

Parish Caretaker: Your Parish Caretaker (Tim) is still hard at work every month keeping your parish clean, tidy but also safe. Over the last few months, he has been hard at work litter picking, (please remember to use and remind others to use the bins provided); repairing the safety surfaces in the playground; and levelling up graves within Gods Acre, ensuring local residents who visit loved ones within the cemetery can walk about in a safer environment (still take care as not all graves are level yet). Over the next few months, Tim will be working on the playground equipment, removing the rust from the older items, and then repainting them. This inevitably will mean some pieces of equipment will be out of use for a short period of time, but the work will be carried out as quickly as possible but is essential if we wish to prolong the life of the play If whilst you are out and about around the Parish and you see something that needs a little TLC or outright repairing (not private property) please contact the Clerk via email or phone, or if you see Tim (he will be wearing a hi vis vest with "Parish Council" on the back), stop and say Hi and let him know the issue.

# **Dorset Council update from Cllr Cherry Brooks**

**Homes for Ukraine:** The scheme is well under way, where residents can offer accommodation for refugees. Dorset Council (DC) is asking residents to register directly on the Gov.uk website.

**Planning web pages:** There is planned maintenance for the planning web pages, and the pages will not be available between 5pm 25<sup>th</sup> April until close of play Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> April 2022.

**Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging:** DC is moving into phase two of their EV Charging programme. The order is being placed now and it is hoped will all be up and running by Summer 2022, although there may be some delays due to the time needed to connect to the electricity network.

**Take over challenge:** This runs from June to July 2022, and sees young people aged 13 - 21 or up to 25 for care leavers and people with Special Educational Needs, taking over a role of a Senior decision maker within DC. This challenge

gives the young people the chance to experience the world of work, and make their voices heard, and in return DC gain a fresh perspective on what we do and how it affects young people.

**Summer Visitor Numbers**: DC is planning for high visitor numbers again this summer. The tow away zone in Studland is once again active and will remain in place until November 2022.

**Dorset NHS: Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG):** The CCG was due to be phased out on the 1<sup>st</sup> April but this has been put back to June and will be replaced by the Integrated Care System (ICS), more information to follow.

**Parking Scheme:** The new DC parking scheme is now in operation, seeing a charge of £78 for 12 months for short stay car parks, and £260 for the Flexi permit, allowing for parking within long & short stay car parks.

**Tour of Britain:** West Bay & Ferndown are to host the first ever Dorset stage of the Tour of Britain. The route will see the cyclists coming through Corfe Castle Parish. On Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> September 2022

**Love your verge**: The "Love Your Verge" campaign is back in operation again this year, with signs being placed across Dorset, with the aim of protecting wildlife and wildflowers on our highways.

**Bus Back Better:** DC applied for the Bus Back Better scheme grant, to enable for better services across Dorset, but the bid was not successful in the first round. DC has been notified that further funding will be available and DC is already working to enhance the bid ready for the next round.

**Next Council Meeting** – Monday 9<sup>th</sup> May 2022 (meetings are held on the second Monday of each month), at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter Room. This meeting is the Annual Parish Council Meeting, where we elect our Chairman for the year. To start the meeting is a public half hour, so please come and join us and have your say.

# **News from the Library**

This month sees the return of the talk from February that had to be postponed due to the severe storm warning.



May 20<sup>th</sup> 2022, 2.00pm, Corfe Castle Village Hall. Gen Crisford (National Trust): *The Re-introduction of Beavers to Purbeck* 

Beavers were a key part of our wetland ecosystems until they were hunted to extinction 400 years ago. Eurasian Beavers are native animals; they evolved alongside our other native fauna and flora and until extinction had successfully coexisted in Great Britain since the last ice-age. It is believed that bringing back Eurasian beavers at carefully chosen sites could benefit Poole Harbour and the rivers which flow into it, and local communities are helping to make it a reality.

