September Council meeting - This was cancelled out of respect to the Queen and business will be carried forward to the October meeting

Road Closure West Street – Please see below the notice from Dorset Council regarding resurfacing work required on West Street, Corfe Castle.

"PROPOSED WORKS IN YOUR AREA - West Street Corfe Castle. To enable us to carry out maintenance work, we plan to close West Street Corfe Castle on the 1st of November 2022. The road will be closed daily between the hours of 09:00 and 16:00. During the closure periods there will be no on street parking available. Parking restrictions will be imposed to prevent waiting or parking on the roads stated above. Any vehicle waiting in contravention of any restriction imposed by this Notice may be removed under the provisions of the Removal and Disposal of Vehicles Regulations 1986. If a vehicle has been towed the owner will need to contact our towing contractors Bride Valley on 01305 889421.

Vehicular and pedestrian access will be maintained for residents, however there may be a time where they are asked to wait depending on the current activity on site; there will be a Traffic Management Operative on site to aid traffic. In the current financial climate, the highways service has had to focus its budget on targeting the most damaged sections of road and areas with safety issues."

The area to be resurfaced is from The Square to Hollands Close

Dog Fouling: Council have been made aware of a particular issue concerning dog fouling within the Parish. Dog fouling laws are in place because dog faeces are unsightly and unpleasant. They also represent a serious health hazard.

Toxocariasis can cause serious illness, leading to blindness. It is caused by a parasite which lays its eggs in the soil. If they are ingested by someone, for example a small child, they may hatch into larvae causing toxocariasis. So, the child doesn't necessarily have to pick up dog faeces in order to become infected – they could just be playing where the soil still contains eggs.

We very much hope that this article will highlight the anti-social consequences of not clearing up after your dog. Dog owners need to be aware that the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 allows local authorities and communities to create bylaws relating to dog mess and issue dog control orders against individual owners for offences including allowing their dog to foul in a public space. Councils can issue fixed penalty orders and serious cases can result in prosecution.

If you witness dog fouling the best place to log the incident is with the Dog Warden at Dorset Council via

Reporting Non-urgent Crimes and Police Issues: There are sometimes occasions where anti-social behaviour, suspicious activity or minor crimes go unreported. In order for the police to establish the extent of the problem and act accordingly, it is important that these instances are reported every time with as much detail provided as possible. If the police can establish any kind of pattern then it can inform future patrols. A number of residents experienced a systematic robbing of contents in cars around the village on one evening in August which was reported to the police

Meanwhile the committee want to reflect on two events that took place over the summer, raising much needed funds to sustain the organisation.

Our first **Midsummer Party** took place at the Model Village. If you missed it this year, look out for future notices. Many thanks to all at the Model Village who came together to create such a special evening... despite some very British summer weather

There was a welcome return of the August garden party at **Larkrise**, thanks to the generosity of Joyce Prince. This used to be a regular feature in the village calendar, sadly missed during the last couple of years. A big thank you to everyone who came along, and especially to all those volunteers who helped to make sure the afternoon was a success.

Now autumn is setting in we look forward to the lights brightening up our evenings and, for the kids (young and old), the arrival of Santa in December. The date will be announced here nearer the time.

Boundary Stones 2 - Property

Around Purbeck there are stones which have been deliberately placed in certain positions to mark locations. They are often well hidden in the undergrowth or hidden behind trees; some have sunk into the bogs on the heath and vanished completely, but some were put there by Meresmen when they were evaluating exactly where the parish boundaries lay in 1910. These were men who walked the parish boundary to see if there were any discrepancies in the surveying.



Some of the Meresmen's stones can be found around Norden woods.

The owners of hedges, heaths etc in the parish of Corfe Castle could claim 4 feet into the adjoining land as their property and use it for any purpose they wanted. Overtime this led to inconsistencies and, in 1885, the Meresman for Corfe, Stephen Paine, pointed out that the Tithe map was inaccurate through bad surveying – 3 differences had been spotted in the parish one being at Coombe Bottom. The Meresmen produced little booklets (now all held at The National Archives, Kew) with hand drawn and coloured plans of the boundaries. An example is shown below.

