JUNE 2023 FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

Annual Parish Meeting: Another year and another Annual Parish Meeting has taken place. Turnout this year was a little disappointing, but maybe we can take this as a positive sign and that you think the Parish Council is working as you would wish? However, the Parish Council see the Annual Parish Meeting as a way for you the residents, to talk Face to Face with your local Councillors, not only to voice what you think the Parish Council has done wrong or where it could make improvements, but to have your say on what area or facilities you would like to see the Parish Council develop next year. Next year's format will be very similar to previous years, in that there will be a couple of local groups / organisations giving a quick 5-minute talk, however next year you can sit and listen whilst enjoying a nice refreshment or two!

Correspondence with the Parish Council: There was once a time when the Parish Council had a notice on their website stating, if you contacted the Parish Council, you had to assume your correspondence and any personal details contained would be forwarded to relevant parties, I can hear the screams now! Times have changed and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) now states that your personal details must not be shared with anyone or stored unless you give specific permission to share or store your data. Personal Data is not just your name, email address, phone number etc, it can be anything within the correspondence which identifies you. For example "my neighbour Mr XYZ", when Mr XZY only has one neighbour; or "my dog Fido" when Fido is not a common dog name! Although the Parish Council firmly follow the GDPR rules, please rest assured when you send correspondence to the Parish Council where permission is granted your message will be forwarded to the relevant people. Where permission has not been granted but is required to ensure the correspondence makes sense, permission will be sought, Finally the most common method practised is that where personal data can be redacted (blocked out) before forwarding, it will be removed.

Illegal Rave: The Parish Council is aware that the illegal rave held on 27th May 2023 caused upset to some residents for various reasons. In response to this the Parish Council contacted Dorset Police and asked someone attend the June meeting to explain what happened, and what measures are being put in place to stop this from happening again. Sergeant Simon Colvin from the Purbeck Neighbourhood Policing Team attended and explained the events as they unfolded and the Dorset Police procedures for dealing with such an event. Sgt Colvin has reassured us that although the illegal Rave has long since gone, the work behind the scene by the Criminal Investigations Department continues on the potentially criminal aspects.

The Council will be writing to the Police and Crime Commissioner for Dorset David Sidwick asking for a strategy to prevent future occurrences.

Campaign: Corfe Castle Parish Council will shortly be writing to Dorset Council to request, that Dorset Council underwrite the cost of an accessible and chargeable minibus which would act as a shuttle between Purbeck Park, the National Trust Car Park and the Village Centre. This is because the Council believes the proposed cycle and new pedestrian access is still years away. There would then be a reasonable alternative to parking at West Street and it might reduce the number of cars entering Corfe Castle trying to find parking when visiting Corfe Castle.

Goat Path: Over the last few months the National Trust has been keeping the Parish Council up to date with the deterioration of the "Goat Path" which runs along the Mound. The National Trust appreciate this is a public footpath and is working with Dorset Council to ensure the path remains in place, and safe to use. Due to the location of the path, it is not a simple fix, so both the National Trust and Dorset Council are looking into ways this path can be made safe to continue to use, whilst not disturbing any archaeology which may lay beneath.

Planning application & Treework application update: The following applications have been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council, for full details including proposed works please see the Dorset Council website:

Application No: P/LBC/2023/02107 & P/HOU/2023/02104, **Location:**18 West Street, Kingston BH20 5LH. **Proposal:** Internal changes, with new iron downpipe on the exterior. **Recommend:** No objection, due to the drainpipe not being particularly visible

Application No: P/ADV/2023/02753, **Location**: The Castle Inn BH20 5EE **Proposal**: Replacement external signage and lighting, **Recommendation**: CCPC object as although the proposed signs seem sympathetic to the listed building and largely match what is already in place, the proposed change of colour from white to blue to the building is not sympathetic to the surrounding buildings or the street scene.

Application No: P/HOU/2023/01990, **Location**: 10 Halves Cottages, BH20 5EY, Proposal: Garage, Car Port & loft conversion. **Recommend** No objection. The project for the garage and car port fits neatly into the available space which is currently waste land or driveway. There are no overlooking windows from the neighbours. This could be considered overdevelopment however on site it looks OK. It will be the only house with third story dormer windows in the street; however, they are not obtrusive and do not overlook neighbours.