The release of beavers on Purbeck could occur within a few months (in fact it may have occurred by the time of the talk!). Come and hear about the scheme and how it is progressing.

# **Our Recent Get-Together**

Several apologies for sickness and holidays etc., but importantly we still covered our updates/actions. Notes from the meeting were emailed to all those on our Environmental Group email list. Here's the highlights:

#### School:

We're strengthen our bond with the school and hope to have a representative at our meeting in May to find out more about their wonderful efforts, their plans and ways in which the community can support them.

#### Jubilee 'Queen's Green Canopy' Projects Update

- In April we identified yet more sites for our '70 trees for 70 years' project and are in working directly with Dorset Council to see how we can make these a reality.
- ➤ We've applied for and been awarded 420 free saplings as part of the QGC so we look forward to getting those in the ground in the autumn
- ➤ A wider project of recording 70 trees being planted for each of the 70 years of reign (yes, 4900 trees!) is also under way. We've recorded an impressive 2200+ in the 2021/22 planting season. Have evidence of trees you've planted since 01.10.21, or are planning before 31.03.23? If so, please get in touch
- ➤ We're always willing to accept further donations of 'native-ish' saplings for the cause! Please get in touch David via the Parish Clerk.

# **Churchyards**

After successful collaborative efforts in Corfe and Kingston we're aiming to share our learning with Kimmeridge, Steeple and Tyneham to see how we can all further enhance the biodiversity of the churchyards. Several rare orchids in Kingston are the headline discovery and reduced maintenance costs are also an added benefit: A 'no-mow' area = less mowing = less time and fuel.

# **Top Tips**

**Can you save £1000+ in a day?** We've all seen various lists of Money-Saving tips, but have you actually made time to take action? There's potential to save serious £££.

It's time to help everyone save £££. Together, we can have a positive impact on the lives of hundreds across our entire community.

Most actions that save us money usually involve **LESS**: consumption, waste, energy etc. etc. so by default we're in favour of them. What changes are you making or what are your life-long 'rituals' for using less and saving more? **Please share them with us.**

# 3 that caught our eye:

Lightbulbs: Swap a 60W incandescent bulb for an LED bulb = Up to £6 saving per bulb, per year.

ACTION: Switch now to use less energy immediately

- Shower: For 4mins or less? = £70 saving, per year for a typical household.
  - ACTION: Use a timer to 'train' this good habit
- Water Meter Trial: Some households can cut their bill in half with a free swap to a water meter. Wessex Water are currently allowing customers to trial a meter for up to 2 years. If you don't save fff they'll credit you any over spend and switch you back to a fixed rate

ACTION: Try an online water usage calculator or speak to Wessex Water

#### Important Update from Corfe Castle Community Land Trust


Following a challenging few months the CLT Board has made some changes:

- Peter Morrison Wells has decided to stand down as Chair but will remain on the Board. Colin Fuller has been elected by the Board to take over this key role. The Board offers sincere thanks to Peter for the huge amount of work undertaken since the creation of the CCCLT
- 2. The provision of open market homes within our planning application had been causing some problems with viability. Therefore, the Board has over the past few months negotiated a new deal with the Bond family to make the scheme a totally affordable housing package comprising 16 rental homes and 6 shared ownership homes. This has the backing of our selected Housing Provider, Aster Homes Ltd. As a consequence, the current planning application was withdrawn on Wednesday 13th April and a revised scheme is being prepared, to be submitted in a few months' time. The 22 affordable homes will be a mix of 1 bedroom, 2 bedroom and 3 bedroom homes. This provides an even greater opportunity for local people to live in the village.

This change allows us to move the development forward and provide homes for local people who have a history of connection with the village as well as offering a more integrated plan for the site.

