Dorset Council issues: During our March meeting there was a lengthy discussion with Cllr Brooks about the recent flooding. Cllr Brooks is pursuing the issue and will report back.

Council Tax on Empty Homes and Second Homes: This month Dorset Council resolved to shorten the period to one year for the tax surcharge on empty properties starting April 2024. It will also double the Council tax on second homes from April 2025.

Photo ID for the elections. All Councils in Dorset are having elections on 2nd May 2024. Voters will need photo ID such as an Older Person's / Disabled person bus pass, driving licence or passport to cast their vote in person, a full list of approved ID can be found on the Dorset Council webpage https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/-/voting-in-person-at-a-polling-station. Voters encouraged to get their ID ready ahead of this year's local elections



Residents are reminded that they will need be registered to vote and show an approved form of photo ID when they go to the polling stations on 2 May to elect for Dorset Council councillors as well as Town and Parish Councils. The Police and Crime Commissioner elections also takes place on the same day.

Following the Elections Act 2022, photographic identification is a mandatory requirement for everyone voting at polling stations.

Residents will also need photo ID to vote at parliamentary general elections, expected to be called sometime this year.

Various forms of photo ID are accepted, including a driving licence, passport, Older Person's Bus Pass, a blue badge or Disabled Person's Bus Pass. The full list of accepted ID can be found

here: www.electoral commission.org.uk/voting-and-elections/voter-id/accepted-forms-photo-id

Residents can also use an expired ID as long as the photograph is still a good likeness.

For those without accepted photo ID, a free Voter Authority Certificate can be obtained online. Applications must be submitted by Wednesday, 24 April to be processed in time for the 2 May elections. The Voter Authority Certificate is valid for 10 years and is valid for all elections.www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate

To cast your vote in the upcoming elections, you must be registered by Tuesday, 16 April, 2024. If you're not already registered, you can complete the process on the Government's website. Voters only need to register once, unless they have changed their name or address.

Postal votes:

There is no need for people to provide photo ID if you vote by post, but you will need to give your National Insurance number and date of birth. Once your postal vote is set up, whenever an election, referendum or poll at which you are entitled to vote is called, you will be sent a postal poll card giving details of the forthcoming election, referendum or poll. This will be followed by a postal vote pack. www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/-/voting-by-post

Church Knowle Parish Council

The March meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 12th March 2024 at 6:30pm. It was attended by eight members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair), one member of the public and Cllr Cherry Brooks from Dorset Council.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Public Discussion

The topics raised included:

- Flooding at East Creech owing to the inadequate sizing of the under road culvert. While the Highways Department regularly clears this with a suction machine it soon blocks with debris again.

Vacancies on the Parish Council

We are pleased to welcome Ian Gilbert who joined the parish council this month. There is now only one vacancy on the council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk. All eight current councillors will be up for election at the 2nd May elections. Any eligible parishioner can stand for election, the papers can be obtained from the Dorset Council website or from the clerk. The deadline for submission of papers to County Hall, Dorchester is 4pm, 5th April 2024.

Neighbourhood Plan

The Church Knowle Parish Neighbourhood Plan is entering the next phase. To best represent the wants and needs of parishioners, you are invited to a consultation morning at Church Knowle Village Hall on Saturday 20th April at 10 am. This will be an opportunity to discuss your thoughts and ideas with the Steering Group and your feedback will shape our Neighbourhood Plan. Before this meeting, a set of questions for you to consider will be delivered to your home. We hope

to see you there.

The Neighbourhood Plan carries statutory weight under the Localism Act 2011 and this is an opportunity for the parish to take advantage of this.

Report from Dorset Council

The Dorset councillor Cherry Brooks reported that the Dorset Council has balanced its budget and that no services will be cut. At the latest Dorset Council meeting it was decided to apply a 100% council tax premium to long term empty houses and second homes. Holiday lets will continue to be classed as businesses. This will be applied from 1st April 2025.

The May 2nd elections require that voters have a photo ID with them at the polling station.

<u>Planning</u>

There were no new planning applications.

<u>Highways</u>

The problem of deer in the parish and on the road was discussed. Dorset Highways will be approached about the possibility of providing deer warning signs on the roads. Deer have become a massive problem in the parish and indeed in rural communities throughout the country. There are now some 2m roaming free causing 75,000 road accidents a year.

Furzebrook Phone Box

This was decommissioned by BT and adopted by the Parish Council over a year ago and is available for new role. Suggestions for a use for this box are sought. Pease contact the clerk and these will be put to the Parish Council to be considered.