Application No: P/LBC/2023/03088; **Location**: Rempstone Hall; **Proposal**: Replacement windows. **Recommendation**: No objection. This application is to replace old, dilapidated metal windows with modern double glazed aluminium windows. It seems a very sensible solution which will improve the energy efficiency of Rempstone Hall.

Application No: P/TRC/2023/02878; **Location**: 108 West Street, BH20 5HE **Proposal**: G1 Hazel and purple leaf hazel - Coppice., T1 Beech - Reduce height by 3-4 metres. Reduce side by 2-3 metres retaining a natural flowing branch line. T2 Lime - Reduce lime to match the adjacent lime tree. T3 Cherry - Fell to ground level. Grind out resulting stump to a minimum of 200mm below ground level. **Recommendation**: No objection as a replacement tree will be planted to replace the felled Cherry Tree.

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



Recent Get-Together

In June we had an insightful session with Amanda, a Recycling Officer from Dorset Council. Amanda was very generous with her time, answering dozens of questions.

We're inspired to do more - it was clear that none of us were fully confident what can/can't be recycled in our roadside collections! It also became clear that there's a mine-field of information out there about what else can be recycled within the community and how. Can you help Corfe lead the way in community recycling?

Next Get-Together

Recycling Myth Busting / Top Tips

- Recycling is great but reducing the amount of waste you produce in the first place is even better! Try Dorset Council's Zero Waste Map to help
- Various community collections exist for dozens of hard-to-recycle items e.g.
 - Pens & pencils at Wareham Library (We've asked Corfe about starting!)
 - Take soft plastics (crisp/pasta packets, fruit punnet lids etc) to the Co-p
- A quick rinse of plastic food tubs is fine, no need to wash them thoroughly
- Try to bundle items under 5cm together e.g. in an envelope. This stops small items literally falling through the system!
- Tetra Pak style cartons (Juice etc) = General waste collection, NOT recycling
- Tin foil / trays = General waste collection, NOT recycling
- Most shop receipts = General waste collection, NOT recycling
- Push beer bottle tops back on the bottle
- If still disposing of trigger spray bottles (rather than refilling), the trigger section is general waste (wrong plastic!), the bottle can be recycled
- There's a Litter Lotto app. You can win a cash prize for simply taking a picture of you putting your recycling in the bin

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Church Knowle Parish Council - June Meeting

The June meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 13th June at 6:30pm. It was attended by four members of the Council (Cllr Parker in the chair), the Dorset Councillor, Cherry Brookes and six members of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Planning

The applicant for P/FUL/2023/03016, Mr John Hole, presented his plans to create a new house from two cottages at Bradle Farm. He explained that this would enable him and his wife to move into this new house allowing him to pass over the main farmhouse to his son and his family to ensure continuity in the running of the farm. The construction will be of Purbeck stone and slate with as much of the existing material The Council resolved to have No Objection to the application.

Neighbourhood Plan

A meeting of the Steering Group will be called to replace the Chairman who has resigned and to take the Plan forward. The Parish Council remains committed to the Plan and will apply for more grant funding should this become available.

Highways

Speed Limit

The application for a 20 mph speed limit was submitted some months ago and is being processed by Dorset Highways. Cllr Brookes said that the parked cars in Church Knowle meant that the road would likely be regarded as "self-regulated" which mean that a speed limit may be deemed unnecessary. However this still leaves the speed limit through Church Knowle Village and indeed throughout the parish as the National Speed Limit of 60 mph.

Footpath 30

There was discussion about the route of FP30 near Charmswell. It seems that the commonly used path is a "permissive path" which does not accord it the same protection as a statutory footpath. The landowner can withdraw the permission. The Council would therefore not support extinguishing the

statutory footpath at Charmswell as this would make a break in the public's right to walk the route. This will be examined further at the next meeting.

<u>Tenders for Painting the Archive Container in the Church Knowle Village Hall</u> <u>Car Park.</u>

Tenders are sought for spray painting the blue archive container in the Village Hall car park. The document can be downloaded from the website under Tenders or requested from the Clerk at clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk.

Presentation on Health and Wildlife Aspects of 5G Masts.

There will be a short presentation on the health effects and dangers to wildlife of the 5G masts being installed in the region. The inadequateness of these regulations is the subject of a judicial review.

