JULY AT CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

You CAN make a difference. How many times have you thought or heard someone saying, "it's only little old me, what difference would it make?". If I'm honest I've thought it many a time myself, but then last week I read something: "If you think you're too small to make a difference, you've obviously never had a mosquito in your bedroom at night". How true this is. If you have an issue, comment, question, and you don't know who to talk to or ask, contact me, if the Parish Council can help, we will, and if we can't, we will do our best to help steer you in the right direction with who to contact. No issue, comment, question is daft or too small to bother with.

Public Consultation - Gods Acre Cemetery Rules and Regulations: This can be a sensitive issue, however, to ensure the safety of all cemetery users Corfe Castle Parish Council is updating the current Rules and Regulations. Before we finalise and adopt the new document, we would like your feedback. Copies can be found on our website or by contacting the Clerk.

The main differences are:

- To allow, with some restrictions, non-fresh flowers.
- The ability for Council to remove/ dispose of items not permitted. i.e., glass and pottery items as these become brittle, get knocked over and break and can pose a danger to visitors, cemetery staff and wild animals.
- Detailed clarification on what is and isn't permitted within the Cemetery.

Swanage Railway – During the Annual Parish Meeting the issue of Diesel engines idling at Corfe Castle station was raised. As promised the Council contacted the Swanage Railway and Robert Patterson the new Chairman for the Swanage Railway attended our July meeting. Mr Patterson acknowledged the problems and stated where possible they will try to move stock to areas which cause less disturbance. Mr Patterson stated they are very committed to becoming "Good Neighbours".

During the July meeting, a member of the public raised the issue of heath fires created by Steam trains particularly in spells of long dry hot weather. Mr Patterson stated the Railway are investigating various options, including fire buckets and beaters, but also will when necessary, use the diesel engines rather than steam engines.

The Council had a discussion with Mr Patterson on the long delayed link to Wareham after an initial pilot service in 2017. It is still hoped to use SR volunteers to run the service. "However there would be no further delays" and Mr Patterson undertook that a 90-day daytime four trains a day service would operate in 2023.

Planning Application & Treework Application update: The following

applications has been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council:

• P/LBC/2022/03586 - 33-35 West Street, Corfe Castle. Recommend: No objection.

• P/FUL/2022/01606 - Little Underhill Sandy Hill Lane Woolgarston. Recommend: No Objection

Water mains replacement works, Studland, Corfe Castle - The dates have now been finalised for the Wessex Water mains replacement scheme to be carried. This section of road has had a history of water leaks and the works will rectify the history of bursts along Studland Road. As well as the benefits of a new pipe being fitted, the majority of the pipe will be installed in adjacent fields meaning future maintenance will be less disruptive to traffic.

The first phase of works has already commenced in the fields to the north of B3351 Studland Road with no impact to traffic. Phase 2 of the works will install a temporary 40mph speed limit and temporary traffic signals on B3351 near to the junctions with Thrasher's Lane and Meadus Lane. This will be in place from 5th September 2022 until 14th September 2022, the southern section of Meadus Lane will be closed between 5th September 2022 until 23rd September 2022. For the final phase of works Wessex Water will **close the B3351 from the junction with the A351 to the entrance to Dorset Adventure Park. This closure will be in place for 5 weeks between 31st October 2022 until 2nd December 2022 and** will run in conjunction with the Ferry Maintenance period. The diversion route for this closure will take traffic via A351, Ulwell Road, B3351 and vice versa.

Church Knowle Parish Council.

July's meeting was at Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 12th. Early in the meeting we co-opted and welcomed another new member to the Council, Carl Grice who lives in Furzebrook.

At the start of the meeting, in the Public Participation period, Derek Burt described the excellent work that has been done to furnish the East Creech



Phone Box, adopted by the Parish Council for a £1 (but as a special deal BT agreed to waive this fee), as a local information post. It is well worth a look and is a very polished presentation making good use of the box.

The red Public Phone Box in Church Knowle is still owned and operated by BT and they have undertaken to repair the handset and

ensure the box is in good clean order. Good for BT!

The Neighbourhood Plan.