# Church Knowle Parish Council - April Meeting

The April meeting of the Parish Council took place at the Furzebrook Village Hall on the second Tuesday, 12<sup>th</sup> of April with four Councillors present. In the Village Hall car park is a used clothing collection bin for the Salvation Army. A small three sided door had been cut into the back of this with an angle grinder and the flap bent back with the obvious intent on theft. Inside of the bin could be seen black plastic bags of clothes that people had kindly donated. It is highly improbable that there would be any tiaras or diamonds among these, even in Furzebrook and so the criminal motivation for this effort in cutting through this 3mm steel is unclear. Perhaps it is the same criminal mastermind that has stolen the Creech Bottom post box. As is often the case the damage and inconvenience weighs far more than any gain by the perpetrator – and it is nicer to be in a community where these stupid things are not going on.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

# Neighbourhood Plan

The Neighbourhood Plan consultant, Paul Weston, has produced a very comprehensive Scoping Study for Church Knowle, "Church Knowle Neighbourhood Plan – A Way Forward", some 90 pages but concentrating on the issues the Council identified as important and it is a very good and useful piece of work. The Council decided to apply for more grant funding and to see if the Neighbourhood Plan could be taken to completion ("made" in NP terminology). This will require some community input and eventually a referendum by the people of Church Knowle to accept it. There will be a steering committee guided by the consultant and anyone interested in finding out more can contact the Clerk or Google Neighbourhood Plan which will bring up the Locality website that gives a lot of information.

A well drafted Neighbourhood Plan gives (in theory) a lot more power at local, Parish Council, level in determining what happens at Parish level with real legislative clout provided by the Localism Act 2011. This is why the Parish Council is taking the path to produce a Plan.

# <u>Planning</u>

This month saw three applications, all of which were passed by the Council with "No Objection". These are:

P/HOU/2022/02301 – 5 Tyneham Road, Church Knowle Erect side extension to form garage and first floor office/store

P/TRC/2022/01696 – 1 Church Knowle

Tree work, fell some conifers and crown reductions.

### Missing Post Box

The Council resolved to pursue the replacement of the missing post box at Creech Bottom with the Royal Mail and the Clerk will write to top management to get some action. It should not be beyond the wit of the Royal Mail to provide a new post box on a steel pole. In the meantime there is a petition on change.org titled "Royal Mail – Replace the Creech Bottom postbox" and one at the Lookout Stores. Bit by bit these things disappear from daily and cultural life and eventually you look around and there is nothing left. Meanwhile the cost of a postage stamp has just risen again.

The telephone box at Church Knowle should be safe as it is a listed building because it forms an important and integral part of the cultural streetscape.

# Correspondence

The Langton Matravers Parish Council sent a copy of their "Motion of Little Confidence in DC Planning System" to all of the local Parish Councils for their information. The Church Knowle Parish Council endorses this and is preparing a similar motion.

# Vacancies for Councillors

The Parish Council is three members below its full strength of nine and has a quorum of three. If anyone from the Church Knowle Parish would like to join the Council they can contact the Clerk (clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk) or come along to a meeting and simply observe. Anyone can come along to a Parish Council meeting, observe or make a presentation on some particular point if they wish.

The meeting finished at 8:35. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Church Knowle Village Hall at 6:30 on 10<sup>th</sup> May.

# **Spring Covid Boosters**

The Purbeck Covid-19 Vaccination HUB at Wareham Hospital will be offering a spring Covid-19 booster to those age 75+ and age 12+ who are immunosuppressed (transplants, chemotherapy, some rheumatoid drugs and high dose steroids etc). The booster will be **6 months** from your previous Covid-19 vaccination. Those eligible will be invited by letter by the CVP admin team at Wareham Hospital. Appointments are also available to book on the National Booking System. If you do not receive a letter and you believe you are part of this group, please contact the Vaccination HUB on 01929 557559 /557589. This phone line is manned Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings but also has an answerphone. **Please DO NOT phone your surgery for appointments**. Early vaccination requests will need a referral from a clinician.

May is skin cancer awareness month. Most skin cancers are caused by sun exposure so as the weather starts to improve there is a need to be more sun aware again.