Vacancies on the Parish Council

Derek Burt was co-opted onto the Parish Council with a vote of three to one. As he was not present to sign the Declaration of Acceptance of Office a dispensation was agreed by the Council as per s83(4)(c) Local Government Act 1972 that he could sign this at a later date. This leaves three vacancies on the Parish Council and anyone wishing to join can email the Clerk at clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk or by post to Harry Warren House, Studland BH19 3AN

The June meeting finished at 8:18pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Church Knowle Village Hall at 6:30 on 11th July.



Springing into the National Trust!

Starting any new job can be daunting, but when I began my role with the National Trust, I was straight in at the deep end! My job is to promote all the nature conservation work the Trust, our partners and local residents are doing in Purbeck. Here are some highlights from my first three weeks:

Springwatch shines a spotlight on Purbeck

My first week began on 29 May – which coincided with the BBC's filming of Springwatch in Purbeck! Presenter, Megan McCubbin, travelled across the area, meeting some of the organisations who are working together to protect and enhance the incredible wildlife here.

They visited Corfe Castle to present a story about the peregrine falcons that are nesting on the Keep (I won't mention the 'smashing' time Megan had!). Another item about bats was filmed at Winspit – Purbeck is home to 15 of the 18 species of bat in the UK. They feed on insects, and roost in crevices in caves and old buildings, such as Corfe Castle (watch for them at dusk).

Two other sections

were filmed at the beach at Studland. One was about the sand dunes, where all six of the UK's native reptiles can be found, including smooth snakes and sand lizards. The other was about the seagrass meadows, a precious habitat which is home to both the short-snouted and spiny seahorse.

So, what was my role in all this? I had to take photos, write posts for our social media channels, and even join other staff on 'security' duty –making sure people

didn't walk into view when filming was raking place! And of course, I had to watch every show! If you missed any of the Springwatch episodes, you can catch up on iPlayer.

A countryside escape at Weston Farm

In my second week, I was tasked with promoting the campsite at Weston Farm, Worth Matravers. The site is re-opening under the Trust's management at the end of July. This was a happy

coincidence for me because I lived in Worth for many years – and was there when the campsite was first opened and run by the farm!

The new campsite will be on a much smaller scale, with only 60 pitches (10 of them being bell tents for hire). So there will be plenty of space for people to spread out and enjoy the tranquillity of the site, with panoramic views across fields and hedgerows to the sea.

The landscape around the campsite is rich in wildlife – which I remember well from when I used to walk my dog there every day. Skylarks sing from high above, swallows dart in and out of old buildings, and brown hares dance in the fields. As dusk falls on summer evenings, the track

and you often see ghostly barn owls swooping low over the grassland.

The site is part of a National Trust project to enhance these habitats, and work with our partners to build a bigger, better and more joined-up landscape across Purbeck where wildlife can spread and thrive. Many may not know that Corfe Surgery is one of 6 surgeries within the *Purbeck Primary Care Network*. The GP Surgeries meet on a regular basis working together to provide to us with the best services possible in our local area under the guidance of a PCN Clinical Director and a PCN Business manager.

The PCN has reported that the Purbeck Practices have had excellent results in a recent patient access survey (more details at a later stage)but they have warned that the National picture for Primary care is not good with over 3500 GPs leaving the profession in the last twelve months with a 20% increase in GP workload, therefore making recruitment very difficult in all areas. We are

indeed very lucky to be cared for by Dr Lepper and his excellent team in Corfe but it is important that we make best use of the whole surgery team not always expecting to see a doctor.

The PCN uses Facebook and its website as its main communication channels but is asking how best it can communicate with patients in our area - any ideas would be welcomed please.(corfecastlesurgeryppg@gmail.com)

Within the PPG we are delighted to restart our Health talks, thanks to Professor Howard Thomas, a PPG member, who has arranged for Mr James Kersey to visit the Village Hall in June to talk about common eye problems and on **July 13th at 7pm in the Village Hall** we will be welcoming Professor Jonathan Brown, a Consultant Gastroenterologist who will be talking about screening for conditions that affect our digestive tract, gallbladder, liver, bile ducts and pancreas. 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

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News from The Castle

Summer is in full flow now, the flowers are out, and alfresco dining is in!

Friday Nights are still fish nights, but during the children's holidays it is too busy to continue steak nights on Thursdays, we have therefore to suspend them until the autumn.

We are, however, hoping to be hosting our magic Mondays throughout the school holiday period.

So why not come along and be amazed ... fun for everyone.

Hopefully the weather will be kind to us and we can take full advantage of our outside areas including Barbeques and live music in the garden.

What was the village up to in Tudor Times?