Tenders

The last Playing Field inspection recommended that the wooden elements be treated with preservative. Tenders are therefore being sought for treating all of the timber at the playing field with an approved preservative. The timber will have to be sanded to remove any splinters first. Apply to the Clerk at clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk for details.

The March meeting finished at 8:30 pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Furzebrook Village Hall at 6:30 on 9th April 2024.



Skirmish in the skies!

Although ravens are bigger, peregrines are formidable hunters and the fastest birds in the world (reaching over 200 miles per hour in a dive). We have had an updated schedule from Dorset Council for the roof works to The Old Stables on the A351. The works will now commence on Monday 15th April for 3 weeks. This is when the traffic management system will be in place through the village.

We fully appreciate the disruption is difficult, but the schedule and works have been set by the contractors of Dorset Council. The length of time is due to the building requiring structural repairs and works to its roof so that it can continue to be used by the village festivities committee.

WHY DON'T YOU COME AND GIVE IT A TRY?

Challow Farm

The Revd Hutchins thought that this farm's name was derived from the chalk way that leads up East Hill - Chalway. An alternative suggestion is 'Chalwyll', meaning cold spring/stream or well. In 1910, it consisted of about 203 acres and was owned by Captain Guy Marston, RN, of Rempstone Hall. He was a nephew of the last Calcraft and inherited the estate in 1901.

Challow was a dairy farm. The tenant rented 14 milk cows at £12 per cow from Captain Marston.

It was part of Rollington tything and lies just outside the boundary of the borough of Corfe. There are traces of Celtic field systems on its northern side on Rollington Hill.

It's not clear when or how the Clavells came to own Challow – either by purchase or marriage – but one Richard Clavell died in 1510, leaving 10 acres of meadow and an alder bed at 'Challwyll'. No dwelling is mentioned. This passed to his daughter, Elizabeth, as his sole heiress. She was already married to Thomas Dackombe and her property became his, as was the usual practice then. The farm then passed to their son, Robert Dackombe in 1540 and continued down the Dackombe line until about 1740 when it was sold to John Moreton. He left his estate to his nephew, Revd. John Colson, and it was his brother's son, John Morton Colson of Studland, who inherited the estate and sold it to John Calcraft.

In the late 19th century, it was rented to James Wiltshire who described himself in the 1891 census as the registrar for births and deaths for Corfe Castle, a coal merchant, and a farmer. He sublet the farmhouse to John Long, a dairyman. The dairy farm was auctioned off in 1919 by Captain Marston along with his properties in Worth.

Castle doctors surgery you will have seen the outcome of a similar project. We are very excited to see the finished article.



Who's an April fool, then? Me? You? All of us? The more ridiculous the joke, the more we enjoy it so long as we personally are not the butt of it. I believed I looked irresistible dressed in my Andy Pandy outfit, I enjoyed wearing it, it gave me confidence, it was a bit of fun ... and then, unwisely, I manoeuvred several mirrors in order to admire myself from the back and gave myself a shock: all-in-one trousers-and-tops are not ideal wear for those designed with a lot to sit upon. Andy Pandy was despatched to the Age Concern Charity Shop.

But while I *believed* I looked attractive in it, I may even have done so, so convinced was I in my belief.

There are many accounts of people who, for one reason or another, take wrong turns in life and acquire habits harmful to themselves and others - drugs, drink, crime and cruelty just about sums them up. Once on the downward path it is extraordinarily difficult to extricate oneself. What is needed is something to *believe in* that is more powerful than the habit; and, very often, it is belief in God Almighty and his representative on earth Jesus Christ working through the activity of the Holy Spirit in people's lives, that comes to the rescue.

Despair is a terrible feeling incorporating helplessness, powerlessness, and the inevitability of failure. It makes you feel trapped, with nowhere to turn for help. In those circumstances, when there seems to be no one *outside* willing and able to help – the only place left to go is *inside* … *inside* to your own self. When Moses asked God his name, God replied 'I AM'. (Exodus 3:14) I AM is how we refer to ourselves. It follows that our own unique 'I AM' is the inborn link between us and God Almighty, whether we believe in God or not. In your imagination, ask this remarkable reality within you for help, as if you were talking to someone - and see what happens. Weep, if you feel like it, wail, cry out in anguish, shout, bellow with rage or whisper in shy prayer - but direct it to God.

More often than not, help comes to you from *outside* once you have set *inside* going. I don't understand how it works; I just know that it does. With love, Anne

GOOD MAN OR GOD MAN?

