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The cover picture is a sketch of Clavells Tower at Kimmeridge and St Aldhelms Chapel near to Worth Matravers. The sketch is by Joan Bracchi. The view of Clavells is as it was before the Landmark Trust rebuilt it and moved it away from the edge of the cliff. St Aldhelms chapel is a very old place of worship going back to the reign of King Henry III (1261 – 1272).

It may also have been used as a lookout tower. The new St Aldhelms Benefice, which combines the Valley and Hills parishes is named after St Aldhelm, who was a very early Bishop of Sherborne

JULY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

There was one member of the public present at the Council's third Zoom meeting. One of the first items of business was to consider the co-option of Sue Lansbury to fill one of the two vacancies on the council. Sue was duly coopted and she was welcomed to the Council. Sue moved to Corfe Castle in 2017, having lived in Langton Matravers for 20 years and prior to that, Swanage. She loves living and working here and welcomes the opportunity to play a more active role in supporting the local community

Cllr Brooks reported that Dorset Council are now meeting virtually and will be holding their first full Council meeting in September. Dorset Council services closed due to Coronavirus are resuming; leisure centres and swimming pools are opening and libraries are operating a click and collect service.

Dorset Council have removed the **finger post from Halves Cottages** so that it can be repaired and reinstated. The Clerk is still liaising with Dorset Council regarding the installation of a barrier at the entrance to the residents' car-park and the repair to the bollards outside of Gods Acre. The Clerk is continuing to liaise with the landowners regarding the permissive footpath from the village to Woodyhyde Campsite.

The Council were presented with a report which outlined the ongoing threat of coronavirus and they considered the many responses they had received to the recent consultation on how to enable social distancing around the village and in the Village Square. The responders were unanimously opposed to the removal of any parking in the square. Several individuals suggested fencing off the Jubilee Cross to discourage people sitting on it. The Town Trust had made it known they would not support this proposal and stressed that should Dorset Council do so they would need to take responsibility for any barriers and any damage to the cross. There was not support within the Council to take any further action regarding the cross. Several residents suggested notices directing people away from the Square. The Parish Council have as a result produced a new banner directing visitors to the middle halves and it was felt that polite notices were probably the most effective way of communicating with visitors. The Council will endeavour to install further signs as soon as possible prior to the summer holidays. Thank you to everyone who took the time to respond with thoughts and comments.

The Council are **working urgently to open the play area** and are aware that some people are climbing over the locked gates to use the apparatus. The Council had hoped to open the play area on the 4th of July. However following the Government announcement giving permission to open there was insufficient time to ensure the Council could do so as safely as possible. The Clerk is currently

working on implementing the recommended requirements; installing notices and assessing risks. The Council approved a proposal to **clean the play equipment twice each day through the summer holidays; wiping and sanitising touch points.** The motion was passed by a casting vote. Whilst the responsibility to sanitise children's hands before and after play must be with parents, those members in favour felt that **any action to reduce the possibility of infection was worthwhile.** Signage will be displayed advising that cleaning will be done, however people must take responsibility and sanitise. There will be additional signage noting recommended rules for safe use of the area.

A further recommendation in the paper on coronavirus was that the West Street toilets are given an additional clean each day throughout the summer holidays which should help minimise risk. This was approved by all Councillors.

Prior to the Coronavirus crisis the Parish Council had planned to consult the village at the Annual Parish Meeting regarding the removal of the exercise equipment and installing a new play scheme in its place. The Council have received correspondence from the Sports Trust enquiring if the **gym equipment could be relocated to an area near the Sports Pavilion.** The current apparatus is near the end of its life and the cost of moving could not be warranted, therefor new equipment would need to be purchased for this purpose. The Council resolved to revisit the discussion at a future meeting.

The Council had received a letter **expressing concerns about pubs reopening** and asking how possible it will be for the council to ensure that the pubs in Corfe Castle follow government guidelines on reopening. Dorset Council are the licencing authority and it is they who would be responsible for regulating licencing matters. The Parish Council can request a review of licences and will be looking at this at their next meeting in August.

The Council will apply for a Tree Charter Day pack from the Woodland Trust to participate in Tree Charter Day in November. They will be liaising with local landowners to look into possible sites which could be planted.