The Council has been awarded a full grant for this, has re-engaged the consultant and we now have a core Steering Group to move the Plan forward. Any member of the parish is welcome to join this Steering Group and if you are interested please email clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk. More about Neighbourhood Planning can be found on the www.gov.uk website or by searching for "Neighbourhood Plan". The importance of a Plan is that it carries statutory and legal weight under the Localism Act 2011, giving the Parish real weight in any affair, specially planning that has local impact.

The Missing Creech Bottom Post Box

The small red post box at Creech Bottom has been missing for some months and in initial communications Royal Mail said that it had been stolen and that they would not replace it in case it was taken again. It is a short step from here to removing every post box in the country in case they get stolen. Not a really good argument.

This post box, is used regularly by people at Creech Bottom in Church Knowle and parishioners in next door Arne and is sorely missed. They were all cross that it had been stolen and even crosser that the Royal Mail would not replace it. It was resolved at the June Parish Council meeting that representations should be made at the highest level and that the agencies of government should be enlisted in support. A letter was penned to the Director of the Royal Mail and another to our MP Richard Drax. Well, it worked. Mr Drax wrote to the Royal Mail on behalf of the Creech Bottom constituents and the head of Royal Mail Public Relations wrote back (First Class stamp) to the Council saying that they were sorry that we had been put to all this trouble and that they would replace the missing post box within the next 12-16 weeks. A very good result and all credit to Mr Drax for lending his support to this campaign on behalf of his constituents. We are all cock-a-hoop as everyone said it could not be done!

Planning

There were no new planning applications.

<u>Highways</u>

A report has been received from a parishioner that the hedge and verge trimmer had been doing a very rough job and was not only trimming the vegetation but also bollards and anything else in its path. The bollards in question highlighted and protected a concealed hazardous drop at the side of the road presenting a serious danger to anyone, especially cyclists, that could fall into it. Dorset Highways have been contacted to get these repaired as soon as possible.

Footpaths

The survey of passibility and state of the footpaths within the parish is on-going. The footbridge on the Swyre Head walk is still in a very poor condition and a plan to deal with this is being considered. Possibilities include properly repairing the bridge or rerouting the footpath to a nearby bridge.

Painting the Archive Container

Quotations will be sought for contractors to paint the blue container behind the Church Knowle Village Hall that houses the Parish Council archives. Any interested parties can contact the clerk.

There is still a vacancy on the Parish Council and anyone is welcome at meetings to observe proceedings and any parishioner can apply (write to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk) to join. We are also looking for people who would like to join or contribute to the Neighbourhood Planning Steering Group (also write to the clerk).

The meeting closed at 8:50pm. The next meeting is at the Furzebrook Village Hall at 6:30pm on 9th August 2022.

The Haywards of the Common

Who knows when the haywards were first appointed in Corfe, but they were well established by the 1700s. Maybe the Rangers of the Isle morphed into the haywards? The haywards looked after the common waste land of the village - land which had not been ploughed or used for strip farming. It is an ancient title from Medieval times. Two haywards were appointed annually by the Manor Court Leet to oversee how The Common was managed. Today only one is appointed by the rights holders and they no longer have to swear this oath:

The Hayward's Oath

You shall well & truly serve the Office of Hayward for the year ensuing: you shall duly execute all such Process as shall be directed to you from this Court: you shall from time to time signify and present all such pound breaches as shall happen to be made during the continuance in your Office, and in everything well & truly behave yourself in the said Office.

So help me God

Their job included looking after the cattle runs, so that the beasts did not harm themselves, and the welfare and health of the animals is still part of his (or her) duties today.

They also prevented over-stocking on the common. In 1778, a list was prepared and given to the hayward of all those who had the right to pasture their cattle and horses on The Common (Beast Leazes). There was a reason for this as there had been a lot of encroachments there and people had been injured because there were too many grazing animals grazing. Nowadays a record of all stock on The Common is kept for Nitrate Vulnerable Zone records as this area is specially designated an SSSI and RAMSAR site.

