



Annual Parish Meeting: We hope you were able to come on 23 May but if not we have a separate article on what the Council have discussed this past year.

Dorset Waste Partnership: Did you know bagged dog waste can go in any of Dorset Council or Corfe Castle Parish Council owned public general waste litter bins. You can also take your bagged dog waste home and pop it in your black rubbish bin - just never put it in a recycling or food waste bin. On 4th May Cllr Spicer-Short and myself had a meeting with Mike (Operations Manager, Place Services, Dorset Council) & Keiran (Supervisor Wareham Depot) from Dorset Waste Partnership. Keiran has recently taken on the role of Supervisor at the Wareham Depot and is keen to grow working relationships in order to be able to provide a public general waste litter bin service which is sustainable and works for all parties.

Platinum Jubilee: Dorset Council have granted **FREE PARKING** over the Jubilee weekend, Saturday 4th & Sunday 5th June, in the main West Street Car Park. Although please note there will not be a sign on the pay and display machines. Litter Picking working group: special thanks to the Litter picking working group who have cleared litter from Kingston, and around the village on three occasions

This election is an internal Council election, and I am very pleased to announce this year Corfe Castle Parish Council re-elected Cllr Steve Clarke as Chairman and Cllr Stephen Dru Drury as Vice-Chairman.

Dorset Council update from Cllr Cherry Brooks

South Walks House Dorchester – A 20-year lease for the South Walks House in Dorchester to local NHS organisations has been agreed by Dorset Council. The income from this lease will help towards paying the staff at the new Special Educational Needs and Disabilities school in Shaftesbury and the new children's home in Weymouth.

Illegal rave - Dorset Council were pleased with how Dorset Police contained the Illegal rave in east Lulworth on Easter Sunday.

Disturbance at Full Council meeting - On 14th April 2022 the Full Council meeting was disrupted by 2 protestors stating they would glue themselves to the table. Because of the ongoing security risk the meeting was moved to another room to continue. Dorset Council have arranged for increased security for next month's meeting.

Tour of Britain – The Tour of Britain is coming to Dorset; the event will take place on the 10th Sept starting in West Bay, passing through CC parish and ending in Ferndown. Hundreds of the world's best riders will be taking part.

Redlands Sports Centre, Weymouth – Dorset Council have reached a workable plan with the local community which sees the centre staying open.

School Choice – 90% of parents and carers were offered their first choice for their children's school placements.

Pressure on resources – There is still increased pressure on Dorset resources such as hospitals due to Covid. Dorset Council have issued a message asking everyone to think about using the 111 service unless it is urgent or speak to your GP and to carry on with face coverings and social distancing.

Moving Assets – Dorset Council is now leading on the redevelopment at North Pier, Weymouth Dorset. The Council is delivering on a £19 million project to decarbonise Dorset Council buildings. Pippins in Wimborne has now been demolished. Battle Lab at the Dorset Innovation Park has been handed over to the MOD.

Purbeck Community Rail Partnership report: The Council is pleased that the twice hourly train service to London from Wareham has now been restored. The council noted with concern that the Swanage Railway service to Wareham from Corfe Castle and Swanage has been deferred again. The Council has asked to meet SR management

Next Council Meeting – Monday 13th June 2022 (meetings are held on the second Monday of each month), at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter Room. To start the meeting is a public half hour, so please come and join us and have your say.

Corfe Castle Parish Council

Annual report 2021-2

1-It has been another busy year for the Council with some major activities being discussed and many completed.

2-The largest project was the installation of the wooden play structure in the playground -the "Castle" -and the repair of other equipment. The children of the village and visitors seem to love it. The replacement of the adult keep fit equipment remains a project to be funded.

3-This is the first full year of having 5 hours a week caretaker, Tim Lee, and by common agreement the parish is much tidier. Tim has carried out a number of repair jobs, which have saved money on contractors, and he is restoring parts of God's Acre. Many thanks Tim. Our toilets continue to be praised by visitors for their cleanliness and we renewed our agreement with JD Facilities Services for another year

4-The resident's car park opposite God's Acre has new drainage and the surface was restored. As it is a sand surface it will require regular maintenance but hopefully at less cost in the future. We are investigating the provision of electrical charging points.