Corfe's 'differences' were corrected in 1887 but this wasn't the first time that a dispute over land boundaries had broken out. In May of 1835, William John Bankes, asked his steward to perambulate the boundary of Langton Wallis Heath (Hartland Moor & Middlebere Heath) to check that the 'Bound Stones' were in situ and correctly placed. There was a reason for this as the steward of Lord Rivers (otherwise William Morton Pitt) had claimed they were trespassing on Lord Rivers' property and action would be taken against them. 4 Bound stones now stood at point A and a stone had been removed at point B (see the 2nd map below). These stones had been moved a year after it had last been walked in 1779 by the direction of Lord Rivers' steward, Mr Harvey. Mr Castleman, the Bankes steward, protested about their removal. A court was held at Stoborough in November 1835, to discuss the matter and they all consulted William Woodward's map of 1775, drew up their own map and agreed where the stones would now be placed. How amicable this was is unclear, but Mr Harvey, threatened that if the stones were replaced, he would move them again and break them up for use on the roads.

Unfortunately, a lot of these stones are now missing because of the railway line but stone **B**, by the Hixlade stream, has survived and now stands back-to-back with one of the meresmens' stones. Presumably it is in the right place!

Full (solar) Power at The Purbeck School

The Purbeck School (TPS) is looking forward to an exciting and busy year after two years of Covid related disruption. Although staff and students coped well with closures and distance learning it was soon appreciated that nothing could replace being "at school".

Everyone was worried about the learning loss for students. The GOOD NEWS is that TPS has done really well in the first exams taken and marked independently for three years.

At GCSE level the students at The Purbeck School have outperformed the national averages in all areas. When the national data is analysed further the school believes that students will overall have achieved better results than the expectations they would have had at primary school from their SATs results. In education language the school has "added value" to pupils achievement.

At A level the results were exceptional. Everyone passed every exam (no U grades) and 88% of grades were A* to C, with 21 students achieving an A* or A grade for every exam they sat. All students were able to gain places at Universities (including a place at Cambridge) or an apprenticeship of their choice.

Congratulations to al the staff and students on their achievement.

The school is now part of the Wessex Learning Trust a group of high achieving schools in Dorset including Thomas Hardy School in Dorchester. The Trust replaces Dorset Council as the legally accountable body and the Trust will provide common services for all schools. As it develops it will promote best practice and training for all its schools.

Like all schools The Purbeck School faces big challenges such as inflation and the cost of energy. The School now has large numbers of solar panels as part of the Dorset Council green programme, which will help with rising bills.

Corfe Castle is in the designated catchment area for TPS and all Parish pupils qualify for free transport. The open evening for next year admissions is 6th October from 5.30 pm.

Have you heard about Purbeck's Navy?

During the Second World War (1939-1945), cities, towns and villages organised 'warship weeks' to raise money to meet the cost of providing a particular naval ship. Once enough money had been raised for the ship, the local community would adopt it. Local organisations, women's institutes,

churches and schools would also provide additional comforts for the crews of the ship they had adopted. This was usually in the form of woollen socks, gloves and balaclavas. Children would often write letters and send cards to the crew. When possible, officers and men from the adopted ship would visit the local community, and to celebrate their visit, there would often be a parade.

The Tramp By Keith Fullbrook

Timothy Wood was a solitary man who would walk the coastal paths and surrounding villages of Dorset. He would occasionally help local farmers with casual labour to earn money for food and a basic living although most people shunned him because of his appearance - unkempt hair, a long beard, shabby clothes, carrying just a knapsack and an old, battered briefcase. People and children would taunt and call him Tim the Tramp. He was often seen sitting under a tree or on a bench looking through his briefcase and appeared to be studying something inside.

One day whilst walking along the beach at Studland he came across a scene of anguish, a group of people crowded around the body of a young child they had just recovered from the sea, no longer breathing.

Timothy rushed to the group and immediately offered to help but they turned on him and the mother shouted "I don't want some dirty tramp touching my baby". Unperturbed he gently persisted "Please, believe me, I can help before the ambulance arrives, because by then it will be too late". With no other offer of help from anyone else and desperate for her child, the mother reluctantly agreed. Whilst Timothy was working hard to revive the child, his old briefcase fell over and some books tumbled out. One or two people absently noticed the books had no covers but gave it no further thought while the drama unfolded before them. Had they enquired at a less frantic moment, they would have discovered they were medical journals Timothy had collected over the years.

A few moments later his efforts succeeded, the child gasped and coughed before letting out a huge cry to the relief of all. He was handed to his grateful mother who was beside herself saying "Thank you, thank you, I'm so sorry for the names I called you". While everyone fussed over the child and mother, Timothy waved his hand, picked up his belongings and continued his walk along the beach, unnoticed by the crowd.

