

Gods Acre Rules and Regulations: <u>PUBLIC CONSULTATION</u>: Over the coming few months the Parish Council will be updating the rules and regulations for Gods Acre Cemetery, but before we change anything we would appreciate your feedback on the following topic, "Should we allow Non-Fresh Flowers?" Currently only fresh flowers are allowed. If say, linen or plastic flowers are allowed, they would be removed when they fade or get damaged.

Playground: It has been drawn to our attention that the slide which forms part of the new play equipment has recently been affected by bird droppings. New playground legislation meant we had to install the slide on a North facing side of the playground, as sunlight hitting a metal object could heat up to the point where it may cause injury. Whilst we appreciate with the close proximity of the trees this is not ideal, this was the best location for a slide. The Parish Council have recently applied for a Treeworks Order to enable us to prune the Ash Tree, along with asking our Caretaker to clean the slide weekly. Whilst we appreciate neither of these actions will solve the issue entirely given the playground equipment is in an outdoor rural setting, we are hopeful this will go some way to help.

**End of Year Accounts:** The Parish Council and Internal Auditor have approved the 2021/22 accounts for inspection by the External Auditor in line with regulations. Full details of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return can be found on the website or for a small fee to cover cost of postage and packaging a copy can be sent to you. Please contact the Clerk to request a copy.

Annual Parish Meeting: The Parish Council is legally obliged to ensure an Annual Parish Meeting is held. However, in the current format unless a resident has a particular issue they wish to hear or speak about they may choose not to attend. Moving forward we would like your feedback on what you would like to hear and see happen at the Annual Parish Meeting. For example its main focus could be on showcasing Parish groups and /or including choirs, music and drama. This is a meeting for the residents about the community not the Council. Please let me know what you think.

**Refugees**: Over the last several years the UK has welcomed refugees from all over the world, with the South of England housing 6.5% of refugees entering the UK. Corfe Castle Parish Council wish to offer networking and communication support where possible to local families opening their doors to a refugee, no matter where they are from. If you are hosting a refugee family please let the Clerk know if you would welcome help.

#### **Dorset Council update**

**Affordable Homes:** In the last 12 months ending March '22 there has been a 75% increase in affordable homes built in Dorset mainly by Housing Associations after securing grants from Homes England, with 529 families, couples and single people have been able to move into much needed new homes.

**Household Support Funding:** Now open for applications. Available through Citizens Advice, applications are taking on average 10 working days to process. Further Information can be found on the Dorset Council website.

**Information Shop in Weymouth:** Is now open and offers advice on health care, social care, wellness, community groups, volunteering & tourism.

**Dorset Strategic Alliance Conference:** The Conference is being held on the 5th July at Lytchett Minster School. The conference is for representative from across Dorset to come together and share ideas, opportunities and work together to progress activities and actions for young people with families. Further information and to book a space at the conference visit the Dorset Council website.

**Innovation Park (Wool):** A new facility was formally opened a couple of weeks ago by the Minister of Defence Procurement. Bringing together military personnel, academic institutions & private sector companies to trial and experiment cutting edge technologies.

**Fibre Broadband:** Dorset Council won part of a £5 billion bid for the national gigabit which will enable the roll out of full fibre broadband across key public sector services, such as schools, libraries and visitor attractions. Another 35 sites across Dorset are also set to benefit where there are no commercial plans already to roll out full fibre broadband.

#### **National Trust Corfe Castle updates**

**Quinquennial works:** The first round of essential maintenance (category A) has been completed to the castle and the NT have identified and planned in the next round of works (category B) to commence after the summer holidays.

Weddings in the castle: The NT had the very first licensed wedding in the castle on Saturday 28 May '22. The NT is looking at the commercial viability of hosting more weddings but have no current plans, to have any more until a business case has been completed and signed off by the General Manager

**Half Term:** There were over 16,000 visitors during the 9 days of half term and the Jubilee weekend. The castle opened it gates to the local community to watch the Beacon lighting and counting stopped at 1519 visitors to the castle that evening.

**Summer activities:** As per last year there will not be any large-scale re-enactors within the castle grounds for the duration of the summer holiday instead focusing on more small scale enjoyable medieval type games and activities.

