given. We will all want to play our part this year when the NHS is under so much extra pressure and this is a way we can help. Many thanks.

I am writing in September at a time when we are wondering if there will be further changes in guidelines and requirements to cope with the pandemic.

DORSET DREAM BECOMES REALITY FOR UK'S PIONEERING CONSERVATION CHARITY

The long cherished Dorset Dream of pioneering conservation farmer Robin Page has become reality as the Countryside Restoration Trust completed the most significant purchase in its 30

year history of wildlife friendly farming.

Bere Marsh Farm on the banks of the idyllic River Stour at Shillingstone, near Blandford Forum, Dorset, is set to become the Trust's national showcase for its holistic fusion of sustainable, traditional farming methods, habitat restoration and a dedicated education programme focused around the importance of food provenance.

Furthermore, its idyllic 92 acres of wetland, grassland and woodland, rich in butterflies, birds, wildflowers and rare mammals makes it the perfect setting to commemorate the Trust's co-founder and Dorset conservation icon, artist Gordon Beningfield.

'It is the perfect place for us where we can bring together everything we believe in whilst remembering Gordon and his devotion to the countryside. It represents our vision and why he and I decided to found the Trust all those years ago.

We've got a lot of work ahead of us to shape it into the showcase for our work and our vision but it's a challenge we have long wanted,' said Robin Page, Executive Chairman of the Countryside Restoration Trust.

The cornerstone of the CRT's philosophy is that both traditional and innovative farming methods can be made to work profitably and sustainably together in conjunction with the protection and restoration of wildlife habitats and precious eco-systems.

In all, it has 15 properties throughout the UK ranging from dairy and arable farms to sheep, rare breeds and woodland centres. Running in harmony with these sites is the curriculum based MOSAIC education programme for children at a network of nearby primary schools highlighting where food comes from, the value of its sustainable production alongside wild flora and fauna and how they can play their part in connecting with Nature and the wild world.

All these key elements of the CRT's programme will be brought together at Bere Marsh Farm under the supervision and direction of Estate Manager, Elaine Spencer White, an agricultural consultant and specialist marketeer who is also a Trustee of the CRT.

'Bere Marsh has everything we want and need to make it the exemplar farm of our estate. The setting is magnificent, the farmstead and land perfect but above all else it has a trailway, footpaths, car parks and a bridleway all running through it – in short, lots and lots of visitors walking by. You could not ask for more in terms of footfall and site awareness.'

Robin Page agrees. 'Our long term intention is to turn the farm into an education and visitor centre – to re-attach visitors, as well as ourselves, to the land, to our native wildlife and where our food comes from. This will be where we demonstrate everything that he Trust stands for.'

To this end the intention is to introduce a small herd of milking cows, free range hens, a small flock of sheep, an orchard and a nursery. It is even hoped to produce bread at the farm from wheat grown in the fields of other CRT farms as well as beer and cider from CRT barley and apples.

Existing barns and outbuildings will be specially converted to create the education centre alongside a dedicated art gallery devoted to the wildlife artwork of Gordon Beningfield.

'It is a highly ambitious plan but it will be where the Countryside Restoration Trust puts itself on the map and finally makes our Dorset Dream come true,' says Robin Page.



The fence around the castle was erected in 1885 by Job Smith, a mason. He was paid £162.13s 6d for the work; the collectors hut and store were built at the same time.

My great great grandfather Henry Burgess was the first warden of the castle, a job he did for many years. In 1885 the Bankes records show he sold guide books at 3d each, and the receipts for admission to the castle amounted to £75.11s 9d for six months, his own wage for the same time was£17.9s 0d. This was featured in the village pump CVN June 2014.

Dorset Residents Urged to reach out for support

Dorset Council and Dorset Citizens Advice have launched a new campaign encouraging residents financially affected by the COVID-19 pandemic to

seek support before things become more difficult.

With nearly 50,000 people in the Dorset Council area furloughed during the crisis and potentially 15,000 unable to return to work due to redundancy or business closure, the <u>Reaching Out</u> campaign signposts to the wide range of support and advice available.

Review of The Highway Code to improve road safety for cyclists, pedestrians and horse riders – Department for Transport

This consultation is seeking views on proposed changes to The Highway Code to improve safety for vulnerable road users, particularly the groups of:

- cyclists
- pedestrians
- horse riders

The main alterations to the code being proposed are:

- introducing a hierarchy of road users which ensures that those road users who can do the greatest harm have the greatest responsibility to reduce the danger or threat they may pose to others
- clarifying existing rules on pedestrian priority on pavements, to advise that drivers and riders should give way to pedestrians crossing or waiting to cross the road,
- providing guidance on cyclist priority at junctions to advise drivers to give priority to cyclists at junctions when travelling straight ahead
- establishing guidance on safe passing distances and speeds when overtaking cyclists and horse riders

This consultation closes on 27 October 2020.

A PURBECK WOMAN BEHEADED

The Civil War of 1642 left behind it a legacy of hatred and bitterness. Although in Dorset there were no major battles, practically every town was besieged and often wrecked. Perhaps even worse the animosity between families who had supported one side or another lingered on for fifty years. Old scores were paid off in a most vindictive manner. In the Monmouth Rebellion of 1685 some participants were still alive and many had close relations on opposing sides. A descendant of one well known family perished on the block after one of the most unfair trials in British legal history.