5-We have sought to carry out repairs as soon as they are needed to keep the village safe and beautiful. One of the playground fences has blown down three times in two years and we will need to think of a stronger solution as "unusual "weather events seem to occur more regularly. The need to fund projects to a standard, which requires less maintenance, was one of the factors behind increasing the Council budget so that it could cope with expensive repairs.

6-We deliberated at length on the budget for 22-23, as it was a large percentage increase on a small budget. We realised that our budget could not fund core activities such as repairs without drawing on reserves. Inflationary pressures have hit everyone hard but our budget is no more per head than neighbouring Councils.

7-We held a special village and Council meeting to consider the application by the Corfe Castle Community Land Trust for 16 social and 4 market houses in West Street. There were strong opinions on the proposal but after discussion the Council decided to support the proposal. The Council has recently learnt that the application has been withdrawn and a revised proposal for 22 houses will be submitted without the open market housing element.

8-A community speed watch was started this year, which complements the Speed Indicator Device, which the Parish funded and is maintained by our great team of volunteers.

9-The Environment Group in the village has carried on with projects such as encouraging wild flowers and seed swaps. The group has pursued treeplanting possibilities and with others over 2000 trees have been planted in the parish. There is greater interest in solar panels for homes where the regulations allow it. A proposal for the Council to take on the Secret Field near the Commons allotment did not proceed as there was local opposition and the National Trust with local volunteers will pursue other ways of improving the site for biodiversity.

10-The Council asked Crazy 4 Corfe to set up a Platinum Jubilee Committee at short notice. The Committee has done a remarkable job and our Jubilee weekend programme must be one of the most intensive of any village of our size. Parish organisations, business and individuals have contributed generously and it demonstrates what a wonderful place our Parish is to live in. There will be legacy projects and the Council has agreed to site a semi mature oak tree in God's Acre as a lasting memorial to the Queen.

11-In addition to undertaking a host of projects and God's Acre our Clerk undertook a large programme of study to achieve the Certificate in Local Council Administration (CILCA) qualification. We thank her for all her work for the Council and for achieving the award in April. Many Congratulations. One side benefit of the course is that the Clerk is aware of the policy expectations on the Council and she has prepared all the required policies for a modern Council.

12-We welcomed two new Councillors this year: Melanie Roberts after a byelection and Helen Sumbler by cooption. We said farewell and thanks to Rachel Fooks who had campaigned fro the new playground. We would not have achieved much of the above without considerable work by councillors.

13-On wider issues the impact of the Covid virus has been with us for over two years and is still affecting the health of all of us. It has meant more people opting for UK holidays and Corfe Castle seems busier all year round. There have problems for businesses in recruiting staff to meet the demand. The whole area has seen large increases in house prices as people see the attractions of Purbeck for living and home working. Affordability for locals becomes ever more distant. The council has a policy of discouraging the growth in second homes and there is much more interest nationally in discussing policies, which will reduce second home demand.

14- The train service from Wareham to London is being restored to twice hourly from May but the Swanage to Wareham trial service originally planned for 2015 has been delayed again for staffing and financial reasons. We are frustrated by the delays in improving cycle and pedestrian routes in the peninsula in particular the Purbeck Park link to the village which does not have a firm implementation plan after 13 years of discussions. Walkers and cyclists have discovered the joys of our area but some routes feel unsafe. We will continue to press these issues.

15-We supported the campaign to save the Swanage based ambulance car and the campaign was successful. Unfortunately a new multi purpose health hub at Wareham will not proceed as promised.

15-The Parish Council published a Parish Action Plan listing all the projects we are working on and this is on our Website. We also have a Facebook page.

Dave left us with optimism about the majority of measures the EA are taking and advice to press for swift adoption of Coastal Change Management Areas (Cornwall currently lead the way). The overarching message though, was one of deep adaptation – Purbeck is changing fast and climate change is only accelerating that process.

Most actions that save us money usually involve **LESS**: consumption, waste, energy etc. etc. so by default we're in favour of them. What changes are you making or what are your life-long 'rituals' for using less and saving more? **Please share them with us.**

As most of us strive to cut our energy bills at the moment here's a reminder that just a few small habit changes can help save those precious pounds.