May Day 'For the Village, by the Village': The National Trust is happy to say that they will be opening the castle on May Day next year to the local community for the May Day Bank Holiday. More information on this will be sent out in 2023.

**Next Council Meeting:** Monday 11th July 2022 (meetings are held on the second Monday of each month), at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter Room. The meeting starts with a public half hour, so please join us and have your say.

#### Our Recent Get-Together

A massive thank you to Ben Cooke, National Trust Ranger, for his interesting talk about the Slow the Flow Project, which has seen the building of leaky dams by volunteers on the East Common which help hold water in two small watercourses.

Ben explained how similar, larger scale, projects are being completed in the north of England following severe flooding, to help prevent similar floods in the future, and that Slow the Flow is part of a number of projects to care for and improve watercourses and the environment on National Trust land in Purbeck.

#### Environment Group Queen's Platinum Jubilee Tree Planting Project




Initial surveys of sites have now been completed, and details of the proposals were displayed at the Annual Parish Meeting and presented Council at the June meeting. We would now like to invite further feedback on our proposals.

#### **Corfe Castle Play Area Working Group**

Following correspondence from a parishioner regarding mowing of the playing field, the Play Area Working Group, the Clerk and members for the Environment Group met there recently to discuss possible biodiversity improvements. Following this, the Play Area Working Group have developed a proposal, and at the Council meeting on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> June, Council determined to consult with parishioners about these proposals. Below is an indicative plan of the proposals.

#### **Church Knowle Parish Council.**

June's meeting was at Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup>. Early in the meeting we co-opted and welcomed our newest member to the Council, Nicola Pitcher. She brings a wealth of professional accounting experience, is an active outdoor person and has offered to assess the state of the Parish footpaths.

#### The Neighbourhood Plan.

The full grant has been applied for and should the application be successful, which with a fair wind it should, then we will re-engage the same consultant and aim to take it to completion. A "made" plan has statutory status and requires community input culminating in a referendum.

#### **Fingerposts**

The Barnston fingerpost now with its roundel has been completed and very smart it is too. We will be looking at bringing the East Creech fingerpost up to the same standard while we still have access to the specialists to do it.

#### **Planning**

There was only one planning application at Bucknowle Cottage to which the Council had no objection. Cllr Brooks offered to set up instruction on the Planning process by a Dorset planning officer before the September meeting. The instruction will start at 5:00pm before the usual monthly Parish Council meeting. Despite engaging professional consultants, familiarising ourselves with the National, Local policies and the Act, the process and decisions made by the Dorset department are still impenetrable to the Parish Council and this instruction on the Dorset process is badly needed.

#### Church Knowle Phone Box

This is still maintained by BT as the mobile signal in the area is often bad. It is also a listed building and so has to be maintained as part of the village cultural streetscape. It has a broken handset and a report will be made to BT to repair it.

#### Holiday Lets and Second Homes

Dorset Council has told the Council that there are 157 properties in the Church Knowle Parish and that 29 of these are classed as second homes used for domestic purposes. There was a discussion on the resources used by

Holiday lets with regard to rubbish disposal and Cllr Brooks said that Dorset Council rubbish collection resources were stretched generally. Should the Neighbourhood Plan continue then the effect of second homes and holiday lets on the community can be considered and surveyed.

#### Correspondence and Other

Correspondence in response to queries and requests from the Parish Council has been received from Swanage Railway, Cumulus Outdoors and the Blue Pool. All have agreed to make their operations as sympathetic to the Church Knowle residents as possible and the Council is engaged in dialog with them in response to concerns raised by residents.

There are still two vacancies on the Parish Council and anyone is welcome at meetings to observe proceedings and any parishioner can apply (write to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk) to join. The meeting closed at 8:45pm

#### **The Beaufort Tower**

There are not many constructions in the village which can be said to have been built for one of the Constables of the Castle, but the church tower of St Edwards is one. It was built for John Beaufort who was a Constable from May 1391 until his death in 1410 aged 37yrs. There is no definite date as to when it was built but a much less elaborate tower at St George's, Langton Matravers, is said to have been built in 1398.