Purbeck was still an agricultural economy in the 16th century. There was a strict limit on how many sheep you could have on the Downs. There was also a limit on how much peat could be dug for fuel and where the turves could be cut. The villagers of Corfe were allowed to cut the furze on The Common but no one else. Terms like housebote (wood allowed to a tenant to repair his house and for fuel), and hedgebote (allowance to a tenant of wood to repair his hedges or fences), were still used (remnants of Anglo-Saxon rule). There were still two Rangers policing the hunting throughout Purbeck. Any deer, hares or other game belonged to the castle and if you got caught with traps or dogs, you were fined.



This was the last century that a Constable was appointed to look after the castle as it was sold by Queen Elizabeth I in 1572 to Sir Christopher Hatton (pictured here). A bailiff still existed as a steward of the estate.

The mayor and his 8 'barons' (Councillors) oversaw the two markets on Thursday & Saturday and the two fairs (May & October) and ran the borough. This still came with certain privileges (the mayor could stable his horse on castle property for instance).

The Rector of St Edward's was still appointed by the 'lord of the castle' i.e. the Crown. He would have lived at 'The Glebe' along the Church Knowle Road and either walked or rode to Corfe via Copper Bridge as the Church Knowle Road had not been constructed.

In 1539, East Holme Priory was surrendered at the dissolution of the monasteries and their 5 fields at the southern end of the village were granted to Richard Hamper for 21 years. Property ownership had started to change during this time and actual deeds came into existence for the first time.

Thomas Dackombe had married and moved into the village, taking over the lands that had belonged to his deceased father-in-law, Richard Clavell, and had 'Dackombes' (now called 'Moreton Manor') built in the early 1500s. He held considerable land in the parish and a 1525 taxation record, names Thomas 'Dackeham' as the only person taxed on land in the village (another influential village family, the Uvedales, were taxed at Moor Crichel); Thomas paid 1s. 3d. The next largest taxpayers were taxed on goods: John Browne £3, Christian Bugler 1s. 6d and William Benvile 1s. 3d. Robert Gillott/Gyllett at Kingston paid £3 7s. – he was taxed the most out of the whole of the Hasler and Rowbarrow Hundreds.

There were still 3 working grist mills in the parish – West Mill, Boar Mill and Arfleet. 'New Mills' still stood but is not mentioned as a working mill [this should guarantee I'll find a document that will prove me wrong!].

At the beginning of the 16th century, Henry Uvedale caused a bit of a stir. He had already been appointed constable to the castle and bailiff of both Hasler and Rowbarrow Hundreds. He had used his position to run an extortion racket in Purbeck which resulted in him being brought before the King's Council in about 1500 by John Clavell of Tyneham to answer for his actions. John had a list of accusations against Henry not least that he kept looking for gulls' eggs on his land. Henry apparently came into Purbeck with little substance but became rich from his various illicit schemes. He was pardoned by the King in 1503 and became sheriff of Dorset in 1504. His son, William, purchased the manor of Kimmeridge in 1539 after the dissolution of the Cerne Monastery. On William's death in 1542, he held 13 houses, Boar Mill, a cottage, 10 gardens and 143 acres of land in and around Corfe Castle which were inherited by his son, Henry 2. Whether these were all purchased with illicit gains is not known.

Henry 2 and William's grandson, John, built Uvedale House in 1575, using bits of castle stone. Henry also purchased Rollington in 1545 from Sir Edward Willoughby. The new major landholders were starting to increase their estate – gone were the names of Clavell, Phillips and Jay with Uvedale and Dackombe filling their gaps.

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





The Rev Anne Bond writes:

As I apply fingers to laptop this morning, I find myself wondering why I write these letters. Who am I addressing? What am I trying to achieve? Why would anyone bother to write about something so insubstantial, so difficult to explain, so utterly crazy sounding as belief in an invisible God who is not of this or any other world (or perhaps is of this and *every* other world), is in human terms dead but nevertheless alive, and who is present in the comings and goings of every*one* and every*thing* every*where* ...

Blimey. Now there's a question.

Who am I addressing? Well – you. You who are reading this, particularly if you are someone who is Not Religious. Or if you are someone who suspects there might be something in it but it's not for you. Or if you think the idea of 'God' being real is like believing in fairies and leprechauns and selkies.

What am I trying to achieve? Well: to interest you enough to make you want to enquire further and eventually to have the courage to open your mind and allow the mighty winds of change to billow in.