On planning matters the Council considered the **erection of an agricultural Barn** at Lynch Farmhouse, Kingston. The Council consider the proposed barn to be too big for the suggested purpose giving regard to the available farmland. They have asked the planning officers to consider this. The Council raised a number of points they would like the planning officer to consider regarding a **retrospective application to erect a community boxing gym** with associated access at the rear of 83-87 East Street, Corfe Castle. These included concerns regarding health and safety, parking and access, recognition of a footpath, the appearance of the building and a restriction on operational hours (should the permission be granted). The Council discussed a notification they had received for a Certificate of

Lawfulness to **landscape a small plot of land at the rear of 29 East Street**. Whilst not invited to comment the Council would like it recorded that if it were a planning application they would object ask for Purbeck stone cladding to a retaining wall. Full details of the Councils comments can be read in the minutes which will be published on the Parish Council website.

The next meeting will be held on the 10th August 2020 at 7pm via Zoom. The Pubic are welcome to attend and participate in the public half hour at the start of the meeting. Details will be posted on the website by Tuesday the 4th of August. For further information please contact the Clerk.

We would like to take the opportunity to thank you all for your continued patience and understanding at this unusual time. Please could we stress, however, that if you have a medical problem or concern call the Surgery as normal and try to refrain from email where possible. That being said; as the phone lines are busier than ever before; please could we ask that only urgent medical ailments be called in before 10:30? If you wish to have a consultation with a GP which is not urgent please call after this time and we will be happy to arrange an appointment (usually within the next 7 days). This system would help to relieve a lot of the current pressure on the phone lines, reception team and GP's.

We have a new Doctor starting with us in August for 4 months called Dr Luke McMaster. He is a trained doctor completing placements in hospital and community settings in preparation for his future career. He will be calling and assessing patients as a trained Doctor but all clinical decisions are approved by Dr Lepper.

Just a reminder that we will also be closed on Monday 31st August. Please ensure you have enough repeat medication for the long weekend and that we receive any request in good time in preparation for this closure.

During these times (and whenever the surgery is closed) you can call 111 for non-emergency requirements (please do not call them for repeat medication requests).

For any life-threatening requirements please call 999 and ask for the ambulance service.

We have welcomed our new dispenser Zoe to the surgery who has come to us from community Pharmacy so please be patient whilst we are busy getting Zoe trained.

A message from Tina; Thank you so much for the good wishes and for my lovely retirement present. The paddle board has already been in use several times. My time at Corfe Castle Surgery has been amazing, I have always enjoyed my nursing and hope to continue this for a while so may see some of you still! My time as a Practice Manager was also very rewarding and I will miss seeing everyone. It was such a shame that I couldn't celebrate my retirement because of COVID but as long as everyone keeps safe that is far more important to me. Many Thanks

This month has seen the lifting of some significant Lockdown restrictions which have happily enabled many of us to see our beloved families and friends again. As we know, however, it's also brought with it large numbers of visitors wanting to enjoy everything Purbeck has to offer but alas with the additional risk of bringing the Covid 19 virus with them. We must continue to be very careful, remembering especially those who have been shielding and may still need our help. The surgery team inevitably has to continue the new ways of working for the time being. They are very much there for us – but we miss seeing their friendly faces!

We are pleased to say that there are now two online ways of keeping up with news of the surgery and our PPG. One is to look at the Corfe Castle Surgery NHS Choices website where you will find regularly updated information about the surgery's services, staffing, reviews of its performance and ratings (including both the CQC inspection Report and the Annual GP Patient Satisfaction Survey results) and about the PPG. The other is to visit the PPG's new Facebook site. It's getting frequent visits each day (up to 60 followers already) and has new posts added on most days. Over the last few days it has included NHS notices, photos and posters by the surgery team, how to avoid ticks, advice on using antibiotics and a PPG update! You will find it mentions the formation of a Purbeck Youth PPG which will be open to all young people aged 13-18 across the six Purbeck GP practices. It's being led by Wareham surgery which will in due course be contacting all the students at the Purbeck School to encourage them to participate. Here in Corfe we have for some time been keen to have some input from our young people and have tried hard to identify a youngster or two to come forward and see how the surgery and PPG work, so with the strong encouragement of Dr Lepper we are gladly supporting this initiative. 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Studland's Dynamic Dunes

Studland Bay has a stunning coastline, we can all say that with a lot confidence. Walking along the beach, picking up shells, watching the gentle waves – it's idyllic. But what about what is behind the beach? Behind the wall of marram grass that fringes the shore? There lie, Studland's wild dunes. A playground of sandy hills and endless adventure. A land of constant change with bare ground, long grasses, pretty heathland, dense scrubland and scattered trees. A home for special and rare life. And a place that needs your help to survive.