The best way to enjoy the sun safely and protect your skin is to use shade, clothing and sunscreen.

Shade and clothing are better than sunscreen at protecting your skin. Sunscreen shouldn't be used to spend longer in the sun. But they can be useful for protecting the parts of skin not covered by clothing or shade.

# Sun safety guidelines

In the UK, the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays are the strongest between 11am and 3pm from mid-March to mid-October. During this time, the sun may be strong enough to cause damage. Take extra care to protect your skin, especially if you get sunburnt easily by:

- 1. Spending time in the shade, especially between 11am and 3pm in the UK.
- 2. Covering up with clothes, a wide-brimmed hat and UV protection sunglasses.
- 3.And using a sunscreen with at least SPF15 and 4 or 5 stars. Use it generously, reapply regularly and use together with shade and clothing.

Skin cancers can look very different and the symptoms can vary. Some of the symptoms are similar to other conditions so if you are suffering from any of the following then please consider booking an appointment with one of our doctors.

A skin lesion that;

- •doesn't heal within 4 weeks
- ·looks unusual
- •hurts, is itchy, bleeds, crusts or scabs for more than 4 weeks

# **Patient Participation Group**

We have, we hope, come through another long winter and, despite the high number of people catching the Covid infection and the worrying rise in the cost of living, there is a new sniff of optimism in the spring air. Here in Purbeck we have many blessings to count. We live in a peaceful country (our thoughts are constantly with the Ukrainian people), in a beautiful place, in a wonderfully supportive community – and not least with the outstanding care of Corfe Castle Surgery. In recent weeks up to 25% of the staff there have been off sick but somehow, e.g. by coming in on their days off, the others have managed to keep the surgery running as they have done throughout the epidemic. We the patients thank you all.

At the Surgery the patients' feedback on the new blood pressure monitor is very positive. Once you've got used to it, it's great! Do please read the information about skin cancer in Kerry Norman's Surgery article. It could make all the difference to you. Also do have your spring Covid booster vaccination if you are eligible but NB the booking is not through the Surgery this time.

I recently attended a meeting of the Chairs of the six local PPGs. The disappointment and disillusionment about the scrapping of the planned Integrated health and Social care Hub at Wareham continue to run deep. We welcomed in principle the coming in July of the new Integrated Care Services, with a new Board, in place of the CCG, combining the provision of health and social care in Dorset. It admirably aims to deliver joined-up care to patients that will e.g. help relieve bed-blocking in hospital. We expressed concern, however, about the timing of this major change when GPs, other clinical staff and carers are already exhausted and about how the existing shortage of staff will be addressed to deliver the new service. We hope the patients receiving care in the community will see the benefit in the way their care is planned and delivered under the new system.

Finally an advance notice to all our carers. As part of National Carers' Week, the local Primary Care Network (the six practices) will be inviting all those registered as carers at Corfe Surgery and the PPG to a Carers Day Event at the Springfield Hotel on Wednesday June 8<sup>th</sup>. Its purpose is to thank unpaid carers for all they do and to ensure that they are getting any help that may be relevant to them. A variety of different organisations will be there giving information, advice and guidance.

# **West Mill**

West Mill was the castle's grist mill grinding corn from the local area by water wheel. A 'molendino' was in existence by 1270 according to Hutchins. The three cottages that had existed there from 1795 were demolished in 1922 and rumour has it that the stone was used for the War Memorial on East Street (unveiled in November 1922).



demolished, the Overseers of the Poor (roughly the equivalent of Social Services today) took on the rental and placed those in need in the cottages. The leet that fed water to the mill had already fallen into disuse, but it can still be seen if you know where to look.

The mill underwent serious repairs in 1730 (rethatched and rebuilt) and described as a dwelling house, mill with an adjoining garden and outhouses.




The Mill in 1775 on William Woodward's map

In the autumn of 1864 'lodgements of muck' were removed from the weir at Miller's Bay. The weir is now in a sorry state. It had been created to feed the water from the river into the leet across Moor Mead to West Mill and the mill pond.