Why?

Because I found that abandoning my resistance to the idea of an actual, real, effective, living God and acknowledging him to be true, made a such a huge difference to my life that it affected my mindset, and consequently my attitude and actions, very much for the better – so much so that I want to pass it on.

Looking at the bigger picture: ever since humanity came on the scene mankind has worshipped a god or gods (with a small g) as 'beings' of infinitely greater possibilities than themselves. Only Judaism understood god-ness as non-corporeal – in other words, pure spirit. You could therefore not make an image of this god. He has no edges. He is not confined within the limitations of space and time. He is God (with a capital G), ever present, all

powerful, all knowing, the One and Only true, living and effective god - and as such is: GOD. There is, and only ever has been, *one* of him. He is only referred to as 'him' for convenience of human communication. As the pure spirit behind Creation (all that is and was and ever shall be) he can have no gender. However, because he communicates with us, it doesn't feel right to call him 'it'. To us, he is personal. He is GOD, the One and Only.

The first academic task of my Ordination Training was to draw a chart, mapping where we could see the hand of God in our lives. I was astonished to find myself drawing a kind of broad, segmented snake beginning with my very birth: I was born at home on the southern edge of Dorchester in January 1944 eight weeks early and not expected to survive. I was baptised at two days old because in those days it was believed that if someone died before baptism they wouldn't go to heaven. My father was away fighting in Greece during the Second World War. After a 24-hour labour my young little mother had to think of a name for this three-pound monkey-like sprat, so she called me by her own name, Sybilla, and Anne, a good plain English name – and alone, waited for me to die. Nowadays a 3-pound 7-month baby is nothing remarkable; in 1944 during a brutal war of bombs and shortages of absolutely everything, the death of such a baby was almost inevitable. But thanks to her devoted and imaginative nursing I survived: painted all over with olive oil, wrapped in cotton wool, put to bed in a hot-water-bottle cover acting as a sleeping bag, and fed on expressed milk in a tiny curved-banana-shaped bottle with a teat at both ends, against all gloomy expectation, I survived.

My mother undoubtedly prayed for her baby to live. I am not offering this story as an '*Aren't I special?*' boast. I am offering it as an example of something remarkable and unexpected, something that could be regarded as an Act of God – and to it I owe my life.

Nobody can help the circumstances of their birth, the family they are born into, and the health or otherwise of their bodies. I don't know why some people are born as healthy babies, and others arrive to suffer life-long bodily malfunction and pain. It seems terribly unfair, and I'm not going to attempt any kind of explanation ... I haven't got one, I don't know.

But I \underline{do} know that God is good; and I \underline{do} know that in every life there is evidence of the loving hand of God to be found.

An atheist was giving a lecture on the folly of believing in God and in the Bible being the Word of God. He said 'there is no God!' A Christian then answered, 'I have been a Christian for many years believing that the Lord Jesus Christ died for my sins and the Bible is my constant joy. If, after death there proves to be no God and that the Bible is a myth, what have I lost in believing all of my life?' A hush fell in the room... The atheist replied 'You won't have lost a thing' The Christian then said 'When it comes to die and you discover that the Bible is true, that God is who He said He is and that Jesus Christ is His Son and there is a Heaven and a Hell.... What would you stand to lose?' The atheist was speechless!

The Bible tells us that 'the fool has said in his heart there is no God' (Psalm 14:1)

Like the Pharisees in the time of Jesus, we also have a choice to make about Him. Jesus asked the question of His disciples 'But who do you say that I Am'? (Matt 16:15) Each one of us has to answer that question for ourselves. Either we acknowledge that He is who He said He is - the Messiah - or we reject that and think of His words and works to something other than the true Ministry of the Messiah, Saviour and King. Jesus said 'He who is not with Me is against Me', but if we are for Him, then we must come to Him His Way, and not as we might prefer. The Pharisees were open to God's invitation, but only on their own terms. As Creations of the Creator, we don't get to make the rules, we simply have to decide whether we are for Him or against Him. You can't be neutral towards Him. If the Pharisees were for Him, they would have had to change their minds on how they would gain entrance into the Kingdom. That would be by their spiritual righteousness Jesus ascribes and not by their external obedience to the law.

There is so much joy from reading the bible, so why not take the Challenge and learn how to transfer your Bible experience from a chore into an essential habit. God is waiting for you to know Him more. He's laid out the great invitation. What happens next is up to you. Why not get into the habit of reading the bible each day. A good place to start reading the Bible is the Gospel of John. We see the life of Jesus through one of His closest friends.