Data from the Cyril Diver citizen science project in 2016, revealed that Studland is losing its dramatic mix of habitats. It showed species like Sand Lizard and Meadow Pipit shrinking in distribution, their numbers squeezed to the dune edges. Climate change, air pollution, reductions in land use and overprotective management are all causes of our dynamic dunes turning static. Now Studland's mosaic landscape is slowly being smothered by gorse and trees. Open sandy habitats are being buried and rare life pushed out.

Dynamic Dunescapes is a nationwide project that aims to bring life back to the dunes of England and Wales. At Studland, four routes will be taken to restore the land:

- 1. Bare ground creation using excavators
- 2. Reintroduction of cattle grazing
- 3. Removal of invasive carp from Little Sea

4. People - What better way to open the land, limit vegetation growth and create some much-needed disturbance than our very own feet? We want to remove the presumption that exploring the dunes will harm them. Instead we want to encourage people on the dunes, to learn about them, experience their beauty and maybe even help them. If this intrigues you, keep an eye out for

upcoming opportunities to volunteer and participate in citizen science. If you can't wait till then, trail off the beach and explore the secret paths hidden within the dunes.

The Dynamic Dunescapes project will essentially open the gates to Studland's dunes.



Reforming natural cycles of dune dynamics to restore a mosaic landscape. When this happens, it is also critical that we strike the right balance. We must target our efforts at the right place and time of the year. Being mindful of different breeding seasons and avoiding vulnerable areas.

If we strike the right balance and let nature steer us, we can restore so much of



what has been lost – we can again see a mosaic landscape of open sandy habitats with lots of special life hidden inside. For we have always needed the dunes, but it is only just becoming clear to us now that the dunes need us too.

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A FALSE KING AT CORFE CASTLE

Everybody knows about King Edward the Martyr at Corfe but not so many know of the strange story connected with King Edward II. The main account of some very strange happenings is in John Stowe's "A Summary of the English Chronicles" (1565). Stowe was prone to exercise his talent for history in a lurid manner but there seems no doubt that there was a basis of truth in his account.

Edward II was in every way a bad king. He was no warrior unlike his father. He was a homosexual and he had a series of favourites who were hated by the Barons. His wife Isabella – the she-wolf of France – was not much better and aided by her lover Roger Mortimer in 1326 forced the abdication of her husband Edward II in favour of his young son who became Edward III. The old King was imprisoned in Kenilworth Castle. They then ruled the land under the terms of the Queen's Regency.

Edmund, Earl of Kent, the new King's brother was much more popular and although not very intelligent, many of the Barons would have preferred him to reign. Rumours about young Edward's legitimacy were spread.

Isabella and Mortimer moved quickly. Edward II was moved to Corfe Castle early in 1327 watched over by two villainous knights Maltravers and Gurney. Maltravers owned large estates in Dorset and even now two villages bear his name.

Finally Edward was moved at night from Corfe to Berkley Castle where he was put to death in a most barbarous manner. Isabella and Mortimer now concocted a plot to dispose of Edmund.

George Bankes wrote in 1853 "of all the mysterious happenings of that period, none will appear more extraordinary than that of which Corfe Castle was the scene". They caused rumours to spread about the kingdom that Edward was still alive and Edmund was so credulous that he believed it in view of certain happenings, which they arranged. A series of masques "and other diversions upon the battlements of the Castle were held, which the country people observing imagined a great prince was there".

In addition a man was dressed in Royal clothes and a visiting Friar was allowed to see him from a distance. All this was reported to Edmund who swore an oath to obtain his brother's release. The Pope at Avignon encouraged him to lead a revolt providing him with funds and the threat of excommunication if he failed to do so. Thus the trap was baited. The foolish Edmund gathered some followers and wrote an imprudent letter which fell into Mortimer's hands. He was duly captured at Winchester and attainted of High Treason.

