

JANUARY FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

Proposed 5G telecom technology in Corfe Castle Parish: The Council recently received a letter from a third-party drawing our attention to a proposal by Cellnex to install mobile phone communications apparatus at Rollington Hill. The Parish Council has written to the communications company and asked them to join us at our next full council meeting in February to give us a talk through the proposal and answer some questions we have on the safety of the technology.

Kings Coronation: The Kings coronation working group for the Parish Council, will hold a meeting (no date confirmed) to discuss possible celebration events. The Parish Council would welcome help to organise an event from other local organisations / groups as well as individuals. Anyone interested in helping should please contact the Clerk.

20mph Speed Limit in Corfe Castle Parish: Corfe Castle Parish Council support the national campaign to reduce the speed limit from 30mph to 20mph in towns and villages and have established a working group to research the following:

- 1. An application to Dorset Council for a 20mph speed limit through Corfe Castle village and other surrounding areas.
- 2. The viability of CCPC making a joint application for a 20mph speed limit through all Purbeck towns and villages

Community Speed Watch: In the last 6 months the Community Speed Watch Teams have carried out 7 roadside sessions, some with the presence of a Dorset Police Speed Camera Operator. In total 4995 cars have been checked with 14 registered as traveling above the speed limit threshold. Of the 14 cars speeding 12 warning letters have been issued by Dorset police to the vehicle owners.

Annual Parish Meeting – The Annual Parish Meeting date and format has been set for 2023. The meeting will take place on the Monday 22nd May 2023 from 7pm in the Village Hall (Main Hall), The format will be very similar to previous years, where a few local groups will be invited to give a 3-minute presentation showcasing their group, followed by an update from the Parish Council on the work we have achieved this year and future plans, concluded by questions from the Members of the Public. The Annual Parish Meeting is your opportunity to let us know what projects you would like to see the Parish Council investigate. Any local group wishing to showcase their activities should contact the Clerk via email; spaces will be limited to 6 groups maximum.

Discouraging More Second Homes: The Parish Council 's motion supporting proposals in the Levelling Up Bill to discourage the growth in second homes was

agreed by the AGM of the Dorset Association of Parish and Town Councils and is being sent to MPs and other organisations

Traffic Management & Parking Plan: The Parish Council are working with Purbeck Transport Action Group, the National Trust and Dorset Council on a variety of issues including: Drop-down kerb requirements, A drop-off / pick-up point for restricted mobility passengers, Parking restrictions in West Street & East Street, Improved public bus services & infrastructure, Better rail service integration with other travel modes, Measures to cope with holiday traffic, inconsiderate / illegal parking, 20mph Speed Limit, Cycle routes on / off road from Swanage to Poole, & EV Charing points. If there is a specific issue which affects you please contact the Clerk.



Church Knowle Parish Council - January Meeting

The January meeting of the Parish Council was held in the Church Knowle Village Hall on 10th January 2023. The December meeting was cancelled as there was a spell of very cold hazardous weather. The January meeting was attended by five Councillors and one member of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Cotness Lakes

It was resolved to pursue the question of a formal planning application for change of use at Cotness Lakes to enable the local residents to have a say on the activities at the lakes.

Commercial Camping

Commercial camping operations in the parish require planning permission and/or a license and it was resolved that a list of those in the parish with planning permission would be sought from Dorset Council.

Neighbourhood Plan

This is progressing well and there is a full steering group of 10. A consultant has been appointed to guide the Plan to completion and much use will be made of the considerable expertise and experience in the steering group so the use of the consultant will be well directed and economical.

A meeting is proposed in February to share and discuss the main outputs and themes from the NP survey with the local community. Details will be posted on the PC website and the survey outputs will also be posted.

Planning

One application (P/HOU/2022/05768) at Puddlemill Cottage was considered but the Council was unable to reach a decision as no drawings were available.

Deer

There was a discussion about the large, (over a hundred was mentioned), herds of deer that are roaming the parish and are a nuisance and expense to farmers and other landowners, to such an extent that some have erected high fences to keep them out. It was agreed that these have become a menace and enquiries will be made to see how they can be controlled and their numbers decreased.

Precept

The expenditure for the past year and the budget for the coming year were examined and it was resolved to set the parish precept at £13,750. This covers the clerical and administrative expenses of running the Council, the maintenance of the Playing Field, the Cemetery and miscellaneous repairs and refurbishments that fall outside of the Local Authority, including clearing watercourses etc.