In 1750, only 85 properties were entitled to graze their animals on The Common, totalling 295 beasts, but it was usually let at half-stock (150 animals). No more than 2 Bulls could be kept there. By 1925, the regulations had altered and no stone colt above a year old, nor any steer or ox, could be grazed on the Commons.

Any animals found straying on The Common after two days were placed in the Pound. If this was thought to be wilfully done, then another fine was imposed plus the hayward's fee for impounding the animal ... assuming that the animal was not illegally retrieved from The Pound and the offender caught as


happened in 1816 when a pony was taken over the wall with the culprit never being discovered.

The haywards also supervised enclosures, fences, gates and ditches and anything else that was needed for the smooth running of the land. In 1810, they were told to employ a mole catcher and to collect the payment for this from the Leaze holders. And when the trustees of the Wareham Turnpike removed a gate leading from Townsend to Lynch in the 1830s, they were asked to re-erect it because of straying cattle.

The haywards also oversaw the making of hay and harvesting which by 1925 also included half of the Bailiff's Hollish and the whole of Gooseham's at the southern end of The Common.

Every inhabitant of the Manor had the right to cut furze and collect sticks for fuel. If anyone outside the Manor did this, they were fined. No one was allowed to carry away cattle dung or dig up soil or make any dams or lakes. The problem with drainage on the southern side has always occurred and the way to Blashenwell regularly flooded. Corfe Castle Surgery

With the summer holidays now here I just wanted to remind you all of the previous information shared with you about skin cancer awareness - so don't forget to cover up, apply sunscreen and stay in shaded areas when you can. I also hope you are able to enjoy the sun and warm weather whilst you can!

Ovarian Cancer Awareness.

As with most cancers, ovarian cancer becomes more common as you get older. The risk of ovarian cancer increases steeply from around 45 years. And is greatest in those aged between 75 and 79 years.

The symptoms of ovarian cancer can be very vague, particularly when the disease is in its early stages.

Currently there is no screening for ovarian cancer so it is important to report your symptoms if you are suffering from any of the following;

- feeling full quickly
- loss of appetite
- pain in your tummy (abdomen) or lower part of your abdomen that doesn't go away
- bloating or an increase in the size of your abdomen
- needing to wee more often

You may also have these other symptoms;

- tiredness that is unexplained
- weight loss that is unexplained
- changes in your bowel habit or symptoms of irritable bowel syndrome, especially if this starts after the age of 50

These are all symptoms of other less serious conditions but if you have them or anything else that is not normal for you get them checked out by your doctor.

The National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) recommends that if you have the following symptoms 12 or more times a month, your GP should arrange tests - especially if you're are over 50:

- swollen tummy (abdomen) or bloating
- feeling full quickly or loss of appetite
- pain in your abdomen

• needing to wee more often or urgently

Your doctor will want to examine you and may decide to arrange some blood tests and an ultrasound scan.



Verrucas and their Treatment

The Verruca virus enters the body though small cuts on the bottom of the feet in places where there is an abundance of water, swimming pools, shower etc. The verruca belongs to a group of viruses commonly known as the *human papilloma virus*, there are over 100 different. Each verruca type is designated with a number 1-100. The virus lives in the sub dermal layers of the skin and appears on the surface of the foot as a wart like projection. They are commonly found on the bottom of the foot and called verruca plantaris (vp).

Because vertucas are a virus it makes them very difficult to completely eradicate the appearance from the surface of the foot. If we can eradicate the visual appearance of the vertuca, this does not mean that the virus has left the body. The virus will live on in the basal layers of the skin awaiting the right conditions to resurface again as a wart like projection.

Treatment options are wide and variable ranging from, do nothing and time may induce spontaneous regression, waiting the body's immune response especially in children, to alternative non invasive treatments with no evidencebased trails that say they work, to the more invasive treatments with evidence and ongoing clinical trials and research into the effectiveness of the treatment.

The "go to" treatment usually starts with a trip to the chemist and the purchase of an over the counter product, which is generally a good staring point. These products in some cases can regress the vertuca back into a dormant state just below the skin surface. If the vertuca fails to go it may be necessary to seek further help from you podiatrist.