There is such a treasure in the Word of God just waiting for those who are willing to go after it. The Bible is often referred to as the "Word of God" or "God's Word" because it is communication from God to humanity revealing who He is and how we can have a relationship with Him. The Bible

is a collection of Books written over 1500 years by 38 Authors who God inspired to write it all down. It is a wonderful Book with one Central Theme – our relationship with God through Jesus Christ. It's a complete revelation of God to man. It is the final Authority on Faith, Doctrine and daily living. God is speaking to us through the words of the Bible where He shows us things related to our lives. The Bible can be trusted and is accurate in all its teachings and the Lessons in the bible are as relevant today as they have ever been.

Jesus said "whoever hears my word and believes Him who sent me, has eternal life and will not be condemned he has crossed over from death to life" (John 5:24)

Ofsted report - St George's C of E Primary School, Langton Matravers

Older pupils enjoy being role models for younger pupils at playtime. Pupils feel safe at school because staff help them if they have any concerns.

Focusing on leadership, the inspection team noted:

SGPS story time

Leaders, staff and governors have worked together to make rapid improvement since the previous inspection. The school community is complimentary about the drive of the headteacher. Staff say that recent changes are well thought through and have a positive impact on their workload. Pupils and parents say that the school is a welcoming place to be.

Leaders and governors have a shared vision. Governors provide relevant and constructive challenge for leaders and engage proactively with external challenge and support. This has helped to improve the quality of education. Leaders have selected the precise content they want pupils to know in most subjects. They have sequenced knowledge so it builds on to wider ideas about the subject. Pupils can recall their learning in depth. For example, in mathematics, pupils find review questions useful. They talk confidently about prior learning and explain how their fractions learning has developed over time. In Reception, children develop their understanding of number and can create number sentences independently.

Pupils know the importance of the school's values. They encourage each other to be responsible. As a result, the school is a calm place to be. Pupils know what is expected of them and they rise to these expectations. This begins in the early years. For example, leaders teach children routines, such as lining up, through song and rhyme. Pupils love initiatives such as 'secret student 'during assembly to reward a child who has behaved well. Pupils have designed postcards that members of the school community can send one another for positive behaviour and effort.

Leaders ensure the personal development curriculum has high importance as soon as children start in Reception. Children learn about right and wrong. Pupils create recipes to explain how to be mentally and physically healthy. Staff teach pupils the importance of quiet moments for reflection. Pupils know it is important to treat everyone with respect despite any differences. They benefit from trips and a wide array of clubs, such as choir, football and gymnastics. Pupils take pride in leadership roles, for example, as eco and school councillors.

This was a very encouraging and well deserved endorsement of the school. Ofsted recognised and praised the drive and leadership of headteacher, Katy Astle, and the hard work and support of all staff who work in the school.

Well done to everyone at St George's.

John Courtney

Many of you will remember John.

Sadly, he passed away at his home in Yeovil, on Friday June 9th 2023.

He was our past treasurer of the Corfe Valley News.

John was born in 1938 and lived in Weymouth with his parents until 1939, when his bank manager father moved the family to Leicester. Although he was a bright child, he spent a lot of time out of school due to poor health, having both eczema and asthma. Despite missing so much school he still managed to pass his 11+ exams and consequently attended Leicester Wyggeston grammar school for boys.

After school, he became a trainee quantity surveyor at Leicester College of Art and Technology and graduated in 1961, as a Chartered quantity surveyor with the RICS.

He was then offered a junior partnership with John Boon, a Leicester and Market Harborough based quantity surveying business, eventually becoming the Senior partner. In 1987, after moving to Chipping Campden, he started John Courtney Associates - he built an office in the garden and because he was so computer savvy, was able to run his office single handed! One of the first people to WFH (work from home) - way ahead of his time!

John enjoyed DIY. Every house he lived in was structurally changed, walls knocked down, new kitchens built. John was one of the earliest surveyors to see the potential that computers could have in the building industry. In the mid-80s (when no-one had mobile phones, let alone computers!) he accounted for every door and window at Euro Disney using a "spreadsheet"!

He was a keen Rotarian for over 50 years. He founded Blaby Rotary club, as well as forming a Rotaract club for young people in the area, and he was awarded the Philip Harris award from Rotary - a prestigious award, only given to a few. When John and Julia moved to the Cotswolds, he joined the North Cotswold Rotary club and when moving to Corfe Castle, John joined Wareham Rotary before gently retiring into the Probus club in Corfe.