BT Junction Box

A complaint was received about the "No Parking" notice that has been fixed by BT to their green junction box in the village at BH20 5NG. It was felt that this was adding insult to injury as the junction box had been placed in one of the very few parking places available in the village, with no planning permission or local consultation sought. While it is already restricting the parking place, to take it out altogether is presuming too much. A letter will be sent to BT.

Creech Bottom Post Box







One piece in the puzzle of Corfe Castle's past human landscapes.

Several years ago, I read Philip Pullman's *His Dark Materials* trilogy. At the heart of the story is the idea of there being separate worlds coexisting in parallel,

between which, if you have the right knowhow or special tools, you can open holes to move from one world to another. That idea came to mind recently when, having been bitten by the archaeological bug last summer, I attended a talk by Julian Richards on lost Mesolithic landscapes. I was struck by his observation that underneath today's visible landscape are layer upon layer of past landscapes. We can consult maps made over recent centuries to see those landscapes that are several hundred years old, but we cannot see those even older landscapes that lie beneath without opening holes into the ground to see what is there. The test pit which we dug in our garden last summer and wrote about last November was one small hole that allowed us to peek into Corfe Castle's past landscapes. We have now had our pottery sherds examined by some knowledgeable people including Lilian Ladle and can provide an update on what we glimpsed of Corfe Castle's past landscapes in our hole.

Our test pit was dug in a part of the garden that has been undisturbed lawn since we came to the village in the late-1990s. Nonetheless, bits of plastic were the most abundant find in the topmost 10cm below the turf, one of the most abundant between 10-20cm deep, but not found any deeper than 30cm. With the boom in plastics being a post-WW II phenomenon, we can deduce that only the upper 30cm of our garden soil has been disturbed a lot over the last 75 years. These upper layers also contained almost all the fragments of ceramic building materials, glass and white glazed porcelain. Below one spade's depth modern stuff was replaced by an increasing abundance of both glazed and unglazed pottery sherds. Those found between 30cm and 60cm were a mix of post-medieval 17th-18thC and a few older medieval sherds. As we mentioned in our last article, the greatest depth at which we found a piece of clay pipe was at 40-50cm, and this dated from the mid-17th C. Also, the % of stones in each layer that were Purbeck marble scars (a few of which still showed signs of being worked) increased with depth up to 60cm deep (55%) and then diminished again

to 4% in the layer at the bottom of the pit just above the underlying clay. In the deepest two layers we dug (60-70cm and 70-80cm), the pottery sherds were a mix of 15thC - 12thC and seemed to derive from lots of different pots. Interestingly, the average weight of individual sherds of both glazed and unglazed pottery increased with depth from the surface to the bottom of the pit. However, almost all the sherds were considered by Lilian Ladle to be very small and there was a noticeable lack of larger pieces of rims, handles or bases. This made precise ageing rather difficult. However, we found no pottery from Saxon times, Roman times, or pre-historic times.

From all of this we speculate that the upper 30-40cm or so of our garden soil profile has accumulated or been added to or been significantly disturbed since our house was built in the late Victorian period. Below that depth all the finds probably predate the house and by 50cm down we are in the mid-17th C or older and by 60-70cm down we are in the $14^{th}-12^{th}$ C when Purbeck marbling was at its peak. The puzzle now is to work out how all this post-medieval and medieval material found its way to what is now a domestic garden. Was it all waste material dumped by the successive occupants of the yet to be relocated dwelling that used to stand in what in the past was known as George's Plot? Or was George's Plot a disposal site for general waste material from the nearby medieval village centre or even from the castle? With very few finds of any type at 70-80cm deep and no finds older than 12^{th} C it would seem that before then there was very little human activity in and around the land on which our house now stands.

Since our last article we have been fortunate to discover that there is a resident geoarchaeologist living in the village. Dr Ben Pears, a research fellow at Southampton University, with help from Finlay, very kindly undertook some high-tech laboratory analyses of soil samples taken from our test pit. The analyses tell us that the upper 30cm of the soil profile is dominated by organic material, indicators of combustion and has comparatively (though happily not worrisomely) high levels of various metals such as lead, copper, zinc, arsenic etc.. All of this suggests a lot of deposition of organic matter and inorganic matter such as ash from household fires (something that continues to this day around our tomato plants). Deeper than 30cm the organic content, indicators of combustion, and most of the metals decline with increasing depth although some other metals increase in concentration with depth e.g., iron, cadmium, manganese, and nickel. There were also five spikes in % carbonate content at roughly 10cm depth intervals from 20-60cm deep. Those spikes may indicate

discrete phases of addition of "chalky" material - perhaps deliberate attempts to sweeten the land and improve its productivity. Below 60cm deep the soil analyses indicated minimal evidence for human derived inputs with very low levels of organic matter, carbonate, indicators of combustion or heavy metals. The soil analyses therefore agree with the finds data in indicating a lot of human activity throughout the profile down as far as c 60-70cm, which the finds data suggest may date back to the 12th C but no further.