By the time the 1886 map was surveyed, the leet had become a hedgerow, the mill pond filled in and one bridge had been removed. Only Vineyard Bridge survives now.

The eagle-eyed amongst you, will also have spotted that Vineyard Cottage had moved to the other side of the old leet. The original cottage is likely to have been demolished when Lady Bankes created her water garden in Mill Close.

#### The Reverend Anne Bond writes

Easter is when all the world decides to have a holiday – so, whaddya know? All the airlines start cancelling flights. Well, anyway, this year they have, because of the world-wide rise in the cost of fuel to make the aeroplanes go. Ho hum. What happens now?

The origin of the word 'holiday' is the phrase 'holy day' indicating a day that long custom has designated the anniversary of some saint or holy person's birth or death or crowning triumph, all of which made a perfectly splendid reason to stop that day's work and start eating the fatted calf. Nowadays, engineering and technology has made it possible to eat not only the fatted calf but also the fatted octopus, prawn, frog's leg, sheeps' eyes, birds nest soup, hundred-year-old eggs and leg of crocodile on foreign shores only hours distance from familiar, boring, home ground. But at what cost? Are we being forced to choose between paying for cheap flights that are only cheap because the airline has economised on comfort, paying through the nose for upholstered reclining seats and space for a (small) handbag, or not being able to get on a flight at all because there aren't enough to go round and holidaying in one's own back yard?

I have watched several programmes lately on TV about people going on pilgrimages. In days gone by you could only get to foreign parts by boarding a ship and, if you were rich, hiring a horse-drawn carriage to take you overland, and if you weren't, employing shank's pony – your own two legs. Pilgrimages were mostly done on foot, the experience of the slow speed of travel giving one time to appreciate nature in all its glory – beauty of landscape, awfulness of weather and difficulty of terrain - together with the company of your varied companions adding depth to the whole spiritual exercise. I notice that today's pilgrims certainly found this to be so; and their sense of achievement as well as a considerable amount of self-discovery made the pilgrimage an experience that for many became the most significant of their lives yet far.

What is a holiday for? To take a rest from the toils of work. To enjoy new experiences. To explore new places. Perhaps more than anything else, to give yourself a gap in your everyday routine to evaluate life as you know it, and to see if improvements can be made. Sometimes an unexpected event or a chance meeting can illuminate your next step, and that, in its turn, sometimes has consequences that can only be from God.

# The 5th Sunday of the month - 29th May


For several reasons the service on May 29<sup>th</sup> will NOT be at Church Knowle. This is for a variety of practical reasons.

### Arty birds at Shell Bay from this Easter!





From April, eight arty birds will make their home around Shell Bay to raise awareness of an exciting project that's



coming in the autumn. Young artists from local youth groups and schools have painted the giant birds to help explain what the project is about. Those involved are Swanage Secondary, Sandford Primary, Montacute School, Dorset Wellbeing, Purbeck Youth & Community Foundation, Stoborough Primary, St Mary's Swanage and Linwood School.

"The bird is called Steve. We really enjoyed decorating Steve for the National trust and hope that Steve can help raise awareness of the plight of the wading birds, thanks Steve" - Quote from Aquila Class at Linwood School

Wading birds travel long distances to rest and feed during the crucial winter months. Poole Harbour is a designated Special Protection Area and provides an important safe space for these wading birds. In the past, Shell Bay was home to a large gathering of 4, 000-6,000 waders, including Dunlin, Sanderling, Oystercatcher, Ringed and Grey Plover, and Bar-tailed Godwit. Most of them spending time here between

September and March. Now, Shell Bay attracts just a handful of birds

If birds are repeatedly disturbed, they'll abandon favoured roosting sites and not return in following years. It's vital for birds to be able to feed and roost in quiet zones as they need to keep all their energy reserves as high as possible for their long migrations.