A quick search online and you'll see hundreds of tips, ranging from the rather obvious to the plain silly (like closing your curtains at night).

But what are the not-so-obvious things you can do around the home to have a real impact on reducing your energy bills?

Here's some that caught our eye:

- ➤ Wash in it for me! The 'Eco' program on a dishwasher and washing machine will usually be the cheapest. Or check the manual to find the energy and water use of different washes. Auto settings on your tumble dryer can also help you not overdry clothes and therefore waste energy. Alternatively, avoid using your tumble dryer entirely to save as much as £170 per year
- ➤ Hot Stuff Many people are in the habit of leaving baking trays and dishes in the oven as extra storage. Just be sure to take them out before turning it on because unnecessary trays will block the airflow in your oven, leading to uneven cooking and using more energy in the process!
- ➤ **Chill Out** Defrosting frozen items in the fridge will reduce cooking time (as you're cooking from chilled rather than frozen). Not only is this the safest method of thawing your food, but it also helps to cool down the inside of your fridge. This means the compressor will have less work = reduced energy consumption
- ➤ Time to Talk Dirty Dust lurking on condenser coils can prevent your fridge or freezer from cooling properly. Especially dusty coils can increase energy use by up to 25% which could be costing you an extra £45 a year. Check and dust twice a year with a soft brush and a hoover
- Ice Cold If your freezer isn't frost-free, defrost it regularly to prevent a build up of ice. Not only will it take up precious space where your food should be, but the ice actually acts as an insulator. Meaning your freezer has to work harder in order to penetrate that block of ice to keep your food cold

Church Knowle Parish Council - May Meeting

This meeting was held at the Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 10th May with five Councillors present. The first part of the meeting was the Annual Parish Meeting at which the Parish Council summarises its activities for the past year. The report concentrated on planning for which the Parish Council is a statutory consultee and outlined the difficulties that the Council has in having its voice heard and heeded at the Local Planning Authority. It seems that Church Knowle is not alone in this regard. The Annual meeting closed and the Council then commenced the monthly Parish Council meeting.

Cllr Fry continued in the chair with Cllr Evans as the vice chairman and the minutes of the last meeting were passed. A question arose about the number of second homes and the proportion of people who are permanently resident in Church Knowle and for whom it is their primary residence. It was agreed that by asking the right questions of the rating and election departments at Dorchester we should be able to form a good picture of this aspect of the community.

For the Queen's Platinum Jubilee a hedge has been planted at the village hall and it was agreed to install a permanent brass plaque to commemorate this. Not so much to glorify the hedge, handsome though it might be but as a marker for future generations to reflect on the long and glorious second Elizabethan Age. The UK has many historical monuments and memorials marking significant moments in our history and it is important to continue the tradition. It was observed that it had better be sited out of the way of the lawn mower.

Signs for the Playing Field to remind people that dog fouling is an offence, especially where children play will be installed as there has been a problem with this in recent times.

The Council considered two planning applications. One from Puddle Mill for replacement windows in a heritage building and the other for a change of use for the Grange Gallery to a photographic studio. Myles New presented his plans for the Grange Gallery and sought the Councils input on these as he appreciated that the Gallery had had some planning history. The Council resolved to submit "no objection" to both of these applications.

Correspondence was received seeking clarification about the running of a facility at Withy Lakes and also the plans that Cumulus Outdoors have for summer activities at Cotness. The problem of railway enthusiasts (is train-

spotters still PC?) parking apparently at random near good vantage points with little consideration for the local residents was bought up. It was agreed that the clerk would write to the appropriate organisations on all of these points.

The Council is pleased to have received an application from a local resident to join it and all being well we will have a new member at the next meeting. There will still be two vacancies and any Church Knowle resident can come to a meeting and observe, the meetings are open to all, and then apply to join.

The meeting ended at 21:04 and the next meeting of the Parish Council is at the Furzebrook Village Hall at 6:30 on 14th June. After the meeting there was a spirited informal discussion about the relations between the Parish Council and the County Council.