So, we now know what one tiny piece of the jigsaw puzzle of Corfe Castle's past human landscape looks like. Others in and around Corfe Castle will no doubt already have different, bigger and better pieces of the puzzle. Yet others may be interested in finding out what the piece of the puzzle that lies in their garden looks like and in doing so could help to build a fuller picture of Corfe Castle's past human landscape (beyond the iconic castle). If you are interested in following our example and digging a pit in your garden, please e-mail me at cvnnature@gmail.com. If there is sufficient interest, we could organise a meeting at which we might present our findings, and everyone could discuss whether there is the collective know-how and appetite to make a "community dig" happen in 2023.



Salisbury Cathedral's green initiatives have continued with the creation of a bug cathedral. The Revd Pete Atkinson, minor canon for young people, said that following the gaining of the Eco Church Gold award, the cathedral had run a project in the summer to engage young people in its life.

Pete and the education team ran a Youth Eco
Day, to which a group of 20 12- 16-year-olds
came along to create a bug cathedral and
explore the cathedral via a tower tour.
"The young people from Salisbury and
the surrounding area had the opportunity

to create an amazing environment for insects in an enormous bug cathedral, which was built by the cathedral's carpenter, Richard Pike," he said. Since then, the cathedral has run an evening bat walk and set up a weekly eco club.

Many people have a real interest in finding out all about their ancestors and who they were related to, forming a family tree. But what is behind this desire to find our family roots? I believe there are two major motivating forces. The first is the need to express our individuality and uniqueness- we need to know who we are and discover our real identity. The second is the need to belong and be part of something bigger than ourselves. It is a combination of these two that causes us from time to time to look back at our genetic ancestry and find out a bit about our forebears and what part they played, if any, in making us the people we are today. God understands these basic needs within us and, on a deeper spiritual level gives us the answers to both of these needs in His Word, the Bible. He reminds us that we are uniquely created and fashioned in His image. We are, in the words of the Psalmist, fearfully and wonderfully made. Each individual person reading this is special to God. There is, as it were, a spiritual DNA in created man that separates us from all other forms.

But we were made not just to express our individuality. The Bible tells us we were created by God, through God and for God. We were made to have a living loving relationship with our father God. Sadly, through man's rebellion and sin, that contact with mankind became lost and God became like some long-lost relative. This inherited human nature explains why we are so eager today to live without God. Tragically, even the resulting catastrophes all around us hasn't weakened our stubborn resolve to go it alone and work out our own lifestyle plan.

But surely as the seasons come and go, our Creator is there to remind us of our spiritual ancestry. The image may be tarnished but deep down inside there is that sense of eternity that just won't go away. And God in His love and mercy has made a way to bring us back into His family, that we might be the people He wants us to be. The key to this is the Lord Jesus and the starting point for our voyage of discovery begins at the Cross of Calvary where Jesus won for us the victory over sin.

Consider this. We were made by God for God. We were made to express and celebrate the uniqueness of our individuality, and yet at the same time we were also made to be conformed to God's image.

The alternative is a world without God... we exist then we cease to exist-followed by nothingness-oblivion. Is it time to choose? Is it time to open the Bible and find out the wonderful Good News as to who you really are?

I did 36 years ago and it was truly the most wonderful moment of my life...

The Rambling Gardener

Wishing you a good 2023 and may your new year wishes come true. I must not tell anyone my wish, but I do hope by the end of 23 I don't have to buy anything wrapped in man-made material that is so damaging to the environment.

What incredible events Purbeck put on in December; people cooked good food for coffee mornings, many people sang for us inside and out, others arranged walks and did plays. A thank you goes to every one of them that put in their time and money.

The sudden freeze in December took me by surprise. I had hoped for some cold weather to keep things healthy but was not expecting a week of freezing weather. Plants can acclimatise to cold if it comes slowly, but that freezing weather was a shock to many species, it will be interesting this summer to see the results!