To help protect and restore this once productive and important roost site at Shell Bay, a partnership project between National Trust, Birds of Poole Harbour, Natural England and the Birds and Recreation Initiative are installing a trial 'Wader Protection Area' which will provide a safe section of Shell Beach away from people, dogs, and horses where waders can quietly roost during the winter. It will also provide an opportunity to see what species take advantage of these safe spaces and could potentially set a framework for similar installations at other busy sites in Poole Harbour.

# "Be aware of birds and don't scare" - Quote from Year 3 at St Mary's Primary School

We've mapped out the area, the orange shows the coastal footpath, and the yellow box shows where the wader fence will go. The coastal footpath will remain accessible, and you will be able to walk on both sides of the wader fence during most times of the year. It is only during a high Spring tide, that you may not be able to walk on the seaside of the fence.

It has been a real pleasure to work with the young artists of Purbeck and Dorset, they are an inspirational lot and their passion for these wading birds truly shows in their artwork. The schools and youth groups have been buzzing with energy and highlighted some interesting ideas for us. This is the landscape they will grow up in, and it is wonderful to have the youth involved in the restoration process.



# New training programme could help thousands more get online

A free training programme has been launched to recruit an army of special advisors who can help Dorset's digitally excluded residents get online.

> Open to any organisation in Dorset which works directly with residents, the new programme will train people who can champion online services to their users and

customers.

Called the 'Embedded Digital Champion' programme, the Dorset Council-run course aims to train 1,000 of the county's frontline workers by 2023.



A team from Dorset adult education centre, Skills & Learning Centre, were among the first to complete Dorset Council's new Embedded Digital Champion training programme.

Organisations across Dorset are being encouraged to find out how this course can help their staff and volunteers to become digital champions.



Dorset Council's portfolio holder for Corporate Development and Transformation. Cllr Jill Haynes, said: "Whether it's booking your doctor's appointment or filling in an application form, so many things can now be done quickly and easily at a click of a few buttons or the touching of a screen.

"But although it's easy and convenient for

most of us, what we need to remember is there are some people who do not feel confident doing things online – and that's where the embedded digital champions come in.

"Embedded digital champions will be able to assist customers there and then or, if needed, refer them on for extra support and advice."

It's estimated that every embedded digital champion will help on average eight customers a week with a digital related enquiry.

If 1,000 embedded digital champions are recruited, that could potentially solve around 400,000 digital enquiries every year. A survey of Dorset residents revealed that 11% are still totally offline while a further 20% don't have all the skills needed to make the most of the digital world.

The embedded digital champion training, which can be tailored to meet an organisation's needs, will ensure those digitally excluded can turn to someone for advice. Residents who do not have access to a digital device can use computers at Dorset Council libraries and receive help and advice from library staff.

A team from Skills & Learning, which provides a range of adult courses for Dorset residents, were among the first to complete the embedded digital champion training.

Customer and Business Support Team Leader, Julia Fay, said: "We wanted to do the training as a lot of our courses are online but many of our learners come to us with very low digital skills. "The embedded digital champion training really helped us take a step back and look at it from the customer's perspective. For example, not to use jargon. Don't say to someone 'go to the menu' as they might say 'what's a menu' or don't use terms like 'web browser' as not everyone knows what that means.

"We not only feel more confident in helping our learners to understand digital when speaking to them over the phone, but we also know where to signpost them for any extra support they might need."



May is a great time to see the underwater garden of Kimmeridge Bay in all its colourful glory, as the seaweeds have not yet faded from the sunlight. The waterproof snorkel trail guide can be bought from the Wild Seas Centre, along with mask and snorkel sets if you don't have your own. No need to book for this, the trail is there all summer for you to use and consists of 5 white buoys marking a variety of stations along the trail. There are plenty of shallow areas to rest if needed.

The trail should only be used in calm weather, when the water should fall clear. You can always give us a ring at the Centre to check conditions before venturing down to the Bay. It should be avoided in rough weather.