Purbeck Carers event

The six Practices of Purbeck have been busy getting ready for the Purbeck carers event which will be held on Wednesday 8th June at Springfield Hotel. If you are registered as a carer, please keep an eye out for an invitation letter if not already received, and I hope to see some of you there on the day.

Our own PPG will also be hosting a carers tea party in the Practice garden on Thursday 30th June, so anyone registered as a carer or cared for that would like to pop in for a cup of tea and slice of cake between 2pm and 3.30pm, you will be very welcome. In the event of bad weather this will be cancelled.

June is Cervical Cancer screening awareness month.

The NHS cervical screening programme invites all women and people aged between 25 and 64, who have a cervix for screening. Our cervical screening has continued despite Covid but many people delayed coming forward, so it is important that anyone who is overdue their smear test contacts their surgery to get this arranged.

The screening test aims to pick up changes early that could develop into cervical cancer if left untreated.

Cervical screening is a way of preventing cancer. It tests for a virus called human papilloma virus (HPV). High risk HPV can cause cervical cells to become abnormal. Virtually all cases of cervical cancer are linked to high risk HPV.

Your result will fall into one of three outcomes.

No HPV found - means you don't have high risk HPV. So you will be invited back for cervical screening in 3 or 5 years time depending on your age and where you live.

•HPV found with no cell changes - means you have high-risk HPV, but you do not have changes to your cervical cells. So you will be invited for cervical screening sooner to check that the HPV has gone. This usually after a year.

•HPV found with cell changes - means you have high risk HPV and cervical cell changes. You will be invited to go for a colposcopy and further tests

We are all looking forward to celebrating the Queen's 70 years on the throne with the many local Jubilee Events over the coming weekend. The PPG would like to join in the general thanks to the Parish Council, the Jubilee Committee (including our own PPG member Chris Clarke) and all the other people who have with imagination and hard work ensured that the fun events they've organised will lift the spirits of the whole village. Let's hope for good weather!

As we think back 70 years, it is also a good time to remember everything the NHS has done for us since its founding in 1948, four years earlier, in the wake of the Second World War. We take the NHS for granted but its founding revolutionised patient care, for the first time available to everyone, based on need and not means. No organisation is perfect, of course, but we certainly have SO much to thank the millions of dedicated past and present NHS staff for. This is a good time to pay tribute to them. Over the decades the NHS has faced challenges, not least the present perfect storm of ever-greater demands on funding (more patients, new treatments and technology) and timely access to treatment (to GP practices and hospitals), all much exacerbated by the Covid crisis. Who knows how this will be resolved nationally? What we do know is that if we ask the patients of Corfe Castle how we would like to be looked after at the primary level, the resounding answer is that we do NOT want to find ourselves being seen in a large impersonal medical centre. We treasure our local practice with the high-quality care, continuity of care and kindness it offers; thank you Dr Lepper and team. Bigger is not necessarily better.

I attended a recent webinar organised by the CCG's data protection officer on cyber- crime. The scale of fraud activity at work and at home is extraordinary (e.g. £58 million lost on shopping last year). We must watch out for 'red flags' like an email address that changes when we come to pay or suspicious requests, e.g. to update card information. We should ensure we have good

antivirus software, back up our data, use 2-factor authentication when possible. If suspicious or you've been scammed you should always report it (only 1 in 4 are reported) and change your password.

There are several events on the horizon for carers registered with Corfe Castle Surgery:

- 1. The PPG and Surgery are planning to hold a Carers' Tea Party in the Surgery garden on Thursday 30th June 2.0-3.30. The surgery will be sending you invitations in due course. We are so pleased to be able to hold this tea party again and do hope you'll be able to come. NB For Covid reasons, if wet I'm afraid it will be postponed to a later date.
- 2. The next Carers' Time coffee morning will also be on 30th June at the usual time of 10.0-12.0 and all are welcome.
- 3. As we mentioned last month the Primary Care Network (the six local practices) are organising a big event at the Springfield on Wednesday June 8th to thank carers. Various organisations will be there to give helpful information and advice.

Cows back at Studland Bay





Towards the end of May, Red Devon cattle will return to graze the dune heath at Studland Bay. The cows did a fantastic job last



year of grazing and trampling over the vegetation and creating spaces of bare ground for rare species. As such, this year they are back and better than ever! We have introduced a few more cattle to the group and are slightly expanding their range.