At that time no one knew who or what he was. Later the local doctor informed the villagers that Timothy Wood was once a distinguished surgeon who, due to personal tragedy, decided to leave his profession and travel around his beloved Dorset to find peace.

Now whenever people meet him they greet him with a friendly "Hello Mr Tim". Which just goes to show, you should never judge a book by its cover.

The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

The theme this half term for assemblies at Corfe School is 'thankfulness'. So, I took the visitors' book from church into school and read out some of the comments, because quite often they are expressions of thanks: not least for the village, castle and church; for the church being open and quite often for more personal occasions such as a golden wedding.

By the following week the book included a larger number of thanksgivings than usual and these, of course, were mainly for the Queen and for her life of service to the nation, the commonwealth and indeed beyond, for she touched in so many ways the lives of people everywhere. And as the days have gone by since the Queen's death, I think we have come to realise even more how important and true this has been for us all and has lead to a renewed commitment to encourage and serve one another and the communities of which we are part.

During this second assembly the discussion lead on, and prompted by the points made by the pupils we had a really good discussion and reflection on the role of the monarchy in our constitution. In particular we thought about the monarch's role in signing the laws passed by parliament and about the more hidden role 'behind the scenes' during the regular meetings with the Prime Minister.

So be encouraged and take heart! The children growing up among us are very interested in these things.

So as we look back and give thanks for the long reign of Queen Elizabeth we also look forward to the reign of King Charles and pray both for him and his family and for all of us as together we pray to God ' thy kingdom come on earth, as it is in heaven'; remembering that heaven is not so much another place, elsewhere, but God's presence among us here and now.

The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

Two long lives: Her Majesty the Queen, 96 years; Gertie Welsh, 101 years. One the supreme head of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth of Nations; the other a long-time resident of Corfe Castle. One the topmost pinnacle of the aristocracy; the other a straightforward countrywoman. One born to having her every want supplied; the other born to the usual struggle to survive. One born to work every day of her life; the other born to work every day of her life. One a deeply Christian woman, dependant on God, possessor of a faith that gave her strength; the other a deeply Christian woman, dependant on God, possessor of a faith that gave her strength. They died within days of each other – and I am quite sure they are sitting together now in heavenly bliss, having died in the peace of Christ and risen to glory.

Two months ago I wrote about the Kingdom of God. The lives of these two women illustrate what living in the Kingdom of God is, despite their differing life circumstances. They both endured sadness in their family lives; but both found it within themselves to 'just get on with it'. Neither gave up their trust in a loving God; neither ceased to model their lives on the example of Jesus Christ; and both were rewarded by the continuing deepening of their faith and steadily developing spiritual awareness which, I believe, matured into an inner sense of wellbeing despite – and not because of – their very different life conditions. These were two people whose sphere of influence reached out not only to their descendants, but also to those whose pilgrimage through life touched theirs, whether directly or indirectly: two great ladies who will be sorely missed.

Why doesn't God do something? Friends, I expect like me, you have times where you ask, if you are there God, why don't you act? Or if only You would tear the heavens open and come down... into my situation.

Many years before Jesus came, a holy man of God asked the same thing.

If only You would tear the heavens open and come down so that the mountains would quake in your presence Isaiah 64:1

These were words echoed by the prophet Isaiah over 600 years before Jesus came. When Jesus started His ministry Mark records the same 'tearing of the heavens 'as God speaks of Jesus at His Baptism in Mark 1:10.

They tried to ban him but he kept on gatecrashing competitions with wacky disguises and fake names.

Dear Friends

I write this month's Pioneer view in the light of the recent passing of Queen Elizabeth II. This may cause many people to pause and reflect on their own loss of loved ones.

I would like to offer some personal reflections on grief and loss.

My team and I have witnessed this grief and loss first hand whilst supporting bereaved people through our befriending Scheme. What I notice as someone who has been offering support to many of these people is a sense of my own powerlessness, unable to take away the pain and make things better.

C.S. Lewis was someone who had been touched with grief and loss. He wrote this:

"Grief is like a long valley, a winding valley where any bend may reveal a totally new landscape." C.S. Lewis, A Grief Observed.

What I think C.S Lewis is getting at is that grief and loss is a journey, one that can appear to be endless. He describes it as a valley, often deep and dark at times. For many people this is a road less travelled. Their journey has often been compounded by the COVID 19 pandemic, leaving many bereaved families facing difficult challenges in what are incredibly unique circumstances.