He went to the scaffold on March 9th 1329 much lamented. He was a victim of his own credulousness and of his Royal blood.

His progenitor King Henry II was reputed to be descended from the devil and his descendents were serial killers. Each generation almost without exception revelled in fratricide, matricide and causing death of countless nephews, nieces and cousins. The Plantagenets and the Tudors were a rough lot!

The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

After discussion with the churchwardens, and taking account of present circumstances, we have decided to continue with the pattern of church opening and services in August as has been the case in July.

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Expansion of Corfe in the 20th century – Church Terrace

Up until the 20th century, Corfe's housing had mainly been owned by the large estates although there were still a few freeholders. It relied on the landowners to maintain the properties which in some cases were little more than hovels and had a tendency to burn down because of the thatching. By 1891 the village had 592 families, or separate occupiers, living in 368 houses – not ideal by today's standards. The population then stood at 1,706. By 1901 the population had decreased by 300 and only 263 houses were inhabited. Better pay and the availability of jobs would have drawn folk to the bright lights of Bournemouth and Poole but it also meant that there was a reduced labour force for the estates around Corfe. An event in late August 1896 meant that one of the ancient properties by the church on East Street was about to be upgraded and become 5 semi-detached houses.

In the early 1600s, this ancient property belonged to the Dackombes, a royalist family. It also included the stable and garden plot that lay on the other side of East Street now forming part of No.39. When Edward Dackombe died in about 1683, many of his properties were sold off as the family had been forced to make reparations to The Commonwealth after the Civil War. However, this was one of tenements retained by them and used to raise a mortgage of £100 in 1697. By then, it was rented out to the Rector of Corfe, Dr Nicholas Gibbon, and on the north side, a passageway lead to the churchyard. (A passageway still exists behind the terraced housing leading to the churchyard called the 'Curate's Walk' although it can't be accessed from the churchyard side as it is now blocked off.) Dr Gibbon was also a Royalist and despite being appointed to the parish in 1644, he had to leave and didn't return until the restoration of the monarchy in 1660. He died here aged 92 in 1696. There is a white marble plaque in St Edwards which records his death as 1686. Since Dr Gibbon had had this plaque made, he rather underestimated his existence by 10 years.

On a Saturday morning on the 29th August 1896, a bakery behind the ancient property caught fire at about 4am. It destroyed the whole building. Luckily a neighbour, Mr Stockley, had heard the cracking glass and raised the alarm. One of the tenants, a family called Stevens, had no time to dress, and lost all their clothes; George Cleall, from the village stop, was able to help an aged widow out although both were slightly burnt. Part of the house had been sublet to Mrs Paine, a widow, and she ended up throwing her three children out of an upstairs window; she escaped by a small ladder. Another tenant, Mr Day, a carpenter, managed to save himself, his family - and some furniture, the only

one to do so. Fortunately, the fire didn't spread and by 6am the Wareham Fire Brigade had arrived with their 'manual machine'. Needless to say, no one was insured apart from Ralph Bankes who owned the property and he decided to rebuild hoping to turn the site into 5 cottages.

The ruins stood for several years before the estimate of £1,200 for the rebuild was accepted in March 1901. The site stood 2-3ft in places above the footpath as the hill slopes down towards The Square and it was decided to build a dwarf wall to keep up the soil and build steps to the front doors. In the interim, the boundary wall between the churchyard had fallen down and had to be repaired. By September the builder, Thomas Luther, had realised he'd underestimated his costs and was now asking for £1,394 exclusive of drains, the 2 new pumps and the boundary wall. Usually when a site was cleared the old materials could be sold on but, because of the intensity of the fire, the stone had been split and was unusable. The Estate and Mr Luther must have come to an agreement in October 1901 as the five semis were built. Anecdotal evidence, records that they were built to commemorate the birth of Henry John Ralph Bankes on 14th July 1902.