We have just celebrated Easter and despite the chocolate eggs and the Easter bunnies, the real heart of Easter centres on the life changing effect of the death and resurrection of one solitary man, Jesus Christ. Does it really matter whether we believe He was not only fully human but fully divine? <u>New Partnership Launched to Help Residents who Fear Losing their</u> Home

Dorset Council and national charities Shelter and Citizens Advice have joined forces for the first time to prevent homelessness in the county.

The new partnership is supporting Dorset residents who are experiencing a range of housing

issues by providing a free, confidential and nonindependent on a store shore for anyone with housing

judgemental one-stop-shop for anyone with housing cost concerns.

Experts can assist with many areas of housing, such as giving legal and debt advice, help finding a new home due to eviction and in some circumstances facilitate financial assistance to enable residents to remain in their accommodation. The Housing Advice Line is open to anyone who:

- has a mortgage
- rents privately
- has a social landlord or
- are landlords themselves.

The service is also open to lettings agents, so they can share information with landlords and their clients.

When people call the Housing Advice Line on 01305 221000, their enquiry will be triaged and passed on to the most relevant team or organisation to progress.

The collaboration was formed to make it easier for people to access help if they have concerns or worries about losing their home, by having only one point of contact to get help.

Every local authority has a statutory duty to provide advice to everyone who is experiencing housing issues. Our data from 2023 shows we:

- took approximately 8,000 calls on housing issues via our Housing phone line.
- answered more than 25,000 emails about housing related topics.
- managed around 350 referrals from professionals from both our internal and external partners.
- took more than 4,000 enquiries through our dedicated online portal a rise of 6% from 2022.

Residents can also access the Housing Advice service by emailing housinghelp@dorsetcouncil.gov.uk or visiting the webpage Are you struggling with housing costs or worried about losing your home? - Dorset Council- for more information.

PurbeckParkys

My name is David Gynes, I am a volunteer with Parkinson's UK and I have Parkinson's. Shortly after I was diagnosed I heard about an exercise class run by a neuro physiotherapist. I joined the class, made new friends and we shared our dismay that there was no support this side of the big towns. So we decided to start a support group, PurbeckParkys. We meet monthly, the next meeting is on April 17th at The Village Inn, Ulwell.

The group functions under the aegis of Parkinson's UK, the National charity and research hub.

We are a Parkinson's café, which means we meet for social interaction, a beverage, and to share information. We exist for Parkys, their families and carers.

World Parkinson's day is held on April 11th this year. And we would like your help and support on that day please.

So what is Parkinson's? It used to be called Parkinson's disease but we now realise that it is many "diseases" under one umbrella. It is a neurological disorder in which certain brain cells die off steadily, and most people diagnosed with Parkinson's have actually had it for years beforehand. The cell destruction is usually quite advanced by the time the visible symptoms including tremor, stumbling and shaking become obvious. It manifests with over 40 recognised symptoms and it affects people very differently. Some of us have no motor symptoms, others great pain, others rigidity and others mental disorder - and all possible combinations of those and other issues.

And why World Parkinson's Day? Parkinson's is the fasted growing neurological disorder in terms of diagnosis worldwide. It is also probably the least understood, and certainly among the lowest, if not the lowest, among the life changing illnesses, in terms of government expenditure on research, treatment and support. (Last year the charity Parkinson's UK raised and spent more than twice the amount on research projects than did the UK Government.)

On World Parkinson's day we are striving to bring the size of the problem and the needs of people living with the condition to the widest possible audience. To educate and dispel myths – and - of course, raise money for more research into its causes and possible cure and prevention. [Sadly, among the myths we know that some cultures see the tremors and uncontrolled body movements as

a sign of demonic possession and the person with Parkinson's is, at best, ostracised and at worst, killed.]

Parkinson's UK have asked all their members and friends to turn the world BLUE on April 11th.

So please look out for blue balloons, banners and bakery, buildings lit blue. Any support you can give will be gratefully received and any money will be put to very good use.

Blashenwell Farm

Although the current farmhouse was built sometime in the 18th century, the actual settlement is much older. It was one of the scattered Saxon farmsteads that existed in Purbeck and is referred to as 'Blechenwelle' in a Saxon charter of 955 A.D. when King Eadwig granted his minister, Whitsige, some land which would eventually pass to the Abbess of Shaftesbury. The last Abbess was Elizabeth, and she held this land until 1539 when she surrendered the Abbey to the King's Commissioner.