The options are;

- Freezing with nitrous oxide and Acid based products not available over the counter as more potent, up to 30% effective.
- Falknors Needling, technique where a local anaesthetic is given to numb the area of the foot and the vertuca is pierced with a needle several times. This causes the virus to be reintroduced into the tissue below in ordered to stimulate the bodies own immune system to regress the virus. Up to 70% effective

The Reverend Ian Jackson writes

The Reverend Anne Bond writes

'The Kingdom of God' is a phrase often used by the writers of the first three Gospels in the New Testament – Matthew, Mark and Luke. The emphasis of John's gospel is on the identity of Jesus as the Son of God, the Messiah, the Christ, the one 'anointed by God.' However, all four gospels insist that Jesus was much more than an ordinary mortal, although he was in every way an ordinary man as well.

What is meant by 'the Kingdom of God'? How could an idea so ancient possibly apply to us, ordinary people living now, *twenty-two <u>hundred</u> years later*, in a world of instant communication and digital special effects that seem to effectively challenge reality?

There is a *now* and a *not* yet aspect to 'the Kingdom of God.' Just as Jesus was both as ordinary as are most of us - but *also* more extraordinary than anyone has ever been before or since - so 'the Kingdom of God' can be experienced both in the *now* of 1st century Palestine as easily as in the *now* of our day, as well as in the *not* yet of both.

The *not yet* aspect of the Kingdom of God is easily explained. There will come a time when the world as we know it will end, possibly by vast natural disaster, possibly as a result of nuclear war; or possibly because Jesus has come again a second time to this planet Earth to roll up present reality and to bring the Kingdom of God on Earth into being - a Kingdom with the One and Only Real, Living and Active God at its head, a Kingdom where there will be no more pain or sorrow but only ideal conditions, love, and eternal bliss. All those who have ever lived or died believing in this God will live forevermore in this Kingdom – 'the Kingdom of God on Earth'.

The *now* aspects of the Kingdom of God relate to the mindsets of people living in their present reality, in whatever country they find themselves, in whichever century, in whatever conditions. It is possible to enjoy the privileges and pleasures of the Kingdom of God in this *now* in which you presently exist, by the attitude of mind you assume.

It is not a question of physical good-living conditions; it is more like finding yourself feeling immeasurably blessed *despite* less-than-ideal living conditions. This feeling of blessed wellbeing seems to come as a direct consequence of declared belief in God, in persistently thanking God, in acknowledging that God is actually real as a living presence in the process of your life, even though that life may be hard to bear.

You may think it is easy to write this, but considerably less easy to live it. Suppose you are someone living in desperate poverty, struggling to support a family, every day a grinding effort to survive? Suppose you have a terrible terminal illness, your every waking thought being 'why me?' Suppose you are confined within an aggressive partnership without love but which you can't leave for fear of what might happen to your children? To name but a few of mankind's tragedies. How can anyone feel blessed or filled with wellbeing in those circumstances?

I can only tell you that some people do, and mostly they are people who believe in the reality of a loving God. They seem to believe despite reason, by instinct, by inner conviction of truth, by stubborn insistence, and because they can't *not* believe.

Again, you may think, that's all very fine for them but I'm not like that. But for some of them, nor were they, to begin with. They were just like you. But at some time in their lives they took the active decision to believe in God, to believe the stories about Jesus, to acknowledge that beyond all human reason there is in the world an influence alive and active in peoples' minds and hearts that can be relied on to give support and to nudge believers in the direction of wellbeing *despite* personal distress.

Our human lives tend to be messy, irrational, and inconsistent. Very few of us keep up a constant steady mindset let alone a constant steady lifestyle. (I know I don't!) However, it seems to be a fact that once someone has admitted recognition of God in their life, a spiritual awakening happens, and they begin to grow and develop in previously unsuspected directions. This process tends to be lifelong. It is this that is the source of blessedness and wellbeing. Living in such a wellspring of delight is the *now* of living in the Kingdom of God in this present, in this life.



living increase, before the funds are no longer available.

Citizens Advice is working with Dorset Council to administer the government's Household Support Fund which is now available to pensioners who are on a low income.