One of the earliest tenants in number 4 was Joseph Tubb, a traction engine driver, and in 1937, Fred Orchard, a dairyman, moved into number 5. In 1911, the caretaker of the castle, Robert Baverstock, lived in number 3. There are a couple of photos that exist of the ancient property before it burnt down but if anyone has any other information, it would be fascinating to know about. Please get in contact with the CVN.

What is Purbeck Coast FM?

Are you scam aware?

The coronavirus crisis means more people are facing issues - from employment and debt, to housing and health - resulting in some being in vulnerable situations.

Added to this, the overall heightened uncertainty and anxiety caused by the pandemic is making some people more vulnerable and more likely to fall victim to a scam.

If you think you've been scammed Citizens Advice is here to help. If you receive emails or texts about coronavirus from someone you don't know, or from an unusual email address, you are advised not to click on any links or buy anything.

Don't give money or personal details to anyone you don't know or trust - for example someone who knocks on the door and offers to help.

As the Covid-19 pandemic has developed, scammers are finding new ways to scam people.

Here are four examples of recent coronavirus scams that you should be aware of:

1. **Spoof texts and emails** - Scammers are using spoof emails and text messages pretending to be government agencies, like HMRC. This might include offering payments if you click on a link or a request for bank details.

2. **Voucher scams** - Scammers have pretended to be supermarkets offering money-off vouchers. The aim is to steal credit card details when you click on the link.

3. **Fake medical kits** - Scammers are preying on health worries around coronavirus to sell fake or substandard medical products, and home testing kits.

4. **Online shopping scams** - As we're all at home more than normal, scammers are using increases in online shopping to scam victims, including asking for payment of goods by bank transfer.

Help Wanted

My name is Martin Barry, and I am a PhD student from the University of Bristol researching 'The Materiality, Memories and Material Culture of Princess Mary's 1914 Christmas Gift to Soldiers and Sailors during the First World War'.



These little embossed brass boxes were only given to those 'wearing the King's uniform on Christmas Day 1914' and in all around 2.6 million were issued.

They were packed individually into a cardboard box along with accompanying 'comforts' such as smoking pipes, tobacco, cigarettes, sweets for non-smokers and chocolate for nurses. Nothing was placed inside the brass box except either a flint and tinder cigarette

lighter or a pencil made from a rifle bullet.

This object is a powerful example of the material culture of the First World War and carries with it many significant biographies. Biographies that include memory, remembrance and commemoration. Some are empty reminders of a much-loved father or grandfather, now gone but not forgotten. Some are the legacy of an ancestor not personally known by the current custodian of the Gift but still being commemorated today.

Many of these 'Gift's from a Princess' were kept and sent home. A significant number remain with the soldier's descendants and it is these people I am seeking to contact.

My goal is to interview people who still have these brass boxes to investigate these 'memory processes' and to see how we link those people from over a hundred years ago to today through these simple objects.

Can you help me?

Before the Covid- 19 crisis I would interview face-to-face but am now going to do it either virtually or over the telephone.

All interviews will be recorded (audio only) but ALL results will be made anonymous.

Halves Cottages, Corfe Castle

Halves Cottages was never part of the Mediaeval Strip farming system of the village, despite its name. It stands on three fields; two used to belong to the Priory of Holme or East Holme (a Cluniac order owned by the Priory of Montacute, Somerset) and the other one belonged to the Uvedale family.

Halves Cottages partly stands on land that once belonged to Alured de Lincoln. His surname is sometimes written 'de Wallis' as this family owned the now non-existent Manor of Langton Wallis. He bought these fields from '*Grimaldus medicus*' (Dr Grimaldi) sometime between 1100-1135. The late Brenda Chappell was convinced that her house on East Street (nos. 158 & 160 and she had lived in both of them) was a plague house so maybe Dr Grimaldi was Corfe's first Doctor? Alured left these lands to his heir, Robert, the son of Pagan.