It is still unlikely you will see a cow, as they are grazing a large area and tend to spend their time in the wilder spaces, but if you do, please remember to act in accordance with your own and the cattle's safety. Maintain a safe distance, keep dogs on short leads, do not approach the cows and make sure to clear up

any rubbish. If a cow is approaching you and your dog, the best thing to do is let your dog off their lead and move away from the cow.

The cattle will again play their role as wild herbivores on the dunes. Cropping and trampling the vegetation, opening up new areas and creating a mix of



different habitats.







The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

On Monday morning 25th April I tested positive for covid. It attacked me with a high temperature and progressed along the usual route of hot and cold shivers, a sore throat, an aching and full-of-muck head, streaming eyes and nose, persistent coughing, progressive deafness, monumental sneezes,

aching bones and a stomach upset. If I lost my sense of taste and smell, I didn't notice it amongst everything else.

But I am still alive! And think how much more ill I might have been had I not been vaccinated!

One of the challenges of this 21st century is going to be, I believe, at least as important as restoring the planet to its natural balance but very much less popular: the problem of steadying and stabilising our own population growth. It used to be said that 'nature' regulated human population by means of disease and war – and looking backwards into history, perhaps it did. However, as a species we have become very much less war-like largely due to the weapons of today being more likely to wipe us out than to win; and at the same time we have become more caring about the wellbeing of our neighbours, and medically skilled beyond the realms of reasonable expectation. The speed of the development of effective vaccines against the various mutations of the covid-19 virus has been little short of miraculous – which makes me wonder what God has in mind for the future of his precious creation who, the Bible tells us, he made 'in his own image'.

Jesus taught: 'Love the Lord your God and love your neighbour as you love yourself' and he went about healing as well as teaching. The hallmark of God is love: that profound desire for the best wellbeing of another or others. But love is not indiscriminate; within it wisdom and common-sense abide. The extraordinary world-wide growth of success in many fields of medicine would seem to indicate that healing is at least as God-approved in this century as it was in the 1st century AD; and the global condemnation of Russia's President Putin's unnecessary and evil war against Ukraine in which millions of innocent people have been displaced, had their homes destroyed or been slaughtered, perhaps indicates humanity's abhorrence, once and for all, of war as an acceptable means to an end. Maybe we are at last inching nearer to the Kingdom of God on Earth.

Could it be that finding a loving solution to over-population will be humanity's final task?

Dear Friends

This year's Loneliness Awareness Week will take place between the 13th and 17th June. As such the Growing compassionate Communities charity will be playing an active role in raising awareness of loneliness. I believe that Loneliness and isolation in our communities is one of the most significant challenges facing people and communities currently.

So, let's talk about loneliness. In this month's Pioneer view, I want to explore this theme of loneliness in more depth. What is Loneliness? A definition:-

"Loneliness is a perceived mismatch between the quality or quantity of social connections that a person has and what they would like to have". Perlman, Daniel, and L. Anne Peplau (1981)

Let's now explore what impact loneliness has on our lives.

Research has linked social isolation and loneliness to higher risks for a variety of physical and mental health conditions: Such as, high blood pressure, heart disease, obesity, anxiety, depression, memory problems, various forms of dementia and even death.

People who find themselves unexpectedly alone due to the death of a spouse or partner, separation from friends or family, retirement, loss of mobility, and lack of transportation are at particular risk.

However, what about a remedy? It is suggested that engagement in meaningful, productive activities with others tend to live longer, boost their mood, and have a sense of purpose. These activities seem to help maintain their well-being and may improve their cognitive function.

Reducing loneliness and isolation sits at the core of the Growing Compassionate Communities charity's mission and vision.

What we seek to do through our groups and activities is to reduce loneliness and isolation and promote and facilitate wellbeing in all the communities we serve.

During loneliness awareness week, we will be a running a campaign to raise awareness of loneliness and isolation in the communities we serve.