William Bond, the squire of Blackmanston, a hamlet between Church Knowle and Kimmeridge, took no part in the War. He was a cousin of Dennis Bond, MP for Dorchester, who was a member of Oliver Cromwell's inner cabinet and a rabid parliamentarian. He favoured the execution of Charles 1. Bond's daughter Edith married another Cromwellian adherent, Sir William Beckonshaw who lived at Moyles Court near Fordingbridge. Their daughter Alice born in 1618 spent much of her girlhood in Purbeck with her grandparents but married a prominent lawyer, John Lisle. This clever jurist was knighted by Cromwell and was one of the Judges who condemned the King to death. He was rewarded with a peerage but his well known harshness towards Royalist prisoners ensured a dreadful death for his wife. Amongst these was Colonel Penruddock, a nearby Squire who headed the 1655 abortive rising. In 1660 Lisle fled to the continent and was assassinated by a gang of Irish cut-throats a few years later.

His widow lived on undisturbed at Moyles Court for the next 20 years and although it was known that she favoured the local Presbyterians she was left in peace. Then in 1685 after the Monmouth Rebellion the peace of the West Country was shattered and fugitives from the Battle of Sedgemoor were hunted like dogs. Once condemned their hands and limbs were displayed in every town and village in Dorset. (Here in Corfe we have descendants of a young lawyer, Christopher Battiscombe who was hung in chains at Lyme Regis). Over a thousand men were condemned to death and as many transported to the colonies. Only one woman suffered.

The architect of this horror was George Lord Jeffreys, a career Judge who had already risen to fame by the persecution of witnesses, juries and defendants alike. A contemporary writer says 'His behaviour was beyond anything heard of in a civilized country. He was either drunk or in a rage, but mighty witty upon the prisoners at the Bar'. He was given a Royal mandate by James II to strike terror into those who had participated in the rebellion.

After the destruction of Monmouth's army, two fugitives came to Moyles Court. They were John Hicks, a Presbyterian Minister and Richard Nelthorpe, a well known trouble maker. Dame Alice did not realise they had taken part in the rebellion, but when she did, concealed them in an outhouse but sent to the Magistrates presumably giving them time to escape. However the local J.P. Colonel Penruddock arrived with a posse at dawn and captured the two men. They, and Dame Alice were sent in chains to Winchester Gaol. Hers was the first case in the so-called 'Bloody Assizes'. It was obvious from the start that Judge Jeffreys was determined to bring about her death regardless of any relevant facts. Dame Alice deposed that she had never supported Monmouth and in fact her son had fought against him. Quite wrongly Jeffreys referred to the fact that her late husband had been implicated in the death sentence passed on Charles 1. In summing up he said to the Jury, "If I had been one of you and she my mother, I would have judged her guilty".

Poor Dame Alice was sentenced to be hung, drawn and quartered. Influential friends had this cruel death changed to beheading, and so it was that this elderly heroine walked steadily to the scaffold in Winchester Market Place on 3rd September 1685 without a tremor saying, "I forgive all that have done me wrong". The remains of Dame Alice have lain in Ellingham Churchyard for over 300 years. William Bond's granddaughter suffered a vile death solely because of the rancour which arose from our last Civil War. In 1688 a re-trial was ordered by William III and the sentence was quashed. This can have given her little satisfaction.

A Rare Visitor

In early September we were alerted to a rare visitor to the Bay. Rose Ward (she and Pat are 'founts of all knowledge' where birds are concerned!) popped in while we were watering and told us that a rare *pectoral sandpiper* was on the beach and had been for 24 hours. What an excuse to stop the watering! We went down to admire this smart little bird which breeds in North America or Northeast Asia and migrates mainly to South America but is sometimes blown off course or stops here on the way from Siberia! About 50 a year are spotted in Great Britain and Ireland. The books say it usually feeds in freshwater habitats but this one seemed very happy picking over the seaweed near 'stink corner'! Thank you to Rose for telling us.

Kimmeridge Coastguard Rescue Team

We have remained active locally with a number of rescues carried out jointly with neighbouring teams including rescuing an injured person who had fallen in the rocks near Chapman's Pool and a walker who had fallen in the Army Ranges near Lulworth Cove. Seasons under the sea in Kimmeridge Bay.

Weather-wise this has been a good summer and that has been reflected beneath the water in Kimmeridge Bay. Early summer saw a boom in the population of sea hares. These shell-less sea snails grow larger than your average garden snail or slug, measuring up to 20cm long. They feed on seaweed and sometimes congregate on the shore and in rock pools in large numbers to mate and lay strings of eggs in a tangle on the seaweed.

Throughout the summer we recorded a variety of stalked jellyfish. These tiny relatives of drifting jellyfish attach via a stalk to seaweed, holding up their sticky tentacles to the water to catch tiny prey. They only grow to around 2cm or less so are harmless to humans. The presence of stalked jellyfish in Kimmeridge Bay is one of the reasons this special area was chosen as a Marine Conservation Zone, a type of marine reserve.

Now autumn is here the sea hares and stalked jellyfish have gone but there are still plenty of fish, prawns and crabs to be found in the rock pools and shallows. Blennies are probably the most commonly seen fish here and include the common blenny or shanny, Montagu's blenny and larger tompot blenny. I recently discovered that the old Dorset name for blenny is biddleknob. This fishy family can be distinguished from each other by their head-gear. The shanny has a bald head while the tompot blenny sports a pair of red, antler-like antennae on its head and the Montagu's blenny has a single, tiara-like headdress. Next time you're rock pooling at Kimmeridge, be sure to say hello to the Biddleknobs!

Art exhibition

This month the Wild Seas Centre is exhibiting the work of artist and Wild Seas Centre volunteer, Rosemary Edwards. The prints, inspired by the beauty of Kimmeridge Bay, are from her collection of 26 paintings created for the 2.6 Challenge, to raise funds for Dorset Wildlife Trust during what is a very difficult time for charities.