John was an illegitimate son of John of Gaunt (the 3<sup>rd</sup> son of Edward III) and Cathryn Swynford, a commoner. His parents weren't married until 1396 and an Act of Parliament was passed in 1397 to enable John and his brothers to bear Arms. John was created the Earl of Somerset the following day. He and his wife, Margaret, have a very impressive tomb in Canterbury Cathedral.

His heraldic badge was a portcullis believed to show the portcullis defending the gate of Castle Beaufort in Champagne – John's birthplace. The symbol is shown on the end of the town's mace and the eagle-eyed amongst you will have spotted his badge (presumably purloined from the castle) on a property just off The Square. It will look familiar, as it is now used as the emblem for both Houses of Parliament.




Beaufort badges shown on the mace and 'Bartholomews'.

It is thought that John built the tower as a memorial to his family. The entrance to the tower is via steps from the churchyard which leads to a spiral staircase. The original entrance lay inside the church which was blocked off before the church underwent renovation. The tower is 65ft (19.8 meters) high and the view from the top is breath-taking. Graffiti can be seen carved into the original lead roof before it was raised to accommodate the new bell frame.

The tower also contains the oldest piece of graffiti in the village carved by the village blacksmith into the left-hand door lintel of the ringing chamber:



1624 Jun 23 - Nicholas Cobb

On the West Street side, a pair of double doors stand under a perpendicular arch which shows two shields which are thought to have been painted. The shield on the left is lying on its side and so far, no satisfactory answer has been found to explain why this was

done. Maybe because of John's illegitimacy? It has been suggested that the two heads facing outwards on the right of the doors are John and his wife, Margaret, but they are very weathered.



Inside the church, looking up the rising columns towards the top of the arches four carved faces can be seen. The heads represent John of Gaunt and his wife, Cathryn, looking westwards whilst Edward III and Oueen Philippa, the grandparents of John Beaufort, look down the nave.

The most spectacular gargoyles and grotesques (4 of each) run around the string course at the top of the tower. The gargoyles were originally used to carry water the off the roof and scare the evil spirits away (successful so far!).



A gargoyle showing a hairy devil gripping the SW corner of the tower and holding the head of a Dorset horned sheep.

Right at the top of the tower stands the weathervane – another monster - a dragon dated 1855.



The tower is open to the public during the Church Fete in August.

#### Unveiling of the Millennium Plaque at St Martin's Church on the Walls, North St, Wareham on 1st June 2022


There was a report in the June edition of the CVN about local sculptor Johnathan Sells producing a plaque to celebrate the millennium of the Church of St Martin on the Walls in Wareham

The plaque, which was unveiled on 1st June, has been designed and carved by local Sculptor, Jonathan Sells and depicts the famous story of St Martin cutting his cloak to share with a

beggar. The plaque is carved in Purbeck Stone supplied from W.J Haysom stone quarry, Worth Matravars. St Martin's Church has stood on the walls witnessing 1000 year's of the history of Britain from the time of King Canute. He is reported to have rebuilt the church in 1020 after an earlier place of worship at the site, believed to have been built by St Aldhelm in 7<sup>th</sup> century was destroyed by Vikings.

It is with sadness that I have to share the news that Dr Zara Mufti leaves the practice at the end of July. It has been a very challenging 15 months since she started with us and we know that patients and staff will miss her very much. We wish her the very best of luck and success for her future.

#### This months cancer update

Bowel cancer is also called colorectal cancer. It affects the large bowel, which is made up of the colon and rectum.

Risk factors for bowel cancer include age, family history of bowel cancer, low fibre and high processed food in your diet, smoker and alcohol and obesity. Lifestyle is an important risk factor for bowel cancer.

Possible symptoms of bowel cancer

The symptoms of bowel (colorectal) cancer can include:

- \*bleeding from the back passage (rectum) or blood in your poo
- \*a change in your normal bowel habit, such as looser poo, pooing more often or constipation
- \*a lump that your doctor can feel in your back passage or tummy (abdomen), more commonly on the right side
- \*a feeling of needing to strain in your back passage (as if you need to poo), even after opening your bowels
- \*losing weight
- \*pain in your abdomen or back passage
- \*tiredness and breathlessness caused by a lower than normal level of red blood cells (anaemia)

NHS bowel cancer screening checks if you could have bowel cancer. It's available to everyone aged 60 to 74 years. Over the next 4 years it will be expanded to include everyone over the age of 50 years.