Robert then founded Holme Priory in the mid 12th century (or as Thomas Bond wrote in 1890 'who had been moved by divine instinct to found a house of religion'). Eventually, Robert granted the land in Corfe, consisting of five fields, to the Prior with the agreement of his wife, Beuza, and his son, another Alured, sometime in the 1160s. The Priory was dissolved in about 1535 at the dissolution of the monasteries with the land being purloined by King Henry VIII. The last prior of Holme was Thomas Walys, whether he was a descendant of the family that gave the lands originally is not known. It then passed to Edward VI who gave it to Edward, Duke of Somerset, who sold it to John Hannam of Wimborne in the 1550s. It remained in this family's hands until 1696, when it was sold to Gabriel Odingsell of Wells, Somerset, to pay off debts. The Odingsell's also struggled financially and sold it just over twenty-five years later to the Bonds of Creech Grange. The Bonds retained the land (and still retain part of the Priory's old lands) until Halves Cottages was built in the 20th century.

Two of the fields owned by the Priory were called 'Felbanks Meadow' and 'Knappy Ground' but the other part of Halves Cottages lies in a field that ran adjacent to East Street which came to belong to the Bankes family and was called 'Grove's Meadow' simply because a man called Thomas Grove of Studland had leased the field from William Okeden in 1682. William Okeden was a descendant of Henry Uvedale, the man who renovated Uvedale House in 1575. His father, William, owned 143 acres in and around Corfe Castle when he died in 1542 although it's not clear whether this also included this particular field. Most of the Uvedale estate was purchased by John Calcraft and John Bankes had acquired the field from him by 1769. This meadow remained with the Kingston Lacy Estate until 1948.



A sortie flown by the RAF in 1947 still shows aerial views of the fields (you can find this on <u>https://explorer.geowessex.com/</u> under Imagery & Photography). Affordable homes were needed, even though the population in the parish had remained static since 1911. An application to build 10 Swedish timber houses in Webbers Lane (now Close) in March 1946 had already been approved. So, In January 1948, a planning application was submitted to the Wareham & Purbeck Rural District Council to build 18 council houses on Grove's Meadow only. Frederick Walsh was the architect, as Angelica mentioned in the previous issue. The original plan (held at Dorset History Centre, Dorchester) was altered as the proposed road through to Higher Filbank (a private road) was never extended because of the dangerous exit by the thatched cottage on East Street and a temporary turning space was created at the end of the Council's southerly road instead.

This plan was superseded by one in April 1948 which proposed blocks of four and/or pairs of semi-detached houses with the road blocked off from Higher Filbank. These were the original 18 Cottages erected by the Council on 'Grove's Meadow'.

Mary Rose Bray has also contacted the CVN to tell us that John Lawrence who at the time was head of planning at the District Council was responsible for the design of the whole project. The architect, Frederick Walsh, and John worked closely on the project and both must be recognised for the result. For example it was John who insisted that the site was not laid out in straight lines and that all building was to be in Purbeck stone, which in the post war environment was difficult to get people to agree to.

John was a local man from Worth Matravers who lived in Corfe and married Mary Rose's sister Jo. I remember driving with him along the Bere road at 80 miles an hour, which I thought was fantastic. Unhappily he was later killed in a car accident. Stephen

Kimmeridge News

This month we have a special report from Kimmeridge's very own Emily on:

Kimmeridge's plastic pollution



Kimmeridge Bay is a place not to be wasted or taken for granted just because it's on our doorstep. Throughout lock down I have been lucky enough to spend a great deal of time down the beach. Since around mid-March I have noticed a huge increase in plastics compared with previous years, not only down the bay and in the sea but throughout our streams, fields and on roadsides. I have litter picked

the beach virtually every day determined to keep this small haven clean from rubbish; But sometimes it can be exhausting to continuously see, time and time again, the sheer amount of plastic (and other waste), that has been carelessly discarded, left behind or washed up, with no thought to how it can seriously impact the environment.

Devastatingly within in a day or two it is back. All the hard work spent hauling rope, plastic and other rubbish all undone. Kimmeridge Bay (March 30th 2020) Lots of different micro-plastics including nurdles, chippings from larger plastics, bottle tops and potentially dangerous materials, including two needles! Plastics, like nurdles, whilst in the sea can soak up toxic chemicals known as 'PBTS' (Persistant Bioaccumulation Toxins) which can be mistakenly ingested by wildlife, both marine life and other wild life. Far





too often clear-coloured nurdles are mistaken for fish eggs which are then ingested by sea birds which is regularly fatal to them.