For myself, I have embraced my own powerlessness, in doing so this has set me on a creative journey leaving with a question how we can respond compassionately as a charity to those people and families who have lost loved ones?

We in the Growing Compassionate Communities have embarked on an important project to help people engage with this journey of grief and loss. We have been planting memorial trees and plaques in communities across Dorset.

Hopefully these spaces will help people to process their grief and loss. It's so important to be able to say goodbye too loved ones as part of their own journey.

A quote to ponder:

"Grief is the price we for love" Queen Elizabeth II

With the Autumn equinox come some very low spring tides in September and October which are ideal for exploring the seashore. At this time of year there are still lots of juvenile creatures to swell the rockpool and seashore populations and the water itself is still a mild temperature. If you want to check the best tides for this, call in at the Fine Foundation Wild Seas Centre by the slipway in Kimmeridge Bay for advice and information.

This year the Great Global Nurdle Hunt runs from 20th September to 18th October. Nurdles are tiny plastic pellets used in manufacturing to make most of our plastic items. All around the world, billions of nurdles are lost to the environment each year, ending up in the sea or on our beaches where they pose a threat to wildlife. Unfortunately, they are often mistakenly eaten by seabirds and other marine animals. A study in the North Sea found that 95% of fulmars (a seabird) had small plastic items such as these in their stomachs. You can find out more and help us tackle the problem by joining our event at Kimmeridge on Sunday 9th October. Or why not do your own nurdle hunt on a Purbeck beach near you? Learn more about nurdles at <u>www.nurdlehunt.org.uk</u>

The Wild Seas Centre will remain open every day from 11am until 4pm until 30th October before closing for the winter months. During autumn half term we will be running a Beachcombing Event searching for items washed up on the shore that give us clues to what lives in the sea. RECORD-BREAKING STEAM LOCOMOTIVE 'FLYING SCOTSMAN' TO VISIT THE SWANAGE RAILWAY

Close to celebrating its centenary, record-breaking 'Flying Scotsman' – the most famous and iconic steam locomotive in the world - is to visit the Swanage Railway in Dorset's Isle of Purbeck for almost three weeks during **October**, 2022.



Owned by the National Railway Museum in York, the iconic 97-tonne A3 class locomotive completed in 1923 by the London and North Eastern Railway (L.N.E.R.) – will be on the popular Purbeck heritage line for 19 days from Wednesday, 19 October, to Sunday, 6 November. 2022. inclusive.

Flying Scotsman Corfe Castle March 2019 ANDREW PM WRIGHT

During a test run in 1934,

the Nigel Gresley-designed 'Flying Scotsman' was the first steam locomotive in the United Kingdom to haul a train at 100 miles an hour.

Coupled behind No. 60103 'Flying Scotsman' will be a late 1940s Devon Belle Pullman observation carriage - known as Car 14 - that dedicated Swanage Railway volunteers rescued from San Francisco in the U.S.A. during 2007 where it was a static bar.

It was between 1969 and 1972 that 'Flying Scotsman' ran with the Devon Belle Car 14 in the United States of America during a tour of the country aimed at promoting British exports. Sadly, the company running the tour went bankrupt with 'Flving Scotsman' being returned home but the Pullman observation carriage remained in the USA.

Fresh from a major engineering overhaul, 'Flying Scotsman' will be hauling passenger trains from Swanage to Corfe Castle and Norden for five days - from Saturday, 22 October, to Wednesday, 26 October, 2022, inclusive - with ticketonly access to stations for the public.

The iconic steam locomotive will be on static display at Swanage station on Thursday, 20 October, and Friday, 21 October, 2022, and again from Thursday.

27 October, to Sunday, 6 November, 2022, inclusive, with ticket-only access to visit the fascinating footplate of the iconic steam locomotive.

Swanage Railway Trust trustee and Swanage Railway Company chairman Robert Patterson explained: "With uniformed attendants serving champagne and canapés to passengers on board the Devon Belle Pullman observation carriage, Car 14 will be

coupled directly behind 'Flying Scotsman' when it hauls trains on the Swanage Railway.

Costing £7,944 to build, 'Flying Scotsman' was named after the prestigious London to Edinburgh express train service that the locomotive helped to operate - the journey time being eight hours.