The screening programmes send a bowel cancer testing kit every 2 years to people who can take part. You need to be registered with a GP to receive your screening invitations. The test is called FIT - Faecal Immunochemical Test. It looks for tiny traces of blood. You do the test at home. The kit contains instructions of what to do including a prepaid envelope to send the sample to the hospital.

If you have any of the above symptoms, even if you have had a normal FIT test in the community, it is important to see you doctor for further investigation.

#### **Patient Participation Group**

The Jubilee Celebrations, from the Lighting the Beacon Event at the Castle to the Big Picnic, cheered us all, bringing us noisily and happily together after the years of Covid doldrums. Congratulations and thanks again from the PPG to all those involved.

Corfe Surgery and our PPG were well represented at a recent very successful Carers' Event led by the Purbeck Primary Care Network (the six GP practices in Purbeck). It was an informal drop-in event with many organisations having stalls where carers could get information, advice and guidance on what services are available to help them and how they might get extra support. We ourselves found it a friendly opportunity to talk to other PPGs, Hospital Friends' and more. We continued to discover how many organisations are out there available to any of us, not just carers, if we need support of some sort that doesn't require ongoing medical intervention. To give you three examples of groups you could contact; Help & Care provides free sessions to help you move forward with your wellbeing (e.g.mobility, anxiety, grief, isolation) - 0303 3030153; Steps2wellbeing is an NHS mental health support organisation – see its website; Help and Kindness is a local volunteer support group and includes Dorset's Food Projects- 01305 59 59 58.

I've also attended the three-monthly meeting of the local PPG Chairs. We were joined by the clinical director of our Primary Care Network. He painted a concerning picture of general practice nationally with GP resignations, early retirement and young doctors reluctant to go into general practice. There are several reasons for this. GPs have never worked as hard as they are now. There are fewer doctors. Patients see their doctor many more times a year than they used to. There's a limited number of hours in the day and, even though doctors are offering more appointment times and doing more paperwork than ever, it still isn't meeting the patient demand for access. This unfortunately

leads to patients getting frustrated with the doctors, nurses and receptionists. Many patients elsewhere have considerable problems with accessing care because of the shortage of doctors. Here in Corfe we know we are exceptionally lucky; if we have an urgent problem and phone before 10.30 we can be sure of being spoken to and then seen, if necessary; we can get through on the phone easily; we can choose to book routine appointments to see or speak to the doctor. The latter may be further ahead than you would wish but this is because time priority has to be given to urgent cases and the Surgery is at full stretch looking after us. We ourselves can all help our future care here by being understanding of the situation and making sure the staff feel respected, valued and encouraged by us so they can enjoy their work. They are amazing.



Here is what Sarah had to say about the children's entries

I love reading poems written by children. Their fresh approach and willingness to have a go are admirable. I enjoyed all the poems and hope the entrants will continue with their writing. As with the adult entries, I looked for the ideas, use of language, the appearance of the poem on the page, and the title. I also considered the age of the poet as language learning and experience will vary hugely between the early and top primary school age groups. I ignored spelling and grammar slips as long as the meaning was clear. Some poems included nice illustrations. It was hard to choose but I had to! I decided on 'Beautiful Queen' by Lucy Trim. It fits the competition theme and uses the acrostic form (look at the first letter of each line!) form which works well. It is thoughtful and appreciative. I noted the missing 'a' in

'beautiful' but the poet could include this when she rewrites the poem. She is 7 years old and this is a good effort

Here's what Sarah had to say about the adult entries to the competition. I enjoyed reading all the poems with their different ways of celebrating the Queen's long reign. They helped get me in the mood for the jubilee weekend! When reading poetry I look especially for ideas that hold my attention, for use of language including imagery, rhythm, rhyme, sounds and interesting words. How the poem looks on the page, and the title are also important. I was entertained by the story-telling qualities of 'Just Five More Minutes in Bed!', liked the geographical sweep of 'Commonwealth Kingpin', and was intrigued by the title 'A Conversation'. Many individual lines in poems caught my attention: 'I love my children, their children but they can be hard to manage.' ... 'Red boxes, PMs and the occasional dorgi' ('dorgi' is a new word for me!) ...'I wonder if she'll send herself a 100 th birthday card?' It was hard to choose a winner but finally I decided on: 'My Tribute to the Queen' by Anita Collins. I chose this poem because it closely fitted the competition theme: 'Celebrating Our Queen – what the queen means to you'. The poem is warm and celebratory, uses language well, and blends aspects of the poet's personal life and memories with a celebration of the Queen's reign and her place in our hearts.