News from the Library

The season of talks came to an end last month with a fascinating talk on the re-introduction of beavers into Purbeck. There will be a break over the summer and the talks will return in the autumn



There was always a tradition of having copies of newspapers and magazines to read in libraries. Over the years the number of titles available diminished as successive waves of funding cuts took effect until the service had to be scrapped completely. However, cooperation between libraries at a national level and the lower costs of providing online resources have seen a return on this service in digital form. This month we draw your attention to two of the digital services that members of the library have access to for newspapers and magazines (in the case of newspapers this is for both current and archive copies). Current editions may be read via a laptop/PC or through apps on your tablet, ipad or smart phone. Audio versions are also available in the same way.

Read and Listen to Local and National Newspapers Online

Dorset library card holders can access digital newspapers online, as well as emagazines and comics using *Libby*.

To get started, visit the Libby website (https://libbyapp.com/library/dorsetuk) or download the Libby app from your devices app store. You can access the online newspapers by clicking the **Extras** tab. You can

- access the full text of 1000+ daily, weekly and monthly newspapers from over 100 countries (and in 60 languages), including 166 local, regional and national UK titles
- newspapers can be streamed online via a tablet, smart phone (app available for iOS, Android & Kindle Fire) or web browser
- titles available on the day of publication, including supplements and up to 3 months back issues for most titles
- use the search function to find articles
- change the interface language
- listen to the paper read out loud in your chosen language

If you are new to digital library services visit the Libraries_West website (https://www.librarieswest.org.uk) for a quick guide to getting started. The

page also gives you access to all the digital resources (newpapers, magazines, ebooks, audio ebooks, ecomics etc.)

You can use Newsbank for free if you're a member of Dorset libraries. Enter your Dorset library card number prefaced by DORSET, for example, DORSET001234567A.



It is found fairly high up the shore as it does not compete well with some of the faster-growing algae and likes a rather open rock to grow on. For this reason it is easily trampled. Please take care not to walk through rock pools if you can

avoid it. Stick to the dry rock to keep both yourself and wildlife safe.

5G noticeboard

The trial of the 5G noticeboard at Kimmeridge has come to an end. There was plenty of feedback from the local community and in the end it was decided that Kimmeridge Bay was not a suitable location for this new technology. It was felt that the light and sound detracted from the peace and quiet of the area. Dorset Council, who ran the trial, have now disconnected the board and should have removed it entirely by the beginning of June. Thanks to all who commented. There is a noticeboard on the wall outside the Wild Seas Centre with information about tide times, weather, safety and local events, as well as some of the wildlife.

Wells in Corfe Castle

There are several places with the name 'well' in them in Purbeck – Blashenwell, Claywell, Knaveswell & Ulwell – and of course, the actual water wells (**W**). In the village about 30 are shown on the 1st OS map (partly shown below) but there were more.

The Corfe Castle Town Trust looks after two pumps (**P**) which belonged to the civic body of the town (the one in The Square and the one by Grace Cottage, East Street) and one well on West Street by Springwell Close.

Deeds frequently refer to access to a well or a pump for water. It should be remembered that pumps usually had lead piping and Dr Dru Drury had the pump in The Square closed because of this health hazard plus the fact that water leaked down the street from it which must have made walking treacherous in frosty weather.

In 1924, the pump was restored by Dr Dru Drury and Francis Newbery, the artist, and since they had paid for the repairs, the good Doctor assumed that he owned it and a few letters passed between him and The Town Trust before it was decided in 1957 (by which time the Doctor had died) that the pump

belonged to The Trust. It was still unable to pump water though and by 1942, Westport House's Sanitary Officer refused to let it be re-opened.

A stone was placed in the trough in 1982 to prevent it being filled with litter but within a year that had been stolen (the current stone is a replacement). Two fibreglass copies of the Town Seal were placed on the two pumps in 1989.

Lead piping was standard in the 18th century and for a brewer like William Turner, who ran The Ship (now The Bankes Arms) in 1755, he not only had a lead pump and piping but a lead cistern too for brewing. Lead is considered highly toxic now and lead piping has been banned in the UK for over 25 years.