A crisp packet collected, on the 4th June, from the bottom of the Clavell Tower. Reading best before May 1995, it's over 25 years old! For me not only does this show how

long plastic litter can last in the environment but also how frequently people really litter pick in the area. @smilingseas

Top culprits found during litter picks

On the beach and in the sea:

Nurdles- Once collected I try to upcycle these, instead of putting them in the bin where they will be sent to landfill allowing the cycle to start again. *Old and unused fishing lines, crab line and rope.*

Small fragments of plastic (Micro plastics) which are mainly found sprawled in amongst the rocks, shale and always caught up in the seaweed. Entangled Seaweed generally has to be cut or put in the bin in order to remove the plastic from the beach.

In the fields:

Plastic bale wrap, Confectionary wrappers, Plastic bags (shopping bags and heavy duty feed bags), Lids from bottle tops and animal feed tubs

In the streams:

Plastic bottles, Styrofoam/polystyrene, Food Wrappers, Shoes

On the road side:

Drink Cans, Wrappers, Dog-poo bags, Plastic bags, Tickets/receipts, Cigarette butts

Even though it can be overwhelming try to stay positive and remember that every effort you make will make a difference. Keep safe and thank you for reading, Emily.

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Steam Trains Resume And Norden

<u>Station Has Re-Opened</u> <u>Corfe Castle, Harman's Cross &</u> Herston Stations Closed

Steam trains are have resumed on the award-winning Swanage Railway for the first time since mid-March – with Norden station re-opening to the public while Corfe Castle, Harman's Cross and Herston stations remain closed.



The move comes as the Swanage Railway, in Dorset's Isle of Purbeck, continues its 'Save Our Service' (S.O.S.) Appeal to raise £360,000 to help the popular heritage line – which has been rebuilt from nothing since 1976 – survive in the wake of the economic effects of Coronavirus.

Steam trains now operate a nonstop service between Swanage

and Norden stations. Trains are not stopping at Corfe Castle, Harman's Cross and Herston Halt.Norden station has re-opened for passengers starting their journey from Dorset Council's Purbeck Park car park off the A351 Wareham to Corfe Castle road.

The steam locomotive that will be hauling the trains will be late 1920s-built Southern Railway U class No. 31806 which used to haul trains to Corfe Castle and Swanage during the 1950s.

The resumption of steam trains and the opening of Norden station will see the health of passengers and railway staff still protected with socially distanced queuing at Swanage and Norden stations, socially distanced assigned seating on trains and the wearing of face coverings.

The non-stop train service departs Swanage station at 10.30am, 12.00 noon, 1.30pm and 3pm for the return trip to Norden.

While a socially distanced Swanage station shop is open, subject to volunteer availability, when trains are running, the catering outlets at Swanage and Norden stations remain closed.

Passengers are being encouraged to book in advance for the trains via the Swanage Railway's website at www.swanagerailway.co.uk.

Swanage Railway chairman Gavin Johns said: "Everyone intending to travel must have a ticket and seat reservation to ensure social distancing can be maintained. Customers are expected to have face coverings unless there are health grounds not to do so. Full details can be found on our website.

"We are pleased with the progress we are making with re-starting train services after the enforced closure due to the Covid-19 lockdown. Our risk assessment has proven its worth, ensuring that customers and staff can confidently travel with us to enjoy the Swanage Railway and the magnificent Purbeck countryside.

"We are continuing to look at the practicality of re-opening Corfe Castle station and hope to be able to make announcements concerning this station in due course," added Mr Johns who is a volunteer signalman on the Swanage Railway. As of Tuesday, 14 July, 2020, the Swanage Railway's 'Save Our Service' (S.O.S.) Appeal had raised £238,937 towards the target of £360,000.

Gavin Johns explained: ""The Swanage Railway still has considerable work to do to ensure that the impact that the Coronavirus lockdown has had on our finances can be managed to ensure survival to 2021.

"The summer train service – first hauled by heritage diesel locomotives and now steam – is but one part of our survival plan. Continuing to raise awareness and funds through our <u>'</u>Save Our Service (S.O.S.) Appeal campaign, we are very grateful and humbled by the support that we are receiving from the public," he added.

The Swanage Railway last ran its public steam train service on the weekend of 14 and 15 March, 2020.