John was chairman of the DeMontfort housing association for many years. This was a voluntary position where he made significant impacts – Courtney Close in Northampton is named after him! Princess Anne was there to cut the ribbon and he was always proud to have spent a morning with her.

John married Julia in 1964. Sue arrived in 1965, Graham in 1968. The family lived in Leicester right up until 1987 before moving to Chipping Camden - a place that they visited often and loved very much. They made some lifelong friends here.

In 2006 another move - to Corfe Castle. John had family roots in Dorset, he felt it was a homecoming. It wasn't long before he became treasurer of the Corfe Valley news – he loved this position and made many friends through the magazine.

John and Julia loved to travel, they cruised and flew all over the world. Even after Julia passed away, he continued to fly solo to visit Graham in the USA.

Luckily, his love of technology came to his rescue during lockdown. Recently widowed and having to isolate due to his diabetes, he embraced Facetime, Messenger, and Zooms! The curry club was a lifeline zooming twice a week, together with Pilates online with Alex, and talking to family and friends on FaceTime.

In the last year of his life, John moved to Yeovil, where he continued to have good quality days out and weekends away with Sue and Craig. Torquay was a recent holiday with Graham.

John has six grandchildren – all of whom have inherited his humour, and of course, his good looks! The family take comfort in this.

He was a loving grandpa, a wonderful dad, and an adoring husband. He was a kind, generous and warm soul, who was a real friend and who will be sorely missed.

The Rambling Gardener

July is the start of the children's holiday and we all hope for good weather here beside the sea for all the families. People drive for miles to enjoy time here, but I remember the end of July and early August sadly seems to rain. This is great for the garden, but no good for the holiday visitors.

It is a good time to sow some seeds such as black radish, cabbages and cauliflowers to grow through the winter, and also quick cropping Little Gem lettuce or oriental greens, especially if it rains. If you have room there are also green manure plants like rye, mustard, phacelia and clover that protect and enrich the ground, and may have beautiful flowers.

I think we should all eat more food that we have made fresh from things we have grown ourselves. Tonight's supper was greens from perennial kale, a little potato and some local organic bacon topped with some nasturtium flowers. It was followed by a whole apple and homegrown lemons grated with yogurt and raisins. Much of this can be grown on a balcony, or inside on a wall with the right lighting, it is time consuming but good health is worth working for and packaged food from the supermarket doesn't taste nearly the same!

Another good idea I would like to suggest is that you join up with neighbours to have joint meals sometimes, many households are smaller now. It is more fun to eat together and saves on energy and ingredients when several meals are cooked together. Our "supper club" is very relaxed, we cook together or each donate a bit of the meal and enjoy each other's different cooking styles and company each week.

One food that we all rely on is bread, but it has changed over the years. Many people cannot digest it and are intolerant to the gluten in bread. Traditionally wheat was grown for both the straw for thatching houses, feeding/bedding animals and the kernels of corn. With a population rise and processing of foods lead to high demand for wheat for bread making. The straw was not needed so wheat was crossed with rye and other grasses to halve the height of the wheat and increase its productivity. This changed the wheat DNA, and now I am unable to eat bread without falling asleep. Some people with wheat intolerance can eat bread made with old varieties of flour e.g., Einkorn, Emmer and Spelt.

Very dry weather at the end of May and in June has affected water levels, so do keep a mulch or cover around plants and be very careful with your water supply. This year putting sheep wool around many of my perennial plants and cutting excess foliage is doing a great job keeping the weeds down, keeping the ground moist, and stopping evaporation.

Have a good July and enjoy being outside. If you would like to visit, I am usually here so do come, visit the garden and have tea, but please call first. 01929 421681

Others we noticed with our untutored eyes was an abundance of rock samphire, sea kale, sea carrot (or wild carrot), white campion, wild cabbage, of course, and probably others I've forgotten. It really is amazing that in this dry weather and on the shifting shale cliffs these plants all look so healthy!

It isn't exactly Kimmeridge related, but last night we walked up on the track from the back road in Corfe Castle to Rollington Hill, and spotted various things but most exciting for us, Pyramidal Orchids in abundance, one Bee Orchid and a patch of Yellow Mignonette. All lovely to see and the views were stunning of course as well!