In 1963 at the end of December we had freezing snow with an east wind that blew the snow into drifts. It filled the road to the east and did not thaw out until the end of March. At the farm we had to dig out a 23-foot drift to get out of the farm. To avoid throwing away all our cows' milk we took churns of milk down the fields to Swanage and then along the cleared main road to a milk collection point in Corfe Castle as the milk tankers were unable to get to the farms. Also, our water supply froze up, and for more than a month our family, including three children under six and a baby born in early January, had only 10 gallons a day of usable water, hauled from a spring daily. I wonder what 2023 will bring us?

In January there are important jobs to do on good days outside in a green house, porch or garage such as mixing compost for potting. Also sowing early plants like love-in-a-mist, hollyhocks, foxgloves and many early vegetables as well as removing any dead leaves on plants to decrease the build-up of infective agents like rust spots. A very important job is sitting in a warm room dreaming and planning for the coming year and looking through seed and plant catalogues. Look out of your windows and see where winter flowering plants or interesting foliage are needed for the next winter, and talk to neighbours if that is your main visual outlook. There are many plants, from the 2" high alpine saxifrage to trees like the little *prunus autumnal*, that can flower much of the winter. Think especially about planting bulbs to give colour all year in beds, pots and hanging baskets both inside the house and out. Having plants to look after keeps me challenged, happy and healthy, nature is mentally healing.

Sowing seeds is the cheapest way to keep a garden full although it is tempting to buy plants that someone else has started and then can get almost instant vegetables, foliage or flowers. If you order in January, you will have a better selection, but any bare-rooted trees, shrubs, and plants can be ordered up to April.

I hope that you have had a wonderful festive season and that you are looking forward to the coming year. Rachel.

Crisis Support Bus

Citizens Advice in East Dorset & Purbeck is currently raising funds for a Crisis Support Bus which will provide vulnerable residents with access to free advice and support. The cost of living crisis has meant that many more people are in need of advice with some unable to access current services due to rural isolation, restricted mobility, cost of fuel or limited access to public transport. The mobile advice unit will deliver a service to rural areas in and around Purbeck & East Dorset, for those who cannot easily access outreaches, local

libraries or are digitally excluded. It is anticipated that the bus will be ready for service early 2023.



January beach combing at Kimmeridge

In January sea temperatures have dropped substantially, and many shallow water species move offshore to avoid the worst of the winter storms. It can be difficult spotting marine life at this time of year, but a winter walk along a blustery seashore can result in some interesting finds. Most obvious will be the oystercatchers, black headed gulls, rock pipits and pied wagtails. All of these will be making the most of the flies and invertebrates on the strandline and in the vast mat of seaweed that accumulates on the beach after winter storms. Cuttlefish bones can also be found in good numbers with many of these having died after breeding in the summer months, leaving just their white bones to float on the sea's surface. The rough weather brings them ashore in large numbers at this time of year. The size can range from a few centimetres long to the largest at over 20cm.

Also washing up on the beach are logs, seaweeds, fishing equipment and plastic litter items, and it is worth looking to see if there are any goose barnacles attached to this stuff. These will have washed in from the Atlantic Ocean where the drifting larvae attach to floating objects and grow in large clusters. Some may have travelled from as far away as North America. With a flexible, wormlike stalk and a head covered in triangular white shell-plates, these strange looking animals are often still alive when they strand. With stalks writhing and shell plates opening and closing to reveal feathery feeding arms, they create a bizarre sight. Once washed up these animals soon die but other creatures such as Columbus crab, an American species, have been found recently along the Dorset coast.

Unfortunately, you don't have to venture far to see the problem of marine litter first hand and a stroll along Kimmeridge beach following a storm can be quite an eye opener. There is increasing concern that the huge amounts of litter in the ocean are acting like a super-highway for non-native species to reach our shores, with potentially devastating consequences for our native marine life. While the global scale of the problem can seem overwhelming, there are small changes we can all make in our everyday lives that will have a huge impact. Choosing fruit and vegetables not wrapped in plastic, using re-usable cloth shopping bags,

carrying a refillable drink bottle instead of buying bottles of water and saying 'No' to plastic drinking straws when out for a drink are easy things we can all do with a little effort. The less plastic we buy, the less plastic will be made and the less will escape into the environment. Why not start your journey towards 'plastic-free living' today? There has never been a better time!

With new species arriving regularly, it is important to record when and where this happens. If you are out and about on the beach this winter, please keep an eye out for unusual wildlife and let us know. We are always interested in what you find (native or non-native) and with a photo taken on your camera phone and a location, emailed to us at the above address, we should be able to identify and record it.