Purchased by the National Railway Museum in 2004, 'Flying Scotsman' was restored thanks to a £4.2 million, ten-year project funded by the National Heritage Memorial Fund and the Heritage Lottery Fund as well as from public donations.

Crime around Corfe

William Hall had been a seaman when he married Harriet Webber at Poole in 1815, but by 1830 he had become a butcher at Corfe Castle and was still in that profession at the time of the incident. He had been born at Corfe Castle in early 1789. Harriet was also native to Corfe.

Isaac Brake was a preventive service man, born near Bridport in late 1809. Preventive service men were employed to counteract smuggling activity and to collect duties on imported goods. Isaac was based at the Kimmeridge stationhouse where the commander was Lieutenant Carr.

On 12th April 1834 Willam Hall was on the road home from Wareham market, between Stoborough and Corfe, apparently a little tipsy. He was walking with two men - one of whom was Isaac - a woman, and a horse which was in front of them.

Cassandra Stoodley and her husband were walking home from the heath and witnessed what happened. William called out to the Stoodleys to stop the horse. They did so, and he caught up with it. Isaac mounted the horse, but William told him to get off, which he did.

The other man - also with the preventive service - and the woman walked on towards Corfe, whilst William and Isaac argued with one another. Isaac thought he had earned the ride because he had carried an empty basket belonging to William on that understanding. William told Isaac to go before or behind him but to stop aggravating him. William had a small stick and hit Isaac across the shoulders once or twice, although not hard. William then grabbed Isaac by the coat because he had spotted a pistol, and he asked him about it. Isaac took the pistol from his pocket and cocked it with William still holding onto him. William attempted to knock the pistol out of Isaac's hand, but Isaac gave him a push and fired. The ball passed through William's side. William walked a little way towards the Stoodleys and dropped to the ground. Mr. Stoodley fainted at the sight.

After Isaac had shot William he took up a bundle from the ground and walked on. Cassandra Stoodley called him to come back saying that he had shot a man, but he would not. Isaac waved his stick over his head, laughed, and walked on up the hill. Cassandra testified that Isaac was not drunk.

Soon after the sound of the pistol, George Norris and Thomas Hatchard came to help Cassandra. William was lying in agony on the ground. They unbuttoned his waistcoat to find blood on his shirt about the size of a crown-piece, and a hole in his side about the size of a bullet. Thomas Hatchard took William on his back and carried him to Cassandra's cottage. Robert Taylor was the postmaster at Corfe, and on his way home from Wareham that same day, saw William at the Stoodleys cottage. Robert set off to look for Isaac and found him at Kimmeridge. Isaac said that if anyone else was to molest him as William had done he would shoot them also. Isaac was taken to the preventive officers station-house at Kimmeridge, where Lieutenant Carr, ordered him to give up his arms, which he did. They consisted of pistol, a swordstick, powder cartridge, and five balls. The pistol was loaded.

Isaac was admitted to Dorchester prison on 15th April where he was charged with shooting with intent to murder. William Hall died on 19th April, and the coroner issued a warrant with the charge of willful murder.

Willam and Harriet had had six children. Fanny, number seven, was born just a few days after William died.

Isaac was tried on 19th July 1834.

Lieutenant Carr confirmed that Isaac had been one of his officers on the 12th of April. He stated that it was necessary that Isaac should be armed, especially between Stoborough and the station-house, because seizures of contraband spirits had been made through Isaac's vigilance, and threats of revenge had in consequence been made to him. This made it necessary that he should protect himself. Lieutenant Carr said that Isaac was not a passionate man in temper, but particularly mild.

Several witnesses were called for Isaac, each testifying to his excellent character. The judge said that he believed the act was not premeditated, but done in the heat of the moment. This reduced the crime from murder to manslaughter, of which the jury found him guilty. Isaac believed that he had permission to shoot, as unlikely as that seemed to the people around him. The judge declared this to be a horrible opinion, and as the act was so close to murder, it should receive a severe punishment. Isaac was sentenced on 19th July 1834 to transportation for the term of his natural life.

On 5th September 1834, he was sent from Dorchester prison to the prison hulk Leviathan in Portsmouth harbour, arriving the following day. On 18th November 1834, Isaac was put onto the ship "Waterloo", bound for Van Diemen's Land (*Tasmania*), arriving there on 3rd March 1835. He declared his trade on arrival to be a ploughman. He died in Launceston, Tasmania on 12th July 1843 aged about 33.