#### The Reverend Anne Bond writes

Before the 1950s the idea that Britain could be regarded as a multicultural society was unthinkable, Romans, Saxons, Vikings, Picts and Celts having been consigned firmly to History. But the Windrush bringing British immigrants from the Commonwealth ushered new blood into this country, followed by more immigrants from the EU, many from Eastern Europe, Asia, and most recently from Africa – so that now, well into this 21<sup>st</sup> century, we are about as multicultural as you can get. No wonder people suffering intolerable conditions under totalitarian governments, or the ravages of war, see this country as a place of safety. We should be proud of that fact.

Broadly speaking, this is a Christian country. Approximately 3,500 years ago Moses wrote 'Do not oppress the alien in your midst' ('alien' meaning foreign immigrant rather than a being from outer space), advice which threads itself persistently through both Old and New Testaments of the Bible. But for us there are two problems: firstly how to establish a safe, legal, inexpensive and well-publicised way for 'aliens' to get here avoiding the illegal, perilous route across the English Channel in an overcrowded dinghy, hopefully thus putting people smugglers out of business; and secondly, we are a relatively small island with limited space. This second may well eventually solve itself in the natural to-and-fro movements of emigration of a proportion of our population; but it may also depend to a certain extent on successfully eliminating the inhuman crime of people smuggling.

Before Brexit, we relied on 'The alien in our midst' for the smooth running of the NHS and most of the public services on which we rely. Now that many of them have gone back home, there are plenty of jobs — but not enough of our own indigenous population to fill them. Russia's war on Ukraine has not helped, unavoidably bringing with it economic slump caused by consequent ludicrously high prices for some of the various essentials of life due to shortages of supplies and difficulties in delivery.

But how dare I grumble? My home has not been reduced to rubble, I have not had to flee for my life leaving behind husband and sons to fight, I don't have to watch from afar as the President of my country stands heroically against the brutality of the insane bully next door. Nor am I in the position of Babushka Z, the Ukrainian grandmother living on the Ukrainian/Russia border who innocently believes (because she has no way of knowing better) Putin's claim that Russia is freeing Ukraine from Nazi influence, and consequently now finds herself regarded in Ukraine as a traitor.

Appalling and heart-breaking as is the plight of Ukrainians, and eager as we are to help them, we should not forget they are not the only people who are desperate to find safety in this country. It is easy for us to empathise with the people of Ukraine because their way of life is very similar to our own. However, there are many people from countries whose culture, climate, and terrain is very different to ours, who are equally desperate to escape mortal danger, terrible living conditions, the mental stress of never feeling safe and of living in constant fear from the wicked injustices of corrupt government. These are those who, when their endurance runs out, become the victims of people smugglers. It should surely be not beyond the wit of our Parliament to

formulate a system of safe conduct by sea from the European mainland to Britain. Or from certain international airports to Britain. Thousands of British pounds have been willingly given to aid Ukraine; we Brits have generous hearts, and would, I am sure, give equally generously to an organisation dedicated to stopping the tragic deaths of families often including children, and putting people smugglers out of business.

Until that comes to pass, we as individuals can do little but pray. Praying is both the least we can do, and the most.

#### THE SQUARE AT CORFE 150 YEARS AGO

Modern dwellers in Corfe may be interested in all account of the Square written in the 1870's by C.E Robinson in his rare book, "The Royal Warren". He was staying at the Bankes Arms.

"Cockcrow still calls people in Corfe Castle Town out of their comfortable beds to an early breakfast, with appetites whetted by a keen morning and not dulled by a pernicious late-night dinner. The dawning light comes less and less palely through the clean dimity curtains draped across our bedroom window. Now is heard the opening and shutting of cottage doors and the clink of hob-nailed boots as the labourers leave one by one for a day's work in the fields.