The Saxon name refers to a place where cloth was bleached – a spring by the bleaching enclosure. The natural colour of linen is brown so to produce a white cloth some form of lye (urine or wood ashes) was needed to soak the cloth. The cloth was then dried outside in the sunshine and then washed. It was



a long process which made the cloth expensive.

The spring rises to the south of the farm, and then flows by the farmhouse northwards to the SW side of Corfe Common occasionally causing flooding where the old ford lies. In 1926, a culvert and bridge were constructed to prevent this happening. It still floods.


The site predates the Saxons. A building existed here in Roman times, maybe even some sort of dwelling before that as artefacts have been found here dating back to the Stone Age. Blashenwell has been occupied for a very, very long time. Evidence was found in a rubbish tip which dated the original people who lived here to the early Neolithic period (c.4100 - c.2,500 BC). They seem to have made flint knives living principally on wild pig, deer and limpets.

On the dissolution, the manor of Kingston was given to the Duke of Somerset, Edward Seymour, and it then passed to his son, the Earl of Hertford. He sold it to William Pitt in 1612. Blashenwell then passed down the Pitt line before being purchased by John Scott, the Earl of Eldon, in 1837.

Sometime after 1166, a survey for the Manor of Kingston noted that Fuca and Adelinus held 1½ hides (about 180 acres) and gave up one workday for ploughing to the Abbess of Shaftesbury as Lord of the Manor. It mentions a ford existed here (was that the one by The Common?). By the 1800s, it had become a dairy farm holding a herd of between 60-77 dairy cows.

The Rambling Gardener

Welcome to April sun and showers, though hopefully no gales, as everything is getting ready for summer. It is such fun watching the birds courting or busy feeding their young, but if a nest is found then be careful to not disturb them. I have lots of nest boxes that can be seen from the house, and the bird feeders are always busy, from small blue tits to bigger woodpeckers and doves. It is expensive buying the bird food, but they eat many greenfly, slugs, snails and other harmful insects and benefit my garden.

It has been a very, very wet spring so far this year, but we still need to be thoughtful about saving water in the house and by using moisture meters to avoid over-watering. We also need to prevent the heavy rains from washing soil into the sea by keeping soil covered with vegetation or mulches, and allowing water to drain into the soil with less use of impermeable substances like concrete and asphalt – there are porous substitutes available now. An inch of compost can be made in a year, but it takes 1000 years to make an inch of the soil that we need to grow our crops.

I am so looking forward to April as it heralds springtime when I can sit and wonder at nature, still so much still to learn. In remembering my life, and looking at old photos I can see how things are evolving. I have seen so many changes (as I am now a ripe old four score years and ten) and I see nature is changing; evolution never stops, especially with humans affecting everything. There are fewer flocks of small birds like the linnet (or twite) and wheatears, and the whitethroat is not singing sweetly in the hedges at Knitson anymore. However, there seem to be more big bumblebees, we have developed more and more beautiful flowers for our gardens, and I have seen more wrens than normal in my garden this year.

Back to our gardening: flowers cheer us up and so are important, vegetables are needed for health and are far tastier and nutritious picked just before eating. If you love all your plants, they will love you back. In April most seeds can be sown direct into the soil, or sown in the house to go out when it is warmer. Annuals, like our salad vegetables and petunias, will give food or flowers this year and the biennials, like foxgloves and most cabbages, next year. This is a good time to plant potatoes and divide things that are too crowded. Weed the things you don't need; it is easy with a sharp slide hoe and you can leave the uprooted weed as a mulch. I do pick up bits of convolvulus and ground ivy as they smother other plants if left as they can regrow from small bits of root Grey leaved plants evaporate less water so they are good for hot sunny places, and ferns like shady borders. Choosing plants that like where they are can save a lot of time and trouble. I usually choose old varieties of fruit, shrubs and vegetables, but this year I am looking at new varieties that do better in the changing weather. These will, I hope, give me more food and longer colour with less work once established. I am looking at the long fruiting strawberries and small quick fruiting nut trees. I have got a walnut that I am told will crop in 2 years, and I have seen that there are lots of fruits that do well in pots. I have planted irises that flower from May to November, and by putting some gravel under them they do well even in the wet. They only need the leaves tiding up and removal of old corms every few years to look beautiful.

How we garden changes all the time. The less we do the better the plants are and we can have time to enjoy ourselves. There are lots of new ideas: water butts which can be covered with creepers on fencing, or even buried under the lawn, small lawn areas planted with wild flowers or low growing thyme, planting three trees in only 10 square metres. Many ideas can be tried and if they don't work learn and try new ideas!

Etches Collection