By 1894, it was acknowledged that there was an insufficient water supply in the village and, in 1908, a schedule was drawn up of properties that could be connected to a domestic water supply and charged Water Rates. There was a little intermission, when the Bankes Settled Estates, and the Rector, refused to sanction a project by the Swanage Gas & Water Company to convey water through Corfe in 1911. The company had planned to construct a new waterworks at Stoborough and carry the water via either aqueduct, conduit or pipes through the village. A service tank or reservoir was to be placed in the NW corner of a field close to Arfleet Mill – not so far from the present Sewage Works. There is a fair amount of correspondence about this held at Dorset History Centre. Anyway, nothing came of it and Corfe eventually gained its own domestic supply 10 years later as the Pumping Station was built on the Studland Road in 1921 as a distribution site from the Corfe Castle reservoir. The reservoir lies above it on the north side of Challow Hill. An extension was added to the building in 1933 which incorporated an upstairs bathroom and WC.

MILLENNIUM PLAQUE TO BE UNVEILED AT WAREHAM'S HISTORIC ST MARTIN ON THE WALLS CHURCH

A Millennium Plaque to celebrate the 1000 year anniversary of Wareham's St Martin on the Walls Church is to be unveiled on 1st June 2022 at 12.00pm at the Church, North Street, Wareham, BH20 4AG. The plaque has been designed and carved by local Sculptor, Jonathan Sells and depicts the famous story of St Martin cutting his cloak to share with a beggar. The plaque is carved in Purbeck Stone supplied from W.J Haysom stone quarry, St Aldhelm's Head, Worth Matravars, Dorset. All are welcome to attend the unveiling and it has a great educational value for the community.

St Martin's Church has stood on the walls witnessing 1000 year's of the history of Britain from the time of King Canute. He is reported to have rebuilt the church in 1020 after an earlier place of worship at the site, believed to have been built by St Aldhelm in 7th century was destroyed by Vikings.

The millennium anniversary of St Martins is therefore an important occasion for the community of Wareham. The idea for the plaque came about when local resident, Malcolm Lewis, who helps run the not-for-profit initiative Art4Action, noticed the little sign on the tower while out on a walk with his family during the first lockdown in 2020. The sign gives the Church's probable construction date as 1020. He said: "I thought a sign should be erected to mark our fantastic Saxon church's 1000 year anniversary, so I contacted a member of the Wareham Church of England family about organising it. However, they told me that while they had planned to have a little celebration party that year, there was no budget to pay for a stone plaque."

So, just before Christmas 2020, through the second of their Art4Action auctions that year, they managed to raise a substantial portion of the funds needed to pay for a plaque, alongside a number of other important causes for the local parish. One of the other causes was to raise funds for the homeless, and the reason for this lies in the history of the Church.

Malcolm Lewis, had previously stated in a 2020 Art4Action article "St Martin would have been very important to the people of Wareham from Saxon times right up until the late Middle Ages, as he was across Europe. So it's not surprising that our earliest church was dedicated to him." St Martin lived between around AD 316 and 397. When he was a Roman soldier, he one day saw a freezing beggar in the street. He cut his cloak in two, and gave half to the beggar. Afterwards he had a dream that the beggar was actually Jesus, and the experienced was life changing. Martin became a Christian and resigned from the army. He later became Bishop of Tours in France."

In 1760 Wareham had it's own Great Fire, similar in proportion to the great fire

of London. It was during this time that St Martin's Church housed the homeless people of the town for 2 years.

The Sculptor, Jonathan Sells has lived and worked in Corfe Castle for 35 years. Jonathan has produced a number of public pieces locally and is probably best known in Wareham for his Cottees Auctioneers Statue, created as a double celebration of 700 years of Wareham Market and 100 years of Cottees Auctioneers. He also has public sculpture in Christchurch, in the Priory Gardens; in Bournemouth, outside the BIC, in Plymouth, Somerset (Highbridge) and London (Queen Mary University Hospital). Jonathan also has an extensive record for teaching Stone Carving and working with disadvantaged groups and those with disabilities. As someone who has lived with cerebral palsy and hearing impairment all his life, he has a passion for helping others to develop their confidence in the creative sphere. Speaking about his opportunity to design and create the Millennium Plaque for St Martin's Church, Jonathan said that it was "a great honour, to create something to commemorate a church of such importance to Wareham, with such benevolence in its history, both with being named after St Martin, and it's assistance for the homeless during the Great Fire." 