A noise of brooms, a ringing clatter of plates and tip stamps the stair rosycheeked Betty with a can of cold water. Then a timid knock and a quavering 'Seven o'clock. Sir, and breakfast is nearly ready'. The latter is confirmed by a frizzling noise as of the frying of big rashers of bacon. Up and back with the curtains. Let the light in and look from the window on the Market. Place. This a Market Place? And yet as confined a space has been the centre of a well-known state. Now, as in other small towns, the Market in Corfe has fallen into utter disuse. It is said that the Railways have put an end to all markets.

"Having exhausted nearly all the sights of Corfe, let us now leave the Moscow of Purbeck for the Petersburgh of Swanage. Bright, seaside Swanage.

"A rumble, a clatter, flickering whips, clamouring voices and the sound of feet stamping along the stone-paved passage inform us that the Swanage coach has come in. And sure enough there it is at the door of the Inn with two sorry roans all trembling and the single dusty traveler treating the Coachman to a drop of beer at the bar. 'Three minutes are enough to unearth Her Majesty's Mail Bag, the contents of which would easily go into a tall hat, to pile our luggage in a very shaky pyramid on top of the bagman's and to take our seats on the high box. But we don't go away so sharply after all. One of the horses, poor thing, has a sore collar and having cooled in standing is determined to jib when called upon to go. Whips and prods with sticks are to no purpose. The populace, consisting of all the small boys not at school, gather round. Half a dozen of them to each wheel push the clumsy vehicle forward a quarter of a yard, but still the stubborn quadruped makes no move. At last a man goes to its head, the crowd pulls the wheels backward, the

driver lays on a shower of blows, and off we go ten miles an hour, up the hill amid shrieks front a pig, which is being hauled along by a rope to some hidden place of execution. Two such incidents as these make a very stirring day for the inhabitants of Corfe."

Writing some 30 years later at the start of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Sir Frederick Treves calls the village 'Ancient. and grey, a dim mumbling place of tales' and he quotes Hutchins as saying that the "inhabitants were of a supine disposition with it a propensity to idleness. The appearance of misery in the town is only too obvious."

Perhaps the 'good old days' were not so good!

Please note that Hutchins' poor opinion of Corfe inhabitants is not mine!




#### **New Book on Ukraine**



While full of (cracking) jokes, Belfast is incredibly tense. What's taking place is ethnic cleansing and what makes it so confounding is that the lovely, Protestant families on Buddy's street are complicit in the process.

Just my opinion, but I think this is one of the best Bond films ever, and a fitting end to the Daniel Craig era. Bond has left active service and is enjoying a tranquil life in Jamaica. His peace is short-lived when his old friend Felix Leiter from the CIA turns up asking for help. The mission to rescue a kidnapped scientist turns out to be far more treacherous than expected, leading Bond onto the trail of a mysterious villain armed with dangerous new technology. 

#### **Corkwing wrasse nesting**

Out in the bay male corkwing wrasse are busy collecting seaweed scraps with which they build a nest. Using courtship display they entice females (often more than 1) to lay eggs in this, & then fertilise the eggs before covering them with more seaweed. The females play no more part leaving the male to

vigorously guard the eggs from predators until the fry hatch. The normally shy males become quite bold at this time, and ward off any attempts to raid the nest.

#### Crabbers Code – How to go Eco Crabbing

Use a net bag not a hook, which can get caught in the mouths of fish & in people's fingers! If you only have a hook ask at the centre & we will swap it for a bag FREE of charge. Take your own bait, anything smelly such as bacon, cheese or a bit of your packed lunch. Do not use wildlife such as limpets as bait. Use a large bucket & fill with cool sea water. When lifting crabs out of water on crab line keep low so if they fall off they won't crack their shells.

Once you have caught your crab keep water shaded with seaweed, especially important on a hot day. Refresh water frequently, every 10 minutes or so to prevent animals suffocating from lack of oxygen. Do not put big crabs with little crabs as they will fight & you may need to remove one of them. Handle crabs very carefully, they can easily fall and crack shells or lose limbs. Do not keep out of water for more than 1 minute. Only put a maximum of 3 small crabs in 1 bucket. Do Have Fun.