Nina Downes, Project Leader, said: "The government has allocated funding for pensioners to help with the increase in the cost of living and spiralling energy prices."

"If you're a pensioner living in the Dorset Council area and are on a low income, we urge you to apply for the fund. It's easy to apply and if you're not online, there are other options available."

Citizens Advice is encouraging residents to help an elderly relative, friend or neighbour who could be eligible for the Household Support Fund by telling them about the funding and helping with the application if applicable. The online application asks for proof of ID and providing pensioners do not have savings of more than £10,000, a supermarket voucher will be issued. Nina continues: "It's really important that pensioners apply now before the funding is no longer available. There is a time limit so we want to encourage as many pensioners as possible to apply. This is not a grant, they don't need to pay it back, it's money available in the form of a supermarket voucher to help with the cost of living increase."

Rebuilding and running a community railway through the Isle of Purbeck

UNIQUE VICTORIAN STEAM LOCOMOTIVE RE-WHEELED IN SIGNIFICANT MILESTONE TOWARDS RETURN TO STEAM FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 1948

A unique Victorian steam locomotive has been re-wheeled in "a hugely significant milestone" towards restoring the historic engine to full working order and returning it to steam for the first time since 1948.

Dating from 1893 and the last survivor of its class, London and South Western Railway T3 No. 563 had travelled a total of more than 1.5 million miles when it was withdrawn from service by the Southern Railway Company in August, 1945.

Bound for a scrapyard after being one of the finest express passenger train locomotives of the Victorian era, the T3 was saved from being cut up so it could be used to help celebrate the centenary of London's Waterloo station in 1948.



It is hoped to have the 81-tonne T3 locomotive back in steam and hauling trains, for the first time in 75 years, in 2023 for the centenary of the Southern Railway and the 185th anniversary of the formation of the London and South Western Railway.

T3 No. 563 boiler Flour Mill workshops Forest of Dean Gloucestershire NATHAN AU

Part of an ambitious £500,000 restoration project, the locomotive's re-wheeling comes as the Swanage Railway

Trust's 563 Locomotive Group appeals to the public to sponsor a boiler stay or a boiler tube to help with the cost of restoring the T3's boiler.

Subject to a further $\pm 150,000$ being raised, the restoration of the T3 – which is owned by the Swanage Railway Trust after the locomotive was donated by the National Railway Museum in 2017 - could be complete by the summer of 2023.

563 Locomotive Group treasurer Steve Doughty said: "Reuniting the wheels with the locomotive's frames, to make a rolling chassis, is a hugely significant milestone.

"With both driving wheels and leading wheels in position, the stage is now set to complete the boiler this year and enable the final assembly. "The construction of a brand-new copper inner firebox for the T3 has been the lion's share of the project so far and this has now been installed at the heart of the boiler.

"The T3's firebox has 830 stays so manufacturing them out of copper bar is no small task while the cost of the copper to make just one stay is £35. The order



for the boiler tubes for the T3 is also to be placed shortly with each tube costing $\pounds 50$.

"A limited number of original lifeexpired copper boiler stays from the T3 – which can't be used in the locomotive's restoration – are available to anyone who donates at least £1,200 to the T3 restoration project; a rare chance

to own a piece of special Victorian railway history," added Steve.

Swanage Railway Trust chairman Gavin Johns said: "We are working hard to ensure the engine's preservation for future generations to enjoy and the best way to do that is by seeing No. 563 brought back to life so it can haul trains for the first time in 75 years.

"Given its Victorian heritage, the T3 has an incredibly rich history to tell and it is unique because it is the only surviving tender engine designed by the renowned locomotive engineer William Adams.

"No. 563 is the only steam locomotive owned by the Swanage Railway Trust and returning it to working order gives us the opportunity to show our visitors what the railway was like during Dorset's industrial and social development in the 19th century.

"The T3 is a direct link to the Swanage Railway's past – right back to the early days of the London and South Western Railway when holidaymakers first visited Purbeck by train," added Gavin who is a volunteer signalman on the Swanage Railway.

T3 No. 563 is being restored by specialist contractors at the Flour Mill workshops in the Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire.






